POSTAGE RATES BETWEEN VICTORIA AND FRANCE OR ALGERIA, OR FOREIGN COUNTRIES, *via* FRANCE.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the seventh day of April, 1862.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act to amend an Act intituled An Act to amend the Law relating to the Post Office*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, to make, or cause to be made, arrangements with the Postmaster General in England, or with the authorities of any British possession or foreign country, for the following objects, that is to say:—(3.) For the appointment, determining, and collection of postage and rates of postage upon letters, packets, and newspapers conveyed between the colony aforesaid, and such kingdom, possession, or country, and for the exemption of such letters, packets, and newspapers from all or any rates. (4.) For the division or appropriation and mutual accounting for, and payment of, money so collected. And that such arrangements may provide for the prepayment or otherwise of the postage due on such letters, packets, and newspapers, notwithstanding any of the provisions of the said Act; and the postage on any letters, packets, and newspapers received from parts beyond the seas may be payable under such arrangements in Victoria:

Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that letters posted in Victoria, addressed to France and the foreign countries to which correspondence may be transmitted *via* France, as specified in the accompanying table, marked A, shall be exempted from the compulsory prepayment of postage:

That the rates of postage shown on the annexed table, marked A, be charged on paid letters posted in Victoria for France and the countries to which correspondence can sent by way of France:

That the rates of postage shown on the annexed table, marked A, be charged on delivery of unpaid letters received in Victoria, under this arrangement, except in the case of unpaid letters originating in France or Algeria, on which letters Tenpence (instead of Eightpence) per quarter of an ounce be collected:

That the rates of postage shown on the annexed table, marked B, be accounted for to the French Post Office on the classes of letters therein described, upon the condition that the rates mentioned in the annexed table, marked C, be, in like manner accounted for to Victoria:

That newspapers posted for and received from France and the foreign countries above referred to, be charged the colonial postage of One penny.

And the Honorable George Samuel Evans, Her Majesty's Postmaster General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

Letters addressed to all those countries and places to which, according to the foregoing Table, the entire postage to destination can be paid in advance, may be registered at the desire of the senders, and in such case the postage *must be so prepaid*, and at double the rates of postage chargeable for ordinary letters.

REGISTRAR GENERAL'S REPORT ON THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF MARCH, AND FOR THE QUARTER ENDING 31ST MARCH, 1862.

The number of deaths recorded as having occurred in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of March was 339, against 337 in the same month of 1861, and against 332 in the same month of 1860. The daily average of mortality during the month shows improvement as compared with that of February and January; deaths in March having been at the rate of 10.94, those in February at the rate of 12, and those in January at the rate of 12.93 per diem.

The mean temperature of the month was 65.5° against 65.8° for March, 1861, and against 66.6° for March, 1860. The greatest heat experienced was on the 9th, at 3 and 4 p.m., when the thermometer reached 98.6°, and the least on the 1st, at 6 a.m., when it descended to 46.1°. The greatest range of temperature (52.7°) was on the 1st, from a maximum of 81.8° to a minimum of 46.1°, and the least (8.3°) on the 23rd, from a maximum of 70.3° to a minimum of 62°. The range between the highest and lowest of the month was 52.5°, and the mean daily range 21.3°. The mean atmospheric pressure during the month was 29.892 in. against 29.927 in. in March, 1861, and 29.878 in. in the same month of 1862. The highest point reached by the barometer (30.208 in.) was on 31st, at 10 a.m., and the lowest (29.599 in.) on the 9th, at 5 and 6 p.m. The range for the month thus being .609 in.

The mean temperature, number of deaths, and daily average of mortality for the first four weeks in March, were as follow:—

Of the 339 deaths which took place during the month, 181 or rather more than 53 per cent. were of males, and 158 or less than 47 per cent. were of females. The deaths of children under five, and of persons above that age, were respectively 198 and 141, and the proportions 58 and 42 per cent. In the month of March, 1861, these proportions were respectively 65 and 35 per cent., and in 1860 they were 61 and 39 per cent.

Nineteen deaths occurred on the 20th, 11 of which were of children under five, and 8 of persons over that age; this is the highest number occurring on any one day. The next highest numbers were sixteen on the 13th, fifteen on the 14th, 17th, 18th, and 22nd, and fourteen on the 2nd and 9th.

The oldest persons who died during the month were, a male at 76 of phthisis, a female at the same age of jaundice, and a female at 75 of old age.

The deaths from external causes recorded during the month numbered no less than 27, of which three were known to be suicidal, and the remainder supposed to be the result of accidents or negligence. Of the latter class eight deaths were from drowning, two of which were of boys of 9, and one of a boy of 12. Four midshipmen or junior officers of one of the ships in the bay were also drowned, but only two of their deaths appear in the returns for March, probably owing to the bodies of the others not having been found up to the end of that month. Two females aged respectively 47 and 21 were burnt to death, a child of two years old died of a scald, three infants were suffocated, and one infant of four weeks old died from the bite of a poisonous insect.

The deaths occurring in charitable and public institutions numbered fifty-six, and were as follow:—Melbourne Hospital, 36; Benevolent Asylum, 5; Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 9; Immigrants' Home, 4; Roman Catholic Orphanage, 1; Spencer street Barracks, 1; the whole amounting to sixteen and a half per cent. or about a sixth of the deaths of the month.

NOTE.—The population of the different sub-districts according to the recent census is given subject to future revision, but it is believed that when finally corrected the figures will not differ materially from the above.

Of the 198 deaths which occurred to children under five years of age 102 were of males and 96 of females, the per centages being 52 and 48; 125 were under a year old, 55 between one and two years, 7 between two and three, 3 between three and four, and 8 between four and five.

Of the 141 persons above the age of five who died during the month, 79, or 56 per cent., were males, and 62, or 44 per cent., females; 11 were between five and ten, 4 between ten and fifteen, 5 between fifteen and twenty, 17 between twenty and twenty-five, 18 between twenty-five and thirty, 20 between thirty and thirty-five, 24 between thirty-five and forty, 13 between forty and forty-five, 5 between forty-five and fifty, 6 between fifty and fifty-five, 6 between fifty-five and sixty, 4 between sixty and sixty-five, 2 between sixty-five and seventy, 3 between seventy and seventy-five, and 3 of seventy-five and upwards.

The deaths from zymotic diseases diminished from nearly 34 per cent. of the total deaths in January and February to rather over 29 per cent. in March. Their number (99), in the latter month, was nearly equalled by deaths from local diseases (94). These amounted to about 28 per cent. of the total, whereas in January and February they equalled between 25 and 26 per cent. Deaths from constitutional and developmental diseases during the month were in the proportions to the total respectively of about 14 and 21 per cent., against 12 and 25 per cent. in February, and against 14 and 24 per cent. in January. The proportion of violent deaths to the deaths generally increased from 3½ per cent. in January, and 4½ per cent. in February, to 8 per cent. in March.

THE MOORABBIN ROAD DISTRICT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him should seem meet, as and to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare that the portions of the parishes of Moorabbin and Mordialloc, in the county of Bourke, hereinafter defined, shall be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, that is to say:—

Commencing on the sea-coast at the south-west angle of Dendy's special survey; thence east by the south boundary of the municipality of Brighton to the south-east angle of said municipality; thence by the eastern boundary of said municipality bearing north-westerly and north to the north-east angle of said municipality; thence east by part of the north boundary of the parish of Moorabbin to the north-east angle of said parish; thence south by part of the east boundary of said parish to the north-east angle of section 50 in the said parish; thence east along the north boundary of section 24, in the parish of Mordialloc, to the north-east angle of said section; thence south by the east boundary of said section to the coast line; and thence by the coast line bearing north-westerly to the point of commencement.

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Moorabbin Road District."

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this fifth day of May, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and in the twenty-fifth year of Her Majesty's reign.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

GABO ISLAND LIGHTHOUSE.

IN reference to a Notice to Mariners issued from this office on the 28th December, 1860, intimating that a New Lighthouse was about to be built on Gabo Island:

Navigators are hereby informed that the masonry of the new tower is now completed, and that a Fixed White Light of the first order will be exhibited therefrom on or about the 15th day of August next, when the present fixed light will be discontinued and the lantern removed.

The centre of the new light will be about one hundred and seventy-two feet above the mean level of the sea.

The new lighthouse is situated about a cable's length N.W. from the extreme S.E. point of Gabo Island; its approximate position is latitude 37° 35' S., longitude 149° 55' E.

The lighthouse tower is circular, built of granite of a grey color.

The lightroom and top of lantern only will be painted white, tower remaining its natural color.

Notice to Mariners.

SAILING DIRECTIONS FOR THE NEW CHANNEL INTO CORIO BAY AND GEELONG HARBOR.

NOTICE is hereby given that the artificial channel across the extensive sandbank which fronts Corio Bay has been deepened to eighteen feet at low water.

The channel is about one mile and two-tenths long, in an E. by N. and W. by S. direction, and is 132 feet wide at bottom, sloping to 165 feet at the surface at its narrowest part.

Entering from sea, the edges of the channel are marked by white beacons on starboard hand and black beacons on the port hand.

About half a mile S.E. from the east end of the main channel, a passage eighteen feet deep at low water, about a cable's length in a N.W. and S.E. direction, and half a cable wide, has been dredged across the neck of sand which forms the south-eastern side of the deep basin lying to the eastward of the bar. This passage is marked by four buoys, two black on port side and two white on starboard side.

The easternmost white buoy is cone-shaped, and as a distinguishing mark is moored broad end down; it swims nearly upright, and is surmounted by a staff and ball; the other three are cask buoys.

The Sailing Directions for Geelong, included in the general Sailing Directions for Port Phillip, issued from this office in 1854, and amended in 1860, will be sufficient to guide navigators to the upright white cone buoy at the S.E. end of the outer cut; passing which, steer direct for the Bird Rock beacon, taking care to keep it a little open to the westward of a gap in the trees N.W. of the rock until you begin to bring the line of black beacons in one which marks the new channel, when haul sharp up and pass through, keeping midway between the two lines of beacons.

As the tides, both flood and ebb, set across the entrance of the new channel, care must be taken that the vessel is kept under good command, and not horsed over on either bank.

Vessels drawing 20 feet can, by choosing a proper time of tide, and employing steam, pass through this channel into Corio Bay close up to the Geelong wharfs.

The height of water in the new channel can always be ascertained by adding eight feet to the height in the old channel as indicated by the tidal signals hoisted on board the lightslip; for a description see Sailing Directions for Port Phillip, pages 13 and 14.

Vessels intending to proceed from sea to Geelong, and requiring the harbor pilot, would save time by sending a telegram from the Heads (stating draft of water) to the harbor master, who would have a pilot ready to board the vessel of Point Henry.

Masters of vessels, pilots, and others using the channel, are specially cautioned to keep in remembrance its very limited width, and to use every precaution to avoid collision with other vessels or the buoys or beacons.

To prevent accidents, although there is width enough for ordinary vessels to pass each other from opposite directions in this channel it is advisable not to do so. Persons in charge of vessels are recommended when they see another vessel entering the channel from an opposite direction to await outside either entrance until she has passed through.

SPRINGFIELD, CHINTIN, FORBES, ETC.

A MEMORIAL, bearing the signatures of seventeen land-owners, householders, and farmers resident in the parishes of Springfield, Chintin, Forbes, Bylands, Havelock, and part of Moonegetta, has been received, wherein the memorialists state that they are desirous of forming a road district, and request that it may be proclaimed and designated as "The Springfield Road District," with the boundaries described on a tracing which accompanied the memorial, and which are as follow, viz. —

Commencing at the north-east angle of the parish of Forbes; thence west to the north-east angle of the parish of Springfield; thence west to the county boundary of Bourke; thence northerly and westerly by the county boundary to a point due north of the north-east angle of block 1, parish of Lancefield; thence south to the said angle; thence east to the Saltwater River; thence by the Saltwater River and western boundary of the parish of Springfield to the northern boundary of the parish of Moonegetta; thence west by the northern boundary of the said

parish to the Lancefield road; thence south by the Lancefield road to a point opposite the south boundary of the parish of Havelock; thence east to the south-east angle of the said parish; thence north by the east boundary of the said parish to the Saltwater River; thence by the Saltwater River to a point where the east boundary of the village reserve, parish of Bylands, cuts the river; thence northward by portion of the eastern boundary of said reserve, and of blocks 83, 83, 84, and 83 of said parish, to the south-east angle of the parish of Forbes; thence north by the east boundary of said parish to the commencing point.—(02.1027.)

PROPOSED ALTERATION OF ROAD DISTRICTS.

WARRNAMBOOL, MORTLAKE, ETC.

A MEMORIAL, bearing the signatures of forty-five land-owners and ratepayers residing in the parishes of Terang and Glenormiston, in the county of Hampden, has been received, the tenor whereof is as follows:—

The memorialists state that the parishes where they reside are at present included within the Warrnambool and Mortlake road districts, from which they are desirous to be severed, and transferred to the Hampden and Heytesbury road district, for the following reasons, viz.:—

That the interests of the parishes of Terang and Glenormiston are identical, and coincide with those of the Hampden and Heytesbury road district, at whose board they might be represented by members selected from their respective localities—an advantage which Terang is now deprived of through its remoteness from the place of business of the road district in which it is at present situated; that Terang is the post town of the district, and that mails and passengers are conveyed twice a week between it and Geelong and Warrnambool; that though it is material that the postal route be maintained in the best state, it stands in need of urgent repairs and improvements, and has not had its fair share of expenditure from the local board; and that above all other considerations they desire to be united with a board whose labors have inspired confidence and give assurance that the local funds will not be misappropriated, but judiciously and impartially applied.

Lastly, the memorialists urge the early consideration of their desire, and solicit His Excellency to proclaim the alteration above suggested with as little delay as possible.

HEATHCOTE AND WARANGA ROAD DISTRICT.

RULES and Regulations to conduct the proceedings of the Heathcote and Waranga District Road Board.

1. The business of the board shall be conducted with open doors.
2. The regular meetings of the board shall be held on the first Tuesday in each month, at half-past Eleven o'clock a.m., or as soon as a quorum of three is present; but should there be no quorum after the lapse of half an hour, the meeting shall lapse, a minute being taken of the members present.
3. Special meetings may be summoned by the clerk, upon his receiving a written requisition signed by three members stating the matter to be brought forward at such meeting. The clerk shall give notice thereof to each member, by post, seven clear days before such meeting.
4. The order of business shall be as follows:—
 1. Reading and confirming minutes.
 2. Reading copies of letters sent.
 3. Reading letters received, and ordering thereon.
 4. Reception and reading petitions.
 5. Reports of permanent committees.
 6. Reports of special committees.
 7. Orders of the day.
 8. Motions of which previous notice shall have been given.
 9. Giving notices of motion.
5. The minutes of a previous meeting, when confirmed, shall be signed by the chairman, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy.
6. All petitions addressed to the board must be presented by a member of the board, who shall be responsible for its being in proper form and respectfully worded.
7. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the board, and any business the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration. Any member may, however, bring forward any business he may think fit, a notice of motion having been given through the clerk seven clear days.
8. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member giving notice, or some member authorized by him, be present; notices not proceeded with shall be struck off the paper.
9. No bye-law shall be finally passed at the meeting at which it shall be first proposed, nor until the next monthly meeting of the board, and such bye-law shall in the meantime remain open for the inspection of the ratepayers, at the office of the board, free of all charge.
10. Any member shall have power to move for a call of the whole board to rescind any motion previously passed during the official year, and on such motion being carried, the clerk shall give notice thereof, by post, to each member.
11. Every member, including the chairman, shall stand while addressing the board.

12. In all matters of order or practice the chairman's ruling shall be final, and he shall state the same without comment or argument.

13. Every motion or amendment shall be entered on the minutes, with the name of the mover and seconder, and on a division thereon the votes shall be recorded.

14. One amendment only shall be discussed at a time; but if lost, another may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote.

15. All questions of the board shall be decided by open voting.

16. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment, and any business undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the board.

17. No motion, the effect of which would rescind a motion previously carried during the official year, shall be entertained, unless by a call of the board, and once negatived shall not again be introduced.

18. Any member using any offensive expression towards another member, shall, if required by the board, withdraw such expression, and make a satisfactory apology.

19. Any member may require the clerk to take down the particular words used by a member immediately on the same being used.

20. Any member of the board may enter his protest against any resolution of the board on the adoption of the resolution to be protested against, and the protest shall be entered in the minute book, and be signed by the member or members protesting.

21. Notices of motion may, in cases of emergency, be dispensed with, provided that not more than three members be absent.

22. No election for any office at the disposal of the board shall take place until six clear days' public notice shall have been given in the local papers inviting qualified applications.

23. All contracts shall be made by tender advertised twice in the local paper, unless the board shall otherwise direct. Tenders shall be endorsed and addressed to the chairman, and be only opened at the time of their consideration. The names of the tenderers, with the amount of tender, shall be entered on the minutes of the board. Where any tender shall exceed the sum of Fifty pounds, the tenderer, at his own cost, shall enter into a bond and find security for the due performance of his contract, which bond shall be signed by himself, two securities, and two members of the board.

24. No officer or member of the board shall have any pecuniary interest directly or indirectly in any contract of the board.

25. Payments will be made monthly by cheque, signed by two members of the board, countersigned by the clerk.

26. In all cases it shall be considered sufficient for the collector to call once for any assessment, and in the event of its not being paid before the expiration of one month, legal proceedings may be taken for its recovery.

27. The collector shall not less than once a week pay into the hands of the treasurer of the board all moneys received by him, and shall furnish the clerk with an account of such moneys.

28. The treasurer and collector shall present their accounts at each monthly meeting of the board.
