REQUISITIONS.

16. Requisitions are to be addressed to the Government Storekeeper upon the authorised form (No. 1), and are to be rendered as follows, viz.:-

Stores, on or before the 1st January, 1st April, 1st July, and 1st October, respectively.

Fuel and light, on the dates specified for stores.

Articles for building and manufacturing purposes, from time to time as required. The requisitionist must, however, give timely notice of his requirements.

All heads of departments are expressly enjoined to transmit their quarterly applications in due time. No supplies will be furnished until fourteen days after the receipt of the requisition.

19. The Government Storekeeper, unless with the especial sanction of the minister concerned, is on no account to furnish supplies to any department for which timely provision, as directed by these regulations, shall have been neglected.

AND SALE POSTPONED.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better administration of Justice in Courts of General Sessions in the Colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor, from time to time, to define and appoint by proclamation the times at which such courts should be holden, and such times to alter or vary as the said Governor should think fit: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the thirtieth day of December, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, certain times were appointed at which the several Courts of General Sessions were to be holden during the present year: And whereas it is expedient to alter the times appointed for holding the next Courts of General Sessions for the districts of Palmerston and Sale: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby alter the times appointed for holding the next Courts of General Sessions for the districts of Palmerston and Sale respectively in manner following, that is to say:—

The Court of General Sessions for Palmerston shall be holden on Friday, the twenty-fourth day of October next ensuing, instead of on the seventeenth of the said month.

The Court of General Sessions for Sale shall be holden on Monday, the twenty-seventh day of October aforesaid, instead of on the twenty-fourth of the said month.

ONDIT AND CUNDARE FARMERS' COMMON.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act*, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the sixteenth day of September, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, a certain area therein described was proclaimed a farmers' common at Ondit: And whereas it is expedient to abolish the said common, and to proclaim another farmers' common in lieu thereof: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby abolish the said farmers' common at Ondit; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby proclaim the area hereinafter mentioned to be a Farmers' Common, that is to say:—

THE FARMERS' COMMON AT ONDIT AND CUNDARE:—Three thousand six hundred and twenty-nine acres, being sections 17, 18, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32; portion A of section 33; sections 35 and 36; portion A of section 37; and section 38, parish of Cundare.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this first day of September, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and in the twenty-sixth year of Her Majesty's reign.

MUNICIPALITY OF GISBORNE.

BYE-LAW No. 12.—FOR THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS FOR THE TOWN COMMON OF THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF GISBORNE.

WHEREAS by the Act of His Excellency the Governor and Parliament of Victoria, 25 Victoria No. 145, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the sale and occupation of Crown Lands*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the municipal council of any municipal district within or in the vicinity of which any town common, within the meaning of the Act of the Parliament of Victoria No. 117, is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-law prescribe, three persons to be managers of such common: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Gisborne, by and with the assent of His Excellency the Governor in Council:—

1. That the election of three persons to be managers of the Gisborne Town Common shall be held annually on the first Wednesday of September each year, at Eight o'clock in the evening of said day.

2. That at the annual meeting, or any subsequent meeting for the election of a manager or managers for the said common, any member of the municipal council may nominate, in writing, the names of not more than three persons to be managers thereof, with the consent of the person or persons so nominated; and in case there shall be more persons nominated than vacancies, a ballot shall be taken of the chairman and members present at such meeting of council, and at the conclusion of said ballot, if there shall be an equality of votes, the chairman shall have a casting vote; and the person or persons elected shall be declared to be the managers or a manager, as the case may be, of the Gisborne Town Common, under the provisions of the Act aforesaid.

3. That should any manager be removed by order of the municipal council of Gisborne, a meeting for the election of a successor to the manager so removed shall be held within twenty-one days from the date of such removal, the day for holding such meeting to be appointed at the regular meeting of the council which shall be held next after the date of the removal of a manager as aforesaid; such meeting to be held at the same hour and place, and conducted in the same manner as hereinbefore provided.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 12, made by the municipal council of Gisborne, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF MARYBOROUGH.

BYE-LAW No. 23.—FOR MAKING AN ASSESSMENT AND IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING AND THREEPENCE IN THE POUND, FOR THE YEAR ENDING 4TH MAY, 1863.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is authorised and required to assess all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district (except property belonging to Her Majesty), according to its fair average annual value, and to impose a rate on all such properties for the current year: And whereas the council of the municipal district of Maryborough has caused a valuation of all rateable property within the said district, under the said Act, to be made, amounting to the sum of £20,639 10s.: And whereas all appeals against such valuation have been finally made and determined, and such valuation has been amended, as provided by the said Act: And whereas such amended valuation amounts to the sum of £19,474 10s.: Be it therefore enacted, by the said municipal council, that all the several properties in houses and lands within the limits of the said district be and the same are hereby assessed for the current municipal year ending 4th May, 1863, according to the several amounts of annual value respectively affixed to the same in the said valuation or assessment, amounting in the aggregate to the aforesaid sum of £19,474 10s.; and that a rate of One shilling and threepence in the pound for the current year on the said annual value of the said respective properties be and the same is hereby imposed and levied, one moiety to be collected on and after twenty days from the issue of the notices, and the other on and after the 1st day of February, 1863.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 23, made by the municipal council of Maryborough, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF SMYTHESDALE.

BYE-LAW No. 9.—FOR STRIKING A RATE ON THE VALUE OF PROPERTY WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF SMYTHESDALE.

THAT a rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound is hereby imposed upon all assessable property within the municipal district of Smythesdale, for the year ending the second day of May, 1863.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 9, made by the municipal council of Smythesdale, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF ST. ARNAUD.

BYE-LAW NO. 4.—A BYE-LAW FOR LICENSING AND REGULATING THE SLAUGHTER OF SMALL CATTLE WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY OF ST. ARNAUD.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is rendered competent for the council of any municipal district to pass bye-laws for regulating the killing of butchers' meat, and the suppression of nuisances: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the council of the municipal district of St. Arnaud, that all butchers whose premises shall have been suitably prepared and properly paved for purposes of slaughtering, so that in the judgment of the council, after the report of the inspector or other officer, the said premises are found to be in a fit and proper state, be granted a license, and permitted to kill sheep and lamb, swine and goats; provided that such persons shall receive or cause to be received the blood into tubs, or other suitable vessels or receptacles, together with all offal, or other offensive matter, and remove the same or cause it to be removed from such premises at least once in every twenty-four hours. And for the purpose of better carrying out the provisions of this bye-law, such premises shall be registered at the municipal or town clerk's offices, and shall at all times be open to the council or their duly appointed inspector or other officer for the purpose of inspection. And be it also ordered and enacted, that written notice of application for such license and registration shall be given to the town clerk at least eight days before the same be granted, made, and entered, and be exhibited at his offices; and that the said licenses and registrations shall issue and be made on the first Friday in any month, or upon such other day as the council may hereafter appoint. And any butcher who shall kill any sheep or lamb, swine or goat, without being duly licensed and registered as aforesaid (except the *bona fide* servants of the butcher), or whose premises shall not be kept and maintained inoffensive and in order as above required, or shall neglect or refuse to comply with any of the regulations of this bye-law, shall, for any such neglect or breach thereof, be subject to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds sterling, and such penalty shall and may be awarded, measured, recovered, and distributed by summary process before any two or more justices of the peace having jurisdiction within the said municipal district of St. Arnaud.—(62. W. 5317.)

BYE-LAW NO. 6.—A BYE-LAW FOR PROHIBITING THE DEPOSIT OF NIGHT-SOIL, OR OTHER OFFENSIVE MATTER, EXCEPT IN SOME PUBLIC DEPÔT, AND FOR THE PROHIBITION OF BOILING DOWN OR BURNING OF OFFAL, OR OTHER OFFENSIVE MATTER, WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to pass any bye-law with the view to the preservation of the public health: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of St. Arnaud, that no person shall deposit or put any night-soil, offal, or other offensive matter upon any of the unenclosed lands, or upon any public road or way, or in any creek, or in any mining shaft, paddock, or water-hole within the boundaries of the municipality, excepting in some public depôt appointed by the council to be the receptacle of such night-soil, manure, offal, or offensive refuse; nor shall any person or persons burn or boil down, or cause to be burned or boiled down, any offal or offensive refuse within the boundaries of the municipality. And any person proved guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds sterling, the same to be awarded, measured, recovered, and distributed by summary process before any two or more justices of the peace having jurisdiction within the said municipal district of St. Arnaud.—(62. W. 5319.)

The foregoing Bye-laws, Nos. 4 and 6, made by the municipal council of St. Arnaud, have been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF WOODEND.

BYE-LAW NO. 1.—A BYE-LAW TO REGULATE, BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS, THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNCIL, FOR THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF WOODEND.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15 intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings (18 Victoria No. 15, sec. 26): Be it therefore ordered and directed by the council of the municipal district of Woodend, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the proceedings and business of the said municipal council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which shall be and be called the "Standing Orders" of the said council, that is to say:—

CHAPTER I.

Parliamentary usages to be resorted to.—That in all cases not hereinafter provided for, resort shall be had to the rules, forms, and usages of Parliament, which shall be followed so far as the same are applicable to the proceedings of this council.

ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS.

1. *Council to sit with open doors.*—The business of the council shall be conducted on all ordinary occasions with open doors; but any three members present may require the exclusion of strangers until it shall have been decided by the council whether the questions proposed to be introduced shall be discussed with open doors.

2. *Commencement of business. When a quorum is not present.*—At all meetings of the council, the business shall commence so soon after the time stated in the summons as a legal quorum is present; but, should a quorum not be present at the expiration of thirty minutes, such circumstance shall be noted, with the names of the members present, in the minute book, and the business on the notice paper shall be postponed to the next meeting of the council.

3. *Confirmation of minutes.*—At every regular meeting of the council the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting for confirmation the minutes of any preceding meetings, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to the accuracy as a record of the proceedings. The minutes, when confirmed, shall be signed by the chairman for the time being.

4. *Order of business.*—That after the confirmation of the minutes, the order of business shall be as follows, or as near thereto as may be practicable, but for the greater convenience of the council at any particular meeting thereof it may be altered by resolution to that effect.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1. Reading of copies of letters sent by authority of the council.
2. Reading letters received, and considering and ordering thereon.
3. Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
4. Reading and ordering on reports of permanent committees.
5. Reading and ordering on reports of special committees.
6. Reading and ordering on reports of deputations.
7. Orders of the day, including subjects arising from proceedings of former meetings.
8. Motions of which previous notice has been given.

5. *Council to be communicated with by petition.*—Every communication addressed to the council shall be in the form of petition or memorial, in writing (not printed or lithographed), and presented by one of its members, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.

6. *Presentation of petitions.*—On the presentation of a petition, no debate shall take place thereon until notice has been given in the usual manner; and the only questions that shall be entertained on the occasion of its presentation shall be that the petition be received, and, if necessary, that it be referred to a committee or taken into consideration with any order of the day to which such petition may refer; and every member presenting a petition to the council shall confine himself to a statement of the persons from whom it comes, of the number of signatures attached to it, of the material allegations contained in it, and to the reading of the prayer thereof. Every petition must be signed by at least one person on every skin or sheet on which it is written.

7. *Presentation of reports.*—No report of a committee shall be considered or adopted on its presentation, nor until due notice thereof shall be given, nor shall any debate be allowed thereon, except as to its being received, and, if thought necessary, printed for distribution among the members.

8. *Consideration of reports.*—If in the report of a committee there are distinct recommendations contained, such report shall not be adopted until notice has been given of the several recommendations, and the sense of the council taken separately on each.

9. *Reports to be numbered and signed.*—The reports of any committee shall be numbered in consecutive order, and signed by the chairman thereof, or in the event of his absence, then by the chairman for the time being, previous to being presented to the council.

10. *Orders of the day.*—The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration; any member of the council may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable, in the form of a notice of motion, such notice to be given in writing to the town clerk, on the previous meeting of council, and all such notices of motion shall be considered in the order in which they were given.

11. *Proceedings with motions.*—No motion shall be proceeded with unless the councillor giving notice, or one of the council authorised by him in writing, be present to proceed with the same when called upon.

12. *Delivery of notice paper.*—The notice paper shall be prepared by the town clerk, and caused to be delivered to each councillor two clear days previous to each council meeting.

13. *Resolutions, how rescinded.*—No motion, the effect of which would be to rescind any previous resolution of the council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council has been duly ordered for that purpose; and no motion for rescinding any resolution of the council shall be again entertained during the same municipal year, unless by consent of at least five members of the council.

14. *Bye-laws.*—No bye-law shall be finally passed or adopted at the meeting at which it shall have been first proposed, nor until the next meeting of the council regularly convened, and every such bye-law shall in the interim remain open for the inspection of any of the ratepayers free of charge.

15. *Reference of proposed petitions, &c. to a committee.*—No motion proposing any petition, address, bye-law, or standing order shall be entertained, unless the mover shall submit therewith a draft of such petition, address, bye-law, or standing order; and the draft so submitted shall in no case be taken into consideration until it shall have been referred to a committee, who shall report thereon; and the mover of every such proposition shall be a member of such committee.

16. *Manuscript motions to be preserved.*—The original manuscript of any motion or amendment that is submitted to the council shall be preserved until the minutes of the meeting at which the same has been disposed of are confirmed in the usual way.

CHAPTER II.
ORDER OF DEBATE.

17. *Motions and amendments, how proposed.*—Any member desirous of making a motion or amendment shall rise and address the chairman, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down until the member calling to order shall have been heard thereon, and the question of order disposed of, when the member in possession of the chair shall proceed with the subject.

18. Any member desirous of proposing either an original motion or amendment, must state the nature of such motion or amendment before addressing the council in support thereof; and when making a motion or amendment, shall put it in form, sign, and deliver it to the town clerk, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder; and no motion or amendment so made shall be withdrawn without the leave of the council.

19. *Seconding of motions and enforcement of standing orders.*—No motion or amendment shall be entertained or discussed unless it be seconded; any member may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the council, by simply noticing that such order is disobeyed.

20. *As to speaking on moving or seconding a motion.*—A member moving a motion shall be held to have spoken thereon; but a member merely seconding a motion without remark shall not be held to have spoken upon it.

21. *Members to be addressed by their official titles.*—The members, in meeting of council, shall designate each other by their official titles, namely, that of chairman or councillor.

22. *Priority in speaking.*—If two or more members rise to speak at the same time, the chairman shall decide which is entitled to priority.

23. *Chairman to rise when addressing the council.*—The chairman shall rise in addressing the council to discuss any question.

24. *Speaking twice on the same subject.*—No member shall speak twice on the same question, except by way of explanation, or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment last carried, and after the reply the amendment on the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.

25. *Calling to order for speaking twice on the same subject.*—The chairman shall, without waiting for the interposition of the council, call to order any member proceeding to speak a second time on the same question, unless entitled to reply, or in explanation where he has been misrepresented or misunderstood.

26. *The chairman shall decide what is order.*—The chairman, when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case, without argument or comment, and his decision as to what is order or explanation shall be final for that occasion in each case.

27. *Imputations of improper motives and personal reflections highly disorderly.*—No member shall digress from the subject-matter of the question under discussion, or comment upon the words used by any other member in a previous debate; and all imputations of improper motives, and all personal reflections on members, shall be considered highly disorderly.

28. *Members shall withdraw offensive expressions, and make apology.*—Any member who shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other member shall, if required by the council, withdraw such expression, and make a satisfactory apology to the council.

29. *Members to withdraw when called upon.*—When, in consequence of disorderly conduct, the chairman shall call upon any member by name, such member shall withdraw as soon as he has been heard in explanation; and after such member's withdrawal, the council shall at once take the case into consideration.

30. *Words may be taken down.*—Any member may require the town clerk to take down any particular words used by a member immediately upon the same being used.

31. *Production of documents.*—Any member may, of right, require the production of any documents of the council relating to the question or matter in discussion.

32. *Amendments.*—One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another may be moved before the original question is put to the vote; but, upon any amendment being carried, such amendment shall be held to have quashed the original motion, and for all purposes of subsequent discussion the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion; and it shall be competent for any member to move one other amendment thereon, but not more.

33. *Questions may be superseded.*—A question may be superseded—1st, by the adjournment of the council on the motion of a member "That the council do now adjourn;" 2nd, by the previous question, viz, "That this question be now put," being proposed and negatived.

34. *Vote, how taken.*—The chairman shall, in taking the vote upon any motion or amendment, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative, and he may do so as often as is necessary to enable him to form and declare his opinion from the show of hands as to which party has the majority.

35. *Manner of voting.*—The council shall vote by show of hands, excepting in cases of elections, when the vote shall be by ballot; any member of the council may, however, call for a division upon any question, in which case the members voting in the affirmative shall stand up, and those in the negative shall retain their seats, until the vote is recorded.

36. *Adjournments.*—No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the council; but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the council.

37. *Committee of the council.*—In the consideration of any matter of detail it shall be competent for the council to resolve itself into a committee of the whole.

38. *Protests.*—Any member of the council may enter his protest against any resolution of the council, provided that such protest is not inconsistent with truth or disrespectful to the council; notice of intention to protest must, however, in every case be given on the adoption of the resolution protested against, and the protest, signed by the member or members protesting, and specifying the reasons for protesting, must be entered before the next regular meeting of the council, by the protesting member, in a book to be kept for that purpose in the town clerk's office, and duly referred to in the minutes of council, the same to be considered also a part of such minutes.

39. *The council to be counted out.*—If a debate on any order of the day or on a motion be interrupted by the council being counted out, such order of the day or motion may be restored to the notice paper, and the debate thereupon resumed at the next meeting of council, at the point where it was so interrupted.

40. *The committee of the whole council interrupted for want of a quorum.*—If the discussion of any question in a committee of the whole council be interrupted for want of a quorum, the council may order the resumption of such committee on a future day, on motion upon notice; and the discussion of such question shall then be resumed at the point at which it was so interrupted.

CHAPTER III.

COMMITTEES—PERMANENT.

41. *Appointment of committees.*—There shall be at least two permanent committees, consisting of three members each, two to form a quorum, formed under the following heads:—

1. Public Works; and 2. Finance and Rates; which committees shall be elected annually by voting papers by the members of council.

42. *Chairmanship of committees.*—Every committee, at the first meeting after its appointment, shall elect one of its members to be chairman for the municipal year, and in his absence shall elect a chairman for the time being.

43. *Chairmanship of committees.*—The chairman of the council, when appointed on any permanent committee, shall be the chairman thereof; when special committees are appointed for a merely temporary purpose, the member proposing such committee shall be the chairman thereof, and the standing orders of the council shall be observed in all committees, except as to the number of times limited for speaking.

44. *Absence of a quorum at committees.*—If there shall not be a quorum of members present within thirty minutes after the time fixed for the meeting of any committee, such meeting shall lapse, but it may be competent for the chairman of such committee, if necessary, to convene another meeting at a future day.

45. *Absentees.*—Any member of a committee absenting himself from three consecutive meetings, duly convened, shall cease to be a member thereof.

46. *Vacancies, how filled.*—The council shall, if it thinks fit, on the requisition of any member, discharge him from serving on a committee, and all vacancies as they occur shall be filled up by the council.

47. *Questions decided by a majority of votes.*—All questions shall be decided by a majority of votes, and whenever the votes are equal, the chairman shall have the casting vote.

48. *Finance committee may disburse £1 in one month.*—The finance committee shall be at liberty, at their discretion, to authorise disbursements for current expenses to an amount not exceeding £1 in any one month.

49. *Committees, how convened.*—The town clerk shall convene every permanent committee within ten days of its first appointment, and every select committee within five days of the same, or at any other time thereafter by the order of the council, or the written order of the chairman, or on that of any two members of such committee; and of all committee meetings the town clerk shall give each member at least three clear days' notice.

CHAPTER IV.

MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS.

50. *Call of the whole council, how made.*—For the consideration of any bye-law, or for the raising or appropriation of money, or for the objects contemplated in standing order No. 13, or for any other important business, it shall be competent for any member, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any such subject, at the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given in the notice paper for the day when the order of the day or notice of motion for which such call was made is set down for consideration; and no member shall absent himself when such order of the day or notice of motion comes under consideration, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the council.

51. *Election of officers.*—No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until not less than five clear days' notice have been given in one or more newspaper or newspapers, inviting applications for the same; and the salary or other remuneration of such office in all cases to be fixed before proceeding to the election.

52. *Voting by ballot at election of officers.*—At all elections for officers, at the disposal of the council, the voting shall be by ballot, on cards to be provided for the purpose signed by the voter, and containing the name or names of the person or persons voted for; and no voting card shall be received at any election which is not signed by the member voting; and such voting cards shall be kept in the town clerk's office for the twelve months next ensuing the day of election.

53. *Security—Members or officers not receivable.*—No member or officer of the council, or any auditor of the municipality of Woodend, shall be received as a surety for any officer appointed by the council, or for any work to be done for the council. In all cases of security being given for the faithful performance

of any duty or contract, the expense of preparing such security shall be borne by the person providing the same.

54. *Councillors to have no share or interest in contract.*—No councillor shall have, directly or indirectly, by himself or his partner, any share or interest in any contract or employment with or by the council, except he be a shareholder in any public company or corporation with which this council may contract.

55. *Attestations under the common seal.*—The town clerk shall have the custody of the common seal of the municipal council, and be responsible for the same and the proper use thereof, each impression of the seal being verified by the signature of that officer.

56. *Attestations under the common seal.*—The town clerk shall not affix the common seal to any corporate document without the express order of the council, nor unless such document bears the signature of the chairman, but in the case of powers of attorney, and other legal documents not relating to the corporation, the signatures to which require to be verified before the chairman by declaration; and in any such case the said seal shall and may be affixed by the town clerk to the chairman's certificate accompanying the same.

57. *Suspension of standing orders.*—Any one or more of the standing rules and orders may be suspended *pro tem.*, in case of emergency, with consent of a majority of the council.

58. Any person guilty of the neglect or breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 1, made by the municipal council of Woodend, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE GLENLOGIE CEMETERY.

THE following Rules and Regulations were adopted by the Trustees of the Glenlogie Cemetery, at a full meeting held on the evening of Thursday, 10th July, 1862.

1. All charges must be paid to the treasurer when orders are given, or before the grave or vault is opened.
2. Orders for interment must be given to the person in charge of the cemetery before five o'clock p.m. the day previous to interment.
3. The certificate of the Registrar of Deaths must be produced at the time of giving the order for burial.
4. The procession to arrive at the cemetery punctually at the hour appointed for the funeral.
5. The usual hours of interment will be from Ten a.m. to Seven p.m. from September to April, inclusive; and from Ten to Four in the other four months, except on Sundays, when the only hours will be from Two to Five.
6. The charges will be remitted for the burial of any person on the production of a certificate signed by two respectable householders, that the relatives or friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.
7. Applications for permission to make a vault or erect a monument in the cemetery, to be made to the trustees. A certificate of permission will be granted to the persons applying, on payment of the charges set forth in the schedule marked A.
8. The trustees will cause all ordinary graves to be dug; but when a brick grave or vault is required, it must be constructed under the direction of the trustees or some person duly appointed by them; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault belonging to another person, the consent in writing of such person must be left with the order.
9. All monuments, vaults, graves, gravestones, and fences, to be kept in proper repair at the expense of the owners.
10. Every coffin in a vault or bricked grave to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, granite, slate, or iron.
11. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and a plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, and a copy of every epitaph or inscription, to be submitted to the trustees for approval, who are required by the 8th section of the Act to withhold permission, and prevent the erection of any monument which shall appear to them inappropriate or unbecoming; and shall determine and fix the position of any monument which may be preferred to be erected according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner. In the erection of tablets copper cramps must be used.
12. Wooden fences allowed, but if not kept in proper repair may be removed by order of the trustees without notice to the owner.
13. A plan of the cemetery and a registry will be kept, and may be inspected at the charge set forth in schedule A.
14. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.
15. Any person wantonly or wilfully destroying, or doing, or causing to be done, any damage to any monument, vault, or tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree, or plant in the cemetery, is guilty of a misdemeanor, and, being convicted thereof, is liable to be punished as prescribed by the 14th section of the Act 17 Victoria No. 12.
16. No dogs will be allowed to enter the cemetery.
17. Three of the trustees to form a quorum.
18. No grave to be of a less depth than eight feet. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.
