**ALLOWANCES TO WITNESSES.
ORDER IN COUNCIL.**

At the Government House, Melbourne, the 22nd day of October, 1860.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor
Mr. Nicholson Mr. Bailey

Mr. McCulloch

WHEREAS by two several Orders of the Governor in Council, bearing date respectively the second day of October, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and the twenty-third day of January, One thousand eight hundred and sixty, certain rates of allowances to be made to witnesses and interpreters summoned to attend at the Supreme and Circuit Courts and Courts of General Sessions, were prescribed: And whereas it is expedient to alter the said rates and make others in lieu thereof, as also to provide for the travelling expenses and attendance of witnesses and interpreters attending Courts of Petty Sessions, inquests, and magisterial enquiries, and entitled to allowances under the Appropriation Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that on and after the first day of January next, the rates aforesaid shall cease and determine, and that on and after that day the allowances to be made to witnesses and interpreters required to attend at any of the courts aforesaid shall be as follows, that is to say:—

FOR TRAVELLING.

1. To every witness or interpreter, not being a police sergeant, constable, or convict, the sum actually paid, but not exceeding One shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) for every mile he may reside from the court at which he is required to attend.
2. To every witness, being a police sergeant or constable, and not using a Government horse or vehicle in going to or returning from the court at which he is required to attend, the sum actually paid, but not exceeding One shilling (1s.) for every mile he may reside from such court.
3. To every witness, being a police sergeant or constable, and using a Government horse or vehicle in going to or returning from the court at which he is required to attend, the sum actually paid for forage, but not exceeding Sixpence (6d.) for every mile he may reside from such court.
4. To every witness, being a convict, a ration of provisions in kind, but no money allowance whatever.
5. To every witness and interpreter who may travel by ship, coach, or railway, the sum actually and properly paid for fares, both in going to and returning from the court at which he may be required to attend.

NOTE.

No allowance will be made to any witness or interpreter residing within three miles of the court which he may be required to attend.

In all cases, where practicable, witnesses and interpreters must travel by ship, coach, or railway, and in such part of the vessel, vehicle, or train as may be suitable to their station in life, as the allowance will be no greater than if they had so travelled.

Any witness or interpreter paid ship, coach, or railway fares under the fifth clause will not be entitled to any allowance under any of the preceding clauses for the distance which he may travel by ship, coach, or railway.

10. To every witness who may be necessarily prevented from proceeding on his journey, or to his place of abode by ship or otherwise, the same allowance from the date of detention up to the day of departure as paid to witnesses residing beyond twenty (20) miles from the court. See 3rd column.

NOTE.—The abstract of payments to witnesses and interpreters must be certified at the supreme and circuit courts by the Crown solicitor; at courts of general sessions by the clerk of the peace, countersigned by the Crown prosecutor as inspected and approved; at courts of petty sessions by the police magistrate or chairman of the bench; at inquests by the coroner; and at magisterial enquiries by the magistrate.

And the Honorable John Dennistoun Wood, Her Majesty's Attorney General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

LANDS RESERVED IN THE VICINITY OF BAL-
LAARAT.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of the power in him vested in this behalf, has, by an Order made on the 24th day of September, 1860, reserved the lands hereinafter described, situate in the vicinity of Ballarat, for public purposes, viz. —

LAND COVERED BY LAKE BURRUMBEET.—Five thousand five hundred acres, more or less, county of Ripon, being the lake known as Lake Burrumbeet.

LAND AT PINCOTT'S CREEK, CONTAINING GRANITE QUARRIES.—One hundred and fifty acres, more or less, counties of Grant and Grenville, at the junction of Pincott's Creek and the Yarroovee River: Commencing at the south-west angle of allotment 12, section 3, parish of Warreneep; bounded on the south by a line bearing south 65 degrees 29 minutes west about twenty-one chains; thence by a line, bearing about north 9 degrees west twenty-seven chains fifty links, more or less; thence by a line bearing about north 19 degrees east fifty chains, more or less; thence by a line at right angles to the last line, bearing south-easterly about twenty-two chains to Pincott's Creek; and by that creek southerly to the point of its junction with the Yarroovee River; thence by a creek southerly to the point of commencement.

LAND AROUND MOUNT BUNINYONG.—Five hundred and seventy-eight acres, more or less, county of Grant, parish of Buninyong: Commencing at the north-east angle of portion 52, parish of Buninyong: bounded on the north-west by the south-east side of the road leading to Melbourne via Lal-lal, following said road in a north-easterly direction to a point bearing due west of the south-west angle of portion A; thence by a line and the south boundary of portion A bearing east to a point bearing north of allotment 7, adjoining Scott's pre-emptive purchase; thence by a line south to allotment 7; thence by the west and part of the north boundary of allotment 7 to the north-east angle of allotment 5; thence by the north and west boundaries of allotment 5 to the north-east side of the main line of road from Geelong to Buninyong following said road to the east boundary of portion 83; thence by the east boundaries of portions 83, 64, 63, and 52, bearing north to the point of commencement.

BYE-LAW No. 29.—A BYE-LAW TO PREVENT THE INTRODUCTION OF RATS WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BALLAARAT.

BE it ordered and directed by the Municipal Council of the district of Ballarat, in accordance with the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, it shall not be lawful for any person to convey or cause to be conveyed through any portion of the municipal district of Ballarat, any rats whether for baiting or otherwise: And be it further ordered and directed that no person or persons shall be allowed either for themselves or as agents, to receive any consignment of such vermin, or shall be allowed to have any such on their premises of which they may be the owner or occupier, or to have any such in their possession for any purpose whatsoever. And any person or persons offending against this bye-law shall, upon conviction before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Fifty pounds.

Printed forms of tender may be obtained from the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne, or the officer in charge of the police at each station, by whom also any information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

The tenders for each station will be accepted or rejected separately.

At stations where oats and bran cannot readily be procured, the tenders may be for hay or straw only: when all the supplies are included in one tender, it will, if advisable, be accepted for hay or straw, and not for the other articles.

2. The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the officer in charge of the district or station, the quantities stated in the schedule being, however, only approximative, and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than stated. The excess over the estimate will, however, in no case exceed 50 per cent.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the military commissariat.

4. The forage when delivered must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly, in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Government Stores, Melbourne, or the Treasury Pay Office of the district, as may be indicated on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours from a reasonable time to be fixed on the order, it will be competent for the department, should circumstances require it, to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage, as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when from some other cause injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. APPLICATIONS TO GOVERNMENT.

Urgent applications were made to have a bridge erected over the Moyno, to connect the jetty and approaches with the town side of the river, but the law officers of the crown were of opinion that according to the interpretation of the Appropriation Act, the money could not be so expended.

That £4000 to make the Mount Napier road, £500 for the erection of a public wharf, £3000 for harbor improvements, and £3000 for the erection of a bridge over the Moyno at Belfast East, be placed on the estimates for the ensuing year.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The bridge over the Moyno at Belfast East has been temporarily repaired by the council, the Government having refused to repair same.

Several contracts for repairs of portions of the Rosebrook road have been taken and performed satisfactorily.

Contracts for repairing Prince street and Cox street have been taken and satisfactorily performed, and contracts for repairing William street and Ruffe's cross road at Rosebrook, have also been taken, but are not yet completed.

Tenders were called for forming and making William street, near Campbell street, but the successful tenderer having withdrawn his tender, fresh tenders will have to be called for. Several contracts of minor importance have been satisfactorily performed.

A committee was appointed to confer with Mr. Woodward on the propriety of altering the present line of the Mount Napier road, and the line proposed by Mr. Woodward has been agreed upon.

The Public Health Act has been extended to Belfast, and Dr. Boyd has been appointed honorary medical officer to the local board.

The sites for a bathing place and market reserve have been fixed upon, but the site for a town hall has not yet been definitely settled.

BOTANICAL GARDENS.

A sum of £200 was given by the Government for the present year for the support of the gardens, on condition that the council expended a similar amount, which was agreed to, and the amount granted by the Government has been received.

FINANCE.

On the 11th of July the first instalment of the grant-in-aid, amounting to £1261, was received, and a voucher for the balance, amounting to £471, has been received and returned signed to the Treasury.

The members of the council had made themselves personally responsible to the bank for an advance of £1200, which has been paid.

The amount of revenue arising from this district is capable of considerable increase, but there is no clue to the large quantities of gold taken to Melbourne by private escort, and no licenses

are included where the moneys have been paid into the Treasury in Melbourne, or the Sub-Treasury, Sandhurst. There is also an error of £8289 10s. in the gold license return.

The amended return of expenditure showed that only £5612 8s. 9d. had been expended on roads and bridges, and of this amount only £749 4s. in Heathcote, £1200 on the Sandhurst road over the Melvor Creek, £3792 at Pyalong in the electoral and police district of Kilmore, £2093 on the Axe Creek near Sandhurst, £777 9s. on the Campaspe half way to Sandhurst.

The council were, however, satisfied with an approximate return; they, however, felt it their duty to send to the Chief Secretary a protest against the incorrect statements of the Commissioner of Roads and Bridges, who, in the face of facts, had asserted that the previous return showed more clearly the true amount expended for the sole benefit of Heathcote.
