PENTRIDGE PENAL ESTABLISHMENT.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders*, it was amongst other things enacted, that all buildings, erections, houses, and premises thereafter to be erected, built, purchased, enlarged, or maintained at the public expense, as and for public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments within the said colony, which should from time to time be proclaimed by the Lieutenant Governor of the said colony, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, as such public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, or penal establishments, should, from and after the publication of such notice, be severally deemed and taken to be the public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments respectively of the place or district where the same are or shall be situated within the said colony, and should be subject to the several provisions made for the regulation, discipline, management, and care of the public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments already erected in the said colony, and of the prisoners confined within the same: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the then Lieutenant Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the twentieth day of April, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, it was declared that the buildings and premises called and known as "The Pentridge Stockade," with the reserve attached thereto, and in the said Proclamation defined, should be a House of Correction: And whereas divers buildings and premises have been since constructed and added thereto, and it is expedient to proclaim the whole of the said buildings and premises in accordance with the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation declare that the buildings and premises called and known as "The Penal Establishment at Pentridge," in the parish of Jika Jika, in the county of Bourke, situated, erected, and built upon the reserve of land hereinafter described, and such reserve of land as aforesaid, comprising about one hundred and forty-three acres, shall be and be deemed and taken to be a Public Gaol, House of Correction, and Penal Establishment of and for the colony of Victoria, within the meaning and subject to the provisions of the said Act.

Description of the land reserved:—Commencing at a point one chain and fifty links east from the north-western angle of the village reserve of Pentridge; thence south twenty chains and fifty links; thence east four chains; thence south to Urquhart street; thence east by the northern boundary of that street thirty-nine chains, more or less; thence by a line bearing north sixty-one degrees and twenty-four minutes east to the Merri Creek; thence by that creek to a point on the northern boundary of the aforesaid village reserve of Pentridge eleven chains and twenty-two links, more or less, due east from the commencing point; and thence west by the said northern boundary to the said commencing point; reserving a road one chain wide to be made by the Penal Department along or near the right bank of the Merri Creek from Sydney street eastward to the road leading from the Merri Creek past Mr. Watts's cottage towards Preston.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this eleventh day of April, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and in the twenty-second year of Her Majesty's Reign.

RULES OF THE DENOMINATIONAL SCHOOL BOARD.

HIS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has approved of the subjoined Rules made by the Denominational School Board.

GENERAL RULES.

I. The administration of the Board will be confined to matters affecting the temporal regulation and secular efficiency of schools; and the assistance given to schools by the Board will be appropriated to schools in connection with one or more religious bodies; but the Board will not in any way interfere with the religious instruction given to scholars.

II. The conditions of aid will be—

1st. That all schools receiving aid shall be subject to inspection, in so far as temporal regulation and secular instruction are concerned.

2nd. That they shall be subject to all general regulations adopted by the Board, and sanctioned by the Governor in Council, and to such directions as shall be necessary for carrying such general regulations into effect.

3rd. That children attending a school connected with a different denomination from that to which they themselves belong, shall in no case be required to join in, or be present at, any religious exercise, catechism, prayer or lesson, contrary to the expressed wishes of their parents or guardians.

4th. That schools shall be attended by a sufficient number of scholars, according to the rules of the Board; and that suitable instruction shall be given therein by teachers approved of by the Board, with regard to their literary qualifications.

5th. That such records shall be kept in schools, and such returns and reports made to the Board, from time to time, as it may deem necessary to show their state of efficiency.

6th. That an adequate proportion shall in each case be raised from local sources by school fees or otherwise, to meet the amount paid in salaries to teachers of schools, over and above any charges incurred for school cleaning and maintenance of buildings.

The Board will require, as a general rule, that an addition of one-half the amount paid by the Board in ordinary salaries to teachers in any school shall be provided locally; and in the case of schools in populous places, a larger proportion, not exceeding an amount equal to that paid by the Board, may be required. The Board will give notice of the proportion considered necessary according to the circumstances of each case.

7th. That suitable accommodation for scholars shall have been provided, with such furniture and apparatus as are necessary for the efficient conduct of a school.

SALARIES OF TEACHERS.

III. The amounts payable to schools in salaries to teachers will be fixed for six months or more at a time, according to the ascertained attendance and efficiency of the school for a previous half year, or for a longer period. In special cases, such as the establishment of new schools, such an amount will be appropriated as may appear necessary under the circumstances. Notice will be forwarded to each school of the amount appropriated to its use for ordinary salaries for a given period of time.

IV. In appropriating such amounts, the Board will not provide for a sewing mistress unless there has been an average attendance of thirty scholars; nor for a male or female assistant, unless there has been an average attendance of sixty scholars; nor for a second assistant unless there has been an average attendance of one hundred scholars. But pupil teachers can be appointed in any school on the recommendation of inspectors.

V. The Board will provide ordinary salaries at the following rates:—

For a qualified master	£100 per annum.
Male assistant	90 "
Mistress	80 "
Female assistant	60 "

For a sewing mistress, £30 per annum, or £40 if employed for the whole day.

Assistants will be entitled to receive a proportion of the school fees, which shall in no case be less than £10 per annum.

VI. Augmentations of salary will be paid to teachers inclusive of assistants, on classification, as follows:—

To teachers in the first division of competency	£20 per annum,
" " fourth class for honors	... 40 "
" " third	... 60 "
" " second	... 80 "
" " first	... 100 "

subject to the rules for classification. Such amounts will not be included in the amounts provided for each school according to previous attendance.

VII. With a view to encourage practical teachers, who may be under a disadvantage in examinations, the Board may award special allowances of £20 per annum to teachers who shall have conducted schools with great efficiency, for a period of not less than three years in this colony.

House allowances will not be payable after the 30th June 1859.

VIII. No allowances will be made for travelling expenses, or for any purpose not expressly provided for in these rules.

IX. The sums paid to the Board for salaries will be paid to the teachers to whom such salaries are due, or to their order, but the Board will in no case make partial payments on account of teachers out of their salaries.

APPOINTMENT OF TEACHERS.

X. Teachers will be appointed by the managers of each school according to the constitution thereof, and may be dismissed by such managers; but the Board will not recognise the appointment of teachers (other than sewing mistresses) unless written agreements are entered into between them and the managers at the time of appointment. Teachers in such agreements must engage to conform to all regulations for the time being of the Denominational School Board, and duplicates of such agreements must be sent in, or the Board will not authorise the payment of salaries.

XI. The Board will not recognise the appointment of any assistant or additional teacher in any school, unless the managers shall have obtained the written authority of the Board to make such an appointment.

SCHOOL FEES.

XII. The rate of school fees will be regulated by local managers, but is not to exceed 8s. a month, or 2s. a week, unless with the special sanction of the Board; nor is it to be less than 3s. a month, or 9d. a week, for any single scholar. Where there are several children of one family with small means, and in infant schools, the rate may be further reduced to 6d. by authority of the local managers.

XIII. School fees should in every case be paid in advance, and amounts not paid at the end of the quarter will not be taken into account in considering the proportions which local payments may bear to the amounts appropriated by the Board for schools.*

XIV. Orphans and children whose parents are really destitute of sufficient means can be educated gratuitously; but in every case a certificate must be furnished by the local managers that such children are entitled to gratuitous instruction; and such certificate must be produced by the teacher, if called for by an inspector of the Board.

XV. The whole of the receipts of any school, whether resulting from grants from the Board or from school fees, must be expended on the school for which they have been granted or received; and accounts of such receipts and expenditure must be kept in the school for inspection, and furnished to the Board when required.

EXAMINATION AND CLASSIFICATION.

XVI. Teachers in charge of schools previous to 1st October, 1857, have been authorised to hold their situations without examination, but all teachers receiving salaries from the Board are liable to be summoned to examination by order of the Board, if reported by the inspector of the district to be incompetent for the right discharge of their duties.

XVII. Teachers not exempt must, within three months from their appointment, submit to an examination, and obtain a certificate of competency, or they will not be recognised by the Board. Credit will be given for certificates of merit from Her Majesty's Inspectors in England, Scotland, and Ireland, or from similar competent authorities, according to the value assigned to them by the Board. Teachers passed as competent will be divided according to their competency and standing into first and second divisions.

XVIII. Examinations for honors will be open to all teachers who have received certificates of competency from the Board, or who have been recognised by them as competent; but those only who have been admitted to the first division will be considered competent for this purpose (after the first general examination has taken place). Augmentations of salary will be paid on classification according to Rule VI.

XIX. Certificates of merit from Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools in Great Britain and Ireland, or from such competent authorities as the Board may direct, will entitle their holders to such a class as the Board may consider equivalent, taking all the circumstances into account; but teachers claiming this privilege must have taught a public school in this colony for at least six months, and must produce a good report from their inspector for that period.

XX. In order to encourage practical efficiency in teachers, the Board will require that a teacher shall have taught a public school under inspection in this colony, or in Great Britain or Ireland, and shall have received a good report from his inspector for at least one year before he can be admitted to the 4th class; for two years before he can be admitted to the 3rd class; for three years before he can be admitted to the 2nd class; and for four years before he can be admitted to the 1st class.

XXI. The programme of subjects for examination will be found in Appendix A., but the Board may add such subjects as it may think fit from time to time, and will give credit in marks for proficiency in vocal music and drawing, as taught in Denominational Schools.

Teachers under examination who shall make a clandestine use of books or papers, will be deprived for such time and to such an extent as the Board may think fit, of salaries and augmentations.

* See clause 6, Rule II.

Examinations for competency will be conducted by the Inspectors of the Board; but examinations for honors will be conducted by a special board of examiners appointed for the purpose.

The rules affecting pupil teachers will be found in Appendix B.

APPLICATION FOR AID TO SCHOOLS.

XXII. The Board for the future will not undertake to assist in the erection of school buildings, but will reserve any funds which it may have available for the purpose of assisting schools in special cases, and for encouraging the introduction into schools of suitable apparatus, by making grants-in-aid to an amount not exceeding half the cost.

XXIII. The Board will, in special cases, make grants towards the payment of rent for school buildings to an amount not exceeding one-half the rent locally subscribed, but the premises will be subjected to inspection and the approval of the Board.

XXIV. All applications for aid in the first establishment of schools by salaries or otherwise, must be forwarded in writing to the Board by the managers or promoters of the school, with the recommendation of the head of the denomination or denominations with which the school may be connected. Such applications must be accompanied with a statement of children attending or engaged to attend the school, stating the age, sex, and denomination to which they belong, with such other particulars as the Board may require. The Board, however, will not engage to afford assistance to any new school without obtaining the report of an inspector on all the circumstances of the case.

XXV. When the inhabitants of a locality are desirous of combining for the education of their children on a basis which shall not exclude religious teaching, they can do so by presenting the school to the Board as being connected with two or more denominations, provided that the consent in writing of the heads of such denominations is obtained.

MISCELLANEOUS.

XXVI. Every school assisted by the Board must be open for instruction for five days in each week, and for five hours on each school day, except on public and church holidays and during vacations, which must not exceed in all thirty days during the year.

XXVII. The general course of instruction will embrace infant training, reading, writing, arithmetic, geography, grammar, history, and needlework, with singing and drawing, when such instruction can be procured. The Board will also encourage the introduction of mathematics, languages and natural philosophy, in schools of a higher grade, and may authorize a higher rate of fees in such schools as special cases.

XXVIII. The Board will expect local managers to visit schools as frequently as possible, and to record their visits, with remarks, on the school roll books. Roll books or sheets are to be kept in the school without fail, and certified copies are to be sent to the office with all remarks of visitors or inspectors which may have been made on the originals. A report on the local examination must be sent in at the end of every half year, with such particulars and in such forms as the Board may require.

XXIX. The Board will import the books and maps published by the Commissioners of National Education in Ireland. The books will be supplied at cost price, on requisition, for the sole use of schools connected with the Board. Maps will be issued in like manner, at half price.

XXX. Managers of schools may require the scholars to pay for the books or materials furnished to them, at prices not higher than those charged by the Board.

XXXI. Evening schools will be subject to inspection, and may receive assistance on the recommendation of an inspector, by the payment of a sum not exceeding sixpence per week, for every scholar actually attending such evening schools, for not less than five hours in each week, on the production of similar returns to those required from day schools. They will be required to be under the same management as the day schools with which they are connected.

XXXII. Aid may be given to boarding and industrial schools, *Firstly*, by the payment of a moiety of the rent paid for the use of suitable premises, or land, attached to such schools.

Secondly, By allowances to boarders at a rate not exceeding £10 per annum, to be paid *only on account of those boarders who shall be furnished by the managers of the school with certificates to the effect that their parents or guardians are not in a position to pay the full amount charged for their board, and that their residence is beyond the reach of any public day school.* Such certificates must, in every case, be countersigned by a justice of the peace. The amount charged for such boarders must, in no case, exceed £35 per annum.

Actual orphans and children of the Aborigines may be paid for by the Board at the rate of £20 per annum, on special application with similar certificates.

The fees paid on account of instruction in the day school are in every case to be kept separate.

XXXIII. The accounts of schools must show distinctly their income and expenditure as day, boarding, or industrial schools—and all payments will be made separately by the Board on account of instruction, boarding, and industrial training.

XXXIV. With reference to all payments by the Board it is clearly to be understood that these rules are restricted in their application by the amount of funds placed at the disposal of the Board, and by the way in which such funds shall be appropriated by the Legislature.

XXXV. All former rules and regulations issued previous to this date are hereby repealed.

The Board will not alter or add to these rules, unless with the consent of the Governor in Council, and only after three months notice published in the *Government Gazette*.

APPENDIX B.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS AS TO THE APPOINTMENT, EXAMINATION, CLASSIFICATION, AND SALARIES OF PUPIL TEACHERS.

I. The appointment of pupil teachers rests with the managers of the schools.

II. The Denominational School Board will not grant salaries to pupil teachers unless the inspector of the district can report—

- (1.) That the masters or mistresses of the schools applying for such salary are competent to carry the pupil teachers through the course of instruction provided for them; or if not at once fully qualified, that they may be fairly expected, and that they express their willingness to endeavor to become qualified to pass an examination every year, on such subjects as the pupil teachers under their charge may be expected to be examined in, at the end of the year next ensuing.
- (2.) That the school itself exhibits a tolerable degree of efficiency, discipline, and arrangement; has an average attendance of at least thirty-five, and is properly supplied with books and apparatus.

It will also be required that suitable school buildings shall have been provided.

- (3.) That the candidates are fit to be placed in the fifth class, hereafter to be described, of sound and healthy constitution, and free from any physical defect likely to impair their efficiency as teachers.

III. Pupil teachers will be divided into five classes, hereafter to be described, according to their proficiency.

IV. A general examination will be held of all pupil teachers at the end of every year, both by means of papers and orally, which all pupil teachers may be required to attend under pain of forfeiting their salaries. At this they will be classed for the ensuing year; and pupil teachers may, at the request of the teachers under whom they are, and with the approval of the inspector of the district in which their schools are situated, be examined and removed to a higher class at any time intervening between any two annual examinations.

V. Every pupil teacher will be expected to advance at least one class at each annual examination, and those who undergo two annual examinations without promotion will forfeit their salaries altogether.

VI. Pupil teachers will be paid at the following rates:—

Salaries to pupil teachers will be included in the amounts actually appropriated by the Board for the maintenance of schools.

VII. (1.) A bonus of £10 will be given to the teachers for every pupil teacher who shall receive promotion.

- (2.) But no bonus will be given unless promotion takes place before the expiration of fifteen months from the appointment, or last promotion, of a pupil teacher.
- (3.) Where pupil teachers have been under more than one teacher, the amount of bonus will be divided in proportion to the periods of instruction, and teachers who have given instruction for less than nine months may be paid in proportion to the time given on the recommendation of the inspector of their district.

VIII. Teachers will be required to give six hours instruction to their pupil teachers in each week out of school hours.

The following are the subjects which will be required to be known by the candidates for admission to the several classes respectively:—

FOR THE FIFTH OR LOWEST CLASS.

Reading.—To read fluently the Irish Society's Third Book, or some book equivalent to it.

Writing and composition.—To write out neatly in small hand, with correct spelling, any passage dictated from the Third Book, or its equivalent.

Grammar.—To point out the parts of speech in a simple sentence.

Geography.—To have a knowledge of the elements of geography, and the outlines of the map of the world.

Arithmetic.—To write from dictation sums in the first four rules of arithmetic, simple and compound, and work them correctly, and to know the tables of weight and measures.

Needlework for girls.—To sew neatly, and to knit.

FOR THE FOURTH CLASS

Reading.—To read the Irish Society's Fourth Book, or some book equivalent to it, with ease, fluency, and proper tone and emphasis, and be acquainted with the subjects contained in the Third Book, except the stories, fables, and poetry.

Writing and composition.—To write from dictation, with correct spelling and proper punctuation, any passage from the Fourth Book of Lessons, or its equivalent.

Grammar.—To know the substance of the large print of Sullivan's English Grammar, to page 98.

Geography.—The geography of Australia.

Arithmetic.—Arithmetic, to simple proportion and practice, with the elements of mental arithmetic.

Art of teaching.—To exhibit ability to give a class a reading lesson, and conduct it through exercises necessary for preserving order.

Needlework.—Girls to instruct the younger ones in sewing and knitting.

FOR THE THIRD CLASS.

Reading.—To read with fluency and proper emphasis; to know the subjects of the Irish Society's Fourth Book of Lessons.

Writing and composition.—To write from memory the substance of a narrative read to them, with correct spelling and punctuation.

Grammar.—To know the substance of all Sullivan's Grammar to the end of etymology, and the elements of parsing.

Geography.—The geography of Europe, and the first four chapters of Sullivan's Geography Generalised.

Arithmetic.—Arithmetic, to vulgar fractions, decimals, and interest (girls only to comprehend practice), and mental arithmetic.

Art of teaching.—To teach a class grammar and arithmetic, and keep the class in attention, order, and activity.

Needlework.—Girls to exhibit increased skill in needlework.

FOR THE SECOND CLASS.

Reading.—To read with ease and expression either prose or poetry; to know the first three sections of the Fifth Book.

Writing and composition.—To write from memory the substance of any easy essay previously read to them.

Grammar.—To have a good knowledge of syntax.

Geography.—The geography of the rest of the world, and the first fourteen chapters of Sullivan's Geography Generalised.

Arithmetic.—All the subjects contained in the Irish Society's small work on arithmetic (girls as far as simple interest), with the elements of bookkeeping.

Art of teaching.—To teach a class grammar, geography, and arithmetic, on slates, and to manage it properly.

Geometry.—The first book of Euclid.

Algebra.—Algebra to division.

Needlework.—Girls to exhibit some skill in fancy work, and to do plain work well.

FOR THE FIRST CLASS.

Writing and composition.—To write a short essay on some easy subject.

Geography.—A full general knowledge of geography, and the whole of Sullivan's Geography Generalised.

Grammar.—A knowledge of grammatical analysis, and the derivation of words.

Arithmetic.—A full knowledge of arithmetic and bookkeeping. Girls to decimals and fractions.

Algebra.—Algebra to simple equations, and problems in them.

Geometry.—The two first books of Euclid.

Mensuration.—The rules of measuring plane surfaces.

Natural Philosophy.—Sections III., IV., V. of the Irish Society's Fifth Book of Lessons.

Art of teaching.—To give a gallery lesson, or a lesson to two or three classes combined, and to have a good knowledge of the organization and management of a school.

History.—British History.

Needlework.—Girls to be able to cut out and make up plain articles of female apparel, and to teach needlework to others.

Girls to be acquainted with the principles of domestic economy, as laid down in the Irish Society's Sixth Book.

Note.—The subjects laid down for the several classes are the minimum which will be required for admission into each class respectively.

It is not intended to limit the annual advance of pupil teachers to one class only. They will at each annual examination be placed in whatever class they may be considered fit for.

FITZ ROY PETITION FOR EXTENSION.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by two hundred and ninety-nine inhabitants of the municipal district of Fitz Roy, in the county of Bourke, praying for the annexation of a contiguous locality to the said municipal district.

The petitioners state that they are desirous that the northern boundary of the municipal district should be extended so as to include the triangular portion of land embraced by the Heidelberg road, Smith street, and Reilly street.

They are of opinion that the portion of the Heidelberg road extending from the north end of Brunswick street to the north end of Smith street is the natural boundary of the district on the north, inasmuch as all the leading streets east of Brunswick street are continued to and terminate thereon. But the present boundary line extending along Reilly street deprives the municipal authorities of the power to construct, repair, or control the continuations of those streets that extend in a northerly direction towards the Heidelberg road, and hence these continuations of the leading thoroughfares of the district will be neglected to its manifest injury.

They are also of opinion that the city corporation can lay no just claim to the portion of land sought to be annexed, inasmuch as the expenses incurred in laying out and forming the portions of the streets that intersect it were duly credited to them in the adjustment of amounts at the period of separation.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your memorialists therefore pray that your Excellency will be pleased to proclaim the northern boundary of this municipality as follows—from a point where the centre of Reilly street intersects the centre of Nicholson street, along the centre of Reilly street to Brunswick street; thence in a north-easterly direction along the south-eastern side of the Heidelberg road to Smith street, and along the centre of Smith street to the present boundary line."

PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.

HEATHCOTE.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His
 Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive
 Council, has directed the publication of the substance and
 prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter
 set forth, signed by one hundred and ninety-nine householders
 at Heathcote, in the county of Dalhousie, praying for the
 erection of their locality into a municipal district.

By His Excellency's Command,

J.2883. JOHN O'SHANASSY.

The petitioners recite the 1st and 2nd sections of the Muni-
 cipal Act, 18 Victoria No. 15, and state that urgent necessity
 exists for the establishment of a municipal district at Heath-
 cote.

They suggest the following boundaries for the proposed
 district, viz.:—Commencing at a point at the junction of
 Mitchell street and High street, being the centre of the town-
 ship of Heathcote, and extending thence on the north to a
 point seven chains north to the Black Swan Hotel; on the
 south to a point twenty chains north of Sheep Station Gully,
 such north and south boundaries to be arcs of a circle whose
 radii shall not exceed three miles from the centre, and extend-
 ing on the east and west respectively one quarter of a mile,
 or twenty chains from the east and west boundary lines respec-
 tively of the main Government road throughout the entire
 length of the proposed district from north to south.

They state that the abovementioned district forms only a
 portion of the parish of Heathcote, and is considerably less
 than the area limited by the Act, and also that it contains a
 population of householders much exceeding Three hundred.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

“Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Excel-
 lency will be pleased to cause the substance and prayer of this
 petition to be advertised in the *Government Gazette*, in accord-
 ance with the above in part recited Act, and so soon as the terms
 and provisions of the said Act will permit, to proclaim the locality
 as a municipal district, by a name in such Proclamation to be

declared, and also by the same or any other Proclamation to define the limits and boundaries of such municipal district, the same to be a municipal district, having a council created a body corporate, for the purposes and with the powers contained in the said in part recited Act."

MUNICIPALITY OF BALLAARAT.

SIXTH HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF BALLAARAT, FOR THE HALF-YEAR ENDING THE 16TH JANUARY, 1859.

PUBLIC WORKS.

Water-works.

THE municipal council have, during the past half-year, laid down pipes from Yuille's Swamp, and erected stand pipes at the junction of Sturt and Lydiard and Sturt and Lyons streets. The advantages which will result by the completion of these works can only at present be anticipated. Irrespective of the saving annually in the maintenance of the roads from the swamp, caused by the water carts, the inhabitants in the populous portion of the township are now supplied with water at very reduced prices.

Gas.

The municipal council have to congratulate the inhabitants of this district on the successful accomplishment of the Ballaarat Gas Company; and the council have availed themselves of the advantages which accrue to any town by being properly lighted, and wherever the company have laid down mains, the municipal council have erected lamp-posts, and arranged for the lighting of the streets.

Railway Terminus.

The municipal council, finding that efforts were being made by the residents on Ballaarat East to have the Geelong and Ballaarat Railway to terminate on Bakery Hill, sent a deputation from this council, accompanied by a deputation from the resident merchants of this district, and although nothing definite was promised by the Government, they ascertained the contract accepted included that portion between Bakery Hill and Soldier's Hill, and taking into consideration the necessity of providing for a further extension of the railway into the agricultural districts, the municipal council feels assured that the chief terminus for the Ballaarat district will be on Soldier's Hill.

Maintenance of the Streets.

Under the supervision of the town surveyor, hired labor has been employed for cleansing and repairing the roads and streets, and also for collecting and breaking the stone necessary for keeping the roads in repair during the ensuing winter, and for that purpose the municipal council have on hand 2553 cubic yards of broken quartz, and 1234 cubic yards of gravel.

Botanical Gardens.

The municipal council offered a premium for the best design for laying out the grounds, and have had the grounds surveyed according to the most approved plan, and should the Government grant a fair proportion of the revenue, as compared with Melbourne and Geelong, towards improving public gardens, the Ballaarat Botanical Gardens will, it is to be hoped, become a source of attraction and enjoyment to the inhabitants of Ballaarat.

BYE-LAWS.

No. 18.—A bye-law for the conducting of public meetings of the ratepayers, and of elections of members of council, and also for regulating the proceedings at the election of chairman.—Gazetted.

ELECTIONS.

At a public meeting of the ratepayers, held at the Council Chambers on the 14th day of January, to elect three members in the place of Councillors Oddie, R. Smith, and W. C. Smith, who retired by rotation, but were eligible for re-election, the following gentlemen were proposed:—Messrs. W. C. Smith, Robert Smith, James Oddie, Bendon S. Hassell, Walter Craig, and John Smith Carver. A poll was taken on Saturday, the 15th of January, and the following gentlemen were declared duly elected members of the municipal council of Ballaarat:—Messrs. Robert Smith, Bendon S. Hassell, and W. C. Smith.

The council have urged upon the Government the necessity for making the Government roads through the town, namely, Simson street and Bucknall street, frequently during the last half-year, but without effect.

For apportioning a portion of the cemetery for the use of the Wesleyan congregation.—Granted.

For a new bridge in a central part of the town.—Not granted.

For liberty to appoint a town herdsman.—Declined.

For reserving a portion of land for depasturing impounded cattle.—Declined.

For plastering the Court House.—Granted.

For declaring this a polling place.—Granted.

For having the Government land in the neighborhood sold here instead of at Maryborough.—Not answered.

For a further grant-in-aid.—Granted.

PETITIONS.

The council have, during the last half-year, forwarded petitions to the various heads of departments, requesting that a gaol for the district might be erected here, and also for a new bridge; but although the commission appointed to consider the best site for the gaol recommended Carisbrook, the same is to be built at Maryborough. The bridge was also considered necessary, but on the vote coming before the House the same was lost by a majority of one.

DEPUTATIONS.

Deputations have attended on the heads of departments and members of the Legislature, for endeavoring to obtain for Carisbrook those privileges which the council conceive the town to be entitled to, but without effect.
