IN pursuance of an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the nineteenth year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act to provide for the Election of Members to serve in the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Victoria respectively*: I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation appoint that

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the several places mentioned in the second column of the schedule hereunto annexed shall be respectively polling places for the purpose of taking the poll at any contested election of Members to serve in the Legislative Assembly of Victoria for the electoral District of Avoca; and that all votes in respect of qualifications within the boundaries and limits of the several divisions of such District mentioned or referred to in the first and third columns of the same schedule shall be taken at any election for such District at the polling place or polling places in the first column of the same schedule set opposite to the respective names of such divisions, that is to say:—

PROPOSED WIDENING OF THE QUEENSCLIFF ROAD, COUNTY OF GRANT.

135. *Extent of claim in worked and abandoned ground.*—Bye-law numbered ninety-seven (97) shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu:—The extent of claim in worked and abandoned ground (other than on the beds of creeks or rivers), where the depth of sinking does not exceed forty feet, shall be

Where four men are employed ...	100 yards x 100 yards

136. *Extent of claims on quartz reefs.*—Bye-law numbered fifty-seven (57) shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—The extent of claim on quartz reefs shall not exceed eighty yards in length on the reef by a width of one hundred and fifty yards, both horizontal measurement; provided that one man be kept employed for every ten yards comprised in such claim, except during the first four months after registration, which time is allowed for prospecting, and during which two men shall be sufficient to hold the entire claim.

137. *Extent of claims on the Eldorado.*—Bye-law numbered thirteen (13) shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—The extent of claim which may be occupied by each claimholder on that portion of the Woolshed Creek situated between a point known as the upper boundary of Kneebone's claim and the junction of the said creek with the Owens River, shall be eight hundred yards in length by four hundred yards in width; it being imperative upon the claimholder to keep at least one man constantly employed upon such claim for every fifty yards in length of such claim; except during the time occupied in sinking the pump hole, during which time the employment of ten men on such claim shall be held to be sufficient occupation.

138. *Area of prospect claim.*—Bye-law numbered one hundred and three (103) shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—Any person or persons mining for the purpose of making a discovery of new gold workings where the same has not been previously discovered, shall be entitled to occupy an area of ground for mining purposes according to the following dimensions:—Where the probable depth of the contemplated sinking does not exceed one hundred feet (100 feet), the area shall be 500 yards x 500 yards; exceeding 100 feet and not exceeding 200 feet, 700 yards x 700 yards; exceeding 200 feet, 1000 yards x 750 yards; and these areas shall be termed for the purposes of these bye-laws, "Temporary prospecting claims."

Immediately after a discovery of gold workings has been made in any temporary prospecting claim, the occupiers thereof shall be entitled to hold as their claim a square block, the sides of which in wet ground shall be six times, and in partially wet or dry ground four times, the length of claim to which such description of gold workings would entitle them on gold workings which had been previously discovered; except in that portion of the Woolshed Creek commencing at the upper boundary of Kneebone's claim, and extending to the junction of that creek with the Owens River; and excepting also in cases of the discovery of quartz reefs, where the size of claim after a discovery shall be three hundred yards in width by one hundred and sixty yards in length.

Any person or persons occupying a temporary prospect claim in any locality where the distance from the nearest discovered payable ground is not less than five miles, such temporary prospect claim shall be twice the area hereinbefore prescribed for temporary prospect claims, and upon a discovery of payable ground being made therein, such person or persons shall be entitled to hold double the area which they would have been entitled to after a discovery as hereinbefore prescribed.

139. *Discovery of payable ground in prospect claim to be reported.*—Any person making a discovery of payable ground within any temporary prospecting claim shall, without any unnecessary delay, make a report, in writing, to the warden or surveyor of the division in which such discovery has been made, and such report shall state, firstly, date of discovery; secondly, the yield of gold obtained from a specified quantity of wash-dirt or quartz; thirdly, whether wet, partially wet, or dry;

fourthly, the depth of sinking; and fifthly, a most accurate description of the immediate locality in which the discovery has been made. Any person not complying with this bye-law shall be subject to the penalty imposed by the 126th section of the Gold Fields Act, 21 Victoria No. 32.

140. *Number of men to be employed on prospect claim.*—The number of men necessary to hold a prospect claim, either before or after payable ground has been discovered, shall be the same as would be necessary to hold a claim (other than a prospect claim) in the same class of workings.

141. *Extent of area of claim where expensive machinery is required.*—Bye-law numbered 99 shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu:—Any person cutting an expensive tail race, or erecting expensive machinery for the purpose of working previously wrought and abandoned ground, shall be entitled to occupy, in addition to the claim held by him under any bye-law, an extended claim equal to four entire claims of the same class. Such occupation shall exist until such tail race is completed or such machinery erected; after which event any person thinking that such extended claim is excessive, and desiring to occupy the whole or any portion thereof, shall apply to the warden, who, by himself or with assessors, as the case may be, shall decide what portion (if any) of the extended claim the owner of such tail race or machinery shall be entitled to occupy in consideration thereof, which occupation shall be legal until the ground is abandoned; the remainder (if any) of the extended claim shall be deemed to be forfeited.

142. *Area for quartz crushing machinery.*—Any person proceeding to erect, or having erected, machinery for the purpose of quartz crushing, shall be allowed for such purpose to occupy an area of ground not exceeding two acres in extent; the length of such shall not exceed twice the width.

143. *Road or tramway to or from a claim to be permitted.*—Any person requiring to form a road or tramway to or from his occupied claim on a reef or other workings, shall be allowed to occupy for such purpose, except as against existing rights, any ground required for such road or tramway; provided always that the same is registered at the office of the warden.

144. *Provision for mining on ground on which any race is constructed.*—Bye-law numbered eighty-three (83) shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—Any person being desirous of mining upon ground through or by which any race or tail race is constructed, may divert such race or tail race; provided that he shall substitute in lieu thereof a race or tail race, as the case may be, equally available to the persons originally entitled to such race or tail race; but under no pretence whatever, except as provided for in this bye-law, shall any person be permitted to obstruct, damage, or otherwise interfere with any race or tail race.

145. *Protection to sides of tail races.*—Bye-law numbered eleven (11) shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—Any person occupying a claim on ground on which any tail race has been cut previous to the occupation of such claim, and is in occupation, shall not be held to occupy within a distance of ten feet from the sides of such tail race, and where the depth of the tail race exceeds ten feet, shall not occupy within a distance from the sides of such tail race equal to the depth of the tail race.

Any person desirous of working the ground on which any tail race is situated, may do so by first providing a tail race equally available as the first tail race to the holder of the tail race.

146. *Reservoirs may be formed.*—Bye-law numbered forty-eight (48) shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—Any miner desirous of forming a reservoir shall make application to the warden, who, if satisfied that such reservoir is in no way likely to interfere with mining interests, may grant permission, in writing, authorising the formation thereof. Any person desirous of working the ground on which any reservoir is formed may do so, if he provides for the owners thereof a reservoir equal in value and availability to the original one.

147. *Notice to make water available to persons entitled to prior supply.*—Bye-law numbered sixty-five (65) shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—Any person in the occupation of a bed claim, or who may require water for washing auriferous substances at a creek or river, may give notice, in writing, to any person not entitled to a prior supply, to make the water (if any), or so much thereof as may be necessary to enable the person giving the notice to be supplied with the amount of water to which he is entitled, available, if in the Buckland, Three-mile creek, or Nine-mile divisions, within twenty-four hours after the receipt of such notice, and if in the Yackandandah, Spring Creek, Omeo, Woolshed, or Indigo divisions, forthwith upon the receipt of such notice. And any person in the occupation of a race for working claims other than bed claims requiring water, may give notice to any other person not entitled to a prior supply, to make the water (if any), or so much thereof as may be necessary to enable the person giving such notice to be supplied with the amount of water to which he is entitled, available within twenty-four hours. Any person refusing to obey such notice shall be liable to the penalties imposed by the 126th section of the Gold Fields Act.

148. *Adjoining claims may be united.*—Bye-law numbered one hundred and twenty-two (122) shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—The holders of adjoining claims may unite their respective claims for the purpose of working the same, except on that portion of the Woolshed Creek commencing at a point known as the upper boundary of Kneebone's claim, and terminating at the junction of the said Creek with the Owens River; provided that the same number of men shall be kept constantly employed within the limits of the united claim or in connection therewith as would have been necessary for the occupation of the same extent of ground if the claims had been wrought singly; but should any less number of men be employed thereon or in connection therewith, a portion of such claim proportionate to the deficiency in the number of men employed

thereon or in connection therewith shall be deemed to be forfeited. All such unions to be registered with the warden of the division in which such claims are situated, except in the case of frontage claims, the unions of which shall be registered with the mining surveyor of the division in which such claims are situated; provided always that where a creek claim is united to one or more claims of a different class, the water privileges of such creek claim shall not extend further than if such creek claim had not been united to any other.

149. *When claims shall be exempt from forfeiture.*—Bye-law numbered twenty-two (22) shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—When at any time claims which are in working order shall become unworkable from the failure of the usual and necessary supply of water (such supply being sufficient for at least three consecutive months in each year), or in consequence of floods, excessive drainage, or any other unavoidable cause, the warden may grant, in writing, a suspension of all working for such time as he shall think necessary (during which the claim shall not be liable to forfeiture), and may from time to time extend and enlarge such suspension at his discretion. A registry of all such suspensions to be kept by the wardens granting them.

150. *Forwarding work of a claim to be deemed occupation thereof.*—Bye-law numbered twenty-one (21) shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—When the number of men requisite to the occupation of a claim are employed in forwarding the works of such claim in any manner, they shall be deemed to be in legal occupation thereof.

151. *Claims to be worked by pegs.*—Bye-law numbered seventeen (17) shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—The boundaries of every claim shall be defined by a peg at least two feet above the surface, firmly fixed in the ground at each corner thereof, and such pegs shall be kept in their position during the occupation of the claim.

152. *Claims coming under frontage system.*—All claims in unworked alluvial ground (other than ground in beds of creeks or rivers) where the depth of sinking is not less than forty feet, shall be occupied under a classification, which for the purpose of these bye-laws shall be termed the frontage system; and all claims occupied under the frontage system shall be termed frontage claims.

153. *Length of frontage claim.*—The length of lead which any frontage claim shall comprise, shall, with the addition (provided for in bye-law No. 154) be determined in proportion to the depth of the prospect claim in which the discovery of the payable ground of such lead occurred, and shall bear the following ratio to the depth of said prospect claim, namely:—In wet ground, where the depth of the prospect claim is not less than forty feet, the length of lead to be comprised within the frontage claim adjoining the prospect claim shall be one hundred and twenty-five feet; and for every foot in excess of forty feet which the prospect claim is in depth, the adjoining frontage claim shall comprise one foot additional in length of the lead. In dry or partially wet ground, where the depth of the prospect claim is not less than forty feet, the length of lead to be comprised within the frontage claim adjoining the prospect claim shall be ninety feet; and for every foot in excess of forty feet which the prospect claim is in depth, the adjoining frontage claim shall comprise nine inches additional in length of the lead. Each frontage claim in wet or dry or partially wet ground, beyond the one adjoining the prospect claim, shall comprise the same length of lead as the frontage claim adjoining the prospect claim on the lead on which such claim is situated, together with the addition provided in bye-law No. 154.

154. *Increased length of claim.*—Measuring from the prospect claim in the direction of the dip of the payable ground, each claim shall comprise one foot more than the claim immediately preceding it.

155. *Width of frontage claims.*—The width of all frontage claims shall be one thousand yards, such width to be measured at right angles to the length of such frontage claim. When the payable ground within any frontage claim shall have been discovered, the width hereinbefore named shall be reduced to three times the length of such frontage claim. The boundaries of the claim which is so reduced need not be parallel to the base line in such claim, but must be parallel to one another. The position of such reduced width to be left optional to the claimholder.

156. *The surveyor to lay off frontage claims.*—All frontage claims shall be measured off in the following manner:—The surveyor shall measure off a right line along the course of the lead—this line to be termed the base line, and to be of such length as will admit of any number of claims, the length of which shall be determined according to the provisions of bye-law No. 153, which, in the aggregate, will measure nearest to but not exceed six hundred yards. On each side of the base line and parallel to it shall be measured off lines one thousand yards from one another, but not necessarily equidistant from the base line—these two lines to be termed side lines. Upon the base line shall be measured off the length of each claim, such lengths to be determined by the provisions of Bye-law No. 153; and at the points terminating the length of each claim, and at right angles to the base line, lines shall be produced to each side line; and these lines so produced, together with the portions of the side lines contained within them shall be the boundaries of all claims laid off upon such base line. The whole of the claims contained, within any two side lines shall be termed a block, but each claim within such block shall be separate and distinct, except where two or more are united as provided in bye-law No. 143.

157. *Blocks to be laid off.*—The surveyor shall lay off the first block so that its base line shall proceed from and be at right angles to either boundary, terminating the length of the prospect claim, and each succeeding block shall proceed from and be at right angles to the boundary limiting the length of the adjoining block. The direction of such succeeding block may be altered laterally, provided that its base and side lines

shall continue at right angles to the boundary limiting the length of the block which it adjoins, except in cases next hereinafter provided for.

158. *Direction of blocks may be altered.*—At the termination of any block the surveyor may lay off the next block at right angles to the claims in the block which it succeeds, but no variation except in a lateral direction shall be made except at right angles.

159. *Occupiers on a new lead to be entitled to the frontage claims on which their shafts are situated.*—Persons being in lawful occupation of a shaft within the limits of any surveyed frontage claim shall be entitled to the frontage claims in which the shaft is situated; but, immediately upon the boundaries of the frontage claim being defined, all portions of the claim which such persons held in connection with the said shaft previous to the measurement by the surveyor, shall be deemed forfeited and abandoned; and where two or more shafts are within the limits of any frontage claim, only the first occupier shall be entitled to it; but where a shaft is situated on any boundary line of two frontage claims, the occupier thereof shall be entitled to the frontage claim upon which the greater portion of their shaft is situated, excepting in such cases where prior occupants hold possession as provided in this bye-law.

160. *How frontage system is to be applied in certain cases.*—Bye-law numbered one hundred and twenty-one (121) shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—Where the sinking in any claim in alluvial ground not previously occupied under the frontage system shall exceed forty feet in depth, notice thereof shall be given to the surveyor by the occupier of such claim; and should the surveyor find that a series of five (5) consecutive shafts running in the same direction exceed the depth of forty feet, and indicate a continuous dip, he shall proclaim a lead in that direction; and all new ground in that direction shall be taken up under the frontage system, the centre shaft of the five before-mentioned shafts to constitute the prospect shaft for the purpose of defining the length of such frontage claim.

Immediately upon the depth of sinking being found to exceed forty feet upon any lead which has had its source in workings where the depth of sinking was less than forty feet, the surveyor shall, commencing at the prospect shaft, lay off claims in accordance with the frontage bye-laws; and the claim (if any) having priority of occupation and situated within the bounds of each frontage claim so laid off shall be entitled to all the spare ground within such frontage claim, subject to the rights of other claimholders already in occupation; but should any such claim be situated on the boundary dividing two frontage claims, it shall be deemed, for the purpose of this bye-law, to be within the bounds of the frontage claim nearest to the prospect shaft.

161. *Number of men to be employed on frontage claim.*—The occupier of any frontage claim shall, at and after the expiration of the time allowed for registration, keep not less than four men employed thereon, or in connection therewith (unless where otherwise provided for in these bye-laws). Should any less number of men be employed on such claim or in connection therewith, a portion thereof proportionate to the deficiency, in the number of men employed thereon or in connection therewith shall be deemed to be forfeited.

162. *Frontage claims to be registered.*—Within four clear days after a discovery has been made within a prospect claim, and the boundaries terminating the length thereof fully defined and laid off, should the nature of the ground come within the definition of frontage claims, all claims occupied on the gold workings discovered by such prospect claim, whether previously occupied or not, shall be registered with the mining surveyor of the division; and all claims taken up after such period has elapsed shall, within four days of the occupation of such claims, be registered with the mining surveyor aforesaid. Any claimholder not complying with this bye-law shall be deemed to have forfeited all right to such claim.

163. *Surveyor's duties.*—It shall be the duty of the mining surveyor appointed for any division, to define the length, width, and position of frontage claims within the division for which he is appointed, in accordance with the bye-laws of the Beechworth mining board, and generally to carry out the provisions of such bye-laws as relate to his duties.

164. *Surveyors' fees.*—Bye-laws numbered one hundred and nineteen (119) and one hundred and twenty (120) shall be and the same are hereby annulled and repealed, and the following are substituted in lieu thereof:—The fees which surveyors shall be entitled to demand shall be,—for registering and laying off a frontage claim and all operations connected therewith, together with marking the reduced width of the same, Ten shillings (10s.); for the registration of a union of claims, Two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.); and for registration of the notice of transfer of a claim, Two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.)

165. *Provision for frontage claims occupied under frontage bye-laws passed previous to 1st March, 1860.*—Any person occupying a frontage claim under bye-laws passed previous to the 1st day of March, One thousand eight hundred and sixty, shall be entitled to the claim (laid out under any bye-laws passed subsequent to that date) in which his shaft is situated, except in cases where two or more leads are so situated that if the widths provided for in bye-laws subsequent to that date are measured off upon any one lead such widths would include any other lead upon which other claimholders are in occupation, in which cases the surveyor shall have full power to determine how far the side lines of claims upon one lead shall approach towards another lead, and if necessary to diminish the width of claims upon any lead which is so circumstanced, from one thousand yards to any less width; provided that such diminution does not reduce the width to less than three times the length of the claim; and the width determined as provided in this bye-law, notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in any other bye-law, shall be deemed to be the width of all claims upon leads so circumstanced. Where a claim is so situated that its reduced width will include any portion of ground occupied by any other person, then the person first in legal occupation shall have a full claim;

and any ground occupied by any other person which may be included in such full claim shall be deemed to be forfeited immediately upon the reduced width of the claim of the prior occupant being reduced and measured off.

166. *Interpretation bye-law.*—In the construction, and for the purposes of the bye-laws of the Beechworth mining board, the following terms shall, if not inconsistent with the context or subject matter, have the respective meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say:—

1. The words "payable ground" shall mean the alluvial deposit or wash-dirt containing gold running in a continuous course or occurring successively and repeatedly in spots or patches.
2. The word "lead" shall mean the surface of the ground under which the payable ground is supposed to be situated.
3. The words "wet ground" (only as applied to frontage claims) shall mean all ground where the quantity of water which requires to be raised from the bottom of the shaft to the surface shall exceed 1200 gallons per twenty-four hours.
4. The words "partially wet ground" (only as applied to frontage claims) shall include all frontage claims where the quantity of water which requires to be raised from the bottom of the shaft to the surface does not exceed 1200 gallons per twenty-four hours.
5. The words "constantly employed" shall mean employment during usual working hours.
6. The words "person" or "persons," or "claimholder" or "claimowner," shall only have reference to persons legally entitled to mine upon the waste lands of the Crown.
7. The words "tail race" shall mean any description of race cut for the purpose of draining any claim or claims, or for carrying off the water used for sluicing or any other mining purpose.
8. The word "race" shall mean any channel made for the purpose of conveying water for mining purposes.
9. The words "surveyor" or "mining surveyor" shall mean the mining surveyor appointed by the Governor in Council.
10. The words "worked and abandoned ground" shall mean ground upon which shafts have been sunk and bottomed, and abandoned for a period of one month.

The undersigned members of the said mining board concurred in making the foregoing bye-laws.

MUNICIPALITY OF BRIGHTON.

BYE-LAW No. 2^a.—TO ENABLE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF BRIGHTON TO IMPOSE A RATE NOT EXCEEDING TWO SHILLINGS IN THE POUND ON THE RATEABLE PROPERTY WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BRIGHTON, FOR THE CURRENT YEAR, COMMENCING 10TH FEBRUARY, 1860, AND ENDING 10TH FEBRUARY, 1861.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to impose a rate on all houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district, according to the fair average annual value thereof, such rate not to exceed the sum of Two shillings in the pound of such value: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Brighton, by and with the consent of His Excellency the Governor, that a rate for the current municipal year of One shilling in the pound on the annual value of all property in houses and lands within the limits of the said municipal district be imposed and levied, and be due and payable in equal portions on the first day of June and the first day of November respectively, in the present year One thousand eight hundred and sixty.

BYE-LAW No. 13.—A BYE-LAW FOR MAKING AN ASSESSMENT AND IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND FOR THE YEAR 1860.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, a council of any municipal district is authorised and required to assess all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district (except property belonging to Her Majesty) according to its fair average annual value, and to impose a rate on all such properties for the

current year: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Brunswick, that all the several properties within the limits of the said municipal district shall be assessed for the year 1860, according to the several amounts of annual value respectively affixed to the same in the assessment roll confirmed by a bench of magistrates on Wednesday, 29th of February, 1860, and amounting to a total sum of Thirty-one thousand two hundred and ten pounds ten shillings (£31,210 10s.), and also that a rate of One shilling in the pound of said annual value is hereby imposed on all the said properties for the year 1860, the first moiety thereof to be due and payable on the second day of January, and the second moiety thereof on the second day of July, 1860.

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

WHITE HILLS, SANDHURST.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by Two hundred and fifty-nine householders resident within the municipal district of Sandhurst, praying for the erection of their locality into a separate municipal district.

The petitioners state that they are householders within the meaning of the Act 18 Victoria No. 15, and reside within the portion of the municipal district of Sandhurst subsequently described, and which they desire to have erected into a separate municipality, viz.—Commencing at a point called or known by the name of Simon's Point on the north-west; thence in a straight line to a point called and known by the name of Washington Haycock's Point on the north-east; thence in a straight line south to a point to the north of a bridge called and known by the name of King's Bridge, taking the northern part of the said bridge as the boundary, and from Simon's Point on the north-west as aforesaid in a straight line south to a point north of King's Bridge aforesaid in a straight line with the said point drawn from Washington Haycock's Point to the north of King's Bridge as aforesaid, as delineated on the plan in the petition.
