PARISH OF METCALFE, COUNTY OF DALHOUSIE.

MARYBOROUGH MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAWS WITH REFERENCE TO STANDING ORDERS OF THE MINING BOARD OF THE MINING DISTRICT OF MARYBOROUGH.
—[17th October, 1859.]

At a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Maryborough, begun and holden at Maryborough, in the said district, on the 17th day of October, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS OF THE MINING BOARD OF MARYBOROUGH.

1. *Business conducted with open doors*.—Strangers may be excluded.—That the business of the board shall be conducted on all ordinary occasions with open doors, but any one member present may require the exclusion of strangers until it shall have been decided by the board whether any particular question proposed to be introduced shall be discussed with open doors.

2. *Minutes shall be taken*.—That minutes of the proceedings of each meeting of the board shall be taken regularly and entered in a book.

3. *When there is not a quorum, names recorded*.—At any time appointed for the board to meet, when there is not a quorum of the members present, or when the board is counted out, such circumstance, together with the names of the members then present, shall be recorded in the minute book.

4. *Minutes of preceding meeting first business*.—The minutes of any preceding meeting not previously confirmed, shall be read as the first business at all meetings of the board, in order to their confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereupon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings of the board, and upon their being confirmed, or amended and confirmed, as the case may be, they shall be signed by the chairman.

5. *Order of business*.—That the following shall be the order of business:—1. Confirmation of minutes; 2. Correspondence and incidental business; 3. Motions of which notice has been given; 4. Fresh notices of motion.

ATTENDANCE OF MEMBERS.

6. *Calls of the board*.—Calls of the board may be made by the chairman, on a written application signed by at least two members of the board, and stating the business for which such call is requested.

7. *Fine for non-attendance*.—Should a call for a full meeting of the members of the board be made, any member who does not attend such meeting shall be subject to a fine of One pound, unless he shall furnish to the board a satisfactory reason for his absence.

8. *Seven days' notice for a call of the board*.—No order for a call of the board shall be made for any day earlier than seven days from the date of such order, inclusive of the day of such order.

9. *Copy of order shall be sent to each member*.—A copy of the order for a call of the board shall be forwarded to each member of the board, signed by the chairman or clerk.

10. *Breach of order No. 7*.—At every call of the board, so soon as the minutes of the previous meeting have been read and confirmed, the names of the members shall be called over, and any member not being present before the expiration of the half-hour provided by the Act shall be considered to have broken standing order No. 7.

11. *Attendance of members recorded*.—That the attendance of members shall be entered in a book at each sitting of the board.

NOTICES AND MOTIONS.

12. *Notices of motion, motions and amendments to motions, to be written and signed*.—That all notices of motion, motions and amendments to motions, must be in writing, and signed by the mover and seconder.

13. *One member may give notice of motion for an absent member*.—A member may give notice of motion for any other member not then present, by putting the name of the member for whom the notice is signed on the notice of motion.

14. *Members who have given notice shall be present*.—No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called in order. Notices not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.

15. *Motions not seconded shall lapse*.—Any motion not seconded shall not be further debated, but shall lapse.

16. *Motions proposed and seconded*.—When a motion has been proposed and seconded, a question thereon shall be proposed to the board by the chairman.

17. *Motions may be withdrawn*.—A member who has proposed a motion may withdraw the same by leave of the board; but should such motion be seconded, such leave can only be granted provided there be no negative voice.

18. *Questions may be superseded*.—A question may be superseded—1st, by the adjournment of the board on the motion of a member "That the board do now adjourn;" 2nd, by the previous question, viz., "That the question be now put," being proposed and negatived.

19. *Questions shall be put*.—So soon as the debate upon a question shall be concluded, the chairman shall put the question to the board in a distinct and audible manner.

20. *Votings*.—The question being put, shall be resolved in the affirmative or negative by the majority of voices "aye" or "no."

21. *Chairman shall give his opinion*.—The chairman shall state whether in his opinion the "ayes" or the "noes" have it, and

unless his opinion be acquiesced in by the minority the question shall be resolved by a division.

22. *Questions once carried cannot be questioned again*.—A question being once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, cannot be questioned again at the same sitting during which it has been so resolved.

AMENDMENTS.

23. *Questions may be amended*.—A question having been proposed, may be amended by leaving out certain words or by inserting or adding words.

24. *Amendments not seconded*.—An amendment proposed but not seconded will not be entertained by the board nor entered in the minutes.

25. *Amendment to leave out words*.—When the proposed amendment is to leave out certain words, the chairman shall put a question, "That the words proposed to be left out stand part of the question," which shall be resolved by the board in the affirmative or negative, as the case may be.

26. *Amendment to substitute words*.—When the proposed amendment is to leave out certain words in order to insert or add other words, the chairman shall put a question, "That the words proposed to be left out stand part of the question," which, if resolved in the affirmative, will dispose of the amendment; but if in the negative, and there is no motion before the board for amending the proposed amendment, another question shall be put, "That the words of the amendment be inserted or added instead thereof," which shall be resolved in the affirmative or negative, as the case may be.

27. *Amendment to insert or add words*.—When the proposed amendment is to insert or add certain words, the chairman shall put a question, "That such words be inserted or added," which shall be resolved in the affirmative or negative, as the case may be.

28. *Amendment may be withdrawn*.—A proposed amendment may be by leave of the board withdrawn.

29. *Amendments may be amended*.—Amendments may be proposed to a proposed amendment as if such proposed amendment were an original question.

30. *Amended questions*.—When amendments have been made, the main question as amended shall be put.

31. *Amendments not carried*.—When amendments have been proposed but not carried, the question is put as originally proposed.

DEBATE.

32. *Members shall rise to speak*.—Every member desiring to speak shall rise in his place uncovered, and address himself to the chairman.

33. *Members may not speak during a division*.—Members can only speak while the board is dividing by permission of the chairman, and then only to a point of order.

34. *Members may not speak to a question after the votes have been taken*.—No member may speak to any question after the same has been put by the chairman, and the voices have been given in the affirmative and negative thereon.

35. *When two members rise to speak*.—When two or more members rise to speak, the chairman shall call upon the member who in his opinion first rose in his place.

36. *Members may speak*.—A member may speak to any question before the board, or upon any amendment proposed thereto, or upon a question or amendment to be proposed by himself, or upon a question of order arising out of the debate, but not otherwise.

37. *Members may explain matters of a personal nature*.—By the indulgence of the board, a member may explain matters of a personal nature, although there be no question before the board, but such matters may not be debated.

38. *Members may not speak twice*.—No member may speak twice to a question before the board, except in explanation or reply, or in committee of the whole board.

39. *A member who has spoken may again be heard*.—A member who has spoken to a question may again be heard to explain himself in regard to some material part of his speech, but shall not introduce any new matter.

40. *A member may reply*.—A reply shall be allowed to a mover of a resolution or amendment.

41. *A point of order*.—That any member rising to a point of order shall be allowed simply to direct attention to the point complained of, and submit it to the decision of the chairman.

42. *Member may not reflect on any vote of the board*.—No member shall reflect on any vote of the board, except for the purpose of moving that such vote be rescinded.

43. *Member may not refer to another member by name*.—No member shall refer to any other member by name, except for the purpose of distinguishing him from other members proposed for the same division.

44. *Member may not apply offensive words to any member*.—No member shall use offensive or unbecoming words in reference to any member of the board.

45. *Words objected to in debate*.—When any member shall object to words used in debate, and shall desire them to be taken down, the chairman, if it be the pleasure of the board, will direct them to be taken down.

46. *Words objected to in committee*.—In a committee of the whole board, the chairman, if it be the pleasure of the committee, will direct words objected to to be taken down, in order that the same may be reported to the board.

47. *Words objected to shall be taken down.*—Every such objection shall be taken down at the time when such words are used, and not after any other member has spoken.

48. *Members using objectionable words shall apologize.*—Any member having used objectionable words, and not explaining or retracting the same, or offering an apology for the use thereof to the satisfaction of the board, will be censured by the board, and shall not be allowed to hold his seat or vote on any question before the board until the offensive words have been retracted by him and an apology rendered to the satisfaction of the board.

49. *When the chairman rises during a debate.*—Whenever the chairman rises during a debate, any member then speaking or offering to speak shall sit down, so that the chairman may be heard without interruption.

50. *Charges against members.*—Any member against whom any charge has been made, having been heard in his place, shall withdraw while such charge shall be under debate.

DIVISIONS.

51. *Members must vote.*—Every member present at the board when the question is put will be required to vote.

52. *Divisions—Votes recorded.*—In every case of division the votes of both the ayes and noes shall be recorded.

53. *Divisions may be demanded in a committee of the whole.*—Divisions may be demanded in a committee of the whole board in the same way as hereinbefore described.

COMMITTEES OF THE WHOLE.

54. *Committee appointed by resolution.*—A committee of the whole board will be appointed by resolution, "That the board do now resolve itself into a committee."

55. *Chairman of committees.*—A member shall be appointed chairman of committees of the whole board, and shall continue so to act during the pleasure of the members of the board.

56. *Quorum of committees.*—The quorum of the committees of the whole shall be the same number as required for a quorum of the board.

57. *Matters to be considered.*—Committees shall consider such matters only as have been referred to them by the board.

58. *Members may speak more than once.*—In committee members may speak more than once to one question.

59. *Chairman's casting vote.*—Every question in committee shall be decided by a majority of votes, and in case of an equality of votes the chairman of committee shall give the casting vote.

60. *Request to report progress.*—At any stage of a measure in committee, the chairman may be requested to report progress and ask leave to sit again at a future day.

61. *No quorum present.*—If while in committee there shall not be a quorum, the chairman will resume his chair and adjourn the board to a future day.

62. *Business disposed of.*—When matters referred to a committee of the whole have been considered, the chairman of committees shall report the same to the board.

63. *Motion to report progress.*—A motion may be made during the sitting of a committee, "That the chairman do now report progress and ask leave to sit again."

64. *Reports of committees.*—Every report of a committee of the whole board shall be brought up without any question being put.

65. *Lists of divisions.*—Lists of divisions in committee shall be recorded.

66. *Resolutions in committee may be recommitted.*—Resolutions agreed to by a committee of the whole may be affirmed or negatived by the board; if negatived, they must be recommitted for further consideration in committee.

67. *Motions introducing new regulations.*—All motions which if carried would introduce new regulations into this district, shall not be resolutions of the board until they shall have been read at three sittings of the board.

68. *Motions respecting bye-laws ordered into committee.*—That all motions respecting bye-laws be ordered into committee after the second and previous to the third reading.

PETITIONS.

69. *Member to acquaint himself with contents.*—It shall be incumbent on every member presenting a petition to acquaint himself with the contents thereof, and to ascertain that it does not contain language disrespectful to the board.

70. *Member shall prefix his name.*—Every member presenting a petition to the board shall write his name at the beginning thereof.

71. *Petitions must be in conformity with rules.*—Every member presenting a petition shall take care that the same is in conformity with the rules and orders of the board.

72. *Petitions shall be respectful.*—Every petition shall be respectful, decorous and temperate in its language.

73. *Petitions shall be presented by a member.*—Petitions can only be presented to the board by a member.

74. *Petitioner shall not present petition from himself.*—A member cannot present a petition from himself.

SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS.

75. *Standing orders may be suspended.*—It shall be competent, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, for the board

to suspend any standing order herein contained, provided the effect of such suspension shall not be the rescinding of any resolution previously adopted by the board.

CONDITIONS.

1. The hay to be eaten, good, sound, and sweet; the straw to be wheaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats and bran also to be sound and sweet and of the best description.

2. The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the officer in charge of the district or station, the quantities stated in the schedule being, however, only approximative, and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than stated. The excess over the estimate will, however, in no case exceed 50 per cent.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the military commissariat.

4. The forage when delivered must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly, in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Government Stores, Melbourne, or the Treasury Pay Office of the district, as may be indicated on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours from a reasonable time to be fixed on the order, it will be competent for the department, should circumstances require it, to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage, as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a Board of Survey, composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when from some other cause injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. It will be competent for the Government Storekeeper on behalf of the Government, or for the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to that effect, it being understood that such notice can only be given from the first day of a month, and provided that no such notice can be given before the 30th April, 1860.

And whereas the streets, courts, and alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked A, have not been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, to the satisfaction of the council of the city of Melbourne:

Be it now ordered by the council of this the said city, that the streets, courts, and alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked A, shall, within ten days from the date of this order's coming into operation, be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered, in such manner as is expressed in the schedule to this order annexed, and marked B; and it is hereby notified to the owners respectively of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon the streets, courts, and alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked A, that if they or any of them shall neglect or omit to remove the obstruction, and pave, flag, macadamise, level, drain and sewer, or otherwise complete and repair the street, court, or alley on which their respective tenements adjoin or abut, in the manner and within the time expressed in this order, then the council of the said city will remove all obstructions in the said streets, courts, and alleys, and pave, flag, macadamise, level, drain, sewer, and otherwise complete or repair the same, or such parts thereof as shall not have been so done pursuant to this order, and will thereupon ascertain, determine, and charge such respective owners with their several proportionate parts of the costs, charges, and expenses thereof, according to and co-existent with their respective tenements adjoining or abutting on such street, court, or alley, having regard in such apportionment to the state and condition of the pavement, flagging, macadamising, levelling, draining, and sewerage in such streets, courts, or alleys respectively, or any part thereof, as shall or may be at the time of making this order.

SCHEDULE B, REFERRED TO IN THIS ORDER.

Manner in which the streets, courts, and alleys, enumerated in schedule A, referred to in this order, are ordered to be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered:—

The natural soil is to be reduced or made up as the case may require, so that the longitudinal section of the whole right-of-way shall in no part have an inclination of less than 1 in 120, and where practicable the entire length is to form one incline. In laying on any stuff it is to be spread in layers of not more than one foot thick. The transverse section of the right-of-way is to show a roadway whose crown shall be one inch above the kerbs of the footways, and in the fall from the crown of the water-channels is to be at the rate of 1 in 25.

On either side of the roadway there is to be a water-channel eighteen inches wide, consisting of two rows of bluestone pitchers, nine inches deep, and not less than nine inches by fourteen inches on the surface, with upright sides, set in loam and rammed with a rammer weighing forty pounds, so as to subside four inches.

The bottom of the channel is to be seven inches below the top of the kerbs.

On either side of the roadway there is also to be a footway not more than three feet wide, and these are to be separated from the roadway by a red gum plank or kerb ten inches by three, set on edge, and fastened with five-inch spikes to piles four inches by four of red gum, three feet long, driven into the soil.

The footways are to be covered with a coat of gravel three inches thick, and the surface is to fall towards the channel at the rate of 1 in 10. The roadway is to be covered with a coat of broken metal, broken to a two and a half inch gauge, and laid on seven inches thick at the channels, and eight inches at the crown, and this when necessary is to be covered with a coat of loam one and a half inches thick.

Wherever private entrances lead from the rights-of-way they are to be paved to the full width with bluestone pitchers, in the same manner as the channels. Paving is to be extended from the channels towards the line of houses or fences, so as to cross the entire footway.

The whole of the work must be done under the inspection and subject to the approval of the city surveyor, who is authorised to order any deviation from these general principles which the particularities of any case may require. No. 1543

FINANCE.

The amount of rate for 1859, exclusive of arrears of rates for preceding years, is, to the present date, £2503 8s. 6d., with arrears for 1856-7-8, £162 14s., making a total of £2666 2s. 6d. A considerable per centage must be deducted from outstanding rates for those uncollectable from absent owners and other causes. The rate collector reports unprecedented difficulties this year in collecting the rates, hence the large balance still outstanding.

It cannot, however, be too strongly impressed upon the minds of the ratepayers that the legislative grant is regulated in amount by that of the rate collected in this year (1859), for the rate struck in the same. The sum paid will be about 30s. for every pound collected; and, consequently, every pound due in 1859, not paid or collected within that period, will entail a loss of thirty shillings to the municipality.

The town clerk having, on the 5th of August last, resigned his office of acting municipal treasurer, held it by request of the council until the close of the municipal year, when Thomas Cope, Esq., the chairman, was appointed municipal treasurer for the current municipal year.
