ORDER IN COUNCIL

(Made under 21 Victoria No. 32, §12)

FOR

REGULATING MINING LEASES OF AURIFEROUS LAND IN THE MINING DISTRICT OF BEECHWORTH.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-eighth day of May, 1860.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the 21st year of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, No. 32, it was made lawful for the Governor to grant leases of any auriferous Crown lands, for mining purposes, for any term not exceeding ten years: AND WHEREAS by the same Act it was also made lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make such regulations, not being contrary to the said Act, as should appear to be necessary for prescribing the form of documents and leases to be issued under the said Act, the modes, times, dates, and places of the issue thereof, and the conditions on which such leases should be issued: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order, with respect to all leases which the Governor may grant as aforesaid of any auriferous Crown lands being in the mining district of Beechworth, make the regulations next following.

WHAT LANDS MAY BE LEASED.

I. All auriferous Crown lands in the mining district of Beechworth may be leased under these regulations, except—

1. The whole or any part of any claim held under a miner's right by any person other than the applicant;
2. Any land within the boundaries of which any claim, or part of a claim, is held under a miner's right or Chinese residence license.
3. The whole or any part of any land which any person, other than the applicant, is entitled by virtue of a miner's right or Chinese residence license to occupy for residence, and actually does occupy *bona fide*;
4. The whole or any part of any land which any person, other than the applicant, is entitled by virtue of a business license to occupy, and does actually occupy *bona fide*;
5. The whole or any part of any land in or over which any person, other than the applicant, has any interest or authority other than those above mentioned which he may lawfully use or exercise for mining purposes or for discovering the existence of gold.

REQUIREMENTS PRELIMINARY TO THE ISSUE OF LEASES.

I. For the information of the holders of miner's rights, every person desirous of obtaining a lease of auriferous Crown lands in the mining district of Beechworth, shall, previous to making application (as hereinafter directed), erect, or cause to be erected, at each angle of the land proposed to be leased, a post not less than three inches square, and standing at least three feet in height above the surface of the ground, and shall affix upon each post a board with the words, in English and Chinese, "Applied for Lease," together with the name of the applicant, and the extent of the area applied for, legibly painted thereon, and such posts shall be maintained at the expense of the applicant until the land shall have been officially surveyed. The applicant will also be required to publish in one or more of the local newspapers, and at least fourteen days previous to the consideration of his application, full particulars of such application, together with a description of the land applied for.

II. Every person applying for a lease of auriferous Crown lands in the mining district of Beechworth, shall apply for such lease by addressing to the Chief Secretary, through the nearest warden of the mining district, an application in duplicate in the form in schedule hereunto appended marked A.; and the warden shall, as soon as it may conveniently be done, enter or cause to be entered, in a book to be kept for the purpose, such

application, numbered according to the order in which it shall have been received, and shall thereupon, and upon receipt of the deposit in the application referred to, give to the applicant a certificate and receipt in the form in schedule hereunto annexed marked B.; and the priority of every application shall be determined according to the time at which it was so received and entered as aforesaid.

III. At the time of applying as aforesaid for a lease, the applicant must deposit with the warden (in addition to a sufficient sum to cover the charges of survey) the sum of Ten pounds, as a guarantee for payment of any expenses which may be incurred by reason of any objection to such application being allowed. And whether such objection shall be allowed or not, any surplus which may remain over expenses incurred shall be returned to the applicant.

IV. Every person who shall hereafter apply for a lease under these regulations, shall deposit with the warden a sum equal to six months' rent (computed at the rate hereinafter specified), of the land so applied for; and in the event of any lease being subsequently refused, such deposit may and shall be returned to the applicant without any deduction whatsoever. But if the application is withdrawn by the intending lessee, he shall forfeit a sum equivalent to three months' rent of the land proposed to be leased, together with all the expenses which may have been actually incurred for the purposes of survey.

N.B. Printed copies of the forms A., B., C., will be issued at the office of the wardens of the district, free of expense.

OFFICIAL SURVEY.

I. Upon receipt of such application and money aforesaid, the warden shall direct the surveyor to proceed to the land applied for, and survey the same, and furnish the warden with a report thereon as to the area; boundaries; and description thereof, and the character of the ground, as also any claims to prior occupancy which may come under his notice while making the survey, accompanied by a plan thereof on the scale of two chains to the inch, together with a tracing of so much of the general map of the district, on the scale of four inches to a mile, as will suffice for connecting the particular area applied for with at least one fixed point in the district; and the warden shall transmit such report, plan, and tracing to the Chief Secretary with as little delay as under the circumstances may be possible.

II. When the surveyor shall proceed to make his survey, he shall remove the posts erected by the applicant, and shall mark out the land applied for by fixing at each angle thereof, and at distances not exceeding one hundred yards in the side lines thereof, a post, painted white, and standing at least three feet above the surface of the ground, and shall affix upon some conspicuous place within the boundaries of the land applied for a notice, in English and Chinese, dated on the day of such survey, setting forth, in the form of the schedule hereunto annexed marked C., the description of the land applied for and the address of the applicant, and such notice shall be effectually secured by the surveyor.

III. In the event of more than one application being made for the same land or any part thereof, each of such applications shall be dealt with according to its priority.

OBJECTIONS.

I. Any person objecting to the issue of such lease to any applicant, shall, within twelve clear days after the date of the notice posted on the land by the surveyor as aforesaid, forward to the warden of the district, and also to the applicant, at the address stated in such notice posted as aforesaid, full notice of all objections against the issue of such lease to the applicant.

II. Every person so objecting shall (except in cases of interference or encroachment which are hereinafter provided for) deposit with the warden the sum of Five pounds as security for the due prosecution of his objections, and in satisfaction of all expenses to which the applicant may be put by such objections; and if such objection should not be prosecuted, or shall fail, so much of such sum shall be handed over to the applicant as may by the warden be declared necessary to defray the expenses of the applicant, and the balance (if any) shall be refunded to the person objecting.

III. When application shall have been made for a lease of any ground, to the whole or any part of which, or to any land, water-course, or other easement within the boundaries of which any person other than the applicant shall claim to be entitled by virtue of prior occupation under a miner's right or business license, the objection to the granting of such lease may be heard by the warden in the same way as a case of interference or encroachment under the provisions of the Gold Fields Act.

ENQUIRY INTO APPLICATIONS AND OBJECTIONS.

I. After the expiration of the twelve days, exclusive of Sunday, Good Friday, and Christmas Day, allowed for objections, the warden shall proceed to hold, at a time and place to be named by him, an enquiry into the truth of the particulars stated by the applicant and of the objections made by each objector.

II. At such enquiry the warden or other officer shall receive such information as the parties may offer, and as he may think pertinent to his enquiry; and immediately after such enquiry, or, should there be no objections, immediately after the expiration of the twelve days allowed for objections, he shall forward to the office of the Chief Secretary the application and objections thereto, if any, and his report thereon.

III. Every applicant who shall require the same shall be furnished with a copy of the mining surveyor's report, and plan of the ground sought to be leased, and shall also be entitled to examine the warden's report, and to make or cause to be made a copy of the same for his own use and guidance.

LEASES.

I. All leases to be applied for, and which it shall be proposed to grant for mining purposes, shall be designated "Gold Mining Leases," and shall be classified as *Ordinary Leases* and *Quartz Leases*.

1. *Ordinary Leases* will include all lands where gold is found in the drift alone, or wherein the land is of a mixed nature, consisting partly of alluvial workings and partly of lodes, or veins of quartz.

2. *Quartz Leases* will refer to lands consisting wholly or for the greater part of quartz lodes or veins.

II. The Governor may, if he shall think fit, issue to any applicant who has complied with such of these regulations as refer to his application, a lease of the land applied for, or any part thereof, after the time prescribed by the eleventh section of the Gold Fields Act, viz., one month after notice of the intention to grant the same shall have been published in the *Government Gazette*.

III. In any case in which an application shall have been made in pursuance of these regulations for a lease of land in any part of which any person other than the applicant may be entitled to cut, construct, or use any race or dam, or to any other easement for mining purposes, the Governor may, if he shall think fit, authorise the issuing of a lease of such land, subject to all existing rights in, to, or the use of such race, or dam, or other easement, and impose such terms as the said Governor may think fit, in order to secure the enjoyment of the same, or to secure compensation for any injury or inconvenience likely to arise to such person by reason of the issuing of such lease.

IV. Every lease will bear date the day of the execution thereof by the Governor, and may be obtained at the office of the warden, who shall deliver the same to the applicant, or such person as shall be duly authorised to receive the same, upon receipt of a fee of £1.

V. The parcel of land demised shall be in ordinary leases in the form of a quadrilateral figure (except where it is impracticable by reason of the adjoining land being occupied, or from insuperable impediments), and the maximum length thereof shall not, except as hereinafter provided, exceed more than thrice the maximum breadth, and shall be described in the lease by such notes and bounds as shall have been reported by the surveyor and approved by the Chief Secretary, upon report of the warden.

VI. The term of the lessee in the land demised cannot in any case exceed ten years.

VII. The extent of the areas of leases shall be (except in special cases hereinafter provided for) :-

1. For *ordinary leases*, an area not less than two acres nor more than twenty-five acres; but lands comprised in any two or more leases, the total areas of which do not exceed in the whole fifty acres, may be worked conjointly, provided that the value of the machinery employed and the capital expended thereon be equal to the aggregate amounts named in the respective leases.
2. For *quartz leases*, an area the length of which shall not exceed six hundred yards, nor be less than one hundred yards along the line of the lode; and the width thereof shall not be more than two hundred yards, nor less than fifty yards measured across the lode.

VIII. The rents reserved shall in all cases be at the rate of Five pounds per acre per annum, and the said rents shall be made payable half-yearly in advance during the entire term, and the day of the execution of the lease shall be deemed to be the day upon which the first payment shall be made.

IX. In all leases hereafter to be applied for, the land shall be demised, and the rent reserved, as herein prescribed.

SPECIAL CASES.

I. Whenever any person shall have purchased the right, title, or interest of any puddler or miner to or in any land intended to be applied for on lease, such puddler or miner may continue to work and mine the said land, if an agreement has been or shall hereafter be entered into to that effect between the parties, until the applicant receives his lease and requires the use of the said land, and it shall not be competent for any Commissioner of Crown Lands to remove any such person contrary to the agreement so entered into: Provided, however, that the warden shall be the judge who shall decide conclusively as to the existence and validity of such agreement.

II. In cases where it shall be shown that a departure from the foregoing areas or rents would under special circumstances be desirable, the same may be diminished, extended, or otherwise altered by the Governor, and such covenants, conditions, and stipulations may be imposed, and such rents and royalties reserved, as by the said Governor may be considered necessary: Provided that the warden shall not investigate any application for a greater or less extent of land than the maximum or minimum quantities hereinbefore stated, without a special order from the Chief Secretary; and further provided that any such special application already made or which shall hereafter be made shall take its priority as in cases of ordinary applications.

III. In addition to gold mining leases, leases of lands required for the construction of dams, or for sites for the erection of machinery, and whereon it is not proposed to mine for gold, and the areas of which shall in no case exceed ten acres, may also be granted; and such leases shall be subject to an annual rent of one pound per acre, payable half-yearly in advance; and such special lease shall not entitle the holder thereof to mine in or upon any land so leased; and if any land so leased and occupied shall afterwards prove to be auriferous, the occupiers thereof shall be liable to be removed therefrom upon payment of compensation by persons desirous of entering thereon for mining purposes, the amount of such compensation to be determined by a warden, or warden and assessors; and such lease shall thereupon be deemed to be absolutely void.

IV. If any person shall enter upon or occupy any Crown land for which application has been made under these regulations subsequently to the making of and whilst such application is under consideration, such occupation or entry shall not operate to prevent the issue of a lease to the said applicant.

V. These regulations shall take effect and come into operation on the 5th day of June now next ensuing.

PUBLIC ROAD IN THE CRESWICK ROAD DISTRICT.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS it is expedient that a common and public highway should be created in the Creswick Road District, connecting the Creswick and Ballan road with Dead Horse Gully, in the direction hereinafter described: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and order that the land hereinafter described shall at all times hereafter be a common and public highway or road for all the liege subjects of Her Majesty, to go, return, pass and repass, on foot and on horseback, and with horses, carts and carriages, every year, at all times of the year, at their free will and pleasure, that is to say:—

DESCRIPTION OF A ROAD ONE CHAIN FIFTY LINKS WIDE, LEADING FROM PORTUGUESE FLAT, CRESWICK, TO SLATY CREEK, DEAD HORSE GULLY, ETC.—Commencing at a point on the road about to be described, said point bearing south one chain fifty-two links from the south-west angle of section 19, township of Creswick; thence following the west side of the road south 70 degrees 32 minutes east seven chains six links; thence by a road reserve south 45 degrees 25 minutes east eight chains forty-eight links; thence north 88 degrees 55 minutes east ten chains twenty-eight links; thence along the west side of the road south 54 degrees 48 minutes east sixteen chains fifty-three links; thence south 41 degrees 40 minutes east twenty-four chains eighty-five links; thence south 23 degrees 3 minutes west eight chains sixty-four links; thence south 25 degrees 39 minutes west nineteen chains seventy-four links; thence south 15 degrees 37 minutes west twenty-four chains thirty-four links; thence south 33 degrees 14 minutes west ten chains eighty links; thence south 26 degrees 56 minutes west eight chains ninety-five links; thence south 1 degree 19 minutes west nine chains sixty-eight links; thence south sixteen degrees east sixteen chains ninety-three links; thence south 1 degree 42 minutes east thirty chains fourteen links; thence south 28 degrees 40 minutes east twenty-two chains forty-one links; thence south 10 degrees 45 minutes east eleven chains twenty links; thence south 25 degrees west eighteen chains ninety-two links; thence south 16 degrees 38 minutes east sixteen chains sixty-three links; thence south 14 degrees 45 minutes west twelve chains eighty links; thence south 21 degrees 38 minutes east thirty-four chains fifty-two links; thence south 60 degrees 47 minutes east thirty-two chains twenty-two links; thence south 8 degrees 30 minutes east eight chains eighty-eight links; thence south 10 degrees 13 minutes west four chains twenty-three links; thence south 11 degrees 2 minutes east twenty-five chains forty-five links; thence south 2 degrees 14 minutes east seventeen chains thirteen links; thence south 25 degrees 41 minutes west thirty-four chains forty-nine links; thence south 54 degrees 42 minutes west ten chains fifty links; thence south 21 degrees 58 minutes west twenty-six chains seventy-five links; thence south 1 degree 5 minutes east seventeen chains twenty-one links; thence south 27 degrees 10 minutes west forty chains seventy-four links; thence south 4 degrees 30 minutes east fifteen chains thirty-one links; thence south 22 degrees 33 minutes west fourteen chains seventy-four links; thence south 8 degrees 55 minutes west twenty-four chains ninety-five links; thence south 13 degrees 19 minutes east sixteen chains ninety-three links to the north angle of allotment A, Prospectors' Hotel, Dead Horse Gully. PROPOSED WIDENING OF THE MAIN WESTERN PORT ROAD, COUNTY OF MORNINGTON.

NOTICE is hereby given that a map and survey plan, describing the exact boundaries and admeasurements of lands required for the widening of the Main Western Port road, as proposed by the Board of Land and Works, together with a description of the said lands, and the names of the owners and occupiers thereof, so far as known, and also an estimate of the value of the said lands, have been deposited at the Crown Lands and Survey Office, Melbourne, the particulars of which are as follow:—

No. 10. For the protection of the streets and footpaths within the municipal district.

No. 11. For the prevention of accidents by fire.

No. 12. For the appropriation of the first moiety of Government grant for 1860.

No. 13. For regulating the deposits of night soil.

The council have, by petition and other means, communicated with the Government for the following objects:—

1st. For the erection of a powder magazine at Avoca.—Promised.

2nd. For payment of £500, second moiety of £1000 grant-in-aid.—Granted.

3rd. For survey of road between Avoca and Lexton.—Granted.

4th. For the repairing of the Avoca and Lexton road.—For this work the Government have placed on the estimates £1500.

5th. For the erecting a bridge over No. 1 Creek, and otherwise forming the Ararat road from Avoca bridge to Amphitheatre.—For this work the Government have placed on the estimates £2500.

6th. For a piece of ground on which to erect municipal baths.—Granted.

7th. For a piece of ground on which to erect a town pump, the site previously obtained not being suitable as containing no water.—Granted.

8th. For the proclamation of the municipal cattle yards as a public market.—Granted.

9th. For a piece of land as a public park.—The President of Land and Works, while declining to grant the piece referred to, assured the council it should not be sold.—Declined.

10th. For the establishment of a Court of General Sessions at Avoca.—Declined.

11th. For the upset price of land at Avoca to be reduced.—The Surveyor General courteously explained, the land regulations prevented a compliance with the request.—Declined.

12th. For the clearing of High street.—The Commissioner of Roads and Bridges regretted he could not recommend a provision on the estimates for this work in this year's estimates; the council have, however, again pressed the subject, and it is under consideration of the Government.

13th. For such an alteration of the boundaries of electoral districts as would include the whole of the municipal district in the Avoca Division.—The Chief Secretary informed the council that in order to effect this, an alteration of the Act of Council defining those boundaries would be necessary.

14th. For the erection of a Government post office at Avoca.—Declined.

15th. For the amalgamation of the post office and telegraph office on a site in High street, between the two culverts.—Declined.

On the last two subjects the council feel called upon to make a rather detailed statement.

About November, 1859, the council begged the Postmaster General to place a sum of money on the estimates for the erection of a post office at Avoca.

This was declined on the plea that the revenue did not admit of such an outlay, and the council not deeming it proper to press the matter against such a reason for refusing their prayer, allowed the matter to drop.

In December it became known that the Postmaster General had decided on amalgamating the post office and telegraph office on a site in the camp.

The council deeming it their duty towards the public interests of the place to endeavor and prevent the post office being erected on a site so unfavorably situated for general convenience, endeavored to obtain a reversal of this decision, and on the 16th of January of the present year, they in full council arrived at the following resolution—the only dissenting member being councillor Downie:—

"That the Postmaster General having refused to recommend a sum of money for the purpose of erecting a post office at Avoca, and as having the post office removed to the camp, as

contemplated by the Postmaster General, would be most inconvenient to the commercial interests of the place, he (the Postmaster General) be urged to erect both post office and telegraph office on allotment 1, section 24, situate in Rutherford and Cambridge streets.

On the subsequent meeting of the council this resolution was confirmed.

When the council recommended this site they had no alternative; it was one of six allotments which the Government had reserved for public buildings, and on the corresponding allotment the council purpose erecting their town hall; in short, all other allotments in the vicinity were the property of private individuals.

Subsequently the council ascertained that a member of its own body had got up a petition having for its object the setting aside of the beforenamed resolution of the council, and they applied to that member, in his place at the council table, to permit them to see the petition he had thus got up.

The member referred to refused to show the council either the petition or a copy of it.

The council were also refused a copy of the petition by the Postmaster General, to whom they had explained the matter.

On a further investigation of the subject, the council ascertained there was an objection on the part of some ratepayers to erect the post office at any other than a site in High street. At the same time the council received a petition, numerously signed by the ratepayers and others resident in the district, of which the following is a copy:—

"That many of us have heard with surprise and regret that a petition has been signed by a portion of our fellow residents praying to have the site of the post office fixed at the camp.

"That the said petition, being presented by one of your members for signature, was signed by some of us in error, and by others of us without consideration.

"That we consider the present locality of the post office the most suitable of any for the general convenience of the inhabitants; the site at the camp would be least convenient of any.

"That independent of those two last reasons great injustice and injury would be inflicted on the resident interests in the neighborhood of the present site by the removal of the post office to the camp.

"Petitioners therefore pray you may be pleased to apply the influence of your representative position to secure a suitable allotment for the post office in High street, between the two culverts—that is, between Bridport and Russell streets—and that you will urge the Government to erect the post office thereon," &c., &c.

Being most desirous to carry into effect the wishes of the ratepayers—so fully and clearly ascertained—the council forwarded to the Postmaster General the petition just referred to, and expressed their readiness to place at the service of the Government, for post office purposes, an allotment in the part of High street named in the petition.

In reply to this communication, the inspector of country post offices was ordered to visit Avoca and examine and report on the proposed site.

That gentleman accordingly visited Avoca, and a considerable time after his departure the council pressed for a decision on the subject, when they were curtly informed by the Postmaster General "it was decided to remove the post office to the camp."

At the request of the council, Dr. Evans, M.L.A. (who has at all times been most kindly attentive to the interests of the district), asked certain questions on the subject in his place in Parliament, and Mr. Bailey (the Postmaster General) answered him to the effect that the country inspector of post offices had reported favorably to the prayer of the council, but that he (the Postmaster General) considered the council was actuated by interested motives, and that the post office should be removed to the camp.

This council, acting as they did for the general interests of the Avoca, and being, with the exception of one dissenting member, unanimous in opposing the removal of the post office from the centre of the commercial and populated portion of the township to an inconvenient site at the camp, very much regret their efforts should have been so unavailing.

They at the same time feel the Postmaster General's attributing to them interested motives is most unwarrantable, and in a cabinet minister an unprecedented discourtesy; the whole forming a most unhappy contrast to the prompt and courteous treatment the council's representatives have always met with at the hands of the other honorable members of the Government.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The public works completed by the council have been:—1, town pump; 2, municipal cattle yards; 3, municipal baths; 4, sundry repairs to High street, Russell street, Cambridge street, and the Cemetery road.

The town pump has been found of great public convenience, fully justifying the outlay in its erection.

The municipal cattle yards were, on completion, rented to Mr. W. W. Anslow, of Ballarat; that gentleman, however, having neglected to fulfil the conditions on which the lease was based, the council cancelled it, and have made arrangements by which it is to be leased, for three years, at a rental of £150.

Irrespective of the annual revenue thus derived, the council are sanguine that, when open, they will be of much convenience to the ratepayers.

The municipal baths were not completed until February, when they were opened for about nine weeks. The result of this short space (the remnant of the warm weather) leaves no doubt of their being in the future a favorite source of cleanliness and health to the public, and of a handsome revenue to the ratepayers.

Feeling satisfied of this, the council have made arrangements by which warm water is to be introduced to them, when it is purposed to keep them open constantly.

Though the council were fully impressed with the public policy of providing such an institution, it is probable they would

not have entered upon it at so early a stage of municipal existence, were it not apparent to them that the residents would in a very short space of time be deprived of their usual resource for bathing in the various waterholes of the Avoca River and Rutherford Creek, in consequence of the extensive mining rushes in the vicinity, a foresight which, the fact of the waterholes referred to being now in use for mining purposes, the council trusts has been justified.

In submitting the following financial statement, the council would remark on the amount set down for advertising, as it may appear excessive.

In explanation, much of the amount is incurred under the provision of the Act of Council which compels the advertising in two and three papers; and in matters of choice the council have acted on the principle that in all contracts, &c., the fullest publicity was the correct course, and they have the pleasure of adding that the competition thus induced saved the council £70 in a recent contract.

MARYBOROUGH MUNICIPALITY.

SIXTH HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MARYBOROUGH MUNICIPAL COUNCIL, ENDING 4TH MAY, 1860.

THE municipal council, in submitting their sixth half-yearly report, have to record with sorrow the death of their late town clerk, Mr. J. C. Hooper, a gentleman who had been identified with the municipality from its establishment, and to whose indefatigable zeal much of the prosperity of the town may be attributed. His untimely decease will long be deplored as a serious loss to the municipality.

A vacancy in the council occurred on the 23rd March, by the resignation of Mr. Henry Levy, and an election took place on the 13th April following, which resulted in the return of Councilor Kersley.

The annual election for councillors to fill vacancies caused by termination of the period of office, took place on the 4th of May, when the retiring councillors, Messrs. D. K. Campbell, May Garland, and Daniel Christian, were re-elected by large majorities. At the meeting of the council on the 8th of May, D. K. Campbell, Esq., J.P., was unanimously re-elected chairman of the council for the current municipal year; and at the meeting on the 15th following Mr. Thomas Gardner was appointed as town clerk, in the room of Mr. J. C. Hooper, deceased.

In public works and improvements the council have had to depend entirely on the revenue derived from rates, and consequently have not been able to extend their operations beyond those works requiring immediate attention.
