By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the session held in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to regulate the importation carriage and custody of Gunpowder*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to proclaim any town, township, or municipal district,

not being a sea-port town, as a district into which no gunpowder shall be brought unless for deposit in a public or licensed magazine; and if any person shall bring more than One hundred pounds of gunpowder into any such district, and shall not forthwith deposit the same in a magazine as aforesaid, it shall be forfeited: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the municipal district hereinafter mentioned to be a district within the meaning and intent and for the purpose mentioned in the above-recited clause of the said Act, that is to say:—

The Municipal District of Creswick.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-fourth day of March, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and in the twenty-fifth year of Her Majesty's reign.

MUNICIPALITY OF EMERALD HILL.

BYE-LAW NO. 36.—FOR REGULATING THE KILLING OF BUTCHERS' MEAT WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY OF EMERALD HILL.

WHEREAS it is expedient to regulate the killing of butchers' meat within the municipal district of Emerald Hill: And whereas by a bye-law duly made and assented to slaughter-houses have been established within the said district: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the council of the said district, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of the colony of Victoria, as required by law:

1. The slaughter-houses shall be open and slaughtering permitted at all hours of the day and night, except on Sunday for its entire duration, and on Christmas-day and Good Friday from the hour of Five o'clock a.m. to the hour of Ten p.m., when the whole establishment shall be closed, and no slaughtering or other work shall be carried on therein.

2. Every person who shall pay to the superintendent of the slaughter-houses the dues for slaughtering according to the rates hereinafter fixed, shall be entitled to the use of that portion of the slaughter-houses which shall be pointed out to him by the superintendent, and of the appurtenances of the same, for the purpose of slaughtering any of the animals which may lawfully be slaughtered therein, for a reasonable time, not exceeding the time hereinafter mentioned, viz.:—For the killing and dressing of an ox, cow, bull, heifer, or steer, forty-five minutes; of a calf or pig, thirty minutes; and of a sheep, lamb, or goat, twenty minutes.

3. Every person who shall so use the said slaughter-houses, or any portion thereof, or of any of the appurtenances of the same, shall immediately thereafter remove all offal, filth, and refuse of every description whatsoever, which shall remain or result from such use by him of the said slaughter-houses or appurtenances of the same, to the pits or places appointed for the reception of such offal, filth, or refuse, and shall cleanse thoroughly to the satisfaction of the superintendent, all the portion of the slaughter-houses, buildings, and appurtenances which he shall so use.

4. Every person using the slaughter-houses or the appurtenances thereof, or any part of the same, and who shall break, injure, destroy, or damage the same, or any part thereof, shall make good the destruction, damage, or injury done by him, notwithstanding that the same may have been caused by accident only.

5. Every person who shall drive, bring, convey, or conduct any live stock to the said slaughter-houses for the purpose of slaughter, shall inform the superintendent of the description and number of such live stock, and the superintendent shall enter the information so tendered to him in a book to be kept by him for that purpose; the succession of entries in such book shall, in case of any question arising, decide the order of priority in which the several persons shall be entitled to the use of the yards, pens, or premises of the said slaughter-houses as the said superintendent shall direct; and the person so bringing such live stock shall himself be responsible for the safety thereof.

6. The dues which shall be demanded, received, and taken for slaughtering at the said slaughter-houses, be paid to the superintendent, or other officer or person for that purpose appointed by the said municipal council, and shall be as follows, viz.:—

For every bull, ox, heifer, steer, or calf	5 s. d.
For every sheep, lamb, or goat	0 6
For every head of swine	0 1 1/2

such dues to be altered and amended by the said council, from time to time, as the said council shall deem fit.

7. If any person shall desire to kill live stock in one particular portion of the said slaughter-houses, under such conditions as the said municipal council shall think necessary and prescribe, and shall have a portion of the said slaughter-houses pointed out to him for that purpose, such person shall at all times, while he exclusively shall use such portion of the said slaughter-houses, keep the same, together with the appurtenances, clean and free from offence, whether by accumulation of blood, filth, or otherwise; and shall further, whenever so required by the said superintendent, cleanse, scrape, or otherwise purify, in such manner as shall be necessary, and as the superintendent shall direct, the walls, doors, floors, or other parts of the said portions of the slaughter-houses and appurtenances which he shall so use; and he shall in all respects comply with the regulations of the municipal council of Emerald Hill for the government of the slaughter-houses for the time being.

8. Every person who shall bring cattle for slaughter to the said slaughter-houses, and shall permit the same to remain in the yards or pens thereof for a longer period than 24 hours, shall provide such live stock with sufficient food and water, and shall clean and keep clean the yards or pens in which such cattle shall so remain.

9. For every neglect or breach of any of the provisions hereof, the offender shall, upon conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 36, made by the municipal council of Emerald Hill, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF HAMILTON.

BYE-LAW NO. 9.—TO PREVENT ACCIDENTS FROM FIRE THROUGH STACKS OF HAY, ETC., BEING LEFT UNCOVERED WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE HAMILTON TOWN RESERVE.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the prevention of fires, &c.: Be it therefore enacted as follows:—That from and after the date of this bye-law coming into operation no person or persons shall be permitted to erect or make any stack or stacks of hay, straw, or corn in straw, in his, her, or their premises within the boundaries of the Hamilton town reserve, in any quantity exceeding one ton, unless the same be under cover of a building enclosed on all sides, or stacked at a greater distance than one hundred and fifty feet from any building. And any person or persons convicted of a breach of this bye-law, before two or more justices of the peace, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Fifty pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 9, made by the municipal council of Hamilton, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF MOONAMBEL.

BYE-LAW NO. 1.—A BYE-LAW TO REGULATE, BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS, THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF MOONAMBEL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant-Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, section 26, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their proceedings: And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the 21st day of October, 1861, the district of Moonambel was duly established a municipal district: Be it therefore enacted and directed by the municipal council of Moonambel, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency Sir Henry Barkly, then administering the Government of the colony of Victoria, the proceedings and business of the said council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which shall be called the Standing Orders of the said council, and any breach thereof shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding Ten pounds sterling.

CHAPTER I.—Order of Proceedings.

1. That the chairman shall take the chair at the hour appointed, and shall commence business at each meeting as soon as the legal quorum is present; but if at the expiration of thirty minutes after the appointed hour of meeting there be not a quorum, the chairman shall adjourn the council to the next day of sitting, and the names of the councillors present shall be recorded in the minutes.

2. The first business at each meeting of the council shall be to confirm the minutes of the preceding meeting; and no discussion shall take place thereupon, except as to the accuracy thereof.

3. That in the absence of the chairman at a meeting of the council the members present shall appoint one of their own number to preside, and the member so appointed shall at such meeting hold and exercise the powers of chairman.

4. At all meetings the reading of correspondence unconnected with the business of the meeting, the presentation of petitions, and the bringing up of reports, shall have precedence of all motions.

5. No motion shall be discussed or decided upon at any meeting unless notice in writing signed by the councillor proposing the same shall have been given three clear days previous, or at the previous meeting of the council; nor shall any report of committee be decided on unless similar notice be given; and the town clerk shall furnish each councillor with a list of notices of motion received, two days before the meeting for which the same are given, and no motion so made shall be withdrawn without leave of the council.

6. That the reports of committees appointed by the council shall be always brought up at the first meeting succeeding their appointment, unless some satisfactory reason be assigned for delay.

7. The order of the day shall include all business of which due notice has been given, all matters arising out of former meetings of council, and any business the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration.

8. Any motion entered on the notice paper, and the councillor having given notice of the same being absent, and no other councillor deputed to bring forward such motion when the business is called in order, such motion shall be struck out.

9. That any member may, during the discussion of a subject, demand the call of the council to decide thereon, unless four members then present shall object to such call being made.

10. That no order for a call of the council shall be made for any day earlier than seven days, and notice of such call shall be served within twenty-four hours of such order being made.

11. That no member shall fail to attend in compliance with an order for a call of the council without reasonable excuse.

12. No bye-law shall be decided on without due notice (as in the case of motions), and a copy of the proposed bye-law shall be open in the town clerk's office for the inspection of all rate-payers, or of any person duly qualified to vote at elections under the Act, free of charge.

CHAPTER II.—Order of Debate.

1. In connection with a motion one amendment only shall be discussed, but if lost, another may be proposed before the original question is put to the vote. Upon an amendment being carried, it shall be acted upon as an original motion; and one other amendment may be proposed thereon, but not more; and the names of the councillors voting for and against the question shall be recorded; and the votes of all councillors shall be entered on the minutes.
2. Any member may of right require the production of any of the documents of the council relating to the subject under discussion.
3. No member shall address the council in other than a standing posture, without permission of the chairman.
4. No member shall interrupt another while addressing the council, except upon a point of order.
5. No petition shall be presented to the council disrespectfully worded.
6. No member shall refuse to cease speaking when interrupted by a call to order.
7. No member shall make a verbal and unwritten motion or amendment.
8. No member shall address the council as proposer of a motion or amendment without previously stating the nature thereof.
9. No member shall speak more than once on the same motion or amendment except through the chairman in explanation, or in reply as the mover of the original motion; but members merely seconding a motion, shall not be considered to have spoken upon it.
10. No member shall digress from the subject-matter of the question under discussion.
11. No member shall use offensive language, imputing improper motives, or making personal reflections on a member.
12. The chairman, in deciding a point of order, shall state the rule applicable to the case, and his decision thereon shall be final.
13. If more than one councillor rise at one time, the chairman for the time being shall decide which is entitled to precedence.
14. Any member may require the town clerk to take down in writing any words used by another member, immediately on the same being used.
15. No discussion shall be allowed on a motion for adjournment of the council, and should such motion be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of council.
16. The chairman shall arise when addressing the council in discussion of any subject.
17. No motion, the effect of which if carried would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council has been duly made for that purpose.

CHAPTER III.—Elections.

1. No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until four clear days' notice shall have been given in one or more of the local newspapers, inviting applications for the same, and the salary of such office shall in all cases be fixed for the municipal year, and inserted in the advertisement.
2. Except in cases of election which shall be decided by ballot, the council shall vote by show of hands, each question being put first in the affirmative and afterwards in the negative.
3. No councillor or officer belonging to the council shall be received as surety for any officer appointed by the council, and in all cases in which security for the due and faithful performance of any duty or contract is required, the expense of preparing such surety shall be borne by the person or persons giving the same.

CHAPTER IV.—Miscellaneous Regulations.

1. The clerk shall have the charge of the common seal of the corporation, and shall be responsible for the safe custody and proper use of the same, each impression thereof being duly verified by the signature of that officer.
2. The town clerk shall not affix the common seal to any corporate document without the express consent or order of the council, nor unless such document bears the signature of the chairman.
3. No member shall wilfully disobey any lawful order of the council, and no member or other person shall wilfully or vexatiously interrupt the orderly conduct of the business of the council.
4. When in consequence of disorderly conduct the chairman shall call upon any councillor by name, such councillor shall withdraw as soon as he has been heard in explanation, and after such councillor's withdrawal the council shall at once take the case into consideration.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 1, made by the municipal council of Moonambel, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF SMYTHESDALE.

BYE-LAW NO. 6 OF THE SMYTHESDALE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that every municipal council shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets, paths, and public thoroughfares: And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the 8th day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, the township of Smythesdale was

duly constituted a municipal district: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council for the district of Smythesdale, with the assent of His Excellency the Governor, that it shall not be lawful for any person or persons to remove the surface soil, or otherwise damage any of the roads or foot-paths within the boundaries of the municipality, whether the same be formed or not. And any person or persons offending against this bye-law shall, upon conviction before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 6, made by the municipal council of Smythesdale, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

SKIPTON PUBLIC CEMETERY.

RULES and Regulations of General Cemetery at Skipton.

1. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.
2. On application for permission to make a vault or erect a monument in the cemetery being made to the trustees, a certificate of permission will be granted on payment of the fees set forth in the schedule.
3. Charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on a certificate of a minister of religion or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, and that the relatives of the deceased were unable to pay the usual fees.
4. Order for interment to be given either to the sexton or at the office of the trustees on the previous day.
5. The name, age, residence, probable cause, and date of death of the deceased, must be stated at the time of giving the order.
6. All graves must be dug at the expense of the friends of deceased, under the direction of the trustees.
7. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.
8. The usual hours for the performance of funerals will be from Ten a.m. to Six p.m. from September to April inclusive, and from Ten a.m. to Four p.m. in the other four months.
9. All monuments, vaults, graves, and grave-stones, to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.
10. Plan of every monument must be submitted to the trustees for approval.
11. All persons destroying the fences, or in any manner injuring the cemetery, will be prosecuted as the law directs.
12. Every coffin in a vault must be bricked in and cemented, or covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron.
13. A plan of the ground and a register will be kept, which may be examined on payment of the charges in schedule A.
14. The ground will be open daily from sunrise to sunset.
15. The trustees reserve to themselves the right of making any alteration from time to time in these regulations and charges, subject to the approval of His Excellency the Governor.

Fencing Mechanics' Institute and National School reserves.
Forming footpaths and waterchannels in Railway place.
Removing plank road over the lagoon, and erecting a bridge over the same in the line of Rouse street.
Forming and metalling approaches to said bridge.
Forming footpaths in Bay and Crockford streets, from Liardet street to the northern boundary.
Pitching the crossing into Market reserve, and pitching and metalling approach thereto.
Covering roadway in Railway place with clay.
Erection of fire-bell tower.
About 52,000 feet super of hardwood timber have been used in kerbing various streets. Several other minor and useful works have been carried out in addition to the above. A contract has been entered into for fencing the Fish Market reserve.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been assented to and gazetted, viz:—

- No. 9.—For the establishment of slaughter-houses or abattoirs.
No. 11.—For levying a rate of One shilling and threepence in the pound for the year 1861-2.

VALUATION.

The annual valuation of property in the district was made by Mr. F. Peterson, of Prahran. The amount of assessment was £33,597 @ 1s. 3d. = £2099 16s. 3d. The reductions on appeal were about one-half (10s.) per cent.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Arrangements have been made for temporary permissive occupation of certain unmade portions of Beach street, lying close to the bay, for purposes of trade in connection with the shipping, under sec. vii. of 18 Victoria No. 14.

The successful establishment of a fire-brigade in this district has been delayed in consequence of the dilatoriness of the United Fire Insurance Company's committee, as displayed in not replying to the council's correspondence in reference to certain arrangements necessary to be made previously to the organization of the brigade. On 29th August ultimo, William Marsh, of Bay street, was appointed by the council to the care of the fire engine and plant, at a weekly salary of Ten shillings. The voluntary efforts of the working men of Sandridge in connection with the extinguishing of fires in the district have been most praiseworthy. A system of rewards for giving the first alarm, by ringing the town bell, in case of fire, has been found to work exceedingly well. The Sewerage and Water Department has promised to proceed further with laying the water pipes so soon as those expected in April shall arrive. A system of permanent levels for the district, laid down by the council's surveyor assisted by W. Bull, Esq., of Williamstown, has been adopted by the council. The question of the extension of Bay street direct to Spencer street has been discussed by this council in

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conference with the municipal council of Emerald Hill, but a yet without result. Sites have been set apart by the Government for planting trees, &c., and for a town hall for the district. A movement has been initiated with a view to the construction of a direct road between Sandridge and St. Kilda at the rear of the line of batteries on the beach. Efforts have been made to secure a branch clearance office at Sandridge; also, a branch of the pilot service. The clearing away of the seaweed nuisance and the purifying the salt water lagoon have also been under consideration.

ST. KILDA AND BRIGHTON RAILWAY COMPANY.
BYE-LAWS, RULES, AND REGULATIONS OF THE ST. KILDA AND BRIGHTON RAILWAY COMPANY.

THE St. Kilda and Brighton Railway Company, pursuant to and by virtue of all and every the powers, authorities, and privileges given or conferred on them by an Act of the Legislature of the colony of Victoria, passed in the

twenty-first year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, *An Act to authorise the making of the St. Kilda and Brighton Railway*, and also by another Act of the Legislature of the said colony, known and cited as *The St. Kilda and Brighton Railway Extension Act, 1861*, or either of the said Acts, and also of all other powers and authorities enabling the said company in this behalf, do respectively hereby make, pass, enact, and establish the bye-laws, rules, and regulations following, that is to say:—

1. No person will be admitted to the booking office at any station whilst the door is closed for making up and despatching any train, and no passenger will be allowed to take his or her seat in or upon any carriage used on the railway, or to travel therein upon the railway, without having first paid his or her fare and obtained a ticket.

2. Tickets will be issued conditionally; that is to say, in case there shall be room in the train for all the passengers to whom tickets shall have been issued. If there shall not be room for all such passengers, the holders of periodical tickets shall have priority over holders of return and single tickets, and the fare will be returned, on application to the stationmaster, to the holders of such return and single tickets as shall be unable to obtain seats.

3. Each passenger, on paying his or her fare, will be furnished with a ticket, which he or she is to show whenever required by the stationmaster, or porter authorised by him, or by the guard in charge of the train; and if it be a single journey or return ticket, he or she must allow it to be marked when required; and every ticket (whether single, return, or periodical) must be delivered up on demand of any guard or other servant of the company authorised to collect tickets.

4. No periodical ticket so delivered up will be retained unless the period for which the same was granted shall have expired (except in cases of infringement of either the eighth, the tenth, or the eleventh section of these bye-laws).

5. Each passenger, not producing or delivering up his or her ticket will be required to pay a sum equal to the fare from the place whence the train originally started.

6. Every person attempting to defraud the company by travelling upon the railway without having previously paid his or her fare and obtained a proper ticket, or by riding in or upon a carriage of a superior class to that for which he or she has taken out a ticket, or by continuing his or her journey in or upon any of the company's carriages beyond the destination for which he or she has paid his or her fare, or by altering a return or periodical ticket, or endeavoring to use it after or beyond the time for which it was originally granted, or by attempting in any other manner to evade the payment of his or her fare, shall pay to the company the sum or penalty of Five pounds.

7. No return or periodical ticket will be available for special trains.

8. No passenger will be allowed to ride outside under any circumstances whatever, nor will any passenger be allowed to get into or upon or to quit any carriage after the train has been put in motion; and any person doing so, or attempting to do so, shall pay to the company a sum or penalty of Five pounds, and be expelled from the company's premises, and forfeit his fare and ticket, of what kind soever such ticket may be.

9. Dogs will be conveyed and charged for, but they will not on any account be allowed to accompany passengers in the carriages.

10. Smoking is strictly prohibited in the carriages (except as after mentioned) and in and upon the company's stations and premises, and every person smoking in a carriage (except in the one which may be set apart specially as a smoking carriage) shall pay to the company a sum or penalty of Five pounds; and every person persisting in smoking in a carriage (except the smoking carriage), or in or upon any station or other premises of the company, after having been warned to desist, in addition to such penalty shall immediately, or if travelling, at the first opportunity, be expelled from the company's premises, and forfeit his fare and ticket, of what kind soever such ticket may be.

11. Any person found in a carriage or station, or upon the company's pier or premises, in a state of intoxication, or committing any nuisance, or wilfully interfering with the comfort of the passengers, shall pay to the company a sum or penalty of Five pounds, and shall immediately, or if travelling, at the first opportunity, be expelled from the company's premises, and forfeit his fare and ticket, of what kind soever such ticket may be.

12. Any passenger cutting the linings, removing or defacing the number plates, breaking the windows, or otherwise wilfully damaging or injuring any carriage on the railway, shall pay to the company a sum or penalty of Ten pounds, in addition to the amount of damage done.

13. No gratuity is, under any circumstances, allowed to be received by the company's servants, on pain of immediate dismissal.

14. Every passenger, on arriving at the station for which he or she may have taken a ticket, or to or from which he or she may hold a periodical ticket, shall quit the station and premises of the company, and no person shall be allowed to loiter about the company's stations, pier, or premises, or any part thereof; and if any passenger or other person shall refuse to quit the station, pier, or premises aforesaid, on being requested so to do by the piermaster, or any stationmaster or other servant of the company, such passenger or person may be expelled by such piermaster, stationmaster, or other servant aforesaid, from the company's premises, and in addition thereto shall pay to the company a sum or penalty of Two pounds.

15. No drayman, carter, porter, or other person, will be allowed to come into or upon the company's premises, for the purpose of removing luggage or goods, either with or without, a dray or

hand-cart, or truck (unless required by a passenger and specifically engaged by him for the express purpose); and no person will be allowed to come into or upon the company's premises, for the purpose of soliciting custom for hotels or boarding-houses, or any custom or hire of any kind whatsoever; and any drayman, carter, porter, or other person evading, or attempting to evade this regulation, or refusing or neglecting to quit the company's premises, when thereto required by the piermaster or any stationmaster or other servant of the company, shall be expelled from the company's premises, and in addition thereto shall pay to the company a sum or penalty of Ten pounds.

16. The directors of the company may from time to time issue and give such regulations and directions for the observance, conduct, and guidance of the officers and servants in the employ of the company in the performance and discharge of their respective duties as the board of directors shall approve of.

The foregoing bye-laws, rules, and regulations were made, passed, enacted, and established in conformity with the provisions of the beforementioned Acts, by the St. Kilda and Brighton Railway Company, this first day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two; in testimony whereof the said company have hereunto affixed their common seal.
