NOTICE TO MUNICIPAL COUNCILS AND MINING BOARDS.

WITH the view of placing Towns and Gold Fields Commons under proper regulations, the attention of municipal councils and mining boards is requested to the following sections of the Crown Land Sales Act, 24 Victoria No. 117.

Commonage for Towns.

LXIX. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to proclaim that any Crown lands in the vicinity of any town shall be a common for the use of the inhabitants of such town, and all the inhabitants of such town and its vicinity shall from the time of such proclamation be entitled to depasture their cattle and horses on such common, and such common shall be called a "Town Common."

LXX. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, or in case such town common shall be included within or adjoin the limits of any municipal district, then for the municipal council of such district, with the consent of the Governor in Council, to make rules and regulations for determining how many horses and cattle every such inhabitant shall be entitled to depasture on any town common.

LXXI. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to proclaim that any Crown lands in the vicinity of any gold field shall be a common for the use of all holders of miners' rights, business licenses and carriers' licenses, and other residents on such gold field; and every such holder or other residents shall from the time of such proclamation be entitled to depasture his horses and cattle on such common, subject to the rules and regulations hereinafter mentioned, and such common shall be called a "Gold Fields Common."

LXXII. It shall be lawful for the mining heard of the rules.

LXXII. It shall be lawful for the mining board of the mining district within which such "Gold Fields Common" shall be included, with the consent of the Governor in Council, to make rules and regulations for determining how many horses and cattle every holder of a miner's right, business license or carrior's license, or other resident on a gold field, shall be entitled to depasture on any gold fields common.

REGULATION RESPECTING TELEGRAMS FOR THE PUBLIC PRESS AND SHIPPING INTELLIGENCE.

WHEREAS it is expedient to alter the charges for the
transmission of press messages, and to amend the practice in respect to the forwarding of shipping intelligence within
the colony of Victoria, by means of the Electric Telegraph:
Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the
advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order
direct that on and after the 1st day of April now next ensuing,
the amounts to be charged upon all messages forwarded by
electric telegraph on behalf of the public press shall be as follows:—

For every message to or from any place within the colony of Victoria, not exceeding twelve words, One shilling, and One penny for every additional word.

One penny for every additional word.

That on and after the 1st day of April aforesaid, the practice of forwarding shipping intelligence by electric telegraph, free of charge, shall be discontinued, and such intelligence shall only be obtained at the same rates and under the same conditions as other intelligence is obtainable by Government departments, the public, and the press of the colony, respectively.

Shipping intelligence shall only be supplied to the press, at press rates, after Six o'clock p.m.

And the Honorable Thomas Loader, Her Majesty's Postmaster General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

By His Excellency Sir Henry Barkly, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the Government Gazette, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him should seem meet, as and to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I. Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare that the portion of the county of Grant hereinafter defined shall be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, that is to say:—Commencing at a point on the coast of Corio Bay, being the north-east boundary of the corporation of Geelong, and following the coast line thence north-easterly to the mouth of the Little River; thence along the course of that river north-westerly to the north-west corner of the parish of Lara; thence south along the west side of that parish to its south-west corner; thence ast clong the north boundary of the parish of Lara; thence south along the west side of that parish to its south-west corner; thence ast clong the north boundary of the parish of Lara; thence south along the west side of that parish to its south-west corner; thence ast clong the north loundary of the parish of Yowang to its north-rest corner on Sutherland's Creek; thence southerly along the Jourse of that creek to its junction with the

Moorpanyal; thence along the south boundary of that parish' west to the west boundary of the Geelong corporation; thence northerly along the Geelong corporation west boundary to the north-west corner thereof; and thence by the north boundary of the said corporation to the commencing point.

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Corio Road District."

MUNICIPALITY OF CLUNES.

BYE-LAW NO. 4.—FOR THE SUPPRESSION OF THE NUISANCE ARISING FROM GOATS AND PIGS BEING ALLOWED TO GO AT LARGE WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF CLUNES.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, initialled, An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria, the council of any nuncipal district is authorised to make bye-laws for the suppression of nuisances, &c. Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Clunes, that from and after the date of this bye-law coming into operation, it shall not be lawful for the owner of any goat or pig to allow the same to be at large in any street or public place or in any unenclosed place within this municipality, whether the same be or be not public property; and any person or persons who shall so offend shall, on conviction before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding Porty shillings (40s.)

BYE-LAW\_No. 5.—FOR MAKING PROVISION FOR CALLING SPECIAL MEETINGS OF THE COUNCIL.

SPECIAL MEETINGS OF THE COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by a bye-law, No. 3, made by the municipal council of Hawthorn, to regulate, by means of Standing Orders, their proceedings, and which bye-law was assented to by His Excellency the Governor in Council and gazetted on the 20th day of November, 1860, and which said bye-law does not contain provision for calling special meetings of the council; Be it therefore enacted by the Hawthorn Municipal Council, that on and after this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor in Council, the following clause be incorporated and added to the "Order of Proceedings," chapter 1, of Bye-law No. 3:—

"The chairman, or any three councillors, shall have power to call a special meeting of the council by written instructions to the town clerk, provided that the notice be given two clear days before such meeting shall be held."

#### MUNICIPALITY OF KEW.

Bye-law No. 2.—A Bye-law to begulate, by means of Standing Orders, the Proceedings of the Council for the Municipal District of Kew.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18th Victoria No. 15, initiuled, An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria, it is among other things enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings: Bo it therefore ordered and directed by the council of the municipal district of Kew, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor the proceedings and business of the said municipal council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which

shall be and shall be called the Standing Orders of the said council, that is to say :-

council, that is to say:—

CHAPTER I.

1. Meetings of council.—The ordinary meetings of the council shall be held on Tuesday in each week, at half-past Seven o'clock in the evening, except otherwise ordered, and shall be open to the council.

1. Meetings of councit.—The ordinary meetings of the council shall be held on Tuesday in each week, at half-past Seven o'clock in the evening, except otherwise ordered, and shall be open to the public.

The business of the council shall on all ordinary occasions be conducted with open doors, but any member present may require the exclusion of strangers until it shall have been decided by the council whether the question proposed to be considered shall be discussed with open doors.

2. Adjournments.—The council shall have power to adjourn their ordinary meetings from time to time, such adjournment not being more than fourteen days from the last day of meeting.

3. Records of proceedings.—Minutes of the proceedings of all meetings of the council shall be drawn up and fairly entered into a book provided for that purpose, and the said minutes shall be open to the inspection of all persons on the ratepayers roll, free of charge, from Five o'clock p.m. to Seven o'clock p.m. on the Tuesday evening of each week, and from Twelve o'clock at moon to Five o'clock p.m. of every Saturday.

4. Time of commencing business.—At all meetings of the council the business shall be momence so soon as the legal quorum of three councillors are present; but should a quorum not be present at the expiration of fifteen minutes after the appointed time of meeting, such circumstance, with the names of the councillors present, shall be noted in the minute book, and the business of such meeting shall be postponed to the next ordinary meeting of the council.

5. Confirmation of minutes.—The first business at each meeting of the council shall be to confirm the minutes of the preceding neeting, and no discussion shall take place thereupon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings. The minutes, when confirmed, shall be signed by the chairman or councillor presiding at the meeting.

6. Order of business.—After the confirmation of the minutes, when confirmed, shall be signed by the chairman or councillor presiding at the meeting.

1. Reading copies of letters sent by order of the council.
2. Reading letters received, and considering and ordering

council at any particular meeting thereof, it may be altered by resolution to that effect:

7. Council to be communicated with by petition.—Every communication addressed to the council shall be in the form of a petition or memorial, and shall not be lithographed nor printed, but in writing, and must be signed by at least one person on every skin or sheet on which it is written. Every petition shall be presented by one of the members of the council, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded. On the prosentation of a petition on debate shall take place thereon until notice has been given in the usual manner, and the only questions that shall be entertained on its being presented shall be, that the petition be received, or that it be referred to a committee, or that it be taken into consideration with any order of the day to which such petition may refer; and every member presenting a petition to the council shall confine his remarks to a statement of, the names of the persons from whom it comes, the number of signatures attached to it, and the reading of the prayer of the petition.

8. Presentation of reports.—No report of a committee shall be considered nor adopted on its presentation nor until due notice thereof shall be given, nor shall any debate be allowed thereon except as to its being received and, if thought necessary, printed for distribution among the members of the council.

9. Reports to be numbered and signed.—The reports of each committee shall be into the proceeding of former meetings of the council and have proved the town clerk and signed.—The roports

15. Reference of proposed petitions to legislative committee.—No motion proposing any petition, address, or standing order, shall be entertained unless the mover shall submit therewith a draft of such petition, address, bye-law, or standing order, and the draft so submitted shall in no case be taken into consideration until it shall have been referred to the legislative committee, who shall report thereon, and the mover of every such proposition shall be, for that occasion, a member of such committee.

16. Manuscript motions to be preserved.—The original manuscript of any motion or amendment that is submitted to the council shall be preserved until the minutes of the meeting at which the same has been disposed of are confirmed in the usual

CHAPTER II.

ORDER OF DEBT.

17. Motions and amendments, how proposed.—Any member desirous of making a motion or amendment shall address the chairman, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall be silent until the member calling to order shall have been heard thereon and the question of order disposed of, when the member in possession of the chair shall proceed with the subject.

have been heard thereon and the question of order disposed of, when the member in possession of the chair shall proceed with the subject.

18. Any member desirous of proposing either an original motion or an amendment must state the nature of such motion or amendment before addressing the council in support thereof; and when making a motion or amendment shall put it in form, sign, and deliver it to the town clerk, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder; and no motion nor amendment so made shall be withdrawn without the leave of the council.

19. Seconding motions and enforcement of standing orders.—
No motion nor amendment shall be entertained nor discussed unless it be seconded. Any member may however require the enforcement of any standing order of the council by simply noticing that such order is disobeyed.

20. Speaking on moving or seconding a motion.—A member moving a motion shall be held to have spoken thereon, but a member merely seconding a motion without remark shall not be held to have spoken upon it.

21. Councillors to be addressed by their official titles.—The numbers in meetings of council shall designate each other by their official titles, namely, that of chairman or councillor.

22. Priority in speaking.—If two or more members shall rise to speak at the same time, the chairman shall decide which of them is entitled to priority.

23. Speaking twice on the same subject.—No member shall speak twice on the same question, except by way of explanation, or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment last carried, and after the reply, the amendment on the original motion, as the case may be, shall be imal on all questions of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument.

25. No councillor shall dirers from the subject under discussion, nor impute motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly.

26. Any councillor who shall use an expression capable of being offensively applied

quired by the charman, withdraw such expression, and make a satisfactory apology to the council, under a penalty of not more than Ten pounds.

27. When, in consequence of disorderly conduct, the chairman shall call upon any member of the council by name, such member shall withdraw immediately after having been heard in explauation, and after such member's withdrawal the council shall at once take the case into consideration.

28. Any member may require the town clerk to take down any particular words used by a member immediately upon the same being used.

29. Production of documents—Any member may of right require the production of any documents of the council relating to the question or matter under discussion.

30. Amendments.—One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but, if lost, another may be moved before the original question is put to the vote; but upon any amendment being carried, such amendment shall be held to have superseded the original motion, and for all purposes of subsequent discussion the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion, but it shall be competent for any member to move one other amendment thereon, but not more.

31. Questions may be superseded.—A question may be superseded.—

1. By the adjournment of the council, on the motion of a member "That the council do now adjourn."

2. By the previous question, viz., "That this question be now put," being proposed and negatived.

32. Questions have to be put.—The chairman shall, in taking the sense of the council, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative, and the votes of the councillors, if a division be called for, shall be entered on the minutes.

33. Manner of voting.—The council shall vote by show of hands, excepting in cases of elections, when the vote shall be by ballot.

names, excepting in cases of electrons, when the vote shall be allowed.

34. Adjournments.—No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the council, but if on the question being put the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence before any subsequent motion for adjournment; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the council.

35. Committee of the council.—In the consideration of any matter of detail it shall be competent for the council to resolve into a committee of the whole.

36. Protests.—Any member of the council may enter his protest against any resolution of the council, provided that such protest is not inconsistent with truth or disrespectful to No. 52.—April 3, 1861.—2.

Notice of intention to protest must, however, in every case be given on the adoption of the resolution protested against, and the protest must be signed by the member or members protesting, and specifying the reasons for protesting, must be entered before the next regular meeting of the council by the protesting member in a book to be kept for that purpose in the town clerk's office, and duly referred to in the minutes of council, the same to be considered a part of such minutes.

The council may be counted out.—If a debate on any order of the day or on a motion be interrupted by the council being counted out, such order of the day or motion may be restored to the notice paper, and the debate thereupon resumed at the next meeting of the council at the point at which it was interrupted.

The said committees shall be elected annually, and consist of not less than three members each.

40. Chairmanship of committees.—Every permanent committee at the first meeting after its appointment shall elect one of its members to be chairman for the municipal year, and in his absence shall elect a chairman for the time being: provided always that the chairman of the council shall be chairman of any committee of which he shall be appointed a member.

41. Special committees.—Special committees shall not consist of less than five members, three to be a quortum, and shall be subject to the same regulations, so far as they can be applied, as permanent committees.

42. Absence of a quorum at committees.—If there shall not be a quorum of members present within fifteen minutes after the time fixed for the meeting of any committee, such meeting shall lapse; but it shall be competent for the chairman of such committee, if necessary, to convene another meeting at a future

day.

43. Absenties.—Any member of a committee absenting himself from three consecutive meetings duly convened shall cease to be a member thereof, and a report of such circumstance shall be given by the chairman of the committee to the council at its convenience.

41. Vacancies, how filled.—The council shall, if it thinks fit, on the requisition of any member; discharge him from serving on a committee, and all vacancies as they occur shall be filled up by the council.

45. Questions to be decided by a majority of votes.—All questions shall be decided by a majority of votes, and whenever the votes are equal, the chairman shall have the easting vote.

46. Finance committee may disburse £5 in one week.—The Finance Committee shall be at liberty, at their discretion, to authorize disbursements for current expenses to an amount not exceeding Five pounds in any one week.

47. Convening committees.—On any committee being appointed, the town clerk shall give such notices calling the committee together as shall be requisite.

48. Call of council, how to be made.—For the consideration of any bye-law, or for raising or appropriating money, or for the objects contemplated in Standing Order No. 13, or for any other important business, it shall be competent for any member, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any such subject, at the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given in the notice paper for the day when the order of the day or notice of motion for which such call was made, is set down for consideration; and any member not in attendance when such order of the day or notice of motion comes under consideration, or not in attendance at the voting upon such question, or any amendment thereof, whether of adjournment or otherwise, shall be liable to a penalty of One pound, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the council.

49. Election of officers.—No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until six clear days' notice have been given in one or more Melbourne daily newspapers, and a local newspaper, if any, inviting applications for the same; and the salary or other remuneration of such office, in all cases, shall be fixed before proceeding to the election, and at all such elections the voting shall be by ballot.

50. Contracts.—No councillor shall have, directly or indirectly, by himself, or his partner, any share or interest in any contract or employment with or by the council, except he be a shareholder in some public company or corporation with which the council may contract for the supply of gas or water, or other public purposes, or for the insurance of premises against fire in the municipality, nor shall any councillor, auditor, or other officer become security for any contractor or other person employed with or by the council.

51. Altestations under the common seal.—The town clerk shall have the custody of the c

52. The town clerk shall not affix the common seal to any corporate document without the express order of the council, nor unless such document bears the signature of the chairman; but in the case of powers of attorney and other legal documents not relating to the corporation, the signatures to which require to be verified before the chairman by declaration, the said seal shall and may be affixed by the town clerk to the chairman's certificate, accompanying the same on the receipt of a fee of Ten shillings and sixpence for each attestation.

53. Suspension of Standing Orders.—Any one or more of the Standing Rules and Orders may be suspended pro tem. in case of emergency, with the consent of a majority of the council.

54. Penalty for breach of Standing Orders.—The neglect or breach of any of the foregoing bye-laws shall (except in those cases in which the penalty is hereinbefore fixed) subject the person so offending to a penalty not exceeding One shilling in respect of each bye-law.

Bye-law No. 68.—A Bye-law for the suppression of Nuisances arising from the rebping of Swine or Cattle within the Municipality of Prahran.

CATTLE WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY OF PRAHRAN.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act to make bye-laws for the suppression of nuisances, preservation of the health of the public, restraining offensive trades, and for the general good rule and government of such municipal district: And whereas by a proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the 24th April, 1855, the district of Prahran was duly established a municipal district under the provisions and within the meaning of the said Act: And whereas it is expedient to make a bye-law for the suppression of nuisances arising from the keeping of swine and cattle within the municipality of Prahran:

Be it therefore ordered and directed by the council of the

Be it therefore ordered and directed by the council of the said district, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, as required by the provisions of the said Act, no person shall feed or keep any kind of swine or cattle in any house, building, yard, garden, or other place, so as to be a nuisance to any other person in the neighborhood.

And it is hereby further ordered and directed, that any person guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.
