ABSTRACT OF METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVATIONS TAKEN IN VICTORIA, DURING THE QUARTER ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1857.

THE weather was cold in October, and a considerable quantity of rain fell; and in November it was fine and moderately warm, with frequent light showers. Very little rain fell in any part of the country in December, and severe hot winds were experienced. That which occurred on the 23rd is said to have greatly injured the wheat crops in the neighboring colonies, and much fruit and garden produce was injured or destroyed by it in Victoria. Bush fires raged in many parts of the western district during its continuance.

The humidity in October was much above the average, in November it was above the average, and in December the air was very dry.

The mean temperatures at Melbourne, as compared with 1855 and 1856, were as follows:—

October.—The thermometer in shade at Melbourne exceeded 80° on two days, 70° on four days, rose to 70° on one day, exceeded 60° on twenty days, and 50° on four days. Southerly winds prevailed, and they were generally brisk or light. Cumulus and nimbus clouds were common. The highest temperature recorded was 81.0° on the 15th, and the lowest 40.1° on the 10th.

November.—The thermometer in shade exceeded 80° on three days, 70° on ten days, 60° on sixteen days, and 50° on one day. The prevailing winds were southerly, and generally brisk. At night it was frequently calm or nearly calm with a clear sky. Thunder-storms occurred between the 20th and 23rd. The highest temperature recorded was 89.7° on the 8th, and the lowest 42.6° on the 14th.

December.—The thermometer in shade exceeded 100° on two days, 90° on six days, 80° on seven days, 70° on nine days, and 60° on seven days. The prevailing winds were south and south-east, and generally brisk during the day. At night it was often calm or nearly calm. Slight thunder-storms occurred on the 1st, and between the 17th and 19th. The highest temperature recorded was 109.2° on the 23rd, and the lowest 47.6° on the 5th.

The mean temperature of the dew-point was 51.3°, being 3.3° higher than the mean for the same quarter in 1856.

The mean degree of humidity (complete saturation = 1.000) at Melbourne, as compared with the same quarter in 1855 and 1856, was as follows:—

At GEELONG the mean temperature for the *Spring* of 1856 was 57°0', and the total rainfall was 5·44 inches. For the same season, in 1857, the mean temperature was 56°0', and the total rainfall 8·97 inches.

Lightning was seen, but thunder was not heard, at Melbourne on 4th and 31st October, 13th and 19th November, and 12th, 16th and 22nd December; at Geelong on 17th December; at Camperdown on 17th December; at Mount Ararat on 18th December; and at Wimmera, near Crowlands, on 18th December.

Thunder was heard, but lightning was not seen, at Melbourne on 23rd November; at Heathcote on 9th and 31st October, and 1st, 17th, 18th, 19th December; at Sandhurst on 22nd November and 16th December; at Beechworth on 23rd and 30th October, 20th November and 9th December; at Ballarat on 4th October; at Camperdown on 19th October and 1st and 11th December; at Kooyooora on 13th and 21st November; at Mount Egerton on 19th November; at Mount Ararat on 4th October, 13th November, and 11th December; and near Kangaroo Range on 11th and 17th December.

Thunder-storms occurred at Melbourne on 20th and 22nd November, and 1st, 17th, 18th and 19th December; at Geelong on 19th November; at Heathcote on 20th and 22nd November, and 1st, 17th, 18th and 19th December; at Sandhurst on 20th November, and 17th, 18th and 19th December; at Beechworth on 13th, 15th, 20th, 22nd and 23rd November, and 1st, 12th, 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th December; at Ballarat on 19th, 20th and 22nd November, and 18th December; at Portland on 28th October and 22nd November; at Camperdown on 4th October, 19th, 20th and 23rd November, and 18th December; at Kooyooora on 22nd November, and 16th, 17th and 19th December; at Mount Egerton on 20th November and 17th December; at Kooyooora Springs, near Warenheip, on 20th November; at Mount Ararat on 19th, 20th, 22nd and 23rd November, and 17th December; near Kangaroo Range on 4th October, 13th, 19th and 22nd November, and 18th December; and at Wimmera, near Crowlands, on 4th October, 19th, 20th and 22nd November, and 11th and 17th December.

Fog was present at Melbourne on 6th October and 18th December; at Portland on 18th November; at Camperdown on 15th December; at Mount Egerton on 5th and 14th October, 5th November, and 13th and 22nd December; and near Kangaroo Range on 6th October and 9th November.

Shooting Stars were observed at Melbourne on 17th and 27th October, 4th, 6th, 11th and 21st November, 5th, 6th, 7th, 9th, 10th, 14th, 17th, 18th and 22nd December; at Geelong on the 17th December; at Sandhurst on 30th November; at Camperdown on 30th November; at Mount Egerton on 23rd December; and at Mount Ararat on 17th November and 22nd December.

Solar Halos were observed at Melbourne on 3rd and 11th October, and 1st, 7th and 27th December; and at Camperdown on 8th and 11th October, and 27th December.

Lunar Halos were visible at Melbourne on the 27th and 28th October, 21st November, and 27th December; at Geelong on 28th October; at Heathcote on 27th October; at Beechworth on 2nd and 5th October; at Ballarat on 27th and 28th October; at Camperdown on 27th October and 27th November; and at Kooyooora on the 5th October.

Hail fell at Heathcote on 31st October and 13th November; at Sandhurst on 9th October and 22nd November; at Beechworth on 23rd October, 13th, 20th and 23rd November, and on 9th December; at Camperdown on 13th November; at Kooyooora on 30th October and 13th November; at Mount Egerton on 23rd and 31st October, 13th November, and 17th December; at Mount Ararat on 31st October and 13th November; and at Wimmera, near Crowlands, on 31st October, and 13th and 20th November.

Snow fell at Mount Egerton on 23rd October.

Hoar Frost was observed at Camperdown on 3rd, 6th, 10th and 11th October, and 12th November; and at Mount Ararat on 10th October.

Hot or Warm Winds blew at Melbourne on 16th October, 8th and 9th November, and 1st, 7th, and 23rd* December; at Geelong on 23rd December; at Heathcote on 9th November, 7th, 11th, 23rd and 25th December; at Sandhurst on 23rd December; at Beechworth on 9th November, and 11th, 23rd and 24th December; at Ballarat on 16th October, 8th, 9th and 30th November, and 1st, 7th and 23rd December; at Portland on 7th and 23rd December; at Kooyooora on 9th and 10th November, and 7th, 8th, 9th, 19th and 23rd December; at Camperdown on 23rd December; at Kooyooora on 9th and 10th November, and 7th, 8th, 9th, 19th and 23rd December; at Mount Egerton on 9th November and 23rd December; at "The Springs," near Warenheip, on 23rd December; at Mount Ararat on 3rd and 16th October, 7th and 9th November, and 1st and 23rd December; near Kangaroo Range on 23rd December; at Wimmera, near Crowlands, on 8th and 9th November, and 7th, 8th and 23rd December; and at Port Albert, Gipps Land, on 10th November and 23rd December.

The Aurora Australis was seen at Melbourne on 17th December; at Geelong on 17th and 22nd December; at Sandhurst on 17th December; at Beechworth 17th December; at Camperdown on the 17th December, and at Port Albert on the 17th December.

Pear in blossom at Melbourne, 4th October.

Apple in blossom at Melbourne, 18th October; at Beechworth, 7th October; and at Portland in October.

Fig in blossom at Beechworth, 8th October.

Vine in blossom at Melbourne, 18th October; and at Heathcote, 1st December.

Cherry in blossom at Heathcote, 10th October; ripe at Melbourne, 18th November; ripe at Heathcote, 1st November; ripe at Beechworth early in November; and ripe at Portland in November.

Plum in blossom at Heathcote, 10th October; ripe at Melbourne, 30th December; and ripe at Portland in December.

Peach ripe at Portland in December.

Wheat in ear at Heathcote, 25th November; and at Portland in November.

Barley in ear at Heathcote, 10th November; at Beechworth, 11th October; and Portland in November; ripe at Heathcote, 3rd December.

Hay cut at Heathcote, 25th November; at Beechworth and Melbourne, early in November; at Heathcote it was generally stacked before the 20th, and at Melbourne before the 21st December.

* The hot wind on the 23rd December blew with great force. At Melbourne the maximum pressure was 12½ lbs. per square foot, and the highest temperature in shade was 109°2'; at Geelong the maximum temperature in shade was 107°0'; at Heathcote 102°8'; at Sandhurst 105°3'; at Beechworth 104°0'; at Ballarat 103°9'; at Mount Egerton 104°0'; at Kooyooora 109°7'; at Port Albert 103°5'; and at Williamstown 110°5'. At those stations not furnished with maximum instruments, the temperature at 3½ p.m. was taken, and at Camperdown it was 95°2'; at "The Springs," near Warenheip, 102°0'; at Mount Ararat 110°0'; at Cuncunjiella Creek, near Pleasant Creek, 105°0'; and at Wimmera, near Crowlands, 109°0'.

† On 7th December this meteor was visible at Ballarat, at 8½ p.m., after a day of intense heat, but it is not reported to have been seen at any other station.

The Barometer readings have been reduced to 32° Fahr. and (except those at Beechworth) corrected for altitude above the mean level of the sea. The altitudes of the Beechworth Observatory is about 1700 or 1800 feet. The adopted Mean Temperatures have been deduced from Self-registering Thermometers. The Hygrometrical results have been deduced from Gishers's Tables. The instruments used are Standard Barometers by Norman; and Thermometers by Cassin and Zambra, corrected by Kew Standards.

MUNICIPALITY OF ST. KILDA.

BYE-LAW No. 4.—FOR THE BETTER PREVENTION OF FIRES, AND THE SUPPRESSION OF NUISANCES ARISING FROM THE BURNING OF BRICKS AND OFFENSIVE MATTERS, OR FROM INSUFFICIENT CHIMNEYS IN MANUFACTORIES.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," the council of every municipality established pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, is empowered to make bye-laws for the prevention and extinguishing of fires, and for the restraining of noisome and offensive trades, and for the general good rule and government of such municipality: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the council of the municipal district of St. Kilda as follows, that is to say:—

1. That from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of Victoria, pursuant to the said recited Act, every occupier of any premises within the municipal district of St. Kilda, whereof any chimney-flue shall take fire from having been suffered to become foul, shall on conviction thereof forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding Five pounds (£5).

2. That every person burning bones, ordure, or other offensive substances, so as to be a nuisance to his neighbors or to

the public, shall on conviction thereof forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds (£10).

3. That any brickmaker or other person causing bricks to be burned within one hundred and fifty yards of any dwelling-house within the municipality (except such dwelling-house be in his own occupation), shall on conviction forfeit and pay for every such offence a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20).

4. That every occupier of any fire-place or furnace within the limits of the said municipality, used in the working of any steam engine, or in any mill, factory, dye-house, smithy, forge, blast furnace, or brewery, or in any manufactory whatsoever (although a steam engine be not inside thereof), shall provide that such fire-place or furnace be within and on every side enclosed by a building, the walls whereof are of brick, stone, iron, or other non-inflammable material, and shall erect and raise every chimney in connection therewith, now built or hereafter to be built, to such a height as the said municipal council, or their surveyor or other duly authorised officer, shall deem necessary for preventing the same from being injurious or offensive to the neighborhood or the public, and shall by notice in writing require; and any such occupier as aforesaid who shall fail to enclose such fire-place or furnace now existing and unenclosed on any side, or to raise any such chimney or chimneys to the height so to be prescribed, or who being thereto required in writing by the town clerk or surveyor of the said municipal district, shall, after the lapse of twenty-eight days, neglect or refuse so to enclose such fire-place or furnace, or to raise any such chimney to the height prescribed, or who shall after the lapse of the said period of twenty-eight days from and after the date of such notice, cause or permit the smoke from such fire-place or furnace to escape otherwise than by such chimney of the prescribed height, shall, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20), and a further penalty not exceeding Ten pounds (£10) for every week during which he shall thereafter neglect or refuse so to enclose such fire-place or furnace, or to erect or raise the chimney or chimneys thereof as aforesaid.

MUNICIPALITY OF ST. KILDA.

BYE-LAW No. 13.—FOR THE CONDUCTING OF ELECTIONS AND PUBLIC MEETINGS OF THE RATEPAYERS, THE DETERMINING THE VALIDITY OF DISPUTED ELECTIONS, AND REGULATING THE PROCEEDINGS AT THE ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN.

AT all public meetings of the ratepayers, convened by the council or the chairman, for the election of councillors or other municipal business, the chairman, or in his absence the senior councillor then present, shall preside, and (in case of an equality of votes) shall have a casting vote.

2. On a poll being taken at elections of councillors, the chairman shall appoint one or more places or places within the municipal boundaries as poll booths; and in case of his appointing more than one such polling place, he shall appoint a deputy to preside at each such booth at which he does not himself preside. He shall also appoint a poll clerk or clerks for each booth, and each candidate may, if he thinks proper, appoint one scrutineer for each booth; and no persons shall be allowed to remain within the barrier at such booth, except the parties so to be appointed and the candidates, unless for the purpose of voting, or by the chairman or deputy chairman's special authority.

3. Each voter shall be furnished with a paper or card, which shall be signed on the back by the chairman or deputy chairman, and upon which shall be printed the names of the candidates placed in nomination. The voter shall strike out the name of such candidates as he does not intend to vote for, and sign his name thereto; and in case such voter shall be unable to write, he shall signify the same to the chairman or his deputy, who, in the presence of the poll clerk and scrutineers, shall thereupon strike out the name of such candidates as the voter may request; and such act of the chairman or his deputy, in the presence of the clerk and scrutineers, shall be deemed to be the act of the voter, and subject him to the penalties of this bye-law; and no voter shall take out of the poll booth any such voting paper, either before or after the same shall have been marked. And any voter wilfully infringing any of the provisions of this clause, or obstructing the polling by any unnecessary delay in performing any act, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

4. The chairman or deputy chairman shall, if requested, put the following questions to the voter before voting:—

(1.) Are you the person whose name appears on the ratepayers' roll numbered — ?

(2.) Have you voted before at this election ?

5. Any person personating or attempting to personate any elector or deceased elector, or who shall vote a second time on the same day, shall, upon conviction, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

6. No intelligible voting paper shall be rejected or disallowed for want of form, and should more names be left thereon than there are vacancies, the excess in number may be struck out by or under the direction of the voter.

7. At all elections, in case of equality of votes being recorded for two or more candidates, the chairman shall give the casting vote or votes.

8. For determining the validity of disputed elections, the whole council (the member or members whose election is disputed excepted) shall be a committee of elections and qualifications, four to form a quorum, at which the chairman of the council, or, if absent at the commencement of proceedings, the senior councillor present, shall preside, and in all cases of equality of votes shall have a casting vote.

9. The committee shall meet in the council chamber on days not appointed for the holding of council meetings, and be attended by the town clerk, who shall record the minutes of every such meeting.

10. The chairman, of his own authority, may, or on the written request of three members to him to that effect shall, convene meetings of committees of elections, &c.

11. The committee shall have power to regulate their proceedings and to adjourn their meetings, which shall be held with open doors, unless during special deliberations.

12. Each member of committee present shall be required to vote.

13. The ratepayers' roll shall be assumed to be correct, and the committee shall enquire into the identity of the electors, their retention of qualification, and whether the votes were *bona fide*. If proved to the satisfaction of the committee that persons by fraud, force, menace or any undue influence by or on the part of any candidate or his agent, committeemen or partisan, or any of them, gave or were prevented from giving their votes, such votes shall be struck off or recorded, as the case may be established.

14. The acts of authorised agents shall be regarded as those of the principal, if it be proved to the satisfaction of the committee that they were performed with his knowledge, power or consent.

15. The person determined by the committee to be duly elected shall be declared so to be by the chairman.

16. All petitions complaining of an undue election must be signed by a candidate, or by not less than six ratepayers, and be presented within twenty-one days after the election complained of.

17. Ratepayers may be admitted to defend the election or support the petition, if it be abandoned by the person or persons originally presenting it.

18. Written declarations of vacancies in the council, resulting from disqualification by absence or otherwise, may be made by the chairman and one or more councillors, and countersigned by the town clerk.

19. Resignation of membership of council shall be made in writing, addressed to the chairman of the council, and be presented by him to the council at the next meeting thereafter for their ordering on the same.

20. The chairman of the council shall be annually elected in the following manner:—Each councillor being supplied by the town clerk with a voting paper containing the names of the whole of the members of council, shall mark that of the councillor for whom he votes, and deposit the paper in the urn or voting box. On the delivery of the whole papers (it being obligatory upon every member of council present to vote), if the whole council be present, otherwise, after one hour, the chairman shall announce the name of each councillor voted for, the number of such votes, and declare the name of the one who has a majority of votes to be duly elected the chairman of the council for the ensuing municipal year, who shall take the chair accordingly.

21. If the result of voting for chairman should be that the highest number of votes is held equally by two or more councillors, then another voting shall take place for those councillors only holding such equality of votes until a majority is recorded, the chairman giving a casting vote in addition to his own in case of an equality of votes on the final division.

22. Upon the resignation or disqualification of the chairman of the council, at the next meeting of the council thereafter the senior councillor then present shall take the chair *pro tem.*, and immediately after the confirmation of the minutes of the preceding meeting shall proceed to the election of a chairman of council for the residue of the municipal year in manner prescribed by this bye-law; and in the event of an equality of votes being recorded, shall have a casting vote in addition to his own.

23. In determining the seniority of councillors for the purposes of this bye-law, it shall be understood to mean those councillors who shall have held office for the longest period without re-election, and having the greatest number of votes when elected.

MUNICIPALITY OF WARRNAMBOOL.

BYE-LAW No. 11.—TO AUTHORISE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF WARRNAMBOOL TO COLLECT TOLLS, DUES, AND RENTS DUE TO THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL AFORESAID FROM ALLOTMENTS NOS. 1, 2, 3, 4, AT THE TRAMWAY TERMINUS.

(Under 18 Victoria No. 15, sec. 29.)

WHEREAS by the Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Assembly of the colony of Victoria, intituled "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be competent for every such municipal council, whenever it shall appear necessary, to establish tolls, rates, and dues upon any road, market, wharf, or jetty within the jurisdiction and under the control of such council, and to erect toll-gates, toll-bars, or other works necessary for the collection of such tolls, rates, or dues, and to make such bye-laws for the proper collection and management of such tolls, rates, and dues as to such municipal council shall seem fit:

Be it therefore ordered and directed by the council of the municipal district of Warrnambool, That from and after the date of the Governor's assent hereto it shall be lawful for the said municipal council to collect the tolls, rates, dues, and rents accruing and due from Allotments Nos. 1, 2, 3, and 4, at the Tramway Terminus; said allotments being let for the reception and storage of goods and produce, &c., *in transitu* to and from the jetty; the toll or rent not to exceed Ten pounds per annum for each or any of the said allotments.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 11, made by the municipal council of Warrnambool, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF WILLIAMSTOWN.

BYE-LAW No. 20.—FOR REGULATING THE MARKET FOR THE SALE OF GARDEN AND FARM PRODUCE, MEAT, FISH, ETC., AND FOR FIXING AND LEVYING RATES, TOLLS, RENTS, AND DUES IN RESPECT OF SUCH MARKET.

WHEREAS by Proclamation dated the twenty-second day of October, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to approve of the establishment of a market within the municipal district of Williamstown, and did by the said Proclamation fix and determine the boundaries thereof: And whereas it is expedient and necessary to erect suitable sheds or stalls and other conveniences in the said market for the sale of fruit, vegetables, roots, poultry, eggs, pork, fresh butter, hay, grain, green fodder, straw, and other garden and farm produce, butchers' meat, fish, wild fowl, rabbits, kangaroo, and such other articles of food as may from time to time be by the municipal council of the said district sanctioned and allowed to be sold in the said market, and that rates, tolls, rents, and dues should be fixed, levied and collected for the use of the said sheds or stalls, and in respect of all and every the articles and things brought or taken into the said market for sale, and that such rules, regulations, fines and penalties, should be made, imposed and inflicted by the said municipal council as are proper and necessary for the due regulation and government of the said market, and of the persons using or frequenting the same, and that an officer or officers should be appointed to collect the said rates, tolls, rents, and dues, and to enforce the said rules and regulations of the said market and to keep due order therein:

Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the said council of the municipal district of Williamstown, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, pursuant to the 18th Victoria No. 15, section 33, &c.—

1. That it shall be lawful for the said council, and they are hereby authorised and directed, if they shall think fit, to erect or cause to be erected on that part of the said market which is situated between and bounded by Parker street on the north-west, by Cole street on the east, and by a reserve, on which is erected the Roman Catholic church and minister's house, on the south, such sheds or stalls and other conveniences as they may deem necessary for the sale of fruit, vegetables, roots, poultry, eggs, pork, fresh butter, hay, grain, green fodder, straw, and other garden and farm produce, butchers' meat, fish, wild fowl, rabbits, kangaroo, and such other articles of food as the municipal council may allow to be exposed and sold on that part of the said market, and that it shall not be lawful for any person to expose for sale or to sell on that part of the said market any other article or thing than is enumerated or referred to above.

2. That it shall be lawful for the said council to let on lease or otherwise, for any period not exceeding three years, at such rent or rents as they may from time to time affix thereon, all such sheds or stalls, and other conveniences as they the said council may erect or cause to be erected, or of sites for the erection of the same within the said market, and to re-let the same as often as the periods of such lettings shall expire or be otherwise determined; and that for the better regulating and classifying the arrangements of the said market each and every lease or agreement for a shed, stall, or other convenience, or of a site for erecting the same, shall contain a clause setting forth

the articles or class of articles for the sale of which such premises have been let, and that no other article, or articles, or class of articles, shall be exposed for sale or sold in or on the said premises than is named or referred to in the said several leases or agreements respectively, without the consent, in writing, of the said council, first had and obtained in manner hereinbefore set forth.

3. That the said council shall be empowered to impose, levy and collect all such rates, tolls and dues in respect of and on all articles brought or taken in the said market, or any of the sheds or stalls thereof, for sale or sold therein, as are enumerated in Table A in the schedule to this bye-law appended.

4. That it shall be lawful for the said council, and they are hereby authorised and directed, if they shall think fit, to appoint a clerk of the market, with such salary as they may deem meet, and to discharge the said clerk and appoint another in his place as often as to them shall appear necessary, whose duties shall be generally to see that the market rules and regulations are duly observed, to preserve order and regularity in the market and the precincts thereof, to collect all rates, tolls, rents and dues levied or imposed by this bye-law, or by any future bye-law or bye-laws in respect of the said market, or of any goods sold or exposed for sale therein; and the said council are hereby further authorised and directed, if they shall think fit, to appoint any assistant or assistants to the said clerk, and any laborer or laborers, or other persons to be employed in and about the said market, and to discharge him or them as often as they shall deem necessary, and to employ any other or others in his or their place or places, and to pay him or them such salary or salaries, or wages as they shall deem meet—such assistant or assistants, laborer or laborers, to be under the direction and control of the clerk of the market, who shall be responsible to the said council for the due governance and control of the said market, and the persons employed under his directions.

5. That the said market shall be open for the sale of all articles hereinbefore enumerated, or hereafter to be allowed, on every day throughout the year (Sundays, Christmas Days and Good Fridays excepted), as follows, viz.:—During the months of May, June, July and August, from Six o'clock in the morning till Six o'clock in the evening; and during the other months of the year from Five o'clock in the morning to Seven o'clock in the evening, except that on Saturday throughout the year the market shall remain open till Eleven o'clock in the evening. Any person opening his or her shed or stall before the hours named above for that purpose, or keeping the same open after the hours named above for that purpose, shall, on information of the clerk of the market, and on conviction thereof before any two or more of the justices of the peace for the said district for every such offence forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Forty shillings.

6. That any person who shall resist the clerk of the market or his assistant in the discharge of his duty, shall, on conviction thereof as aforesaid for every such offence forfeit and pay in addition to any other penalty which he or she may have incurred for assault or otherwise a sum or penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

7. That any person who may place any matter or thing so as to obstruct the streets and footways in and adjoining to the said market, or otherwise to obstruct the business thereof, and who shall refuse or neglect to remove the same immediately on being required by the clerk of the market so to do, shall on conviction thereof as aforesaid for every such offence forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Forty shillings.

8. That any person who shall deposit or cause to be deposited any rubbish or refuse matter in or upon the streets, footpaths or gutters in or adjoining to the said market, or in any other place than that which has been set apart for that purpose, and who shall refuse or neglect to remove the same immediately on being required by the clerk of the market or his assistant so to do, shall on conviction thereof as aforesaid for every such offence forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Forty shillings.

9. That the holder of every shed or stall in the said market shall within one hour after the opening of the same thoroughly cleanse his or her shed or stall, and the footways and gutters in front thereof or adjoining thereto; and any such holder neglecting on refusing so to do, shall on conviction thereof as aforesaid for every such offence forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Forty shillings.

10. That the space marked A on the plan of the said market shall be set apart and enclosed by the said council for the receipt of rubbish or refuse matter, to which all such rubbish or refuse matter produced within the said market or markets, or in the sheds or stalls thereof, or on or in the streets, footpaths, or gutters adjoining to the same shall be conveyed, and such of the said rubbish or refuse matter which in the foregoing clauses of this bye-law, or some or one of them, has been directed to be cleansed by the persons occupying the sheds or stalls shall be removed thereto by the said persons respectively; and any of the said persons who shall neglect or refuse to remove as aforesaid such rubbish or refuse matter immediately on being directed by the clerk of the market or his assistant so to do, shall on conviction thereof as aforesaid for every such offence forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Forty shillings.

11. That the owner or person in charge of any cart, dray, waggon, barrow, or other carriage, using the said market, shall place the same in the order and position directed by the clerk of the market or his assistant. Any person offending against the provisions of this clause shall on conviction thereof as aforesaid for every such offence forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Forty shillings.

12. That any person who shall sell or offer for sale in the said market any of the commodities hereinbefore enumerated, or any other articles or things allowed or hereinafter to be allowed to be sold in the said market, before the appointed time for opening, or after the appointed time for closing such market as aforesaid, shall, on information of the clerk of the market, and on conviction thereof as aforesaid, for every such offence forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Forty shillings.

13. That any person who shall offer for sale in the said market any article or thing not allowed by this bye-law to be sold in the said market or markets, shall, on information of the clerk of the market, and on conviction thereof as aforesaid for every such offence forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Forty shillings.

14. That all sheds or stalls in the said market shall be erected under the direction of the municipal surveyor to a uniform plan and elevation, sanctioned by the said council, who shall have the power to alter or modify the same from time to time as they may think fit, and that any person who shall erect or cause to be erected any shed or stall not being in accordance with the said plan and elevation, and with the directions of the said municipal surveyor, without the sanction of the said council in writing, under the hand of the chairman, and countersigned by the town clerk, or who shall pull down or alter any shed or stall already erected without the sanction aforesaid, shall on conviction thereof as aforesaid for every such offence forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Fifty pounds.

15. That any person who shall be desirous of having his or her name or calling painted or affixed to any shed or stall occupied by him or her in the said market, shall have the same painted or affixed in such manner as shall be directed by the said municipal surveyor, and if any person shall have his or her name or calling painted or affixed on any shed or stall in the said market in any other manner than as sanctioned as aforesaid, or who shall not obliterate or remove the same immediately on notice from the clerk of the market, if painted or affixed without the sanction as aforesaid, shall on conviction thereof as aforesaid for every such offence forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Five pounds.

16. That any person who shall refuse or neglect to pay on demand by the clerk of the market or other officer appointed by the said council to receive the same, any rate, toll, rent or due which may be due from him or her in respect of any shed or stall, or of any article or thing sold or exposed for sale by him or her in the said market or in the precincts thereof, shall on conviction thereof as aforesaid for every such offence forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Five pounds.

17. That nothing contained in this bye-law shall be construed to interfere with the sale either by wholesale or retail of any fruit, potatoes, or other esculent roots, hay, grain, flour, fish, rabbits, kangaroo, or wild fowl, on board of any ship, barge, boat or other craft, lying at any wharf within the jurisdiction of the council of the said district, or with the landing of any such articles from on board of any ship, barge, boat or other craft lying in Hobson's Bay or in any of the adjacent tidal waters.

18. That the said council shall from time to time, as they shall see fit, repeal any of the rules and conditions in this bye-law contained, and on such repeal being sanctioned by his Excellency the Governor, such rules and conditions as aforesaid shall be void and of no effect, or they may substitute other rules and conditions for those repealed, or alter or amend all or any of the said rules, conditions, tables and forms in this bye-law, or in the schedule thereunto appended, contained, and such substitutions, alterations and emendations shall when sanctioned as aforesaid have the same force and effect as those repealed, altered or amended had before such repeal, alteration or emendation was made.

MUNICIPALITY OF BALLAARAT EAST.

FIRST HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF BALLAARAT EAST, ENDING 3RD DECEMBER, 1857, MADE IN PURSUANCE OF THE 43RD SECTION OF THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

THE INSTITUTION OF THE MUNICIPALITY.

A PETITION numerously signed by the householders in the district of Ballaarat East having been duly presented to His Excellency the Governor, praying that the district might be raised into a municipality, His Excellency, by Proclamation dated 28th April, 1857, declared such district a municipal one, under the governance of the municipal council of Ballaarat East.

BOUNDARIES.

The boundaries of the municipal district of Ballaarat East were defined as follows:—Commencing at the north-eastern angle of the municipal district of Ballaarat; thence by a line bearing east and by the River Yarrowee eastward two miles and forty chains; thence by a line bearing south two miles and forty chains; thence by a line bearing west three miles and ten chains, more or less, to the River Yarrowee aforesaid; and thence northward by that river, and by the eastern boundary of the municipal district of Ballaarat to the commencing point.

ELECTIONS.

The district having been thus determined and proclaimed, a public meeting of householders and residents, presided over by Samuel Irwin, Esq., J.P., was held at the Charlie Napier Theatre, on the 30th May, 1857, pursuant to the provisions of the before mentioned Act, at which meeting it was decided—

- 1st. That the municipal council should consist of seven members.
- 2nd. That their services should be unremunerated.

Candidates were duly proposed and seconded, for whom, on the 1st June, a poll was taken at the same place, when the following gentlemen were elected in the order named:—

The first sitting of the council took place on the 3rd June, when Wm. B. Rodier, Esq., was elected chairman.

MUNICIPAL OFFICERS.

Candidates for the various municipal offices have been duly advertised for.

Mr. John Campbell was appointed town clerk.
Messrs. Coote and Andrews, engineers and surveyors; and Mr. Timothy Hayes, town inspector.
Mr. Robert W. Holmes was likewise appointed solicitor to the council.

On the 10th July, Mr. Campbell having previously resigned the town clerkship, Mr. James Mulholland was nominated to that office.

Messrs. Dyte and Morrow were appointed as valuers, and Mr. John Lake collector of rates.

ASSESSMENT RETURNS.

According to the returns made by the valuers, 1200 householders were duly assessed, the annual value of whose property amounted to £91,657, thereby yielding at the rate of One shilling in the pound, the sum of £4582 17s. 0d. as municipal revenue.

RESIGNATION AND RE-ELECTION OF THE COUNCIL.

A promise having been made by the councillors elect that they would resign as soon as the list of ratepayers would be completed, Messrs. Gibbs, McCrea, Belford, and Robinson, did so on the 18th September, and were replaced at a poll taken on the 19th October, by councillors Wilson, who received 440 votes, Belford 346, Isaacs 328, and Scrase 318.

At the next meeting of council on the 20th October, the chairman, and councillors Sweeney and Clendinning tendered their resignation (councillor Belford being appointed chairman *pro tem.*); and at an election held on the 18th November, councillors George McCleverty by 403 votes, W. B. Rodier 391 votes, and D. Jones 373 votes, were returned to the council; that body now consisting of William B. Rodier (who was re-elected to the chair), Munday Wilson, George McCleverty, Richard Belford, John A. Isaacs, Edwin Scrase and David Jones.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws, passed by the council, have been assented to by His Excellency the Governor:—

No. 2. For an assessment of house and land property within the municipal district, for the year 1857-8.

No. 3. For imposing a rate of One shilling in the pound on the rateable property of the municipal district.

No. 1. Containing the standing rules and orders has not been forwarded for confirmation, the second chapter of the regulations not being yet compiled.

No. 4. For the appropriation of the sum of £3000 paid out of the public revenue for the year 1857, as an instalment of the grant-in-aid is in the hands of the Executive, and it is expected will receive the sanction of His Excellency.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The public works completed have been as follows:—

- 14 chains Bakery Hill road
- 20 chains Specimen Hill road
- 10 chains Arcade road

made into a passable condition.

- Eureka road
- Bakery Hill road

temporarily repaired.

A commencement has also been made of the road from the Golden Point to the Main road, by the Montezuma Hotel.

A weighbridge was purchased from Messrs. Cairns and Co., and fixed opposite the Charlie Napier Hotel, on the main road; but, from defective brick work, resulting in the admission of water into the well, it has not yet been profitably worked.

Plans for the footpaths of the Main road have been decided upon, and sites for a town hall, for public markets, gardens and cemeteries have been fixed.

APPLICATIONS TO GOVERNMENT.
(Granted.)

For extension of the whole of the clauses of the Town and Country Police Act.

For extension of the Dog Act.

For approval of the corporation seal and motto.

For a grant of seven acres of land for a cricket and recreation ground.

For reduction of the upset prices of the Melbourne road frontages, from £300 for occupied, and £150 unoccupied, to £150 and £25 respectively, per acre.

For reduction of the width of the plank road within the municipal boundary, from 3 chains as proposed by the district surveyor, to 1½ chains.

For the establishment of postal receiving and delivery houses.

For the establishment of a central police station.

For a grant-in-aid of the sum of £3000.

For moiety of fines from the clerk of the bench, Ballarat.

For leave to be granted to the inhabitants of Bakery Hill to remain in occupation of their present sites for a term of six months.

For copies of the police regulations.

(Refused or remaining in abeyance.)

For the appointment of a board of enquiry to report upon disputed frontages on the Main road.

For the establishment of a central post office.

For the formation of the Yarrowee bridge the full width of the Main road.

For possession of the cross streets of the municipality, free from obstructions.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The resignation of the Council, and the suspension of the business consequent thereon, added to the tardiness of the Law Officer of the Crown in appointing a clerk to the Court of Petty Sessions in this district, retarded the collection of the rates and hindered the progress of the public works. The total absence of any surveys has also operated most disadvantageously against the settlement of the residents and the compilation of a satisfactory assessment.

Frequent applications that the cross streets should be surveyed and their possession free from obstructions given to the council, have been made to the Board of Land and Works. This request has been refused, the Board declining all responsibility in the matter.

A petition to Government from the inhabitants of the district, complaining of the width of the cross streets, was endorsed by the council, who strongly urged upon the Board of Works the necessity for making them one chain wide, as marked upon the lithographic plans of the Survey department; to which a reply was received to the effect that the streets, as proclaimed, viz.:—47, 37, and 30 feet respectively, were adequate to the traffic thereon. One instance of the absurdity of the statement may be cited,—Specimen Hill road and Windsor street are each to be laid out 1½ chains wide; at their junction, therefore, the width will be 3 chains, from which point it is immediately narrowed into a lane 37 feet in width, leading into the densest portion of the Main road.

The council were informed that a board of enquiry would be appointed to report upon disputed boundaries and trespass upon the sold frontages of the main road, and although application was made as far back as the 19th June, for the appointment of such board, no further information on the subject has been received from the Government.

A communication from the Central Road Board, dated 16th September, stated that the temporary extension of the Yarrowee bridge, according to the town surveyor's report, would be proceeded with immediately, notwithstanding which promise no steps have, up to the present, been taken to render that structure less dangerous than heretofore.

The drainage and water supply of the municipality have occupied the attention of the council, but from the difficulty of supplying either without aid from the general revenue, they have as yet been unable to undertake any active measures. A bill to combine both has been prepared, but is suspended. Another to secure a fair participation in the waters of the swamp has been initiated, at the suggestion of the Attorney General, and it is hoped will receive the sanction of the legislature. The prevention of fires has engaged the anxious consideration of the council, and some regulations have been adopted which will tend materially to the desired end.

In conclusion, the council have to anticipate much activity for the ensuing half-year. Their organization having become systematised, and their work fairly commenced, they hope shortly to secure to Ballarat East all the advantages of municipal institutions.

MUNICIPALITY OF CASTLEMAINE.
FOURTH HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF CASTLEMAINE.

BY clause 43 of the Municipal Act 18 Victoria No. 15, it is directed "That every municipal council shall within one month from the date of election of chairman of such council publish a full statement in detail of their proceedings, together with a certified account of the receipts and expenditure for the preceding six months." In accordance with which, the following, being the fourth half-yearly report of the municipal council of Castlemaine, is submitted. The period of this report extends from the 27th July, 1857, to the 27th January, 1858, both inclusive.

CHANGES IN MEMBERS AND OFFICERS OF THE COUNCIL.

On the 4th of August Mr. Joseph Davis resigned his position of inspector, and Sergeant Fleming was subsequently elected to the office in addition to his police duties, at a salary of £50 per annum.

By a vote of the council of the 11th August it was determined to dispense with the services of a salaried rate collector, and consequently the appointment of Mr. E. Martin ceased on the 18th. Tenders for collecting (on commission) the rate for 1857, as also some outstanding back rates, were then called

for, and on the 21st of August Mr. Joseph Davis was unanimously appointed as collector at 5 per cent. on moneys collected.

Councillor Chapman resigned his seat as councillor on the 1st of September, and on the 15th of the same month councillors Wheeler and Froomes resigned, in consequence of a requisition from the ratepayers calling upon the whole council to resign.

An election to supply these vacancies, and that of Mr. Hitchcock, who had previously resigned, was held on Friday, 9th October, and Messrs. Froomes, Hitchcock, and Chapman, were re-elected in conjunction with Mr. Thomas Vincent, of Campbell's Creek. The three former took their seats on Tuesday, 13th October, and the latter on 20th October. Councillor Froomes resigned as treasurer on 21st October, and councillor Chapman was appointed in his stead.

On the same day sergeant Fleming resigned the appointment of inspector, and since that time the town surveyor has acted in that capacity.

M. Prendergast, Esq., chairman of the council, also resigned on that day, in consequence of a pledge which he had given to do so, and councillor Hitchcock was elected chairman *pro tem*.

On the same day the council made an alteration in the constitution of the various committees, each member of the council becoming a member of the respective committees, and the number of a quorum formerly fixed at two being raised to three.

An election to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of M. Prendergast, Esq., was held on Friday, 9th November. Frederick Gingell, Esq., was returned, and took his seat on the 17th of the same month.

On the 1st of December Councillor Chapman brought forward a motion to consider the salaries and duties of the officers of the council, with a view to their reduction and alteration, but the question was postponed for consideration till the 2nd February, 1858. On the same day Mr. E. Hankins, town clerk, sent in his resignation, which was accepted, but was requested to retain his position till his successor was appointed, and on the 12th January, 1858, Mr. James Larnach was elected to the vacancy, to take office on 26th January.

The annual election to supply the places of James Chapman, Thomas Vincent, and Samuel Love, Esqrs., was held on the 21st January, the poll was taken on the following day, and F. E. Paynter, Thomas Andrews, and William Johnston, Esqrs., were returned. The two latter took their seats on the 26th, and the council proceeded to elect a chairman for the ensuing year, when councillor F. E. Paynter was chosen, the numbers being—

The committee meetings have been duly attended, and reports sent up to the general council.

CORRESPONDENCE, ETC.

Correspondence on various subjects of an important character has been received and despatched during the half-year just ended. In reply to applications to the Attorney General for opinions on the legality of certain grants, the council have been referred to their own legal adviser. The request of the council that the grant to the police of sixty acres of land on Barker's Creek be rescinded, has been refused; and an application for the use of the new court house was not granted. A communication from the Treasury, asking to be furnished with a return of the amount of rates collected on account of the rate struck for 1857, was duly replied to, and a proportionate amount of the second moiety of the grant-in-aid to municipalities has been received, viz., £1816. Another communication has also come to hand from the same office, asking this council if they would undertake to support the charitable institutions of the district, the hospital inclusive, if the Government would hand over the revenues of the pounds in the district, including those of Guildford and Elphinstone; and many enquiries have been made in consequence, but no decided action has been taken or final reply sent at present. In conjunction with the municipality of Emerald Hill and other places, a petition was presented to the Legislative Assembly, praying that the control of unsold lands within municipalities might be given to the various municipal councils. Strong remonstrances have also been sent to the Central Road Board and the district road surveyor, respecting the condition of the government roads within the municipality, and the sum of £2200 is now placed on the estimates for their improvement. In consequence of the request of this council, R. D. Ireland, Esq., M.L.A., asked a question respecting the misappropriation of £1200 voted for Forest street last year, but no satisfactory reply was elicited.

Memorials have been received from the Castlemaine Fire Brigade respecting supply of water, as also from other persons, and the subject is now under the consideration of the council, for which a premium of £10 has been offered for the best

treatise on the best method of providing the town with water, these to be received up to the 25th March. The council applied to all the fire insurance companies having branches in Castlemaine for the loan or gift of a fire engine, but have been refused, only one company, the Northern, in any way even rendering any assistance. The necessity of keeping good faith with the public and this council with reference to the erection of the Supreme Court House has also been urged on the Government, and the building is now nearly completed on block 14, as originally intended.

MEMORIALS.

Memorials have been received from ratepayers on various subjects, and have been sent to His Excellency, respecting the main roads in the municipality, to the Central Road Board on the same question, to His Excellency requesting him to appoint six additional municipal magistrates, and to the Railway Committee of the Legislative Council respecting the railway route. Active steps have been taken by the council to enforce the claims of this district to direct railway communication, and £160 has been applied to the purpose from the municipal funds. The result has been most satisfactory, and a direct route is obtained.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The contract for 2000 yards of metal has been concluded, part of the same has been used, and there yet remains a large quantity ready for use.

The permanent formation of a portion of Hargreaves and Mostyn streets has been completed, viz.:—Twenty-one and a half chains by a width of seven yards in Mostyn street, and five and a half chains by a similar width in the centre of Hargreaves street. The cuttings, &c., at the sides, yet wait the action of the council.

A footpath twelve feet wide has been levelled, formed and gravelled, for a distance of ten chains over Church Hill, and carried one and a half chains up Kennedy street, and the channel crossing at the intersection of Forest and Kennedy streets has been pitched and metalled.

The cattle yards have been completed.

The names of streets have been painted and fixed up in their proper places.

The weighbridge approaches have been repaired and all necessary improvements made.

A temporary market shed has been built, 300 feet by 18 feet, and plans received, which are now under consideration for a permanent building.

Contracts have been entered into for the supply of fire hooks, grappels, and ladders of various sizes, which will shortly be completed.

Also for lighting the municipal lamps for three months; for the repair of a bridge at Barker's Creek, and cleansing streets, repairing the gutters with shingles, &c., when required.

Three additional lamps have been erected, viz.:—At the municipal offices, corner of Kennedy and Campbell streets, and on the brow of Church Hill.

Thirty water casks have been purchased, filled with water, and placed in different parts of the town as a temporary provision in case of fire, and pending the erection of an adequate tank which is now under consideration of the council. Enquiries are also being made as to the cost, &c., of a proper fire-bell.

The question of a new cemetery has been considered, and the town surveyor has reported thereon.

The hollow in Tompton street, near the Gold Office, is being filled up, and can soon be completed.

MISCELLANEOUS.

A motion was made by councillor Smith, and carried, that the Government should be applied to for a grant of £500 per annum, in order to remunerate a medical man for attending the sick and distressed of the district, and for £1000 to dispense as charity to such distressed. Application was accordingly made, but the Government replied that it was the duty of the council to afford relief in such cases. A motion by the same councillor was also made and carried that the Government should be requested to establish an Orphan Asylum. A reply was received that it would receive consideration when the estimates for 1858 were being framed.

Remonstrances have been made respecting the new Post Office, but no concession has been made, and the original plan is now being carried out.

An application from twenty ratepayers was sent in to consider the expediency of paying the chairman of the municipality at the annual meeting, but the consideration of the question was deferred till next year.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been approved of by His Excellency during the past half-year, and are now in operation:—

Bye-law 22. A bye-law to amend bye-law 13, for licensing and regulating nightmen's carts.

Bye-law 24. For the expenditure of the £3000 grant-in-aid, for the Castlemaine municipality, for the year 1857.

Bye-law 25. For an assessment of house and land property, within the municipal district, for the year 1857.

Bye-law 27. A bye-law to enforce the erection of proper public urinals, and a strict attention to their cleanliness by the proprietors of every licensed public house in the municipality.

MARKETS.

Great efforts have been made to establish markets within the municipality, but they have been checked by an old law passed by the New South Wales Legislature in 1841, which

compels all market towns to be proclaimed. Steps have been taken in accordance with the Act in question, and this township will soon be proclaimed.
