YOUR EXCELLENCY.

I am desired by the Committee of the British Syrian Relief Fund to transmit to you the enclosed papers relative to the terrible distress now prevailing in Syria.

You will see the noble efforts which are being made in England for the object, and also the principle of complete impartiality in the relief of the sufferers, which the committee have laid down for the administration of the funds entrusted to them.

It has appeared to the committee very desirable that the Colonies and India should have the opportunity of assisting in this benevolent and most urgent object.

The active and generous aid afforded to the committee by members of Her Majesty's Government sufficiently demonstrates their approval of our proposal to bring the subject before the communities dependent on the British Crown through Her Majesty's representatives in each country.

We venture, therefore, to ask you to consider the propriety of placing the enclosed documents before the leading promoters of humane and benevolent objects in the districts over which your official influence more especially extends, with a view to their forming committees to second the efforts of the Syrian Relief Committee in London.

We shall be thankful to receive any communication that you may think fit to send us in reply to this letter.

The British public have by this time become fully informed, by newspaper and parliamentary reports, of the almost unexampled extent of the destitution and misery which have been occasioned by the late frightful massacres of the Christians in Syria and the Holy Land, and which plead most impressively for immediate and effectual succour. No. 5.—January 8, 1861.—1.

It is needless to dwell on the fearfulness of the tragedy. The carnage of Lucknow and Oude was not equal to that of Lebanon and Damascus. The male Christian population in some places is not decimated but exterminated. The Christian quarter of Damascus is not plundered—it is rased. Their merchant princes are begging their bread. The widows, orphans, and helpless, homeless wanderers are reckoned by thousands. Women are basely sold to unclean, savage purchasers. Compared to these scenes the chivalrous wars of Europe were very mercy.

It rests with the governments of Europe to punish the guilty, to devise measures for restoring permanent tranquillity to those regions endeared by so many sacred associations, and to prevent religious persecution in the land of the patriarchs and

prophets, and the birth-place of Christianity.

But upon the humane people of this and other countries rests another duty,—a duty which is at the same time a privilege. We have to clothe the naked, to feed the starving, to heal the wounded, to shelter the houseless. Her Majesty the Queen, her Royal Consort, and H.R.H. the Duchess of Kent, have set a noble example, by making liberal contributions to the Syrian Fund. The great houses of this city, the merchants, traders, and bankers of London, have taken the lead, by donations proportioned to the emergency, varying from £300 to £100 and less. Her Majesty's ministers, and the leading statesmen of all parties are contributors, and several are members of the committee. It is earnestly and confidently hoped that all classes in the United Kingdom will respond to the appeal which the committee of the Syrian Relief Fund now addresses to them for help proportioned to the vastness of this emergency. We earnestly call upon the mayors and provosts of all provincial cities and towns to initiate efforts to call forth the benificence of their fellow-townsmen. Above all we trust that the ministers of religion of every denomination,—the Anglican clergy, the Roman Catholic priesthood, the ministers of the Hebrew community, and of every persuasion of Dissenters, will heartily co-operate in this great work of philanthropy by private and congregational collections, and thus afford to the jarring and mutually exasperated sects of the East, and to the world at large, the most convincing evidence of the humanizing and harmonizing influence of the religion of the Biblo.

The following statement indicates the extent and variety of the sufferings for the relief of which the committee address this appeal to British humanity.

One hundred and fifty towns and villages have been pillaged and burnt, with the churches, patriarchates, monasteries, schools, the crops, silk factories, &c.; also the whole of the Christian houses in Damascus destroyed (a city in itself), including the European Consulates.

Sixteen thousand Christians have been killed, including the men, women, and children, murdered in cold blood. Also, Mr. Graham, and other missionaries; some of their corpses having been mutilated and thrown into the wells.

Three thousand Christian women, married and unmarried, have been sold as slaves into Turkish harems for a few shillings each.

Seventy thousand to eighty thousand persons, including twenty thousand widows and orphans, left homeless and starving.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE RELIEF COMMITTEE.

Amount raised to 17th September, about £14,000, including about £1000 contributed through a local committee at Manchester, and £1000 raised by a similar committee at Liverpool.

Similar local committees are beng formed, and it is hoped that their number will daily increase. Addresses have been issued by eminent members of the Jewish community and the Society of Friends, entreating the prompt assistance of the bodies to which they belong. Ministers of every religious persuasion in the United Kingdom and on the Continent are being appealed to for congregational collections. Many have been already made, and it is hoped that they will become universal. The Greek community in England have contributed most liberally.

Ladies' committees are being formed in London and the country for the collection of cast-off garments, remnants, and soiled or damaged goods, suitable for clothing; and the warehousemen and manufacturers of the kingdom are being appealed to for the same purpose. Of the London Committee, Lady Stratford de Redeliffe is president; Lady Monteflore, vice-president; and the Countess of Shaftesbury and Miss Florence Nightingale are members.

Contributions have been received from Paris, Hamburg, Calais, Toulouse, and other continental cities, and zealous efforts are being made in the United States.

The Consul-General at Beyrout, chairman of the corresponding committee there, has been authorized by telegrams kindly transmitted by the Foreign Office, to draw upon the treasurer for £10,000, and to employ, at the charges of the London Committee, the refugees at Beyrout in the cleansing of the town.

A lady, who has long resided in Syria, is about to revisit that country, and, under the auspices of the London Committee, and the more immediate arrangements of the Beyrout Committee, to aid in the distribution of relief, in food, clothing, &c., more especially to women, children, and invalids.

HOME

The British Syrian, Relief Committee was constituted in consequence of the fearful massacres in Syria. A meeting was held in the house of Lord Stratford de Redcliffe, on 19th July, 1860, at which were present (besides his lordship) Admiral Sir Charles Napier, M.P., Sir James Fergusson, Bart, M.P., Sir Culling Eardley, Bart, J. P. Kennard, Esq., M. Spartali, Esq., and others; it was resolved that a committee for relief of the sufferers should be formed, and Sir Culling Eardley, Bart, and Sir James Fergusson, Bart, M.P., were requested to act as honorary secretaries. The first meeting of the newly formed committee was held at the Adelphi Hotel, Sir James Fergusson in the chair, when Mr. Cyrus R. Edmonds (formerly corresponding secretary of the Indian Relief Fund) was appointed official secretary.

FUNDS RAISED.

The amount received up to 17th September is about £14,000, including donations from Her Majesty the Queen, H.R.H. the Prince Consort, H.R.H. the Duchess of Kent, Lord John Russell (Minister of Foreign Affairs), Viscount Palmerston (Prime Minister), the Earl of Derby, Lord Stratford de Redelice (late British Ambassador in Turkey), Sir Moses Montefiore, Baron Rothschild, M.P., Baring Brothers, Lord Stanley, the Marquis of Westminster, the Bishop of London, with other prelates, &a., &c.

CIRCULARS.

Circular letters have been addressed to the following classes of persons, and are still in daily course of issue:-

- a. To clergymen of the Church of England throughout the United Kingdom.
- b. To nonconformist ministers.
- c. To the rabbis of the Jewish community.
- d. To bankers and joint-stock banking companies.
- e. To the lord mayors, mayors, lord provests, provests, town commissioners, and other chief officers of cities and boroughs.
- f. To the peers of the realm.
- g. To the members of the House of Commons.
- h. To manufacturers and warehousemen throughout the United Kingdom.
- i. To newspaper proprietors.
- k. To insurance companies.
- To leading Protestant ministers, noblemen, and gentlemen in France, Germany, Austria, Russia, Prussia, Denmark, Sweden, Holland, Belgium, &c., &c.
- m. To Jewish rabbis in the same countries.
- n. To governors and viceroys of British colonies in India, Canada, Australia, the West Indies, &c., &c.
- o. To British ambassadors, consuls-general, and consuls in Europe, and other parts of the world.
- p. To Foreign ambassadors and consuls in England.

The committee have requested the clergy and ministers of all religious denominations to preach in behalf of the suffering thousands in Syria, and to make congregational collections. The mayors and provosts have been urged to exert themselves for the object, and to hold meetings for the purpose of giving information as to the lamentable state of the sufferers, and the efforts and objects of this committee. The foreign Protestants have been advised, if it was found possible, to constitute committee on the basis of the British Syrian Relief Committee, including humane persons of all classes, to unite themselves with their fellow-countrymen, securing an impartial administration of relief without regard to creed, race, or sect. In the absence of suitable local arrangements, the British Syrian Relief Committee would be happy to furnish a channel for conveying and distributing all foreign contributions.

The same advice was given to the foreign Jews; and a circular was also enclosed in each letter, written by the Rev. Dr. Adler, chief rabbi of the Jews in the United Kingdom, from which we extract the following passage:—

"And to your sympathy, my beloved brethren, these unparalleled sufferings appeal the more strongly, because they have occurred in the land of our fathers—that land which is the cradle of our religion—that land with which our past glory and future hopes are inseparably connected. Trucly, 'the Lebanon has opened its doors to the fire of destruction and desolation.'"

AGENCY IN THE PROVINCES.

It was soon found that much larger sums would be secured by a systematic visitation of the chief towns and cities of the United Kingdom, than by the circulation of appeals, however impressive. In consequence, the committee have detached Mr. R. R. Alexander (son of the late Bishop of Jerusalem) from his post in the Syrian Relief Office, and he begins this week his tour into the country to impart information, to organize local committees, and to raise funds for this object.

An address to the Scottish people has been issued by this committee, and has been kindly inserted gratuitously in many of the Scotch newspapers. It is hoped that the effect of the appeal will be that the Scotch people will originate a national movement in co-operation with this committee for the relief of the suffering Syrians.

The committee are happy to say that in numerous churches and chapels collections have been made for Syria, and they are encouraged to believe that their appeal to the hearts of British Christians will elicit a general and cordial response.

FOREIGN.

It is most gratifying to the committee to learn, from the replies which they have received from foreign Protestants, that almost in every country most vigorous efforts are made to relieve the Syrian sufferers. In many instances their contributions have been remitted directly to Beyrout; but several of our Protestant brethren are availing themselves of the offer of this committee, and have promised to transmit their contributions through our hands.

FRANCE.

The Protestants of Toulouse have kindly transmitted a sum of £50 is. The editors of the religious Protestant newspapers of Paris have made an united appeal to the French Protestants, and the funds thus raised will be forwarded to the British Committee.

We learn that the collections made in the Roman Catholic churches of France are remitted to the bishops, and through them to the Roman Catholic authorities in Syria, and to the French Sisters of Mercy, who have several establishments in that country. It is but natural that the French Protestants and Jews should wish to secure an impartial distribution of their subscribed funds through the medium of the British Committee. The subscriptions announced in the Moniteur exceed the sum of 300,000 francs.

HOLLAND,

An influential committee, representing the various classes and religious communities of Holland, is at work in Amsterdam. Our correspondent, the well-known Dr. Cappadose, of the Hague, writes:—

"This com nittee is remarkable for its catholicity, one of its members being an Israelite advocate, the other a Roman Catholic physician, another a clergyman of the Reformed Church, and another a minister of a Baptist congregation. The Burgomaster of Amsterdam engaged to send over the collected money to some friends in Syria, who are well-known to him, and gives full assurance that the contributions will be administered with the greatest impartiality."

BELGIUM.

The Protestants send their contributions to their French brethren, which will thus flow into the same channel, viz., the London Committee.

SWITZERLAND.

We hear from Geneva that-

"Collections are being made in the various Protestant cantons of Switzerland for the sufferers in Syria. At Berne and Lausanne it is in consequence of your appeal; at Geneva and other places associations were already at work in connection with a committee at Beyrout, presided over by Mr. Duchéne, Consul for Switzerland and Belgium, and to him I have sent my contribution."

Another correspondent of Geneva writes us, "That the collection made through the Semaine Religieuse will be transmitted to the London Committee."

GERMANY.-1, PRUSSIA.

A powerful appeal has been made by the Neue Evangelische Kirchenzeitung, the organ of the German branch of the Evangelical Alliance, and we are glad to see that contributions from all parts of Prussia are being transmitted to the editor of that journal. They will be forwarded to the Prussian Consul-General at Beyrout, who, we doubt not, has by this time, in compliance with the request of the London Committee, been added to the committee presided over by the British Consul-General at Beyrout. The correspondent of our committee writes us:—

"We desire to spend a part of our collection on the education of Syrian orphan children, either by some Evangelical pastor missionary at Beyrout, or in the Institution of Deaconesses in Smyrna, who have just purchased a large house for that purpose and will send one of their number to Beyrout, in order to accompany the children to the Asylum at Smyrna.

2. HAMBURG.

"A committee has been formed," as our correspondent informs us, "consisting of bankers, merchants, and clergy, of different denominations, and their appeal has already been published." Our correspondent writes:—"We are stirring, and whatever funds a gracious God may induce our brethren in this place to give for the cause, will be forwarded in due time to your committee."

3. WURTEMBERG.

In reply to our letters to Würtemberg, we hear-

"That a number of Christian friends have already begun to collect for the relief of the suffering brethren in Syria, and that their appeal appears to be in the way of being liberally responded to. Prelate von Kapff, of Stuttgardt, has taken the lead in this matter, and Bishop Gobat, of Jerusalem, is to be entrusted with the distribution of the funds."

4. BAVARIA.

The Protestants of this country, as we hear from a leading man among them, have already resolved to send their funds to the Berlin Committee.

5. FRANKFORT.

A committee is vigorously at work in this town, and it is expected that their collections will be transmitted through the British Committee.

We hope to report shortly of efforts being made in other parts of Germany. We have addressed letters to the leading clergy and laymen in all the states of the Confederation, as well as to Hungary and other parts of Austria.

DENMARK.

From a friend in Copenhagen, we hear that he has united with Christian brethren in Denmark for the relief of the Syrian sufferers. He writes us, that at the end of a sermon he mentioned the distress and sufferings to which our brethern in Syria are exposed, and appealed to his congregation for help. The result was, that among other contributions a comparatively poor man brought to his house the sum of £1 10s., and the Queen Dowager of Denmark sent through her lady-in-waiting the sum of 100 Napoleons d'or (about £80), with the express desire that her donation should go through Pastor Fliedner, of Kaiserswerth, the well-known founder of the Protestant Deaconesses' Institutions, to one of which Miss Florence Nightingale belonged. Pastor Fliedner has formed in several parts of the East similar institutions, for instance, at Smyrna, Constantinople, &c., the members of which are occupied as nurses in the hospitals and as teachers of orphans. The institution at Smyrna has received a great number of Christian orphans, where they receive an evangelical scriptural education gratuitously.

The friends in Denmark have resolved to send part of the funds collected to the British Committee and part to Kaiserswerth.

AMERICA.

Our friends in the United States have formed a committee and issued an appeal, which is before us. Our correspondent writes, dating 26th August:—

"Our treasurer, Wm. A. Booth, Esq., reported that he had received something over 5000 dollars, or £1000, and that he had already remitted £300, and hoped to be able to send £1000 more by the steamer of this day. You will infer from this statement that our Christian people take a deep interest in this Syrian affair. There will be a large sum of money raised in this city and the country around that regards it as a metropolis. There will be much done in Boston and New England generally. Indeed, contributions will come from all parts of the country, and many prayers will continue to be offered up in our daily prayer meetings elsewhere, &c., &c."

From the Vice-Consul, Mr. Noel Moore, the committee has received a letter, addressed to Sir James Fergusson, of which the

following as an extract:—
"I notice carefully all you say about the subscription for the relief of the misery around us. You may rely that we will see a fair distribution of the liberal donation from England without 'favor, partiality, or affection,' and on the broadest principles; every confidence is to be reposed in the local committee, who are all honorable and unprejudiced men. We have hitherto received authority to draw for £2700 altogether; and have given more than £500 for the immediate wants of the unhappy sufferers, who are to be counted by the thousand. At Beyrout alone we have now about 20,000 of them, in a plight that would move the stones. Perhaps you will mention this to Sir Culling Eardley, to whom my father, in writing a short time ago, stated the figure at a somewhat lower number; but since the report of relief having come has gone abroad, the number in a few days rose to the above, and will go on daily increasing; all the particulars, moreover, you will soon have from the committee here in the shape of reports, &c. That an incalculable amount of real and substantial good will be and is done need not to be stated, all these wretches depending as they do on charity for food, shelter and clothing, in a greater or less degree. It will also raise our national name to an unprecedented height, especially as, with the exception of Greece, we are the first in the field, and we take good care that the source of the supply is generally known."

Mr. Consul-General Moore, under date 14th August, 1860, writes to Sir Culling Eardley, in reference to the earnest expression of the desire of the committee, that the supplies furnished should be distributed with the strictest impartiality, and without the slightest distinction of race or creed, in the following terms:—

"Your wishes as to the principles upon which the relief should be administered will be strictly adhered to; indeed, in their operation hitherto, those principles have been acted upon hitherto by the Beyrout Committee. The reports of our proceedings and operations will be duly forwarded to you for the information of those interested."

In reply, the committee have requested the Consul-General to incorporate with his committee the Prussian Minister, with the most suitable representatives of the Greek, Jewish, and Roman Catholic communities in Beyrout, and some friend of the Anglican Bishop of Jerusalem. The Consul-General was further requested to cause the refugees at Beyrout to be employed at the charges of the London Committee in thoroughly cleansing the town. With reference to this arrangement, the committee have received with great satisfaction an expression of marked approbation, conveyed in a very interesting letter from Miss Florence Wightingale. Several medical men have offered their services to go out to Syria, under the instructions of the London and Beyrout Committees, in order to attend on the sick, the numbers of whom are expected largely to increase, owing to the causes of disease

which invariably follow upon extreme privation and exposure. On this question, as on that respecting nurses, medicines, tents, &c., we have consulted the Consul-General, and while awaiting his reply, these proposals are held in abeyance. A lady, however, who has resided in Syria, and who is well acquainted with the districts and peoples visited by these calamities, is about to proceed to Beyrout, and, in connexion with the committee, there to minister to the necessities more especially of the women and children who have taken refuge there.

A committee of ladies is in process of formation, of which the Countess Stratford de Redeliffe has consented to be president, Lady Montefiore, vice-president, and to which the Countess of Shaftesbury, Miss Florence Nightingale, and other influential ladies, have consented to belong. The object of this committee is to collect materials suitable for clothing, more especially that of women and children, as well as garments, whether new or cast off, and all the requisite articles for needlework, which will be forwarded to the relief committee at Beyrout, presided over by Her Majesty's Consul-General. This committee, in the making up and distribution of such material and clothing, will be recommended to avail themselves of the Ladies' Committees already existing at Beyrout in such manner as they may deem most expedient. In connection with this department of operation an earnest application has been made to manufacturers and warehousemen throughout the kingdom for remnants, damaged goods, &c., &c.

The committee have received the following interesting communications from Syria:-

" Beyrout, 23rd August, 1860.

"At a meeting of the Anglo-American Relief Committee, the following statement and report were adopted, and ordered to be printed for circulation in England and America.

"NEVIN MOORE, H.B.M., Consul-General, "President.

About £543 10s., or P. 65,232

"The Anglo-American Relief Committee deem it due to the British Syrian Relief Committee, and to other committees and individuals who either have contributed, or propose to contribute aid to the Syrian sufferers from the present war, to keep them correctly informed as to its operations, and also as to the urgency of the distress that calls for relief. It is to secure these important objects that the following statements are made.

"Our committee originated in a stern and terrible necessity. Many thousands of plundered helpless refugees fled suddenly into our city from the mountains, seeking protection from the devouring sword, and calling for food and shelter. The emergency was so pressing, unexpected, and overwhelming, that our first circular was sent off even before the organization of the committee could be completed, and before the full extent of the calamity was known. A second issue of the circular, however, was put forth as soon after the first as possible, showing not only the full organization of the committee, but also the immense addition to the amount of distress and suffering in consequence of the massacre at Damascus. The subjoined report of our sub-committee will show that the work of distributing food, clothing and medicine to the sufferers is now carried forward on a scale, small at the beginning, but which has rapidly expanded into dimensions quite beyond our ability, and revealing in its daily progress a mass of destitution and misery which is truly appalling.

"The basis of our organization is wholly unsectarian, and broad enough in its spirit and design to embrace all classes of sufferers from this war. Christians only are mentioned in our circular, and that simply because they are the only applicants for aid. Not a Druse, Mohammedan, or Jew has applied for assistance. The Druses remain masters of their half of the mountains, and from the enormous plunder of the Christians are richer than before the outbreak. The same is true of the Moslems who have taken part in the war; while the Jews have nowhere been either plundered or molested, except the very small community of Deir el Kamar. Of the 7000 who now receive daily aid from your charity, a very large majority are Maronites; the next most numerous class are Greek Catholics; a considerable number are of the Greek Church; while only about a hundred are Protestants. Should the changing fortunes of war reduce Druses, Moslems, Jews, or any other class of our population to the same destitution, we should be ready to extend to them the same kind of aid that we now give to the Christians.

"We would earnestly guard our patrons against the impression that the necessity for these charitable contributions will soon cease by the restoration of peace, and the re-establishment of government in this country. On the contrary, the number of the destitute is daily multiplying on our hands, and the suffering is becoming more and more stringent. Those who had a few piastres on their persons when they fled from their burning habitations have spent them; the 20,000 who escaped into the small district of Kesrawan have exhausted the resources of their brethren there, and are now drifting back upon us by thousands, seeking shelter and crying for bread, while long caravans from Damascus block up our streets with the despairing remnants of her Christian population. Many are sick; the children are dying off with alarming rapidity in our hot climate; epidemics are spreading amongst the half-fed, half-clothed, half-sheltered multitudes; and unless better food, clothing, and medical care are provided, the victims of of disease will ere long outnumber those of the sword. To alleviate this accumulating misery we distribute bread daily to more than 7000 poor; we have procured houses and tents as far as possible for shelter; we have voted to purchase and distribute, with the cooperation of a Ladies' Auxiliary Committee, 3000 garments; we have commenced a hospital for the sick; and opened a soup-kitchen chiefly, though not exclusively, for their benefit, and for mothers who nurse, hoping to save some of the children by giving to the mothers more nourishing food than mere dry bread.

"It must be obvious that these various operations, expanded by urgent necessity to meet the wants of thousands, must require a large and steady income. Nor is there any reason to hope that the calls for relief will materially diminish before October, and indeed we fear that the most pinching and ruinous poverty will be felt during the latter part of autumn, and through the rainy months of winter. Let not, therefore, the benevolent in England and America relax their efforts to save from starvation these remnants of Christian populations, rescued from the sword of Druse ferocity, and Mohammedan fanaticism. We will not faint under the perplexing and laborious work of distribution; but we cannot give more than is received, and when your donations fail, our distribution must cease.

"We gladly embrace this opportunity to notice the labors of others in this same work of charity. Many ladies and gentlemen have distributed food and clothing from their houses; and not a few native Christians, and even some Moslems, have received refugees, and to the extent of their means fed, sheltered, and clothed them. The Turkish Government has done the same to thousands, chiefly from Rasheiya, Hasbeiya, Deir el Kamar, and Damascus. From Greece and other parts of Europe liberal aid has been sent Bread has been regularly and largely distributed by the French Consul-General, and by the Lazarist clergy; and the Sisters of Charity have, from the first, displayed that activity, energy, and devotion to the claims of the suffering for which they are so justly distinguished. But it must be remembered that, of these sources of supply, some have already failed, others are fluctuating and uncertain, and all together, working up to their utmost capacity, still leave an immense surplus of destitution and distress, over which we can only drop the tear of sincere but unavailing sympathy.

Extract from a letter of the Rev. Dr. Thomson, dated the 31st August, 1860.

"Since this report was written, my branch of the work has rapidly grown on our hands. Our hospital is full, and multitudes of sick cannot be admitted or attended to in any way. The clothing department reveals frightful nakedness, and tasks all our sensibilities as well as abilities. The daily distributions are made to more than 8000. Our sub-committee, upon which devolves the working of this enormous charity, will have before it this afternoon applications to aid at least 8000 more, most of them at Sidon; the remnants of populations gathered there from the regions about Hastingo. At our last sitting we had an appeal for 3000 at Besherrah, near the cedars of Lebanon, who had fled thither from Baalbek, and the villages of the north part of Bukaoh. Thus the work grows to proportions so gigantic as quite to confound and bewilder us. We are spending at a rate that awakens fear as to funds in future. The beginnings were small; but to-day we work on a scale that overruns £500 a week, nor can I see how to lessen the outlay for many weeks to come. For this money we depend almost entirely on the princely liberality of England. America is far removed from the scene of trouble, and comparatively few of our people have ever had occasion to instruct themselves in the affairs of Syria. Many will, no doubt, contribute; but their aid will be long in reaching us, and multitudes will perish if we have to wait for a response from the United States."

A letter has also been received from Dr. Wortabet, of which the following is an extract:-

Nothing remains for me to tell you but how I have used my time since I landed in Syria. I went down to Sidon, and there finding about 7000 refugees sick and wounded, with no medical men, I at once applied myself to their service, and remained a fortnight. Much work may be done in Sidon, and if the good people who afforded me the means to come out will sustain me this winter, I believe I can be of great good as a medical man. A package of well-selected medicines will be very timely,

"From the letter of the correspondent of the Times you will have a faithful account of Syrian matters, and therefore I will not say a word about them other than to remark that the streets are crowded with the poor, while the Khans resound with the cry

of the maimed."
