## WATER SUPPLY TO CASTLEMAINE AND SANDHURST.

**T**HE Board of Land and Works being desirous of ascertaining the practicability of obtaining a supply of water from the Coliban River for the supply of the towns of Castlemaine and Sandhurst for domestic uses and mining operations, are prepared to receive from engineers, surveyors, and others, preliminary designs and plans for effecting that object, for the two most eligible of which a premium of £250 and £150 respectively will be awarded.

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The plan (on a scale of not less than two miles to one inch) to show the source of supply, the proposed line and levels of pipe tracks or races, the localities to which the water would be conveyed; and the report to embody the uses to which it could be applied, the estimated cost of the proposed works, and the probable amount of revenue to be derived from the sale of water.

The plan and reports to be accompanied by a tender for executing the surveys and levels, and preparing the necessary plans and sections, and the working drawings and specifications, with a detailed estimate of the cost of the works, but not to include the cost of superintendence.

If any tender is accepted, then the premiums paid for the preliminary design is to be considered as a payment on account of it, but the board does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender; and, before the payment of any premium for a preliminary design, &c., it is to be understood that the person to whom it is awarded shall enter into a bond, with approved sureties, for the carrying out of his tender for the surveys.

Preliminary designs with reports, and the tenders, in separate envelopes, but bearing the same motto, must be addressed to the Inspector General of Public Works, on or before the 30th day of November, 1862.

Sealed envelopes, containing the name and address of each competitor, and with the motto on his designs, &c., legibly written on the outside of the envelope, to accompany the plans and tender.

## DISTRICTS OF INSPECTORS OF SHEEP.

THE several districts into which the colony of Victoria has been divided, and for which inspectors of sheep have been appointed, in accordance with the Act No. 143, intitled, *An Act to repeal the Act intitled An Act for preventing the extension of the Disease called Scab in Sheep, and to substitute other provisions in lieu thereof*, are hereinafter described for general information, that is to say:—

THE BENALLA SCAB DISTRICT.—Commencing at the junction of the Goulburn and Murray Rivers; thence by the Murray River, bearing easterly to Cowrang Creek; thence by Cowrang Creek, a range, Livingstone Creek, and a line, together bearing southerly, to the Dividing Range (and being the eastern boundary of the Beechworth Commissioner's district); thence, by the Dividing Range, bearing westerly to the south-east corner of the county of Anglesey; and thence by the east boundary of that county and the Goulburn River, together bearing northerly to the point of commencement.

THE GEELONG SCAB DISTRICT.—Commencing at the south-west corner of the county of Villiers; thence by the west boundary of that county and the west boundary of the county of Ripon, together bearing northerly; thence by the north boundary of the county of Ripon and part of the north boundaries of the counties of Grenville and Grant, together bearing easterly to the north-east angle of the last-named county; thence by the east boundary of that county, bearing southerly to Point Lonsdale; and thence by the sea-coast, bearing westerly to the point of commencement.

THE GIPPS LAND SCAB DISTRICT.—Commencing at the south-east angle of the county of Mornington; thence by the east boundaries of that county and county of Evelyn, together bearing northerly to the Dividing Range; thence by that range bearing easterly to the south-east corner of the Beechworth Commissioner's district; thence by the east boundary of that district (being a line passing along Livingstone Creek, a range, and Cowrang Creek to its junction to the Murray River), bearing northerly to the Murray River; thence by the Murray, and the north-east boundary of the colony of Victoria, bearing south-easterly to Cape Howe; and thence by the sea-coast, bearing westerly to the point of commencement.

THE MELBOURNE SCAB DISTRICT.—Commencing at the south-west corner of the county of Bourke; thence by the west boundary of that county, bearing northerly to the north-east corner of the county of Grant; thence by part of the south boundary of the county of Talbot and portion of the Dividing Range, together bearing westerly to the source of the Avoca River; thence by that river bearing northerly to Lake Bacl-bael; thence by a line bearing north magnetic to the junction of the Marraboor and Loddon Rivers; thence by the Marraboor River, bearing northerly to its junction with the Murray River; thence by the Murray River, bearing south-easterly to its junction with the Goulburn River; thence by the Goulburn River, bearing southerly and easterly to the north-east corner of the county of Anglesey; thence by the east boundary of that county, and the east boundaries of the counties of Evelyn and Mornington, together bearing southerly to the sea-coast; and thence,

by the sea-coast, bearing westerly, and the shore of Port Phillip Bay, bearing northerly and westerly, to the point of commencement.

**THE PORTLAND SCAB DISTRICT.**—Commencing at the south-west corner of the colony of Victoria; thence by the west boundary of that colony, bearing north to the north-west corner of the county of Pollett; thence easterly by the north boundaries of the counties of Pollett and Dundas; thence by part of the west boundary of the county of Ripon and the west boundary of the county of Villiers, together bearing southerly to the sea-coast; and thence by the sea-coast, bearing westerly to the point of commencement.

**THE EAST WIMMERA SCAB DISTRICT.**—Commencing at the north-west angle of the colony of Victoria; thence by the Murray River, bearing south-easterly to its upper junction with the Marraboor River; thence by that river bearing south-westerly to its junction with the Loddon River; thence by a line bearing magnetic south to Lake Bacl-bael; thence southerly to the Avoca River; thence by that river bearing southerly to the Dividing Range; thence westerly by that range to the source of the Wimmera River; thence by that river northerly to its intersection with a magnetic east and west line passing two miles south of Lake Alcautya; thence by that line bearing west magnetic to the west boundary of the colony of Victoria; and thence by that boundary bearing north to the point of commencement.

**THE WEST WIMMERA SCAB DISTRICT.**—Commencing at the source of the Wimmera River; thence by that river bearing northerly to its intersection with a magnetic east and west line passing two miles south of Lake Alcautya; thence by that line bearing west magnetic to the west boundary of the colony of Victoria; thence by that boundary bearing south to the north-west corner of the county of Pollett; and thence easterly by the north boundaries of the counties of Pollett and Dundas, and part of the north boundary of the county of Ripon, together bearing easterly to the point of commencement.

**NOTICE TO OWNERS OF SHEEP.**

THE attention of all owners of sheep throughout the colony is specially directed to the following clauses of the Act No. 143, intituled, *An Act to repeal the Act intituled An Act for preventing the extension of the Disease called Scab in Sheep, and to substitute other provisions in lieu thereof*, which came into operation from and after the 1st instant, viz.:

"§ 2. *Penalty on owners of scabby sheep.*—Every person who not being licensed under this Act shall own any sheep infected with the disease called scab shall be liable to pay the sum of three shillings in respect of every sheep so infected.

"§ 3. *License to keep scabby sheep.*—Any inspector on being applied to by any owner of sheep shall issue to such owner upon payment of a fee of threepence for every sheep so infected a license to keep the said sheep for a period of six months for the purpose of cleansing the same and any inspector may from time to time renew such license for a further period of four calendar months upon payment of the sum of sixpence for every sheep so infected for the first renewal of ninepence for the second renewal and of an additional threepence beyond such sum of ninepence for every additional renewal of such license. Provided that every such license shall be void if during the continuance thereof the person to whom the same is granted shall be convicted under this Act.

"§ 4. *Owners of sheep to deliver correct account of infected sheep.*—Every person owning sheep or having the care or management of sheep within Victoria shall whenever thereunto required by a notice in writing to be personally delivered to such owner or manager aforesaid or left at his usual or last known place of abode in the said colony deliver to the inspector a correct account of all sheep in his possession or custody infected with scab with the marks and brands of such sheep and the description of their age and sex as near as may be and of the places where such sheep may be depasturing or kept. And if any such owner or other person shall not within fourteen days after the delivery or leaving of such notice deliver such account he shall forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding twenty pounds."

The number of deaths in September amounted to 225, and the daily average to 7.5. This shows an increasing mortality as compared with the previous month, in which the rate per diem was 6.13. The reports for September in the three previous years show the deaths to have numbered 234 in 1861, 259 in 1860, and 191 in 1859; the mean for the four years thus being 227, or two deaths in excess of the number which occurred in the month under notice.

The mean temperature of the month was 54.9°, against 57.2° for September, 1861, against 53.8° for the same month in 1860, and against 52.5° for the same month in 1859. The highest point (75.3°) reached by the thermometer was at 3 p.m. on the 27th, and the lowest (38.2°) was at 6 a.m. on the 26th; the range for the month thus being 37.1°. The greatest range occurred on the 27th, viz., 27.6°, from a maximum of 75.3° to a minimum of 47.7°; and the least (9.0°) on the 3rd, from a maximum of 65.1° to a minimum of 56.1°. The extremes of atmospheric pressure (30.179 in. and 29.179 in.) were respectively at midnight on the 1st, and at 1 o'clock p.m. on the 21st; the range for the month thus being exactly one inch. The mean pressure was 29.786 in., against 29.972 in. for September, 1861, against 29.935 in. for September, 1860, and against 29.938 in. for September, 1859.

Of the 225 deaths which took place during the month, 112 were of males, and 113 of females, the excess thus being against the latter, which is a very unusual circumstance; 97, or about 43 per cent., were of children under five, and 128, or about 57 per cent., of persons beyond that age; thus, as has been remarked for the last few months, the mortality among the older division is still greater than that among the younger.

Twelve deaths occurred respectively on the 2nd and 17th, 11 on the 7th and 24th, and 10 on the 12th and 27th. These were the highest numbers recorded for any single days during the month. Only 2 deaths were returned for the 11th.

The deaths of 2 octogenarians were noted during the month, viz., a male aged eighty, and a female aged eighty-three, both from old age.

The large number of 21 deaths from violent or external causes appears in the returns for the month. The following are the particulars:—By drowning 7 persons met their deaths, viz., in the Yarra 2 males, aged respectively twenty-four and thirty-four, the

former by his own act; in Hobson's Bay, a sailor aged twenty-one; in the Saltwater River, a male, whose age and occupation were unspecified; at East Collingwood, another male of age and occupation also unknown; in the same place, a female aged thirty-two; and at Sandridge, a male child a year and a half old. The following persons died in consequence of injuries to limbs:—A station master, aged thirty-five; a farmer, also aged thirty-five; and a woman, aged sixty-six years. Two infants, a male and female, were suffocated, the one by being overlain. A youth, aged sixteen, described as a laborer, met his death at Essendon in consequence of injuries the nature of which was not stated. A groom, fifty-nine years of age, was killed by a horse; a male child, aged five, by a fall; a boy, at the same age, was crushed to death by the wheel of a dray; and another male child, aged one year and thirty-nine weeks, was accidentally killed. A cabman, aged forty-five, committed suicide by taking opium. A female, aged thirty-five, cut her throat. A male child, a year and a half old, died in consequence of swallowing caustic; and a woman, aged thirty-eight, died from the effects of severe burns.

In the public institutions 58 deaths, or nearly 26 per cent. of the entire number, took place, and were thus distributed:—Melbourne Hospital, 38; Immigrants' Home, 5; Benevolent Asylum, 4; Lying-in Hospital, 4; Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 5; Immigrants' Hospital, 2.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF BEECHWORTH.

BYE-LAW No. 37. — FOR REGULATING ELECTIONS OF MANAGERS FOR THE BEECHWORTH MUNICIPAL COMMON.

WHEREAS by the 25th Victoria, No. 145, section 65, the unsold lands in or within five miles of any municipal district may be proclaimed a municipal common: And whereas by 69th clause of said Act the council of any such municipal district is empowered to elect annually three managers for such common, and at any time to remove same, or any or either of them, and to enact bye-laws for the regulation of such elections: And whereas by the 71st and 72nd sections of said Act the amalgamation of any two or more neighboring commons and of the boards of management of same are provided for: Be it and it is hereby enacted by the municipal council of Beechworth:—

1. That they shall, as hereinafter prescribed, elect annually three persons to be the managers of the Beechworth municipal common.
2. That the first election by said council of such managers shall take place at the next general meeting of council after the gazetting of this bye-law, and that in future years such election of managers shall take place at the next general meeting of council after the election of chairman of council: provided, nevertheless, that it shall be competent for the council from time to time to adjourn such election, or any election referred to in clause 5 of this bye-law, upon motion to that effect duly carried; and also that any such election shall stand adjourned in the event of a legal quorum not being present at the prescribed meeting; no such adjournment, however, being for a longer period than to the next general meeting of council.
3. That at such elections the voting shall be by each councillor signing his own voting paper or card, after first inserting the name or names of the person or persons whom he supports; no other votes can be received; and such cards or papers shall, after such election, be preserved by the town clerk as records; and in the event of an equality of votes, the chairman, in addition to his own, shall have a casting vote.
4. That in the event of the removal from office by said council, or of the death or resignation of such managers, or any or either of them, the vacancy or vacancies so caused shall be filled, in same manner as by preceding clause No. 4 prescribed, at the next general meeting of council but one after the existence of such vacancies or vacancy, notice of such vacancy or vacancies being given to the council by the chairman at the next general meeting immediately following such removal, death, or resignation; and the persons or person so elected shall hold office for the remainder of the term their or his predecessors or predecessor would have been entitled to have held the same, unless removed by the council.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 37, made by the municipal council of Beechworth, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF FOOTSCRAY.

BYE-LAW No. 15.—TO ENABLE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF FOOTSCRAY TO ELECT MANAGERS OF THE FOOTSCRAY MUNICIPAL COMMON, TO FIX THE TIME AND MANNER OF THEIR ELECTION, AND TO REMOVE SUCH MANAGERS AND ELECT OTHERS IN THEIR STEAD.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15; intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, power is given to the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the conducting of elections: And whereas by an Act of His Excellency the Governor and Parliament of Victoria, intitled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to the sale and occupation of Crown Lands*, 25 Victoria No. 145, section 69, it is declared that the municipal council of any municipal district within or in the vicinity of which any town or municipal common is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-laws prescribe, three persons to be managers of such town or municipal common, and may at any time remove any one or more of such managers, and elect others in their stead: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Footscray, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the election of managers of the municipal common shall be held and conducted at the time and in the manner following, viz.:—

1. That the election for the appointment of managers of the Footscray municipal common shall be held annually at the first regular meeting of the council in each municipal year, viz., in July; and that the election of such managers for the unexpired portion of the current municipal year shall be held at the first regular meeting of the council after the publication in the *Government Gazette* of this bye-law.
2. That at such meeting or at any subsequent meeting of the council appointed for such purpose, any member of the council may propose the names of the same number of persons to be managers of such common as there vacancies to be filled up; and in the event of there being more persons proposed than there are vacancies, the voting shall be on cards provided for the purpose, on which the voter shall write the name or names of the candidate or candidates he supports, and sign his own: the result of such election shall be entered in the minutes of the day, and the voting cards shall be kept in the town clerk's office for twelve months, as a record.
3. That when any one or more vacancies occur through the death, resignation, or removal by the council of any manager or

managers during his or their term of office, the council shall, as speedily as possible, elect in the same manner a person or persons to fill such vacancy or vacancies as is hereinbefore mentioned.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF HEATHCOTE.

**BYE-LAW No. 9.—To EMPOWER THE COUNCIL TO EXECUTE CERTAIN WORKS BY FUNDS RAISED BY MORTGAGE.**

**WHEREAS** by an Act of Council 13 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted that any municipal council shall have power to borrow by way of mortgage or otherwise, on the credit of lands, funds, or income to which it may be entitled, any sum or sums of money that may be required for the purpose of making, carrying on, or completing any permanent improvements that may directly benefit the municipal district for which such council has been elected, or for the purpose of any railway shares or other stock that may be necessary or desirable for any such improvements, or which may directly benefit such district, but in no case shall the sum so borrowed exceed the whole estimated revenue of such municipal corporation for the period of three years; provided that no money shall be borrowed by any such municipal council until the express sanction of the Governor and Executive Council of the said colony has been obtained, not only to the amount to be borrowed, but also to the works, improvements, railway shares or other stock, upon which it is proposed to expend the same sum or sums of money to be raised: And whereas the council of this municipal district has obtained the express sanction of the Governor and Executive Council of the said colony to borrow a sum not exceeding Seven hundred and fifty pounds, being a sum not exceeding the whole estimated revenue of the said municipal council of Heathcote for the period of three years, by mortgaging its municipal rates, and to expend that sum upon the work and permanent improvement of the erection of a town hall in conjunction with a court house: And whereas the said council purposes to execute the said works in conformity with plans and specifications approved of by the Governor in Council: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Heathcote, that from and after this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, that the council is hereby authorised to execute the said works with the money raised by mortgaging its municipal rates as hereinbefore recited; and such works shall be executed by contract in writing, in conformity with and under such general regulations as may from time to time be made by any officer or person to be appointed by the Governor of the said colony.

**BYE-LAW No. 17.—To REGULATE THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS OF COMMON.**

**WHEREAS** by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the council of any municipal district within or in the vicinity of which any town common, within the meaning of the Act of the Parliament of Victoria numbered 117, is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-law prescribe, three persons to be managers of such common, and may at any time remove any one or more of such managers and elect others in their stead: And whereas the portions of land numbered respectively 42, 43, 44, and 61 in the parish of Carlsruhe, containing in the aggregate One thousand three hundred and thirty-three acres two roods and twenty-eight perches, more or less, together with the unappropriated Crown lands within the municipal district of Kyneton, have been duly proclaimed a Town Common for Kyneton: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the council of the said municipal district of Kyneton as follows, that is to say:

1. That the managers of the aforesaid Kyneton Town Common shall be elected annually by the said council, at their first ordinary meeting after the yearly election of councillors, in the month of December, from a list of persons signifying their willingness to act, and on the nomination of some councillor or councillors.

2. Should there be only three persons nominated, such persons shall be declared by the chairman and shall be duly elected; but if more be nominated, a show of hands shall be taken, and the three having the largest number of votes shall be elected; and if there be an equality of votes the chairman shall have a casting vote in addition to his previous one.

3. In case of the death, incapacity to act, resignation, or removal of any manager before the expiration of his year of office, the vacancy shall be filled as soon as convenient thereafter, at some ordinary meeting of the council, one week's notice of which shall be given by a councillor; and the election shall, in every respect, be conducted in the same manner as at the annual election aforesaid; and the person so elected shall hold office only during the remainder of the year for which his predecessor was elected.

4. Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, it shall be lawful for the said council, instead of proceeding to the nomination and election of managers as aforesaid, to adjourn any such meeting from time to time, as they may think proper, and the election taking place at any such adjourned meeting shall be equally valid.

**ELECTIONS.**

On 30th July, 1862, Mr. James Ingram was elected without opposition to the seat in the council vacant by the resignation of Councillor Henry Harrill Hunt.

On 19th August, 1862, Mr. Wm. T. Soulbey was elected by show of hands at the nomination to the seat vacant by the non-attendance of Councillor James Shackell, no poll being legally demanded by or on behalf of the other candidate.

On 20th August, 1862, Mr. Henry Littlewood was elected, after a contest, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Councillor E. H. Dunn.

And at the annual election on 25th September, 1862, Councillor George Briscoe Kerferd, J.P., was re-elected at the head of the poll by 143 votes; and Messrs. John Duncan Fisher by 136 votes, and Charles Dyring by 127 votes, were elected members of council in the room of councillors G. B. Kerferd, John Yoxall, and James Ingram, who retired by rotation.

On 26th September, 1862, Alexander Rodgers, Esq., J.P., was unanimously re-elected chairman of council; and on the same day Councillor Soulbey was elected chairman of committees, and Councillor G. B. Kerferd honorary municipal treasurer.

**WATER SUPPLY.**

The Beechworth Water Works, referred to in former reports, will now be completed in the course of two or three weeks to their present contemplated extent, when the dam of their reservoir will have reached the height of 35 feet, giving a storage area of about 46 acres. The cost of the entire undertaking to date will have been about £12,000, some £1500 of which may be attributed to the opposition which the council have throughout met with from certain interested parties.

It should be mentioned that those members of the Royal Mining Commission who lately visited this district expressed their unqualified approval of these waterworks as carried out, and their great gratification at the success which has thus far attended the efforts of the corporation to initiate and execute so generally beneficial a project as this cannot fail to prove, some twenty acres of the reservoir area being already covered with water, whilst the reservoirs built by the Government in other parts of the colony are still empty.

**PUBLIC WORKS.**

Deeming the foregoing as a work of primary importance to the entire community, the corporation have limited their other expenditure to the repairs and maintenance of existing roads and streets, without entering upon fresh works, with the exception of the promised clearing and fencing of the new approach to the public recreation reserve of the municipality, which is now completed, and the approach itself gazetted, under the name of Victoria road.

**FINANCE.**

The usual half-yearly balance sheet is hereto appended, from which it will be seen that, with the exception of the overdraft incurred on account of the Beechworth Waterworks, the expenditure of this corporation during this year (as in previous years) has been kept within their income.

**GENERAL.**

The corporation, at the request of the Municipal and Charitable Institutions Commission of the Government, are furnishing as complete and detailed a report as possible upon the general and financial position of this municipality from its first establishment to this date, together with suggestions on various points upon which amendments in the municipal laws seem to be required.
