SECULAR INSTRUCTION.

THE attention of Local Committees of Schools is called to the 11th section of the Common Schools Act, which enacts, "That in every school receiving aid from the consolidated revenue, four hours shall be set apart during each school day for secular instruction alone, and of such four hours two shall be before noon, two afternoon, and shall in each case be consecutive."

NOTICE TO MAGISTRATES AS TO ATTENDANCE AT GENERAL SESSIONS.

AS from the fact of an Act having passed last Session, the 24th section of which renders it competent for the Chairman to transact business although no other magistrate may be present, justices of the peace may be led to imagine that it is no longer expected that they should give their attendance at Courts of General Sessions, it is considered desirable to state that such is not the case. The provision referred to was inserted to prevent the delay which frequently arose in consequence of there being no magistrate but the chairman present; but not as a suggestion to magistrates to absent themselves.

While trials are going on at General Sessions it is not of so much importance that there should be many magistrates in attendance, as in that case the facts are decided by the juries, while the chairman directs the juries as to the law. But it is expected that during the hearing of appeals, as the facts have then to be determined by the court, there shall be a full attendance of the justices residing in the neighborhood of the place at which the court is held. It is desirable that the bench which has to confirm or quash convictions, should be composed of at least as many magistrates as the bench before which those convictions took place.

Police magistrates are to attend the Courts of General Sessions unless engaged elsewhere in the discharge of urgent duties. As regards the mode in which justices attending at sessions should discharge their duties, it may be pointed out that while in all questions of fact, such, for instance, as the credibility of witnesses, they ought each to form an opinion for himself, and although even in questions of law they are not bound to accept the ruling of the chairman, yet it is the practice in England, where a court is composed partly of professional and partly of lay members, to allow the former to decide any matter of law which may arise.

THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF RUTHERGLEN.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that any district of the colony of Victoria, the area whereof should not exceed nine square miles, and which should contain a population of householders not less than three hundred, might, subject to the provisions of the said Act, be constituted a municipal district as thereafter mentioned, provided that no one point in any such area should be distant more than six miles from any other point; and it was further enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than one hundred and fifty householders resident within any such district, praying that such district might be declared a municipal district under the said Act, to cause the substance and prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition, signed by an equal or greater number of householders resident within such locality, should have been delivered at the office of the Colonial Secretary within one month from the date of such publication) the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice aforesaid, might, if he should think fit, declare by Proclamation such locality a municipal district by a name to be mentioned in such Proclamation, and also by the same or any other Proclamation might define the limits and boundaries of such municipal district, and such limits and boundaries at any time thereafter in the same manner, on receipt of a similar petition, might vary and alter, but so as in no case save as thereafter mentioned to include within the limits or boundaries of such municipal district an area of more than nine square miles, and upon the publication of any such Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, such locality so defined should be deemed and taken to be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act: And whereas a petition for the purposes aforesaid has been presented to the Governor by the householders and landholders resident at and near Rutherglen, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published as directed by the said Act, and no counter-petition, in accordance with the terms of the said Act, has been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation declare that the district hereinafter described and named shall be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act, that is to say:-

THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF RUTHERGLEN.—County unnamed, parish of Carlyle: Commencing at a point bearing S. 45° E. sixty-seven chains from the south-east angle of allotment 7, section 20, parish of Carlyle; thence west one mile; thence north two miles; thence east one mile; thence south two miles to the point of commencement.

And I do hereby, with the advice aforesaid, direct that the council of the said municipal district shall be called by the name and style of "The Municipal Council of Rutherglen."

THE RUTHERGLEN ROAD DISTRICT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intitled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him should seem meet, as and to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare that the portion of the said colony hereinafter defined shall be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained; that is to say:-

Commencing at the point of junction of the Ovens River with the River Murray; thence easterly by the River Murray to a point due north of the eastern boundary of the parish of Gooramada; thence south by the eastern boundary of the said parish to its south-east angle; thence west to the eastern boundary of the Wahgunyah Gold Field Common; thence by a direct line south to the northern boundary of block 111 A, in the parish of Tarawingee; thence by the northern boundary of the said block 111 A to the east side of the one-chain road which forms the western boundary of the said block 111 A; thence south by the eastern boundary of the said road to the Ovens River; thence north-westerly by the Ovens River to the commencing point: excluding the municipal district of Rutherglen.

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Rutherglen Road District."

REPORT OF A PUBLIC MEETING OF THE RESIDENT HOUSEHOLDERS AND OF THE LANDOWNERS WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF EAGLEHAWK, HELD AT THE ASSEMBLY ROOMS, CAMP HOTEL, EAGLEHAWK, ON THURSDAY, 4TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 1862, IN THE TERMS OF THE ACT OF COUNCIL 18 VICTORIA No. 15, SEC. 10.

William Simpson, Esq., J.P., the duly appointed chairman under the 11th section of the Act of Council, took the chair at Three o'clock p.m.

1. It was proposed by Mr. Caldwell, and seconded by Mr. Dowding, That Mr. Walker, of Specimen Hill, and Mr. Abbott, of California Gully, be appointed assessors.

The Chairman then submitted the proposition to the meeting by a show of hands, and the Chairman declared it carried, and thereupon those gentleman took their seats as assessors.

THIRTEENTH Half-yearly Report, 11th January, 1862, to 10th July, 1863.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The works completed during the half-year, or now in progress, are:—

Earthwork formation and roadways in Golden Gully, Myrtle street extension, Olive street, Mackenzie street, Short street, Myers street, Mollison street, Laurel street, Plumridge street, Bosquet street, Hamlin street, Bramble street, Upper Mundy street, Palmerston place, and Water street.

Kerbing and channelling Barnard street and McCrae street. Bridge, Golden square.

Fencing, forming promenade, roads, and other works, in the reserve; new culverts at View Point, foot of Forest street, and foot of Mitchell street; alteration of market sheds; works and maintenance Botanic Gardens, with other minor works, at a total cost of £2914 10s. 2d.

The expenditure for lighting, sweeping, prevention of fires, and for the Board of Health, has amounted to £1338 16s. 4d. for the half-year.

BYE-LAWS PASSED.

No. 34. For the more certain prevention of the nuisance occasioned from cattle being allowed to be at large.

No. 35. To regulate the addition of names to the ratepayers' roll.

No. 36. For the regulation of the Botanic Garden and other reserves.

No. 37. To further regulate the conducting of elections (preventing persons voting who have not paid their rates).

The Government has refused its assent to No. 37. The remainder have been assented to.

FINANCE.

The sum of £1503 has been received as an instalment of the grant-in-aid.

In consequence of representations made as to the market dues on sheep being excessive, they were reduced from 1½d. to 0½d. per head, and alterations made in other dues.

A valuation for assessment, including Quarry Hill, has been completed, containing 4160 properties, of an annual value of £120,898 10s., but it has not yet, pending proposed alterations of the municipal boundaries, been made the assessment for the current year.

As a recognition of the able services rendered by the cattle market inspector in the establishment and management of the market and abattoirs, Mr. Lloyd's salary has been increased to £300 per annum.

At the request of the Government, the termination of financial half-year has been altered to 30th June and 31st December. The receipts now published for the markets, &c., do not represent an entire half-year.

MISCELLANEOUS.

To save the town from inundation, the council, at the commencement of the year, were reluctantly compelled to expend

money in the partial maintenance of the main sludge channel. The mining board have undertaken to repay a portion of the moneys so expended, and the council hope that the whole may be recovered.

On the petition of the inhabitants of Quarry Hill and neighborhood, that district has been annexed to the municipality. Petitions to the same purport have also been forwarded from Long Gully, Ironbark, and Golden Gully.

To foster the agricultural and horticultural interests of the district, an exhibition was held in March, and prizes given by the council. Many of the exhibits were of the highest character, and the council proposes an exhibition of more scope, to be held in November next.

The council have been very anxious to establish a connection between the railway and the cattle market, and if it rested solely with the council, the connection would have been available as soon as the railway was open; but unfortunately the Government have to be referred to in the matter, and although the correspondence was opened in April, an answer cannot yet be obtained.

ELECTIONS.

At the annual municipal election, Councillors Jackson, Holdsworth, and O'Keefe were elected; and at the next meeting, Councillor Burrowes was elected chairman for the current year.

ELECTION.

At the annual election, held Thursday, the 16th January, to elect three members in the place of Councillors William Tullock, Robert Lewis, Henry R. Caselli, who retired by rotation, the following gentlemen were nominated—William Tullock, Robert Lewis, Henry R. Caselli, Walter Craig, and Gilbert Duncan.

Robert Lewis, Walter Craig, and Gilbert Duncan, were returned as members of the Municipal Council of Ballaarat.

WATER SUPPLY.

The municipal council have to congratulate the ratepayers on the success of W. C. Smith, Esq., M.L.A., and the other representatives of the district, in obtaining from Government the sum of £10,000, with a grant of the dam known as Kirk's dam, purchased by the Government at a cost of £3000, and which is now being raised 20 feet, out of the vote passed for supplying the gold fields with water for 1861.

The conditions of the grant to the municipal councils are, that they, within two years after the £10,000 has been expended, shall, out of the local revenue of the districts, expend the sum of £15,000 to complete the works. From the circumstances that the Swamp, from whence a population of upwards of twenty thousand persons (20,000) are now dependent for water, was, during last summer, almost exhausted, the municipal council feel assured the advantages that will be derived by the inhabitants of Ballaarat, for mining and domestic purposes, when the works are completed, cannot be too highly estimated.

WATER WORKS.

The municipal council of this district have laid down pipes for supplying the railway station with water; the cost of the pipes and laying the same was £312 18s. 7d.

OPENING OF THE GEELONG AND BALLAARAT RAILWAY.

The Geelong and Ballaarat Railway was opened by His Excellency the Governor, Sir Henry Barkly, K.C.B., on the 10th of April, 1862.

The municipal council on that occasion entertained at a banquet His Excellency, the members of the Executive Council, the members of the Legislative Council, the members of the Legislative Assembly, and the chairmen of most of the municipal institutions in the colony.

The municipal council feel confident, should the Government adopt a liberal scale of rates for passenger and goods traffic, it would tend to develop the many advantages arising from railway communication with the capital, and be the means of advancing the commercial prosperity of Ballaarat, and the surrounding districts.

ANNUAL ASSESSMENT.

The valuator's return for the year ending 16th January, 1863, shows the net value of land and buildings, £661,772; the annual valuation, £82,721 10s.

GRANTS-IN-AID TO MUNICIPALITIES.

The municipal council views with apprehension the diminution in the annual grant-in-aid to municipal institutions, and strongly recommends for the consideration of the municipal councils in the colony the necessity of using their influence to obtain an endowment of land.

RATE COLLECTOR'S RESIGNATION.

Mr. A. Dimant, on the 7th of June, sent in his resignation as rate collector. The auditors' report, in consequence of some of the book receipts of the rate collector not being produced, there is an amount of £167-17s.-1d. received and entered, but they are unable to say if the same is correct.

APPOINTMENT.

Mr. Adam Roxburgh was appointed rate collector and valuator on the 23rd of June, 1862.
