WHEREAS by an Order of the Governor in Council, made on the fourteenth day of February, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, the Court of Mines within and for the mining district of Beechworth was ordered to be holden at Indigo, in the said mining district, once at least in every three calendar months: And whereas it is deemed expedient to discontinue the holding of such court at Indigo: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that the said Court of Mines within and for the said mining district of Beechworth shall be no longer holden at Indigo aforesaid from and after the termination of the sittings of the said court commenced on the 19th day of February instant.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted, that within and for every mining district therein referred to there shall be a court to be called "The Court of Mines," and such court shall be holden at such intervals and at such places within such district as the Governor in Council shall from time to time direct: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the seventh day of January, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, the Court of Mines for the mining district of Beechworth was ordered to be holden at divers places therein mentioned: And whereas it is expedient that such court should also be holden at Chiltern: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct, that the said Court of Mines within and for the mining district of Beechworth shall be holden at Chiltern once at least in every three calendar months.

THE COUNTY COURT TRANSFERRED FROM INDIGO TO CHILTERN.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-fifth day of February, 1861.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for the more easy recovery of certain Debts and Demands*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, to direct that county courts shall be holden for the recovery of debts and demands under the said Act, and with the advice aforesaid to alter the place of holding any such court, or to direct that the holding of any such court be discontinued, and from time to time, with the advice aforesaid, to direct in what towns and places a county court shall be holden, and that the judge of each court holden under the said Act shall attend and hold such court at the place where the Governor, with the advice aforesaid, shall have directed that such court shall be holden, at such times as such judge shall appoint for that purpose, so that a court shall be holden in such place once at least in such interval as the Governor, with the advice aforesaid, shall in each case direct: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the fifth day of December, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, it was ordered that a county court should be holden at Indigo once at least in every three calendar months: And whereas it is expedient to alter the place for holding such court: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present order alter the place for holding the said county court in manner following, that is to say:—

The county court hitherto holden at Indigo shall from and after the termination of the sittings of such court commenced on Monday, the 18th day of February instant, be transferred to and holden at Chiltern, and the holding thereof at Indigo aforesaid shall from thenceforth be discontinued.

And the Honorable Richard Davies Ireland, Her Majesty's Attorney General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

FARMERS' COMMONS.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of parliament holden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, upon the petition of not less than ten occupiers of not less than five hundred acres of adjacent purchased land, to proclaim that any Crown lands within five miles of such purchased land (the area of such Crown lands not being more than three times the area of the purchased land) shall be a Common for the use of such occupiers of the said purchased land as shall cultivate at least one-fourth of his or their purchased land, and every such common shall be called a "Farmers' Common," provided that nothing in the now reciting section shall be deemed or taken to prevent any such lands from being sold under the said Act upon the application of persons desirous of purchasing the same; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council shall have full power from time to time to make any

rules and regulations for imposing any conditions or limitations on the exercise of the right of common upon any Farmers' Common: And whereas the occupiers of purchased land in or near the localities hereinafter mentioned have petitioned for Farmers' Commons in accordance with the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the Crown lands hereinafter described to be FARMERS' COMMONS for the use of the occupiers of purchased land within the meaning and intention and subject to the provisions of the said Act, and also under and subject to such conditions or limitations on the exercise of the right of common as may be hereafter prescribed, that is to say:—

AT ARGYLE AND LINTON'S, COUNTY OF GRENVILLE, PARISH OF ARGYLE.—Extent, about 3522 acres: Commencing at the south-west angle of section 7, Emu Hill, parish of Argyle; bounded on the south by a line bearing west about 125 chains to the Nalanghil Creek; on the west by this creek in a north-westerly direction about 40 chains, and by a line bearing north about 175 chains; on the north by a line bearing east about 160 chains; on the east by the township of Linton's, bearing south 55 chains; on the north by this township, bearing east 40 chains; on the east by Linton's pre-emptive right, bearing south 69 chains 57 links; on the south by sections 1, 5, and 6, parish of Argyle; on the east by section 6, bearing south 50 chains 8 links; on the north by section 6, bearing east 10 chains; and on the east by section 7, bearing south 40 chains to the commencing point.

AT BULLAROOK AND SPRING HILL, COUNTY OF TALBOT, PARISH OF BULLAROOK.—Comprising the unappropriated Crown lands within the parish of Bullarook.

AT BUNINYONG, COUNTY OF GRANT, PARISH OF BUNINYONG.—Extent, about 3519 acres: Commencing at the south-west angle of section 1, parish of Buninyong; bounded on the north by a line bearing west about 40 chains to the south-east angle of section 129, parish of Buninyong, and by sections 129, 130, 131, 133, 134, and 143; on the west by part of Learmonth's pre-emptive section; on the north by the south boundary of same westerly to the Leigh River; on the west by the Leigh River in a south-easterly direction to a point on the east bank bearing east from the north-east angle of section 1, Hardie's Hill survey; on the south from the last-named point by a line bearing east about 1 mile 60 chains; and on the east by a line bearing north about 2 miles 20 chains to commencing point.

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS ACT.
SMYTHESDALE.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and fifty-five householders resident at Smythesdale, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

R. HEEALES.

The petitioners state that the township of Smythesdale is situated in the centre of a very extensive mining district; that the dwellings of the inhabitants are of a substantial character, and have been erected at considerable expense; and that there

are more than 300 householders resident within the boundaries of the township.

That no provision exists for the formation and maintenance of the roads and streets of the township, which consequently are sometimes nearly impassable, and over which very heavy machinery and merchandise have to be carried at great risk and expense; and that the erection of the township into a municipal district will tend greatly to advance its interests and materially aid its improvement and good government.

The petitioners suggest that the boundaries of the township specified in the *Government Gazette* [of 19th April, 1859, page 808] be the boundaries of the municipality.

And the petitioners pray as follows, viz. :—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that the district so defined may be proclaimed a municipality under the name of 'The Municipal District of Smythesdale,' according to the provisions of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15."

The mortality of Melbourne and suburbs, which had been increasing steadily during each of the last three months of 1860, apparently reached its highest point in the December of that year, as the recorded deaths in January, 1861, showed a decrease upon those of that month of 75 in number, or of 2.42 in the average daily rate. The month of January however, showed an augmented mortality as compared with the same month last year, the increase being in numbers from 407 to 450 deaths, or in daily average from 13.1 to 14.5.

The mean temperature in the shade during the month was 67.2°, against 66.3° for the month of December, and against 68.7° for the month of January, 1861. The greatest heat was experienced at 3 p.m. on the 10th, when the thermometer stood at 98.4°, and the least at 5 a.m. on the 22nd, when it fell to 51.6°. The days of highest and lowest range were the 11th and 31st respectively; on the first of which days the range was 37.4°, from a maximum of 94.5° to a minimum of 57.1°, and on the second it was 4.3°, from a maximum of 63.1° to a minimum of 58.8°; the range between the highest and lowest of the month was 46.8°. The mean height of the barometer during the month was 29.798 in., against 29.827 in. for the same month in 1860. The greatest pressure (30.069 in.) was at 8 a.m. on the 6th, and the least (29.423 in.) at noon on the 21st, the range for the month thus being .646 in.

For the first four weeks in January the mean temperature, number of deaths, and daily average of mortality were as follow:—

Of the 450 deaths which occurred during the month, 245, or 54.4 per cent., were of males, and 205, or 45.6 per cent., of females: 321 deaths, or 71.3 per cent., were of children under, and 129, or 28.7 per cent., were of persons over five years of age. All these proportions were within a fraction identical with those which obtained in the month of December; the diminished mortality in January, as compared with that in the previous month, was therefore distributed in about the same ratio amongst males and females, and amongst persons under and over five years of age.

The day of greatest mortality was the 10th, on which the large number of 30 deaths occurred; 25 deaths also took place on the 24th, 22 on the 5th and 14th, 20 on the 19th, 19 on the 1st and 2nd, and 18 on the 6th. In the month of December the largest number of deaths in any one day was 31, in November it was 23, in October 24, and in January, 1860, it was 30. One octogenarian, a female, died during the month, at the age of 87 years.

The deaths occurring in charitable institutions during the month numbered 43, or about nine and a half per cent. of the total deaths; of these, 30 occurred in the Melbourne Hospital, 5 in the Benevolent Asylum, 2 in the Immigrants' Home, and 6 in the Yarra Bend Asylum.

Of 321 deaths which occurred during the month to children under five years of age, 176 or 54.8 per cent. were of males, and 145 or 45.2 per cent. were of females, which proportions differed but slightly from those in the month of December. About half the entire number, or 162 deaths, were of children of less than a year old, 87 were of children between one year and two; 36 of children between two years and three; 22 between three years and four, and 14 between four years and five.

Of 129 persons who died at ages above five years, 69, or 53.5 per cent., were males, and 60, or 46.5 per cent., were females. In the month of December the proportions were of males 55 per cent., and of females 45 per cent. Of the deaths occurring in January, 33 were of persons between five years and ten, 6 between ten and fifteen, 5 between fifteen and twenty, 7 between twenty and twenty-five, 9 between twenty-five and thirty, 15 between thirty and thirty-five, 10 between thirty-five and forty, 17 between forty and forty-five, 8 between forty-five and fifty, 5 between fifty and fifty-five, 6 between fifty-five and sixty, 5 between sixty and sixty-five, 1 between seventy and seventy-five, 1 between seventy-five and eighty, and 1 between eighty-five and ninety years of age.

The principal feature discoverable upon an examination of the above table is, that zymotic diseases, which in December decreased in their proportions to the total as compared with the previous month from 48 to 42 per cent., again rose in their proportions in January to 47.56 per cent. Of the particular diseases of this class resulting fatally, scarlatina in January occasioned 73 deaths against only 56 in December, and diarrhoea caused 65 deaths against 49 in December; but deaths from measles decreased in January from 45 to 16, and those from dysentery from 30 to 15. Deaths from typhus fever, croup, thrush, and cholera each showed a slight increase in January, whilst during the same month those from whooping cough and diphtheria slightly diminished in numbers.

Of sporadic diseases, deaths from those of uncertain seat decreased from 84 in number, or 16 per cent. of the total, in December, to 60, or little over 13 per cent. of the total in January; but other classes of sporadic diseases did not vary much in their proportions from those in December. Deaths from old age increased in January from 4 to 6 cases, but whether owing to the non-registration of the inquests which were held during the month, or from the fact of but few accidents having occurred, only two deaths from external causes appeared in January's returns against 11 in those of December.

5. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supply as to the quality, the

same is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the engineer-in-chief of railways, and the decision of the board is to be final.

6. If the delay necessary for obtaining the decision of a board of survey should be detrimental to the public service, the engineer-in-chief, or officer in charge at the station, will have the power to reject coal which is obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and the contractor must take back the rejected coal and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense charged as in clause 2.

7. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor to such mulct, not exceeding Fifty pounds, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government to terminate the contract forthwith.

8. It will be competent for the contractor, or for the Government Storekeeper on behalf of the Government, to terminate the contract by giving in writing a notice of three calendar months, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month.

MUNICIPALITY OF SANDRIDGE.

THE First Half-yearly Report of the Municipal Council of Sandridge, up to the 16th February, 1861.

ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN.

The first meeting of the council was held on 16th August, 1860. There were present Councillors Morley, Thomas, Swallow, Isaacs, Allen, and Glynn. Two names were put in nomination for the office of chairman, viz.:—Councillor Morley, and Councillor Plummer, who was absent. Councillor Swallow declined to vote. Councillor Morley was elected by a majority of one.

RESIGNATION AND ELECTION.

On the 23rd August, 1860, Councillor Plummer sent in his resignation, which was accepted by the council; and on 28th

No. 31.—MARCH 1, 1861.—7.

November, 1860, an election was held to supply the vacancy thus occasioned in the council. Richard Elworthy, Esq., was elected, and took his seat at the council table at the sixteenth meeting.

APPOINTMENTS.

On 30th August, 1860, Mr. Edward Clark, of Sandridge, was appointed clerk to the council.

On 6th December, 1860, Mr. Frederick William Bull, of Williamstown, was appointed town surveyor, rate collector, and inspector of nuisances; but the council finding that the duties of surveying interfered with the collection of the rates, advertised for tenders for collecting on commission, and on the 31st January, 1861, Mr. John Gledhill's tender for collecting at 2½ per cent. was accepted.

The Honorable R. S. Anderson, M.L.A., has consented to act as solicitor to the council.

Councillor Plummer did not attend the council previously to his resignation.

ASSESSMENT AND RATES.

At the third special meeting of the council, held on 29th October, 1860, a rate of One shilling and threepence in the pound was struck; the threepence being intended to meet the cost of lighting the district with gas. The valuation of property in the district was made by Mr. W. F. Westall, whose tender for that purpose was accepted by the council on the 30th August, 1860. The number of buildings in the district at the time of making the valuation was 914. The amount of assessment after appeal was £36,675 at 1s. 3d. = £2289 13s. 9d. The reductions on appeal amounted to about 2½ per cent. on the total original assessment.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been passed by the council and assented to by His Excellency the Governor:—

No. 1. To regulate, by means of standing orders, the proceedings of the municipal council of Sandridge.

No. 2. For regulating the proceedings at the election of chairman, and at elections of members of the municipal council, and public meetings of ratepayers.

No. 3. For levying a rate of One shilling and threepence in the pound for the current municipal year 1860-1.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The following works have been carried out:—

Cleansing channels in Beach and Bay streets.

Cleansing Bay street of drift sand, from Liardet street to Graham street.

Cleansing sand from off Beach street.

Taking up and relaying cube crossing at the intersection of Bay and Graham streets.

Repairing culvert on Sandridge road.

Board at south end of lagoon to warn passengers of danger.

The fencing-in of the general market reserve has been just completed. The making-up of footpaths in Beach and Bay streets is now in progress.

The following works are under consideration:—

Raising Heath and Nott streets, from Raglan street to Ingles street, and forming same.

Forming and metalling Liardet street, a width of 15 feet, from Bay street to Railway place.

Forming and metalling Graham street, from Railway place to Railway fence.

Making up Beach street, from Railway place to Bay street.

Forming and kerbing footpath in Station place.

Forming and kerbing footpaths in Bay and Graham streets, and the Sandridge road to the boundary.

Drainage of the swamp in the centre of the township.

BEACH STREET.

A correspondence with the Government has been in progress since September last on the subject of Beach street. Previously to the proclamation of this district as a municipality, the council of the corporation of Melbourne caused Beach street, with some other streets in the district, to be defined on a plan which was submitted to and approved of by His Excellency the Governor and the Executive Council. In pursuance of this approval the streets defined were proclaimed on 19th March, 1860. The municipal council having had under consideration the dirty, dangerous, and disgraceful state of Beach street, caused by certain parties keeping thereon, in the most disorderly manner and without reference to public safety and convenience, lumber, old iron, and marine stores, determined to give said parties one month's notice to clear the street. This was not attended to, and the consequence was that these parties were summoned to the Sandridge police court under 18 Victoria No. 14; the magistrates remanded the cases for the purpose of seeking the opinion of the law officers of the Crown. On the re-hearing of the cases, that opinion, it was stated by the bench, was adverse to the authority of the council, because the width of the street (although set forth on the plan) had not been defined in feet in the proclamation, and therefore the bench dismissed the cases. The council, however, maintain that the Government is bound, from the fact of having assented to the plan, which shows the width, to remedy the defect stated by the law officers, and re-proclaim Beach street according to the plan. The council has every reason to believe that the new proclamation will shortly be gazetted.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The importance of a road between this municipality and that of St. Kilda has occupied the attention of the council, and mutual action by the two councils has been taken in the matter, but the question is at present in abeyance.

The district is greatly indebted to the superintendent and directors of the Victoria Sugar Company for the gratuitous supply of the ashes produced on the company's premises. These ashes are now being largely used in the construction of footpaths.
