STEAMBOAT WHARF, WILLIAMSTOWN.

IT is hereby notified, for general information, that in accordance with the powers conferred upon me by the 14th section of *The Customs Act, 1857*, I have directed that the wooden portion of the steamboat or old wharf at Williamstown shall be used for passenger traffic, and as a suerance wharf for the lading and unloading of light goods only; that on no account shall heavy and bulky articles, such as wood, iron, stone, bricks, boat ballast, gravel, sand, &c., be landed or deposited on the same; and that no drays shall be permitted to ply thereon.

CAUTION TO IMPORTERS OF CATTLE, ETC.

THE attention of importers of sheep, masters of vessels, and others, is invited to the prohibition contained in clause 34 of *The Customs Act, 1857*, specifying the following goods as being liable (if imported) to forfeiture and destruction, viz.:—
"Infected cattle, sheep, or other animals, and hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or any other part of cattle or other animals which the Governor in Council may prohibit, in order to prevent any infectious or contagious distemper or disease."

Instructions have been given to the Customs officers throughout Victoria, in the event of sheep or other animals imported into this colony being reported as, or presenting the appearance of, being diseased, to cause such sheep or animals to be detained on board ship, or in some secure close-fenced enclosure on shore, until the same can be inspected by some person of competent skill, upon whose report a further order will be made; and all importers of sheep and of other animals, as well as masters of vessels, are hereby cautioned against any attempted infringement of the law, otherwise they are liable to severe penalties in addition to the forfeiture of the goods.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the lands hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the above recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE BURRAMBEET AND WINDERMERE FARMERS' COMMON shall comprise the following area, viz.: Counties of Ripon and Grenville, parishes of Windermere, Burrumbeet, and Haddon, extent about 7783 acres: Commencing at the junction of the eastern bank of Lake Burrumbeet with the reserve on the west of allotment 149, parish of Burrumbeet; bounded on the west by Lake Burrumbeet, bearing southerly to the northern angle of allotment 7 of section 2, parish of Haddon, and by the eastern boundaries of allotments 7 and 6 of same section; on the south by a road south of allotment 10 of same section, and north of allotment 1 of section 8; on the west again by said allotment 1 and a road to the west of allotments 4 and 6 of section 8; on the south and west again by allotments 6 and 7 of same section and a road to the north-west of allotment 3 of section 11; on the south by a road to the south of allotments 3 and 2 of same section, and allotments 1, 2, 4, and 5 of section 10; on the east by a road to the east of allotments 5 and 3 of same section, allotments 6, 3, and 2 of section 9, and allotments 2A and 1A of same section; on the south again by a road to the south of allotments 7 and 8 of section 20, parish of Windermere; on the east and north-east by the road from Smythesdale to Lake Burrumbeet to the commencing point; excepting such alienated lands as are contained within the said boundaries; and the Windermere Farmers' Common, described amongst others in a Proclamation bearing date the eighteenth day of February, 1861, shall be and is hereby abolished.—(62.E.9593.)

THE MALMSBURY MUNICIPAL COMMON shall comprise the following area, viz.:—Counties of Dalhousie and Talbot, parishes of Lauriston and Edgecombe, comprising all the unappropriated Crown lands within the municipal boundaries of Malmsbury, containing 307 acres, more or less.—(62.E.9734.)

THE SAGO HILL AND CAMPBELL'S GULLY GOLD FIELD COMMON (described in a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-first day of October, 1861) is hereby increased by adding thereto the following area, viz., 1310 acres, more or less, in two portions, being the unappropriated lands within the following boundaries, viz.:—

No. 1.—390 acres, more or less, commencing at the south-east angle of allotment 5, section 17, parish of Cardigan; thence east by the south side of the present Gold Field Common to the south-east angle thereof; thence south to the south-west angle of allotment 1, section 7; thence east by the south boundary of the lastnamed allotment to the south-east angle thereof; thence south to the south-west angle of allotment 2, lastnamed section; thence south-westerly by road about ten chains, more or less; thence west to a point due south of the commencing point; thence north by the eastern boundaries of allotments 2 and 1 of section 18 to the point of commencement. No. 2.—320 acres, more or less, commencing at the south-east angle of allotment 2, section 15; thence north to the north-east angle of allotment 3, same section; thence west to the north-west angle of allotment 1, same section; thence south to the south-west angle of the lastnamed allotment and section; thence east to the point of commencement, this lastnamed portion of the common comprising allotments 1 and 2, section 15.—(63.F.7288.)

" for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim that the Buttlejorck and Holden Farmers' Common, described amongst others in a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-second day of April, 1861; and the Gap Town Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the twelfth day of August, 1862, shall be a Common, under the name of "The United Town and Farmers' Common of Buttlejorck Holden, and The Gap" for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either of the said commons.

REGISTRAR GENERAL'S REPORT ON THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF OCTOBER, 1862.

ACTUAL Daily Mortality of persons of both sexes under and over five years of age in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, embracing a radius of ten miles, and including the Statistical Sub-districts of Melbourne Proper, East Melbourne, North Melbourne and Carlton, Fitz Roy Municipality, East Collingwood, Richmond, Jika-jika parish (exclusive of North Melbourne, Collingwood, and Richmond), South Yarra and Prahran, Emerald Hill and Sandridge, St. Kilda and Brighton, Doufa Galla and Keilor, Boroondara and Heidelberg, Cut-paw-paw parish, and the shipping in Hobson's Bay: also, the Temperature in the shade at Melbourne, deduced from the mean of twenty-four hourly observations taken at the Flagstaff Observatory on each day during the month of October, 1862:—

The deaths occurring in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of October numbered 194, or a daily average of 6.26. The mortality was therefore less than in September, when the daily average was 7.50, but nearly the same as in July and August, in which respectively it was 6.68 and 6.13. The number of deaths in October, 1861, was 227; in October, 1860, it was no less than 377; and in October, 1859, it was 225. The mean for the four years was thus 256, or 62 deaths more than in October, 1862.

The mean temperature of the month, as registered at the Melbourne Observatory, was 57.6°, against 58.7° for October, 1861, against 56.7° for October, 1860, and against 53.7° for October, 1859. The highest temperature (86.7°) was at 2 p.m. on the 13th, and the lowest (33.4°) at 5 a.m. on the 10th; the range for the month thus being 53.3°. The greatest range of temperature occurring on any one day (36°) was on the 12th, from a maximum of 75.8° to a minimum of 39.8°; and the lowest (8°) on the 17th, from a maximum of 60.7° to a minimum of 52.7°. The mean daily range was 19.6°. The extremes of atmospheric pressure (30.445 in. and 29.546 in., giving a monthly range of .899 in.) were respectively 8 a.m. on the 3rd and at 5 a.m. on the 26th; the mean pressure for the month was 30.033 in., against 29.797 in. for October, 1861, and against 29.9 in. for October, 1860.

The mean temperature, number of deaths, and daily average of mortality for the first four weeks in October, were a follow:—

Of the 194 deaths which occurred during the month, 111, or rather more than 57 per cent., were of males, and 83, or rather less than 43 per cent., of females; only 73, or about 40 per cent., were of children under five years of age, leaving 115, or 60 per cent., for persons over that age. For some months past the mortality has been greatest in the latter division; but in no case has the excess been so great as in the month under review.

On the 25th 11 deaths took place, and 10 on the 1st, 15th, 21st, and 31st respectively. These were the highest numbers recorded. As few as 2 deaths were returned for the 29th.

The oldest persons who died during the month were two males, each at the age of 79, the one of pleurisy the other of old age, and one female at the age of 76 of bronchitis.

The reported casualties for the month were, by drowning a youth aged 15 years, a man aged 50, and a seaman aged 29, all in the River Yarra; a boy 4 years old was killed by some timber; a laborer aged 32 died of dislocation of the neck; a cab proprietor of 43 years of age died in consequence of fracture of the leg, a farm laborer in consequence of fracture of the spine; a female infant aged 9 weeks was accidentally suffocated, and another female child died from burns.

Forty-three deaths took place in charitable institutions, being 23 per cent. of the total. They occurred thus:—Melbourne Hospital, 31; Benevolent Asylum, 4; Lunatic Asylum, 3; Immigrants' Home, 3; Lying-in Hospital, 1; hulk *Success*, 1.

The following table shows the number of persons of all ages according to the last census, the number of deaths of persons under and over five years of age, the total at all ages, and the number of deaths to every 1000 of the population during the month of October, 1862, in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, and in each of the sub-districts of which it is composed:—

Of the 79 deaths of children under five years of age, the sexes were nearly equal, 39 having been of males, and 40 of females; 48 were under one year old, 11 between one and two, 6 between two and three, 6 between three and four, and 8 between four and five years old.

Of the 115 deaths of persons over five years of age, 72, or about 62 per cent., were of males, and 43, or about 38 per cent., of females; 12 were between five and ten years old, 4 between fifteen and twenty, 7 between twenty and twenty-five, 14 between twenty-five and thirty, 16 between thirty and thirty-five, 13 between thirty-five and forty, 14 between forty and forty-five, 7 between forty-five and fifty, 7 between fifty and fifty-five, 2 between fifty-five and sixty, 6 between sixty and sixty-five, 1 between sixty-five and seventy, 8 between seventy and seventy-five, and 4 of seventy-five and upwards.

The following table shows the causes of the deaths of persons of both sexes, under and over five years of age, and the proportions per cent. of deaths from each cause, in Melbourne and suburbs, during the month of October, 1862:—

MALMSBURY PUBLIC CEMETERY.
RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE MALMSBURY GENERAL CEMETERY.

(In accordance with the Act 17 Victoria No. 12.)

ALL charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. By the 8th section of the Act, any person making a vault, or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees, under these rules, and upon the payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons and his or their representatives for ever.

3. Application for such permission to be made to the office of the secretary. A certificate of permission, in the form set out in the schedule, will be granted to the party applying for such permission on payment of the charges in the schedule.

4. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on a certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence, proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relations and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

5. Orders for interment to be given at the office of the secretary; such notice to be given between the hours Eight a.m. and Four p.m. the previous day; if not, an extra charge will be made (see schedule A). No free interment will be allowed without the above notice.

6. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but parties wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of the trustees; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent in writing of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.

7. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased, must be stated at the time of giving the order.

8. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

9. Until otherwise ordered, the usual time fixed for interments will be from Ten a.m. to Six o'clock p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from Ten a.m. to Four o'clock p.m. in the other four months, except on Sundays, when the usual and only hours for funerals will be from One to Five o'clock p.m. throughout the year.

10. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones, to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

11. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, slate, iron, or red gum planking 2½ inches in thickness.

12. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, to be submitted to the trustees for approval, who are required by the eighth section of the Act to determine and fix the position of any unobjectionable monument, according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner. In the erection of tablets copper cramps must be used.

13. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

14. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, will be kept at the office, and may be inspected at the charge set out in the schedule; and the registers of all grants are kept by the secretary.

15. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

ALTERATION OF BOUNDARIES, AVOCA.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and fifty-four householders resident within the municipal district of Avoca and in the vicinity, praying that the said municipal district may be altered.

The petitioners state that they are householders within the municipal district of Avoca, and within the boundaries hereinafter described.

They represent that the existing municipal boundaries were adopted to suit the nature of the lands up to that time surveyed, and are inconvenient, but that subsequent surveys and the interests of the residents render their alteration expedient, and to this alteration the owners of the land to be excluded from the municipal area assent.

They state, lastly, that there are three hundred householders within the proposed new boundaries, which will comprise not more than nine square miles.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore pray you may be pleased to alter the boundaries of the Avoca municipal district to the following, viz.:—Commencing at a point at the north-east corner of allotment 1, section A-3, about one mile north of the township of Avoca; thence southwardly by the parish boundary of Avoca to the south-east corner of allotment 30, section 1, about one mile south of Avoca; thence west about two miles and a half to the south-west corner of allotment 7, section 2 A, country lands south-west of Avoca; thence north about three miles and a half to the north-west corner of allotment 2, section 1 A, country lands north-west of Avoca; thence by the northern boundary line of said last allotment, and those of allotments 3 and 4, section C, to the Avoca and Moonambel Main road (Main Adelaide road); thence across said road to the west angle of allotment 6, section B; thence by the north-western boundary line of same, and the northern boundary line of last-named allotment and that of allotment 1, section A 3, to the point of commencement."

MUNICIPALITY OF PORTLAND.

BYE-LAW No. 24.—FOR PROHIBITING DAMAGE TO THE FOOTPATHS AND WATERCOURSES, AND FOR REGULATING THE FORMATION OF CROSSINGS OVER FOOTPATHS AND WATERCOURSES.

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted, that every municipal council shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets, paths, and public thoroughfares, and shall and may make bye-laws for carrying out these objects: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Portland, with the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of Victoria:—

1. No person or persons shall ride, drive, or lead any horse or beast, nor shall drive or wheel any carriage, cart, barrow, or other vehicle upon or across any of the public footpaths within the district, nor in any way damage or cause to be damaged the said footpaths, or any of them, nor in any way damage or cause to be damaged the public watercourses, or any of them.

2. Every owner or occupier of any gateway, yard, lane, or private road or way, to which access by horses, beasts, carriages or other vehicles, can be obtained only by riding, driving, leading, or wheeling upon or across any of the said public footpaths or watercourses, who shall make and maintain such crossing or crossings over the said public footpaths and watercourses, or any of them, as may be necessary for approach and access to any such gateway, yard, lane, or private road or way, in the manner hereinafter described, at the expense of such owner or occupier, and under the superintendence of the municipal surveyor, or such other officer as the municipal council may appoint in this behalf, shall be allowed to use such crossing without being liable to the penalty hereinafter provided.

3. In streets where a stone or wood kerb is now or hereafter may be laid, every such crossing as aforesaid, when required, shall be paved with stone or wood pavement, or metalled with broken stone or metal the whole width of the footpath from the building line to the pavement of the water channel, in cases where the said channel is or shall be paved; and in cases where the water channel shall not be paved, then as far as to the kerbing of the footpath. And the water channel must not in any way be altered or obstructed, but it shall be competent for the municipal council to grant permission for the construction of a stone culvert across any such channel. In cases where the water channel is not paved, the street kerbing need not be removed, but a wooden bridge may be placed across the channel in the manner hereinafter provided.

4. In streets where a footpath and water channel are or may hereafter be formed, and where no kerbing is laid, the channels must be formed with stone or wooden paving, or broken stone or metal, or suitable wooden bridges must be provided and fixed over the water channel so as to leave a free passage for the water underneath such bridges, which may project into the public roadway not more than four feet from the outer edge of the footpath.

5. The owners or occupiers of any buildings or property shall not cause or suffer any water to be discharged on to or over

any public footpaths; but such owners or occupiers, or any of them, may make and maintain such drains leading through and under the adjoining path as shall be necessary to discharge the water from such buildings or property into the public water channels, at the expense of such owners or occupiers, under the superintendence aforesaid, and with the consent of the municipal council first had and obtained, without being liable to the penalty hereinafter mentioned.

6. Any person or persons guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20).

BYE-LAW No. 25.—TO REGULATE THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS FOR THE PORTLAND TOWN COMMON.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Legislature of Victoria, 25 Victoria No. 145, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to the sale and occupation of Crown Lands*, section 63, it is enacted that the municipal council of any municipal district, within or in the vicinity of which any municipal common is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-law prescribe, three persons to be managers of such common, and may at any time remove any one or more of such managers and elect others in their stead: And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor in Council, dated the eighteenth day of February, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and made under the provisions of the Act of the Parliament of Victoria No. 117, intituled, *An Act for the sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, the boundaries of the Portland Town Common are duly gazetted: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Portland, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor in Council, the election of managers of the Portland Town Common shall be conducted in the manner following (that is to say):—

That an election of managers for the Portland Town Common shall take place at the Council Chamber in Portland, on the first Wednesday in the month of December in each year.

That any member of the said council desirous of nominating one or more candidates shall, seven days before the day of election, give to the chairman or clerk of the council, in writing, the name or names of such candidate or candidates, with the written consent of the person or persons so nominated.

If the number of candidates nominated as aforesaid shall not exceed the number of managers to be elected for the said common, the chairman of the said council shall declare such candidates to be duly elected, and they shall be deemed to be duly elected accordingly; but if the number of candidates shall exceed the number of managers to be appointed, the council shall proceed to the election by ballot in whatever way they may determine, and the three candidates who shall have the largest number of votes shall be declared duly elected; and if two or more candidates shall have received an equal number of votes, the chairman shall, besides his own vote, have the casting vote.

That should any manager be removed by order of the council, some other person shall be elected in his stead, at such time as the chairman shall appoint, in the same manner as hereinbefore provided for the annual elections.

The foregoing Bye-laws, Nos. 24 and 25, made by the municipal council of Portland, have been assented to by the Governor in Council.

1. The construction of a timber-built bridge with approaches and footpath to North Clunes.
2. The extension of Fraser street from Service street to Bailey street.
3. The construction of Camp Hill street from Fraser street to Talbot road.
4. The cutting of drains in various streets.
5. The maintenance of Fraser street and Service street.
6. The construction of wooden crossings at Creswick's road, the manure depot, Purcell street, Fraser street, and Service street.
7. The construction of right-of-way from Fraser street to Purcell street.
8. Repairing bridge and approaches foot of Camp Hill street.

The council, being desirous of obtaining possession of the land reserved for municipal purposes in Bailey and Service streets, have carried on a long correspondence with the Government on the subject, who have sanctioned an extension of the time wherein to erect suitable buildings, on the understanding the council compensate the owners of such improvements as were legally made on the ground prior to the 28th January, 1861. The council have been in treaty with such owners, and the matter is now in course of adjustment, with the exception of one case.

A vote having passed the Parliament last session for the supply of water to the gold fields, a deputation from this council waited on the Commissioner of Public Works, and subsequently a sum of Two thousand pounds was allocated from this year's vote, with a promise of the like sum from next year's vote, on the understanding that this council should expend a sum equal to the moiety of the sum granted by the Government and carry out the works. This council accepted the proposition, and surveys are being made for the purpose.

Applications have been made to the Government for laying out streets at North Clunes, which has been promised; for the appointment of a letter carrier, complied with; for the extension of Bailey street, not yet carried out; for the establishment of Courts of Mines and County Courts in this town, now under consideration, and other minor matters.

The only bye-law gazetted has been No. 11, "For the regulation of the appointment of Managers to the Town Common."

The *Government Gazette* of 3rd October contained a proclamation, appointing the gravel pits in Hotham as a site for a metropolitan manure depot for Melbourne, Fitz Roy, and Hotham. The council took active steps to have the proclamation rescinded, and so far succeeded that the deodorising works are to be erected at the city manure depot.

ERECTION OF TOWN HALL AND COURT HOUSE.

During the past half-year the council approved of the design sent in by Mr. J. Flanagan, architect, and accepted the tender of Messrs. Leech and Bricknell to erect the building for the sum of £1398. It is of brick, and consists of the police court, 40 feet by 20 feet, a magistrates' consulting room, an office for

the clerk of petty sessions; and for municipal business there are offices for the town clerk and surveyor, and a committee room. The building is near completion, and is much admired for its arrangements.

A detailed statement has been compiled at the instance of the Municipal and Charitable Institutions Commissioners, showing among other things the revenue derivable from rateable property since the establishment of the municipality in 1853, as follows:—
