It having been represented to the Board of Land and Works that the Department of Public Works has experienced great inconvenience from the existence of unauthorised and unknown liabilities, frequently not reported until after the expiration of the financial year, and subsequent to the closing of the vote from which they should be paid:

The Board orders that no claim for the defrayal or reimbursement of expenditure which may hereafter be incurred upon public works and buildings without the previous sanction of the Board shall be entertained until a report and justification of the circumstances under which the work was ordered, together with a full account or an approximate estimate of the cost, shall have been forwarded to the Honorable the Commissioner of Public Works within fourteen days after the necessity for the expenditure shall have arisen.

It is also ordered that no such claims as the above which may have been incurred previous to the publication of this order will be recognised by the Board, unless they shall be reported to the Commissioner of Public Works on or before the 31st instant.

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

CARLTON.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by four hundred and fifty-six householders resident in the locality known as Carlton, being a portion of Smith ward, in the city of Melbourne, praying for the erection of such locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners represent themselves as residing in and around the portion of Smith ward north of Grattan street, North Melbourne, called Carlton, and within the area hereinafter described.

They request that the substance and prayer of their petition may be published, in order that in due time their locality may be proclaimed as the Carlton Municipality, with the following boundaries, namely:—Bounded on the south by a line running east along the centre of Grattan street; from thence along the centre of Grattan street to its intersection with Nicholson street; thence by a line running north along the centre of Nicholson street to its intersection with the centre of Reilly street; thence by a line running east along the said centre of Reilly street to its intersection with the centre of Smith street; thence by a line running north along the said centre of Smith street to its intersection with the southern side of the Heidelberg road; thence by a line running easterly along the said southern side of the said road to its junction with the west side of the Merri Creek; thence by a line running up the said creek to its intersection with the south boundary line of the Brunswick municipality; thence west along the said boundary line to its intersection with the centre of Lygon street; thence by a line running southerly down the centre of the said Lygon street; thence by the centre of the road bounding the south-east corner of the Melbourne General Cemetery to its intersection with the centre of Madeline street; thence along the centre of Madeline street to the commencing point.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

“May it therefore please your Excellency, with the advice of the Executive Council, to take the premises into your gracious consideration, and cause the advertisement of the substance and prayer of this petition to be made in the *Government Gazette* as required by statute; and in due time thereafter, if there be no counter-petition signed by a greater majority (*vis*) of the householders of Carlton, and delivered, then, in pursuance of the aforesaid statute, to proclaim the locality presently known as a portion of Smith Ward to be a municipal district, to be known by the name and style of the Carlton Municipality, or such other name as your Excellency shall adopt, all within the meaning of the said statute; or to do, order, and proclaim otherwise in the premises, as it may seem meet to your Excellency, with the advice of the Executive Council.”

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

SANDRIDGE.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by six hundred and fifty-two householders of Macarthur ward, in the city of Melbourne, commonly called and known as Sandridge, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district under the said Act.

WILLIAM NICHOLSON.

The petitioners state, that they are householders of Sandridge, otherwise called Macarthur ward, of the city of Melbourne:

That they consider that the time has fully arrived for the severance of the ward from the city—firstly, because it is already geographically separated by the intervening municipality of Emerald Hill; secondly, on account of the inability of the corporation of Melbourne to provide for the wants and require-

ments of Sandridge; thirdly, because they believe that they are better able to understand their own wants and manage their own affairs than any other body can possibly understand or manage them:

That they desire to avail themselves of the means provided by law to share the benefits which have resulted therefrom to other localities, believing that thereby the welfare of Sandridge will be considerably advanced, and its moral and material prosperity greatly augmented.

They further state that the corporation of Melbourne are about to submit to the Legislature a Bill to define the boundaries of the city including Macarthur ward therein, a measure to which the petitioners are averse, as its effect would be to exclude them from the benefits resulting from local and separate government, which is essential to the full and free development of the capabilities of this important sea-port town.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

“Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Excellency would be pleased to extend the operation of the Municipalities Acts 18 Victoria Nos. 15 and 32 and 19 Victoria No. 16 to this locality, and be pleased to proclaim Sandridge a separate municipality under the style and title of ‘The Sandridge Municipality;’ and that the boundaries of such municipality be as follow, viz:—Commencing at the Government pier at Sandridge at high-water mark, running westerly to the junction of the River Yarra Yarra with Hobson's Bay; from the said junction up the said river at high-water mark to a point where the boundaries of the Footscray municipality strike the river on the eastern bank of the said river; thence following the boundaries of the Footscray municipality in an easterly direction to the south-east angle of the boundaries of the said municipality; thence following the said boundaries in a northerly direction to a point where the said boundaries strike the south bank of the Yarra Yarra at high-water mark; thence along the south bank of the Yarra Yarra at high-water mark to the junction of Ferrars street, Emerald Hill, with the said river; thence in a south-easterly direction along Ferrars street to the south-east side of the Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway line; thence in a south-westerly direction along the proposed line of Bay street to a point where it strikes the present boundary line of the Emerald Hill municipality; thence following the said boundary line in a south-easterly direction to the boundary post off the Sandridge road; thence following the said boundary line to the sea-beach at high-water mark; thence in a westerly direction along high-water mark to the Government pier aforesaid, the said boundaries being colored red on the plan submitted herewith.

“Your petitioners humbly pray that your Excellency will be pleased, on consideration of the grounds brought forward, to grant the prayer of this petition.”

MUNICIPALITY OF AVOCA.

BYE-LAW No. 8.—TO REGULATE THE ERECTION OF SHADES, AWNINGS, ETC., AND PREVENT ANY OBSTRUCTION UPON, OVER, OR ACROSS THE PUBLIC FOOTPATHS.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the general good rule thereof: And whereas it is expedient to regulate and control the erection of shades, awnings, &c., over or across the public footpaths in High street, Avoca, so as to prevent such erections becoming obstructions or public nuisances: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Avoca, that the width of footpaths in High street, Avoca, shall be twelve feet; and any person or persons who shall erect or cause to be erected any shade, awning, or other obstruction over, upon, or across any of such footpaths without first having obtained in writing the consent of the said municipal council to such erection, shall, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the said district, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

2. And be it further ordered and directed by the authority aforesaid, that every such shade, awning, or obstruction, when such consent to the erection of the same shall have been obtained as hereinbefore directed, shall be erected with the upright posts or pillars thereof immediately at the outside of the kerbstone or other prescribed boundary of the footpaths; and that no plate, rafter, or tie of any such shade, awning, or other obstruction shall be of a less height above the surface or prescribed level of such footpaths than seven (7) feet in the clear to the underside of such rafter, plate, or tie.

3. And be it further ordered and directed that it shall be lawful for the said council to direct and require the removal of any shade, awning, or other obstruction, erected across, over, or upon any of said footpaths, except the same be erected in strict accordance with the foregoing directions, whether such shade, awning, or other obstruction, shall have been erected prior to this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, or subsequently thereto.

4. And it shall be further lawful for the said council by their officer to give notice to any owner or occupier by whom or for whom any such shade, awning, or obstruction, shall have been wholly or in part erected, to remove the same; and any such owner or occupier who shall refuse or neglect to remove any such shade or awning, or other obstruction, within forty-eight hours from the time of the service of such notice of removal, shall, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the said district, forfeit and pay for every such offence, refusal, or neglect, a sum or penalty of not exceeding Five pounds.

BYE-LAW No. 9.—TO PREVENT THE NUISANCE ARISING FROM SUFFERING HORNED AND OTHER CATTLE BEING AT LARGE ON THE STREETS OF THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the municipal council of any district is empowered to make bye-laws for the good rule thereof: Be it ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Avoca, that it shall not be law lawful for any person or persons to suffer any cow, bull, ox, or any other horned animal, or any goat or swine belonging to him, her, or them, or under his, her, or their care, to be at large or to wander about in any street within the municipal district aforesaid, according to the boundaries hereinafter set forth, whether the same be public property or not, and any person so offending shall upon conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the said district, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding Ten pounds sterling. The boundaries hereinbefore referred to shall be North street on the north, Bury street on the south, Rutherford street on the east, and the Avoca River on the west. This bye-law to have effect on receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor.

BYE-LAW No. 10.—FOR THE PROTECTION OF THE STREETS, FOOTPATHS AND ROADS, WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF AVOCA.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to pass or make bye-laws for the general good thereof: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Avoca, that it shall not be lawful for any person or persons to remove the surface soil, or dig, or make any hole, or sink any shaft, for any purpose whatsoever, upon any of the streets, footpaths, or roads, within the boundaries of said municipal district, whether the same be formed or not, except with and by consent of said council: And any person or persons committing either of these acts or offences without the consent of the council, shall, upon conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the district, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Twenty pounds sterling. This bye-law to have effect on receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor.

BYE-LAW No. 11.—FOR THE BETTER PREVENTION OF ACCIDENTS BY FIRE.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the general good rule thereof: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Avoca, that it shall not be lawful for any roof, or other exterior covering of canvas, duck, drill, or calico, or any such material, to be placed upon or on the outside of any building to be erected within the boundaries as hereinafter set forth and specially declared; nor shall it be lawful for any such now in use to be repaired or renewed with like material, unless such building or erection shall stand and be at least twenty clear feet apart from any dwelling-house, store, or other building whatsoever, and not nearer the frontage to High street, Avoca, than forty clear feet.

2. That no person shall keep any stacks, or stacks of hay, corn, or straw, of any description, on premises within the boundaries hereinbefore referred to, and to be hereinafter set forth, unless the same shall be under shed or building, of which no exterior part or covering shall be of canvas, calico, or other textile fabric whatever.

3. That no person shall erect or put up any bush or brush fence either as a side or partition fence, or for any other purpose, within the said limits.

No. 193.—DECEMBER 20TH, 1859.—2.

4. That it shall be lawful for any officer authorised by the council, upon complaint of any ratepayer, in writing, that any chimney, flue or vent, is constructed of inflammable material, or that the top of such chimney, flue or vent, is not sufficiently elevated or removed from any inflammable material of which the roof or other portion of the building, or any adjoining building is constructed, or that any such chimney, flue or vent, is not so constructed as to carry off the smoke, so that it becomes a nuisance or dangerous to the neighbors, or if it shall appear to the council to be at any time necessary, their duly appointed or authorised officer shall and may, at any time, proceed to inspect such chimney, flue or vent; and if he shall find any proper ground of complaint or reasonable cause of danger or nuisance he shall forthwith serve a notice upon the owner or occupier of such premises, calling on him or her to alter such chimney, flue or vent, so as to remedy and abate any such danger or nuisance; and no person hereafter shall alter or repair, or erect any chimney, vent or flue, with or of any dangerous or inflammable materials, or any other substance than brick, stone, iron, or earthwork of sufficient solidity and proper construction.

5. That in order the better and more efficiently to guard against accidents by fire, no person shall incautiously, carelessly, or improperly use or cause or permit or suffer to be used, or make, place or deposit any fire or combustible substances whatsoever in or upon any road, street, footway, lane, court, alley, or thoroughfare, or open or public place in or near any building, dwelling-house, or place of business, or within or upon any yard, whether fenced or enclosed or not.

6. And all the provisions of this bye-law shall henceforth extend and take effect within the following boundaries, that is to say, on all allotments having a frontage to High street, Avoca.

7. Any person offending against any provision of this bye-law, or neglecting or refusing to attend to or comply with any notice given as herein directed by said council, or their duly appointed officer, shall on conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace acting for the district, forfeit and pay a sum of money not exceeding Twenty pounds sterling. This bye-law to have effect on receiving His Excellency's the Governor's assent.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the good rule thereof: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Avoca, that no person shall deposit, place, or put any night soil, manure, offal, or other offensive matter or refuse whatsoever, upon any unenclosed land, or upon any street, footpath, road, or way, within the municipality, except in some public depot appointed as hereinafter directed to be the receptacle of such night soil, manure, offal, or other offensive matter; and any person so offending shall for each offence, on being convicted thereof before two or more justices of the peace acting for the district, forfeit and pay a sum of money not exceeding Ten pounds: And be it further ordered and enacted, that an announcement in the *Government Gazette*, and in three successive numbers of any newspaper circulating in the district, and duly certified by the town clerk, with the sanction of His Excellency the Governor, shall be deemed an appointment of such public depot.

notice in writing to the owner or occupier of any house, building or tent, or of any land where the fence encroaches as aforesaid, to order the removal of such house, building, tent, or fence within fourteen days from the date thereof. And be it further ordered and enacted as aforesaid, that any person failing, or neglecting, or refusing to comply with the provisions of this bye-law on the expiration of the term abovenamed in such notice, upon proof of such notice having been served personally or left on the premises of such owner or occupier, as aforesaid, shall be liable and subject to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds for the first offence, and a sum not exceeding Fifty pounds for any second offence, and for any succeeding offence against the bye-law a sum not exceeding Fifty pounds, such penalty or penalties to be recovered and recoverable by the said council, on conviction before any two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the district.

The provisions and conditions of this bye-law to refer to and include all buildings, fences, tents, &c., erected on any of the surveyed lines of streets within the said municipal district prior to the passing of this bye-law.

(Under the 18th Victoria No. 15.)

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings * * * the prevention and extinguishing of fires, the suppression of nuisances * * * and for the general good rule and government of such municipal district: And whereas it is expedient to prevent the erection of dwellings within such municipality wholly or partly composed of fibrous materials, which erections are specially liable to be destroyed by fire, and to cause thereby the destruction of human life and of property in their vicinity: Be it therefore hereby enacted, that from and after the date hereof no person shall erect or cause to be erected in the municipality of East Collingwood any tent or any building or habitation consisting wholly or partly of cotton, linen, wool, or other fibrous materials, within twenty feet of any dwelling-house, shop, stable, out-houses, or other buildings in the said municipality; and any person having erected or caused to be erected therein prior to the date hereof any such structures or buildings aforesaid at a less distance than twenty feet from any other building, shall, within fourteen days' notice to that effect from the town clerk, remove such tents or substitute for the fibrous materials in such buildings or structures aforesaid wood, iron, zinc, tin, brick, or stone to complete the same.

Any one offending against any of the provisions of this bye-law shall, upon conviction, pay a fine for every such offence not exceeding Ten pounds.

BYE-LAW No. 26.—TO ENFORCE UNIFORMITY ON THE INNER SIDE OF FOOTWAYS OF PUBLIC STREETS AND THOROUGHFARES OF THE MUNICIPALITY, SEVERALLY OR JOINTLY LAID OUT, SURVEYED, OR PROCLAIMED, UPON THE ERECTING BUILDINGS, POSTS, FENCES, OR OTHER ENCLOSURES ON THE INNER OR BOUNDARY LINE OF SUCH FOOTWAYS OR STREETS, AND FOR THE REMOVAL OF ANY SUCH ENCROACHMENTS WITHIN THE BOUNDARY LINES OF SUCH STREETS TO WHICH THIS BYE-LAW MAY APPLY.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings * * * and to have the care and management of the roads, public streets, paths, wharves, jetties, piers, and public thoroughfares: And whereas it is expedient to preserve the entire width of the footways of the public streets and thoroughfares of the municipality of East Collingwood free from encroachments, and the buildings, post fences on the inner or boundary line of such footways uniform therewith: Be it therefore hereby enacted, from and after the date hereof, that no person shall commence or authorise any one to begin to erect any description of building, or to erect posts, or enclose or fence off land, within the boundary line of the inner side of the footway of any public street or thoroughfare severally or jointly laid out, surveyed, or proclaimed, without first giving two clear days' notice of such intention to the town clerk, or his deputy, of the municipality of East Collingwood, in the form appended hereunto marked Schedule A., or shall proceed to erect such building, posts, enclosure or fence, on the inner side of such footway laid out, surveyed, or proclaimed, until inspected by the municipal surveyor or other authorised officer of the municipal council aforesaid, in the form hereunto appended marked B.; and any person who may have erected any building, post, fence, or other enclosure, within the boundary line of any proclaimed street within the municipality since the proclamation thereof, shall remove the same forthwith, after fourteen days' notice to that effect to the occupier or owner from the town

clerk or other authorised officer of the municipal council; and any one offending against any of the provisions of this bye-law shall, upon conviction, pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

The following fees specified in the schedule marked C., hereunto appended, shall be paid for forms of notice, certificates of inspection from the municipal surveyor, the proceeds therefrom to be paid to the town clerk as compensation to him for entering, issuing, and recording such documents.

BYE-LAW NO. 27.—TO PROVIDE FOR THE PUBLICATION OF FARES OF CABS, OMNIBUSES, AND OTHER VEHICLES LICENSED TO CONVEY PASSENGERS, AND FOR THE ARRANGEMENT OF SUCH CONVEYANCES ON THE PUBLIC CARRIAGE STANDS.

(Under the 18th Victoria No. 15.)

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings * * * the regulation and licensing of porters, public carriers, criers, water drawers, and public vehicles. And whereas it is expedient that the ratepayers of the municipality and other should be enabled before using licensed vehicles for the conveyance of passengers, to ascertain the fare or charge to be paid for the use of the same, and also that suitable provision should be made for public convenience by the arrangement of the vehicles aforesaid on such public carriage stands as the municipal council of East Collingwood may from time to time, after seven clear days' notice to that effect in a Melbourne and local newspaper, order or appoint: Be it therefore enacted, that from and after the date hereof—

1. The owner or driver of every hackney carriage, car, cab, omnibus, or vehicle licensed to ply for hire within the municipality of East Collingwood, shall with oil paint cause to be painted, and exhibit on such vehicle, on such part of the same and in such manner as shall be directed by the inspector of hackney carriages, who shall be the inspector of health, &c., for the time being, the name of the place or places to and from which such vehicle plies, and the amount of fare charged for each passenger carried thereby; and in the event of any greater fare being charged for any journey commenced at any particular period or periods of the day than at any other period or periods than the amount of such greater as well as of such lesser fare, together with the hours of the day between which each of the said fares respectively is to be charged, and the words and figures so painted, shall be kept constantly conspicuous and legible during the whole time that such vehicle shall ply for hire; and no alteration shall be made in such fares until and unless the

owner of such vehicle shall previously deposit with the town clerk, in his office, a statement in writing of the altered fare or fares which it shall be the intention of such owner to charge, and shall alter and re-paint in oil paint upon such vehicle such altered fare or fares as specified in such statement so deposited as aforesaid.

2. The driver of every vehicle plying for hire on any stand shall be bound, in consideration of the fare for the full number of passengers which his vehicle shall be capable of carrying, by law to proceed to any place the name of which shall be painted on his vehicle.

3. The vehicle plying for hire upon the several public carriage stands appointed, or which shall from time to time hereafter be appointed by the municipal council of East Collingwood (save where such stand shall be along the frontage of some public reserve), shall be arranged by the drivers thereof in manner following, that is to say:—The carriages shall draw up along the centre of the street or roadway in the order of their arrival on the stand, and the first carriage only shall be permitted to leave the rank in the centre of the street or roadway, and draw up at the side thereof until its fare shall be made up, when it shall proceed on its journey, and the carriage next in order on the rank shall proceed to take its place, and it and the carriages following it on the stand shall succeed in similar order: Provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent any person from calling any particular vehicle off the stand, but the driver of such omnibus shall forthwith proceed with the same on its journey without waiting for other passengers.

4. Whenever any stand shall have been appointed for carriages plying to several places, the first carriage on the stand for each of such places shall be permitted to draw up at the side of the street or roadway, and the several other carriages for the same place shall follow it from the rank in the order hereinbefore described: Provided that no two carriages so drawn up at the same side of the street or roadway shall be nearer to each other than fifty yards at the least.

5. Every owner, driver, conductor, or other person attendant on any licensed carriage, whilst his carriage shall be in the rank, shall remain with it in the centre of the street unless specially excepted; and no owner, driver, or conductor shall, whilst plying on any stand, create any noise or disturbance by vociferating names of places or otherwise. When required by a passenger he shall produce his license and a copy of the bye-laws of the council of the city of Melbourne relating to licensed carriages.

6. For every offence against any provision of this bye-law the offender shall, upon conviction of the same before any one or more of the justices of the peace for the said municipality or for the territory of Victoria, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

7. The word vehicle where used in this bye-law shall be understood to mean every omnibus, stage carriage, car, or other carriage conveying passengers at separate and distinct fares between places in East Collingwood to the city of Melbourne, and within eight miles of the corporate limits thereof, and not impelled otherwise than by animal power.

8. The provisions of bye-law No. 34 of the council of the city of Melbourne, intituled, "A bye-law to alter and amend the bye-laws for licensing and regulating hackney carriages and the owners and drivers thereof, plying for hire within the city of Melbourne and within the distance of eight miles from the corporate limits of the city," and passed by the said council on the 24th day of September, 1855, shall, as far as the said provisions apply to the municipality of East Collingwood, be deemed to be incorporated in this bye-law.

9. The schedule of public carriage stands hereunto appended shall be the only stands to be so used until otherwise determined by the municipal council of East Collingwood, by public notice as prescribed herein.

BYE-LAW No. 17.—FOR IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING AND SIXPENCE IN THE POUND ON AN ASSESSMENT OF ALL PROPERTY IN HOUSES AND LAND IN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF MALDON. FOR THE CURRENT YEAR ENDING 10TH SEPTEMBER, 1860.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to impose a rate on all houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district according to the fair average annual value thereof, such rate not to exceed Two shillings in the pound of such value: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Maldon, that a rate for the current year of One shilling and sixpence in the pound on the annual value of all property in houses and land within the limits of the said municipal district be imposed and levied, and be due and payable in two equal sums (except such annual rate shall not in any case exceed ten shillings, then and in every such case the rate shall be collected in one whole sum), the first on the 30th day of November instant, and the second on the 30th day of May, 1860.

BYE-LAW No. 15.—EMPOWERING THE COUNCIL TO AWARD CERTAIN AMOUNTS TO CARTERS FIRST ARRIVING WITH LOADS OF WATER AT ANY FIRE WHICH MAY OCCUR IN THE MUNICIPALITY.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered, under clause No. 26, to make bye-laws for the general good rule and government of such municipal district; and whereas great destruction of property has occurred at fires through the absence of a prompt supply of water for extinguishing the same, it has been found necessary, in order to induce water drawers to use quick despatch in their attendance at fires, to offer rewards to the same: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Newtown and Chilwell, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the rewards for the quick attendance of water drawers at fires shall be according to the following scale:—

MUNICIPALITY OF WILLIAMSTOWN.
BYE-LAW No. 44.—TO REGULATE THE LANDING OF GOODS ON THE STEVEDORE STREET WHARF, AND TO PROHIBIT THE WHARF FROM BEING DAMAGED.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act shall have the care of all wharves lying within such municipal district, and it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make such bye-laws for carrying out these objects as shall to each such council seem fit: And whereas it is expedient to make a bye-law for regulating the landing of goods on, and for the better protection of the wharf extending off the end of Stevedore street, and to prohibit damage that might arise to the same from sundry causes, as hereinafter mentioned: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the authority aforesaid, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, as required by the provisions of the said Act—

1. That no timber, stones, coals, firewood, or any other article landed on the said wharf, shall be allowed to remain thereon or on the approach thereto for a longer period than twenty-four hours; and any person neglecting or refusing to remove the same when directed to do so by any officer of the council appointed for that purpose, shall, on conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the district, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Twenty pounds.

2. That all goods or materials landed on the wharf shall be stacked on the north side thereof, and shall not be allowed to occupy more than half the width of the wharf; and any person infringing this law, or not removing the materials or goods as aforesaid from off the said wharf and the approach thereto within twelve hours after having been directed so to do by any officer as aforesaid, shall on conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the district, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Twenty pounds.

3. That any master or person in charge of a vessel refusing to unmoor or haul off from the wharf when directed so to do by

any officer as aforesaid, shall, on conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the district, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Ten pounds.

4. Should any owner or master of any vessel, or any other person, cause any damage to be done to the wharf by allowing his vessel to lay alongside thereof, or otherwise, such person shall at his own expense repair the same; and should any such owner or master, or other person, neglect or refuse to repair the same, he, she, or they shall for every such offence, on conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the district, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Fifty pounds.
