SIR,

It has been intimated to me by Earl Russell that he has been informed by the American Minister at this Court of the intention of the United States Government to issue Letters of Marque, with a view to checking the hostilities carried on by the Southern privateers against United States commerce.

I think it right to convey to you the earliest notice of this intention, as serious inconvenience may result to British commerce from such a measure.

THE BERWICK ROAD DISTRICT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him should seem meet, as and to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare that the portion of the said colony hereinafter defined shall be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, that is to say:-

Commencing at a point in the eastern boundary of the county of Mornington, due east of the south-east angle of the parish of Cranbourne; thence by a direct line west to the south-east angle of the said parish; thence by the eastern and northern boundaries of the said parish to the south-east angle of the parish of Eumemmering; thence north by the eastern boundary of the said parish to the north-east angle of the section xxxi. of the said parish; thence west by the northern boundary of the said section to the south-east angle of section xxvii. of the said parish; thence by the east and north boundary of section xxvii. to the centre of the one-chain road which divides sections xxv. and xxvi. in the said parish; thence north by the centre of the said road to a point opposite the north boundary of allotment 19, section xxv. of the said parish; thence east by part of the north boundary of allotment 19, section xxv., to the south-east angle of allotment 17, section xxv. of the said parish; thence by the east and part of the north boundary of allotment 17, section xxv. to the south-east angle of allotment 15, section xxv. of the said parish; thence north by the east boundary of the said allotment 15, section xxv., to its north-east angle; thence west to the south-east angle of the Dandenong Township Reserve; thence north by the eastern boundary of said reserve to a point in the centre of the Dandenong Creek, opposite the north boundary of the said township reserve; thence northerly by the centre of the Dandenong Creek to its junction with the Corranwarrabul Creek; thence by the centre of the Corranwarrabul Creek to the north-east angle of section x., in the parish of Narree-warran; thence by the northern boundary of section xiv. of the said parish to its north-east angle; thence by a line due east to the boundary of the county of Mornington; thence by the county boundary to the commencing point.

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Berwick Road District."

THE CRANBOURNE ROAD DISTRICT ALTERED.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the nineteenth day of June, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty, the boundaries of "The Cranbourne Road District" were defined as therein mentioned: And whereas it is expedient to alter the said district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the boundaries specified in the said Proclamation; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby proclaim and declare that the said Cranbourne Road District shall comprise the area hereinafter described, that is to say:-

Commencing at a point on the southern boundary of the Berwick Road District due north of the east angle of section xix. in the parish of Yallock; thence westerly and northerly by the western boundaries of the Berwick Road District to the south-east angle of the Dandenong township reserve; thence west and north by the southern and part of the western boundaries of the said township reserve to the centre of the Dandenong Creek; thence southerly by the centre of the Dandenong Creek to a point due north of the north-west angle of block 60 in the parish of Eumemmering; thence south to the north-west angle of block 60 of the said parish; thence southerly by the eastern boundaries of blocks 60, 59, 58, in parish of Eumemmering, and by the western and portion of the southern boundary of the parish of Lyndhurst, to the north-west angle of the parish of Langwarrin; thence by the western and southern boundary of the said parish and a direct line east to the shore of

the Inner Western Passage of Western Port Bay; thence further easterly following the north shore of the Inner Passage to a point due west of the southern boundary of Mickle, Lyall, and Bakewell's pre-emptive right; thence by a line east to the south-east angle of the said pre-emptive right; thence by the eastern boundary of the said pre-emptive right and the south-eastern boundary of the parish of Yallock to the eastern angle of section XIX. of the said parish; thence by a line north to the commencing point.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency **SIR HENRY BARKLY**, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the nineteenth day of March, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, the boundaries of "The Dandenong Road District" were altered as therein mentioned: And whereas it is deemed necessary and advisable that the boundaries of the said district should be again altered: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke so much of the said Proclamation as describes the said road district; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby proclaim and declare that the boundaries of the said Dandenong Road District shall be the boundaries hereinafter specified, that is to say:—

Commencing at a point in the Dandenong Creek due east of the northern boundary of section v., in the parish of Dandenong; thence by a line west to the centre of a one-chain road which forms the eastern boundary of sections VII. and X. of the parish of Mordialloc; thence south by the eastern boundary of the Moorabbin Road District to the south boundary of the said parish of Mordialloc; thence easterly by the south boundary of the said parish to the western boundary of the parish of Dandenong; thence south and east by part of the western and by the southern boundary of the parish of Dandenong to the western boundary of Dandenong township reserve; thence south, east, and north by the west, south, and east boundaries of the said township reserve to the Dandenong Creek; thence northerly by the said creek to the commencing point.

PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.

By His Excellency COLONEL THOMAS GORE BROWNE, Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of Tasmania and its Dependencies.

A PROCLAMATION.

I, COLONEL THOMAS GORE BROWNE, Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief as aforesaid, by virtue of the power conferred on me by an Act of the Parliament of Tasmania (25 Vict No. 3), do hereby revoke the Proclamation under my hand and seal, bearing date at Hobart Town, in Tasmania aforesaid, the third day of October instant, and published in the *Hobart Town Gazette* on the same day: And I do hereby, by virtue of the power aforesaid, prohibit the importation of all cattle into Tasmania except from the following places, and subject to the following restrictions:—

Cattle may be imported from Port Albert if landed at either of the three ports of Hobart Town, Launceston, or Port Arthur, but on condition of undergoing an inspection by an officer appointed by the Governor prior to their being landed.

Any cattle that, on inspection, may appear to be infected with the disease pleuro-pneumonia to be immediately killed and disposed of as the inspecting officer may direct.

Imported cattle once placed in the slaughter yards are not to be removed therefrom until slaughtered.

Cattle imported from the United Kingdom may, on undergoing a satisfactory inspection by such officer as aforesaid, be landed at either of the above ports.

The petitioners state that they are householders resident within the present limits of the municipal district of Sandridge, and that they are desirous of its limits and boundaries being altered.

They represent that the district comprises only about seven hundred and sixty acres, and is considerably less in extent than the other littoral municipalities of Brighton, St. Kilda, Emerald Hill, and Williamstown; and that while these municipalities enjoy the advantages of a large sea frontage, and two of them a good river frontage also, Sandridge has no river frontage, and only sixty-two chains of frontage to the Bay, of which about fifteen and a half chains are taken up by the reserve of the Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway Company and another part by military works.

Lastly, they urge that the restricted area of their district debars them from many advantages, such as the carrying out of needful sanitary measures and other matters of local importance, and subjects them to numerous disabilities, among which is their inability to project a road so as to establish direct communication with the metropolis independently of the control of any other district.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Excellency will be pleased to exercise the powers vested in your Excellency by the clause aforesaid [§ 2 of 18 Victoria No. 15], and

alter and vary the limits of the municipal district of Sandridge so as to include the area described below, that is to say: Commencing at the south-eastern angle of the present boundary line of the municipal district of Sandridge; thence following the said boundary line in a northerly and westerly direction until it strikes the banks of the River Yarra Yarra; thence along the south banks of the said river in a westerly direction as far as to the municipal limits of Footscray; thence following said municipal limits in a southerly and westerly direction until the banks of the River Yarra Yarra are again reached; thence following the banks of said river southerly to its junction with Hobson's Bay; thence following the high-water line of Hobson's Bay in an easterly direction as far as to the commencing point, as indicated upon the plan herewith forwarded."

MUNICIPALITY OF WARRNAMBOOL.

BYE-LAW No. 35.—FOR THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS OF THE WARRNAMBOOL MUNICIPAL COMMON.

WHEREAS by the Act of Parliament 25 Victoria No. 145, section 69, it is provided that the municipal council of any municipal district shall elect annually, in such manner as they may respectively by bye-law prescribe, three persons to be managers of any town or municipal common, and may at any time remove any one or more of such managers and elect others in their stead: Be it therefore ordered and directed by His Excellency the Governor in Council—

1. That the annual election of three persons to be managers of the Warrnambool Municipal Common shall take place in the month of November in each year.

2. That all meetings of the council for the election of managers shall be specially convened for that purpose.

3. That at the annual meeting, or any subsequent meeting for the election of a manager or managers for the said common, any member of the municipal council may nominate, in writing, the names of not more than three persons to be managers thereof, with the consent of the person or persons so nominated; and in case there shall be more persons nominated than vacancies, a ballot shall be taken of the chairman and members present at such meeting of council, and at the conclusion of said ballot, if there shall be an equality of votes, the chairman shall have a casting vote; and the person or persons elected shall be declared to be the managers or a manager, as the case may be, of the Warrnambool Municipal Common, under the provisions of the Act aforesaid.

4. That should any manager or managers resign or be removed by order of the said municipal council of Warrnambool, a meeting for the election of a successor or successors to the manager or managers so resigned or removed, shall be held within one month from the date of such resignation or removal; and the manager or managers then elected shall hold office for the remainder of the term his or their predecessor or predecessors would have been entitled to have held the same unless resigned or removed by the municipal council.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 35, made by the municipal council of Warrnambool, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed that in all cases wherein fees for Farmers' Depasturing Licenses have been received by the Commissioners of Crown Lands for depasturing of stock on Farmers' Commons after the 1st July, 1862, those fees be refunded; and parties paying the same must pay in lieu thereof the fees specified in Regulations framed by Managers of Commons.

BET-BET FARMERS' COMMON No. 3.

RULES FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE BET-BET FARMERS' COMMON No. 3.

NO person or persons will have any right to commonage who does not cultivate at least one acre in eight of his or their purchased land.

2. All parties entitled to commonage shall send their claim and qualifications to the managers within the time advertised by them for receiving the same.

3. Number of cattle belonging to any one person or firm not to exceed fifty head; and in no case will more than one head of cattle to each two acres of cultivation, and one horse to each three acres of cultivation, be allowed, except the common be not sufficiently stocked, in which case special arrangements may be made with the managers, reserving the right to diminish the number at any time when the grass is not sufficient for the number of cattle depasturing thereon.

4. The common fees to be charged at the rate of Three shillings and sixpence per year for every head of cattle over twelve months old, and Five shillings per year for every horse, mare, or gelding over twelve months old, which must be paid, in advance, to the treasurer, who will give the party so paying a receipt for the same, and an order to the herdsman to receive the number of cattle or horses so paid for; any cattle or horses not the progeny of stock on the common will be charged for at six months old. No bulls or entire horses will be allowed on the common, except by special permission.

5. In no case or under any pretence will the herdsman be permitted to receive cattle or horses on the common except by order as in the last preceding rule, a breach of which will subject him to immediate dismissal.

6. All parties putting cattle on the common shall muster all such cattle at a certain place appointed by the managers, of which due notice will be given, for the convenience of the herdsman taking the brands, and to put the common brand on them (pitch); and any person making use of the common brand will be prosecuted. And in no case shall the herd be held responsible for any cattle not intrusted to him in accordance with these rules.

7. The herd shall be answerable to the managers only for the proper fulfilment of his duty; and he shall, upon any cattle straying or otherwise being removed from the common without the owners' consent, acquaint the owners thereof within forty-eight hours. In the event of no notice being given, and neglect

being proved, the herd shall be held liable to such fine as the managers may think fit. In no case shall the fine exceed One pound; the fines, if any, to be deducted from his salary.

8. Any person or persons disturbing cattle unnecessarily on the common shall be dealt with according to law, the herd in every such case to lay an information with the managers; and no cattle shall be removed from the common without the knowledge of the herd.

9. The herdsman shall be required to see that travelling herds and flocks of sheep shall keep strictly within the limits of the boundaries in passing over the common, as provided in the 78th clause in the new Land Act; but any resident of the district desiring to remove his cattle or sheep from one place to another must keep strictly to the road, the same not to be considered as travelling flocks or herds.

10. Any cattle which shall have been duly delivered to the herd by any one entitled to the common, and which may get impounded, the herd shall pay one-half the impounding fees, and the other half to be borne by the owners of the cattle; and also when any cattle, sheep, or horses are impounded by the herdsman, the fees derivable from the same shall be equally divided between the herdsman and the commonage fund.

11. Any person or persons entitled to depasture cattle or horses on the said common, and failing to pay the fees for ten days after they are due, will be liable to have their cattle impounded; the year to commence on 1st October.

12. Any person or persons whom the managers shall have good reason to suspect of not being duly qualified for the use of the common, shall, if the managers deem it expedient, make a declaration before a justice of the peace, that he or they are the *bonâ fide* holder or owner of the land on which the application is founded.

CARDIGAN FARMERS' COMMON.

RULES FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE CARDIGAN FARMERS' COMMON.

ALL farmers holding purchased land within five miles of the common shall be eligible to depasture cattle.

2. The charge for all cattle shall be at the rate of Seven shillings per head for cattle, and Ten shillings per head for horses; to be paid quarterly in advance, quarters commencing 1st November, 1st February, 1st May, 1st August.

3. The managers reserve to themselves the right to add to or diminish the number of cattle at any time depasturing on the common, if grass is not sufficient from fire or other causes.

4. When the number of cattle are allotted to each claimant, the managers will advertise a meeting, where each person will learn the number allotted to him.

5. The managers shall engage a herd by tender.

6. The herdsman will be answerable to the managers only, and in no case will the herd be permitted to receive cattle without an order from one or more of the managers.

7. The brands of all cattle, and description, to be left with the herdsman, in writing, by the owner, when putting them on the common.

8. No bulls or entire horses will be allowed on the common, without permission of the managers.

9. No cattle or horses to be removed from the common until the owners inform the herdsman that it is their intention to do so. The herdsman will attend at his residence on the common on each Wednesday, from Ten to Twelve o'clock, to receive and deliver cattle.

10. Any person neglecting to pay the commonage fees one week after the commencement of each quarter will be proceeded against according to the provisions of the Land Act.

11. The managers will direct the herdsman to brand all cattle depasturing on the common, and any person illegally using the common brand will be prosecuted.

12. No sheep to be allowed on the common.

13. Any person impugning the above rules will be disqualified from grazing cattle on the common, or any person disturbing the cattle on the common will be dealt with according to law; the herdsman in every such case to inform the managers.

14. The managers reserve to themselves the power of altering or amending at any time the above rules, for the better management of the common.

15. Any person or persons, whom the managers shall have just reason to suspect of not being qualified for the use of the common, shall, if the managers think it expedient, make a declaration before a justice of the peace, that he or they are the persons referred to in the application, and holder of the ground referred to in the application.

CLARENDON AND SOUTH BUNINYONG FARMERS' COMMON.

RULES FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE CLARENDON AND SOUTH BUNINYONG FARMERS' COMMON, IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE 73RD SECTION OF "THE LAND ACT, 1862."

ALL landowners and farmers who comply with the regulations, and reside within five miles of this common, their land not being nearer to any other farmers' common than to this, shall be eligible to depasture cattle, &c., on this common.

2. One head of cattle over six months old to be allowed to every three acres of land possessed according to rule 24, and one horse or mare over six months old to every five acres so possessed, and eight sheep to every three acres so possessed, and also two head of cattle extra to be allowed for every three acres of land cultivated, or two horses or mares extra for every five acres of land cultivated, or sixteen sheep extra to every three acres of land cultivated.

3. Commonage fees shall be Six shillings for each head of cattle per annum, Eight shillings for each head of horses per annum; sheep, Seven shillings per score per annum, and shepherded at the owners' expense, and kept within the boundaries defined by the managers, should they see fit to allow sheep.

4. All fees shall be paid quarterly in advance to the treasurer, who will give the person so paying a receipt, and an order to the herdsman to receive the number of cattle, &c., so paid for, and to register the same in his herd register, and unless so paid for, &c., no cattle or horses, &c., shall be allowed on the common, otherwise the owner shall be liable to prosecution for trespass, according to the 129th section of *The Land Act, 1862*, or otherwise the cattle, &c., be impounded.

5. No entire horses over-twelve months, or bulls over six months old, will be allowed to depasture on this common without special permission from the managers.

6. The managers shall have power to make special arrangements for the convenience of any of the commoners requiring temporary pasturage, but only when there is grass to spare, or understocked.

7. The managers reserve the right to diminish or increase the number of cattle, &c., on the common, as circumstances may warrant, according to favorable or unfavorable seasons, that the common may never be overstocked.

8. The managers reserve the right to cause all cattle, horses, or sheep suspected of pleuro-pneumonia, or any other disease which in their opinion may endanger the healthy stock, and the managers shall cause the said diseased cattle, &c., to be removed to a convenient place on the owners' property, or otherwise to be examined, the herdsman to give forty-eight hours' notice to the owner to this effect; and should the managers be convinced of the existence of any such disease, the owners to have back their fees for time to run, and the said cattle, &c., shall be strictly prohibited from depasturing on the common; and after this, should the owner turn them at large on the common, without permission from the managers in writing, he shall be prosecuted according to the 129th section of *The Land Act, 1862*, as a trespasser, and held liable for the consequences of such disease to the other cattle, &c., belonging to the commoners.

9. All persons entitled to commonage shall produce their claims and qualification to the managers within the time advertised for receiving such claims, and ten clear days' notice must be given in the nearest public newspaper with once or twice inserted. On the expiry of the time named, the managers shall proceed to allot to each claimant his proportion, which may be ascertained by applying to the chairman.

10. All parties shall within twenty-one days following after the time advertised to receive claims, pay in full the several sums due by them as fees for depasturing cattle allotted to them, and every successive quarter shall be paid clear in advance, otherwise the owner will be liable to trespass penalties, unless his cattle, &c., are registered according to the 4th rule every quarter.

11. The managers shall engage a herdsman by tender, after advertising twice in fourteen days.

12. The herdsman shall make full provision for the efficient discharge of his duties in detaining and watching the cattle, &c., intrusted to him, and mustering at the request of the managers, and assist owners to cut out what they want at the times and conditions which shall be specified; and to use all vigilance against bush fires, and to find all needful assistance which may be required in extra work, and find good sureties to the extent of £20 against any loss by neglect.

13. The herdsman shall be answerable to the managers only, to whom all complaints must be made of any neglect of duty, or incompetency, or misconduct; and the managers shall be empowered to discharge the herdsman whenever they shall see cause in their opinion for so doing.

14. Should any of the registered cattle, &c., be impounded, the herdsman shall release them within forty-eight hours, on paying two days' maintenance or less, for which the owner shall be responsible; but beyond that time, if in any pound within seventeen miles, the herdsman shall release them at his own cost.

15. The herdsman shall, on any cattle straying or being otherwise removed without the owners' consent, acquaint the owners thereof within forty-eight hours; and in the event of no notice being given within that time, and the cattle, &c., should be lost, the herdsman shall be held responsible for the loss, not exceeding £10, to be deducted from his salary or recovered from his sureties.

16. No cattle shall be removed from the common without the knowledge of the herdsman, and to give a receipt for the same; and under no circumstances will cattle be allowed to be taken from under his charge, except between the hours of Eight and Eleven a.m. and Two and Four p.m., except by special authority of the managers.

17. No person or persons shall be allowed to herd their own cattle, and remove them at will off the said common, except by special authority of the managers, and in no case will the fees be less than the usual rates.

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18. Any person disturbing the cattle, &c., unnecessarily, on the said common, shall be prosecuted; the herdsman in every case to lay an information with the managers, and also against all cattle, &c., trespassing on the common, not having been registered according to rule 4; the owners thereof shall be proceeded against according to the Act, either by the chairman, or the herdsman in his behalf by authority in writing, also the same in all other prosecutions.

19. The managers shall cause to be erected a stockyard for the use of the commoners, and to be limited to the cattle, &c., having a right to pasturage only.

20. The herdsman or his assistant shall be found at their place of abode on the common between the hours of Twelve and Two p.m., unless called away by special order of the managers.

21. All parties putting cattle on the common shall first of all deliver them to the herdsman in the aforesaid stockyard, complying with rule 4; and the herdsman shall register in his book the brands, so far as he can decipher them, with the assistance of the owner, also the color and marks, if any, and provide himself with boiled tar and a marker to put the common brand on, which shall be CB off side and near rump; and the herdsman shall in all cases give a receipt to the owner, and the owner shall sign the corresponding block; and in no case shall the herdsman be held responsible unless these conditions are complied with by the owner, as well as all the other foregoing rules.

22. Any person removing stray horses or cattle must first acquaint the herdsman of his intention of so doing, and the herdsman shall assist to extricate the same. Unless the owners or their servants comply with this, they may be proceeded against in terms of the 129th section of *The Land Act, 1862*, as trespassers.

23. Any person removing cattle cannot substitute others in their stead, but must enter them also in compliance with all the foregoing rules, and pay in advance for one quarter.

24. Any person or persons whom the managers shall have good reason to suspect of not being duly qualified to claim commonage, if the managers deem it expedient, they shall cause the person or persons to make a declaration before a justice of the peace that he or they are the parties represented in their application, and are the *bona fide* owners or holders of the land on which the application is founded.

25. The managers shall have power to alter and amend these foregoing rules, or add thereto, to meet the emergencies that may arise; and also it shall be optional with them in all cases of trespass either to impound the cattle, &c., or prosecute the owners.

26. The managers shall elect a chairman and a treasurer and a secretary, and all business done at their meetings shall be entered in a minute book.

GLENDARUEL, ASCOT, SMEATON, ETC., FARMERS' COMMON.

RULES FOR THE MANAGEMENT AND REGULATIONS OF THE GLENDARUEL, ASCOT, SMEATON, ETC., FARMERS' COMMON.

ALL persons entitled to depasture stock on the Glendaruel, Ascot, Smeaton, &c., Farmers' Common, shall be allowed to run one head of cattle for every two acres of cultivated land, up to twenty acres; one head for every three acres, up to sixty acres; and one head for every four acres, up to one hundred acres or more; and so on up to one hundred head of cattle, which shall be the maximum number any one farmer can depasture; also, one horse for every ten acres of cultivated land; and any man can run one horse in lieu of two head of cattle.

2. Young stock to count at per head after they are nine months old. No person shall be allowed to run bulls or entries on the common over nine months old, without the written permission of the managers.

3. The fees to be charged for depasturing stock on the common shall be Six shillings for every horse, Four shillings for every head of cattle, and One shilling for every sheep, per annum, payable in advance; and all licenses, whenever issued, shall be charged as yearly licenses.

4. All parties when applying for depasturing licenses shall be required to produce a written statement to the managers or secretary of the number of cattle they intend to depasture, with the description and brands. It is necessary that each person shall use one distinguishing brand for entry in the register, to prevent confusion.

5. All persons taking cattle to the common shall be required to deliver them into the charge of the herdsman, together with a duplicate of the written statement of the number, description, and brands of the cattle so delivered. They must also produce their depasturing licenses, which the herdsman will countersign, to prevent either transfer or imposition. The herdsman will give a receipt for the cattle delivered to him, and enter a copy of it in the herd book, and shall afterwards proceed to brand the cattle with the common brand, in pitch or paint; the owners in all cases to render every assistance to the herd during the branding.

6. Any cattle returning home from the common must be returned by the owner, and re-delivered to the herd; and in no case will the herd be responsible for the absolute loss of cattle, but must exert due vigilance for their safety.

7. Any person desirous of removing stock from the common must give notice of such intention to the herd, and if for permanent removal, must sign the herd's delivery book. The herd

to keep a diary of such removals, specifying the number, description, and brands, together with the name and residence of the owner. Dairy cattle and working bullocks to be removed and returned at the risk of the owner.

8. The herdsman shall be required to see that travelling herds and flocks of sheep shall keep strictly within the limits of the boundaries in passing over the common, as provided in the 78th clause of *The Land Act, 1862*, and to report immediately to the managers or secretary the slightest indications of disease in any of the cattle under his charge.

9. If the managers find that parties entitled to depasture will not avail themselves of the common, and that the funds derivable therefrom will not be sufficient to defray the expenses of herdsman, &c., they reserve to themselves the power of increasing the number of stock to be depastured, or setting apart such portions of the common to depasture sheep as they may think fit.

DUTIES OF HERDSMAN.

1. The herdsman must reside on the common, and devote his whole time to the work—the managers to provide a suitable dwelling—and be allowed to run six head of cattle and three horses.

2. The herdsman must keep a register of all cattle intrusted to his care in the herd book; give receipt for all cattle delivered to him, and attend at such places and at such times as may be directed by the managers to receive and brand cattle.

3. The herdsman to provide sufficient assistance to clear the common of strayed cattle at commencement, and afterwards to retain the services of two permanent assistants.

4. The herdsman to produce satisfactory testimonials as to character and ability; must be competent to keep accounts, and to enter into security with the managers to the same amount expected as salary, for the due performance of his duties, and to name his proposed sureties in his tender.

5. The fees derivable from impounding cattle from the common to be set apart as a separate fund, to be applied for releasing any cattle belonging to the common that may be impounded from unenclosed private lands. If this fund be inadequate to defray such impounding expenses, the herdsman must release them at his own cost; but if there be any surplus, it shall be a perquisite to the herd to induce him to keep the common clear, and exercise vigilance to prevent impounding.

6. The expenses of releasing any cattle belonging to the common, that shall be impounded from enclosed lands, shall be borne by the owners.

7. The common brand to be registered in all the surrounding pounds; and it shall be the duty of the herdsman to release any cattle belonging to the common that may get impounded therein; and if such cattle be impounded from enclosed lands, the owner to indemnify the herd to the amount so paid on production of the poundkeeper's receipt; and if the owner refuses to pay, the herd can sue him for the amount before any justice of the peace.

8. The herdsman to muster the cattle when required by the managers, either for cutting young stock, or rebranding, or any other purpose that may be deemed necessary.

9. On the written complaint of twelve licensees, preferring negligence, mismanagement, or connivance to put cattle on the common without payment, against the herdsman or assistants, the managers will investigate such complaints; and if sufficient evidence be produced to substantiate such charges, the managers reserve to themselves the power of dismissing such offender, by giving fourteen days' notice.

10. The herdsman to produce all books and accounts in connection with the common, once a month, or oftener if required, at the office of the managers, to be examined; and to conform to such other regulations as the managers may consider necessary for the proper working of the common.

BYE-LAWS FOR THE MANAGEMENT AND REGULATION OF THE GLENDABUUL, ASCOT, SMEATON, ETC., FARMERS' COMMON.

1. The managers to elect a chairman and appoint a secretary, and to meet on the first Tuesday of every month, or oftener if necessary, at their office, Ascot Hotel, to examine the secretary's books, and compare them with those of the herdsman, and transact such other business as may come before them.

2. All moneys received to be placed in the bank to the credit of the managers conjointly; and all cheques given in payment of accounts must be signed by at least two of the managers.

3. The secretary to attend at the office every Tuesday, between the hours of Ten a.m. and Two p.m., to issue depasturing licenses. Licenses can also be obtained at the private residence of any of the managers. Every applicant must, in all cases, produce a written statement of the number, description, and brands of cattle intended to be depastured.

4. The secretary shall, on each day of meeting, produce his books and accounts to the managers, and shall hand over all the moneys to them, who shall give him a receipt for the same.

5. The situation of herdsman to be advertised for, and to be paid by the managers from the fees derivable from the common. All other expenses connected therewith to be paid out of the fees, the residue to be applied for the construction of crossings on the creeks, and for such other local purposes as the managers may consider for the benefit of the commoners generally, subject to the approval of the Board of Land and Works.

We, the undersigned, concurred in framing the foregoing rules and bye-laws.

LAURISTON FARMERS' COMMON.

THE persons entitled to depasture stock upon this common shall be the occupiers of purchased land within five miles of the said common, who shall hold five acres or more than five acres of cultivated land, or thirty acres or more than thirty acres of grass land, or the holder of a transfer (in a form to be prescribed) from any person so entitled.

2. Holders of miners' rights actually at mining work shall be entitled to depasture one head of cattle for every miner's right.

3. Any person claiming the right to depasture stock must sign a declaration, in a form also to be prescribed, setting forth the number of acres cultivated and legally occupied by him, which declaration must be deposited with the officer appointed by the managers; and holders of miners' rights claiming the right to depasture stock shall present their miners' rights to such officer, &c.

4. Any person who shall have made the declaration aforesaid, or his transferee, may depasture one head of neat cattle for every five acres under cultivation, or one for every thirty acres of grass land, and one horse for every eight acres so cultivated by him, subject to regulations hereinafter provided.

5. In the following scales of fees, class No. 1 shall be held to represent all cows, heifers, steers, bulls or bullocks six months old or upwards; class No. 2 shall include all mares or horses six months old or upwards; and for and in respect of these classes the following fees for depasturing on this common up to the 31st August, 1862.

6. No entire horse shall be allowed to run on this common; and further, no bull shall be allowed to run upon the common except such as may be approved by the managers. Class No. 1, 4s.; class No. 2, 6s.

7. All cattle to be depastured upon this common must be handed over to a person duly appointed by the managers to receive at the common yards, or such other place as may be temporarily named for that purpose, and at such times as shall be publicly notified; and the owners of such cattle, or their agents, shall be required to give such officer a memorandum of the number of cattle, with their brands and descriptions, which shall be entered in a registry book to be kept for such object, which they are desirous to depasture, and shall there and then pay the fees chargeable thereon (if not previously paid) for the current year.

8. Cattle shall not be taken off the common after delivery to the officer without giving due notice thereof, unless as hereinafter provided to the contrary, and after such notice the herdsman shall not be considered in any degree responsible for such cattle until they shall again be handed over to him, excepting in cases where cattle may be frequently required; the owners may, upon application, receive permission to remove and replace such cattle at pleasure, provided that such removal or replacement shall be done in a quiet manner, so as not to interfere with or disturb other stock unnecessarily; but the herdsman shall not be considered to have any supervision over such cattle as regards their appearance or non-appearance upon the common.

9. When any stock shall have become infected with any contagious disease or distemper, the owner or owners thereof must remove them within twenty-four hours from the receipt of a notice to that effect from any of the managers, or by authority of any of them, or in default thereof the right of such person to depasture stock upon this common may be nullified.

10. In the event of the common not being fully stocked, the managers reserve to themselves the power to extend the rights of commoners upon such terms as they may deem expedient.

UPPER PLENTY FARMERS' COMMON.

RULES FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE UPPER PLENTY FARMERS' COMMONS.

THAT a duly qualified person be appointed by the managers as herdsman, at a salary not exceeding £100 per annum, finding, if required, two sureties for faithful and efficient discharge of his duties.

2. That a dwelling house, receiving yards, and paddock, be erected without delay, upon some convenient place on the common, for the occupation and use of the herdsman during the term of his office, which improvements the herdsman must keep at all times in good and thorough repair.

3. That the herdsman, when required, take delivery of all dry cattle, or cattle not in actual milk or used at the time for dairy purposes, and horses, to be depastured upon the common, at the yards established for the purpose, or at any yards that may in the meantime (being in the district) be approved of by the managers, and shall give the owner or person delivering the said stock a receipt for the number delivered, and shall enter the same, with brands and particular marks, name of owner, and date of delivery, in a book to be called a Receiving Register, and shall mark all cattle received with tar or otherwise.

4. That upon receiving twenty-four hours' notice the herdsman shall, when applied to by any owner of stock grazing upon the common, or the application of any person duly authorised on his behalf, deliver at the yards established, or any other convenient place if upon the common and mutually agreed to, the whole or any portion of the stock previously given into the herdsman's charge, and shall take a receipt for the same, and duly enter name of person receiving said cattle, number delivered, date, and brands, in a book to be called the Delivery Book; provided that such delivery be given on Tuesdays in each week only.

5. That the said register book shall be the property of the managers, for the proper keeping and due care of which the herdsman shall be responsible, and which shall be examined and inspected from time to time by the said managers; and shall, if requested, at any time be delivered up to them or any person duly authorised by the managers to receive the said books from the herdsman. The books may also at any time during the day, before Six o'clock p.m. in the months of October, November, December, January, February, and March, or Four o'clock p.m. if any other months during the year, upon the payment of the fee of Two shillings and sixpence, be inspected by any person desiring to do so, and the fee of One shilling from any person being duly authorised to graze stock upon the common; and such fees, as well as all other fees when received by the herdsman on account of the managers, he must be accountable and responsible for, and must duly enter in a book to be called a Register for Common Fees.

6. That the herdsman shall, after notice given by the managers, impound all unregistered stock in the nearest public pound, and shall be entitled to receive the usual trespass fee, excepting, however, any travelling stock; but if travelling stock are found trespassing upon the common after the period of twenty-four hours, the herdsman shall then demand the fees as per schedule annexed.

7. Persons being duly possessed of common rights, wishing to depasture stock thereon, must apply to the managers, stating number, description, and brands, and accompanied with a declaration made before one of Her Majesty's justices of the peace, that the said stock are perfectly free from disease. Upon due payment to the managers, or person authorised by them, of the fees as per schedule annexed, a quarterly permit will be granted to the applicant, authorising him to graze upon the common the number of cattle, not exceeding fifty head, young and old, therein specified, which stock must be delivered to the herdsman at the yards hereinbefore named, or other convenient place, if mutually agreed to; and upon the exhibition of the owner's permit to the herdsman, he will take delivery of the said stock, and give a receipt for the same.

8. No persons will be permitted to remove stock off the common without first applying to the herdsman, and giving him a receipt for all stock delivered as heretofore provided; any person doing so will subject himself to a penalty of not more than £5, or absolute forfeiture of his permit.

9. No stock infected with disease of any kind will be permitted to graze upon the common, and all stock found so infected, if the property of any one holding a permit, must be either destroyed or removed forthwith by the owner; and if not so removed or destroyed, the managers will cause them to be destroyed, and charge any expense thus incurred to the owner thereof, or otherwise prosecute such owners as the law directs; and if any stock grazing upon the common (the owner or owners of which are unknown to either the managers or herdsman) should be found to be diseased, the herdsman shall, after due enquiry for such owner or owners, and if not found, destroy the stock so infected; and if at any subsequent period the owner or owners of such infected stock thus destroyed shall be discovered, he or they shall be liable for any expense thereby incurred, and may be recovered in a summary way at the nearest court of petty sessions, if not paid when demanded.

10. It must be distinctly understood, and all owners of stock are hereby informed, that neither the managers of the said common or the herdsman thereof will be in any way responsible for their safety, and that all stock put thereon to graze will be entirely at the risk of the owner.

All persons, being the owners of sheep and entitled to commonage rights, wishing to depasture sheep upon the Upper Plenty Farmers' Commons, will be permitted to do so subject to the following Rules:—

1. Application must be made to the managers, stating the number, which must not exceed 700 sheep above twelve months old, accompanied by a declaration, duly made before one of Her Majesty's justices of the peace, that the said sheep are and have been for three months previous to the date of application perfectly free from disease.

2. Upon receipt of such application and declaration, and of the fees as per schedule annexed, the managers or other duly authorised person will grant a permit, for the term of twelve months, for grazing the said sheep upon that part of the common allotted for the purpose of depasturing sheep exclusively.

3. The part of the common allotted by the managers for the exclusive use of sheep shall be that portion situated to the north of the parish road bearing east from the Plenty River, and known as Cade's road, and, upon a day named by the managers, the applicants shall, with one or more of them or with some duly authorised person, proceed to the place, and he or they shall then be shown the boundaries of that part of the common allotted for the use of sheep, after which the owner will be allowed to put the number of sheep specified in his permit thereon, the owner of the said sheep in each case to provide a shepherd; and no tent, hut, yard, or fence will be allowed by the managers to be erected on any part of the common by sheepholders.

4. The managers shall, if they think it necessary, cause any sheep running upon the common to be yarded from time to time, for the purpose of having them counted and otherwise examined, or any one duly authorised by the managers may do so; and if at any time a greater number of sheep should be found in the flock or flocks when counted than that named in the permit, the managers shall then, if they think proper, cancel such permit, and, if any of the said sheep should be found diseased, may order their removal forthwith.

5. All sheep allowed to depasture upon the common must be driven thereto and therefrom, along the parish roads leading in the most direct line to and from that part of the common allotted for their use, and the flock or any part thereof must not

at any time be permitted to stray a greater distance, while being driven, than two chains on either side of the road, and if allowed to do so, will be regarded as wilfully trespassing; whereupon a manager, the herdsman, or any holder of a permit may claim the usual trespass fee per head for all or any part of the flock of sheep seen (as near as can be judged) beyond the distance prescribed; and if the owner thereof or driver refuse and neglect to pay the amount claimed, the claimant may summon either the owner or driver of the said sheep, respecting such trespass and sum claimed, before the nearest court of petty sessions, who shall hear and determine the same in a summary way.

6. If at any time the said sheep should be permitted wilfully to cross the boundaries of the common after having been duly pointed out as aforesaid, the owners will thereby be subject to a penalty of not more than £2 for the first offence, and for the next or any subsequent offence a penalty not exceeding £5; and any person whomsoever guilty of wilfully violating either or any of the foregoing rules for the general management of the Upper Plenty Farmers' Commons aforesaid, will be subject to the like penalties, recoverable in the usual way in the nearest court of petty sessions.

RULES TO BE OBSERVED BY THE OWNERS OF MILKING COWS.

1. Any person possessing common rights wishing to graze milking cattle, used at the time for dairy purposes, upon the common, may do so upon making application to the managers, stating the number and brands, and that such cattle are free from disease, and upon payment of the fee as per schedule; a separate permit will, however, be issued by the managers for milking cows, which must when obtained, or at any time thereafter when required, be exhibited to the herdsman, who shall enter the number, brands, name of owner, and date of permit, in a separate part of the receiving register under the head of milking cows, and shall from time to time examine the different lots of cattle used for dairy purposes and see that no greater number than that named in each owner's permit is allowed to graze upon the common, and if at any time a greater number be found grazing on the common than that named in the permit, a double fee will be charged for the number in excess, or the permit of the owner thereof shall be cancelled by the managers.

2. No permit will be issued by the managers for a less number than five head of milking, and if at any time the owner thereof should wish to increase that number during the term of his permit, he can do so by giving due notice to the managers, and payment of the fee or fees for the additional number, when the increased number will be inserted in the permit, of which the owner of the said milking cows must, without delay, duly acquaint the herdsman, whereupon the herdsman shall enter the additional number, date, and brands in the register as aforesaid.

3. All permits will be dated from the 1st day of November, 1862, for the first quarter; the 1st day of February, 1863, for the second quarter; the 1st day of May, 1863, for the third quarter; and the 1st day of August, 1863, for the fourth quarter throughout the year; and no abatement will be made by the managers in the charges to any applicant for a permit making application in any intervening space of time between the dates herein named.

4. No bulls or entire horses will be permitted by the managers to run upon the Upper Plenty Farmers' Commons, unless such of either description of animal as may be approved of by them, and all persons having either bulls or entire horses now depasturing thereon must remove them without delay.

The foregoing Rules, received from the Managers of the Upper Plenty Farmers' Common, are published in accordance with the 73rd clause of "The Land Act, 1862."

DOWLING FOREST PUBLIC CEMETERY.

RULES and Regulations of the Dowling Forest General Cemetery.

1. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.
2. By the 8th section of the Act, any person making a vault, or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees, under these rules, and upon the payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons and his representatives for ever.
3. Applications for such permission to be made to the office of the trustees. A certificate of permission, in the form set out in the schedule, will be granted to the person applying for such permission on payment of the charges in the schedule.
4. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on a certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence, proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relatives and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.
5. Orders for interment to be given at the office of the trustees; such notice to be given between the hours Ten a.m. and Three p.m. on the previous day.
6. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but parties wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of the surveyor; and in case interment is made in any private grave or vault, the consent in writing of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.
7. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased, must be stated at the time of giving the order.
8. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.
9. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals will be from Ten a.m. to Six p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from Ten a.m. to Four p.m. in the other four months.
10. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones, to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.
11. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave, to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, slate, or iron.
12. A plan of every monument and tombstone proposed to be erected and placed shall be exhibited to the said trustees before permission for the erection thereof is given; and the said trustees shall be at liberty to withhold such permission, and prevent the erection of any monument or tombstone which shall appear to them inappropriate or unbecoming; and shall determine and fix the position of any monument or tombstone which may be proposed to be erected, according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner.
13. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.
14. The ground will be open daily to the public, from sunrise to sunset.
15. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, is kept at the office, and may be inspected at the charge set out in the schedule; and registers of all grants are kept by the secretary.
16. Any person who shall wantonly and wilfully destroy, or do or cause to be done, any damage to any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree, or plant in the said cemetery, will be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, being convicted thereof, will be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds, or, at the discretion of the justices, to imprisonment for any period not exceeding three months; and any person who shall do, or cause to be done, any injury to any such monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, shrubbery, tree, or plant, whether the same shall have been done wilfully or wantonly or otherwise howsoever, shall be liable to pay damage and compensation, which shall be recoverable in any court of competent jurisdiction in the colony, by the trustees of the said cemetery, or any person injured by such damage.
17. The trustees reserve to themselves the right to make any alterations from time to time in these regulations and charges.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The contract for fencing the fish market reserve mentioned in the last report was cancelled on 5th April ultimo.

The following works have been completed:—

Laying and fixing hardwood kerbing in various streets.

Forming, metalling, kerbing, and claying Liardet street from Bay street to Railway place.

Forming and kerbing footpaths and forming roadway and channel in Stokes street, from Beech street to Liardet street.

Verandah at the end of the Government Shipping Office for the use of boatmen.

Cutting open drain in Inglis street.

Erection of fourteen lamp-posts and lamps to be lighted with kerosene oil.

Sundry other minor and useful works have been completed.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been assented to and gazetted.

No. 13. For the suppression of nuisances caused by throwing deleterious matters into the Saltwater Lagoon.

No. 14. For the maintenance and management of a free public library at Sandridge.

No. 15. For prohibiting damage to the public footpaths and water-courses, and for regulating the formation of crossings over footpaths and water-courses.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The establishment of a sailors' home at Sandridge has occupied the attention of the council, and application was made to the Government for a site for that purpose; but the claims of Sandridge in this matter have not been favorably received. The question of the proposed road between Sandridge and St. Kilda is still in abeyance. The construction of a bridge over the Yarra Yarra, opposite the end of Spencer street, has been brought before the Government. A promise was made that an estimate of the cost of construction, together with plans and specifications, should be prepared, and that an amount should be placed on the Parliamentary Estimates for 1863, for the consideration of the Legislature. The further extension of the Yan Yean water service to this district has been delayed by the Sewerage and Water Department, in consequence of the want of the necessary pipes. Negotiations have taken place between this council and that of Emerald Hill, relative to the Sandridge road, with a view to the said road being retained under the control of the two councils, and it was proposed to form a joint committee for the collection and distribution of a toll to be levied thereon; but as no understanding was arrived at that could be considered satisfactory to both parties, the result was, that the road was taken possession of by the Government, and a toll established thereon.

Allotments 10 and 11 of section 20, fronting Bay street, have been purchased by the council, in order to secure a reserve for drainage purposes. The necessity for further regulations relative to the town jetty was brought before the Hon. the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, who promised to incorporate most of the suggestions of the council in certain new harbor regulations that were being framed. The United Insurance Company's Fire Brigade Committee have promised a subsidy of

£00 per annum in aid of fire expenses in the district. The question of establishing a post office savings' bank at Sandridge, similar to the system in operation in England, has been brought under the notice of the hon. member for the district, and he promised to bring the matter before the Executive Council. A petition from the inhabitants of Fisherman's Bend, praying for annexation to Sandridge, was received by the council, and presented to the Government, but, in consequence of the number of signatures not being sufficient, the petition was not entertained. Certain alterations in the system of levels previously adopted have been made in that portion of the district between Bridge street and Inglis street.

ANNUAL ELECTION.

At the annual election, on 2nd August, 1863, Messrs. John Murphy, Charles Muirhead Inglis, and John Pickles, were duly elected as members of the council, to serve in the stead of John Murphy, Thomas Swallow, and John Pickles, who retired by rotation.

THE MELBOURNE AND HOBSON'S BAY RAILWAY COMPANY'S EXTENSION OF POWERS BILL.
