## NOTICE TO CARRIERS, CARRIERS' AGENTS, AND FORWARDING AGENTS.

THE attention of carriers, carriers' agents, and forwarding agents, is directed to the circumstance that by the Act No. 78 their licenses must be renewed annually; that any unlicensed person acting as a carrier is liable to a penalty of £50; that any person permitting the words "licensed carrier" to remain upon his vehicle *after his license has expired* is liable to be indicted for a misdemeanor; and that carriers' agents or forwarding agents delivering goods to any other person than a licensed carrier will be liable for any loss of or injury to them.

**POSTPONEMENT OF THE NEXT GENERAL SESSIONS AT CASTLEMAINE AND BEECHWORTH.**

**PROCLAMATION**  
By His Excellency **SIR HENRY BARKLY**, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

**WHEREAS** by an Act passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better administration of Justice in Courts of General Sessions in the colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor, from time to time, to define and appoint by Proclamation the times at which such Courts should be holden, and such times to alter

and vary as the said Governor should think fit: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the ninth day of March, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, certain times were appointed at which the several Courts of General Sessions were to be holden: And whereas by another Proclamation bearing date the twentieth day of August instant, the Court of General Sessions for Castlemaine was postponed from the twenty-seventh day of August, One thousand eight hundred and sixty, to a date to be appointed in lieu thereof: And whereas it is expedient to alter the time appointed for holding the next Court of General Sessions of and for the district of Beechworth: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby postpone the times appointed for holding the next Courts of General Sessions in and for the districts of Castlemaine and Beechworth aforesaid, in manner following, that is to say:—

The Court of General Sessions for Castlemaine, from the 27th day of August instant until Wednesday, the 3rd day of October, 1860.

The Court of General Sessions for Beechworth, from the 10th day of October, 1860, to Thursday, the 31st day of January, 1861.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-seventh day of August, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty, and in the twenty-fourth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

**THE DOG NUISANCE ACT EXTENDED TO CARNHAM, SMYTHESDALE, AND SKIPTON.**

**THE** Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has extended the provisions of the Act 6 William IV. No. 4, intituled, *An Act for abating the nuisance occasioned by dogs in the streets of certain towns and on highways in New South Wales*, to the townships of Carnham, Smythesdale, and Skipton, the boundaries of which respective townships are as follow, viz.:—

**THE TOWNSHIP OF CARNHAM, COUNTIES OF RIPON AND GRENVILLE.**—Commencing at the south-east angle of the town reserve, being a point bearing north one chain from the north-east angle of portion 2; bounded on the east by Russell street, bearing north one mile; on the north by a line bearing west one mile; on the west by a line bearing south one mile; and on the south by Goldsmith street, bearing east one mile to the point of commencement.

**THE TOWN OF SMYTHESDALE, COUNTY OF GRENVILLE.**—Commencing on the north boundary of the town reserve at a stake bearing north 32 degrees 19 minutes east from the north-west angle of section B; bounded on part of the north by a line bearing east twenty-one chains fifty-eight links; on the east by a line bearing south one hundred and twenty chains; on the south by a line bearing west, crossing Smythe's Creek, one hundred and twenty chains; on the west by a line bearing north one hundred and twenty chains; and on the remainder of the north by a line bearing east, again crossing Smythe's Creek, ninety-eight chains forty-two links to the point of commencement.

**THE TOWN OF SKIPTON, IN THE COUNTIES OF HAMPTDEN AND RIPON.**—Commencing at the north-east angle of allotment 1 of section 3, Skipton suburban allotment; bounded on the east by a line bearing north two miles; on the north by a line bearing west one mile; on the west by a line bearing south two miles, crossing the Emu Creek; and on the south by a line bearing east one mile to the point of commencement.

## ORDER IN COUNCIL

(Made under 21 Victoria No. 32, §12)

FOR

REGULATING MINING LEASES OF AURIFEROUS  
LAND IN THE MINING DISTRICT OF ARARAT.*At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-seventh day of  
August, 1860.*

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor

**WHEREAS** by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the 21st year of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, No. 32, it was made lawful for the Governor to grant leases of any auriferous Crown lands, for mining purposes, for any term not exceeding ten years: **AND WHEREAS** by the same Act it was also made lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make such regulations, not being contrary to the said Act, as should appear to be necessary for prescribing the form of documents and leases to be issued under the said Act, the modes, times, dates, and places of the issue thereof, and the conditions on which such leases should be issued: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order, with respect to all leases which the Governor may grant as aforesaid of any auriferous Crown lands being in the mining district of Ararat, make the regulations next following.

## WHAT LANDS MAY BE LEASED.

I. All auriferous Crown lands in the mining district of Ararat may be leased under these regulations, except—

1. The whole or any part of any claim held under a miner's right by any person other than the applicant;
2. Any land within the boundaries of which any claim, or part of a claim, is held under a miner's right or Chinese residence license.
3. The whole or any part of any land which any person other than the applicant, is entitled by virtue of a miner's right or Chinese residence license to occupy for residence, and actually does occupy *bond fide*;
4. The whole or any part of any land which any person, other than the applicant, is entitled by virtue of a business license to occupy, and does actually occupy *bond fide*;
5. The whole or any part of any land in or over which any person, other than the applicant, has any interest or authority other than those above mentioned which he may lawfully use or exercise for mining purposes or for discovering the existence of gold.

## REQUIREMENTS PRELIMINARY TO THE ISSUE OF LEASES.

I. For the information of the holders of miner's rights, every person desirous of obtaining a lease of auriferous Crown lands in the mining district of Ararat, shall, previous to making application (as hereinafter directed), erect, or cause to be erected, at each angle of the land proposed to be leased, a post not less than three inches square, and standing at least three feet in height above the surface of the ground, and shall affix upon each post a board with the words, "Applied for Lease," together with the name of the applicant, and the extent of the area applied for, legibly painted thereon, and such posts shall be maintained at the expense of the applicant until the land shall have been officially surveyed. The applicant will also be required to publish in one or more of the local newspapers, and at least fourteen days previous to the consideration of his application, full particulars of such application, together with a description of the land applied for.

II. Every person applying for a lease of auriferous Crown lands in the mining district of Ararat, shall apply for such lease by addressing to the Chief Secretary, through the nearest warden of the mining district, an application in duplicate in the form in schedule hereunto appended marked A.; and the warden shall, as soon as it may conveniently be done, enter or cause to be entered, in a book to be kept for the purpose, such application, numbered according to the order in which it shall have been received, and shall thereupon, and upon receipt of the deposit in the application referred to, give to the applicant a certificate and receipt in the form in schedule hereunto annexed marked B., and the priority of every application shall be determined according to the time at which it was so received and entered as aforesaid.

III. At the time of applying as aforesaid for a lease, the applicant must deposit with the warden (in addition to a sufficient sum to cover the charges of survey) the sum of Ten pounds, as a guarantee for payment of any expenses which may be incurred by reason of any objection to such application being allowed. And whether such objection shall be allowed or not, any surplus which may remain over expenses incurred shall be returned to the applicant.

IV. Every person who shall hereafter apply for a lease under these regulations shall deposit with the warden a sum equal to six months' rent (computed at the rate hereinafter specified), of the land so applied for, and in the event of any lease being subsequently refused, such deposit may and shall be returned to

the applicant without any deduction whatsoever. But if the application is withdrawn by the intending lessee, he shall forfeit a sum equivalent to three months' rent of the land proposed to be leased, together with all the expenses which may have been actually incurred for the purposes of survey.

N.B. Printed copies of the forms A., B., C., will be issued at the office of the wardens of the district, free of expense.

## OFFICIAL SURVEY.

I. Upon receipt of such application and money aforesaid, the warden shall direct the surveyor to proceed to the land applied for, and survey the same, and furnish the warden with a report thereon as to the area, boundaries, and description thereof, and the character of the ground, as also any claims to prior occupancy which may come under his notice while making the survey, accompanied by a plan thereof on the scale of two chains to the inch, together with a tracing of so much of the general map of the district, on the scale of four inches to a mile, as will suffice for connecting the particular area applied for with at least one fixed point in the district; and the warden shall transmit such report, plan, and tracing to the Chief Secretary with as little delay as under the circumstances may be possible.

II. When the surveyor shall proceed to make his survey, he shall remove the posts erected by the applicant, and shall mark out the land applied for by fixing at each angle thereof, and at distances not exceeding one hundred yards in the side lines thereof, a post, painted white, and standing at least three feet above the surface of the ground, and shall affix upon some conspicuous place within the boundaries of the land applied for a notice, dated on the day of such survey, setting forth, in the form of the schedule hereunto annexed marked C., the description of the land applied for and the address of the applicant, and such notice shall be effectually secured by the surveyor.

III. In the event of more than one application being made for the same land or any part thereof, each of such applications shall be dealt with according to its priority.

## OBJECTIONS.

I. Any person objecting to the issue of such lease to any applicant, shall, within twelve clear days after the date of the notice posted on the land as aforesaid, forward to the warden of the district, and also to the applicant, at the address stated in such notice posted as aforesaid, full notice of all objections against the issue of such lease to the applicant.

II. Every person so objecting shall (except in cases of interference or encroachment which are hereinafter provided for) deposit with the warden the sum of Five pounds as security for the due prosecution of his objections, and in satisfaction of all expenses to which the applicant may be put by such objections; and if such objection should not be prosecuted, or shall fail, so much of such sum shall be handed over to the applicant as may be by the warden be declared necessary to defray the expenses of the applicant, and the balance (if any) shall be refunded to the person objecting.

III. When application shall have been made for a lease of any ground, to the whole or any part of which, or to any land, water-course, or other easement within the boundaries of which any person other than the applicant shall claim to be entitled, by virtue of prior occupation under a miner's right or business license, the objection to the granting of such lease may be heard by the warden in the same way as a case of interference or encroachment under the provisions of the Gold Fields Act.

## ENQUIRY INTO APPLICATIONS AND OBJECTIONS.

I. After the expiration of the twelve days, exclusive of Sunday, Good Friday, and Christmas Day, allowed for objections, the warden shall proceed to hold, at a time and place to be named by him, an enquiry into the truth of the particulars stated by the applicant and of the objections made by each objector.

II. At such enquiry the warden or other officer shall receive such information as the parties may offer, and as he may think pertinent to his enquiry; and immediately after such enquiry, or, should there be no objections, immediately after the expiration of the twelve days allowed for objections, he shall forward to the office of the Chief Secretary the application and objections thereto, if any, and his report thereon.

III. Every applicant who shall require the same shall be furnished with a copy of the mining surveyor's report, and plan of the ground sought to be leased, and shall also be entitled to examine the warden's report, and to make or cause to be made a copy of the same for his own use and guidance.

## LEASES.

I. All leases to be applied for, and which it may be proposed to grant for mining purposes, shall be designated "Gold Mining Leases."

II. The Governor may, if he shall think fit, issue to any applicant who has complied with such of these regulations as refer to his application, a lease of the land applied for, or any part thereof, after the time prescribed by the eleventh section of the Gold Fields Act, viz., one month after notice of the intention to grant the same shall have been published in the *Government Gazette*.

III. In any case in which an application shall have been made in pursuance of these regulations for a lease of land in any part of which any person other than the applicant may be entitled to cut, construct, or use any race or dam, or to any other easement for mining purposes, the Governor may, if he shall think fit, authorise the issuing of a lease of such land, subject to all existing rights in, to, or to the use of such race,

or dam, or other easement, and impose such terms as the said Governor may think fit, in order to secure the enjoyment of the same, or to secure compensation for any injury or inconvenience likely to arise to such person by reason of the issuing of such lease.

IV. Every lease will bear *date* the day of the execution thereof by the Governor, and may be obtained at the office of the warden, who shall deliver the same to the applicant, or such person as shall be duly authorised to receive the same, upon receipt of a fee of £1.

V. *The parcel of land* demised shall be in all cases in the form of a quadrilateral figure (except where it is impracticable by reason of the adjoining land being occupied, or from insuperable impediments), and the maximum length thereof shall not, except as hereinafter provided, exceed more than thrice the maximum breadth, and shall be described in the lease by such metes and bounds as shall have been reported by the surveyor and approved by the Chief Secretary, upon report of the warden.

VI. *The term of the lease* in the land demised cannot in any case exceed ten years.

VII. *The extent of the areas* of leases shall be (except in *special cases* hereinafter provided for) not more than twenty acres nor less than two acres; but lands comprised in any two or more leases, the total areas of which do not exceed in the whole fifty acres, may be worked conjointly, provided that the value of the machinery employed and the capital expended thereon be equal to the aggregate amounts named in the respective leases.

VIII. *The rents reserved* shall be at the rate of Five pounds per acre per annum, and the said rents shall be made payable *half-yearly in advance* during the entire term, and the day of the execution of the lease shall be deemed to be the day upon which the first payment shall be made.

IX. In all leases hereafter to be applied for, the land shall be demised, and the rent reserved, as herein prescribed.

#### SPECIAL CASES.

I. Whenever any person shall have purchased the right, title, or interest of any puddler or miner to or in any land intended to be applied for on lease, such puddler or miner may continue to work and mine the said land, if any agreement has been or shall hereafter be entered into to that effect between the parties, until the applicant receives his lease and requires the use of the said land, and it shall not be competent for any Commissioner of Crown Lands to remove any such person contrary to the agreement so entered into: Provided, however, that the warden shall be the judge who shall decide conclusively as to the existence and validity of such agreement.

II. In cases where it shall be shown that a departure from the foregoing areas or rents would under special circumstances be desirable, the same may be diminished, extended, or otherwise altered by the Governor, and such covenants, conditions, and stipulations may be imposed, and such rents and royalties reserved, as by the said Governor may be considered necessary: Provided that the warden shall not investigate any application for a greater or less extent of land than the maximum or minimum quantities hereinbefore stated, without a special order from the Chief Secretary; and further provided that any such special application already made or which shall hereafter be made shall take its priority as in cases of ordinary applications.

III. In addition to gold mining leases, leases of lands required for the construction of dams, or for sites for the erection of machinery, and whereon it is not proposed to mine for gold, and the areas of which shall in no case exceed ten acres, may also be granted; and such leases shall be subject to an annual rent of one pound per acre, payable half-yearly in advance; and such special lease shall not entitle the holder thereof to mine in or upon any land so leased; and if any land so leased and occupied shall afterwards prove to be auriferous, the occupiers thereof shall be liable to be removed therefrom upon payment of compensation by persons desirous of entering thereon for mining purposes, the amount of such compensation to be determined by a warden, or warden and assessors; and such lease shall thereupon be deemed to be absolutely void.

IV. If any person shall enter upon or occupy any Crown land for which application has been made under these regulations subsequently to the making of and whilst such application is under consideration, such occupation or entry shall not operate to prevent the issue of a lease to the said applicant.

V. These regulations shall take effect and come into operation on the fourteenth day of September next ensuing.

**MUNICIPALITY OF BALLAARAT EAST.**

**BYE-LAW No. 18.—FOR PREVENTION AND EXTINGUISHING OF FIRE.**

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted; that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the prevention and extinguishing of fires: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Ballarat East, from and after the day on which His Excellency the Governor shall have signified his assent hereto—

1. That any person erecting or repairing, or causing to be erected or repaired, any tent, canvas erection, canvas or calico or felt roof, or any chimney of wood or other inflammable material, or any stove or stove pipe within two feet of any wall or partition constructed of wood or of calico, or canvas and wood, or who shall lead any stove pipe through any roof or wall as aforesaid without the same be environed or supported by a collar of sheet iron not less than three feet in diameter, or who shall permit any inflammable material to remain within such distance in any building or premises being on the boundary line of any proclaimed street or road, or within one hundred and eighty-six feet of the boundary of any proclaimed street or road, or within twenty feet of any building or erection, shall, upon proof thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, be fined in any sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

2. Any tenant or occupant of a dwelling-house, shop, or other building, who shall allow any chimney connected therewith to remain foul, so that the soot take fire or flames issue from the top of such chimney, shall, upon proof thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, be fined in any sum not exceeding Five pounds.

3. Any person who shall light or cause a fire to be lighted in any fenced yard, garden, shed, or open space within one hundred and eighty-six feet of any building or erection, or on the boundary line of any proclaimed street or road, shall, upon proof thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, be fined in any sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

4. Any person who shall expose or cause to be exposed in any open place any hay or straw, or erect or cause to be erected any stack of hay or straw, within a distance of one hundred and eighty-six feet from any building or erection, or on the boundary line of any proclaimed street or road, shall, upon proof thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, be fined in any sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

5. Any person who shall light or cause to be lighted any bonfire, far barrel, or fireworks in any proclaimed street or common thoroughfare, or within one hundred and eighty-six feet of the boundary line thereof, shall, upon proof thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, be fined in any sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

**MUNICIPALITY OF BRIGHTON.**

**BYE-LAW No. 32.—A BYE-LAW FOR THE REGULATION OF PUBLIC VEHICLES WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BRIGHTON.**

THE municipal council of Brighton, by virtue of the powers given to them in the Act 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, and of all other powers and authorities enabling them in this behalf, by and with the consent of His Excellency the Governor, do hereby enact as follows:—

1. Such places as the said council shall from time to time appoint shall be stands for public vehicles plying for hire within—  
No. 108.—August 31, 1860.—2.

the municipal district aforesaid; provided that the council may from time to time, as they shall see fit, alter the situations and number of the said stands so appointed, and of the vehicles on each stand; six clear days' notice of such appointment and of any alteration shall be given by the said council by advertisement in one newspaper published within the city of Melbourne, and in a local newspaper, if any.

2. The owner or driver of any public vehicle shall not permit any part of such vehicle, or of any horse drawing the same, to stand within ten feet of the corner of any street, whether for hire or otherwise.

3. At every fourth vehicle on each stand there shall be left a space of at least six feet for passengers to pass through.

4. Public vehicles shall take their stations on the stand in the order of their arrival, and when any vehicle shall be called or driven off any stand the vehicle immediately behind shall draw up to the vacated place, and any other vehicle behind in the like order.

5. No driver of any public vehicle shall suffer the same to stand for hire across any street, or alongside of any other public vehicle, nor obstruct the driver of any other vehicle in taking up or setting down any person, nor wilfully, wrongfully, or forcibly prevent or endeavor to prevent the driver of any other vehicle from taking a fare.

6. No owner or driver of any public vehicle shall permit his vehicle, with or without horses, to stand in any street, lane, thoroughfare, or public place, longer than may be necessary for loading or unloading, or taking up or putting down any passenger, except while standing for hire in some lawful place appointed for that purpose, as provided by this bye-law, or waiting for the hirer.

7. No driver or conductor of any public vehicle shall carry, or knowingly permit to be carried, in any such vehicle within the said municipal district, except to some police office or watch-house, any person so noisily or violently conducting himself or herself, or otherwise so misbehaving as to occasion any public annoyance or disturb the public peace.

8. The driver of every public vehicle shall be constantly attendant on the same when plying on any public stand, or otherwise engaged for hire within the said municipal district.

9. Every public vehicle plying for hire, or engaged after sunset or before sunrise within the said municipal district, shall be provided with proper carriage lights, and the driver shall keep the same lighted while so plying or engaged for hire.

10. The driver of every public vehicle shall place a muzzle upon the head of any vicious horse used or employed by him, and keep the same thereon while on any stand within the said district.

11. Every driver of a public vehicle who shall feed any horse while on any stand within the said district shall use a nosebag to contain the forage, and shall not remove the blinkers from any horse during the time of feeding.

12. The words “public vehicle” and “vehicle” where used in this bye-law shall be understood to mean all coaches, omnibuses, cars, cabs, and other carriages plying for hire or carrying passengers for hire within the municipal district of Brighton, whether at separate and distinct fares for each passenger, or at one fare for the whole vehicle, or otherwise, and not impelled otherwise than by animal power; the word “owner” shall signify every person possessed of a beneficial interest in any public vehicle, and the word “conductor” shall include every person; other than the driver, who shall attend upon any public vehicle or upon the passengers therein; and whenever in this bye-law, with reference to any person, animal, matter, or thing, any word or words are used importing the singular number only, yet such word or words shall be understood to include several persons, animals, matters, or things, unless there be something in the subject or context repugnant thereto.

13. For every offence against any of the provisions of this bye-law the offender shall, upon conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

## FIRE BRIGADE.

The municipal council have expended in engines, apparatus, &c., the sum of One thousand and sixty-eight pounds nine shillings and twopence, including the first moiety of the grant of £600 towards building an engine house (see details).

The committee of the fire brigade accepted tenders for the erection of the building in stone for the sum of £823 15s.

The foundation stone was laid on Friday, the 15th day of June, by W. C. Smith, Esq., chairman of the municipal council. The building is now nearly completed, and irrespective of its great utility, it is one of the greatest ornaments as a public building in the town.

## TOWN HALL.

The municipal council invited competitive designs for town hall, the total cost of the building not to exceed £13,000. Eight (8) designs were sent in, and the council selected the one with the motto "To be or not to be," the architect, Chas. D. Cutburt, Esq. The council have also accepted a tender for a portion of the building from Messrs. Evans and Barker, for the sum of Four thousand nine hundred pounds. The portion which is now in course of erection will include police court and four offices for the use of the municipal council.

The Government have voted towards the erection of the police court the sum of two thousand pounds.

## BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have received the assent of His Excellency the Governor:—

No. 26. A bye-law for levying a rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound upon all houses, lands, and tenements within the municipal district of Ballaarat, for the year ending 16th day of January, 1861.

\* The chairman absent on a deputation to the Honorable the Commissioner of Public Works, relative to a water supply for Ballaarat.

No. 27. A bye-law to amend a bye-law of the municipal council of Ballarat East, intituled, a bye-law No. 16, to prevent the nuisance arising from exposing goods for sale and blocking up the footpaths on the township of Ballarat.

#### WATER SUPPLY.

The municipal council, in conjunction with the municipal council of Ballarat East, have had several miles of drains cut for conveying the storm water into Yuille's Swamp. The swamp has also been fenced in, and the filter beds have been improved. The first moiety of the proportion of the expense has been received from the municipal council of Ballarat East.

The chairman of this council, in company with the representatives from the various municipal councils from the gold fields, waited upon the Honorable the Commissioner of Public Works respecting a permanent supply of water to the gold field districts. The Government were very favorable towards voting large sums of money for supplying the inland towns of the colony with water wherever the scheme proposed could be carried out, and yield a revenue sufficient to guarantee the issue of Government debentures for such works.

The importance of a sufficient supply of water for the district of Ballarat is paramount, not only for the domestic and sanitary purposes of the population, but the future yield of gold in the district will depend very greatly on the supply of water available for the various uses in washing gold from the alluvial and quartz mines.

The town surveyor reports that, unless an unusual quantity of rain falls during the months of September and October, the supply in Yuille's Swamp will be exhausted before the end of January next.

#### RAILWAY TERMINUS.

The municipal council of this district sent down a memorial for presentation to the Legislative Assembly, advocating the claims of the district for a terminus on Soldiers' Hill, as they found that attempts were being made to deprive the inhabitants of this district of the advantages of a railway terminus on this township; and from the pledges given by the present and by former Governments, and the reports in the Legislative Assembly, they have every confidence that the terminus will be on Soldiers' Hill.
