## WATER SUPPLY TO CASTLEMAINE AND SANDHURST.

THE Board of Land and Works being desirous of ascertaining the practicability of obtaining a supply of water from the Coliban River for the supply of the towns of Castlemaine and Sandhurst for domestic uses and mining operations, are prepared to receive from engineers, surveyors, and others, preliminary designs and plans for effecting that object, for the two most eligible of which a premium of £250 and £150 respectively will be awarded.

The plan (on a scale of not less than two miles to one inch) to show the source of supply, the proposed line and levels of pipe tracks or races, the localities to which the water would be conveyed; and the report to embody the uses to which it could be applied, the estimated cost of the proposed works, and the probable amount of revenue to be derived from the sale of water.

The plan and reports to be accompanied by a tender for executing the surveys and levels, and preparing the necessary plans and sections, and the working drawings and specifications, with a detailed estimate of the cost of the works, but not to include the cost of superintendence.

If any tender is accepted, then the premiums paid for the preliminary design is to be considered as a payment on account of it, but the board does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender; and, before the payment of any premium for a preliminary design, &c., it is to be understood that the person

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to whom it is awarded shall enter into a bond, with approved sureties, for the carrying out of his tender for the surveys.

Preliminary designs with reports, and the tenders, in separate envelopes, but bearing the same motto, must be addressed to the Inspector General of Public Works, on or before the 30th day of November, 1862.

Sealed envelopes, containing the name and address of each competitor, and with the motto on his designs, &c., legibly written on the outside of the envelope, to accompany the plans and tender.

**DISTRICTS OF INSPECTORS OF SHEEP.**

THE several districts into which the colony of Victoria has been divided, and for which inspectors of sheep have been appointed, in accordance with the Act No. 143, intitled, *An Act to repeal the Act intitled An Act for preventing the extension of the Disease called Scab in Sheep, and to substitute other provisions in lieu thereof*, are hereinafter described for general information, that is to say:-

THE BENALLA SCAB DISTRICT.—Commencing at the junction of the Goulburn and Murray Rivers; thence by the Murray River, bearing easterly to Cowrang Creek; thence by Cowrang Creek, a range, Livingstone Creek, and a line, together bearing southerly to the Dividing Range (and being the eastern boundary of the Beechworth Commissioner's district); thence by the Dividing Range, bearing westerly to the south-east corner of the county of Anglesey; and thence by the east boundary of that county and the Goulburn River, together bearing northerly to the point of commencement.

THE GEELONG SCAB DISTRICT.—Commencing at the south-west corner of the county of Villiers; thence by the west boundary of that county and the west boundary of the county of Ripon, together bearing northerly; thence by the north boundary of the county of Ripon and part of the north boundaries of the counties of Grenville and Grant, together bearing easterly to the north-east angle of the last-named county; thence by the east boundary of that county, bearing southerly to Point Lonsdale; and thence by the sea-coast, bearing westerly to the point of commencement.

THE GIPPS LAND SCAB DISTRICT.—Commencing at the south-east angle of the county of Mornington; thence by the east boundaries of that county and county of Evelyn, together bearing northerly to the Dividing Range; thence by that range bearing easterly to the south-east corner of the Beechworth Commissioner's district; thence by the east boundary of that district (being a line passing along Livingstone Creek, a range, and Cowrang Creek to its junction to the Murray River), bearing northerly to the Murray River; thence by the Murray and the north-east boundary of the colony of Victoria, bearing south-easterly to Cape Howe; and thence by the sea-coast, bearing westerly to the point of commencement.

**THE MELBOURNE SCAB DISTRICT.**—Commencing at the south-west corner of the county of Bourke; thence by the west boundary of that county, bearing northerly to the north-east corner of the county of Grant; thence by part of the south boundary of the county of Talbot and portion of the Dividing Range, together bearing westerly to the source of the Avoca River; thence by that river bearing northerly to Lake Bael-bael; thence by a line bearing north magnetic to the junction of the Marraboor and Loddon Rivers; thence by the Marraboor River, bearing northerly to its junction with the Murray River; thence by the Murray River, bearing south-easterly to its junction with the Goulburn River; thence by the Goulburn River, bearing southerly and easterly to the north-east corner of the county of Anglesey; thence by the east boundary of that county and the east boundaries of the counties of Evelyn and Mornington, together bearing southerly to the sea-coast; and thence by the sea-coast, bearing westerly, and the shore of Port Phillip Bay, bearing northerly and westerly, to the point of commencement.

**THE PORTLAND SCAB DISTRICT.**—Commencing at the south-west corner of the colony of Victoria; thence by the west boundary of that colony, bearing north to the north-west corner of the county of Pollett; thence easterly by the north boundaries of the counties of Follett and Dundas; thence by part of the west boundary of the county of Ripon and the west boundary of the county of Villiers, together bearing southerly to the sea-coast; and thence by the sea-coast, bearing westerly to the point of commencement.

**THE EAST WIMMERA SCAB DISTRICT.**—Commencing at the north-west angle of the colony of Victoria; thence by the Murray River, bearing south-easterly to its upper junction with the Marraboor River; thence by that river bearing south-westerly to its junction with the Loddon River; thence by a line bearing magnetic south to Lake Bael-bael; thence southerly to the Avoca River; thence by that river bearing southerly to the Dividing Range; thence westerly by that range to the source of the Wimmera River; thence by that river northerly to its intersection with a magnetic east and west line passing two miles south of Lake Albacutya; thence by that line bearing west magnetic to the west boundary of the colony of Victoria; and thence by that boundary bearing north to the point of commencement.

**THE WEST WIMMERA SCAB DISTRICT.**—Commencing at the source of the Wimmera River; thence by that river bearing northerly to its intersection with a magnetic east and west line passing two miles south of Lake Albacutya; thence by that line bearing west magnetic to the west boundary of the colony of Victoria; thence by that boundary bearing south to the north-west corner of the county of Follett; and thence easterly by the north boundaries of the counties of Follett and Dundas, and part of the north boundary of the county of Ripon, together bearing easterly to the point of commencement.

#### NOTICE TO OWNERS OF SHEEP.

THE attention of all owners of sheep throughout the colony is specially directed to the following clauses of the Act No. 143, intitled, *An Act to repeal the Act intitled An Act for preventing the extension of the Disease called Scab in Sheep, and to substitute other provisions in lieu thereof*, which came into operation from and after the 1st instant, viz.:—

"§ 2. *Penalty on owners of scabby sheep.*—Every person who not being licensed under this Act shall own any sheep infected with the disease called scab shall be liable to pay the sum of three shillings in respect of every sheep so infected.

"§ 3. *License to keep scabby sheep.*—Any inspector on being applied to by any owner of sheep shall issue to such owner upon payment of a fee of threepence for every sheep so infected a license to keep the said sheep for a period of six months for the purpose of cleansing the same and any inspector may from time to time renew such license for a further period of four calendar months upon payment of the sum of sixpence for every sheep so infected for the first renewal of ninepence for the second renewal and of an additional threepence beyond such sum of ninepence for every additional renewal of such license. Provided that every such license shall be void if during the continuance thereof the person to whom the same is granted shall be convicted under this Act.

"§ 4. *Owners of sheep to deliver correct account of infected sheep.*—Every person owning sheep or having the care or management of sheep within Victoria shall whenever thereunto required by a notice in writing to be personally delivered to such owner or manager aforesaid, or left at his usual or last known place of abode in the said colony deliver to the inspector a correct account of all sheep in his possession or custody infected with scab with the marks and brands of such sheep and the description of their age and sex as near as may be and of the places where such sheep may be depasturing or kept. And if any such owner or other person shall not within fourteen days after the delivery or leaving of such notice deliver such account he shall forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding twenty pounds."

**PROCLAMATION.**

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

**WHEREAS** by *The Land Act*, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the fourth day of March, 1861, a Farmers' Common at Tarragal and Mouzie therein described was amongst others proclaimed: And whereas it is expedient to increase the said common: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the said Tarragal and Mouzie Farmers' Common by adding thereto the area hereinafter described, that is to say:—

## BRAYBROOK FARMERS' COMMON.

RULES, ETC., FOR MANAGEMENT AND REGULATION OF THE  
BRAYBROOK FARMERS' COMMON.

ALL persons entitled to depasture cattle and horses on the Braybrook Farmers' Commons shall be allowed to run twenty head of cattle, more or less, as the managers may direct from time to time.

2. No person shall be allowed to run bulls or entire horses on the commons over six months old, without the permission of the managers; calves to count as per head after they are six months old.

3. The fees to be charged for depasturing of cattle and horses on the commons shall be—for every horse Twenty shillings per annum, and for every head of cattle Ten shillings per annum, always payable quarterly in advance; quarters to terminate on 31st March, 30th June, 30th September, and 31st December respectively.

4. All persons taking cattle to the commons shall be required to deliver them into the charge of the herdsman, and produce a written order from two or more of the managers; the herdsman shall sign the same, and make a note of it in his book kept for that purpose, and shall afterwards proceed to brand the cattle with commons' brand in pitch or tar.

5. Each person, previous to taking cattle to the commons, shall be required to apply to the manager's office, held at the Kororoit Creek Hotel, to have his name and address, together with the brands and description of his cattle or horses registered in a book kept for that purpose; the herdsman to receive all fees thereon, and to give a receipt for the same.

6. The herdsman shall be required to see the travelling herds and flocks of sheep shall keep strictly within the limits of the boundaries in passing over the commons, as provided in the 78th clause of the new Land Act of 1862; but any resident of the district desiring to remove his cattle or horses from one place to another must keep strictly to the roads, the same not to be considered as travelling herds or flocks.

7. The herdsman shall be required to report immediately to the managers the slightest indication of disease in any of the cattle under his charge. If any cattle belonging to the commons are impounded from private lands during the absence of the herdsman when on duty, sickness, or otherwise, the managers shall be bound to pay the fees for such impounding from the commonage fund; and when any cattle or horses are impounded by the herdsman, the fees derivable from the same shall be equally divided between the herdsman and commonage fund.

8. The herdsman shall be required to muster the cattle at any time when ordered by the managers, and no person to be allowed to run more than two horses on the commons, which will be equal to four head of cattle on the commons per annum; but no person shall be allowed to keep a breeding stock of horses on the commons. Each foal or young horse to count as per head, 20s. per annum, after they are twelve months old.

## BYE-LAWS OF THE BRAYBROOK FARMERS' COMMONS.

1. The managers to elect a chairman and treasurer, and to meet on the first Monday in every month at the office of the managers, to transact all business that may come before them (all moneys received from the commonage to be put in some Bank to the credit of the managers of the Braybrook Farmers' Commons when exceeding Fifty pounds), and all moneys to be paid out by the treasurer, by cheques or otherwise, signed by the managers and secretary.

2. The secretary shall be required to keep all books, papers, and accounts, receive and answer all correspondence; to attend at the office every Monday, unless otherwise ordered by the managers, between the hours of Ten a.m. and Four p.m.; to enter the names and residences of all persons entitled to depasture cattle or horses on the commons in a book to be kept for that purpose, the number, description, and brands of the cattle they wish to run upon the commons; to receive fees payable for the same; and to give a receipt on behalf of the managers for all moneys he may receive for such and other purposes.

3. The secretary or herdsman, on each day of general meeting, to produce his or their books and accounts to the managers, and shall hand over all moneys received from the commonage to the treasurer, who shall give a receipt for the same.

4. Any person depasturing cattle or horses on the Braybrook Farmers' Commons not paying the dues of the respective cattle or horses as specified in the 3rd rule of the general law, namely, every three months in advance, or in default of payments, the managers shall have the power, by giving twenty-one days' notice to such party or parties, to sell by public auction the cattle or horses belonging to the owners of the said cattle or horses to defray expenses; and should there be any surplus from such sale, to be handed over to the owner; and such owner to give a receipt in full to the managers or secretary; and should any deficiency occur from such sale, the managers may, if they think proper, sue the said owner or owners for the balance.

5. The appointment of herdsman shall be advertised for. The managers shall have the power to appoint any competent man, who shall be required to produce satisfactory testimonials as to character and ability, and shall be required to enter into security with the managers for the safety of all cattle, horses, and other property which may be entrusted to his care; and no application will be received by the managers from any party or parties connected in any way whatsoever with the Braybrook Farmers' Commons.

6. The herdsman shall be required to reside on or near the commons, the managers to provide a suitable residence and garden ground, and to be allowed the run of six head of cattle together with two horses on the commons.

7. The managers to pay the herdsman at a salary

per annum; payments to be made every month or board-day from the fees derivable from commons, and the residue to be applied to some local purpose in the making of stock-yards or other works, as the managers may consider for the benefit of the commons and the district.

8. All disputes which may arise between the herdsman and the commons shall be referred to the managers. Any complaints so complained of must be given in writing to the managers, whose decision shall be final.

9. Should at any time the managers consider to dispense with the services of the secretary or herdsman, they shall be bound to give him a month's notice, or one month's compensation of the current salary paid to him per annum; and should the said secretary or herdsman require to leave, he shall be bound to give one month's notice to the managers.

10. The true interpretation of the foregoing rules and bye-laws shall be in every case to be considered by the managers, and their decision shall be final. It shall be considered at all meetings of the managers that any two shall form a quorum. And no commoner will be allowed to send any cattle on the commons but his own *bona fide* property; and should he attempt to do so, he shall be fined by the managers Twenty shillings for every head of cattle or horse so sent.

THE UNITED FARMERS', GOLD FIELD, AND TOWN.  
COMMON OF AVOCA.RULES FOR MANAGING THE AFFAIRS OF THE AVOCA UNITED  
COMMON.

WHEREAS by The Land Act, 1862, it is enacted that the managers of any common or united common shall from time to time make rules for the management thereof: Be it therefore ordered by managers of the Avoca United Common as follows:—

1. All persons applying for a license to depasture any animal on the Avoca United Common must do so on form of schedule A hereunto annexed.

2. Every person possessing a license to depasture any animal on the Avoca United Common shall muster the same for the recognition of the managers, or any person authorised by them, within seven days after they shall have received a notice to do so, signed by the secretary; and shall keep such animals off the common for the space of twenty-four hours, if required to do so, to afford the managers an opportunity to search the common and ascertain whether there are any other animals thereon of the same brand.

3. All animals licensed to depasture on the Avoca United Common shall be branded by their owners with some distinctive brand, so as to distinguish from others.

4. Whenever the managers shall suppose that any animal is infected with a contagious disease, the owner of such animal shall remove the same from the common on receiving twenty-four hours' notice so to do by the secretary, and such animal shall not again be put upon the common without the special permission of the managers. And any animal affected with any contagious disease shall not be permitted to depasture on the said common. And whether such animal was infected with a contagious disease at the time of or subsequent to its being licensed to depasture, so soon as it shall be discovered to be infected with disease, as hereinbefore described, it shall in all respects be treated as if it had not been licensed.

5. Bulls shall not depasture on the common unless by special permission of the managers.

6. Entire horses shall not be permitted to depasture on the common unless tethered or under the immediate care of a herd.

7. All licenses issued by the managers shall be in the form of schedule B hereunto annexed.

8. The licenses for 1862 shall expire on the 31st December, 1862, after which all licenses shall date from 1st January and 1st July in each year.

9. All persons entitled to depasture animals on the Avoca Town, Gold Field, or Farmers' Common respectively, shall be entitled to depasture the same on the Avoca "United Common" in the following proportion:—

(1.) Townspeople shall be permitted to depasture 2 horses, 4 head of horned cattle, and 4 goats.

(2.) Miners shall be permitted 3 horses, 5 head of horned cattle, and 5 goats.

(3.) Farmers shall be permitted to depasture 5 head of horned cattle and 2 horses, and shall be permitted to depasture over and above that number 1 horse for every two acres of cultivated ground, or 1 head of horned cattle for every acre cultivated; provided that no one party shall be permitted to depasture on the common more than 20 horses or 40 head of horned cattle, or a proportionate number of both.

(4.) Teamsters shall be permitted to depasture 6 horses and 12 bullocks.

10. Fees.—The fees chargeable on annual licenses to depasture shall be—

11. Dairymen may be permitted to depasture any number of horned cattle not exceeding 40, and 3 horses, on payment of the following fees:—

12. Butchers and persons engaged in slaughtering may be permitted to depasture 60 sheep, or any less number, on payment of a fee of £3; and to depasture 20 head of horned cattle and 5 horses, or any less number, on payment of a fee of £4.

13. All sheep so permitted to depasture to be confined to such parts of the common as the manager may set apart for their use.

14. That in exacting fees and issuing a license for the depasturing of cattle or sheep on the Avoca United Common, the managers shall not be responsible for the safe keeping of the same, or for any neglect or omission, or any other act of any herdsman appointed by them, in the performance of his duty.

BYE-LAW No. XVI. OF THE MINING DISTRICT OF BALLAARAT.  
[1st October, 1862.]

At a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Ballaarat, begun and holden at Ballaarat, in the said district, on the 1st day of October, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

Whereas bye-law XIV. of the mining board of Ballaarat, in sections one, two, three, four, five, and six, provides for the division of the mining district of Ballaarat into ten divisions, and the appointment and payment of registrars for the said several divisions, and in said bye-law has defined the duties of said registrars, a portion of which duties is to effect all registrations required by the said bye-law numbered XIV., so far as regards the subject matters of such registration as specified to be performed by said registrars within their several divisions: And whereas doubts have arisen and may arise as to the validity of registrations when the claim or other subject matter of registration shall embrace a portion of two or more of the aforesaid divisions, if such registration shall not have been effected by all

and every of the said registrars within whose divisions any portion of said claims or other subject matter of said registrations shall be situated: And whereas it is expedient to remove said doubts, be it therefore enacted as follows, that is to say:—

1. That when any claim or other subject matter of registration, which the said bye-law XIV. provides shall be registered by one of said mining registrars, embraces a portion of two or more of the aforesaid divisions of the mining district of Ballaarat, it shall be lawful for either of the registrars within whose division any portion of said claim or other subject matter of said registration shall be situated to effect said registrations; and such registrations shall to all intents and purposes be as valid as if said claim or other subject matter of registration were wholly situated in the division in which said registration shall have been effected, or as if said registration were effected by each and every of the registrars in whose divisions any portion of said claim or other subject matter of registration shall be situated.

2. And that no registrar shall effect a registration for any claim or other subject matter of registration every part of which is situated without the boundaries of his division.

The undersigned members of the said mining board concurred in making the foregoing bye-law.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the suppression of nuisances, the licensing of carter and public vehicles, and the preservation of the public health: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the council of the municipal district of Hotham, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor—

1. That no person shall exercise or practise the business of a nightman, or drive any night-cart within the municipal district of Hotham, until and unless he shall have a license from the said council so to do.

2. Every nightman's license, at whatever period of the year the same may be granted, shall remain in force only until the thirty-first day of December next ensuing.

3. Whenever any licensed nightman or his assistants shall change his or their place of abode, he or they shall, within two days next after such change, give notice thereof in writing to the town clerk, specifying his or their new place of abode; and shall at the same time produce the license to the town clerk, who shall endorse thereon and sign a memorandum specifying the particulars of such change.

4. If any person, for the purpose of procuring a nightman's license, shall use or employ, or cause to be inserted in such license, any false or fictitious name or place of abode, he shall be subject to the penalty prescribed herein for offences against the provisions hereof; and any license so obtained, having such falsehood therein, shall be cancelled.

5. Every licensed nightman, before using any cart or other carriage as a night-cart within the said municipal district, shall register the same in such manner as the said council may direct, in the office of the town clerk, and shall receive a memorandum

of the number assigned to such night-cart; provided that no such registration of any night-cart shall be made unless and until such cart shall have been inspected by the inspector of nuisances, or other officer appointed for that purpose by the municipal council aforesaid, and certified by him to be fit and suitable for the purposes of a night-cart.

6. Every licensed nightman shall, before using any cart or other carriage as a night-cart, have painted and kept at all times conspicuous on the right or off side thereof, with white letters upon a black ground, his name, together with the words "Licensed nightman," in letters not less than two inches in length and of proportionate breadth, and the number assigned to such night-cart, in figures not less than four inches in length and of proportionate breadth.

7. Every licensed nightman shall cause two lamps provided with argand burners, or other burners of equal illuminating power to argand burners, and having the word "Hotham" legibly painted on the front glass of each, to be kept properly trimmed and lighted, and in such manner that the word aforesaid may be legible and conspicuous, affixed, the one on the front and the other on the back of the night-cart, whenever and so long as such night-cart is being driven or used.

8. Every night-cart shall be kept by the owner thereof watertight and free from leakage, and shall be provided with covering so as effectually to prevent the splashing or spilling of anything contained therein.

9. No privy or cesspool shall be emptied, nor any nightsoil carted away, nor any foul or offensive liquor or matter of any kind whatever pumped out of or removed from any house, cellar, or other building within the aforesaid municipality of Hotham, between the time of sunrise and the hour of Eleven o'clock post meridian of any day.

10. Nightmen's licenses shall be in the form contained in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked A, or to the like effect.

11. For any neglect or breach of any of the provisions of this bye-law, the offender shall, upon conviction before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

12. For the purposes of this bye-law, the word "nightman" shall be understood to mean any person who shall remove, or assist to remove, any nightsoil, or other refuse, matter, or thing whatever; and the word "night-cart" shall mean any cart or other carriage of any description whatsoever, used for the conveyance of any nightsoil, ammoniacal liquor, or other offensive liquor or substance.

#### APPENDIX A.

##### Town of Hotham.—Nightman's License.

WHEREAS of Hotham security for the due and faithful performance of his duties as a nightman therein, subject to and in accordance with the provisions of Bye-law No. 16 of the municipal council of Hotham, entitled, *A Bye-law for the Regulation and Government of Nightmen*. Now therefore I, the town clerk of the said municipality of Hotham, in exercise of the powers in that behalf vested in me, for and on behalf of the chairman and councillors of the municipal district of Hotham, license you, the said

## CONDITIONS.

All the articles required by this notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds, in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages.

The supplies are to be immediately placed on board by the contractor by day or night if so required, on the written order of the officer in command, failing which, they will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from the contractor's account.

The contractor will be bound to put on board rations either for one day or one month, or more or less, as may be required.

When the vessel shall be in any harbor of the colony except Hobson's Bay, the officer in command shall be at liberty, without reference to this contract, to procure provisions in such manner as he may be empowered by the Government.

The contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly in the prescribed form, and to present the same in a complete state, signed by the officer in command, to the Government Storekeeper, for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne.

#### ELECTIONS.

No election took place during the currency of the half-year, but a vacancy occurred through the decease of Councillor Brown, the filling up of which it was deemed expedient to defer till the September annual election, as Councillor Brown's seat would have become vacant then by effluxion of time.

#### APPLICATIONS.

Applications to the Government have been made for the establishment of a local district survey office.—Declined.

For a special grant towards forming the approaches to the town, three applications.—Refused.

For a share, as heretofore, of the grant for fencing and improving public parks in aid of the Botanical Gardens.—Refused, on the ground that the aggregate amount hitherto apportioned to Belfast is in excess of what it is entitled to in proportion to its population.

The application for a manure depot, referred to in last report, has been acceded to, and the land selected and marked off under instructions of the district surveyor, but the reservation has not yet been gazetted.

#### PUBLIC WORKS.

The contract for forming and paving 46½ chains of the Mount Napier road has been completed, and numerous repairs effected from time to time on the Rosebrook and Yambuk roads.

A mass of trap rock, containing upwards of 250 cubic yards has been quarried and removed from hip of bank-street, and the proper formation given the street, footpath, and water-table.

700 lineal yards of footpath, 12 feet wide, have been brought to a proper formation and level, and coated with 4 inches of limestone broken small, and rolled down to a hard and even surface.

100 lineal yards bluestone kerbing have been laid down, and 100 yards old kerbing lifted and reset.

400 chains water-channels have been cleaned out and deepened, and upwards of 1000 loads earth removed from water-channels and hips of streets.

#### FINANCE.

In consequence of the unexpectedly great reduction in amount of grant-in-aid this year, the councillors have had to become personally liable to the bank for an overdraft, by giving their joint pro. note for £300, a large portion of which, however, will be met by second moiety of the grant-in-aid for 1862, and which has not yet been distributed.

# YANGARDOOK, KOROROIT, ETC., FARMERS' COMMONS.

**RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE YANGARDOOK, KOROROIT, AND DIERBREWARRH, ETC., FARMERS' COMMONS.**

1. ANY person holding or occupying purchased land within five (5) miles of the boundary of this common will be entitled to its advantages.

2. That each person entitled to commonage shall be permitted to graze one head of cattle for every three acres he may have under cultivation during the current year.

3. Cultivation shall mean and be understood as ploughed land for crop, ploughed land for fallow, or self-sown crop intended to be harvested.

4. That all cattle sent to said common shall have the owner or owners' brand (in legible and distinct characters or letters) on them, in order that the herdsman may be able to discover any strange cattle that may be at any time upon said common. Parties removing their cattle will intimate the same to the herdsman by notice in writing.

5. All persons applying for a license to depasture their cattle will be required to fill up a form, to be obtained from either of the managers or herdsman, setting forth the number of acres he has under cultivation according to the intent and meaning of these regulations, and also make a declaration before a justice of the peace as to the correctness of the same.

6. Any person found depasturing more cattle than what he has taken out a license for, the managers will have the power to cancel his license, and prevent him the use of the common during that year.

7. The fees for all cattle (horses excepted) will be at the rate of Four shillings per head per annum, and for horses Six shillings per head, payable in each case in advance; all cattle under six months old, free.

8. That the year shall commence on the 6th day of October, 1862, and end on the 5th day of October, 1863, and no less fees will be charged during the currency of said year.

9. That in no case will sheep be permitted to graze on said common during the first year, at the end of which time, if the then licensed commoners (or a majority of them) agree to depasture sheep, this rule will be altered or amended to suit their wishes.

10. In no case will either a bull or entire horse be permitted on the commons without the written consent of all the managers.

11. A record of all cattle, describing their brands, shall be kept by the herdsman for the inspection of any commoner, to enable him or them to discover strange cattle on the common; who are requested, if possible, to communicate the same to the herdsman.

12. The herdsman will have the authority of the managers to impound any sheep or cattle found trespassing on said common, and prosecute the owners thereof under clause 129 of the Land Act, an entry of which he will make in a book kept for the purpose, so that damages and fees arising from the same may be properly accounted for.

13. That all cattle suspected to be diseased belonging to the owners, shall (by order of the managers), after twelve hours' notice in writing, remove the same off said common; and in event of refusal, the owner shall be considered a trespasser, and be liable to the penalty inflicted or recoverable under and by virtue of the 129th clause of the Land Act, now in force in the colony of Victoria. And that the same cattle shall not be returned to the said common without the consent, in writing, of the managers first had and obtained.

14. It will be the herdsman's duty to see all the cattle under his charge once every 24 hours. Should any be missing during that time, he is to inform or notice the owners the day following, and make a memorandum in his book to that effect.

15. Should the fees collected be insufficient to pay the herdsman's wages, and other contingencies connected with the management, an additional charge will be made upon each commoner in fair proportion to the number of cattle by him depastured; and each license granted will be under the condition that he can be sued for the same, and the amount to be recoverable before any justice of the peace.

16. That the herdsman must be accountable to the commoners for any loss they may sustain by having their cattle impounded when strayed off the common; and the herdsman will receive as fees the sum of 6d. per head from the managers, for every head impounded by him trespassing on the said common.

17. Should the managers at any time consider the herdsman incompetent or neglectful of his duties, they can remove or discharge him without notice, and he can have no claim upon them for compensation whatever.

18. The managers do not hold themselves responsible for any neglect or irregularity of the herdsman, and can alter or amend these rules when they consider it necessary.
