NOTICE TO MAGISTRATES AS TO ATTENDANCE AT GENERAL SESSIONS.

AS from the fact of an Act having passed last Session, the 24th section of which renders it competent for the Chairman to transact business although no other magistrate may be present, justices of the peace may be led to imagine that it is no longer expected that they should give their attendance at Courts of General Sessions, it is considered desirable to state that such is not the case. The provision referred to was inserted to prevent the delay which frequently arose in consequence of there being no magistrate but the chairman present; but not as a suggestion to magistrates to absent themselves.

While trials are going on at General Sessions it is not of so much importance that there should be many magistrates in attendance, as in that case the facts are decided by the juries, while the chairman directs the juries as to the law. But it is expected that during the hearing of appeals, as the facts have then to be determined by the court, there shall be a full attendance of the justices residing in the neighborhood of the place at which the court is held. It is desirable that the bench which has to confirm or quash convictions, should be composed of at least as many magistrates as the bench before which those convictions took place.

Police magistrates are to attend the Courts of General Sessions unless engaged elsewhere in the discharge of urgent duties. As regards the mode in which justices attending at sessions should discharge their duties, it may be pointed out that while in all questions of fact, such, for instance, as the credibility of witnesses, they ought each to form an opinion for himself, and although even in questions of law they are not bound to accept the ruling of the chairman, yet it is the practice in England, where a court is composed partly of professional and partly of lay members, to allow the former to decide any matter of law which may arise.

LANDS TO BE PERMANENTLY RESERVED.

RULES, ETC., FOR CERTAIN FARMERS' COMMONS.

RULES FOR THE MANAGEMENT AND REGULATION OF THE LITTLE RIVER AND DUCK PONDS FARMERS' COMMONS.

ALL persons entitled to depasture cattle and horses on the Little River and Duck Ponds Farmers' Commons shall be allowed to run four head of cattle on said commons in respect of his right as a resident thereof, and one head of cattle for every acre of cultivated land up to thirty acres, one head for every two acres from thirty to fifty acres, one head for one acre one head to every three acres, from fifty to seventy-one acres one head to every four acres, and from seventy-one to ninety-nine acres one head to every four acres.

2. No person shall be allowed to run more than fifty-eight head of cattle; calves to count as per head after they are twelve months old. No person shall be allowed to run bulls or entire on the commons over nine months old without the permission of the managers.

3. The fees to be charged for the depasturing of cattle and horses on the commons shall be, for every horse seven shillings per annum, and for every head of cattle three shillings and sixpence per annum, payable quarterly in advance, quarters to terminate on 30th September, 31st December, 31st March, and 30th June respectively.

4. All persons taking cattle to the commons shall be required to deliver them into the charge of the herdsman, and produce his order from the secretary or one of the managers; the herdsman shall sign the same and enter a copy of it in the herd book, and shall afterwards proceed to brand the cattle with the commons brand in pitch.

5. Each person previous to taking cattle to the commons shall be required to apply at the office of the manager, or at their private residence, between the hours of Ten o'clock a.m. and Four o'clock p.m. on each Saturday, to have his name and address, together with the brands and descriptions of his cattle and horses, entered on the books of the managers, to pay the fees thereon, and shall receive from the secretary or managers a receipt for same, together with an order to the herdsman for the admission of his cattle or horses to the commons.

6. The herdsman shall be required to see that travelling herds and flocks of sheep shall keep strictly within the limits of the boundaries in passing over the commons, as provided in the 78th clause of the new Land Act; but any resident of the district desiring to remove his cattle or sheep from one place to another must keep strictly to the road, the same not to be considered as travelling flocks or herds.

7. Persons whose watering-places may be dried up in the dry summer months shall not be allowed to drive their flocks, or herds across the commons to any water-hole, creek, or river, without first making application to the managers for permission to do so. The managers shall, if they think proper, grant the application, and lay off a roadway which the applicant shall be strictly required to keep.

8. The herdsman shall be required to report immediately to the secretary or managers the slightest indication of disease in any of the cattle under his charge; and if at any time obliged to leave the commons for the purpose of taking cattle or sheep to the pound, he may call upon any person to take charge of the commons in his absence, who shall be allowed compensation for the same; and if any cattle belonging to the commons are impounded from private lands, the herdsman shall be required to pay half the fees for such impounding, the other half to be borne by the managers from the commonage fund; and also when any cattle, or sheep, or horses, are impounded by the herdsman, the fees derivable from same shall be equally divided between the herdsman and commonage fund.

9. The herdsman shall be required to muster the cattle at any time when requested by the managers, and every person shall be allowed to run one horse in lieu of two head of cattle; but no person shall be allowed to keep a breeding stock of horses on the commons, and the ultimate number of horses will be determined on by the managers that each person shall be allowed to run.

10. That although the managers who are now appointed may increase or diminish the number of cattle allotted to each person to depasture on the commons, they shall not alter or amend nor frame any new rules in contradiction of these now in force without submitting the same to a public meeting of the commoners.

BYE-LAWS FOR THE MANAGEMENT AND REGULATION OF THE LITTLE RIVER AND DUCK PONDS FARMERS' COMMONS.

1. The managers to elect a chairman and treasurer and appoint a secretary, and to meet on the first Monday of each month at their office to examine the secretary's books and compare them with those of the herdsman, and to transact all business that may come before them.

2. The secretary to attend at the office every Saturday, unless otherwise ordered, between the hours of Ten o'clock a.m. till Four o'clock p.m., to enter the names and residence of all persons entitled to depasture cattle or horses on the commons in a book to be kept for that purpose, the number, description, and brands of the cattle they wish to run upon the commons, to receive the fees payable for the same, and to give a receipt on behalf of the managers for all moneys he may receive for such purpose.

3. The secretary shall, on each day of general meeting, produce his books and accounts to the managers, and shall hand over all moneys received by him to the treasurer, who shall give him a receipt for the same.

4. The situation of herdsman to be advertised for, and when appointed to be required to produce satisfactory testimonials as to character and ability, and to enter into security with the managers for the safety of all cattle entrusted to his care.

5. The herdsman shall be required to reside on the commons, the managers to provide a suitable dwelling and garden ground.

and to be allowed the run of six head on the common, together with two horses.

6. The managers to pay the herdsman from the fees derivable from the commons, and the residue to be applied to the making of dams and stockyards, the eradication of thistles, and for other such local purposes as the managers may consider for the benefit of the commoners generally, subject to the approval of the Board of Land and Works.

7. The secretary shall, on a day to be hereafter named for that purpose, and of which due notice will be given, attend at Little River and Duck Ponds respectively, to receive the fees from persons entitled to depasture cattle and horses on the said commons; and any person failing to pay the fees one week after they are due will be liable to have his cattle or horses impounded.

We, the undersigned, do hereby certify that the foregoing rules and bye-laws have been duly submitted to a public meeting of commoners, held at Bragg's Hotel, on Wednesday, the 27th August, 1862, and unanimously approved of, and certified by John Myles, Esq., J.P., chairman of meeting.

BEECHWORTH MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAWS.—[26th August, 1862.]

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Beechworth, begun and holden at Beechworth, in the said district, on the twenty-sixth day of August, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

26. *Dry bank claims.*—The holder of a dry bank claim shall cause a post to be erected at each corner of the claim, such posts to be not less than three inches in diameter, to be firmly fixed in the ground extending at least three feet above it, and to be kept erected during the occupation of the claim.

27. *Frontage claims, Buckland division.*—In the Buckland division, notwithstanding previous enactments, a wet frontage claim shall be one hundred yards on the lead.

28. *Creek claims, Omeo division.*—Notwithstanding anything enacted in bye-law number 7, creek claims in the Omeo division shall not in any case be less than one hundred yards in width.

29. *Extended areas which may be occupied by prospectors for undiscovered quartz reefs by means of tunnelling into mountain ranges.*—Any person or persons searching for auriferous quartz reefs by means of tunnelling into mountain ranges may occupy an area extending one thousand yards along the course of the proposed tunnel, by a width not exceeding three hundred and twenty yards, horizontal measurement; such extended area to be laid off by the surveyor.

The holder or holders of such tunnelling claim shall keep constantly employed four men in driving said tunnel, and shall be subject to the requirements and entitled to the provisions made and provided under the ordinary quartz bye-laws.

30. *Extended areas which may be occupied by the projectors of mining companies under the frontage bye-laws.*—On wet frontage leads where the depth of sinking exceeds two hundred feet, and the lowest or last occupied claim, or united claim, has been in possession of the present occupants for six months after payable gold has been discovered by them, and when machinery equal to twelve horse power is required, and is at work on such last or lowest claim—

One man may take possession and hold two and a half claims
Two men, five claims
Three men, seven and a half claims
Four men, ten claims

without commencing work for a period of three months; that term being allowed for the formation of a company to work the ground. Such company being formed, registered, and their claims united, the united claim shall be immediately occupied, and not less than one-half the number of men required under frontage bye-law No. 6, section 8, kept constantly employed on or in connection therewith; such occupancy shall then entitle them to possession for a further period of three months after payable gold has been discovered therein, when the full number of men required under the lastmentioned bye-law shall be constantly employed.

One man or more taking up extended areas under this bye-law shall advertise the occupancy in the nearest local newspaper, repeating therein the said advertisement once in each of the two following weeks, and shall also post a conspicuous notice on the ground stating the name and residence of each of the company, and the extent of the ground claimed.

All companies holding under this bye-law, except as herein specified, must comply with the ordinary frontage bye-laws.

31. *Suspension of workings on frontage leads.*—Should the holders of a wet frontage claim on a proclaimed lead fail to discover the course of the lead within six months, during which time the requisite number of men have been constantly employed on such claim, be unable to prosecute their labors from want of funds, the warden may, on such cause being made known to him, grant to such claimholders a written permission to suspend all workings for a period not exceeding six months.

A copy of such permission to be posted on a conspicuous place on the claim.

In the event of any dispute arising under this bye-law, the onus of proof of the cause of such suspension to rest with the claimholders.

32. *Bridges.*—Bridges built under the provisions of section 4, bye-law 18, shall be maintained in an efficient state, and be subject to the approval of the mining surveyor.

33. *Protection from forfeiture.*—Notwithstanding anything enacted to the contrary in bye-law 13, any person considering a claim liable to forfeiture and desiring to occupy such claim or any portion thereof, shall give notice in writing to the person or persons claiming to occupy the ground in question; and if he or they shall fail to comply with the conditions imposed in the bye-laws within one week from the receipt of such written notice, the person serving it may, on application to the warden, be placed in possession of the ground.

The protection afforded by this bye-law shall not extend to the Indigo division, to persons who have left the district, shareholders in any other claim, or those who are not working miners.

34. *Protection to sides of races and dams.*—Bye-law 20 of the Beechworth mining board, sections 1 and 2 in the words following, "the undermentioned lands, &c." be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—

I. The undermentioned land shall not be occupied for mining purposes, viz.: all land within a distance of three feet of any race constructed in unworked ground, and five feet where constructed in worked ground.

All land within a distance of twelve feet of any tail-race for a distance of twenty yards from the boundaries of the claim with which the tail-race is connected, and all lands within a distance of five feet of the remaining portion of any of such tail-race.

All lands within a distance of twenty feet of the lower side of any dam or reservoir constructed for the purpose of storing water.

II. No person shall, under any pretence whatsoever, damage, destroy, or otherwise interfere with any race, tail-race, dam, reservoir, or any appurtenances connected therewith, unless with the consent of the registered owners thereof. In the Yackandandah division and Wombat Creek, Omeo, tailing dams to be considered as public property, to be used by any party or parties paying a fair share of the expenses incurred in their erection, such expenses to be decided by arbitration or by warden and assessors. Parties using such dams for the reception of tailings must contribute towards keeping them in good repair.

35. *Registrar's fees, Buckland division.*—Notwithstanding anything enacted in bye-law 23, the registrar in the Buckland division shall be entitled to demand a fee of Two shillings and sixpence on the production of a certificate of any registration made under the bye-laws.

36. *Interpretation bye-law.*—Bye-law No. 25 of the Beechworth Mining Board, from clause No. 1 to 12, in the following words:—"In the construction and for the purposes, &c." be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof.

I. In the construction, and for the purposes of these bye-laws, the following terms shall, if not inconsistent with the context or subject-matter, have the respective meanings hereby assigned to them.

II. The words "warden, surveyor, and registrar," shall mean respectively the warden, surveyor, and registrar for the time being of the division in which the events in connection with which they are mentioned shall happen.

III. The words "lead or frontage lead" shall mean any stratum of auriferous earth at a depth exceeding forty feet.

IV. The words "constantly employed" shall mean employment during ordinary working hours.

V. The word "race" shall mean channel made for the purpose of conveying water.

VI. The word "tail-race" shall mean a race cut for the purpose of draining any claim or claims, or for carrying off the water used for sluicing or any other mining purpose.

VII. The words "worked and abandoned ground" shall mean any ground which has been mined upon for gold, and which has been declared by the warden and assessors to be worked and abandoned, except on frontage leads, the words worked and abandoned ground shall then mean where two or more shafts have been bottomed upon any claim or amalgamated claim proposed to be taken up; provided such ground has been abandoned for a period of at least three months.

VIII. The words "right or water-right" shall mean the privilege of diverting and using water from any creek or river.

IX. Any words importing the singular number shall include the plural number.

X. Any words importing the masculine gender shall include the feminine gender.

XI. "New alluvial gold workings" shall mean workings on any lead or creek on which payable ground has not previously been discovered or which has been entirely abandoned as unprofitable, or any surface working not less than five miles from the nearest workings of the same class.

XII. The words "when a claim is fairly opened and in working order" shall mean, in ordinary or frontage claims, when the lead or payable ground has been discovered. In creek or other claims, when the occupiers are in a position to commence washing, except in cases in which an extensive tail-race is to be cut, the words shall then mean, when the occupiers have been at work on or in connection therewith, for a period of not less than two months.

XIII. Where the words "entire claims" occur in section III, bye-law 10, they shall mean no more ground than can be held by four men, as specified in the frontage bye-laws.

37. *Defining boundaries of amalgamated frontage claims.*—Notwithstanding anything enacted to the contrary in bye-laws numbered 6 and 23, no amalgamated claim on any frontage lead may be reduced in width by the surveyor to a greater extent

than such portion as might be occupied by four men above and below the point where payable gold has been discovered in such united claim.

BEECHWORTH MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAW FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE GOLD FIELDS COMMONS UNDER THE NEW LAND ACT.—[26th August, 1862.]

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Beechworth, begun and holden at Beechworth, in the said district, on the twenty-sixth day of August, Eighteen hundred and sixty-two, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

1. Three managers of each gold fields common situated within this mining district shall be elected by the mining board in the month of November each year.

2. A person recommended for nomination in writing by at least ten holders of miners' rights or business licenses shall be eligible for election as manager for one or more of such commons, but such candidate must at his election be proposed and seconded by members of the board.

3. When such election takes place, if more than three candidates are proposed as managers for any common, a ballot shall be taken of the members of the board present, and those three who obtain the greatest number of votes shall be declared by the chairman duly elected as managers of the common for the ensuing year. The chairman shall not vote unless two or more candidates have an equality of votes, in which case he shall have a casting vote.

4. Notice shall be given by advertisement at least fourteen days prior to the date of election in some newspaper circulated in the district of the intention of the board to elect managers, which notice shall also state the day of election; and all recommendations of candidates must be sent in to the chairman of the mining board previous to such day.

5. In case a sufficient number of written recommendations of candidates is not sent in, or in case some of such recommendations are deemed objectionable, the members of the board shall then elect such managers as they may think desirable.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The works completed during the half-year, or now in progress, are:—

Earthwork formation and roadways in Golden Gully, Myrtle street extension, Olive street, Mackenzie street, Short street, Myers street, Mollison street, Laurel street, Plumridge street, Bosquet street, Hamlin street, Bramble street, Upper Mundy street, Palmerston place, and Water street.

Kerbing and channelling Barnard street and McCrae street. Bridge, Golden square.

Fencing, forming promenade, roads, and other works, in the reserve; new culverts at View Point, foot of Forest street, and foot of Mitchell street; alteration of market sheds; works and maintenance Botanic Gardens, with other minor works, at a total cost of £7914 10s. 2d.

The expenditure for lighting, sweeping, prevention of fires, and for the Board of Health, has amounted to £1338 16s. 4d. for the half-year.

BYE-LAWS PASSED.

No. 34. For the more certain prevention of the nuisance occasioned from cattle being allowed to be at large.

No. 35. To regulate the addition of names to the ratepayers' roll.

No. 36. For the regulation of the Botanic Garden and other reserves.

No. 37. To further regulate the conducting of elections (preventing persons voting who have not paid their rates).

The Government has refused its assent to No. 37. The remainder have been assented to.

FINANCE.

The sum of £1503 has been received as an instalment of the grant-in-aid.

In consequence of representations made as to the market dues on sheep being excessive, they were reduced from 1½d. to 0½d. per head, and alterations made in other dues.

A valuation for assessment, including Quarry Hill, has been completed, containing 4160 properties, of an annual value of £120,898 10s., but it has not yet pending proposed alterations of the municipal boundaries, been made the assessment for the current year.

As a recognition of the able services rendered by the cattle market inspector in the establishment and management of the market and abattoirs, Mr. Lloyd's salary has been increased to £300 per annum.

At the request of the Government, the termination of financial half-year has been altered to 30th June and 31st December. The receipts now published for the markets, &c., do not represent an entire half-year.

MISCELLANEOUS.

To save the town from inundation, the council, at the commencement of the year, were reluctantly compelled to expend

money in the partial maintenance of the main sludge channel. The mining board have undertaken to repay a portion of the moneys so expended, and the council hope that the whole may be recovered.

On the petition of the inhabitants of Quarry Hill and neighborhood, that district has been annexed to the municipality. Petitions to the same purport have also been forwarded from Long Gully, Ironbark, and Golden Gully.

To foster the agricultural and horticultural interests of the district, an exhibition was held in March, and prizes given by the council. Many of the exhibits were of the highest character, and the council proposes an exhibition of more scope, to be held in November next.

The council have been very anxious to establish a connection between the railway and the cattle market, and if it rested solely with the council, the connection would have been available as soon as the railway was open; but unfortunately the Government have to be referred to in the matter, and although the correspondence was opened in April, an answer cannot yet be obtained.

ELECTIONS.

At the annual municipal election, Councillors Jackson, Holdsworth, and O'Keefe were elected; and at the next meeting, Councillor Burrowes was elected chairman for the current year.
