## REGULATIONS RESPECTING ACCOUNTS FOR MEDICAL ATTENDANCE

IT is hereby notified that, on and after the first day of January, 1862, the following regulations have been approved by the Governor in Council respecting the claims of duly qualified medical practitioners for attendance on prisoners and others, at the request of the police or other authorities, and are to be observed in lieu of those on the same subject dated 20th August, 1860:—

### SCALE OF FEES.

For medical or surgical attendance, including the supply of all necessary medicines, between the hours of 6 a.m. and 9 p.m., half-a-guinea per visit.

Ditto, ditto, ditto, at any other hour, one guinea per visit.

For minor surgical operations, two guineas per case.

For capital operations, the fee to be fixed by the Chief Medical Officer according to the circumstances of the case.

### TRAVELLING EXPENSES.

Where the distance is not travelled by railway, half-a-guinea per mile for each mile after the first. Where the distance is travelled by rail, the allowance to be fixed by the Chief Medical Officer.

To legally qualified medical practitioners (that is those registered by the Medical Board of Victoria) for examining persons charged with lunacy and giving the necessary evidence and certificates, One pound (£1) per case, with travelling expenses at the rate allowed to medical witnesses by the Order in Council of the 22nd October, 1860, viz.:—One shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) per mile.

Accounts are in every case to be rendered on the proper form (L. 2), signed by the claimant and the officer by whose request the attendance was given, and forwarded by the latter to the Chief Medical Officer, Melbourne.

The following particulars are to be fully given on the face of the account, viz.:—The name of the prisoner or person attended or examined; the nature of the disease or injury for which medical attendance was required; the place where such attendance was given, with its distance from the claimant's abode when travelling expenses are charged; the hour of attendance in the case of a night visit; and the total time occupied in the service where the distance is travelled by railway, with the amount expended for railway fares.

Accounts should be rendered as soon as practicable after the service charged for is given; and any account not intended for payment at Melbourne should have written on the face of it the name of the particular pay office at which the claimant desires payment to be made.

### REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS AT PUBLIC MEETING AT MOONAMBEL, UNDER THE MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS ACT.

A MEETING of householders and landowners was held, under the provisions of the Municipal Act, 18 Victoria No. 15, at the Pilot Boat Hotel, Moonambel, on Monday, the 18th day of November, 1861, at Two o'clock p.m., for the following purposes:—

1. For deciding whether the council for the district shall consist of three, five, or seven members.
2. Whether the members of such municipal council shall or shall not receive any pecuniary remuneration, and, if any, the amount thereof.
3. For electing the members of the said municipal council.

Moved by Mr. Wheeler, and seconded by Mr. Mellor, That Mr. F. K. Orme acted as chairman.

Moved by Mr. Wheeler, and seconded by Mr. Mellor, That Mr. B. Isaacs act as assessor. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, and seconded by Mr. Wheeler, That the Moonambel Municipal Council shall consist of seven members. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Morgan, and seconded by Mr. Kaye, That the council shall not receive any pecuniary remuneration. Carried.

### PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

#### ESSENDON AND FLEMINGTON.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and sixty-nine householders resident at and near Essendon and Flemington, in the parish of Doutra Galla, in the county of Bourke, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that they are all householders resident at and near Essendon and Flemington, within the meaning of the Municipal Institutions Act, 18 Victoria No. 15; that they are more than one hundred and fifty in number; and that the area within which they reside contains a population of more than three hundred householders, and does not exceed nine square miles, wherein no one point is six miles distant from any other point.

They further state that they are desirous that their locality should be erected into a municipal district to be governed by a council as provided by the said Act, and suggest the following boundaries for such district (as described on a plan which accompanied the petition), viz. —

“Commencing at a point on the northern boundary fence of the Melbourne and Mount Alexander railway at its intersection with the western side of Moonee Ponds Creek; thence along the northern fence of the railway for a distance of eighty-seven chains, more or less, by a curved line having an average bearing of west by 8° 30' north to its intersection with the eastern side of the Saltwater River; thence for a distance of three hundred and four chains, more or less, along the eastern side of the Saltwater River, being an irregular line having a general bearing of north by 38° 30' west to the intersection of the western boundary of No. 1 allotment of portion 7, in the parish of Jika-Jika, with the northern side of the Saltwater River; thence by a line for a distance of one hundred and thirty chains, more or less, bearing due north to its intersection with the northern side of the one-chain Mount Macedon road; thence by a line for a distance of seventy-two chains, more or less, bearing east by 8° south to the intersection of the eastern side of the Main Melbourne road with the northern side of Woodland street; thence due east for a distance of one hundred and fourteen chains, more or less, along the northern side of Woodland street to its intersection with the western side of Moonee Ponds Creek; thence for a distance of five hundred and twenty-five chains, more or less, along the western side of Moonee Ponds Creek, being an irregular line having a general bearing of south by 10° east to the point of commencement, all the above being situate in the parish of Doutra Galla, county of Bourke.”

The petitioners state, lastly, that they are desirous that the district above described be proclaimed as the municipal district of Essendon and Flemington, and pray as follows, viz. —

“Your petitioners therefore pray your Excellency that the before described boundaries may be constituted the limits of the municipal district; that your Excellency will be pleased to constitute the same under the name of ‘The Municipal District of Essendon and Flemington;’ and that your Excellency will also be pleased to issue the necessary Proclamation for declaring it a municipality, and defining the limits accordingly.”

**REGISTRAR GENERAL'S REPORT ON THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF OCTOBER, 1861.**

In the report for September, it was stated that an unusually low rate of mortality had prevailed in Melbourne and suburbs during that month, but a still lower one obtained in October, the deaths in it having numbered only 226 or 7.29 daily, against 234 or 7.80 daily in the former month. In October, 1860, the high number of 377 deaths occurred, or 151 more than in the month under review; and in October, 1859, 225 deaths took place, being one less in actual numbers than in that month, but being a higher rate, if the difference in the population at the two periods be taken into account; that number of deaths representing 1.76 in a 1000 of the population of the district in October, 1859, whilst the deaths in the month now being reported on are in the proportion of only 1.61 in a 1000 of its present inhabitants.

The mean temperature of the month, as registered at the Flagstaff Observatory, was 58.7°, or the same as that of October, 1859, but 2 degrees higher than that of October, 1860. The maximum (87.1°) was at 1 p.m. on the 20th, and the minimum (40°) at 5 a.m. on the 6th, the range during the month thus being 57°. The greatest daily range (35°) was on the 27th, from a maximum of 80.6° to minimum of 45.6; the least (10.2) was on the 16th, from a maximum of 60.2° to a minimum of 50°, and the mean daily range was 19.7°. The mean height of the barometer was 29.797 in. as against 29.9 for October, 1860. The highest point indicated by the mercury (30.224 in.) was at 9 a.m. on the 13th, and the lowest (29.336 in.) was at 10 p.m. on the 1st, the range of pressure for the month thus being .889 in.

The deaths of males during the month numbered 124, or 55 per cent., and those of females 102, or 45 per cent. of the total deaths. Children under the age of five years for the first time since last July, died in larger numbers than persons above that age, the proportions being 115 to 111, or 51 to 49 per cent. The excess of the deaths of young children over those of older children and adults is as yet only slight, but the experience of former years leads to the expectation that for several months to come that excess will increase considerably. In October last year the deaths of children under five years of age were in the proportion of 63 per cent. of the total, but at that time scarlatina and measles were raging, and caused upwards of 50 per cent. of the infantile mortality.

The greatest number of deaths occurring in any one day was 16, on the 31st, on no other day did a larger number than 12 deaths appear in the returns.

One octogenarian, a male, died during the month; he was described as a laborer, and the cause of death was bronchitis. A female at 40 years of age described as a domestic, died of psoriasis, a kind of leprosy; two adults and a child of 9 years of age, all

three males, were accidentally drowned; a man was hanged, judicially; a railway gatekeeper was killed through being passed over by a train; a child of 11 months old died of a scald, an infant was suffocated in bed, another was found dead, supposed to have been destroyed at its birth, and a child of 3½ years old died of a fractured skull, the manner of the accident not being stated.

Forty deaths or nearly 18 per cent. occurred in public institutions and gaols. Of these 25 took place in the Melbourne Hospital, 5 in the Benevolent Asylum, 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Immigrants' Home, 1 in the Lying-in Hospital, 1 in the Melbourne Gaol, and 1 in the prison hulk *Success*.

NOTE.—The population of the different sub-districts according to the recent census is given subject to future revision, but it is believed that when finally corrected the figures will not differ materially from the above.

The number of children dying before attaining their fifth year was 115, of whom the larger number, 62 or 54 per cent., were females, leaving only 53 or 46 per cent. of males. Of both sexes, 65 were less than a year old, 26 were between one year and two, 9 between two years and three, 7 between three years and four, and 8 between four years and five.

Of the persons above five years of age who died during the month, 71 or 64 per cent. were males, and 40 or 36 per cent. were females. Seven were between five years and ten, 5 between ten and fifteen, 2 between fifteen and twenty, 3 between twenty and twenty-five, 12 between twenty-five and thirty, 13 between thirty and thirty-five, 16 between thirty-five and forty, 10 between forty and forty-five, 8 between forty-five and fifty, 13 between fifty and fifty-five, 9 between fifty-five and sixty, 4 between sixty and sixty-five, 1 between sixty-five and seventy, 6 between seventy and seventy-five, 1 between seventy-five and eighty, and 1 between eighty and eighty-five.

As was also the case in September, the greatest number of deaths resulted from diseases of the respiratory system, of which class phthisis caused 25 deaths and pneumonia 16 in October against 23 and 21 in the previous month. Next in order in October and showing equal numbers appear zymotic diseases and those of the respiratory system, the former having much declined since the previous month, and having only caused 17 per cent. of the total deaths against 24 per cent. in that month, the latter having increased, chiefly owing to the large number of deaths of children (18) from convulsions; diseases of uncertain seat show a slight increase, principally in atrophy and debility in infants, the numbers dying from those diseases exceeding by 6 those in September, although less by 6 than those in October, 1860. Diseases of the digestive organs also increased from 5.36 to 10.62 per cent. of the total. The number of deaths resulting from violent or accidental causes was remarkably low in October, only 8 having been returned against 20 in the previous month.

To the Honorable the Commissioner of Lands and Survey, to have the common at Fyansford proclaimed.—The common has been proclaimed.

To the Honorable the Chief Secretary, requesting the Government not to assent to Bye-law 18 of the Corporation of Geelong, which bye-law imposed a yearly tax on all vehicles found within the town of Geelong, whether the owners thereof lived within the town or not, and notwithstanding such vehicles were licensed in the district from whence they came; and pointing out to the Government the injustice of the bye-law, and the evil effects which would accrue should it come into operation.—Not granted, the bye-law having previously been assented to.

Further letter to the Government on this subject, requesting that in accordance with the Act the Governor would exercise his power and extend the time for the bye-law coming into force.—Not granted, the time for the Governor exercising this power having expired.
