## FUND FOR THE RELIEF OF THE SUFFERERS BY THE MUTINY IN INDIA.

HIS Excellency the Governor has directed the subjoined letter, with its enclosures, addressed to His Excellency by the Lord Mayor of London, to be published.

By His Excellency's Command,

Mansion House, October, 1857.

Sir,—The disastrous events which have occurred in our Indian territory will already have come to your knowledge. You are also probably aware that a movement has originated in London, which is being seconded with great zeal and liberality throughout this kingdom, for the relief of those, both at home and abroad who are sufferers by this mutiny, and by the sanguinary war to which it has given rise.

We cannot doubt that our fellow-subjects over whom your influence extends, as the representative of the British Government, must sympathise most deeply with the fallen and the bereaved; and that they will feel with us the binding obligation under which, as a nation, we are laid, to alleviate their afflictions and to compensate their wrongs.

Entertaining this conviction, I beg, in the name of the Central Committee in London, most earnestly to request your kind co-operation. We are convinced that you will feel it alike a duty and a pleasure to adopt immediate measures for the augmentation of the Relief Fund which we are laboring to raise, and which we are commissioned to distribute.

I beg to enclose to you some documents which we respectfully request you to circulate, and which will afford to some extent the necessary information, both as to the urgency of the case and as to the principles which will guide the Relief Committee at home in the distribution of those funds which the humanity of their fellow-countrymen may place at their disposal.

Let me beg you to originate immediate measures for obtaining congregational and general subscriptions, and to transmit the amounts contributed to the Bank of England, to the credit of the Indian Mutiny Relief Fund.

### ADDRESS TO THE BRITISH PUBLIC FROM THE INDIAN RELIEF COMMITTEE.

The committee for relieving the suffering caused by the Indian mutinies, while acknowledging gratefully the munificent donations already contributed, yet feel it their duty to call attention to the circumstances which necessitate a further appeal to the public.

Throughout the length and breadth of the Bengal Presidency, large numbers, amounting probably to some thousands of civil servants, covenanted and uncovenanted, military officers, chaplains, missionaries, indigo planters, private traders, clerks, civil engineers, persons employed in the department of public works, and others, have lost their moveable property; and, in the present disturbed state of the country, will have difficulty in raising funds. Without some kind of pecuniary aid, therefore, they will be unable to reinstate themselves in their previous mode of life.

The families of persons who have been killed or despoiled of their property, or who, from their being employed in disturbed

districts, are unable to make remittances, are to a great extent without present means of support, whether they are residing in India or in this country; and many children who have been sent to England for education, would have to be removed from school if some assistance were not given.

Considering the greatly increased number of European troops now to be employed in India, numbering probably nearly 100,000 men, and the casualties which are likely to take place among them from war and climate, the pecuniary aid which will be required for their families is certain to amount to a very large sum. This observation applies both to Her Majesty's and to the Honorable East India Company's European troops.

Many other classes of persons might be mentioned who will stand in need of assistance, including those natives of India, civil and military, or their widows or orphans, whose destitution may be distinctly traceable to fidelity and devotion to the cause of the British; but enough has been said to show that, independently of any assistance which may possibly be required in the Bombay and Madras Presidencies, subscriptions are still called for on a scale equal to the greatest efforts of this kind which have been made of late years. In the majority of cases temporary aid will be sufficient; but some claims upon the National bounty will necessarily extend over a considerable period. No sums will be given absolutely where a loan would be sufficient.

The principles according to which the relief will be administered, in concert with the Calcutta and other Committees, are contained in the following resolutions, which were passed at a meeting held at the Mansion House on the 26th September, 1857.

At a meeting of the committee held on the 26th of September, 1857, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:—

1. The object of this committee is to relieve, as far as may be practicable and necessary, the distress caused by the mutinies in India.
2. In so doing, care should be taken not to supersede the assistance which ought to be given by the Government, by the established Widows and Orphans' Funds, or by the relations of the sufferers; but to supplement it to the extent to which it falls short of a just measure of relief.
3. Compensation for losses *as such*, will in no case be given.
4. Subject to the preceding conditions, the efforts of the committee will be specially directed:—

*First.* To enable the sufferers to live with frugality in their respective states of life until other means of subsistence are available.

*Second.* To provide for the maintenance and education of children in cases in which it has been interrupted or prevented by casualties arising out of the mutiny, and in which it cannot be provided for from other sources.

*Third.* To assist the sufferers to come to this country or to go to India, when the circumstances render it proper that they should do so, and the means of paying for their passage cannot be obtained from any other source.

*Fourth.* To afford reasonable aid, by loan or otherwise, to officers and others who have lost their equipments, furniture or other property, by the necessity of sudden flight from their stations or the destruction of their dwellings, when, without such aid, they would be involved in pecuniary embarrassments.

5. That relief according to these principles be given, without distinction of religion or nationality, to every person of whatever rank who has a just claim upon the sympathy and assistance of the British people.

Hay was generally stacked before the 21st. In favorable localities the plums were ripe about the 20th. The blight known locally as the "curl" was disappearing on the 19th, and the peach and nectarine were looking healthy. The hot winds have destroyed much garden produce in exposed situations.

Occasionally the fall of rain was very slight, not appreciable by the rain gauge.

THE AURORA AUSTRALIS was visible on the 17th. It first appeared at 9.12 p.m. The luminous beams extended nearly to the zenith when it was most brilliant. It disappeared about 2 a.m. on the 18th. The wind was from the north and warm on the 1st and 7th, and a severe storm wind blew on the 23rd, which commenced at 5.4 a.m. and continued to blow strongly until 4 p.m.

Fog was present at 4.4 a.m. on the 18th. LIGHTNING was seen at night on the 12th on the N.E. horizon, at intervals of 2', 5' and 7'; on the 16th, at night, on the N.E. horizon, at intervals of 1', 1 1/2' and 10'; and on the 22nd, at evening, at long intervals, on the N.W. horizon.

A THUNDERSTORM occurred on the 1st, at 6.10 p.m. Distant thunder was heard and lightning seen on the 17th, at 3.15 p.m., and subsequently at night LIGHTNING was seen on the N.N.W. horizon, at intervals of 7' and 10'. Thunder was heard and lightning seen on the 18th at 1.50 p.m., and subsequently at evening LIGHTNING was seen on the northern horizon, at intervals of 2', 5', 10' and 15', and less frequently during the night. A slight thunderstorm occurred on the 19th, at 3.15 p.m. SOLAR HALOS were seen on the 1st, 25° in diameter; 7th, 30° in diameter; and on the 27th, 30° in diameter.

A LUNAR HALO was seen on the 27th, about 40° in diameter. SHOOTING STARS.—On the 5th, at 9.18 p.m., a very faint meteor from S.W. to S. 0.32 p.m. a small bright meteor from W. to E., about 60° above E. horizon. On the 6th, at 8.48 p.m., meteor about 35° above S. horizon; 9 p.m., a faint meteor from S. to N., about 40° above N. horizon; 10.46 p.m., a faint rapid meteor from N. to S., about 25° above E. horizon; 10.48 p.m., a faint rapid meteor from CRUX to CIRCINUS; 11.2 p.m., a faint meteor from W. to E., about 25° above S.E. horizon; 11.12, a faint meteor from W. to E., about 25° above N.E. horizon. On the 10th, at 9.44 p.m., a faint rapid meteor from the S.E. horizon to S.E.; on the 17th, at 9.12 p.m., a meteor from N.E. to S.W., passing through CRUX; 10.29 p.m., a small faint meteor from N. to S., passing through CRUX; 11.15 p.m., a meteor from N.E. to S.W., passing through CRUX, and on the 18th, at 9.31 p.m., a small rapid meteor from TRIANG. ASTR. to W. Also meteors were seen on the 7th, 9th, 14th and 22nd, but they were not numerous, and their paths were not accurately noted.

The observations at 9.30 p.m. are recorded by SERGEANT FORBES and CORPORAL HEADY, Royal Engineers.

#### PARTICULARS.

On the 30th ultimo, the bodies of two men hereafter described were found dead in a hole between Dunolly and Jones's Creek, two and a half miles from Dunolly, and a quarter of a mile from the old Jones's Creek road. Over the bodies were found an opossum rug, repaired in the centre with two pieces of striped calico, a blanket, and two calico caps, one of which had a hole in the crown:—1st, a man 6 feet high, thirty-five years old, very muscular, black hair, and small dark whiskers, had on a pea jacket, blue shirt, trousers, and Blucher boots; and 2nd, 5 feet 10 inches high, forty years old, light hair, reddish whiskers, thick beard and moustache, and sharp features, had on a pea jacket, drawers, moleskin trousers, and Blucher boots. The skulls of both men are fractured, and the bodies are in an advanced stage of decomposition, and appear to have been in the hole in question about five or six weeks.—10th December, 1857.

NORTHERN LIGHTHOUSES.—NOTICE TO MARINERS.

*Five additional Lighthouses on the West Coast of Scotland.*

THE Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses hereby give notice, that on the night of Tuesday, the 10th day of November next, and every night thereafter, from the going away of daylight in the evening to the return of daylight in the morning, lights will be exhibited from the undermentioned Lighthouses, the positions and characteristics of which have been specified by Messrs. David and Thomas Stevenson, the Engineers to the Board, as follows:—

I. USHENISH—SOUTH UIST.

*Ushenish Lighthouse* is situated on the most easterly headland on the eastern side of the Island of South Uist, one of the Hebrides, in the county of Inverness.

The light will be a dioptric first-class Fixed Red Light, and will be exhibited from a tower of masonry erected on the headland. The light will be about one hundred and seventy-six feet above high water of spring tides, and will be seen in clear weather at the distance of about eighteen nautic miles, allowing ten feet for the height of the eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

II. RONA.

*Rona Lighthouse* is situated on the northern end of the Island of Rona, in Inverness-shire, between the west coast of Ross-shire and the Island of Skye.

The light will be a catadioptric second-class holophotal Flashing White Light, shewing a flash every twelve seconds. It will be exhibited from a tower of masonry erected on a peak at the north-east point of the island. It is elevated about two hundred and twenty-two feet above high-water of spring tides, and will be seen in clear weather at the distance of about twenty nautic miles, allowing ten feet for the height of the eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

III. KYLEAKIN.

*Kyleakin Lighthouse* is situated on a point of rock which covers at high water spring tides, and projects from the west end of Eilan Dool, or Gillean Island, in Ross-shire, at the western entrance of "The Narrows," leading to Loch Alsh. The tower is about fifty-three yards within the high water mark of spring tides, and is connected with the island by a bridge of five spans.

The light will be an Azimuthal condensing light, and will show a Fixed White Light in the fair way of the sound of Loch Alsh, and a Fixed White Light in the fairway leading to the Sound of Applecross, and which White Light extends southward to Fabbia Island.

From thence it will show a Fixed Red Light, extending eastward along the shore of Skye to the south of the fairway of Loch Alsh. It will also show a Fixed Red Light to the north-eastwards of the fairway to the Sound of Applecross.

To the north of the fairway of Loch Alsh, the Light will not be shewn.

It will be exhibited from a tower of masonry about fifty three feet above high water of spring tides, and will be seen in clear weather at the distance of about eleven nautic miles, allowing ten feet for the height of the eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

IV. ISLE ORONSAY.

*Isle Oronsay Lighthouse* is situated on a low point at the south-east end of the island of Oronsay, Inverness-shire, in the Sound of Skye, also called Sound of Sleat.

The light will be an azimuthal condensing light, and will show a Fixed White Light, from a tower of masonry about fifty-eight feet above high water of spring tides. The light will be seen in clear weather about twelve nautic miles, allowing ten feet for the height of the eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

V. SOUND OF MULL.

*The Sound of Mull Lighthouse* is situated on a small rock called Runa Gall, on the south shore of the Sound of Mull, Argyllshire, about one mile northwards from Tobermory. The tower is about fifty yards within the high water mark of spring tides, and is connected with the shore by a bridge of two spans.

The light will be an azimuthal condensing light, and will show a Fixed Red Light, northwards out to sea; a Fixed Green Light towards the New Rocks, the Red Rocks, and the Stirks Rocks, in the Sound of Mull; a Fixed White Light southwards into the Sound of Mull.

The light will be exhibited from a tower of masonry about 55 feet above high water of spring tides, and will be seen in clear weather at the distance of about twelve nautic miles, allowing ten feet for the height of the eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

And the said commissioners hereby further give notice, that under a warrant by Her Majesty in Council, dated the 27th

day of August, 1857, the following tolls will become leviable on and after the said 10th day of November next, viz.:-

For every British vessel and for every foreign vessel privileged to enter the ports of the United Kingdom upon paying the same duties as are payable by British vessels, which may pass or derive benefit from each of the said lights, the toll of eight-sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burthen of every such vessel, for every time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on an oversea voyage, and One-sixteenth of a penny per ton, for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on a coasting voyage, and for every foreign vessel not privileged in manner before mentioned, double the amount of the respective tolls before specified, according to the voyage on which she may be employed. And the said tolls in respect of each of the said lighthouses are to be levied by the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, subject to the abatement or discount of 25 per cent. on vessels engaged in oversea voyages, and of 10 per cent. on vessels engaged in coasting voyages, provided for by an Order in Council, dated the 26th June, 1855; and subject also to the further abatement or discount of 15 per cent. on vessels engaged in oversea voyages, and of 15 per cent. on vessels engaged on coasting voyages, provided for by an Order in Council, dated the 20th day of March, 1857, and subject also to the regulations and exemptions contained in the Consolidated Tables of Light Duties sanctioned by Order in Council, dated the 26th day of June, 1855.
