MONUMENT TO BURKE AND WILLS.

Competitors must satisfy the Board appointed to make the selection that they are able to carry out the design complete for the sum of £4000.

WATER SUPPLY TO CASTLEMAINE AND SANDHURST.

THE Board of Land and Works being desirous of ascertaining the practicability of obtaining a supply of water from the Coliban River for the supply of the towns of Castlemaine and Sandhurst for domestic uses and mining operations, are prepared to receive from engineers, surveyors, and others, preliminary designs and plans for effecting that object, for the two most eligible of which a premium of £250 and £150 respectively will be awarded.

The plan (on a scale of not less than two miles to one inch) to show the source of supply, the proposed line and levels of pipe tracks or races, the localities to which the water would be conveyed; and the report to embody the uses to which it could

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be applied, the estimated cost of the proposed works, and the probable amount of revenue to be derived from the sale of water.

The plan and reports to be accompanied by a tender for executing the surveys and levels, and preparing the necessary plans and sections, and the working drawings and specifications, with a detailed estimate of the cost of the works, but not to include the cost of superintendence.

If any tender is accepted, then the premiums paid for the preliminary design is to be considered as a payment on account of it, but the board does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender; and, before the payment of any premium for a preliminary design, &c., it is to be understood that the person to whom it is awarded shall enter into a bond, with approved sureties, for the carrying out of his tender for the surveys.

Preliminary designs with reports, and the tenders, in separate envelopes, but bearing the same motto, must be addressed to the Inspector General of Public Works, on or before the 30th day of November, 1862.

Sealed envelopes, containing the name and address of each competitor, and with the motto on his designs, &c., legibly written on the outside of the envelope, to accompany the plans and tender.

THE CROWLANDS DISTRICT ALTERED.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the nineteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act to provide for the Election of Members to serve in the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Victoria respectively*, I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation abolish Redbank as the place of nomination for the electoral district of Crowlands, also Pleasant Creek as the polling place for the Pleasant Creek division, and Redbank and Navarre Rush as polling places for the Navarre division thereof; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby appoint that Stawell shall be the place for the nomination of candidates to serve in the Legislative Assembly of Victoria for the said district, and that Stawell aforesaid shall be the polling place for the said Pleasant Creek division, and that Landsborough shall be an additional polling place for the Malakhoof division of the said district of Crowlands.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the second day of December, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, the boundaries of "The Avoca Road District" were defined as therein mentioned: And whereas it is deemed necessary and advisable that the boundaries of the said district should be prospectively altered: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare, that, from and after the third day of March in the year next ensuing, the boundaries of the said Avoca Road District shall be the boundaries hereinafter specified, that is to say:

Commencing at a point being the north-east angle of the Stawell Road District (township of Navarre); thence easterly by the south boundary of the St. Arnaud Road District to its south-east angle (Natte Yallock); thence easterly by the south boundary of the Dunolly Mining Division to a point in the west boundary of the parish of Wareek, being six miles and a half, more or less, from the south-east angle of Natte Yallock; thence south by the west boundary of the parish of Wareek and by part of the west boundary of the parish of Bung Bong to the north-west angle of the town reserve in said parish; thence east by the north boundary of said town reserve to a point in the centre of the McNeil's Creek; being the north-west angle of the Amherst and Clunes Road District; thence by the west boundary of said road district to its intersecting point with the Lexton Road District; thence westerly by the north boundary of said road district and that of Ararat to its intersection of the east boundary of the Stawell Road District; thence northerly by said boundary to the commencing point; excluding the municipalities of Avoca and Mobbambel.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the fourteenth day of January, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, the boundaries of "The Bet-bet Road District" were defined as therein mentioned: And whereas it is expedient to alter the said district in manner hereinafter mentioned: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the boundaries specified in the said Proclamation, and do hereby proclaim and declare that the said Bet-bet Road District shall comprise the area hereinafter described, that is to say:

Commencing at a point in the centre of the Loddon River at its junction with the Bet-bet or McNeil's Creek; thence south-westerly by the centre of said creek to a point due east of the northern boundary of the town reserve, parish of Wareek; thence due west to and along said boundary to the north-west angle of the town reserve; thence in a direct line south-westerly to the north-west angle of the parish of Bung Bong; thence northerly by the western boundary of the parish of Wareek to a point in the southern boundary of the Dunolly Mining Division, being six miles and a half, more or less, from the south-east angle of Natte Yallock; thence westerly by the southern boundary of said mining division to the south-east angle of Natte Yallock; thence northerly by the centre of the Avoca River to a point due west of Mount Bealiba, being the north-west angle of the Dunolly Mining Division; thence easterly by the northern boundary of said mining division to a point in the centre of the Loddon River; thence southerly by the centre of said river to the commencing point; excepting the municipality of Dunolly.

PROCLAMATION,

**ADMITTING CATTLE INTO THE PROVINCE OF OTAGO FROM
PORT ALBERT, IN GIPPS LAND.**

By His Honor JOHN LARKINS CHEESE RICHARDSON, Esquire,
Superintendent of the said Province.

WHEREAS by section 9 of the *Diseased Cattle Act*, 1861, passed by the General Assembly of New Zealand, it is enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to the Governor that any infectious or contagious disease has broken out in any district out of the colony, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by Order in Council, to declare that such district is infected within the meaning of the Act, and from time to time to make such regulations as to him shall seem fit for prohibiting the importation of cattle into the colony from such district, and the landing or driving of such cattle, and for destroying cattle imported, landed, or driven, contrary to such regulations: And it is by the same Act also enacted, that the Governor in Council may, by warrant under his hand, from time to time delegate to the Superintendent of any Province within the colony, all or any of the powers vested in the Governor or Governor in Council by the said Act: And whereas the Governor hath, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, delegated to me, John Larkins Cheese Richardson, Esquire, so long as I shall hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Otago, the several powers vested in the Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act, subject to being rescinded as in the said Act is provided, and subject to certain regulations issued by the Governor in Council on the first day of October, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and to any other regulations to be from time to time duly made: And whereas, in pursuance and exercise of the powers so vested in me, a Proclamation was by me issued, under the public seal of the said Province, upon the fifth day of June last, declaring that after the date thereof all districts, places, and ports wheresoever out of the main land of the North and Middle Islands of New Zealand, shall be deemed to be infected districts within the meaning and for the purposes of the abovementioned Act: And whereas it is expedient so far to rescind the said Proclamation as to exempt Port Albert, in Gipps Land, from the operation thereof: Now therefore I, the said John Larkins Cheese Richardson, in pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in me in this behalf, do hereby rescind the aforesaid Proclamation to the effect above mentioned, and do hereby proclaim and declare that after the date hereof all districts, places, and ports wheresoever out of the main land of the North and Middle Islands of New Zealand, except Port Albert, in Gipps Land, shall be deemed to be infected districts, within the meaning and for the purposes of the aforesaid Act, and that no cattle after the date hereof, until further notice, shall be imported into the Province of Otago from such districts. And I do further proclaim and declare that the foregoing exemption of Port Albert, in Gipps Land, shall be subject to the following regulations, that is to say, that a certificate under the hand of the Collector of Customs at Port Albert, or other satisfactory evidence, shall be produced by the master of any ship by which any cattle are imported into the Province of Otago from Port Albert, in Gipps Land, that such cattle had not been brought coastwise to Port Albert; that at the time of the shipment thereof such cattle were free from any infectious or contagious disease; that such ship has not touched at any intermediate port out of New Zealand on her voyage to this province; that any such disease amongst cattle was at the departure of such ship from Port Albert, in Gipps Land, there unknown; and that on any such cattle arriving at any port of this Province of Otago, the Government Inspector of cattle shall be satisfied that they are free from disease, otherwise they shall not be permitted to be landed. Provided, however, that the Superintendent of the Province may allow any cattle to be landed from vessels from the islands of Great Britain and Ireland, subject to such conditions and restrictions as he may deem expedient, and the circumstances of any case may require.

The names of the tenderers and their proposed sureties, together with their addresses, must be stated at full length.

All tenders must be endorsed, "Tender for Medicines, &c.," and be deposited in the Tender Box at the Government Stores, King street; or, if sent by post, they must be addressed to the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

CONDITIONS.

1. All articles must be of the best quality of their several kinds.

2. All orders for supplies under this contract must emanate from the Chief Medical Officer, or from the Government Storekeeper, and the articles must be delivered at the office of the Chief Medical Officer, or at the Government Stores, as the case may be.

7. If from any cause injury would accrue to the public service by waiting for a board of survey, the Chief Medical Officer, or the Government Storekeeper, as the case may be, will have the power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead, failing which, it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense (if any) will be charged as in clause 6.

8. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivery or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

9. It will be competent for the Government Storekeeper on behalf of the Government, or the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract by giving a notice in writing of three full calendar months; it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made.

ELECTIONS.

On 30th July, 1862, Mr. James Ingram was elected without opposition to the seat in the council vacant by the resignation of Councillor Henry Harrill Hunt.

On 19th August, 1862, Mr. Wm. T. Soulbly was elected by show of hands at the nomination to the seat vacant by the non-attendance of Councillor James Shackell, no poll being legally demanded by or on behalf of the other candidate.

On 20th August, 1862, Mr. Henry Littlewood was elected, after a contest, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Councillor E. H. Dunn.

And at the annual election on 25th September, 1862, Councillor George Briscoe Kerferd, J.P., was re-elected at the head of the poll by 143 votes; and Messrs. John Duncan Fisher by 136 votes, and Charles Dyring by 127 votes, were elected members of council in the room of councillors G. B. Kerferd, John Yoxall, and James Ingram, who retired by rotation.

On 26th September, 1862, Alexander Rodgers, Esq., J.P., was unanimously re-elected chairman of council; and on the same day Councillor Soulbly was elected chairman of committees, and Councillor G. B. Kerferd honorary municipal treasurer.

WATER SUPPLY.

The Beechworth Water Works, referred to in former reports, will now be completed in the course of two or three weeks to their present contemplated extent, when the dam of their reservoir will have reached the height of 85 feet, giving a storage area of about 46 acres. The cost of the entire undertaking to date will have been about £12,000, some £1500 of which may be attributed to the opposition which the council have throughout met with from certain interested parties:

It should be mentioned that those members of the Royal Mining Commission who lately visited this district expressed their unqualified approval of these waterworks as carried out, and their great gratification at the success which has thus far attended the efforts of the corporation to initiate and execute so generally beneficial a project as this cannot fail to prove, some twenty acres of the reservoir area being already covered with water, whilst the reservoirs, built by the Government in other parts of the colony are still empty.

PUBLIC WORKS.

Deeming the foregoing as a work of primary importance to the entire community, the corporation have limited their other expenditure to the repairs and maintenance of existing roads and streets, without entering upon fresh works, with the exception of the promised clearing and fencing of the new approach to the public recreation reserve of the municipality, which is now completed, and the approach itself gazetted, under the name of Victoria road.

FINANCE.

The usual half-yearly balance sheet is hereto appended, from which it will be seen that, with the exception of the overdraft incurred on account of the Beechworth Waterworks, the expenditure of this corporation during this year (as in previous years) has been kept within their income.

GENERAL.

The corporation, at the request of the Municipal and Charitable Institutions Commission of the Government, are furnishing as complete and detailed a report as possible upon the general and financial position of this municipality from its first establishment to this date, together with suggestions on various points upon which amendments in the municipal laws seem to be required.
