MINING OPERATIONS AUTHORISED UNDER THE WENDOUREE SWAMP, BALLAARAT.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the second day of July, 1861.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor
Major General Pratt, C.B. | Mr. Sullivan
Mr. Heales | Mr. Humfray
Mr. Grant | Mr. Houston

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted, that nothing thereinbefore contained shall authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy for mining purposes any Crown land which shall have been exempted by the Governor in Council from the operations of 'mining,' or which shall have been applied to any public use or purpose, or be lawfully and *bona fide* used as a yard, garden, or orchard, or for any race or dam, or for any house, outhouse, shed, or other building, or to cut or remove from any such Crown land any trees growing thereon, or to cut or construct any race or dam through or upon any such Crown land; but nevertheless it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy under such miners' rights, and also to cut and construct races and dams for the purposes aforesaid, through or upon any Crown lands which may have been so exempted or applied as aforesaid, subject to such conditions and restrictions as the Governor in Council shall impose: And whereas certain submerged land called the Wendouree Swamp, situate at Ballarat West, in the mining district of Ballarat, has been reserved for the purpose of saving the water, and is exempt from mining operations accordingly: And whereas a copartnership or association of miners, called and known by the name and style of the Royal Saxon Company, has applied for permission to prosecute mining operations under the said submerged land: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order authorise the said Royal Saxon Company to mine under the Wendouree Swamp aforesaid, subject to the conditions and restrictions hereinafter prescribed, that is to say:—

1. That the drives be at a depth of not less than three hundred and thirty feet from the surface of the said Wendouree Swamp.

2. That the drives be open at all reasonable hours to the inspection of any mining surveyor acting under the authority of the Commissioner of Mines, the Judge of the Court of Mines, or the Warden.

3. That the drives be well and properly timbered and walled, and stowed if deemed necessary by the inspecting mining engineer, and all reasonable and necessary precautions taken and observed to secure the said Wendouree Swamp against damage or danger.

4. That the company stop their works when requested so to do by the mining surveyor, or other authorised officer, whenever it shall appear to the mining surveyor, or other duly authorised officer, that the works are not being carried out with due precaution against any contingent damage to the said Wendouree Swamp.

5. That the area to be allowed to the said company shall be the extent of ground only allowed under the Ballarat Mining Board's bye-laws.

6. That the permission hereby accorded to the said company to mine under the said water reserve shall be without prejudice to the alleged rights (if any) of any other persons.

And the Honorable John Basson Humfray, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Mines for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

MUNICIPALITY OF SANDHURST.

BYE-LAW No. 31.—A BYE-LAW FOR THE REGULATION OF THE SANDHURST HORSE AND CATTLE MARKET, ALSO FOR THE PUBLIC ABATTOIRS, AND FOR FIXING THE RATES OF DUES TO BE CHARGED THEREIN.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 13 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that

it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings, the collection of their rates, regulating the killing and sale of butchers' meat, the regulation of markets, market dues, fairs, and sales, the restraining noisome and offensive trades, and the general good rule and government of such municipal district; and also by the said recited Act (clause 29) it is competent for every such municipal council, whenever it shall appear necessary, to establish tolls, rates, and dues upon any market within their jurisdiction and under the control of such council, and to erect toll-gates, toll-bars, or other works necessary for the collection of such tolls, rates, or dues, and to make such bye-laws for the proper collection and management of such tolls, rates, and dues as to such municipal council shall seem fit:

Be it therefore ordered and directed by the council for the municipal district of Sandhurst, from and after this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor as required by the provisions of the said Act:—

1. That the market known and proclaimed in the *Government Gazette* of the 23rd August, 1860, as the Sandhurst Horse and Cattle Market, shall be open for the sale (subject to the dues and tolls hereafter specified) of oxen, cows, bulls, heifers, steers, calves, horses, mares, geldings, foals, asses, mules, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, every day from sunrise to sunset, except on Sundays, Christmas-day, and Good Friday, on which days no business shall be transacted therein.

2. That the said cattle, horses, and other stock shall be sold or offered for sale only on payment of the dues set forth in the schedule hereto attached, or such dues as may hereafter from time to time be made and approved by the municipal council; the said dues to be payable to the cattle market inspector when the animals are brought into market.

3. That the abattoirs or slaughter-houses erected in the said cattle market shall be used for the slaughter of animals for human food (subject to the dues hereafter specified), and shall be open for use at all times as in the discretion of the cattle market inspector the necessity of the slaughtering trade requires.

4. That the owners of all carcasses slaughtered in the said abattoirs shall pay the dues set forth in the annexed schedule, or such dues as may hereafter from time to time be made and approved by the municipal council, the said dues to be paid before the carcasses can be removed by the owners.

5. That the said market and abattoirs shall be under the control of an officer called the cattle market inspector, whose duties shall be as follows:—

To see that the market regulations are duly observed.

To inspect all animals intended for human food exposed for sale in the market, and to prohibit the sale of any animal in such market which he may consider unfit for human food.

To direct the placing of the animals for sale in the various yards, pens, and enclosures.

To direct the time and rotation in which animals shall be slaughtered, and to superintend the slaughtering and delivering of carcasses.

To collect personally or by deputy all tolls or dues, and to be individually responsible to the council for the same.

To maintain generally the good order and regulations of the market.

6. That all persons attending or using the said market shall comply with the directions of the cattle market inspector given in accordance with this bye-law, and shall not obstruct him in the execution of his duty, and shall not place any animal, matter, or thing so as to obstruct the thoroughfare of the said market, or neglect to remove the same on being required to do so by the inspector.

7. That no person shall sell or offer for sale in the said market any animal or carcass before the hour for opening or after the hour for closing the market.

8. That no person shall sell, or offer or expose for sale, or deliver as sold, without paying market dues, any horses, cattle, or other animals specified in this bye-law, whether the same be alive or slaughtered in any place within the municipality of Sandhurst other than in the said proclaimed market: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent any person selling or exposing for sale any cattle, horses, or other stock specified herein, at the owner's dwelling-house or shop within the municipal district of Sandhurst.

That any person or persons committing, or causing to be committed, a breach of any of the provisions of this bye-law, shall, on conviction before any two or more justices of the peace, having jurisdiction within the municipal district of Sandhurst, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

MUNICIPALITY OF PRAHRAN.

BYE-LAW 71.—A BYE-LAW FOR THE MAINTENANCE AND MANAGEMENT OF THE FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF PRAHRAN.

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that every such municipal council may also make such bye-laws as may be necessary for the establishment of public libraries, museums, botanical gardens, or other places of recreation, and the management thereof: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Prahran, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor:—

1st. The bye-law No. 65, intituled, "A bye-law for the maintenance of a free public library within the municipal district of Prahran," shall be and is hereby repealed.

2nd. The sum of One hundred and fifty pounds may in every

year be expended in the maintenance of the free public library, and for the purchase of books and other literary and scientific publications for the use thereof.

3rd. Any person entering the library in a state of intoxication, or using unbecoming language, or disturbing the readers or others therein by noises of an offensive kind, defacing, mutilating, injuring or removing therefrom any books, maps, plates, or other publications, or property, shall upon conviction of any of the said offences before two or more justices of the peace forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.

The number of deaths reported to have taken place in Melbourne and suburbs during May, was 337, or an average of 10.87 per diem, being a daily decrease of .60 as compared with the returns for April. Those for May, 1860, showed only 308 deaths, or nearly one a day less than in the same month this year. It is perhaps worthy of remark, that the mortality of the month which is the subject of this report was numerically identical with that of the March preceding; and it will not be uninteresting to glance casually at the returns of those two months, for the purpose of examining whether the analogy holds good in detail. Such is the case to a remarkable extent as regards the sexes, which in the two months were divided thus:—March, males 184, females 153; May, males 185, females 152. But with reference to the ages the similarity is not sustained, the figures being as follow:—March, children under five 219, persons over five 118; May, children under five 179, persons over five 158. The latter month thus showing a decrease of 40 in the infantine mortality, and an increase of the like number in the deaths of children over five and adults. On reference being made to the disease analyses for the two periods, it is observed that this diminished mortality of young children and infants is principally attributable to a decrease of scarlatina, dysentery, and diarrhoea, whilst the increase of deaths amongst persons above five years of age is mainly chargeable to diseases of the respiratory system, of which phthisis or consumption alone increased from 18 to 44 fatal cases.

The mean temperature in the shade was 52.7°, against 59.3° for April, and against 65.8° for March; in May last year it was 54.7°. The days of highest and lowest temperature were the 8th and 13th, on the first-named of which the thermometer in the shade, at 2 p.m., stood at 72.4°, whilst on the latter, at 3 a.m., it stood at 37.7°. The greatest range of temperature (25.6°) was on the 6th, from a maximum of 65.8° to a minimum of 40.2°, and the least (5.4°) on the 13th, from a maximum of 56.2° to a minimum of 50.8°. The range between the highest and lowest of the month was 34.7°, and the mean daily range 14.55°. The mean atmospheric pressure during the month was 29.403 in. against 29.979 in. for April, and against 29.99 in. for May, 1860. The barometer reached its highest point at 9 a.m. on the 5th, when the reading was 30.434 in., and it stood at its minimum (29.403 in.) at 3 p.m. on the 1st, the range for the month thus being 1.031 in.

For the first four weeks in May the mean temperature, number of deaths, and daily average of mortality, were as follow:—

Of the 337 deaths which occurred during the month, 185 or 54.9 per cent. were of males, and 152 or 45.1 per cent. were of females; 179 or 53.1 per cent. were of children under, and 158 or 46.9 per cent. were of persons over five years of age. This proportion of males to the total is 3.5 per cent. greater than in April, and that of females correspondingly less. It was noticed in

the report for April a decrease was observable in the proportion of children under five to the total number dying; in the month under review a further decrease to the extent of 5 per cent. took place, the proportion to the total of persons over five of course suffering to a corresponding extent.

Nineteen deaths took place on the 23th, the next largest number being 16 on the 13th. During April 18 were the most that occurred in one day, and in May last year, 20 deaths appeared against the 25th instant.

The following results appear against charitable or public institutions:—Melbourne Hospital, 40 deaths; Immigrants' Home, 7; Benevolent Asylum, 3; Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 3; Lying-in Hospital, 2; making a total of 55 deaths, or 16·3 per cent. of the whole number recorded.

NOTE.—The returns of the recent census not having been yet compiled, those of the previous one are still given, which present a guide, rather to the probable relative proportions, than to the actual numbers of the persons now inhabiting the several sub-districts.

Of the 179 children under five who died during the month, 98 or 54·7 were males, and 81 or 45·3 were females: 80 were under one year, 41 between one and two years, 20 between two and three, 13 between three and four, and 23 between four and five.

The 158 deaths of persons over five years of age admit of the following division:—87 or 55·1 per cent. were males, 71 or 44·9 per cent. were females: 34 were between five and ten, 7 between ten and fifteen, 13 between fifteen and twenty-five, 23 between twenty-five and thirty, 12 between thirty and thirty-five, 24 between thirty-five and forty, 13 between forty and forty-five, 10 between forty-five and fifty, 7 between fifty and fifty-five, 3 between fifty-five and sixty, 6 between sixty and sixty-five, 2 between sixty-five and seventy, and 4 of seventy-five and upwards.

Deaths arising from zymotic diseases have consecutively diminished in their proportions to the deaths from all causes during several months past; thus for March their proportion was 45·10 per cent., for April it was 41·33 per cent., and for the month under review it was 34·42 per cent. A marked declension has taken place in the number of deaths from diarrhoea and dysentery, only 19 having been returned from those causes against 41 in April and against 51 in March. Scarlatina, still remaining high, occasioned 54 deaths, against 63 in April and 68 in March; measles caused 4 deaths and whooping-cough 9, against the same numbers in April; typhus showed 10 deaths, against 11 in April; diphtheria and croup increased from 5 and 7 deaths in April to 9 and 9 deaths in May.

Of the various classes of sporadic diseases, those of uncertain seat increased about one and a half per cent., and those of the nervous system about one and a quarter per cent. of the total deaths, but those of the respiratory system showed an increase of about four per cent., nearly a fifth of the deaths recorded having been from this class of diseases. It has been already remarked that 44 deaths were occasioned by phthisis, and it may here be observed that this is a larger number than has hitherto been recorded in one month from that complaint, and is nearly double the number which occurred from it in the same month of 1860. A decrease has taken place in diseases of the circulatory system, which were above the average in April, and an increase in diseases of the generative organs. Amongst an average number of deaths from external causes, two are reported as the result of lead poisoning.

The petitioners state that their locality is situated on the Main Mount Alexander road, and is fast rising in importance, being the centre of a large and increasing agricultural population.

That within the township boundary there are many large and substantial buildings, including stores, hotels, and steam flour-mills, breweries, and a large malting establishment all now in full operation, and moreover that some of the finest blue-stone quarries have been opened and are being extensively worked.

That roads, bridges, drains, and streets are required to facilitate the large and increasing local traffic, but no provision exists for these works.

The town common for Ararat, containing 2800 acres, and capable of depasturing about one hundred and fifty head of cattle, has been the subject of frequent complaints by the council to the Government, but they have only succeeded in obtaining a promise, that if it is found to be too small, it can afterwards be enlarged.

The desire of the council to clear off the overdraft at the bank, and thus save to the municipality the amount annually paid as interest, have prevented them from undertaking more public works than were absolutely required during the past half-year. They hope by the end of the present municipal year to be free of debt, and in a position to proceed with every necessary work.

MUNICIPALITY OF KYNETON.

SEVENTH REPORT OF THE COUNCIL, FOR THE HALF-YEAR ENDING 10TH JUNE, 1861, INCLUSIVE.

MEETINGS.

Eighteen ordinary and four special meetings of the council have been held, and two meetings lapsed for want of a quorum. The Chairman (Councillor Wilson), attended 19; Councillor Keyworthy, 19; Councillor Menzies, 19; Councillor Scott, 20; and Councillor Hargreave, 18 meetings; and Councillors Kelly and Perkins each attended three meetings, being the only ones held since their election. The council now hold fortnightly meetings only.

PUBLIC WORKS.

Footbridge at Rogers and Harper's ford, painted.
Plan for laying out the botanical gardens adopted, and the fencing of the river side of the gardens in progress.
The metalling of Wedge street, from Piper street to Baynton street, in progress.

APPLICATIONS TO THE GOVERNMENT.

For unconditional grant of money out of the vote for 1860, for improving the botanical gardens.—£120 granted.

For a grant for a similar purpose, out of the vote for 1861.—Under consideration.

For half an acre of land fronting Mollison street, as an addition to market site, and for weighbridge.—Granted.

For site for manure dépôt.—Granted.

To raise the Mollison street bridge seven feet higher than contracted for.—Under consideration.

For the Government grant-in-aid for current year.—A portion will shortly be received.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Councillor Wilson was elected chairman of the council for the current year.

On the 4th April last, Councillors Fitzgerald and Dickinson resigned, and Councillors Kelly and Perkins were elected in their stead.

The late town surveyor, valuator, and collector, Mr. Donnelly, was dismissed for inattention to his duties, and Mr. G. Fleck has been appointed in his stead as town surveyor and valuator, and Mr. C. H. Orr as collector. The salaries of the officers have been considerably reduced.

Owing to the defective state of the law, the council have found it impracticable to obtain for the public the full advantages of the commonage proclaimed for the town, consisting of 1333 acres.

Efforts have been made to establish a general market, and by way of experiment, the Agricultural Show yards were temporarily obtained for the purpose, but the council regret to state that the project met with very little encouragement, and the yards are now closed.

A bye-law has been passed prohibiting the slaughter of large cattle in the municipality, and making other provisions for the cleanliness of the town. An inspector of nuisances has also been appointed, and Dr. Geary has accepted the office of hon. officer of health.

The valuation of the municipality for the current year, after all appeals heard, amounts to £26,462, producing a rate, at 1s. in the pound, of £1323 2s., the first moiety of which is now in course of collection.

The first election for members to serve in the municipal council was held on the 13th and 14th days of November, 1860, when the following gentlemen were elected from eighteen candidates:—Messrs. T. Symons, Morrison, Connell, Nichol, P. Mark, Gubbins, and Rose; and on the 9th May, 1861, Mr. James Pleasants was elected in the place of Mr. Councillor Symons, resigned.

4. For the survey of the land lying on the north side of Fraser street, east of Templeton street, and the sale of the unsold surveyed town allotments.—The survey is now being proceeded with, and the sale of the lots referred to is gazetted to take place on the 8th proximo.

5. For the extension of the 5th to the 10th sections of the Town and Country Police Act to this municipal district.—Granted.

6. For the grant of two acres of land for a market reserve and municipal purposes.—Granted.

7. For an extension of the area granted for commonage.—Refused.

8. For an extension of the time granted for removal to those persons carrying on business within a quarter of a mile of lands in the township alienated from the Crown.—Time extended to twelve months.

9. For making Fraser street one chain wide.—Objected to, then assented to, and finally gazetted one and a half chains wide.

10. For the establishment of a public pound at Clunes.—Granted, and now in course of being carried out.

11. For the appointment of a coroner for Clunes.—Objected to, as not being necessary.

12. For an alteration of the time for the despatch of the mail to Melbourne.—Time altered to One o'clock p.m.

The following bye-laws have been approved of by the Governor in Council, and gazetted:—

No. 1. For levying a rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound on all property in houses and lands within the municipal district.

No. 4. For the suppression of the nuisance arising from pigs and goats being allowed to go at large within the municipality.

No. 5. For compelling the inhabitants of this municipality to keep their premises free from offensive and unwholesome matter, &c.

No. 6. For regulating the deposit of night-soil, manure, &c.

No. 7. For guarding against accidents from the careless use of fire in the open air, &c.

No. 8. For the regulation and prevention of damage to the water-courses, roads, public streets, footpaths, and public thoroughfares within the municipality of Clunes.

A bye-law for regulating the proceedings of this council by means of standing orders, and another regulating the proceedings at elections of members to serve in this council, have been passed, and forwarded for His Excellency the Governor's approval, but are not yet assented to.

THE PUBLIC WORKS.

The following contracts have been completed or are in course of execution:—

Contract A.—Repairing and maintaining for six weeks about 23 chains of road in Fraser street. N.B.—This work was in course of execution when the council came into office, and the contract was subsequently adopted by them.

Contract No. 1.—Forming, pitching, and metalling 13 chains 50 links of roadway; constructing one culvert; forming and kerbing 21 chains 50 links of footpaths in Fraser street, from Templeton street to Service street.

Contract No. 2.—Forming, pitching, and gravelling 5 chains 40 links of roadway, and making two box culverts in Fraser street from foot of Camp Hill towards Mr. McDonald's fence.

Contract No. 3.—Repairing, widening, and pitching, metalling, and blinding 13 chains 67 links of roadway along Fraser street, from Templeton street to Camp Hill street; relaying pitched open water-channel; cutting 10 chains of drains, and filling holes in Camp Hill Street.

* The chairman was absent from two meetings of the council on municipal business, in Melbourne.

† Mr. Councillor Pleasants was elected only on the 9th May.

Contract No. 4.—Forming, pitching, metalling, and blinding 26 chains 7 links of roadway in Service street; cutting 56 chains of side drains; making four timber crossings, and maintaining works for three months.

Contract No. 5.—Widening and deepening drains west side of Fraser street; timbering same and partly covering in.

Contract No. 6.—Additions to No. 1 contract. Earthwork and gravel in widening footpaths; excavating and embanking for a width of 33 feet for about 13 chains; reforming water-tables; cutting drain and constructing 38 feet of culvert with timber covering.

Contract No. 7.—Forming, pitching, and metalling half a chain of roadway in Camp Hill street; cutting one chain drain and pitching portion of road near pitched open crossing.

Contract No. 8.—Cutting drain from low ground at rear of Fraser street to the creek, and constructing one timber crossing.

Contract No. 9.—Constructing timber crossings from Fraser street to Templeton street, and from Fraser street to right-of-way near Morrison's smithy, and approaches thereto.

MUNICIPAL CONFERENCE.

The chairman attended the municipal conference with reference to the proposed action of the Government in reducing the grants in aid to municipalities.
