PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the nineteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act to provide for the Election of Members to serve in the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Victoria respectively*: I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation appoint that the places mentioned in the second column of the schedule hereunto annexed shall be polling places for the purpose of taking the poll at any contested election for the electoral district of Castlemaine, and that all votes in respect of qualifications within the boundaries and limits of the division mentioned in the first column of the same schedule shall be taken at any election for such district at the polling places mentioned in the said second column, that is to say:—

LANDS TEMPORARILY RESERVED FROM SALE.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of the power in him vested in this behalf by the Act 24 Victoria No. 117, has temporarily reserved from sale the lands hereinafter described, viz.:-

The petitioners state that they reside within the area hereinafter defined.

That the town of Inglewood is in the centre of a large mining district, and that it contains a mining and trading population who have invested large sums in permanent buildings.

That the land in the township has been lately sold, some of it at a high price, and notwithstanding the large sums paid by the inhabitants to the Government no provision has been made for roads or approaches to the town, and that the streets are now almost impassable.

That the township contains over three hundred householders. They further state that they are of opinion that the erection of their locality into a municipal district will greatly advance its interests and prosperity and conduce to its permanent improvement and good government, and they suggest the following boundaries for the district, viz.—Commencing at the south-west angle of the Inglewood township reserve; thence by a line bearing north one hundred and sixty chains; thence by a line bearing east one hundred and sixty chains; thence by a line bearing south one hundred and sixty chains; and thence by a line bearing west one hundred and sixty chains to the commencing point.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"We, the undersigned householders and landowners resident within the area above set forth, most respectfully pray your Excellency will cause the said area to be proclaimed a municipal district, in accordance with the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, under the style and title of 'The Municipality of Inglewood.'"

BYE-LAW NO. 33.—TO REPEAL AND AMEND CERTAIN PORTIONS OF STANDING ORDERS, BEING PART OF BYE-LAW NO. 1 OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF BRIGHTON.

WHEREAS a certain portion of the standing orders comprised in bye-law No. 1, made by the municipal council of Brighton assented to by His Excellency the Governor in council, and gazetted on the 19th day of April, 1859, has been found inconvenient in practice, and it is considered advisable to repeal such portion of and to make an amendment in the said bye-law No. 1: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Brighton, under the authority vested in them by the Act 18 Victoria No. 15, that from and after this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, the following alteration or amendment shall be made in and to the said bye-law No. 1:—

Standing order No. 79 is repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—

All plans for the formation of any street or portion thereof, or other public work, shall be laid before the council, and be open for the inspection of the ratepayers, at least six days prior to the same being considered and ordered upon; and after any such plans shall have been adopted by the council, the working specifications for carrying out any of such plans shall be examined by the public works committee and reported on to the council, and shall also remain open six days for the inspection of ratepayers prior to tenders being called for.

MUNICIPALITY OF SMYTHESDALE.

BYE-LAW NO. 4 OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF SMYTHESDALE.

MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS.

WHEREAS an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria was passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, whereby it was, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings: Be it therefore enacted, that—

1. For the consideration of any bye-law, or for the raising or appropriating of money, or for the objects contemplated in standing order No. 39, it shall be competent for any member, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any such subject at the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given in the notice paper for the day when the order of the day or notice of motion for which such call is made is set down for consideration; and every member shall be in attendance when such order of the day or notice of motion comes under consideration, and at the voting upon such.

question, or any amendment thereof, whether of adjournment or otherwise, or if absent, shall show cause for such absence.

2. The town clerk shall have charge of the common seal of the municipality, and shall be responsible for the safe custody and proper use of the same, each impression thereof being duly verified with the signature of that officer.

3. The town clerk shall not affix the common seal to any corporate document without the express order of the council, nor unless such document bear the signature of the chairman; but in the case of powers of attorneys, and other legal instruments not relating to the municipality, the signatures to which require to be verified by declaration before the chairman, the said seal shall and may be affixed by the town clerk to the chairman's certificate accompanying the same, on receipt of a fee of half-a-guinea for each attestation.

4. Any one or more of the standing orders of the council may be suspended *pro tempore*, in case of emergency; provided that five of the members present shall deem such suspension necessary, but not otherwise, except numbers 39 of bye-law 1 and 1 of bye-law 4.

5. That every member shall be in attendance within ten minutes after the municipal hour of meeting, and if altogether absent from a meeting a reasonable excuse shall be produced.

6. In case of death, absence, or other lawful impediments preventing the chairman from calling meetings of the council, any five members of the council shall, in such circumstances, have power to call a meeting of the council.

7. Any person who shall neglect or refuse to comply with any regulations herein made, shall, upon conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, pay a penalty not exceeding One pound.

MUNICIPALITY OF TARADALE.

BYE-LAW NO. 1.—A BYE-LAW TO REGULATE BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF TARADALE.

WHEREAS by the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, section 26, it is enacted, "that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings, the collection of their rates, the conducting of elections and public meetings of the ratepayers, the determining the validity of disputed elections, the prevention and extinguishing of fires, the suppression of nuisances and houses of ill-fame, compelling residents to keep their premises free from offensive or unwholesome matters, the regulation and licensing of porters, public carriers, carters, water drawers, and other public vehicles, regulating the killing and sale of butchers' meat, the establishment of slaughter-houses, the regulation of markets, market dues, fairs and sales, the preservation of public decency and public health, the restraining noisome and offensive trades, and the general good rule and government of such municipal district," such bye-laws to have force and effect under the 33rd section of the said Act, upon the assent of the Governor of the said colony having been obtained thereto under his hand: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Taradale, that from and after the date of the Governor's assent hereto, the proceedings and business of the said council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which shall be deemed and called the Standing Orders of the said council, until repealed or altered, that is to say:—

ORDER OF PROCEEDING.

1. That the sittings of this council shall be open to the public, but a majority of the council may require the withdrawal of strangers.

2. That the business of the council shall commence with a quorum. If at the expiration of thirty minutes from the time of meeting there is no quorum, no business shall be transacted, and the names of the councillors present shall be recorded in the minutes.

3. At every regular meeting of the council the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting for confirmation the minutes of any preceding meetings, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings. The minutes when confirmed shall be signed by the chairman for the time being.

4. If the chairman be not present one quarter of an hour after the time appointed for the meeting of the council, a councillor shall be elected to preside as chairman for the time being.

5. The chairman of the council, or the chairman for the time being, may take part in all the proceedings of the council, and in case of an equality of votes upon any division, shall give a casting vote.

6. That after the confirmation of the minutes, the order of business shall be as follows, or as near thereto as may be practicable, but for the greater convenience of the council at any particular meeting thereof, it may be altered by resolution to that effect:—

1. Reading of copies of letters sent by authority of council.
2. Reading letters and accounts received, and considering and ordering thereon.
3. Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
4. Reading and ordering on reports of permanent committees.

5. Reading and ordering on reports of select committees.
6. Reading and ordering on reports of deputations.
7. Special payments.
8. Special payments not classified.
9. Order of the day, including subjects arising from proceedings of former meetings.
10. Any other matters not hereinbefore classified.
11. Motions of which previous notice has been given.
12. Notices of motion.
7. All communications by letter intended for the council shall be made and addressed to the town clerk; and all petitions and memorials shall be addressed to the chairman and council, under cover to the town clerk.
8. No motion shall be decided on at any meeting of council unless notice in writing, signed by the councillor proposing, shall have been given at the previous meeting of the council; nor shall any report of committee be decided on unless similar notice be given, unless in committee of the whole council, or the whole council be present.
9. The order of the day shall include all business of which due notice has been given, and all matters arising out of former meetings of the council.
10. No motion shall be proceeded with unless the councillor giving notice, or one of the council authorised by him in writing, be present to proceed with the same when called upon.
11. No bye-law shall be decided on without due notice (as in cases of motions), and a copy of the proposed bye-laws shall be open in the council chamber for the inspection of all ratepayers, free of charge, or of any person duly qualified to vote at elections under the Act.

ORDERS OF DEBATE.

12. Any councillor proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the chairman; and no councillor shall be interrupted unless by a call to order, when he shall sit down, the councillor calling to order shall be heard, and the question of order decided before the subject is resumed or any other business.
13. Any councillor proposing a motion or amendment must state the nature of it before addressing the council.
14. No question once brought before the council shall be withdrawn without leave of the council, nor shall any motion be entertained by the council until the same be seconded.
15. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, unless by way of explanation merely, or in reply as the mover of an original motion, or upon any amendment; and after such explanation or reply the question shall be forthwith put to the vote; but councillors merely seconding any motion shall not be held to have spoken upon it.
16. If more than one councillor rise at one time, the chairman for the time being shall decide which is entitled to preaudience.
17. No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion, or impute motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly.
18. The chairman, when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case, without argument or comment, and his decision as to what is order or explanation shall be final.
19. No proposition or amendment shall be entertained unless in writing, and, when seconded, handed to the clerk.
20. The chairman shall rise when addressing the council in discussion of any question.
21. Any councillor may demand the production of any of the documents of the council relating to the subject under discussion.
22. Only one amendment shall be discussed at one time, and upon the adoption of any amendment the original motion shall be deemed rejected, and the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.
23. The chairman shall, in taking the sense of the council, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative, and the votes of all councillors shall be entered in the minutes.
24. The council shall vote by show of hands, except in cases of elections.
25. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion of adjournment; but if the question be negative, the next motion or order of the day shall be considered before the question of adjournment shall be again entertained. Provided the motion be carried, any business left undecided shall take precedence at the next meeting of council.
26. Any councillor may record his protest against any decision of the council, provided the same be made, in writing, before the next meeting of the council, and be couched in respectful language, and be consistent with truth. Notice of such intention, however, must be given on the adoption of the resolution.
27. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council has been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the council which shall have been negatively by the council shall be again entertained during the same municipal year.
28. Any councillor who shall use expressions capable of being offensively applied to any other councillor, shall, if required by the council, withdraw such expressions, and make a satisfactory apology to the council.
29. Any councillor may require the clerk of the council to take down any particular expressions immediately on their being used.

ELECTIONS.

30. No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until three clear days' notice shall have been given in one or more of the local newspapers, inviting applications or tenders for the same.

31. No councillor shall have any pecuniary interest in any contract or other work in connection with the council, nor shall he be received as surety for any officer; nor shall any auditor or other officer become security for any other employee of the council, or for any work to be done for the council. And in all cases where security shall be required, the expense of preparing the same shall be borne by the party giving the same.

32. At all such elections the voting shall be (except at that of chairman of the council) on cards to be provided for the purpose, on which the voter shall write the name of the candidate he supports, and sign his own; no others will be received; and the town clerk shall preserve the same as a record.

MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS.

33. For the consideration of any bye-laws, or for the raising and appropriating of money, or for the objects contemplated in the standing order No. 27, or for the consideration of other important business, it shall be competent for any councillor, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council, for the consideration of any such subject at the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given in the notice paper for the day, or notice of motion, for which such call was made is set down for consideration; and any member not in attendance when such order of the day or notice of motion comes under consideration, or not in attendance at the voting of such question, or amendment thereof, whether of adjournment or otherwise, shall be liable as for a breach of this bye-law, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the council.

34. The clerk shall have the charge of the common seal of the corporation, and shall be responsible for the safe custody and proper use of the same, each impression thereof being duly verified by the signature of that officer.

35. The town clerk shall not affix the common seal to any corporate document without the express order of the council, nor unless such document bears the signature of the chairman, but in case of powers of attorney, and other legal documents not relating to the corporation, the signatures to which require to be verified before the chairman by declaration, and in any such case the seal shall and may be affixed by the town clerk to the chairman's certificate accompanying the same, and such seal shall not be so affixed unless a fee of Five shillings be paid.

36. Any one or more of the standing orders of the council, except No. 27, may be suspended *pro tempore*, in case of emergency, provided that the majority present deem it necessary.

37. The chairman of the council, when appointed on committees, shall be chairman thereof, and the standing orders of the council shall be observed in all committees, except as to the number of times limited for speaking.

38. The neglect or breach of any or either of the foregoing bye-laws shall subject the person offending to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

BELMONT TOWN COMMON.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE TOWN COMMON.

WHEREAS in an Act passed in the sessions of Parliament holden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to proclaim that any Crown lands in the vicinity of any town shall be a common for the use of the inhabitants of such town, and all the inhabitants of such town and its vicinity shall, from the time of such proclamation, be entitled to depasture their cattle and horses on such common, and such common shall be called a "Town Common;" and it is further enacted, that in case such Town Common shall be included within the limits of any municipal district, with the consent of the Governor in Council, to make rules and regulations determining how many horses and cattle every such inhabitant shall be entitled to depasture upon any Town Common: And whereas a Town Common was on the 29th April last proclaimed by the Governor in Council for the town of Belmont, in the county of Grant: And whereas such common is included in or adjoins the limits of the municipal district of South Barwon:

Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of South Barwon, by and with the consent of the Governor in Council, that every inhabitant of the town of Belmont and its vicinity shall be entitled to depasture on the Town Common for Belmont any number of horses or cattle not exceeding six.

Adopted by the municipal council of South Barwon the 24th September, 1861.

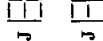
