SECTIONS V. TO X. OF THE TOWN AND COUNTRY  
POLICE ACT EXTENDED TO THE MUNICIPAL  
DISTRICT OF AVOCA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty (Number 14), intituled, *An Act to provide for the Management of Towns and other places in Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that so many of the provisions of the said Act as relate to the good order of towns and other populous places, being sections numbered V., VI., VII., VIII., IX. and X., in the said Act, should extend to and be in force in such cities, towns, districts and places as the Lieutenant Governor might by proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare to come under the operation of the same respectively, or any of them; and it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor to define the limits of such places, and to vary and alter such limits and revoke any such Proclamation; and all the other provisions of the said Act except the last (being numbered XXXIX.) should extend to and be in operation throughout Victoria and its dependencies from and after the passing thereof: Now I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare that the municipal district of Avoca shall come under the operations of the sections of the said Act numbered respectively V., VI., VII., VIII., IX. and X.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-fourth day of October, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and in the twenty-third year of Her Majesty's Reign.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

THE MINING DISTRICT OF SANDHURST ALTERED.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-fourth day of October, 1859.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor  
Major-General Macarthur, C.B. | Mr. Horne  
Mr. O'Shanassy | Dr. Evans, LL.D.  
Mr. Chapman | Mr. Ireland

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to erect any portion of the colony into a mining district, and to give to such district some distinguishing name, and to define the limits and boundaries thereof, and also again to abolish any such district, and from time to time to alter and vary such limits and boundaries: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council, bearing date the fourth day of January, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, the several districts therein mentioned were erected into mining districts: And whereas by another Order of the Governor in Council, bearing date the thirty-first day of January, 1859, the mining district of Sandhurst was altered as therein mentioned: And whereas it is expedient again to alter the limits thereof: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order alter and vary the mining district of Sandhurst, and doth define the limits and boundaries thereof to be as follows, that is to say:—

THE MINING DISTRICT OF SANDHURST:—Commencing at the south-western angle of the parish of Lockwood; thence west four miles; thence north thirty-two miles; thence east to the Bendigo Creek; thence southwards by that creek and by a line east to a point on the River Campaspe due west of Barrow's Inn; thence southwards by the River Campaspe to a point due west of Mount Camel; thence by a line east to the Corinella Creek; thence northwards by that creek to Lake Cooper; thence by the eastern shores of that lake to the most northern point thereof; thence by a line east to the Goulburn River; thence northwards by that river to its junction with the Castle Creek; thence southwards by that creek to its source; thence by the Dividing Range to the source of the Delatite or Devil's River; thence westerly by the Main Dividing Range to the most western source of Mollison's Creek; thence northwards by the Dividing Range to the source of the McIvor or Patterson's Creek; thence by a line north-westerly to the junction of the Rivers Coliban and Campaspe; thence westward by the River Coliban, the Myrtle Creek, and the Mount Alexander Range to the northern boundary of the parish of Harcourt; thence west seven miles and sixty-four chains, more or less; and thence north to the commencing point aforesaid.

And the Honorable John O'Shanassy, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor in Council to split any mining district as thereinbefore mentioned into any number of divisions and to define the limits and boundaries thereof respectively, and also to determine the number of members of the mining board of such district which shall be elected within and for every such division, and from time to time to alter any such division and the limits and boundaries thereof, and to vary the number of members which shall be elected within and for every such division, but so that the total number of members elected for such district shall in no case exceed or be less than ten: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council, bearing date the fourth day of January, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, the mining district of Sandhurst was split into the divisions therein mentioned: And whereas by another Order of the Governor in Council, bearing even date herewith, the said mining district has been enlarged, and it is expedient to declare the divisions thereof, and the boundaries and limits of such divisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order declare that the limits and boundaries of the four divisions into which the said mining district of Sandhurst has been split shall be those set opposite to the respective names of such divisions in the schedule hereunto annexed, and doth determine that the number of members of the mining board of such district which shall be elected within and for every such division shall be that set immediately under the name of every such division respectively in the same schedule, that is to say:—

HEATHCOTE ... Two members	As described in the same Order.

One member	Commencing at the source of the McIvor or Patterson Creek; thence by a line north-easterly to the junction of the River Goulburn and Hughe's Creek; thence northwards by the River Goulburn to its junction with the Castle Creek; thence southwards by that Creek to its source; thence by the Dividing Range to the source of the Delatite or Devil's River; thence westerly by the Main Dividing Range to the most western source of Mollison's Creek; and thence northwards by the Dividing Range to the source of the McIvor or Patterson Creek, the commencing point aforesaid.

2. All orders for supplies under these contracts must issue from the Government Storekeeper's Department, and unless otherwise specially ordered, the supplies must be delivered to the Government Stores. When ordered, they are to be delivered free of charge to any part of Melbourne, and in the case of Ship Chandlery, Painters', &c., Materials, and Timber, at the Marine Yard, Williamstown.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service, or by any contracts made by the Military Commissariat, or by other departments of the public service. When desirable, raw material will be ordered for the

Printed forms of tender may be obtained from the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne, or the officer in charge of the police at each station, by whom also any information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

The tenders for each station will be accepted or rejected separately.

At stations where oats and bran cannot readily be procured, the tenders may be for hay or straw only; when all the supplies are included in one tender, it will, if advisable, be accepted for hay or straw, and not for the other articles.

Contractors will be allowed to deliver a quarter's supply on the 1st January, a six months' supply on the 1st April for a winter's stock, and the remainder on the 1st October, subject to the provisions contained in clause 2, Conditions of Contract.

The price must be per ton for hay and straw, and per bushel for oats and bran, including delivery at the stations, and all charges.

The net weight only after deducting the tare is to be charged.

No tender will be entertained unless accompanied by a certificate from two responsible persons that they are willing to become bound as sureties for the due fulfilment of the contract in one-third the estimated cost of the entire supply at the station tendered for; and in the event of the tender being accepted, the bond must be executed within twenty days, failing which the contract may be again advertised or another tender accepted. No bond will be required if the whole supply in value will not amount to £150.

The names and addresses of the tenderers, and of their proposed sureties, must be stated at full length.

All tenders must be enclosed in a separate envelope, marked "Tender for ——" (as the case may be), and deposited in the Tender Box at the Government Stores, King street, or if sent by post they must be addressed to the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne.

#### CONDITIONS.

1. The hay to be eaten, good, sound, and sweet; the straw to be wheat, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats and bran also to be sound, and sweet and of the best description.
2. The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the officer in charge of the district or station, the quantities stated in the schedule being, however, only approximative, and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than stated. The excess over the estimate will, however, in no case exceed 50 per cent.
3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts, made by the military commissariat.
4. The forage when delivered must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.
5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly, in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Government Stores, Melbourne, or the Treasury Pay Office of the district, as may be indicated on the account.
6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours from a reasonable time to be fixed on the order, it will be competent for the department, should circumstances require it, to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.
7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage, as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a Board of Survey, composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.
8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.
9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when from some other cause injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.
10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.
11. It will be competent for the Government Storekeeper on behalf of the Government, or for the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to that effect, it being understood that such notice can only be given from the first day of a month, and provided that no such notice can be given before the 30th April, 1860.

On the same day a contract was taken by the same parties, for £56 10s., to form and make portion of Regent street, near Mr. Finn's house.—Completed.

On the 13th July a contract was taken by Robinson and Co., for £367 10s., to form and make Sackville street from Cox street to Regent street.—Completed.

On the same day a contract was taken by Heggarty and Beattie, to form and make Sackville street from Cox street to Campbell street, for £145.—Completed.

Several minor contracts and works of general utility have been undertaken and performed during the last half-year.

On the motion of Councillor Knight, it has been determined to send a correct chart of the harbor of Port Fairy to the best authority on the subject in Great Britain, for an opinion as to the practicability of removing the bar, and the cost of so doing.

On the motion of Councillor Huntly, application has been made to the Government to expend the balance of £2500 in hand for harbor improvements, in extending the jetty and connecting it with the wharf; and that the sum of £10,000 be placed upon the estimates for completing the jetty and improving the harbor generally.

## BOTANICAL GARDENS.

Messrs. Scott and Houghton's contract to fence has been completed.

On the 6th July Mr. Henry Hedges was appointed superintendent of garden for six months, with a salary at the rate of £130 per annum. A quantity of trees, shrubs and plants have been presented by the curators of the botanical gardens of Melbourne and Adelaide, and a quantity has been purchased, and the laying out and planting of the gardens are now being proceeded with. £500 was received from the Government towards fencing and improving, and a further sum of £200 has been granted though not yet received.

## MALDON MUNICIPALITY.

SECOND HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF  
MALDON.

IN pursuance of the Act 18 Victoria No. 15, clause 43, the municipal council of Maldon gives the following report of its proceedings for the half-year ending 10th September, 1859.

## ELECTION OF COUNCILLORS.

On the 30th August last, the nomination of candidates to fill the vacancies occasioned by the retirement, by rotation, of Councillors Wright, Subritzky, and Lawrence, took place in the Market House, Councillor Watt presiding as chairman of the election, when fourteen gentlemen were duly proposed. A poll having been demanded, it was held on the following day, when Messrs. F. Courtin, Jas. Wood, and John Robinson, received the highest number of votes, and on the same evening were declared duly elected.

At a special meeting of the council held on the 2nd day of September last, Mr. Councillor T. C. Cooper was elected to the office of chairman of the council for the ensuing year.

## PUBLIC WORKS.

The following public works have been completed:—

The clearing of stumps and filling up holes and inequalities with metal, from the main road through the township and to Eagle Hawk.

The forming of Fountain street, and making footpaths therein.

The clearing of a portion of the Market square.

The supply and erection of 60 public oil lamps and posts.

The repair of Main road, near the Springs. And the Market House is in progress and near completion.

## BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been approved of by His Excellency the Governor, and are now in force, viz:—

No. 11. To prevent the erection of calico buildings in certain parts of the district.

No. 12. For the expenditure of the sum of £1000, grant-in-aid for 1858.

No. 13. To cause proper precautions to be used in the erection of buildings and opening of excavations, and to cause the same to be lighted during the night.

No. 14. To regulate the erection of shades or awnings, and to prevent obstructions on the public footpaths.

A bye-law was also prepared and brought up by the chairman to compel publicans to erect public urinals, but it was negatived by the council.

## CEMETERY.

The council has been informed by the President of the Board of Land and Works that the cemetery is without the municipal boundary, and that in consequence thereof it is necessary that trustees be appointed.

The regulations prepared and sent down by the council for approval have not, consequently, been approved of.

## DEPUTATIONS.

There have been two deputations during the half-year.

1. The chairman was deputed to wait upon the heads of Government departments, when in town, with respect to the requirements of the district, and his report thereon was favorable.

2. The chairman and Mr. Councillor Lawrence were deputed to wait upon the Castlemaine council and solicit their co-operation in endeavoring to obtain the sum of £12,000, to be placed on the Government estimates for next year, for making the main road between Maldon and Castlemaine. The Castlemaine council readily acceded to the request, and agreed to join this council in a memorial to the Chief Secretary for the purpose.

## MEMORIALS.

Memorials have been forwarded to the Government as under:—

1. To the Chief Secretary, in support of an application made by the inhabitants of Eagle Hawk to withdraw certain lands from sale.

2. To the Chief Secretary, applying for—

A sum of £6000 to be placed on the ensuing estimates, for making the main road through the municipality.

A sum for building and maintaining a hospital.

A sum for a powder magazine.

A sum for fencing park lands.

And a sum for the erection of a post office.

3. A joint memorial from the municipal councils of Maldon and Dunolly, for a sum to be placed on the estimates for making a bridge over the Loddon, and for clearing and making the said road on the telegraph line.

4. A joint memorial with Castlemaine as above named.

## HOSPITAL.

The inhabitants of the district having raised a sufficient sum to erect a temporary hospital, applied to the council for a grant in support thereof, and after due consideration, and being desirous of rendering some assistance to so deserving an object, they voted a sum of £100 for the purpose.

## PUBLIC RESERVES.

Application has been made to the Surveyor General for the Crown grants of land reserved for a market and manure depot, but the same have not yet been forwarded, nor has any reply been received to the application.
