#### MUNICIPALITY OF AMHERST.

BYE-LAW No. 1.—TO REGULATE BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF AMHERST.

WHEREAS by the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, section 26, it is amongst other things enacted, that "it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings;" And whereas by the 33rd section of the said Act it is further enacted, that "no such bye-law shall have any force or effect until the Lieutenant Governor shall, under his hand, have signified his assent thereto;" Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Amherst, that from and after the date of the said Governor's assent hereto, the proceedings of the said council shall be conducted according to the following regulations, which shall be deemed and called the standing orders of the said council, that is to say:—

1. That the ordinary sittings of this council shall take place on Wednesday of each week, at half-past Seven o'clock in the evening, excepting Christmas Day or any public holiday; and special meetings of the council may be convened at the same hour of any evening by the chairman or any three councillors, by written instructions to the clerk, provided that the notice be given the day before such meeting be held, and the business thereof stated. At all meetings of the council the business shall commence so soon as the legal quorum may be present, but should a quorum not be present at the expiration of twenty minutes, the circumstance shall be noted (with the names of the members present) in the minute book, and the business of such meeting shall lapse.
2. That the business of the council shall be conducted on ordinary occasions with open doors, but any one member present may require the exclusion of strangers until it shall have been decided whether the question proposed to be introduced shall be discussed with open doors.
3. That every communication addressed to the council shall be in proper form, and presented by one of its members, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.
4. Minutes of the proceedings of all meetings shall be drawn up and fairly entered into a book for that purpose, and shall be signed by the chairman or the councillor presiding at the next succeeding meeting.
5. The first business at each meeting of the council shall be to confirm the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereupon except as to the accuracy thereof.
6. At all meetings the reading of correspondence unconnected with the business of the meeting, the presentation of petitions, notices of motion, and bringing up of reports, shall have the precedence of all motions and orders of the day.
7. No motion shall be discussed or decided upon at any meeting of council unless notice in writing, signed by the councillor proposing, shall have been given at a previous meeting of the council, nor shall any report of committee be decided on unless similar notice be given.
8. The orders of the day shall include all business of which due notice has been given, and all matters arising out of former meetings of the council.
9. No motion shall be proceeded with unless the councillor

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giving notice, or one of the council authorised by him, in writing, be present to proceed with the same when called upon.

10. No bye-law shall hereafter be proposed without due notice (as in the case of motions), neither shall any such bye-law be finally passed or adopted by the council, nor be presented for the assent of His Excellency the Governor until the expiration of fourteen days from the posting thereof on the outer door of the council chamber, and a copy of all bye-laws in force under the Act shall be kept in the council chamber for the inspection, free of charge, at reasonable times, of all persons on the rate-payer's roll.

11. All business shall be considered in the order in which notice thereof was given.

12. That no payments be made except by order of the council at an ordinary meeting: then only by cheque signed by three of the councillors, and countersigned by the town clerk.

13. Any member, when proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the chairman; and no member shall be interrupted unless by a call to order, when he shall sit down. The member calling to order shall then be heard upon such point of order, and the question decided before the subject is resumed or any other business entered upon.

14. Any member desirous of proposing either an original motion or amendment, must state the nature of such motion or amendment before addressing the council in support thereof.

15. Any member making an amendment shall put it in writing, sign and deliver it to the clerk to the council, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder; and no question once brought before the council shall be withdrawn without leave of the council, nor shall any motion be entertained by the council until the same be seconded.

16. If more than one councillor rise at the same time, the chairman for the time being shall decide which is entitled to pre-audience.

17. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question unless by way of explanation merely, or in reply to the mover of an original motion, or upon any amendment; and after such explanation or reply, the question shall be forthwith put to the vote; but councillors merely seconding any motion shall not be held to have spoken upon it.

18. No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion or impute motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly.

19. The presiding chairman's decision shall be final on all questions of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument.

20. The presiding chairman shall rise when addressing the council.

21. Any councillor who shall use expressions capable of being offensively applied to any other councillor, shall, if required by the majority of the council, withdraw such expressions, and make a satisfactory apology to the council, under a penalty of not more than Ten pounds.

22. Any councillor may require the clerk to the council to take down any particular expressions immediately on their being used.

23. Any councillor may of right demand the production of any of the documents of the council bearing on the question under discussion.

24. Only one amendment shall be discussed at one time; and upon the adoption of any amendment, the original motion shall be deemed rejected, and the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.

25. The chairman shall, in taking the sense of the council, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative, and the votes of all councillors (if a division be called for) shall be entered in the minutes.

26. That all questions shall be decided by a majority of votes, exclusive of the chairman; and whenever the votes are equal, the chairman shall have the casting vote.

27. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment; but if the question be decided in the negative, the motion under consideration, or the next motion or order of the day, shall be considered before the question of adjournment shall be again entertained, and any business left undecided shall take precedence at the next meeting of the council.

28. Any councillor may record his protest against any decision of the council, provided the same be made in writing before, and presented not later than the next meeting of the council, and be couched in respectful language.

29. No motion, the effect of which would be to rescind any previous resolution of the council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council has been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the council, which shall have been negatived by the council, shall be again entertained during the same municipal year.

30. That when a call of the council has been determined on, three clear days notice in writing shall be given of each call to, or left at the residence of, each member, by the clerk to the council; and any member who shall, without reasonable cause, absent himself from the meeting upon the day for which such call shall be made, shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

31. The chairman of the council, when appointed on committee, shall be chairman thereof; and the standing orders of the council shall be observed in all committees except as to the number of times limited for speaking.

32. That upon any committee being appointed, the clerk to the council shall give such notices calling the committee together as may be requisite.

33. The clerk to the council shall have charge of the common seal of the corporation, and shall be responsible for the same, and verify each impression by his signature, and shall not affix the same to any documents without the order of the majority of the council; and for using the same to verify documents not belonging to or for the use of the council, shall charge a fee of Five shillings.

34. No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until four clear days notice shall have been given in one or more of the local journals, inviting applications for the same, and the salary or remuneration of such office shall in all cases be fixed before proceeding to the election.

35. At all such elections the voting shall be on cards provided for the purpose, on which the voter shall write the name of the candidate he supports and sign his own—no other will be received; and the clerk to the council, or chairman, shall forthwith proclaim the same aloud, and preserve the same as a record.

36. No councillor shall have any pecuniary interest in any contract or other work in connection with the council, nor shall he be received as surety for any officer; nor shall any auditor or other officer become security for any other employé of the council, or for any work to be done for the council; and in all cases where security shall be required, the expense of preparing the same shall be borne by the party giving the same.

37. The neglect or breach of any or either of the foregoing bye-laws shall (except where a sum by way of penalty is hereinafter fixed) subject the person offending to a penalty not exceeding the sum of One shilling in respect of each bye-law.

38. Any one or more of the standing orders may be suspended *pro tem.* in case of emergency, with the consent of a majority of the council.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF BEECHWORTH.

BYE-LAW No. 30.—FOR IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND ON THE RATEABLE PROPERTY IN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BEECHWORTH.

WHEREAS by the 18 Victoria No. 15, section 30, municipal councils are empowered to impose a rate not exceeding Two shillings in the pound upon all houses and lands within their respective municipalities according to the fair average annual value: Be it and it is hereby enacted by the municipal council of Beechworth, that a rate for the current municipal year of One shilling in the pound on the annual value of all rateable property within the limits of the Beechworth municipal district be imposed and levied, and be due and payable, in equal proportions, upon the tenth day of April and the tenth day of July respectively, in 1859.

BYE-LAW No. 9.—A BYE-LAW FOR MAKING AN ASSESSMENT AND IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND FOR THE YEAR 1859.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is authorised and required to assess all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district (except property belonging to Her Majesty) according to its fair average annual value, and to impose a rate on all such properties for the current year: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Brunswick, that all the several properties within the limits of the said municipal district shall be assessed for the year 1859 according to the several amounts of annual value respectively affixed to the same in the assessment roll confirmed by the said council on the 1st December, 1858, and amounting to a total sum of Thirty-two thousand two hundred and seventy-six pounds (£32,276); and also that a rate of One shilling in the pound of said annual value is hereby imposed on all the said properties for the year 1859, the first moiety thereof to be due and payable on the 1st January, and the second moiety on the 1st July, 1859.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF CARISBROOK.

BYE-LAW No. 11.—FOR CONDUCTING ELECTIONS OF MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district has the power to regulate their own elections as and in manner they may deem expedient: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Carisbrook, with the assent of His Excellency the Governor:—

1. That the chairman shall appoint the town hall, or some public place or booth, for the holding of meetings for the nominations at elections, and also one or more rooms or booths as polling places, being within the municipality.

2. That at the nomination the chairman shall have the power to adjourn the meeting to some hour of the day which shall be more convenient for the assembling of the ratepayers, and thereat any ratepayer being on the ratepayers' roll may present himself as a candidate; that in case of a poll being demanded, each candidate shall demand the same for himself, or it shall be demanded for each separately by six ratepayers: Provided, always, that the chairman shall not declare any one to be elected a member of the council who is not then a ratepayer on the roll.

3. The chairman shall appoint one or more poll clerks for each and al. of the polling rooms or booths, and shall furnish to every such poll clerk a copy of the ratepayers' roll, certified by the town clerk to be a true copy; and there shall be at least one booth for every eight hundred ratepayers; and there shall be affixed over the entrance to each booth certain letters, the entire letters of the alphabet, being comprised and divided accordingly; and no person shall be permitted to poll in any booth or room unless his surname shall begin with one of the letters so affixed over such entrance.

4. At every polling booth or room there shall be one or more compartments provided with ink, pen and blotting paper, for the purpose of enabling the ratepayers to mark the voting paper as hereinafter provided, in which booth or room no person other than the chairman, deputy chairman, poll clerks, and the scrutineers of the candidates, and the ratepayers who shall then be tendering their votes, shall be entitled to be present.

5. The chairman, or deputy chairman, shall have a locked box, of which he shall keep the key, with a cleft or opening in such box capable of receiving the voting papers, which box shall be on the table at which the chairman, deputy chairman, poll clerk and scrutineers are present; and each ratepayer, after having satisfied, as herein provided, the chairman or deputy chairman, that he is entitled to vote, shall then receive a voting paper in the form of the schedule annexed, marked A, and which voting paper shall be signed on the back by the chairman or deputy chairman; and such ratepayer shall, in such compartment provided for the purpose, strike out the names of such candidates as he does not vote for, and shall forthwith fold up the same so as to conceal the names of the candidates, and deposit it in the box aforesaid.

6. After the nomination of the candidates for the municipality shall have taken place, the chairman shall cause to be printed a number of voting papers in the form "A," which he shall have in his own custody, and shall deliver to each deputy chairman such number thereof as shall be sufficient for the number of ratepayers who may poll at the booth or room within such deputy's division, taking a receipt for the exact number so delivered, and shall keep a sufficient number of voting papers for the ratepayers who may poll at the place where he himself shall preside, and he shall sign his name on the back of every such voting paper before it shall be delivered to any ratepayer about to vote, and in like manner each deputy chairman shall sign his name on every voting paper within the division whereat he shall preside; and it shall be the duty of the chairman and each deputy chairman to keep an exact account of all such voting papers.

7. Upon delivering of the voting papers to any ratepayer, the chairman, deputy chairman or poll clerk, shall check or mark off upon a certified copy of the ratepayers' roll such voter's name as having voted, which marking off shall, *prima facie*, be evidence that such voters whose names shall thus appear on such ratepayers' roll have voted at the election at which such voting papers were delivered.

8. The chairman shall preside at one polling place, and he shall appoint, by writing under his hand, the respective polling places at which any deputy chairman shall preside; and in like manner for each polling place, the clerk, who shall assist him or either of the deputies, and who, in case of need, shall act for him or either of the deputies, and preside at any of such polling booths or rooms aforesaid respectively.

9. Each candidate may appoint one person to be a scrutineer at each polling booth or room, and every scrutineer so appointed shall, before entering on his duty as such, make and subscribe the following declaration before the chairman or any deputy, being a justice of the peace:—

I, \_\_\_\_\_ a scrutineer, appointed by \_\_\_\_\_ a candidate at the present election, do hereby solemnly declare that I will faithfully assist at the same, and that I will not attempt to ascertain for whom any ratepayer shall vote, neither will I by word or action directly or indirectly aid in the discovery of the same, unless in answer to any question which I am legally bound to answer.

10. No enquiry shall be permitted at the time of polling as to the right of any person to vote, except only as follows, that is to

say:—The chairman or deputy chairman shall, if he thinks fit or if requested by the poll clerk, by any candidate or his scrutineer, or by any two ratepayers on the roll, put to any ratepayer, before he has entered the voting compartment, and not after, the following questions:—

1st. Are you the person whose name appears on the ratepayers' roll as numbered ?

2nd. Have you voted before at this present election ?

And no person so required to answer said questions shall be qualified or entitled to vote until he shall have satisfactorily done so; and any person who shall wilfully make a false answer to any one of the said questions shall, on conviction thereof, be subject to a fine not exceeding Fifty pounds.

11. In case the voting paper as of any ratepayer has been received, and any other person shall tender his vote as the same person, the chairman or deputy shall receive his voting paper, but not allow such vote nor permit it to be put into the voting box, but shall write on the back thereof the word disputed, with his signature, and shall keep the same apart in his custody, provided such person shall duly answer the questions hereby authorized to be put to him, and sign his name on the back of the voting paper: and any person personating or attempting to personate any ratepayer or deceased ratepayer, or who shall vote a second time on the same day, at any election of members, shall upon conviction thereof forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.

12. Each deputy chairman shall, immediately on the close of the poll, make out an account of the number of the votes polled for each candidate, which shall be verified by his signature and by the signatures of the poll clerks and scrutineers then present; and shall collect and seal up all the voting papers that have been taken, together with the certified copy of the ratepayers' roll, and signed by him and the poll clerk also separately, such voting papers as have not been used, and all disputed voting papers, with all books or papers kept by him or the poll clerk during the polling, and shall forthwith proceed and deliver, or cause to be delivered, the whole of the same to the chairman; and the chairman shall in like manner make out an account of the votes polled at his division, and shall seal up all the voting papers and books as aforesaid, and shall then make out another account containing the number of all the votes polled for each of the candidates at all the polling places, which shall be verified by his signature and the signatures of the poll clerks and scrutineers then present; and this account shall be the final act of the polling, and shall determine who are the candidates elected by the majority of such votes: Provided, always, in case of equality of votes being given for two or more candidates, the chairman, who shall not otherwise vote at such election, shall give his casting vote or votes, which shall be recorded on the final account of the votes as aforesaid before being signed.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF FITZ ROY.

BYE-LAW No. 1.—TO REGULATE, BY MEANS OF RULES AND ORDERS, THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF FITZ ROY.

WHEREAS by the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, section 26, it is enacted, *inter alia*, "that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings:"

Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Fitz Roy, That from and after the date of the Governor's assent hereunto, the proceedings and business of the said municipal council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which shall be, and be called, the Standing Rules and Orders of the said municipal council; that is to say:—

#### GENERAL CONDUCT OF BUSINESS.

1. That in all cases not hereinafter provided for, resort shall be had to the rules, forms and usages of Parliament, which shall be followed, so far as the same are applicable to the proceedings of this council.

2. That the worshipful the chairman shall take the chair at the hour appointed for the meeting of the council, and if at the expiration of half an hour after the hour appointed there be not a quorum, the council shall stand adjourned to the regular day of meeting.

3. That if the chairman be not present one quarter of an hour after the hour appointed for the meeting of the council, a councillor shall be elected to preside as chairman for the time being.

4. That the chairman of the council, or the chairman for the time being, may take part in all proceedings of council, and vote thereon, and in case of an equality of votes, upon any division, shall give a casting vote.

5. That if at any time after the commencement of the business of the day there be not a quorum, the chairman shall, by his own authority, adjourn the council to the next day of meeting.

6. That at every regular meeting of the council the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting for confirmation the minutes of any preceding meetings, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings. The minutes, when confirmed, shall be signed by the chairman for the time being.

7. That after the confirmation of the minutes the order of business shall be as follows, or as near thereto as may be practicable; but for greater convenience of council, at any particular meeting thereof, it may be altered by resolution to that effect:—

#### ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1. Reading of copies of letters sent by authority of council.
2. Reading letters received, and considering and ordering thereon.
3. Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
4. Reading and ordering on reports of permanent committees.
5. Reading and ordering on reports of select committees.
6. Reading and ordering on reports of deputations.
7. Special payments.
8. Orders of the day, including subjects arising from proceedings of former meetings.
9. Motions of which previous notice has been given.
8. That communications to the council (except epistolary) shall be in form of petition or memorial.
9. That for any call of the whole council the permission of the council shall be obtained, and at least seven days' notice of such call shall be given.

10. That all addresses to the Governor shall be presented by the chairman of council and the town clerk, unless otherwise ordered by council.

11. Summonses stating the business to be transacted shall be prepared and issued to every member of the council by the town clerk, two clear days preceding that on which the meeting for such business will be held.

#### MOTIONS.

12. That all notices of motion shall be dated, and given by the intended mover, at least three days before any meeting of council, to the town clerk, who shall enter the same in the notice of motion book in the order in which they may be received.

13. That no member shall make any motion initiating a subject for discussion but in pursuance of notice given as prescribed in clause 12.

14. That no motion, except that of receiving and referring the same to such committee as desirable, shall be made on any petition or memorial until the next regular meeting of council after its presentation.

15. That orders of the day shall take precedence of motions.

16. That, except by leave of the council, motions shall be moved in the order in which they have been received and recorded by the town clerk in the notice of motion book, and if not so moved or postponed shall be struck out.

17. That no motion entered in the notice of motion book shall be proceeded with in the absence of the member who gave notice of the same, unless by some other member producing written authority from him to that effect.

18. That no motion of a bye-law shall be put for adoption until the next regular meeting of council after that at which it may be first proposed, and in the interim it shall be open to the inspection of the ratepayers.

19. That no motion of an address, petition, bye-law, or standing order shall be entertained unless the mover shall submit a draft of the same, which, unless otherwise ordered by council, shall be referred to the legislative committee, which shall report on the same at the next regular meeting of council.

20. That no motion, the effect of which would be to rescind any previous resolution of the council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council has been duly ordered for that purpose; and no motion for rescinding any resolution of the council, which shall have been negatived by the council, shall be again entertained during the same municipal year, unless by consent of at least five members of the council.

#### ORDER OF DEBATE.

21. That any member desirous of making a motion or amendment, or taking part in discussion thereon, shall rise and address the chairman, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down until the member calling to order shall have been heard thereon, and the question of order disposed of, when the member in possession of the chair shall proceed with the subject.

22. That any member desirous of proposing an original motion or amendment, must state the nature of the same before he may address the council thereon; and such motion or amendment shall be signed by the mover, and delivered by him in writing to the town clerk, who, in the event of its being seconded, shall endorse the name of the seconder thereon.

23. That no motion or amendment shall be withdrawn without the leave of the council.

24. That no motion or amendment shall be discussed or put to the vote of the council unless it be seconded. A member may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the council, by directing the chairman's attention to its infringement.

25. That a member moving a motion shall be held to have spoken thereon; but a member merely seconding a motion shall not be held to have spoken upon it.

26. That the members in meeting of council shall designate each other by their official titles, namely, that of chairman or councillor.

27. That if two or more members rise to speak at the same time, the chairman shall decide which is entitled to priority.

28. That the chairman shall rise in addressing the council to discuss any question.

29. That the chairman shall call to order any member attempting to speak a second time on the same question, unless entitled to reply, or in explanation when he has been misrepresented or misunderstood.

30. That the chairman, when called upon to decide on points of order or practice, shall state the standing order, rule, or practice which he deems applicable to the case, without discussing or commenting on the same. His decision, as to order or explanation, in each case to be final.

31. That no member shall digress from the subject-matter of the question under discussion, or comment upon the words used by any other member in a previous debate; and that all imputations of improper motives, and all personal reflections on members, shall be considered highly disorderly.

32. That whenever any member shall make use of any expression personal and disorderly, or capable of being applied offensively to any other member, the member so offending shall be required to withdraw the expression, and to make a satisfactory apology to the council.

33. That a member called to order shall sit down, unless permitted to explain.

34. That when, in consequence of highly disorderly conduct, the chairman shall call upon any member by name, such mem-

ber shall withdraw as soon as he has been heard in explanation; and after such member's withdrawal, the council shall at once take the case into consideration.

35. The business of the council shall be conducted on all ordinary occasions with open doors; but any three members present may require the exclusion of strangers, until it shall have been decided by the council whether the question proposed to be introduced shall be discussed with open doors.

36. That any member not attending in compliance with an order for a call of the whole council, without reasonable excuse to the satisfaction of the majority thereof, shall be fined a sum not exceeding five pounds.

37. That any member may, of right, demand the production of any of the documents of the council applying to the question under discussion.

38. That the council shall vote by show of hands.

39. That the chairman shall, in taking the sense of the council, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative; and the result thereof shall be recorded in the minutes, with the names therein, on divisions. And that the original manuscript of any motion or amendment that is carried be preserved until the minutes of the meeting at which the same has been carried are confirmed in the usual way.

40. That whenever amendments are made upon original propositions, no second amendment shall be taken into consideration until the first amendment is disposed of.

41. That if a first amendment be carried, it shall displace the original question, and become itself the question whereupon any further amendment may be moved.

42. That if the first amendment be negatived, then a second may be moved to the original question under consideration, but only one amendment shall be submitted to the council for discussion at a time.

43. That the mover of every original resolution, but not of any amendment, shall have a right to reply; immediately after which the question shall be put from the chair; but that no other member be allowed to speak more than once on the same question, unless permission be given to explain, or the attention of the chair be called to a point of order.

44. That no discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the council; but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the council.

45. In the consideration of any matter of detail it shall be competent for the council to resolve itself into a committee of the whole.

46. That any member of the council may enter his protest against any resolution of the council; notice of intention to protest must, however, in every case, be given on the adoption of the resolution protested against; and the protest signed by the member or members protesting, and specifying the reasons for protesting, must be entered twenty-four hours at least before the next regular meeting of the council, by the protesting member, in a book to be kept for that purpose in the town clerk's office, and duly referred to in the minutes of council, the same to be considered also part of such minutes. But such protest may be expunged if declared by a majority of the council to be not in accordance with truth, or in its terms disrespectful to the council.

#### LAISED QUESTIONS.

47. That if a debate on any motion moved and seconded be interrupted by the council being counted out, such debate may be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted, on motion upon notice.

48. That if a debate on any order of the day be interrupted by the council being counted out, such order may be restored to the notice book for a future day, on motion upon notice, and then such debate shall be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted.

49. That if the discussion of any question in a committee of the whole council be interrupted for want of a quorum, the council may order the resumption of such committee on a future day, on motion upon notice, and the discussion of such question shall then be resumed at the point at which it was so interrupted.

#### COMMITTEES.

##### Permanent.

50. That there shall be at least four permanent committees, consisting of three members each, two to form a quorum, formed under the following heads:—

1. Public works and lighting
2. Finance and rates
3. Markets and licensing
4. Health and legislative.

Which committees shall be elected annually by voting papers of members of council.

51. That every committee, at the first meeting after their appointment, shall elect one of their members to be chairman for the municipal year, and in his absence shall elect a chairman for the time being.

52. That if there shall not be a quorum of members present within one quarter of an hour after the time fixed for the meeting, the chairman may adjourn the meeting of the committee to a future day.

53. That all questions shall be decided by a majority of votes; and whenever the voices are equal, the chairman shall have the casting vote.



54. That the council shall, if they think fit, on the requisition of any member, discharge him from serving on a committee, and substitute another member for the same, and shall fill up all vacancies in committees.

55. That meetings of all committees shall be held at the council chamber.

56. The minutes of all proceedings of committees, as well as of their reports, numbered in consecutive order, shall be entered in the committee's minute book, and signed by the chairman, before presentation for confirmation or adoption by council at its next meeting.

57. That the finance and rate committee shall be at liberty, at their discretion, to authorise disbursements for current expenses to an amount not exceeding Ten pounds in any one week.

58. That the town clerk shall convene every permanent committee within ten days of its first appointment, and every select committee within five days of the same, or at any other time thereafter, by order of the council, or on the written order of the chairman, or on that of any two members of such committee, and of all committee meetings the town clerk shall give each member at least twenty-four hours' notice.

#### Select.

59. That select committees shall not consist of less than five members, three to be a quorum, and shall be subject to the same regulations, so far as they apply, as permanent committees.

60. That the mover of an adopted motion for a select committee shall be a member of the same.

#### PETITIONS.

61. That no petition shall be presented after the council shall have proceeded to the orders of the day.

62. That it shall be incumbent on every member presenting a petition to acquaint himself with the contents thereof, and to ascertain that it does not contain language disrespectful to the council, or that the contents violate any of the standing orders of the same.

63. That every petition must be in writing, and not printed or lithographed.

64. That every petition must be signed by, at least, one person on every skin or sheet on which it is written.

65. That every member presenting a petition to the council shall confine himself to a statement of the persons from whom it comes, of the number of signatures attached to it, of the material allegations contained in it, and to the reading of the prayer thereof.

66. That every such petition receivable shall be presented to the chairman, who shall not allow any debate thereupon on its presentation, or any member to speak upon or in relation to such petition.

#### ELECTIONS.

67. That no election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until seven clear days' public notice shall have been given, by advertisement in one or more local newspapers, inviting applications from qualified candidates for the same.

68. That the salary or allowance attached to all offices and places at the disposal of the council shall, in all cases, be fixed before they proceed to election.

69. That elections herein referred to shall be by voting cards or papers containing the names of the persons voted for, and signed by the member delivering the same, or they shall not be receivable, and every such officer must be elected by the votes of an absolute majority of the whole council.

70. That the town clerk shall preserve the voting cards used at any election for twelve months thereafter.

71. That no member or officer of the council, or any auditor of Fitz Roy municipality, shall be received as a surety for any officer appointed by the council, or for any work to be done for the council. In all cases of security being given for the faithful performance of any duty or contract the expense of preparing such security shall be borne by the person providing the same.

#### MISCELLANEOUS.

72. That the town clerk shall have the custody of the common seal of the municipal council, and be responsible for the same, and the proper use thereof; each impression of the seal being verified by the signature of that officer.

73. That the town clerk shall affix the municipal seal to contracts, bonds, and licenses requiring the same; and to all by-laws and addresses to the Governor passed by the council; but he shall not affix it to any other municipal document without the authority of the council.

74. That the town clerk may affix the municipal seal to powers of attorney, and other legal instruments not relating to the municipal council, and be allowed to charge for the same not less than Five shillings or more than Ten shillings, for verifying the same with his signature, or countersigning and sealing a certificate, &c., of the chairman of council.

#### SUSPENSION OF STANDING RULES AND ORDERS.

75. Any one or more of the standing rules and orders may be suspended *pro tem.*, in case of emergency, with the consent of a majority of the council.

SECOND REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF KYNETON FOR THE HALF-YEAR ENDED 10TH DECEMBER, 1858, INCLUSIVE.

## MEETINGS.

THE council have held 26 general and 4 special meetings. Of these the chairman, Dr. Kelly, attended 27 (when absent was engaged on municipal affairs); councillors Kenworthy 23, Geary 25, Thompson 19 out of 20, Lecto 22, Fitzgerald 27, and Healy 17 meetings. The public works and other standing committees also held several meetings.

## PUBLIC WORKS.

During the half-year the council have constructed a bridge over the Post Office Creek, filled dangerous holes and excavations in various parts of the municipality, and fenced Jennings street quarry. They have also entered into the following contracts, viz.:—For 20 iron gas lamp posts and lamps for lighting the town with gas; for making upwards of two miles of footpaths in High, Epping, Baynton, Mollison, Ebdon, Jennings, Hutton, Yaldwin, and Piper streets; and for constructing three culverts, in Epping, Baynton, and Ebdon streets. The kerbing of the footpaths has been delayed for the present for want of means, the contracts already entered into considerably more than exhausting the whole of the funds now at the disposal of the council.

## APPLICATIONS TO GOVERNMENT.

For set of standard weights and measures.—Refused.  
For repair of Government road forming eastern boundary of municipality.—Refused.  
For removal of head-quarters of police from Carlsruhe to Kyneton.—Will be complied with as soon as convenient.  
For copy of Adamson's Acts.—Refused.  
To clear culverts and drainage on main road.—Granted.  
To remove heaps of road metal from main road.—Refused.

## MISCELLANEOUS.

The municipal assessment was reduced on appeal to £21,945 16s., the rate on which, at one shilling in the pound, amounts to £1097 5s. 9d., of which £702 1s. 3d. has been collected.

The Government granted £1000 in aid of the municipal funds for the year 1858, a sum which the council cannot but think far less than the municipality was entitled to. A bye-law for appropriating the amount was passed by the council, and approved of by the Governor. Every effort was made to obtain an additional grant, but without success.

On the 3rd September last, the council had an interview with the Honorable the Chief Secretary, on his visit to Kyneton, and pressed the following matters upon his consideration, viz.:—An additional grant of money for the year 1858; the establishment of criminal sessions; the enlargement of the Court House; the building of a gaol; the near approach of the railway to the town; the establishment of the money-order system; the construction of a bridge over the Campaspe at the south end of Mollison street; the building of a post office, and a site for same; the site for a botanical garden, and a grant for fencing and laying out same; the site for town hall, and a grant to the Mechanics' Institute. Mr. O'Shanassy concurred generally in the views of the council, and promised his influence in carrying them out, if practicable.

The levels and gradients of the principal streets of the municipality have been taken, but the same have not yet been finally adopted.

The council, feeling the importance of the near approach of the railway to the town, petitioned both Houses of Parliament in favor of the North Deviation Line, in opposition to the Government Line running upwards of two miles therefrom. They also granted £150 in aid of the funds of the committee for carrying out that object.

On the 25th June last, councillor Douglas resigned his seat in the council, and councillor Thompson was elected in his stead.

Councillors Lecto, Fitzgerald and Healey, retired from the council by rotation at the end of the municipal year, and councillors Thomas Lloyd James, John Bland and Thos. P. Healey, were elected to the vacancies.

On the 13th August last the council had occasion to dismiss their late town surveyor, and elected Mr. William Donnelly to the office.

Mr. Drought, sergeant of police, has been appointed Inspector of Nuisances and Weights and Measures.
