## SANDHURST MINING DISTRICT.

No. III.—BYE-LAW OF THE SANDHURST MINING BOARD.—[27th September, 1859.]

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Sandhurst, begun and holden at Sandhurst, in the said district, on the 27th day of September, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

*Regulations of local courts and former bye laws of mining board repealed.*—As it is expedient that the mining regulations made by the late local courts for the district of Sandhurst should be repealed, and all several the said regulations are hereby annulled: And whereas it is also expedient that the bye-laws enacted by the mining boards of the mining district of Sandhurst should be revised and amended, the said bye-laws are hereby repealed, and the following bye-law substituted in lieu thereof, excepting an enactment made by the said board for prescribing the mode in which the validity of disputed elections shall be decided, and excepting also the bye-law or standing orders regulating the proceedings at meetings of the Sandhurst mining board, dated 21st May, 1859, and excepting also the bye-law No. 6, passed on the 19th day of January, 1859, by the Sandhurst mining board for the protection of applicants for leases of land for mining purposes, which said bye-laws shall remain in full force, and further also excepting such portions of regulations or bye-laws heretofore enacted by any local court or mining board of the said district as it may be necessary to retain for the purpose of deciding any dispute respecting the boundaries of claims occupied before this bye-law shall have come in force, and also provided that this bye-law shall not be held to interfere with any pre-existing rights or privileges to which any miner shall or may be entitled previously to the date hereof.

## GENERAL CLAUSES.

1. *Construction of words and terms.*—For the construction of this bye-law the word "miner" shall be construed to mean any party of miners or mining company holding "miners' rights," and the word "machine" to mean any engine, mill, or other apparatus used in mining, or for separating gold from any other substance; and every word used in the singular number or masculine gender shall be construed equally to apply to and include the plural number, and females as well as males, unless there is something in the context repugnant to such construction. The words "the warden" shall equally apply to the "resident warden" or to any warden of the gold fields.

2. *Wardens and assessors.*—It shall be lawful in all cases in which a warden has power to act under the bye-laws of the Sandhurst mining board for any party interested to require that assessors shall be called, and the decision of the majority of them the said warden and assessors shall be the decision of the question in which they may be engaged.

3. *Claims to be properly marked.*—All claims taken up or occupied under this bye-law shall be marked as follows, that is to say:—In alluvial ground the claim shall be marked by substantial pegs standing at each corner of the claim at least one foot above the surface of the ground; and all quartz claims shall be marked by substantial posts at least three inches in thickness and standing three feet above the surface; and all such posts shall be maintained free from any tubbish or soil so as to be readily observed.

4. *Work to be done on claim when marked off.*—Any claim marked off in accordance with this bye-law shall be in full work within forty-eight hours from the time of marking, unless where the contrary is provided in any clause hereinafter following.

5. *Pegs, posts, and all mining plant and easements protected.*—No person shall remove, injure, destroy, or deface any posts, pegs, logs, fence, easements, notices, or any mining plant of whatsoever description, without permission from the warden or owner of the claim on which they may be situated.

6. *Preparatory work in claims.*—Any miner employed in making preparation for the working of any claim, whether in connection with the machinery for same or otherwise, shall be deemed as working upon the claim.

7. *Claims not forfeited by neglect of hired workmen.*—Any party holding a claim, or portion thereof, or share or interest therein, and who employs hired labor to work the same, shall not be deemed to have forfeited his right, title or interest in the same through any neglect, absence, or omission on the part of any workman thereon employed; provided always that upon due notice in writing being given to the owner of such claim, the work upon it shall be immediately resumed and carried on in a regular manner.

8. *Claims when relinquished.*—It shall be competent for a warden to declare any claim relinquished if not worked in a *bona fide* manner, and in accordance with the provisions of this bye-law, and he may accordingly award the said claim, or any portion thereof to any applicant for the same, upon due enquiry.

9. *No walls, unless absolutely necessary for safety.*—No wall shall be allowed between any two claims unless it shall be absolutely necessary for the safety of parties working in or near said claims; in which case, if the holders of any adjoining claim or cuttings cannot agree among themselves, it shall be lawful for any warden to prescribe the extent and thickness of any wall which may be necessary; and no person shall mine into, remove or damage any wall which shall have been left by agreement between the parties, or which may have been prescribed as aforesaid to be left, unless the consent of the owners of the claims adjoining such wall, or the authority of the warden, has been

first obtained; and it shall also be lawful for any warden to disallow any wall, or portion of a wall, that has been left by agreement if in his opinion a greater thickness had been agreed upon than was necessary for the purposes of safety.

10. *Air passages may be ordered.*—When air passages are required between one claim and another, it shall be lawful for any warden, when called upon so to do, to fix upon the position and size of such air passages, and to apportion the work of making the same among the owners of the several claims concerned, and every such owner shall, without delay, perform the work thus allotted to him; provided, however, that if the owner of any claim wishes to place any grating of iron or wood across any such air passage, he shall enlarge such passage so as not to diminish the ventilation of any claim connected therewith.

11. *Warning before blasting.*—Ten minutes previous to the discharge of any blast of gunpowder, or other explosive substance, within one hundred (100) feet from the surface of the ground, due notice of such discharge shall be given by the persons who shall have prepared or caused such explosion to all other persons working, residing or passing within a distance of one hundred (100) yards from the place of such discharge.

12. *Enquiry into forfeited claims, &c.*—No miner shall forfeit his right, title, or interest to or in any claim or auriferous material, nor shall any claim or auriferous material be deemed to be relinquished save upon due enquiry by the warden, and after the service of a notice on the owner of such claim or auriferous material, such as prescribed in schedule No. 1 annexed, and on such enquiry the warden shall take into consideration such reasonable plea in excuse as may be offered by or on behalf of any miner touching the same; provided, however, that nothing in this clause shall be taken to apply to quartz tailings, regulations respecting which are provided in clause 50 of this bye-law.

13. *Compensation for work done in quartz and alluvial ground.*—When the claim of any miner shall have been awarded to any applicant, the value of any roads, shafts, drives, timber, mining plant or other materials absolutely beneficial or that may be useful to the said applicant, shall be estimated by a warden, who may obtain the assistance of a surveyor at the expense of the parties concerned in making said valuation, and the amount of said award shall be paid forthwith; provided, however, that no compensation shall be so allowed if less than one month's *bona fide* labor shall have been expended on such claim.

14. *Admission to measure claims.*—It shall be lawful for any warden to grant permission to any miner, with or without a surveyor, to enter during working hours any claim adjacent to his own claim for the purpose of examining or measuring the depth of shaft or length of drive in such claim.

15. *Creeks.*—No miner shall sink or drive within thirty (30) feet of the bank of any creek without a special permission from the warden.

16. *Duplicates of forms, &c.*—For the purposes of this bye-law, all printed forms, schedules, or other documents appertaining to them, shall be issued in duplicate, one copy of which shall be filed in the warden's office and the other copy retained by the person requiring it.

17. *Cancel of improper documents.*—The warden may cancel any mining document which has been obtained upon misrepresentation, and the holder of any such document shall upon such cancelling immediately cease to enjoy any privileges possessed by him in virtue of the said document.

18. *Shafts shall be made safe for the public.*—Any miner who may sink a shaft or make an excavation upon his claim in search of auriferous quartz shall substantially fence in such shaft or excavation to the height of at least four feet, and maintain the same during his occupancy of such claim.

And any miner working in alluvial ground a claim within forty (40) feet of any private road or ordinary crossing-place shall enclose any shaft or excavation which he shall make upon such claim by an embankment or other fence at least four (4) feet in height, so as to afford thereby a reasonable security against accidents to passengers.

19. *Flooded claims, how dealt with.*—When any two or more mining claims communicating with each other in such a manner that water can pass from one claim to another, should be flooded with water, either from natural drainage or other causes, it shall be competent for the owner of any claim so flooded to call upon the warden to enquire into the matter; and after forty-eight hours' notice has been given to the owner of each claim flooded (or in his absence to some person competent to represent him) by the claimholder so applying to the warden, and which said notice may be given either by personal service, or by the posting thereof upon the spot, and when the number of claims flooded has been ascertained it shall be lawful for the warden to make such order relative to the joint pumping or baling of any one or more of the claims, or relative to any other matter pertaining thereto as to him shall appear equitable, and such order may be subsequently added to or altered, should circumstances so require, and a copy of such order, addition to, or alteration thereof, signed by the warden, shall be served upon the owner of each claim to which it may apply; provided that nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply to any quartz reef or other place on which a committee has been or shall hereafter be constituted under any bye-law that has been, or may be hereafter enacted to deal with the circumstances or matter of flooded claims.

20. *Permission to stack auriferous material.*—Any miner desirous of retaining any auriferous substance, shall first obtain permission from the warden to stack it in such place as will not injure the interest of any other miner; and the warden may, in his discretion, and after due enquiry, extend permission from time to time; provided such permission shall not extend beyond three months at any one time, nor prevent the warden from withdrawing it should circumstances seem, in his opinion, to require it; provided further that any such aforesaid auriferous material shall be deemed to be abandoned if it shall have been for more than twelve months unused.

#### ALLUVIAL WORKINGS.

21. *Increase of claim for prospecting in alluvial ground.*—If any miner shall sink in alluvial ground in search of gold, at a distance of one mile or more from any other similar workings, he shall be entitled to mark off and hold an extent of claim of fifty (50) yards by fifty (50) yards, and such miner shall, within three days after the marking of the said claim, report the same at the warden's office (as per schedule No. 2 annexed), and such miner, upon the discovery of a new lead of gold, shall, within six days of such discovery, notify the same to the warden, who shall, upon inspection of the claim, decide upon the validity of the claimant's right to hold it as a prospecting claim.

22. *Form of claim in alluvial ground.*—As far as practicable, all claims in alluvial ground shall be marked off in a rectangular form, the length of the same not exceeding twice the breadth.

23. *Extent of alluvial claim for digging.*—The extent of ground to which miners shall be entitled to mark off as claims, shall be as follows, viz.:—

One miner shall be entitled to,	35 feet by 35 feet
Two miners	50 " 50 "
Three "	60 " 60 "
Four "	70 " 70 "
Five "	80 " 80 "
Six "	85 " 85 "
Seven "	95 " 95 "
Eight "	100 " 100 "

Beyond which extent no greater area shall be allowed to any miners.

24. *Co-operative mining claims.*—It shall be lawful for any miner or party of miners desirous to combine together in the use of steam machinery for the working of previously worked and abandoned alluvial ground, to hold an area of such ground not exceeding five (5) acres; and also any such party may in new alluvial ground occupy a claim for similar use not exceeding one (1) acre; provided such new alluvial ground be not at a less distance than one (1) mile from any alluvial workings, and further provided that the party taking up such ground shall notify the same at the warden's office within three (3) days from the date of occupation of the said claim.

25. *Creek claims.*—Any miner desirous to work the bed of any creek shall be entitled to mark off two hundred and forty (240) lineal feet, irrespective of breadth, on the said creek, beyond which extent no greater area will be allowed. And such miner shall remove all soil raised therefrom at least ten (10) feet from the edge of the bank.

#### PUDDLING.

26. *Dams, machines, &c., authorised.*—Authority may be obtained from the warden by any miner for the making and holding any dam, well, waterhole, or for the erecting of any puddling machine; provided that the said miner shall have first personally served on the owners of the four machines or registered dams nearest to the site applied for a printed notice of application, obtained for the purpose at the office of the resident warden, or when there are no machines nor registered dams within a quarter of a mile of the site applied for, the same notice shall be served upon the miners working nearest to the said site. And the applicant shall, if required by any person upon whom such notice is served, go to and point out to such person the exact site for which application has been made; and any person to whom such application is tendered, if tendered in accordance with this bye-law, shall insert in writing on the back of said notice, and in the manner therein prescribed, the date on which it was served upon him, and his approval or his disapproval of the grant of such authority as aforesaid to the applicant. And until the expiration of three clear days from the day on which the service of the notice was completed, and until all and every such objection has been heard and overruled by the warden, such authority shall not be granted to the applicant to make, nor shall he make or commence to make, any dam, well, or waterhole, or erect any such machine as aforesaid in that place.

27. *Site for puddling machines to be surveyed at the expense of applicant.*—Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this bye-law, it shall not be lawful for any warden, or officer acting for him, to grant an authority to any person to make, hold or occupy any dam in connection with puddling machinery, nor to plant or erect such machinery on any site, unless said site shall have been first inspected and surveyed by a surveyor of the mining board, and such survey shall not be made until the provisions of clause No. 26 of this bye-law respecting the mode of proceeding to obtain authority for making dams and erecting machinery shall have been fully complied with; and provided that such site be not at a greater distance than twenty (20) miles from the office of the resident warden of Sandhurst.

28. *Extent of claim for puddlers.*—In all partially worked alluvial ground, each miner, where horse machinery is employed, shall be allowed to claim and occupy an area sixty (60) feet in

length by sixty (60) feet in breadth, or three thousand six hundred (3600) superficial square feet, and the extent of ground to which any miner shall be entitled, in addition to the said area, shall be according to the scale in schedule No. 4 annexed to this bye-law. And further, any miner holding a puddler's claim and being entitled to a greater area of ground than that which shall be contained in his said claim and adjacent to his machine, may hold, elsewhere, additional ground in one or more blocks; provided, however, that the whole of his claims taken together shall not exceed the extent of claim to which a puddler is entitled under this bye-law, and the working of any portion of the full quantity of ground marked off by any such miner shall be deemed a working of the whole. And any party holding such claim shall within one month commence mining operations upon the claim in conformity with the provisions of this bye-law; provided always, however, that the warden may, at his discretion, permit the aforesaid party to have a lesser number of miners employed upon said claim for any given period not exceeding one month in six months, upon undoubted evidence of expediency, and of the *bonâ fide* intention on the part of the claimholder to work such claim in a legal and proper manner.

29. *Dams, &c., to be properly made.*—When any person shall receive authority, as under this bye-law, to make any waterhole or dam he shall excavate the earth to the depth of twelve (12) feet, unless the bed rock lies nearer to the surface, in which latter case the said dam or waterhole shall be excavated to the rock, and he shall form around such waterhole or dam a bank sufficient at all times to prevent the overflowing or percolation of the water into or upon any occupied ground lying adjacent.

30. *Drains from machines, &c., to be made.*—The owner or occupier of any machine which discharges sludge or water shall make for the proper conveyance of such sludge or water to the main drain of the gully or flat in which such machine is situated a good and sufficient drain; and every such private drain shall be excavated and made as nearly as possible to the same depth as that of the main drain into which it shall discharge and join; and when in any branch gully there shall be no proper main drain, then such private drain shall be made and united in the manner most convenient to the private drain of any other machine in the same gully, and the owner of such private drain shall at all times maintain the same in good order and free from obstructions, and also whether his machine is in work or not, that portion of any main drain which may have been assigned to him to keep in order and free from obstructions by any warden, or which may have been allotted to him by mutual agreement between the puddlers themselves.

31. *Breadth of puddler's roadway.*—In all cases a puddler may occupy a breadth of eighteen (18) feet of ground for the roadway to his claim.

32. *Roadway at puddler's claim may in some cases be deemed part of his claim.*—When a miner shall work or mark out a greater breadth of ground than shall be necessary for the purpose of a road, it shall be lawful for any warden to cause a new measurement of said miner's claim to be made, and to adjudge any portion of said road to be a portion of said claim.

33. *Forfeiture of puddling dams, &c., by neglect to use them.*—The owner or occupier of any dam, well, waterhole, or puddling machine, neglecting or discontinuing the use of the same for the period of six months except in the case of want of water, shall thereby forfeit all right, title and interest therein, and it shall be competent for the warden to cancel the grant of such site as aforesaid, and to assign it to any other applicant; provided, however, that it shall be competent for the warden to award compensation to the party so dispossessed, and which compensation shall be forthwith paid to him by the applicant for the said site, well, dam, or puddling machine (or all of them) with their appurtenances.

34. *Puddlers' claims when protected.*—When any party is engaged in the erection of steam or horse machinery for puddling, it shall be competent for him to mark off the puddler's claim which he purposes to occupy for washing alluvial soil in connection with such machinery, and said claim shall be deemed his claim to all intents and purposes, but he shall duly work it within at least one month after the so marking it off; however, it shall be competent for the warden to extend this period to one month further in case of apparently urgent and reasonable circumstances. And when any miner, having a puddling claim, shall have, notwithstanding proper precautions upon his part, his supply of water exhausted, he shall not be liable to forfeit said claim or any portion thereof.

35. *Puddler's claim may be held unworked.*—It shall be competent for the warden to give any miner, having a puddler's claim, permission to hold the same unworked for any period not exceeding six weeks, provided such permission shall not be granted to any such miner respecting the same or any adjacent site oftener than twice in twelve months.

36. *Water not to be taken from dams.*—No person shall, without the consent of the owner thereof, take away or make use of any water which may be in any duly authorised waterhole or dam, except for domestic purposes only, or by the authority of the warden; provided, however, that it shall be lawful for any warden to authorise the taking of water from any dam or waterhole when such water shall have been unused for the purposes intended for a period of three months, and to prescribe the conditions on which it shall be taken.

37. *Dams not to be made near reefs.*—No waterhole or dam shall be made by any person within the distance of twenty (20)

yards from the line of any quartz workings; and it shall be competent for any warden to direct the removal, alteration, or drainage of any waterhole or dam which is proved to discharge water into any underground quartz workings, and he may adjudge any reasonable sum of money to be paid by the person benefited to the owner of the said waterhole or dam.

38. *Machines, &c., not to be too close to roads.*—No machine of any description shall be placed within the distance of fifteen (15) feet from the edge of any road or crossing-place in use.

39. *Making drains across roads, &c.*—Any person who may enjoy the use of any drain crossing any road or footpath, or who may be desirous to make any drain of any kind across any road or footpath, shall make such drain only upon obtaining permission from the warden or owner of said road or footpath.

40. *Sludge and water to be kept off roads.*—No person shall allow the water or sludge from his machine to run or spread over any road, footpath, or crossing-place in common use.

41. *If sludge shall damage roads, &c., machines may be stopped.*—When the sludge or water discharged from any machine is causing damage to any public road, footpath, or crossing-place in common use, or to any workable ground, it shall be competent for any party interested to report the same to the warden, who may, on enquiry, compel the stoppage of such machine or machines, not exceeding twelve (12) in number, as the circumstances of the case may require, for the prevention or repair of any such damage as aforesaid.

42. *Protection to sludge or water drains.*—No person shall in any way whatsoever interfere with any private or public sludge or water channel, without the authority of the warden.

43. *Machines, &c., obstructing certain creeks may be removed.*—It shall be competent for the warden to direct the removal or alteration of any machine, dam, waterhole, bank, washing-stuff, or other obstruction, which may impede the free passage of the water, and which may now stand, or in future be placed, in or upon the principal channel of any of the creeks within the district, and on which mining operations are carried on, or in or upon any channel or cutting which may have been made, in lieu of any portion of these creeks, or within the distance of thirty (30) feet from the edge of any principal channel or cutting as aforesaid.

#### QUARTZ WORKING.

44. *Prospecting in quartz.*—When any miner may be desirous of searching for any new lode or vein of quartz, or the continuation of any discovered vein, he shall be entitled to mark off and occupy a claim two hundred (200) yards in length on the supposed line of reef, by a width at right angles to said line of one hundred and fifty (150) yards: Provided the end boundaries of such claim be not within the distance of eight hundred and eighty (880) yards from the end boundaries of any claim occupied on the said supposed line: Provided further, that any claim taken up under this clause shall be worked in a *bonâ fide* manner during the ordinary hours of labor for a period of twelve months, or in default thereof the extent of said claim shall be reduced to the size prescribed in clause 45 of this bye-law: Provided also, that the occupant of any such increased claim shall, within three days after the marking thereof, report the particulars to the warden, who shall record the same; and further, on the discovery of any new line of reef, or of the continuation of any known existing line of reef, the said occupant shall defray the expense of surveying the same, with the view of laying down the definite bearing of the said reef.

45. *Extent of quartz claim.*—Any miner shall be entitled to hold twenty-five (25) yards on the supposed line of any quartz lode or vein, by a width at right angles to said line of one hundred and fifty (150) yards; and any two or more miners may hold a claim on the line of any quartz vein or lode to the extent of seventy-five (75) yards in length by a width at right angles to the said line of one hundred and fifty (150) yards; and all the quartz or other auriferous rock lying within or beneath the boundaries of such claim shall be the property of the owner or holders of the claim: Provided, however, that any alluvial earth which may lie upon any quartz claim shall not be deemed to be part of such claim.

46. *Registration of quartz claims.*—The owner of any quartz claim held under the miner's right shall furnish the resident warden with such particulars respecting such claim (such as its position, size, date of occupation, &c.) as may be necessary for its registration, and whenever any miner shall dispose of, sell, mortgage, or assign his claim, or any portion thereof, or any share or interest therein, he shall report such sale, mortgage, or assignment to the resident warden, at his office, for the registration of such sale, mortgage, or assignment; and no quartz claim, or sale, mortgage, or assignment thereof, or of any share or interest therein, shall be valid or recognised as such by any warden, unless the foregoing provisions for registration shall have been observed and complied with: Provided, however, that this clause of this bye-law shall not come into force until the 31st day of December, 1859 (nine). And the person so registering such claim or interest therein shall receive an acknowledgment of such registration from the resident warden, and the same shall be entered in a book kept for the purpose by the said warden.

47. *Protection of quartz claims.*—The owner of any quartz claim held under this bye-law, and in which six (6) months' *bonâ fide* work has been done, shall have his right, title, and interest therein protected for the period of six (6) months from the date at which such *bonâ fide* work ceased; and the owner of

any claim which has been in *bonâ fide* work for any period less than six (6) months, and not less than one month, shall be entitled to similar protection for a length of time equal to that during which his claim was in work: Provided, however, that the owner shall post up and maintain a printed notice on a conspicuous part of the claim for one week previous to the suspension of work in the said claim, and shall during the period of suspension from work maintain in a similar conspicuous place the number of the claim as recorded in the warden's office: Provided also, that such owner shall, on ceasing work, immediately report the same to the warden, in accordance with schedule No. 3 annexed to this bye-law: And provided further, that such protection shall not exempt the owner of said claim from the payment of any assessment which may be made for drainage or other purposes in connection with the reef on which such claim may be situated. And the warden shall cause to be made out a list of the particulars of all such protected claims, which list shall be hung outside of his office during office hours for public inspection.

48. *Bearing of quartz reef.*—When the line, bearing, or strike of any reef cannot be accurately defined, in order to facilitate the settlement of disputes, it is hereby enacted that that bearing of reef which has been already ascertained with probable accuracy in the nearest generally worked reef shall be taken as the standard which shall guide the warden or surveyor in fixing the boundaries of any quartz claim which may be the subject of dispute.

49. *Timbering of quartz claims.*—Upon a complaint made to the warden that any quartz claim is insufficiently timbered, or its shaft not adequately supported for the safety of persons working in said claim, or for the safety of the miners in any adjoining claim, the warden may enter upon said claim and make such order as to him shall seem requisite for the protection of all parties engaged in the working thereof.

50. *Quartz tailings.*—It shall be lawful for the proprietor of any crushing machine to retain possession of any tailings produced at his mill, and placed upon crown lands, up to the date of this bye-law. But henceforth all such tailings lying upon crown lands shall belong to the public, or to any miner who chooses to remove them.

51. *Sluicing.*—Whenever for sluicing purposes a greater amount of labor and expense than usual in such operations shall be incurred, the party undergoing such shall be entitled to mark off as a claim an extended area of ground not exceeding one hundred (100) yards in length by one hundred and sixty (160) yards back measurement.

#### ROADS.

52. *Warden to authorise the making of crossing-places.*—Upon the information of any two or more persons received by the warden, to the effect that it is desirable that a road, bridge, or crossing-place should be made over or across any gully, creek, quartz reef, or other obstruction, and that the said informants are willing, if authorised, to perform the required work at such place, it shall be competent for the warden to fix the position of such road or crossing-place, and to make such order relative thereto as he shall deem proper: Provided, however, that no such road or crossing-place shall be authorised to be made over or through any mining claim, unless compensation for damage or loss shall be immediately paid or tendered to the owner thereof: And provided further, that such road, bridge, or crossing-place shall be of a breadth, where practicable, of not less than fifteen feet, and be so constructed that no injury shall accrue to any drain, creek, or culvert passing under it.

53. *Protection to private roads.*—No person shall dig within the distance of five (5) feet from the nearest wheel track of any private road used for mining purposes, nor drive underneath the same, unless the drive shall be more than ten (10) feet below the surface of the road; nor shall any person interfere in any way with any such road unless authorised by a warden.

54. *Changing a road.*—That in case any miner requires the changing of a private road to any adjacent site, he shall for a period of six days affix a sufficient notice thereat, in a conspicuous place and form, and also acquaint the warden with his desire to alter said road, and the warden may permit such alteration on the expiration of the said six days if he shall approve of it.

#### RESIDENCE AND BUSINESS.

55. *Claims under business license.*—The holder of any business license shall be entitled to occupy and fence in for the purpose of residence and business the full extent of land allotted by the Act of 21 Victoria No. 32, namely, twenty (20) square perches or six hundred and five (605) superficial yards; and such area shall be taken, where practicable, in a rectangular form, the length of which shall not exceed twice the breadth: Provided, however, that when the premises of any holder of a business license shall abut upon any main road, or stand in a line with other stores or shops, he shall not be entitled to hold a greater frontage than twelve (12) yards: but a space of ground ten (10) feet in width shall in all cases, where practicable, be allowed, in addition to the frontage before mentioned (even although one or more such frontages shall be held by the same person), said space of additional frontage to be left and maintained clear of all buildings or obstructions for the passage of carts as right of way, and no person whatever shall leave or place any obstruction in such right-of-way.

56. *Residence claim under mine's right.*—Any holder of a miner's right may fence in for a residence, exclusive of his

mining claim, the full extent of land allowed by the Act 21 Victoria No. 32, namely, twenty (20) square perches or six hundred and five (605) superficial square yards; and the said area for residence shall be marked off, where practicable, in a rectangular form, of which the length shall not exceed twice the breadth: Provided that in the event of such holder of a miner's right having marked off and fenced in such quantity of land for the purpose of residence not residing upon such land, he shall be deemed to have abandoned the same.

57. *Right of entry on ground held as residence, &c.*—All ground occupied under a miner's right or a business license may be entered for mining purposes: Provided, however, that such compensation as a warden may deem equitable shall be paid forthwith to the occupant for any damage or inconvenience sustained by such entry as aforesaid; and provided also that no such entry be made without the authority of the warden.

58. *Warden may remove tents, &c., too crowded.*—Whenever any dwelling-place, tent, stable, stack of hay, washing-stuff, stone, tailings, or other thing, shall have been placed at any time whatever near to any occupied dwelling-house or other building so as to cause annoyance, inconvenience, or damage to the occupant of such last-mentioned dwelling-place or building, it shall be competent for any warden to make an order for the removal by the owner of such dwelling-place or other buildings or things as aforesaid injurious to a reasonable distance.

SURVEYORS.

59. *Duty of surveyors.*—Previous to making any survey of any site for the erection of any machine, the surveyor shall enquire whether or not the preliminary notices required by this bye-law have been served by the applicant for such site; and if such surveyor shall find that any objections be made to the making of such survey, he shall report the same to the warden; and in making such survey such surveyor shall connect such site to one or more permanent points or objects, so that the exact site may thereby be determined in future.

60. *Surveyors' fees.*—Upon application for any such site, the applicant shall pay to the warden the sum of thirty shillings, if the site applied for be within one mile of the resident warden's office, and a further sum of two shillings and sixpence for every mile beyond that distance, as payment for the said surveyor, who shall receive the same upon furnishing his said survey and report, together with a tracing of the same for the applicant.

61. *Records of survey to be kept.*—Any survey of any reservoir, waterhole, dam, or site of same, or site for any machine or quartz workings, or report or drawing in connection with them or any of them, shall be duly lodged in the office of the resident warden by the surveyor.

DRAINAGE COMMITTEES.

62. *Abolition of central drainage committee.*—It is hereby enacted that the central drainage committee and district drainage committees in this district are abolished.

63. *Breach of bye-law.*—Any person acting in disobedience to or non-compliance with this or any bye-law of the mining board of Sandhurst, or who shall in any manner infringe or violate the provisions thereof, render themselves liable, upon conviction, to forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding ten pounds (£10), in accordance with the Gold Fields Act, 21 Victoria No. 32, section 126.

THE BOROONDARA PUBLIC CEMETERY.

RULES and regulations of the Boroondara General Cemetery.

1. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. By the 8th section of the Act, "Any person making a vault, or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees under these rules, and upon the payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have maintained, and kept up, a vault, monument or tombstone, according to the tenor of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons, and his or their heirs or representatives, for ever."

3. Application for such permission to be made at the office of the trustees. A certificate of permission in the form set out in the schedule will be granted to the party applying for such permission on payment of the charges in schedule B.



4. The charges will be remitted for the burial of any person on evidence being produced before two of the trustees that the relatives or friends of such persons are unable to pay the costs and charges.

5. Orders for interment must be given to the person in charge of the cemetery between the hours of Ten a.m. and Five p.m. of the day previous to interment.

6. The trustees will cause all ordinary graves to be dug, but when a brick or other grave or vault is required, it must be constructed under the direction of the trustees, or some person duly appointed by them; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault belonging to another person, the consent (in writing) of such person must be left with the order. No grave to be of a less depth than six feet.

7. When giving the order for interment, a form of application for burial, containing the name, age, and late place of residence of the deceased will be provided, and must be filled up, where practicable, and entered in the interment book.

8. The time fixed for the funeral to be at the cemetery must be punctually observed.

9. The hours fixed for interments will be from Ten a.m. to Six o'clock p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from Ten a.m. to Four o'clock p.m. in the other four months; except on Sundays, when the only hours for funerals will be from Two to Five o'clock p.m. throughout the year.

10. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones, to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

11. Every coffin in a vault, or brick or other grave, to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of stone or iron.

12. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and a plan of every monument, must be submitted to the trustees for their approval. In the erection of tablets, copper cramps must be used.

13. Wooden fences allowed, but if not kept in proper repair they may be removed by order of the trustees, without notice to the owner.

14. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

15. The ground will be open daily to the public from sunrise to sunset.

16. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, will be kept at the office, and may be inspected at the charge set out in schedule B; and registers of all grants will be kept by the secretary.

17. Any person wilfully or wantonly destroying, or doing or causing to be done any damage to any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree, or plant in the cemetery, is guilty of a misdemeanor, and being convicted thereof is liable to be punished, as prescribed by the 14th section of the Act 17th Victoria No. 12.

18. No dogs will be allowed to enter the cemetery.

19. No funeral will be allowed to take place in the cemetery without a certificate from a deputy registrar, or coroner holding an inquest or enquiry on the body to be interred, or from a magistrate; such certificate to be delivered to the person in charge at the cemetery, before the funeral enters the gates.

20. That no interments take place on Sundays, excepting in cases where a medical certificate is obtained to show that such interment is necessary.

21. The trustees reserve the right to add to and make any alterations from time to time in the charges and regulations.

*Clause 134.*—If any person shall make and subscribe any false declaration, or make or sign any declaration, certificate, or other instrument required by this Act to be verified by signature only, the same being false in any particular, or if any person shall make or sign any declaration made for the consideration of the Commissioner on application presented to him, the same being untrue in any particular, or if any person required by this or any other Act relating to the Customs to answer questions put to him by the officers of Customs shall not truly answer such questions, or if any person shall counterfeit, falsify, or wilfully use when counterfeited or falsified any document required by this or any Act relating to the Customs, or by or under the directions of the Commissioner, or any instrument used in the transaction of any business or matter relating to the Customs, or shall fraudulently alter any document or instrument, or counterfeit the seal, signature, initials, or other mark of or used by the officers of the Customs for the verification of any such document or instrument, or for the security of goods or any other purpose in the conduct of business relating to the Customs, or under the control or management of the Commissioner or any officer of Customs, every person so offending shall for every such offence forfeit the penalty of One hundred pounds.

## PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

CARLTON.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by four hundred and fifty-six householders resident in the locality known as Carlton, being a portion of Smith ward, in the city of Melbourne, praying for the erection of such locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners represent themselves as residing in and around the portion of Smith ward north of Grattan street, North Melbourne, called Carlton, and within the area hereinafter described.

They request that the substance and prayer of their petition may be published, in order that in due time their locality may be proclaimed as the Carlton Municipality, with the following boundaries, namely:—Bounded on the south by a line running east along the centre of Grattan street; from thence along the centre of Grattan street to its intersection with Nicholson street; thence by a line running north along the centre of Nicholson street to its intersection with the centre of Reilly street; thence by a line running east along the said centre of Reilly street to its intersection with the centre of Smith street; thence by a line running north along the said centre of Smith street to its intersection with the southern side of the Heijelberg road; thence by a line running easterly along the said southern side of the said road to its junction with the west side of the Merri Creek; thence by a line running up the said creek to its intersection with the south boundary line of the Brunswick municipality; thence west along the said boundary line to its intersection with the centre of Lygon street; thence by a line running southerly down the centre of the said Lygon street; thence by the centre of the road bounding the south-east corner of the Melbourne General Cemetery to its intersection with the centre of Madeline street; thence along the centre of Madeline street to the commencing point.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

“May it therefore please your Excellency, with the advice of the Executive Council, to take the premises into your gracious consideration, and cause the advertisement of the substance and prayer of this petition to be made in the *Government Gazette* as required by statute; and in due time thereafter, if there be no counter-petition signed by a greater majority (*sic*) of the householders of Carlton, and delivered, then, in pursuance of the aforesaid statute, to proclaim the locality presently known as a portion of Smith Ward to be a municipal district, to be known by the name and style of the Carlton Municipality, or such other name as your Excellency shall adopt, all within the meaning of the said statute; or to do, order, and proclaim otherwise in the premises, as it may seem meet to your Excellency, with the advice of the Executive Council.”

3. 5. The above substitutions are to be made whenever it may be considered advisable by the officer authorised to draw the rations, but not otherwise. Scales Nos. 3, 4 and 5 will be drawn at Pentridge, either with or without vegetables, as the officer in charge may direct.

6. The supplies are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto, on the written order of the officer in charge, except in the case of Aboriginal Stations, which are to be supplied under the Melbourne contract, and the several articles are to be delivered at the Government Stores.

10. If the Board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which, it will be procured by the person requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 7.

11. In the country districts, when a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, and in all cases when the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the persons to whom the rations are due, or to the contractor, in waiting for a Board of Survey, the Head of the Department, or officer in charge of the station, will have the power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing which, it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 7.



12. ## BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have received the assent of His Excellency the Governor in Council during the past six months:—

No. 10. For the expenditure of One thousand pounds, grant-in-aid.

No. 11. For the regulating of building operations and the licensing of builders thereon.

No. 12. For preventing the use of inflammable materials in the erection of buildings, and for the better prevention of fires.

No. 13. For preventing damage to footpaths and water channels, and for regulating the formation of private and common crossings.

No. 14. To regulate the conducting of the election of members of the municipal council.

No. 15. For determining the validity of disputed elections, and for regulating the proceedings at the election of chairman.

## PUBLIC WORKS.

The following public works have been completed:—

Fencing the Old Cemetery.

Making twenty chains of road across the lead to Commissioner's Hill.

Pitching with blue stone the water channels of Barkly street from Vincent street to View Point street.

Pitching with blue stone the water channels of View Point and Taylor streets.

Making three box culverts, one across Barkly street where it enters View Point street, one across View Point street, and one across Taylor street.

Grubbing and clearing away all stumps and rubbish and filling all holes in Market square.

Forming Ligar street.

Forming and laying out the Triangle at View Point.

Erecting wooden council chambers.

A contract has been entered into for the cutting and formation of Vincent street at its permanent level, which is now in course of completion.

The following applications made to Government have been granted as under:—

That twenty acres may be given for a general cemetery.—Fifteen acres granted.

That five acres may be given for a manure depot.—Two acres granted.

That eight acres may be given as a quarry reserve.—Five acres granted.

A site for a reservoir.

Sites for council chambers and mechanics' institute.

That the trustees for the cemetery may be approved.

A copy of the evidence and report of the commission of enquiry into Mr. Surveyor Langford's case was applied for, but refused.

The following applications have been promised to be completed with:—

That a sum of money may be placed on the Estimates for 1860 towards the erection of a suitable post office on Ararat.

Application has also been made for a grant of land for a botanical and recreation garden, but as yet no answer has been returned.

## MISCELLANEOUS.

Ever since the month of February this council has been in almost constant communication with the office of Public Works, urging the necessity of immediately proceeding with the erection of a gaol at Ararat.

Tenders are at length advertised, and it is hoped the work will go on rapidly.

And as it is expected that so soon as a part of the gaol is completed the Judges of the Supreme Court will hold regular sittings at Ararat, the people of Ararat will thus be saved the expense and inconvenience of having to travel a distance of sixty miles to secure justice.

On the 13th January the council applied to the office of Land and Survey, requesting that the place chosen by them in conjunction with Mr. Surveyor Langford as a site for a general cemetery might be surveyed and marked off directly. The request was complied with, but the council was surprised to find that the site marked off was not the one they had chosen and requested, but a different one selected by Mr. Langford, which has proved to be auriferous, and has also a stratum of cement within a few feet of the surface that renders it unsuitable for the purposes intended.

For the last six months the subject of the best mode of furnishing the town with an abundant and permanent supply of water has engaged the attention of the council, but the scarcity of funds, together with the fact of the situation they particularly desired for a reservoir being held by a private individual under a grant from the resident warden, have prevented the accomplishment of their intentions; they hope, however, that before the approach of next winter, they will have reservoirs constructed capable of holding sufficient water to preclude the possibility of a scarcity in the driest seasons. The council have also been earnestly endeavoring to obtain an efficient fire-engine, but after making enquiries at the principal importers and makers of machinery, they find that there is not a really good fire-engine for sale in the colony.
