## MINING OPERATIONS AUTHORISED ON RESERVED LAND AT FOREST CREEK.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted, that nothing thereinbefore contained shall authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy for mining purposes any Crown land which shall have been exempted by the Governor in Council from the operations of mining, or which shall have been applied to any public use or purpose, or be lawfully and *bona fide* used as a yard, garden, or orchard, or for any race or dam, or for any house, outhouse, shed, or other building, or to cut or remove from any such Crown land any

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trees growing thereon, or to cut or construct any race or dam through or upon any such Crown land; but nevertheless it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy under such miners' rights, and also to cut and construct races and dams for the purposes aforesaid, through or upon any Crown lands which may have been so exempted or applied as aforesaid, subject to such conditions and restrictions as the Governor in Council shall impose: Now therefore the Honorable Major-General Pratt, presiding in the place and stead of His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order authorise the holders of miners' rights to mine within the area of the land reserved for the purpose of a reservoir at Dinah Flat, Forest Creek, in the mining district of Castlemaine, subject to the following condition, that is to say:—

That each claim-holder do deposit a sum sufficient to cover the cost of repairing the surface and the formation of a "heading," or such other works as may be necessary to ensure the safety of the miners.

And the Honorable John Basson Humfray, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Mines for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

## THE CAMPERDOWN TOWN COMMON ENLARGED.

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c. &c. &c.

**W**HEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the session held in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council at any time to increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any town common, gold fields common, or farmers' common: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the eighteenth day of February in the present year, a certain area, therein described, was proclaimed to be a Town Common for the use of the inhabitants of the town of Camperdown: And whereas it is expedient to increase the said common by adding thereto the area hereinafter described: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the Crown lands hereinafter described to be an addition to the Town Common for the use of the inhabitants of the said town of Camperdown, in like manner and to all intents and purposes as if the said additional area had been included within the area described in the said Proclamation, that is to say:—

**THE ADDITION TO THE TOWN COMMON FOR CAMPERDOWN.**—County of Hampden, parishes of Kariah and Purrumbete; area, 749a. 1r. 19p.: Being allotment 2, section 6, parish of Kariah, containing one hundred and seventeen acres one rood nineteen perches, and section 20, parish of Purrumbete, containing six hundred and thirty-two acres ten perches; as shown on plan deposited in Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-seventh day of May, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and in the twenty-fourth year of Her Majesty's reign.

### THE TULLAROOP DISTRICT ROAD BOARD.

**R**ULES made by the Tullaroop District Road Board to regulate its proceedings.

#### ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS.

1. The business of the board shall be conducted, except on special occasions, with open doors.
2. The regular meetings shall be held at the office of the board on the second Tuesday in every month, at Two o'clock p.m.; the business of the board to commence as soon as the quorum of three is present, but should a quorum not be present at the expiration of half an hour after the said time appointed for meeting, the same shall be entered, with a note of the members present, in the minute book, and the meeting shall lapse.
3. Special meetings shall be summoned at any time by the secretary, upon receiving a written requisition signed by two members, stating the matter to be discussed at such meeting.
4. No special meeting shall be held unless the secretary shall have given notice thereof, by post, five clear days before such meeting.
5. The minutes of any preceding meeting, not previously confirmed, shall be read as the first business at all meetings of the board, in order to their confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy.
6. At all meetings the reading of correspondence unconnected with the business of the meeting, the presentation of petitions, and the bringing up of reports, shall have the precedence of all motions.
7. Every communication addressed to the board shall be in proper form and presented by one of its members, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.
8. On the presentation of a petition or the bringing up of a report, no debate shall take place thereon until notice has been given in the usual manner, and the only question that shall be entertained shall be, that the petition or report be received, and if necessary that it be referred to a committee.
9. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the board, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration. Any member of the board may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable, in the form of notice of motion; no such motion, however, shall be decided on at any meeting of the board unless notice thereof shall have been given to the secretary, in writing, by the member bringing it forward, at the meeting previous to that in which the same shall be taken into consideration.
10. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called in order. Notices of motion not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the papers.
11. No bye-law shall be finally passed or adopted at the meeting at which it shall have been first proposed, nor until the next meeting.
12. The mover of any motion which may be referred to any committee shall be *pro hac vice* a member of such committee.
13. Any bye-law may be suspended *pro tem*, in case of emergency, with the consent of the majority of the board.

#### ORDER OF DEBATE.

14. The presiding chairman's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument.
15. Every motion or amendment shall be entered in the minutes, with the name of the mover and seconder, and on a division thereon the votes shall be recorded.
16. Any member may of right require the production of any of the documents of the board relating to the question or matter in discussion.
17. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another may be moved before the original is put to the vote.
18. All questions before the board shall be decided by open voting, unless a motion for any particular question is made and carried that it shall be by ballot.
19. No discussion will be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the board, but if on the question being put the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained, but if the motion for adjournment be carried the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the board.
20. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the board, shall be entertained during the same year, unless a call of the whole board has been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the board which shall have been negatived by the board, shall be again entertained during the same year.
21. Every member, including the chairman, shall stand up while addressing the board.

#### CONTRACTS.

22. All contracts shall be made by tender, advertised not less than twice; each tender shall be addressed to the chairman, and such tender or tenders only be opened at the time of their consideration by the board. The respective amounts, together with the names of the parties tendering, to be entered in every case on the minutes of the board; and when tenders are accepted a contract bond shall be entered into, signed by the contractor and by two members of the board, one of whom shall be the chairman of the board, or in his absence the chairman of the meeting at which such tender is accepted, and the expense of preparing such bond shall in all cases be borne by the person or persons giving the same.
23. No officer or member of the board shall have any pecuniary interest, either directly or indirectly, in any contract under the board.

#### PAYMENTS OF MONEY.

24. All payments shall be made by cheque, signed by the chairman and one other member of the board, and countersigned by the secretary, and no such cheques shall be given unless they be passed at a regular meeting of the board.

#### LOCAL ASSESSMENT.

25. In all cases it shall be considered sufficient for the collector to call once for payment of any amount due on the assessment roll, and in the event of any such amount not being paid to him, a notice shall be left, stating that unless the amount be paid to the collector of the board before the expiration of one month from the date thereof, legal proceedings will be taken for its recovery.
26. The collector shall pay into the treasurer's hands all moneys collected immediately after such collection.
27. The treasurer shall place all money received from the collector to the credit of the board in the London Chartered Bank of Australia, Maryborough, within one week from the receipt thereof.
28. The collector and treasurer shall present their accounts at each meeting of the board.

#### THE SMEATON PUBLIC CEMETERY.

**R**EGULATIONS made by the Trustees of the Public Cemetery established at Smeaton.

1. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.
2. Any person making a vault or erection, and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees, under these rules, and upon the payment of the charges hereinafter mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the tenor of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons and his or their heirs or representatives for ever.
3. Application for such permission to be made at the office of the trustees. A certificate of permission, in the form set out in the schedule, will be granted to the party applying for such permission, on payment of the charges in the schedule.
4. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on the certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relations and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.
5. Orders for interment to be given to the secretary at the office of the trustees; such notice to be given between the hours of Ten a.m. and Four p.m. the previous day.
6. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but parties wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of a surveyor appointed by the trustees; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent (in writing) of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.
7. The name, age, date, place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased, must be stated at the time of giving the order.
8. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.
9. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals will be from Ten a.m. to Six p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from Ten a.m. to Four p.m. in the other four months.
10. All monuments, vaults, graves, and tombstones to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.
11. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, and covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron.
12. A plan or drawing of every stone, pedestal, tomb, monument, or tablet proposed to be erected, to be submitted to the trustees for approval, who are required by the 8th section of the Act to determine and fix the position of any unobjectionable monument according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner. In the erection of tablets, copper cramps must be used.
13. No catacombs or any wooden fencing allowed without first submitting a plan for the approval of the trustees.
14. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees, will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.
15. The ground will be open daily from sunrise to sunset.
16. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, is kept at the office, and may be inspected at the charge set out in the schedule; and registers of all grants are kept by the secretary.
17. Any person who shall wantonly or willfully destroy or do or cause to be done any damage to any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree, or plant, will be proceeded against as directed by the 14th section of the Act of Council.
18. The trustees reserve the right to make any alteration from time to time in these rules and regulations.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the preservation of public decency and public health: And whereas it is expedient for the preservation of public decency and the public health of the inhabitants of the town of Dunolly, that provision should be made for compelling the residents to keep the privies, cesspools, and waterclosets attached to their premises emptied and cleansed: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Dunolly, that from and after the date when this bye-law shall have received the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the proprietor, owner or occupier, or the proprietors, owners or occupiers, of any house or premises, or part thereof, situated within the town boundary of Dunolly, shall cause to be emptied and cleansed any watercloset, privy or cesspool attached to or belonging to such premises as often as the same shall be required; and any person or persons who shall be guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20).

MUNICIPALITY OF FOOTSCRAY.

BYE-LAW No. 12.—FOR IMPOSING CERTAIN RESTRICTIONS AND FOR THE FURTHER REGULATION AND GOVERNMENT OF LICENSED BUTCHERS AND SLAUGHTERMEN.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be competent for any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act to make bye-laws for the killing and sale of butchers' meat, &c., &c.: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Footscray, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria: That every premises licensed as a place where butchers' meat may be slaughtered or sold shall be provided with tubs, bins, or other vessels, in which shall be deposited all blood, offal, or other offensive matter, and properly washed once in every twenty-four hours. That no animal weighing more than two hundred pounds shall be slaughtered on any premises where butchers' meat is sold in less quantities than sides or

quarters of an animal. And be it further ordered and enacted, that it shall not be lawful for any licensed butcher, or other person, to slaughter any butchers' meat on any premises other than the premises specially licensed and registered by the licensee.

This bye-law shall be deemed part of bye-law No. 10 of the municipal council of Footscray [gazetted 10th April, 1861], save in so far as it may be inconsistent with or repugnant thereto.

BYE-LAW No. 30.—A BYE-LAW FOR THE AMENDMENT OF "A BYE-LAW FOR THE FURTHER REGULATION OF PUBLIC VEHICLES," No. 25.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation and licensing of porters, public carriers, carters, water drawers, and public vehicles, and the general good rule and Government of such municipal district.

And whereas by a bye-law of the municipal council of Sandhurst, numbered 25, intitled, "A bye-law for the further regulation of public vehicles," and assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, according to the Act of Council in that case made and provided, it was by provision or clause of the said bye-law numbered 31, amongst other things ordered, directed and provided, that for every offence against any provision of the said bye-law the offender should upon conviction be liable to and should pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds, to be recovered in a summary way before any justice or justices of the peace: Provided, that where by the said bye-law any penalty is imposed upon the owner or driver, or driver and conductor of any licensed vehicle for one and the same offence, only one prosecution shall be had and maintained for the recovery of such penalty against such owner, driver, or conductor, at the option of the person prosecuting for the same.

And whereas it is deemed advisable by the said municipal council to amend the said bye-law in respect of the lastmentioned provision or clause numbered 31, it is hereby ordered, directed, and enacted by the said municipal council of Sandhurst, that from the date of the provision or clause next hereinafter set forth being assented to according to the Act of Council in that case made and provided, the aforesaid provision or clause numbered 31 in the said bye-law shall cease to have any force or effect within the said municipality, and that the following provision or clause shall be and stand in the place and lieu of the said lastmentioned provision or clause numbered 31 as aforesaid, that is to say: "For any neglect or breach of any provision of this bye-law the offender shall be liable to, and upon conviction shall pay, a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds, to be awarded, measured, recovered, and distributed by summary process before two or more justices of the peace having jurisdiction within the municipal district of Sandhurst: Provided that where by this bye-law any penalty is imposed upon the owner and driver, or driver and conductor of any licensed vehicle for one and the same offence, only one prosecution shall be had or maintained for the recovery of such penalty against such owner, driver, or conductor."

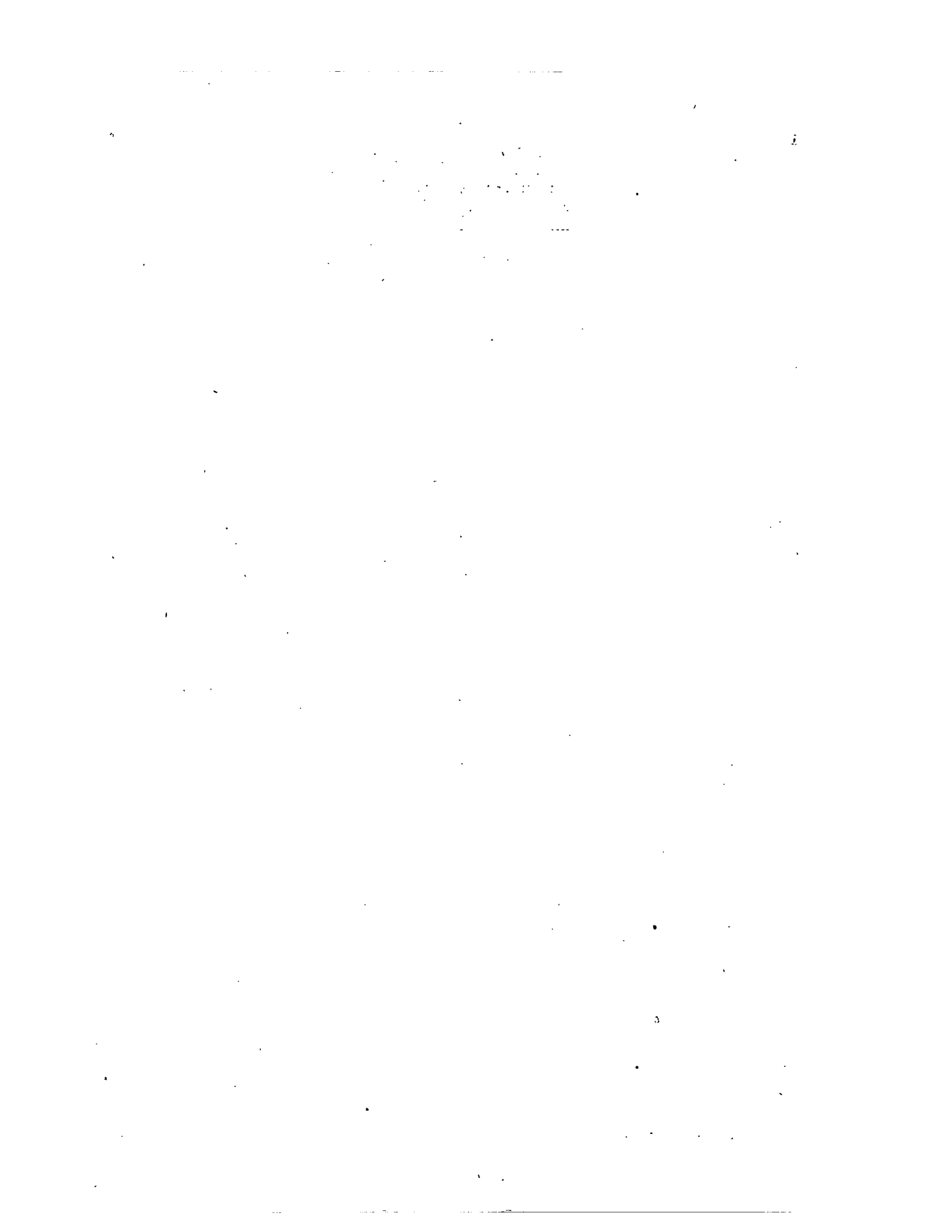

THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF TARADALE.

P R O C L A M A T I O N.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

**W**HEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that any district of the colony of Victoria, the area whereof should not exceed nine square miles, and which should contain a population of householders not less than three hundred, might, subject to the provisions of the said Act, be constituted a municipal district as hereinafter mentioned, provided that no one point in any such area should be distant more than six miles from any other point; and it was further enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than one hundred and fifty householders resident within any such district, praying that such district might be declared a municipal district under the said Act, to cause the substance and prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition, signed by an equal or greater number of householders resident within such locality, should have been delivered at the office of the Colonial Secretary within one month from the date of such publication) the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice aforesaid, might, if he should think fit, declare by Proclamation such locality a municipal district by a name to be mentioned in such Proclamation, and also by the same or any other Proclamation might define the limits and boundaries of such municipal district, and such limits and boundaries at any time thereafter in the same manner, on receipt of a similar petition, might vary and alter, but so as in no case save as thereinafter mentioned to include within the limits or boundaries of such municipal district an area of more than nine square miles, and upon the publication of any such Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, such locality so defined should be deemed and taken to be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act: And whereas a petition for the purposes aforesaid has been presented to the Governor by the householders at Taradale, in the county of Talbot, the substance and prayer of which

petition have been published as directed by the said Act, and no counter-petition has been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation, declare that the district hereinafter described and named shall be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act, that is to say:—

**THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF TARADALE**, Counties of Talbot and Dalhousie.—Commencing at a point on the west side of the main line of road between Taradale and Elphinstone, said point bearing south 52° 37' west from the north-west angle of allotment 1, section 12, Taradale suburban allotments; thence by a line south two hundred and seventy-five chains, more or less, to a point bearing due west from the south-west angle of portion 50, parish of Edgecombe; thence east to said south-west angle of portion 50; thence south fifty links, more or less, to the centre of a road forming the south boundary of portion 50; thence east along the centre of said road to a point in the centre of the Coliban River; thence by a line northerly passing through portions 43, 44, 45, and 46, parish of Edgecombe, to the centre of a road forming the eastern boundaries of portions 2 and 3, parish of Metcalfe; thence east fifty links, more or less, to the west boundary of portion 4, parish of Metcalfe; thence by part of the west boundary of portion 4 north to its north-west angle; thence by a straight line bearing north 20° west one hundred and forty seven chains, more or less, to the centre of a road forming the south boundary of allotment 4, section 5, parish of Metcalfe; thence west by centre of said road and a line west to the Mount Alexander and Murray River Railway; thence by a line bearing south 52° 37' west to the point of commencement.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to proclaim that any Crown lands in the vicinity of any gold field shall be a common for the use of all holders of miners' rights, business licenses, and carriers' licenses, and other residents on such gold field, and every such holder or other resident shall, from the time of such proclamation, be entitled to depasture his horses and cattle on such common, subject to rules and regulations hereafter to be made, and such common shall be called a "Gold Fields Common;" and it is also enacted, that it shall be lawful for the mining board of the mining district within which such Gold Fields Common shall be included, with the consent of the Governor in Council, to make rules and regulations for determining how many horses and cattle every holder of a miner's right, business license, or carrier's license, or other resident on a gold field, shall be entitled to depasture on any Gold Fields Common: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim that the Crown lands in the vicinity of the gold field hereinafter mentioned, comprised within the area the description whereof is subjoined to the name of such gold field, shall (save and except the lands hereinafter declared to be a gold field) be a GOLD FIELDS COMMON within the meaning of the said Act, for the use of all holders of miners' rights, business licenses, carriers' licenses, and other residents on such gold field: And I do further proclaim, with the advice aforesaid, that the portions of Crown lands within such area, upon which mining or digging for gold is or shall be actually carried on now or at any time hereafter, shall be Gold Fields within the meaning of the said Act, and in the vicinity of which Gold Fields Commons may be proclaimed:—

GOLD FIELDS COMMON FOR MOUNTAIN CREEK, County unnamed, situated at Mountain Creek Diggings.—Commencing at the north-west angle of McKinnon's pre-emptive right on Mountain Creek; thence by a line north forty-five chains, more or less, to a spur from the Pyrenees Range; thence by that spur westerly to the Pyrenees Range, and by that range southerly five hundred chains, more or less, to its intersection with another spur from said range; thence by that spur easterly to a point bearing south of the south-west angle of McKinnon's pre-emptive right, sixty chains, more or less; thence by a line north and the west boundary of McKinnon's pre-emptive right to the north-west angle thereof, being the point of commencement. Deducting from above-described area all sold or appropriated Crown lands. Approximate area for common, 15,000 acres; as shown on plan deposited in Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.

## FARMERS' COMMONS.

## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, upon the petition of not less than ten occupiers of not less than five hundred acres of adjacent purchased land, to proclaim that any Crown lands within five miles of such purchased land (the area of such Crown lands not being more than

three times the area of the purchased land) shall be a Common for the use of such occupiers of the said purchased land as shall cultivate at least one-fourth of his or their purchased land, and every such common shall be called a "Farmers' Common;" provided that nothing in the now reciting section shall be deemed or taken to prevent any such lands from being sold under the said Act upon the application of persons desirous of purchasing the same; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council shall have full power from time to time to make any rules and regulations for imposing any conditions or limitations on the exercise of the right of common upon any Farmers' Common: And whereas the occupiers of purchased land in or near the localities hereinafter mentioned have petitioned for Farmers' Commons in accordance with the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the Crown lands hereinafter described to be FARMERS' COMMONS for the use of the occupiers of purchased land within the meaning and intent and subject to the provisions of the said Act, and also under and subject to such conditions or limitations on the exercise of the right of common as may be prescribed, that is to say:—

ON THE BET-BET CREEK, UNDER TITLE "BET-BET FARMERS' COMMON No. 3," County of Talbot, Parish of Bet-bet.—Extent, about 3663 acres: Commencing at a point on the Bet-bet Creek, being the north-east angle of the parish of Bet-bet, bounded on the north and west by the Bet-bet Creek, bearing southerly to the south-west angle of allotment 3 of section 5 A, parish of Bet-bet; on the south by a line bearing east about three miles seventy chains to the eastern boundary of this parish; and on the east by this boundary, bearing north about three miles sixty chains to commencing point; exclusive of all appropriated land within the before-mentioned boundaries.—(61.D.3651.)

ON THE BET-BET CREEK, UNDER TITLE "BET-BET FARMERS' COMMON No. 4," County unnamed, Parish of Bet-bet and unnamed.—Extent, about 3036 acres: Commencing at the intersection of the north boundary of section 8 A, parish of Bet-bet and the Bet-bet Creek; bounded on the south by part of the north boundary of section 8 A aforesaid; bearing west to the west boundary of the parish of Bet-bet; on the west by part of this west boundary forming the eastern boundary of Wareek Farmers' Common, bearing north about one hundred chains; on the south by part of the north boundary of Wareek Farmers' Common, bearing west about fifty chains; on the west by a line bearing north about two and a half miles; on the north by a line bearing east about two and three-quarter miles to the Bet-bet Creek; and on the east by the Bet-bet Creek, bearing southerly to commencing point; exclusive of all appropriated lands within the before-mentioned boundaries.—(60.A.7955.)
