NOTICE TO HEADS OF DEPARTMENTS.

THE attention of Heads of Departments is requested to the undermentioned extracts from the Store and Transport Regulations:—

REQUISITIONS.

16. Requisitions are to be addressed to the Government Storekeeper upon the authorised form (No. 1), and are to be rendered as follows, viz. :—

Stores, on or before the 1st January, 1st April, 1st July, and 1st October, respectively.

Fuel and light, on the dates specified for stores.

Articles for building and manufacturing purposes, from time to time as required. The requisitionist must, however, give timely notice of his requirements.

All heads of departments are expressly enjoined to transmit their quarterly applications in due time. No supplies will be furnished until fourteen days after the receipt of the requisition.

19. The Government Storekeeper, unless with the especial sanction of the minister concerned, is on no account to furnish supplies to any department for which timely provision, as directed by these regulations, shall have been neglected.

MARYBOROUGH MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAW FOR THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS OF THE GOLD FIELDS COMMONS WITHIN THE MINING DISTRICT OF MARYBOROUGH.—[17th July, 1862.]

At a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Maryborough, begun and holden at Maryborough, in the said district, on the seventeenth day of July, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

Power to elect managers under authority of Land Act, 1862.—Whereas by the 69th section of *The Land Act, 1862*, the mining board of the mining district within which any gold fields common is situated, is directed to elect annually in such manner as such mining board might by bye-laws prescribe, three persons to be managers of such gold fields common; and such mining board was also empowered to remove any one or more of such managers, and elect others in their stead: Now it is hereby ordained—

1. *Annual election, period of.*—That the annual election of managers of the various gold fields commons within this mining district shall take place on the fourth Friday in the month of August in each year; provided that, in the event of there not being a quorum, such election shall be held at the next meeting of such board duly constituted.

2. *Mode of election.*—That such election shall take place by ballot, and each member of the board present shall vote thereat.

3. *Assent of candidate to be given in writing.*—That no person shall be nominated or elected to fill the office of manager without his assent in writing, which assent shall be given to the chairman by the member nominating when required so to do by any member of the board.

4. *Chairman and clerk to count votes and declare result in writing.*—That the votes, so soon as recorded, shall be counted in the presence of the members by the chairman, who shall be assisted by the clerk of the board; and the chairman, upon ascertaining the result of such election, shall declare the names of the successful candidates to the board as being duly elected; and shall thereupon direct the clerk to enter such declaration in the minute book, and acquaint in writing the persons elected to fill the office of managers of such circumstance.

5. *Removal from office of manager.*—On the removal by the board of any such manager, the board will elect another in his stead, and the person so elected shall hold such office for the remainder of the term his predecessor would have been entitled to have held the same, unless removed by the mining board.

The undersigned members of the said mining board concurred in making the foregoing bye-law.

PUBLIC LANDS CIRCULAR.

IN order to secure the widest circulation for all proclamations and notices connected with the working of *The Land Act*, 1862, and for all advertisements, decisions, and other announcements from the Department of Lands and Survey, they will be published henceforth in the *Public Lands Circular*; and several hundred copies of each number will be distributed, gratis, wherever the circulation of the announcements it contains is of most importance. It will also be supplied by the Government Printer, and by Messrs. Gordon and Gotech and their agents throughout the country, and by all District Survey Offices, to subscribers post free, at Ten shillings per annum. A single number may be purchased for 6d.

The *Public Lands Circular* will contain all announcements and advertisements connected with this branch of the public service which used formerly to appear in the *Government Gazette*, and also a reprint of such proclamations as the law still requires to be inserted in that publication. It will be ordinarily issued once a fortnight; but more frequently when necessary.

Private advertisements on subjects connected with Land will be inserted on the same terms as in the *Government Gazette*.

The *Public Lands Circular* will be filed at all Survey Offices, Land Offices, and Immigration Offices; and also by the Clerks of Petty Sessions, Commissioners of Crown Lands, and Officers in charge of Police Districts; and the latest number will be hung outside the door of Survey Offices for public inspection.

BALLAN FARMERS' COMMON.

RULES for the management of the Ballan Farmers' Common, in accordance with the 73rd section of *The Land Act* of 1862.

1. No person or persons will have any right to commonage who does not cultivate at least one acre in eight of his or their purchased land.

2. Number of cattle belonging to any one person or firm not to exceed fifty head, or twenty-five horses; and in no case will more than one head of cattle to each acre of cultivation, or one horse to two acres of cultivation, be allowed, except the common be not sufficiently stocked, in which case special arrangements may be made with the managers, but a lesser number than this may be insisted on by the managers at any time.

3. Common fees will be charged at the rate of Six shillings per year for every head of cattle over twelve months old, and Eight shillings per year for every horse, mare, or gelding, over twelve months old, which must be paid quarterly in advance to the treasurer, who will give the person so paying a receipt for the same, and an order to the herdsman to receive the number of cattle or horses so paid for; but any cattle or horses being put on the common during the currency of any quarter, commonage fees will be charged only from the time such cattle or horses have been put on, and for any shorter time than three months a higher rate of fees than here stated may be charged. Any cattle or horses not the progeny of stock on the common will be charged for at six months old. No entire horses or bulls will be allowed on the common except by special permission.

4. In no case or under any pretence will the herdsman be permitted to receive any cattle or horses on the common except by order as in the last preceding rule, a breach of which will subject him to immediate dismissal.

5. Commonage fees will be charged at the rate of One shilling per year for every sheep or lamb over three months old, payable quarterly in advance; such sheep must be herded by the owner thereof, and kept within the boundaries to be defined by the managers. Five sheep will be allowed for one head of cattle.

6. The brands and description of all cattle and horses to be left with the herdsman in writing by the owner when putting them on the common.

7. No cattle or horses to be removed from the common until the parties wishing for such removal first inform the herdsman of their intention to do so, who will attend at his place of residence, which must be on the most eligible site of the common, on Tuesdays and Fridays, from Twelve till Two o'clock, to receive and deliver cattle.

8. To prevent unnecessary expense, notice is hereby given that in all cases of neglect for one week from the commencement of any quarter to pay the commonage fees as above stated, steps will be immediately taken to enforce payment of the same in accordance with the provisions of *The Land Act* in that case made and provided, without further notice than here given. The quarters commence 1st January, 1st April, 1st July, 1st October.

9. All farmers on application to have their stock admitted on the common will be required to fill the vacancies in, and sign the following, viz.:

I, the undersigned, do hereby certify that I am the owner or occupier of _____ acres of purchased land in the parish of _____, being allotment _____ of section _____ of _____, which land is situated within the distance of five miles from the land proclaimed as a Farmers' Common for agriculturists at Ballan, and that I cultivate _____ acres thereof.

WINDERMERE FARMERS' COMMON.

RULES, &c., of the Burrumbeet and Windermere Farmers' Common.

1. All farmers who cultivate one-fourth of their land, and reside within five miles of this common, not being nearer to any other farmers' common than to this, shall be eligible to depasture cattle on this common.

2. All parties entitled to commonage shall send their claim and qualification to the managers within the time advertised by them for receiving such claims, provided that the managers advertise for not less than ten days for claims to be sent in.

3. Upon the expiration of the time, the foregoing rule being complied with by the managers, they shall, to the best of their judgment, allot to each claimant a fair proportion of cattle to be depastured on the common—the charge to be Seven shillings per head for cattle, and Ten shillings and sixpence per head for horses—reserving the right to diminish the number at any time on their finding that the grass is not sufficient for the number of cattle depastured, through bush fires, an unfavorable season, or any other reasonable cause.

4. The managers shall, as soon as they have allotted the number of cattle to each claimant, advertise a meeting, at which every one entitled to the common may attend and learn the number of cattle allotted to him.

5. All parties or persons shall, within 21 days next following after the said meeting, pay in full the several sums due by them as fees for depasturing the cattle allotted to them.

6. The managers shall engage a herd by tender only.

7. The herd shall be answerable to the managers only for the proper fulfilment of his duties. The herd shall make full provision for the efficient carrying out of his duty in providing assistance for any extra work, such as impounding or mustering at the request of the managers, or the more thoroughly detaining the cattle entrusted to him.

8. Any cattle which shall have been duly delivered to the said herd by any one entitled to depasture on the common, and which may get impounded, shall be released within forty-eight hours, or on payment of two days' maintenance, for which payment the owners shall be held responsible. If not so released, any further payment shall be made by the herd at his own cost, and for which payment he shall have no claim against the managers or the party whose cattle are.

9. The herd shall, upon any cattle straying or otherwise being removed from the common without the owners' consent, acquaint the owners thereof within forty-eight hours; in the event of no notice being given, and neglect being proved, the herd shall be held liable to such fine as the managers may think fit. In no case shall the fine exceed Ten pounds (£10); the fines, if any, to be deducted from his salary.

10. No cattle shall be removed from the common without the knowledge of the herd, and under no circumstances shall the herd deliver or allow cattle to be taken from under his charge except between the hours of Eight and Eleven a.m. and Three and Five p.m., unless by special order of the managers or chairman.

11. No person or persons shall be allowed to herd their own cattle, and remove them at will off the said common, except by special order of the managers; also, in no case shall the fees be less on that account.

12. Any person or persons disturbing cattle unnecessarily on the said common, shall be dealt with according to law; the herd in every such case to lay an information with the managers.

13. The managers shall cause to be erected a stockyard, for the use and convenience of all parties depasturing cattle on the common; the use to be limited to the cattle depasturing on the common only.

14. The herd or his assistant shall be found at their dwelling from the hour of Twelve noon to Two p.m., to receive cattle, and from Twelve noon to Three p.m., to deliver any cattle that may be wanted; this not to interfere with special orders.

15. All parties putting cattle on the common shall put all such cattle in the aforesaid stockyard, for the convenience of the herd to take brands, and to put the common-brand on them (tar); the herd shall in all cases give a receipt, and keep a register in a book for the purpose of inserting brands, colors, &c. Any person making use of the common-brand shall be prosecuted; and in no case shall the herd be held responsible for cattle not entrusted to him in accordance with these rules.

16. Any person removing cattle from off the common shall not be allowed to replace them by others within three months from the time of entry, except by special order.

17. No bulls or entire horses (foals and calves not included) shall be depastured on the common, unless by permission of the managers.

18. Any person or persons whom the managers shall have good reason to suspect of not being duly qualified for the use of the common, shall, if the managers deem it expedient, make a declaration before a justice of the peace that he or they are the parties represented in their application, and the *bona fide* holder or owner of the land on which the application is founded.

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT. ANNEXATION TO SANDRIDGE.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by two hundred and forty-one householders resident within the municipal district of Sandridge, praying that an adjoining area may be united with and form part of the said municipal district.

The petitioners state that they are householders resident within the present limits of the municipal district of Sandridge, and that they are desirous of its limits and boundaries being altered.

They represent that the district comprises only about seven hundred and sixty acres, and is considerably less in extent than the other littoral municipalities of Brighton, St. Kilda, Emerald Hill, and Williamstown; and that while these municipalities enjoy the advantages of a large sea frontage, and two of them a good river frontage also, Sandridge has no river frontage, and only sixty-two chains of frontage to the Bay, of which about fifteen and a half chains are taken up by the reserve of the Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway Company and another part by military works.

Lastly, they urge that the restricted area of their district debars them from many advantages, such as the carrying out of useful sanitary measures and other matters of local importance, and subjects them to numerous disabilities, among which is their inability to project a road so as to establish direct communication with the metropolis independently of the control of any other district.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Excellency will be pleased to exercise the powers vested in your Excellency by the clause aforesaid [§ 2 of 18 Victoria No. 15], and alter and vary the limits of the municipal district of Sandridge so as to include the area described below, that is to say: Commencing at the south-eastern angle of the present boundary line of the municipal district of Sandridge; thence following the said boundary line in a northerly and westerly direction until it strikes the banks of the River Yarra Yarra; thence along the south banks of the said river in a westerly direction as far as to the municipal limits of Footscray; thence following said municipal limits in a southerly and westerly direction until the banks of the River Yarra Yarra are again reached; thence following the banks of said river southerly to its junction with Hobson's Bay; thence following the high-water line of Hobson's Bay in an easterly direction as far as to the commencing point, as indicated upon the plan herewith forwarded."

The council advertised for candidates, and on the 28th April elected Mr. David Prophet, who accepted the office of town clerk, and entered on his duties on the 12th May.

The office of inspector of nuisances having become vacant, Sergeant Keohane, of the police, was, on the 16th of June, appointed to that office.
