WATER SUPPLY TO CASTLEMAINE AND SANDHURST.

THE Board of Land and Works being desirous of ascertaining the practicability of obtaining a supply of water from the Coliban River for the supply of the towns of Castlemaine and Sandhurst for domestic uses and mining operations, are prepared to receive from engineers, surveyors, and others, preliminary designs and plans for effecting that object, for the two most eligible of which a premium of £250 and £150 respectively will be awarded.

The plan (on a scale of not less than two miles to one inch) to show the source of supply, the proposed line and levels of pipe tracks or races, the localities to which the water would be conveyed; and the report to embody the uses to which it could be applied, the estimated cost of the proposed works, and the probable amount of revenue to be derived from the sale of water.

The plan and reports to be accompanied by a tender for executing the surveys and levels, and preparing the necessary plans and sections, and the working drawings and specifications, with a detailed estimate of the cost of the works, but not to include the cost of superintendence.

If any tender is accepted, then the premiums paid for the preliminary design is to be considered as a payment on account

of it, but the board does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender; and, before the payment of any premium for a preliminary design, &c., it is to be understood that the person to whom it is awarded shall enter into a bond, with approved sureties, for the carrying out of his tender for the surveys.

Preliminary designs with reports, and the tenders, in separate envelopes, but bearing the same motto, must be addressed to the Inspector General of Public Works, on or before the 1st day of December, 1862.

Sealed envelopes, containing the name and address of each competitor, and with the motto on his designs, &c., legibly written on the outside of the envelope, to accompany the plans and tender.

CAENGHAM ROAD DISTRICT.

THE Carngham District Road Board has made the following Rules and Regulations, whereof No. 9 is in lieu of the 9th of the Rules and Regulations passed on the 8th of August, 1861, to regulate the proceedings of the Board (gazetted 10th September, 1861, page 1717), and Nos. 35-41 are in addition to the said Rules and Regulations, viz.:

9. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the board, and business which the chairman may think fit to bring under the consideration. Any member of the board may, however, bring

forward such business as he may think advisable, by placing the same on the notice paper before the chair is taken; and all such notices shall be considered in the order in which they are given.

35. At the request of any two members, the chairman may at any time call a special meeting of the board, by instructing the secretary to give each member notice in writing of the day and hour of meeting, as well as of the special business to be then brought forward for consideration. Such notice may be by post or otherwise; but no meeting shall take place until the third day after the posting of such notice, and no business shall be proceeded with during such meeting but that mentioned in the notices posted to the different members, except business of routine only.

36. All moneys belonging to the board which may in any way come into the hands of any officer of the board shall be paid into the bank within eight days, at latest, from the receipt thereof, and such officer shall report to the board, at the first meeting thereafter, the amount so paid into the bank, and on what account such moneys had been received.

37. The finance committee shall consist of three members, duly appointed by the board, and their duty shall be to examine the secretary's books and all accounts; and no payment whatever shall be made without being recommended by them; and the chairman and two of the committee will sign all cheques, and no payment shall be made but by cheque.

38. The works committee shall consist of the whole board, and their duty shall be to examine all contracts during their progress, and also all roads under repair; and no application for a progress or final payment shall be entertained unless recommended by the engineer and one of the works committee.

39. The secretary shall be in attendance at the board room on Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday of each week, from Ten a.m. to Four p.m., and shall then give members and ratepayers every facility for examining accounts of the board; and it shall be his duty to have a report prepared previous to any meeting of the finance committee, showing the balance at the bank and balances due on contracts, and generally all liabilities of the board.

40. The officers of the board shall be required to enter into bond with the Guarantee Society for the due fulfilment of their duties to such an amount as may be fixed by the board.

41. Prior to the acceptance of any tender a deposit of five per centum on the amount tendered will be required of the tenderer, to be held as security for the due fulfilment of his contract; and in case of cheques or moneys being forwarded with unsuccessful tenders, it shall be the duty of the secretary, immediately after the rising of the board, to return the amounts to the parties, if present, and if not, to the address given in their tender, the letters therewith to be duly entered in the letter book.

CONDITIONS.

1. The coal is to be the very best of its kind, and must be either screened before delivery over a screen with bars at least one inch apart and ten feet long, set to an angle of forty-five degrees to the ground level, or handpicked so as to be of the same size as if screened in the above manner, and be quite free from shale or other impurities.

2. The orders will be issued by an officer of the Railway Department, if the contract be for delivery daily, and should an order not be complied with within twenty-four hours it will be competent for the local officer who ordered to purchase at the contractor's risk. Should the contract be taken for supplies in bulk the Government Storekeeper will issue orders, and one month from date of order will be allowed for completing delivery, failing which the coal will be obtained by the Government Storekeeper at the contractor's risk.

6. If the delay necessary for obtaining the decision of a board of survey should be detrimental to the public service, the engineer-in-chief, or officer in charge at the station, will have the power to reject coal which is obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and the contractor must take back the rejected coal and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense charged as in clause 2.

7. During the past six months eight rights-of-way have been formed, metalled, and channelled; one right-of-way is in course of construction.

Seven and a half chains of street-way have been cut down to permanent level, formed and metalled.

Fifty-one chains of kerbing and channelling have been laid down, principally in the northern portion of the district.

One thousand yards of metal have been spread upon those streets requiring immediate repair.

Ten lamp posts have been erected, and thirteen lamps lit with kerosene oil.

The council has obtained the loan of £5000 for five years, at 8 per cent. per annum, from the Melbourne Banking Company.

The court house has been completed, and the municipal offices to be attached thereto are in course of erection.

Gore street has been opened throughout, and is now available for traffic.

The council has given up an area of about nine acres of the recreation reserve, in order that the Collingwood Commercial Cricket Club might obtain permissive occupancy thereof direct from the Government.

The council has repeatedly urged the Government to complete the proposed arrangements for a central manure depot before the hot season arrived.

The council intends making arrangements for a clause in the new Municipal Bill, to enable it to have supervision of buildings in this municipality.

The council has granted permission to the Street Railway Company to lay down their tramway from Victoria parade along Nicholson street and Gertrude street to Gore street.
