NOTICE TO TENANTS HOLDING UNDER MINING LEASES.
It is hereby notified to tenants of Crown Lands leased for mining purposes that the non-payment of rent on or before the quarterly or half-yearly gale days named in their respective leases involves the forfeiture of such leases.

RESERVES OF DRAINAGE AREAS FOR WATER RESERVOIRS.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of the power in him vested in this behalf, has, by an Order made on the 15th day of October, 1860, reserved the lands hereinafter described for the purpose of Drainage Areas and Reservoirs.

Such lands are accordingly exempted from mining operations within the meaning of the 4th clause of the Gold Fields Act, 21 Victoria No. 32.

MINING DISTRICT OF ARARAT.

Certain reserves as shown on plans deposited in the office of the Board of Science, Melbourne. Reservoirs No. 1, 2, and 3, Ararat, and Nos. 1, 2, and 3, Pleasant Creek.

MINING DISTRICT OF BALLAARAT.

Smythesdale: Watershed, Reservoir No. 20.—The sources of Smythe's Creek, as shown on a plan deposited in the office of the Board of Science, Melbourne. Area of drainage, twenty-four thousand three hundred and twenty acres, more or less.

Reserve B., Ballarat: The basin of the Bullarook Creek.—Commencing at the source of the Bullarook Creek, in the Main Dividing Range; thence along the Main Dividing Range south-westerly about one mile; thence north-westerly by the watershed of the Bullarook Creek to Great Kingston; thence north-easterly about two and a half miles, crossing the Bullarook Creek; thence south-easterly to the Main Dividing Range, being a point on that range about five and a half miles north-easterly from the commencing point; thence by the Main Dividing Range south-westerly to the commencing point, as delineated on a map deposited in the office of the Board of Science, Melbourne. Area of drainage, twenty-seven thousand five hundred and eighty acres, more or less.

The basin of the Dead Horse Gully and other adjacent gullies, unnamed.—Commencing at a point on the Inkerman Range, about three-quarters of a mile east of the main line of road from Ballarat to Creswick; thence along the Inkerman Range

easterly to the watershed dividing the waters of the Yarroowee River from Dead Horse Gully to the Main Dividing Range; thence by the Main Dividing Range westerly about three and a half miles to the northern portion of the parish of Ballarat, about one mile north-east of Mount Rowan; thence southerly, westerly, and easterly to the commencing point, as shown on a plan deposited in the office of the Board of Science, Melbourne. Area of drainage, four thousand one hundred acres, more or less.

Reserve E.—The basin of the western branch of the Moorarbool River.—Commencing at the source of the western branch of the Moorarbool River, in the Main Dividing Range; thence by the Main Dividing Range north-easterly about two and a half miles; thence by the watershed south-easterly and westerly to Wallace township reserve; thence along the north boundary of the town reserve about one and a quarter miles; thence north-westerly by the watershed to the Main Dividing Range, being the commencing point, as shown on a plan deposited in the office of the Board of Science, Melbourne. Area of drainage, twelve thousand one hundred and thirty-seven acres, more or less.

Area of basin about three thousand acres, situate west of the watershed of Reservoirs Nos. 5 and 5 A, as shown on plan deposited in the office of the Board of Science, Melbourne.

Watershed, Reservoir No. 7, and Reservoirs No. 1, No. 2, and No. 3, Grassy Flat, parishes of Sandhurst, and parish-unnamed on the eastern boundary of the parish of Sandhurst.—Situate easterly, north-easterly, and southerly of the town of Sandhurst. Area of basin about eight thousand five hundred acres, as shown on plans deposited in the office of the Board of Science, Melbourne.

Watershed, Reservoir No. 9, head of Myers' Flat, parish of Marong.—Situate about two miles south-westerly of portion A, Sandhurst, at the head of Myers' Flat. Area of basin about one thousand five hundred acres, as shown on plan deposited in the office of the Board of Science, Melbourne.

Watershed, Reservoir No. 12, California Gully, parish of Sandhurst.—Situate about two miles north-west of Sandhurst, portion B, and about three quarters of a mile northerly of hamlet of Long Gully. Area of basin about three hundred and forty acres, as shown on plan deposited in the office of the Board of Science, Melbourne.

Watershed, Reservoir No. 14, Snob's Gully, parish of Nerring. Situate about half a mile west of hamlet of Eaglehawk. Area of basin about three hundred acres, as shown on plan deposited in the office of the Board of Science, Melbourne.

Watershed, Reservoir No. 15, Sailor's Gully, parish of Nerring. Situate about half a mile north-westerly of the hamlet of Eaglehawk. Area of basin about one hundred and eighty acres, as shown on plan deposited in the office of the Board of Science, Melbourne.

NOTICE TO MARINERS AND OTHERS.

THE following Statement has been received from the Vice-Consul of Panay (Philippine Islands) relative to the Navigation of the seas in the vicinity of the Philippine Islands.

As it contains matters of importance to mariners, and of public interest, it is published for general information.

OBSERVATIONS RELATIVE TO THE PORT AND COAST OF ILOILO.

Vessels making the voyage to Iloilo from Australia, or any place to the southward of the Philippines, will find it the best course during the S.W. monsoon to enter the Philippine Archipelago between the island of Basilan and Zamboanga, the south-western extremity of Mindanao, and on passing Point Batalampun to keep well up to Point Gorda and make the Murcielagos Island, so as to avoid being swept to the westward by the strong currents setting from off the Mindanao coast during both monsoons.*

After passing the Murcielagos, the high land of Isla de Negros soon becomes visible, and the course is clear and safe along its western coast towards the island of Guimaras. When off the south-western point of Guimaras, the route is direct for the narrow channel between that island and Iloilo. On making and entering this channel, care should be taken to keep well in on the Guimaras shore (which is perfectly safe and clear, with deep water close under the island, along the whole extent of the channel) so as to clear the Otong shoal, which stretches off the Iloilo coast to nearly opposite Point-Cabalig. The Otong shoal, being of soft sand, is not of a very dangerous nature, and can consequently be approached pretty closely in the event of its being necessary to beat through. The tides run through the passage with considerable strength; but if unable to make head against the ebb, it is usual to bring up on the edge of the shoal and wait the making of the flood to the northward. [The whole of this part of the coast is completely sheltered during the N.E. monsoon; but in case of need the fine harbor of Santa Ana, between Points Lain and Canga on the island of Guimaras, may be entered with safety, and affords refuge under any circumstances; while during the prevalence of the S.W. monsoon, vessels will of course be subject to no detention in entering the Iloilo channel with a fair wind.]

On reaching the town of Iloilo, ships may bring up in ten to twelve fathoms, in good anchorage, to the eastward of the fort, and about half a mile from the shore, in which position they are safe in every respect, though still partially exposed to the sweep of the tides. If desirous of entering the creek, they should proceed until they arrive opposite the village of Tlat, on the island of Guimaras, and then make for the entrance, which lies exactly N.W. and S.E. getting Tlat directly astern, and passing between the marks placed on each side of the channel.

During the N.E. monsoon, it is generally considered to be the best route for the ships from Australia to Manila to make a detour to the eastward of the Philippines, and enter the Archipelago by the Straits of San Bernardino. In coming from Australia to Iloilo, it will therefore be advisable, during the period of northerly winds, to beat up outside as far as Samar, and enter the Bernardino Straits by that island and Masbate. If bound from Manila, or ports to the northward, vessels may also safely proceed towards Iloilo through the Mindoro Passage, and onwards through the chain of islands off the N.E. coast of Panay, if provided with the latest charts of the Spanish Commission Hidrografica compiled by Don Claudio Montero. After passing Tablas and Romblon (which latter island possesses an excellent harbor), the usual course is to make for the group of small islands called collectively the "Silanga," lying off the north-eastern coast of Panay, a good mark for which is the high conical island named Pan de Azucar, or Sugar-loaf, which is visible from a great distance. In approaching these islands during the N.E. monsoon, vessels should keep along between the islets of Jimtotolo and the larger Zapato, and, during the S.W., more in towards the Panay shore, between Oluiaya and the lesser Zapato. After leaving the Zapatos, the course is to the south or northward of the Gigantes, as preferred, and the channel through the group of islands is generally entered between Siogon and Calagan, from whence the route is continued past Culebra, Pan de Azucar, Bagabu and Tagabanan, though for vessels of heavy tonnage it may possibly be found preferable to adopt the outside and broader passage between the group of islands and the Island of Negros, keeping a look out for the easily avoidable shoal water marked on the chart.

If the inner route among the islands be taken, ships will find safe anchorage throughout the whole passage, more particularly at Pan de Azucar, and at Bacataan or La Concepcion. At Bacataan, assistance and supplies may be had, if needed, through the commandant of the district, and at Apiton, good water and live stock may also be obtained. After passing Tagabanan, and

* Considerable difference of opinion prevailing as to the best course from Australia to the Philippines, the above remarks should be looked upon as suggestive only.

emerging into the broad channel between the coast of Panay and the Island of Negros, the best course is to steer direct for the highest land visible on the island of Guimaras, care being taken to clear the Calabazas and the Pepitas rocks, which lie some distance off the Panay shore.

On opening the channel between Guimaras and Iloilo, and on getting the Seven Sins rock to bear W., the vessel's head should be kept straight for these rocks. By adopting this course, the three dangers of Point Dumangas, Bacacay, and the Iguana bank will be cleared. Passing the Seven Sins, vessels may proceed up the channel and anchor off the mouth of the creek, the directions for entering which are given above. It is usual to keep the lead going on approaching the neighborhood of the Iguana bank and Point Dumangas, though its discoloration is sufficient to mark the whereabouts of shoal water.

It should be remarked that the coast from the Gigantes to Iloilo affords good anchorage, and vessels have been known to ride out heavy gales in the open channel between Isla de Negros and Panay.

The ebb tide to the north of the Pepitas rocks runs to the eastward; but to the south of the Pepitas the ebb sets to the west. The velocity of the tide through the group of islands called the Silanga, and as far as the Seven Sins, is about three to four miles an hour; and from the Seven Sins to Iloilo, owing to the comparative narrowness of the passage, it runs frequently at the rate of six or seven miles.

Though the carefully compiled chart of the Iloilo coast already mentioned renders a pilot almost unnecessary for the approach and entrance from the northward, it may be observed that the aid of natives practically acquainted with the coast may be obtained from the commandant of the district of La Concepcion (at Bacauan), from the native fishing boats, or by sending in a boat to Iloilo. The access from the southward is so unembarrassed as to obviate any occasion for the services of a pilot, as a general rule.

The depth of water at the shallowest part (which occurs within a short distance after passing the entrance) of the creek is thirteen and a half at low, and nineteen feet at high water, so that vessels of 400 tons can load a full cargo alongside the jetties which are attached to the warehouses in the creek, and proceed out again at high tide. The jetties are mostly situated about a mile and a half from the entrance, and afford great facilities for loading from and discharging into the stores. No cargo-boats or lighters are required, except for such portion of cargo as a vessel of much over 400 tons might not be able to take inside the creek. Ships drawing over nineteen feet would have to complete their lading outside, near the entrance, in smooth water, and exposed to no risk. A Spanish vessel of 700 tons has frequently entered and loaded a part cargo at a jetty inside; and one of 450 has gone out with a full cargo. Inside the creek, vessels are as safe as in a dock, and their happening to ground during ingress or egress would be of little moment, the banks on either side being soft mud. A dredging machine employed for a short time near the mouth of the creek would enable it to receive vessels of almost any tonnage.

It is in contemplation to place a lighthouse on the Seven Sins, and one on Point Bondulan, on the island of Guimaras. Orders to this effect have been issued by the Government, and this measure and the projected laying down of buoys along the channel near the Iguana Bank and the Otong Shoal, will render the navigation still safer. Iloilo, with these improvements, will be one of the most easily accessible, as it now is the securest, port of the Archipelago.

Fresh provisions are cheap at Iloilo, and wages moderate.

Rice is generally sold by the provincial cavan, weighing about 195 to 198 lbs. avoirdupois, according to quality, and its price seldom exceeds \$1½ to \$2 per cavan.

The currency is chiefly confined to Spanish and South American dollars and their subdivisions. Gold is circulated with difficulty, though a moderate quantity of doubloons can be disposed of at about \$13 to \$15 each, according to rate of premium on silver.

with a probable deduction of 6½ cents per ton for light dues, which are not yet strictly chargeable. The duties on exports and imports are the same as at Manila.

The port regulations are not yet well defined, and it will be sufficient to state, that after being visited, vessels are allowed free communication with the town, and can obtain all requisite information from the British Vice-Consul resident there.

The principal articles of export of interest in connexion with foreign markets are sugar, sapan-wood, hides, hemp, and paddy. Leaf tobacco is also exported to a considerable extent, but entirely on Government account. Among the minor articles of shipment are horns, cocoras, gum mastich, M.O.P. shell, rattans, mat bags, beeswax, cocoa, arrowroot, vegetable pitch, wheat, Beche de Mer, maize, dried vegetables (beans, &c.), tortoise-shell, deerskins, timber (including ebony and fine woods of various kinds), and a large quantity of valuable goods of native manufacture, made of the fibres of the pine apple leaf and of silk, cotton, and hemp. The export of sugar is about 1900 tons per annum; but the advance in the value of this article has induced a considerable extension of planting. Of hides, the ship-

ments amount to 150 tons per annum; sapan wood, about 2200 tons; hemp, being mostly brought from the neighboring islands as returns for paddy and native goods, is shipped to a small extent from Iloilo, in irregular quantities of from 100 to 250 tons per annum; but in case of a direct demand for a foreign market, large quantities could be obtained from Leyte and Samat, at considerably cheaper rates than those current at Manila.

Imports of foreign goods take place to an important and increasing extent from Manila, though the native fabrics of pine-apple-leaf fibre, silk, and cotton supply a large portion of the native clothing. In the course of time, imports direct from foreign markets may be anticipated, when the development of the direct export trade increases the number of arrivals of native craft with produce from the contiguous islands, which will then obtain their supplies of foreign goods from Iloilo.

NOTE.—The British brig *Pat*, for Melbourne, was the first foreign vessel that loaded at Iloilo since the opening of the port to foreign trade in 1855. She sailed in March, 1859, and was followed by the British barque *Camilla*, also for Melbourne, in May of the same year.

In 1860, the Dutch barque *Bismton* has loaded for Sydney; the Bremen barque *Madraz*, for Melbourne; and the British barque *Alce*, for Sydney. Another vessel will probably load this year for Melbourne or Sydney. Cargoes sugar, the production of which article has received a great stimulus in this and the neighboring islands, and promises to lead, in course of time, to an important trade between Iloilo and Australia.

THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF CLUNES.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that any district of the colony of Victoria, the area whereof should not exceed nine square miles, and which should contain a population of householders not less than three hundred, might, subject to the provisions of the said Act, be constituted a municipal district as thereinafter mentioned, provided that no one point in any such area should be distant more than six miles from any other point; and it was further enacted that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than one hundred and fifty householders resident within any such district, praying that such district might be declared a municipal district under the said Act, to cause the substance and prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition, signed by an equal or greater number of householders resident within such locality, should have been delivered at the office of the Colonial Secretary within one month from the date of such publication) the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice aforesaid, might, if he should think fit, declare by Proclamation such locality a municipal district by a name to be mentioned in such Proclamation, and also by the same or any other Proclamation might define the limits and boundaries of such municipal district, and such limits and boundaries at any time thereafter in the same manner, on receipt of a similar petition, might vary and alter, but so as in no case save as thereinafter mentioned to include within the limits or boundaries of such municipal district an area of more than nine square miles, and upon the publication of any such Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, such locality so defined should be deemed and taken to be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act: And whereas a petition for the purposes aforesaid has been presented to the Governor by the householders at CLUNES, in the county of Talbot, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published as directed by the said Act, and no counter-petition has been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation declare that the district hereinafter described and named shall be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF CLUNES.—Commencing at a point on the south boundary bearing due south one mile and a half from the south-east angle of the electric telegraph and post office reserve, situate in block 4, township of Clunes; bounded on part of the south by a line bearing west one mile and a half; on the west by a line bearing north three miles; on the north by a line bearing east three miles, crossing Creswick's Creek and Bullarook Creek; on the east by a line bearing south three miles, again crossing the Bullarook Creek; and on the remainder of the south by a line bearing west one mile and a half, again crossing Creswick's Creek, to the point of commencement.

And I do hereby, with the advice aforesaid, direct that the council of the said municipal district shall be called by the name and style of "The Municipal Council of Clunes."

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this fifteenth day of October, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty, and in the twenty-fourth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

ORDER IN COUNCIL

(Made under 21 Victoria No. 32, § 12)

FOR

REGULATING MINING LEASES OF AURIFEROUS LAND IN THE MINING DISTRICT OF MARYBOROUGH.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the fifteenth day of October, 1860.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the 21st year of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, No. 32, it was made lawful for the Governor to grant Leases of any auriferous Crown lands, for mining purposes, for any term not exceeding ten years: AND WHEREAS by the same Act it was also made lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make such regulations, not being contrary to the said Act, as should appear to be necessary for prescribing the form of documents and leases to be issued under the same Act, the modes, times, dates, and places of the issue thereof, and the conditions on which such leases should be issued: AND whereas Orders in Council were made for regulating mining leases of auriferous Crown land in the mining district of Maryborough, on the 10th day of October, 1859, and on the 4th day of June, 1860, under the said Act: AND whereas it is expedient to amend the regulations contained in the said Orders: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby rescind the said Orders, and doth also, with respect to all leases which the Governor may grant as aforesaid of any auriferous Crown lands being in the mining district of Maryborough, make the regulations next following: PROVIDED that these regulations shall not affect any proceedings already taken with respect to applications for leases under the said Orders in Council.

WHAT LANDS MAY BE LEASED.

I. All auriferous Crown lands in the mining district of Maryborough may be leased under these regulations, except—

1. The whole or any part of any claim held under a miner's right by any person other than the applicant;
2. Any land within the boundaries of which any claim, or part of a claim, is held under a miner's right;
3. The whole or any part of any land which any person, other than the applicant, is entitled by virtue of a miner's right to occupy for residence, and actually does occupy *bona fide*;
4. The whole or any part of any land which any person, other than the applicant, is entitled by virtue of a business license to occupy, and does actually occupy *bona fide*;
5. The whole or any part of any land in or over which any person, other than the applicant, has any interest or authority other than those above mentioned which he may lawfully use or exercise for mining purposes or for discovering the existence of gold.

REQUIREMENTS PRELIMINARY TO THE ISSUE OF LEASES.

I. For the information of the holders of miner's rights, every person desirous of obtaining a lease of auriferous Crown lands in the mining district of Maryborough, shall, previous to making application (as hereinafter directed), erect, or cause to be erected, at each angle of the land proposed to be leased, a post not less than three inches square and standing at least three feet in height above the surface of the ground, and shall affix upon each post a board with the words "Applied for Lease," together with the name of the applicant and the extent of the area applied for legibly painted thereon, and such posts shall be maintained at the expense of the applicant until the land shall have been officially surveyed. The applicant will also be required to publish in one or more of the local newspapers, and at least seven days previous to the consideration of his application, full particulars of such application, together with a description of the land applied for.

II. Every person applying for a lease of auriferous Crown lands in the mining district of Maryborough, shall apply for such lease by addressing to the Chief Secretary through the nearest warden of the mining district an application in duplicate in the form in schedule hereunto appended marked A.; and the warden shall, as soon as it may be conveniently done, enter or cause to be entered, in a book to be kept for the purpose, such application, numbered according to the order in which it shall have been received, and shall thereupon and upon receipt of the deposit in the application referred to, give to the applicant a certificate and receipt in the form in schedule hereunto annexed marked B., and the priority of every application shall be determined according to the time at which it was so received and entered as aforesaid.

III. At the time of applying as aforesaid for a lease, the applicant must deposit with the warden (in addition to a sufficient sum to cover the charges of survey) the sum of Ten pounds, as a guarantee for payment of any expenses which may be incurred by reason of any objection to such application being allowed. And whether such objection shall be allowed or not, any surplus which may remain over expenses incurred shall be returned to the applicant.

IV. Every person who shall hereafter apply for a lease under these regulations, shall deposit with the warden a sum equal to six months' rent (computed at the rate hereinafter specified), of the land so applied for; and in the event of any lease being subsequently refused, such deposit may and shall be returned to the applicant without any deduction whatsoever. But if the application is withdrawn by the intending lessee, he shall forfeit a sum equivalent to three months' rent of the land proposed to be leased, together with all the expenses which may have been actually incurred for the purposes of survey.

N.B. Printed copies of the forms A., B., C., will be issued at the office of the wardens of the district, free of expense.

OFFICIAL SURVEY.

I. Upon receipt of such application and money aforesaid, the warden shall direct the surveyor to proceed to the land applied for, and survey the same, and furnish the warden with a report thereon as to the area, boundaries, and description hereof, and the character of the ground, as also any claims to prior occupancy which may come under his notice while making the survey, accompanied by a plan thereof on the scale of two chains to the inch, together with a tracing of so much of the general map of the district, on the scale of six inches to a mile, as will suffice for connecting the particular area applied for with at least one fixed point in the district; and the warden shall transmit such report, plan, and tracing to the Chief Secretary with as little delay as under the circumstances may be possible.

II. When the surveyor shall proceed to make his survey, he shall remove the posts erected by the applicant, and shall mark out the land applied for, by fixing at each angle thereof, and at distances not exceeding one hundred yards in the side lines thereof, a post, painted white, and standing at least three feet above the surface of the ground, and shall affix upon some conspicuous place within the boundaries of the land applied for a notice, dated on the day of such survey, setting forth, in the form of the schedule hereunto annexed marked C., the description of the land applied for and the address of the applicant, and such notice shall be effectually secured by the surveyor.

III. In the event of more than one application being made for the same land, or any part thereof, each of such applications shall be dealt with according to its priority.

OBJECTIONS.

I. Any person objecting to the issue of such lease to any applicant, shall, within twelve clear days after the date of the notice posted on the land by the surveyor as aforesaid, forward to the warden of the district, and also to the applicant at the address stated in such notice posted as aforesaid, full notice of all objections against the issue of such lease to the applicant.

II. Every person so objecting shall (except in cases of interference or encroachment which are hereinafter provided) deposit with the warden the sum of Five pounds as security for the due prosecution of his objections, and in satisfaction of expenses to which the applicant may be put by such objections; and if such objection should not be prosecuted, or if such much of such sum shall be handed over to the applicant by the warden be declared necessary to defray the expenses of the applicant, and the balance (if any) shall be returned to the person objecting.

III. When application shall have been made for any ground, to the whole or any part of which, or to any course, or other easement within the boundaries of person other than the applicant shall claim to be entitled by virtue of prior occupation under a miner's right or license, the objection to the granting of such lease may be by the warden in the same way as a case of encroachment under the provisions of the Gold Fields Act.

IV. If any person shall enter upon or occupy any ground for which application shall have been made under these regulations, subsequently to the making of, and whilst such application is under consideration, such occupation or entry shall be deemed to operate to prevent the issue of a lease to the said applicant.

ENQUIRY INTO APPLICATIONS AND OBJECTIONS.

I. After the expiration of the twelve days, exclusive of Sunday, Good Friday, and Christmas Day, allowed for objections, the warden shall proceed to hold, at a time and place to be named by him, an enquiry into the truth of the particulars stated by the applicant and of the objections made by each objector.

II. At such enquiry the warden or other officer shall receive such information as the parties may offer, and as he may think pertinent to his enquiry; and immediately after such enquiry, or, should there be no objections, immediately after the expiration of the twelve days allowed for objections, he shall forward to the office of the Chief Secretary the application and objections thereto, if any, and his report thereon.

III. Every applicant who shall require the same shall be furnished with a copy of the mining surveyor's report, and plan of the ground sought to be leased, and shall also be entitled to examine the warden's report, and to make or cause to be made a copy of the same for his own use and guidance.

LEASES.

I. All leases to be applied for, and which it may be proposed to grant for mining purposes, shall be designated "Gold Mining Leases."

II. The Governor may, if he shall think fit, issue to any applicant who has complied with such of these regulations as refer to his application, a lease of the land applied for, or any

part thereof, after the time prescribed by the eleventh section of the Gold Fields Act, viz., one month after notice of the intention to grant the same shall have been published in the *Government Gazette*.

III. In any case in which an application shall have been made in pursuance of these regulations for a lease of land in any part of which any person other than the applicant may be entitled to cut, construct, or use any race or dam, or to any other easement for mining purposes, the Governor may, if he shall think fit, authorise the issuing of a lease of such land, subject to all existing rights in, to, or to the use of such race, or dam, or other easement, and impose such terms as the said Governor may think fit, in order to secure the enjoyment of the same, or to secure compensation for any injury or inconvenience likely to arise to such person by reason of the issuing of such lease.

IV. Every lease will bear *date* the day of the execution thereof by the Governor, and may be obtained at the office of warden, who shall deliver the same to the applicant, or such person as shall be duly authorised to receive the same, upon receipt of a fee of £1.

V. *The parcel of land demised shall be in all cases in the form of a quadrilateral figure (except where it is impracticable by reason of the adjoining land being occupied, or from insuperable impediments), and the maximum length thereof shall not, except as hereinafter provided, exceed more than thrice the maximum breadth, and shall be described in the lease by such metes and bounds as shall have been reported by the surveyor and approved by the Chief Secretary, upon report of the warden.*

VI. *The term of the lessee in the land demised cannot in any case exceed ten years.*

VII. *The extent of the areas of leases shall be (except in special cases hereinafter provided for) not more than twenty acres nor less than two acres; but lands comprised in any two or more leases the total areas of which do not exceed in the whole fifty acres may be worked conjointly, provided that the value of the machinery employed, and the capital expended thereon, be equal to the aggregate amounts named in the respective leases.*

VIII. *The rents reserved shall be at the rate of Five pounds per acre per annum, and the said rents shall be made payable half-yearly in advance during the entire term, and the day of the execution of the lease shall be deemed to be the day upon which the first payment shall be made.*

IX. In all leases hereafter to be applied for, the land shall be demised, and the rent reserved, as herein prescribed.

SPECIAL CASES.

I. Whenever any person shall have purchased the right, title, or interest of any puddler or miner to or in any land intended to be applied for on lease, such puddler or miner may continue to work and mine the said land, if any agreement has been or hereafter be entered into to that effect between the parties, and the applicant receives his lease and requires the use of the land, and it shall not be competent for any Commissioner of Lands to remove any such person contrary to the agreement entered into: Provided, however, that the warden shall judge who shall decide conclusively as to the existence of such agreement.

where it shall be shown that a departure from the rents or rents would under special circumstances be the same may be diminished, extended, or otherwise the Governor, and such covenants, conditions, and may be imposed, and such rents and royalties by the said Governor may be considered necessary: that the warden shall not investigate any application of less extent of land than the maximum or minimum hereinbefore stated, without a special order from Secretary; and further provided that any such special already made or which shall hereafter be made shall priority as in cases of ordinary applications.

In addition to gold mining leases, leases of lands required construction of dams, or for sites for the erection of machinery, and whereon it is not proposed to mine for gold, and of which shall in no case exceed ten acres, may also be granted, and such leases shall be subject to an annual rent of one pound per acre, payable half-yearly in advance; and such special lease shall not entitle the holder thereof to mine in or upon any land so leased; and if any land so leased and occupied shall afterwards prove to be auriferous, the occupiers thereof shall be liable to be removed therefrom upon payment of compensation by persons desirous of entering thereon for mining purposes, the amount of such compensation to be determined by a warden, or warden and assessors, and such lease shall thereupon be deemed to be absolutely void.

IV. These regulations shall take effect and come into operation on the 1st day of November next ensuing.

MUNICIPALITY OF BRIGHTON.

BYE-LAW No. 29.—TO REPEAL BYE-LAW No. 5 OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF BRIGHTON, AND TO ENACT A NEW BYE-LAW FOR THE REGULATION OF BATHING ON THE SEA COAST WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BRIGHTON.

WHEREAS it hath been found expedient to repeal bye-law No. 5 of the municipal council of Brighton, entitled, *A bye-law for the regulation of bathing on the sea coast within the municipal district of Brighton*, and to enact another in lieu thereof: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Brighton, under the authority vested in them by the Act 18th Victoria No. 15, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, the said bye-law No. 5 shall be and is hereby repealed, and the following is substituted in lieu thereof:—

The western boundary or sea frontage of the municipal district of Brighton shall be laid out in four equal sections, and shall be divided with finger-posts with lettered notices thereon denoting the bathing ground for ladies or gentlemen respectively. The divisions set apart for females shall be exclusively reserved for their use, except only the space within any enclosures attached to any bathing establishments which may hereafter be erected by the consent of the council, which consent must be first obtained prior to the erection of any such bathing establishment; and no male will be allowed to use the open beach for the purpose of bathing at any time in the sea within the limits set apart for females, nor within the limits to be marked from the finger-posts which denote the bathing ground for females, the said distance being denoted by white posts placed at high water mark. No male person shall linger about that portion of the beach set apart for females, nor within a distance of 200 yards back from high water mark at any time when the place is occupied by females, either bathing, apparently about to bathe, or having just bathed.

Any person who shall act in contravention of any of the provisions of this bye-law shall, upon conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

MUNICIPALITY OF DAYLESFORD.

BYE-LAW No. 7.—FOR THE CONDUCTING OF PUBLIC MEETINGS OF THE RATEPAYERS AND OF ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF COUNCIL, AND FOR REGULATING THE PROCEEDINGS AT THE ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN, ETC.

WHEREAS by an Act of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria and the Legislative Council thereof, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria* (18 Victoria No. 15), the council of any municipal district is empowered to frame bye-laws for (inter alia) the conduct of public meetings, the regulations for the election of members of council, and for the election of their chairman: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Daylesford, that from and after the assent of His Excellency the Governor of the colony being given to this bye-law, the following regulations shall be in force, with respect to municipal elections in this district, namely:—

1. It shall be lawful for the chairman to appoint, under his hand and seal, such and so many persons as to him may seem necessary to act as poll clerk or poll clerks, and to appoint such and so many places within the municipal district as he may deem necessary to be the polling place or places, and not being at any hotel, tavern, or inn; and it shall be lawful for him to adjourn the meeting to some hour of the day which shall be more convenient to the ratepayers; and thereat any ratepayer, being on the ratepayers' roll, may present himself as a candidate, or any two ratepayers on the roll may propose and second a candidate.

2. If at any election a poll shall be demanded in the manner and form required by the said Act, the chairman shall cause to be provided, at the polling place or places, a sufficient number of stalls or compartments, together with ink and pens, for the purpose of enabling the elector to mark the voting papers, as in hereinafter provided, in any which polling place no person other than the chairman, the town clerk or his deputy (appointed by him and approved by the chairman), poll clerk or poll clerks, scrutineers, or electors who shall for the time being be tendering their votes, shall be entitled to be present; and any other person than such chairman, town clerk or his deputy, scrutineers, or electors who shall for the time being be tendering their votes, who shall intrude behind the barrier, and upon being requested to withdraw by the chairman shall refuse to do so, shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the provisions of this bye-law: Provided always that it shall be lawful for the chairman, or the town clerk or his deputy, to summon to his assistance in such compartment or room, any member or members of the police force, for the purpose of preserving the public peace, quelling any breach thereof that may have arisen, and for removing out of such room any person or persons who may, in his opinion, be obstructing the polling or wilfully violating any of the provisions of this bye-law, and upon being convicted thereof before any two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the said district, every such person or persons so offending shall forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20).

3. The chairman in each polling place shall cause to be provided, for the purpose of such election, a locked-up box (of which he shall keep the key), with a cleft or opening therein capable of receiving the voting papers, and which box shall stand in front of the chairman, and each elector shall receive from the chairman a voting paper in the form as in the schedule hereunto annexed, and shall thereupon retire to a stall or com-

partment provided for that purpose, and there strike out the name or names of such candidates as he does not intend to vote for, and deposit said voting paper in the beforementioned box, in the presence of the chairman, town clerk or his deputy, and scrutineers; and in case such elector shall be unable to read or be blind, he shall signify the same to the chairman, who shall thereupon mark or strike out the names of such candidates as such elector shall designate; and no elector shall take out of such polling place any such voting paper, either before or after he has marked the same. And any person wilfully infringing any of the provisions of this clause, or obstructing the polling by any unnecessary delay in performing any act within the polling place, shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the meaning of this bye-law, and on being convicted thereof before any two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the said district, shall forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20).

4. Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint by writing under his hand, to be delivered to the chairman at any time before Eight o'clock in the morning of the polling day, one scrutineer to be present on his behalf in the polling place:

5. It shall be lawful for the chairman, or any scrutineer, to put to any person, on his applying for and before he shall have received his voting paper, the following questions, viz.:—

1st. What is your christian name and surname?

2nd. Are you of twenty-one years of age?

3rd. Are you a ratepayer on the ratepayers' roll of the municipal district of Daylesford?

4th. Have you paid all rates levied upon you except such as shall have become payable by you within six months before this election?

5th. Have you already voted at this election?

And if any person shall wilfully give a false answer to any of the questions aforesaid, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the meaning of this bye-law, and on being convicted thereof before any two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the said district, shall forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Ten pounds (£10).

6. At every election it shall be the duty of the town clerk or his deputy to provide himself with the ratepayers' roll, and as each elector comes forward to demand his voting paper, to see whether the name of such elector appears upon the roll as a ratepayer within the meaning of the said Act, and as such elector deposits his voting paper within the beforementioned box, to mark off such elector's name as having voted at such election.

7. In case the voting paper as of any person shall have been received, and any other person shall afterwards demand his voting paper as of the same person, the chairman, when such person shall propose to deposit his voting paper in the aforesaid box, shall refuse to allow the same to be put therein, but shall receive and keep the same apart, and at the close of the election decide whether such person has already voted or not; and for the purpose of such decision it shall be lawful for the chairman to take evidence upon oath or affirmation, and such decision shall be final and conclusive on all parties; and if it shall appear to the chairman that such person has not already voted at such election, such vote shall be added to the number already polled, but if otherwise, such vote shall not be allowed.

8. At the close of the poll, or as soon afterwards as conveniently may be, the chairman, in the presence of the scrutineers, shall count the number of votes polled for each candidate, and if, on the state of the poll being announced, the number of votes shall have been found to be equal for any two or more candidates, the chairman shall, by a casting vote or votes, as the case may be, decide which of the candidates for whom the votes may be equal shall be elected, and the chairman shall then, in the presence of the scrutineers, seal up all the voting papers given during the election, and hand the same over to the town clerk for safe custody amongst the records of the council.

9. That all places within which polling is conducted shall be deemed public places.

10. The chairman of the council shall be elected annually, in the following manner, namely:—At the first meeting of council after the annual election, which meeting shall be convened by the retiring chairman, the senior councillor then present shall take the chair at the hour mentioned in the notice calling the meeting, provided the whole council is present, otherwise at the expiry of half an hour thereafter, and the councillors shall proceed by ballot to elect a chairman for the current year, and the councillor in whose favor the ballot shall result shall be declared by the acting chairman to be the chairman of the council for the current municipal year, and shall take the chair accordingly.

11. If the result of voting for chairman should be that the highest number of votes is held equally by two councillors, the chairman shall then decide by his casting vote; but if by more than two councillors, then another voting shall take place for those councillors only holding such equality of votes until a majority is recorded.

12. Upon the resignation or disqualification of the chairman of the council, at the next meeting of the council thereafter, the senior councillor then present shall take the chair *pro tem.*, and immediately after the confirmation of the minutes of the preceding meeting shall proceed to the election of a chairman of the council for the residue of the municipal year in manner prescribed by this bye-law.

13. In determining the seniority of councillors for the purpose of this bye-law, it shall be understood to mean those councillors who shall have held office for the longest period without re-election, having the greatest number of votes when elected; and in cases where two or more councillors are alike in period of service and number of votes, then the council shall decide by vote which shall be deemed the senior councillor.

14. And it is hereby further enacted by the said municipal council, that any person convicted before any two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the district of a breach of

this bye-law, or of any of its regulations or provisions to which breach no particular penalty is hereinbefore attached, shall, for every such offence, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20).

MUNICIPALITY OF EMERALD HILL.

BYE-LAW NO. 28.—A BYE-LAW FOR THE REGULATION OF PUBLIC VEHICLES WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF EMERALD HILL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act to make bye-laws for the regulation of public vehicles, and for the general good rule and government of such municipal district: and whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the 26th day of May, A.D. 1855, the District of Emerald Hill was duly established a municipal district under the provisions and within the meaning of the said Act; and whereas it is expedient to make a bye-law for the regulation of hackney carriages and other vehicles plying for hire within the limits of the said district: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the council of the said district, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, as required by the provisions of the said Act:—

1. That such places as the said council shall from time to time appoint, shall be stands for public vehicles plying for hire within the municipal district aforesaid; provided that the council may from time to time, as they shall see fit, alter the situations and number of the said stands so appointed, and of the vehicles on each stand; six clear days' notice of such appointment and of any alteration shall be given by the said council by advertisement in one newspaper published within the city of Melbourne, and in a local newspaper.
2. That the owner or driver of any public vehicle shall not permit any part of such vehicle, or of any horse drawing the same, to stand within twenty feet of the corner of any street, whether for hire or otherwise.
3. That at every fourth vehicle on each stand there shall be left a space of at least six feet for passengers to pass through.
4. That public vehicles shall take their stations on the stand in the order of their arrival, and when any vehicle shall be called or driven off any stand the vehicle immediately behind shall draw up to the vacated place, and any other vehicle behind in the like order.
5. That no driver of any public vehicle shall suffer the same to stand for hire across any street or alongside of any other public vehicle, nor obstruct the driver of any other vehicle in taking up or setting down any person, nor wilfully, wrongfully, or forcibly prevent or endeavor to prevent the driver of any other vehicle from taking a fare.
6. That no owner or driver of any public vehicle shall permit his vehicle, with or without horses, to stand in any street, lane or thoroughfare, or public place, longer than may be necessary for loading or unloading, or taking up and putting down any passenger, except while standing for hire in some lawful place appointed for that purpose as provided by this bye-law, or waiting for the hirer.
7. That no driver or conductor of any public vehicle shall carry, or knowingly permit to be carried, in any such vehicle, within the said municipal district, except to some police office or watch-house, any person so noisily or violently conducting himself or herself or otherwise so misbehaving as to occasion any public annoyance or disturb the public peace.
8. That the driver of every public vehicle shall be constantly attendant on the same when plying on any public stand or otherwise engaged for hire within the said municipal district.
9. That every public vehicle plying for hire or engaged after sunset or before sunrise within the said municipal district shall be provided with proper carriage lights, and the driver shall keep the same lighted while so plying or engaged for hire.
10. That the driver of every public vehicle shall place a muzzle upon the head of any vicious horse used or employed by him, and keep the same thereon while on any stand within the said district.
11. That every driver of a public vehicle who shall feed any horse while on any stand within the said district shall use a nose-bag to contain the forage, and shall not remove the blinkers from any horse during the time of feeding.

12. That the words "public vehicle" and "vehicle" where used in this bye-law shall be understood to mean all coaches, omnibuses, cars, cabs, and other carriages plying for hire, or carrying passengers for hire, within the municipal district of Emerald Hill, whether at separate and distinct fares for each passenger or at one fare for the whole vehicle or otherwise, and not impelled otherwise than by animal power; the word "owner" shall signify every person possessed of a beneficial interest in any public vehicle; and the word "conductor" shall include every person, other than the driver, who shall attend upon any public vehicle or upon the passengers therein; and whenever in this bye-law with reference to any person, animal, matter, or thing, any word or words is or are used importing the singular number only, yet such word or words shall be understood to include several persons, animals, matters, or things, unless there be something in the subject or context repugnant thereto.

13. For every offence against any of the provisions of this bye-law the offender shall, upon conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.
