NOTICE.

THE attention of consignees and persons tendering Import and Export Entries for goods both dutiable and free is especially called to the necessity of specifying in such entries respectively the correct value of such goods; and they are hereby cautioned, that by failing to attend to this regulation they are liable to penalties of Twenty pounds and One hundred pounds.

The clauses of the *Customs Act*, 1857, relating thereto, are subjoined.

Clause 58.—Every importer, agent, or other person entering any goods, who shall wilfully fail to comply with the foregoing regulations, so far as they are respectively applicable to the goods so entered by him, shall forfeit and pay the sum of Twenty pounds.

No. 189.—DECEMBER 2ND, 1859.—1.

Clause 131.—If any person shall make and subscribe any false declaration, or make or sign any declaration, certificate, or other instrument required by this Act to be verified by signature only, the same being false in any particular, or if any person shall make or sign any declaration made for the consideration of the Commissioner on application presented to him, the same being untrue in any particular, or if any person required by this or any other Act, relating to the Customs, to answer questions put to him by the officers of Customs shall not truly answer such questions, or if any person shall counterfeit, falsify, or wilfully use when counterfeited or falsified any document required by this or any Act relating to the Customs, or by or under the directions of the Commissioner, or any instrument used in the transaction of any business or matter relating to the Customs, or shall fraudulently alter any document or instrument, or counterfeit the seal, signature, initials, or other mark of or used by the officers of the Customs for the verification of any such document or instrument, or for the security of goods or any other purpose in the conduct of business relating to the Customs, or under the control or management of the Commissioner or any officer of Customs, every person so offending shall for every such offence forfeit the penalty of One hundred pounds.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for the more easy Recovery of certain Debts and Demands*, it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, to direct that county courts shall be holden for the recovery of debts and demands under the said Act, and from time to time, with the advice aforesaid, to direct in what towns and places a county court shall be holden, and that the judge of each court holden under the said Act shall attend and hold such court at the place where the Governor, with the advice aforesaid, shall have directed that such court shall be holden at such times as such judge shall appoint for that purpose, so that a court shall be holden in such place once at least in such interval as the Governor, with the advice aforesaid, shall in each case direct: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present order direct that a county court shall be holden for the recovery of debts and demands under the said Act at the place and within the interval following, that is to say:—

At Taradale, once at least in every three calendar months. And the Honorable John Dennistoun Wood, Her Majesty's Attorney General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

JURY LISTS TO BE PREPARED FOR THE JURY DISTRICT OF TARADALE.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for regulating Juries*, it is enacted, that in case any assizes, or any county court or court of general sessions of the peace, shall hereafter be lawfully directed or appointed to be holden at any town other than those at which the same are now holden, the clerk of petty sessions at such court town, and the clerk of petty sessions at every other town or place within the jury district of such court town, and all justices, constables, officers of police and sheriffs, shall, within such time as the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, shall order for that occasion only, do and perform all such acts, matters, and things in and towards preparing, correcting, allowing, sending and delivering the lists of men qualified and liable to serve as aforesaid, and making out the jury books for every such jury district as are thereinbefore required to be ordinarily done at a different time or period; and all such last-mentioned jury books shall be brought into use, and the persons whose names shall be therein set down shall be liable to serve immediately after the same shall have been made out by the sheriff; and the said last mentioned books shall be used until new books shall have been prepared under the provisions thereinbefore contained: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council, bearing even date herewith, it is ordered that a county court shall be holden at Taradale, the same being a place at which a county court has not previously been holden: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present order direct that jury lists shall be prepared for the jury district of Taradale, in the manner and within the intervals hereinafter stated, that is to say:—

The clerk of petty sessions at Taradale shall issue his warrant to prepare and make out the jury lists for the jury district of Taradale on or before Saturday, the third day of December now next ensuing; such lists shall be prepared forthwith, and shall be published on Sunday, the eleventh day of December aforesaid; the court of petty sessions at Taradale aforesaid shall revise such lists on Friday, the sixteenth day of December aforesaid; such lists shall be sent to the sheriff on or before Tuesday, the twentieth day of December aforesaid; and the jury books shall be prepared and brought into use on or before Monday, the twenty-sixth day of the said month of December.

And the Honorable John Dennistoun Wood, Her Majesty's Attorney General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by the Act 18 Victoria No. 15, it is amongst other things enacted that every work proposed to be executed by any municipal council with funds raised by aid of Government, shall be the subject of a distinct and separate bye-law: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Amherst, that the sum of One hundred and ninety-one pounds and seven shillings, being the sum granted out of the public revenue, in proportion to rates collected for the first half of the year 1859, shall be expended on the following works, namely:—

MUNICIPALITY OF BUNINYONG.

BYE-LAW No. 3.—A BYE-LAW FOR THE CONDUCTING OF PUBLIC MEETINGS OF THE RATEPAYERS AND OF ELECTIONS OF MEMBERS OF COUNCIL, AND ALSO FOR REGULATING THE PROCEEDINGS AT THE ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN.

AT all public meetings of the ratepayers convened by the council or the chairman for the election of councillors or other municipal business, the chairman, or in his absence the senior councillor then present, shall preside, and in case of an equality of votes shall have the casting vote.

2. If at any election the chairman of the municipal council for the time being shall be a candidate for re-election, or shall be incapacitated from presiding at such election, either from illness, absence from the district, or any other cause, it shall be competent for the remaining members of the municipal council (being a quorum) to appoint some one of themselves to act as chairman for the purpose of carrying out such election, and it shall be lawful for the chairman, upon a vote of the council, to appoint under his hand and seal such and so many persons as to the council may seem necessary to act as deputy chairman or chairmen, poll clerk or poll clerks, and to appoint such and so many places within the municipal district as may seem to the said council necessary to be the polling place or places.

3. If at any election a poll shall be demanded in the manner and form required by the said Act, the chairman shall cause to be provided at the polling place or places a sufficient number of stalls or compartments, together with ink and pens, for the purpose of enabling the electors to mark the voting papers as hereinafter provided, in any which polling place no person other than the chairman, the town clerk or his deputy the scrutineers, or electors who shall for the time being be tendering their votes, shall be entitled to be present; and any other person than such chairman, town clerk or his deputy, scrutineers, and electors who shall for the time being be tendering their votes, who shall intrude behind the barrier, and upon being required to withdraw by the chairman shall refuse to do so, shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the provisions of this bye-law: Provided always that it shall be lawful for the chairman, town clerk or his deputy, to summon to his assistance in such compartment or room any member or members of the police force for the purpose of preserving the public peace, quelling any breach thereof that may have arisen, and for removing out of such room any person or persons who may in his opinion be obstructing the polling or wilfully violating any of the provisions of this bye-law, and upon being convicted thereof before two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the district, shall forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

4. The chairman in each polling place shall cause to be provided for the purpose of such election a locked up box, of which he shall keep the key, with a cleft or opening therein capable of receiving the voting papers, and which box shall stand in front of the chairman, and each elector shall receive from the chairman a voting paper in the form in the schedule hereunto annexed, and shall thereupon retire to a stall or compartment provided for that purpose, and there strike out the name or names of such candidates as he does not intend to vote for, and deposit the same in the ballot-box, in the presence of the chairman, town clerk or his deputy, and scrutineers; and in case such elector shall be unable to read, or be blind, he shall signify the same to the chairman, who shall thereupon

mark or strike out the names of such candidates as such elector shall designate; and no elector shall take out of such polling place any such voting paper, either before or after he has marked the same; and any person wilfully infringing any of the provisions of this clause, or obstructing the polling by any unnecessary delay in performing any act within the polling place, shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the meaning of this bye-law, and on being convicted thereof before any two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the district, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of not exceeding Twenty pounds.

5. Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint by writing under his hand, to be delivered to the chairman at any time before eight o'clock in the morning of the polling day, one scrutineer to be present on his behalf in the polling place.

6. It shall be lawful for the chairman, or for any scrutineer, to put to any person before he shall have received his voting paper, the following questions only:—

1st. What is your name and surname?

2nd. Are you of twenty-one years of age?

3rd. Are you a ratepayer on the ratepayers' roll of this municipal district of Buninyong?

4th. Have you paid all rates levied upon you, except such as shall have become payable by you within six months before this election?

5th. Have you already voted at this election? And if any person shall wilfully give a false answer to any of the questions aforesaid, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the meaning of this bye-law, and on being convicted thereof before any two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the district, shall forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Five pounds.

7. At every election it shall be the duty of the town clerk or his deputy to provide himself with the ratepayers' roll, and as each elector comes forward to demand his voting paper to see whether the name of such elector appears upon the roll as a ratepayer within the meaning of the said Act, and as each elector deposits his voting paper within the ballot-box to mark off such elector's name as having voted at such election.

8. In case the voting paper as of any person shall have been received and any other person shall afterwards demand his voting paper as of the same person, the chairman, when such person shall propose to deposit his voting paper in the ballot-box, shall refuse to allow the same to be put therein, but shall receive and keep the same apart, and at the close of the election decide whether such person has already voted or not; and for the purpose of such decision it shall be lawful for the chairman to take evidence upon oath or affirmation, and such decision shall be final and conclusive on all parties; and if it shall appear to the chairman that such person has not already voted at such election, such vote shall be added to the number already polled, but if otherwise such vote shall not be allowed.

9. At the close of the poll, or as soon after as conveniently may be, the chairman, in the presence of the scrutineers, shall count the number of votes polled for each candidate, and if on the state of the poll being announced the number of votes shall have been found to have been equal for any two or more candidates, one or more of whom, but not all, shall by the state of the poll and the number of members to be elected, be entitled to be declared elected, the chairman shall by a casting vote or votes, as the case may be, decide which of the candidates for whom the votes may be equal shall be elected, but no chairman shall be entitled to vote at any election except in the case of an equality of votes, and the chairman shall then, in the presence of the scrutineers, seal up all the voting papers given during the election, and safely preserve them amongst the records of the council.

10. That all places within which polling is conducted shall be deemed public places.

11. The chairman of the council shall be annually elected in the following manner:—At the first meeting of council after the annual election, which meeting shall be convened by the retiring chairman or the person presiding at the annual election, the senior councillor then present shall take the chair at the hour mentioned in the notice calling the meeting, provided the whole council is present, otherwise at the expiry of half an hour thereafter, and the council shall proceed by open voting on motion as usual to elect a chairman for the current year, and the councillor in whose favor the show of hands shall be shall be declared by the acting chairman to be chairman of the council for the current year, and shall take the chair accordingly.

12. If the result of voting for chairman should be that the highest number of votes is held equally by more than two councillors, then another voting shall take place for those councillors only holding such equality of votes until a majority is recorded, and the chairman shall be elected by the majority of the members of the municipal council.

13. Upon the resignation or disqualification of the chairman of the council, at the next meeting of the council thereafter the senior councillor then present shall take the chair *pro tem.*, and immediately after the confirmation of the minutes of the preceding meeting, shall proceed to the election of a chairman of

council for the residue of the municipal year, in manner prescribed by this bye-law.

14. In determining the seniority of councillors for the purpose of this bye-law, it shall be understood to mean those councillors who shall have held office for the longest period without re-election, and having the greatest number of votes when elected.

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

SANDRIDGE.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by six hundred and fifty-two householders of Macarthur ward, in the city of Melbourne, commonly called and known as Sandridge, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district under the said Act.

WILLIAM NICHOLSON.

The petitioners state, that they are householders of Sandridge, otherwise called Macarthur ward, of the city of Melbourne:

That they consider that the time has fully arrived for the severance of the ward from the city—firstly, because it is already geographically separated by the intervening municipality of Emerald Hill; secondly, on account of the inability of the corporation of Melbourne to provide for the wants and requirements of Sandridge; thirdly, because they believe that they are better able to understand their own wants and manage their own affairs than any other body can possibly understand or manage them:

That they desire to avail themselves of the means provided by law to share the benefits which have resulted therefrom to other localities, believing that thereby the welfare of Sandridge will be considerably advanced, and its moral and material prosperity greatly augmented.

They further state that the corporation of Melbourne are about to submit to the Legislature a Bill to define the boundaries of the city including Macarthur ward therein, a measure to which the petitioners are averse, as its effect would be to exclude them from the benefits resulting from local and separate government, which is essential to the full and free development of the capabilities of this important sea-port town.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Excellency would be pleased to extend the operation of the Municipalities Acts 18 Victoria Nos. 15 and 32 and 19 Victoria No. 16 to this locality, and be pleased to proclaim Sandridge a separate municipality under the style and title of 'The Sandridge Municipality'; and that the boundaries of such municipality be as follow, viz.—Commencing at the Government pier at Sandridge at high-water mark, running westerly to the junction of the River Yarra Yarra with Hobson's Bay; from the said junction up the said river at high-water mark to a point where the boundaries of the Footscray municipality strike the river on the eastern bank of the said river; thence following the boundaries of the Footscray municipality in an easterly direction to the south-east angle of the boundaries of the said municipality; thence following the said boundaries in a northerly direction to a point where the said boundaries strike the south bank of the Yarra Yarra at high-water mark; thence along the south bank of the Yarra Yarra at high-water mark to the junction of Ferrars street, Emerald Hill, with the said river; thence in a south-easterly direction along Ferrars street to the south-east side of the Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway line; thence in a south-westerly direction along the proposed line of Bay street to a point where it strikes the present boundary line of the Emerald Hill municipality; thence following the said boundary line in a south-easterly direction to the boundary post off the Sandridge road; thence following the said boundary line to the sea-beach at high-water mark; thence in a westerly direction along high-water mark to the Government pier aforesaid, the said boundaries being colored red on the plan submitted herewith.
