NOMINATION OF MANAGERS OF FARMERS' AND TOWNS COMMONS.

LIGHTHOUSE AT TANDJONG-KALÉAN, ISLAND OF BANKA.

THE accompanying Notice to Mariners, which has been received from the Consul for the Netherlands, is published for the information of navigators and others.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

The Rear-Admiral, Commandant of H.M. naval forces in the East Indies, and Inspector of Marino, informs navigators that on Tandjong-Kaléan, near Muntok, on the island of Banka, a standing white catadioptric lighthouse of the 2nd class has been put into working order, the light of which is placed on a stone tower 52 yards high, and may be seen at a distance of 5 German geographical miles.

The light burns every night from sunset to sunrise, and is to be seen at sea from all quarters. The tower is white; its summit and the lantern are painted red.

On the chart of Strait Banka, by Edeling (edition 1860), this light is marked in 105° 7' 30" E. and 2° 5' S.

The light serves—

1. In coming from the north, to enable the mariner to make in safety for the strait at 1½ to 2 German geographical miles to the west and north of the Fredrik Hendrik Rocks; sighting the light, he can safely sail between these rocks and the shore of Banka; also, coming out of the strait, and wanting to go north, he will be enabled, in sighting the light, to avoid all danger, and may at the same time pass in safety, provided he uses the lead between the Fredrik Hendrik Rocks and the shore of Sumatra.

2. The passage between the Kurrang Hadjie and Tandjong-Kaléan is by this light made available.

3. The light serves as a mark for the passage along the shore of Banka from Tandjong-Kaléan to Kurrang-Brom Brom on the one, and the Amalia Bank on the other, side, whilst one approaches in safety the 4th point of Sumatra on sighting the light. And—

4. The light of Tandjong-Kaléan will be serviceable as a beacon for ships bound for Palembang to make for the river by night.

ROBBERY UNDER ARMS.

FIFTY POUNDS REWARD.

WHEREAS at Eleven in the morning of Tuesday, the 8th of July instant, Timothy O'Connor and Adam Clauss were stopped at a spot in the mountains about twenty miles from Jamieson's Flat, by two armed men, one of whom fired two shots at O'Connor without effect, and then both tied them up and robbed them: And whereas at Three in the afternoon of the same day William S. Scott and George Wright were similarly detained; tied up, and robbed by the same offenders, at the same place: Notice is hereby given that a reward of Twenty-five pounds will be paid for such information as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of each of the said offenders.

His Excellency the Governor will also extend Her Majesty's free pardon to the least guilty of each of the said offenders, on his giving such information as shall secure the conviction of his companion.

PARTICULARS.

The first man (the man who fired at O'Connor) is described as 28 or 30 years of age, 5 feet 8 inches high, slight-built, with light sandy hair, reddish beard, moustache of about three weeks' growth, straight thin nose with a slight turn at the tip, brown eyes, and apparently near sighted. He wore a dark Sydney tweed shooting coat and trousers, blue duck thigh leggings like those occasionally worn by sailors, drab wideawake with black ribbon, and over his face a mask which fell off. He carried a large dark overcoat, a hammer-headed whip, and two Dean and Adams's revolvers.

The second man was about 5 feet 7 inches high, with blue sunken eyes, light eyebrows, and coarse voice. He wore a dark Sydney tweed jacket, Bedford cord trousers, and red nightcap with eye-holes. He carried two single pistols.

Both offenders were Englishmen. After the robbery they took the road towards Jamieson's Flat, leaving their victims tied up.

The property stolen is as follows:—From O'Connor 10 oz. 17 dwts. of gold, including a heart-shaped nugget of 2 oz. 7 dwts. with a hole in the small end, £2 cash, and a double-barrelled gun by Alexander Thompson, Edinburgh, stock broken and plated at the lock. From Clauss were taken about £6 cash, 22 dwts. of gold, and a pair of colonial Wellington boots with a cut from an axe on the left instep. From Scott were taken 13½ oz. of gold, £2 5s. cash, and a small single-barrelled gun about three feet long, London make, and stock worm-eaten.

LANDS TEMPORARILY RESERVED.

IT is hereby notified, in pursuance of the 9th section of the Act No. 145, that the Governor in Council has temporarily reserved from sale the lands hereinafter described for the several purposes specified in connection with each description, viz.:-

In the report for May, reference was made to the low rate of mortality which then obtained. The same remark equally applies to June, the daily averages of the two months being the same within a fraction. The mortality of June also contrasts very favorably with that of the same month in 1861 and 1860, as the deaths which took place (234) were less by 50 than those in June, 1861, and less by 46 than those in June, 1860.

The mean temperature for June was 48.8°, against 50.5° for the same month in 1861, and against 49.7° for the same period in 1860. The highest point attained by the thermometer (61°) was at 1 and 3 p.m. on the 20th, and its greatest descent (35.1°) was at 6 a.m. on the 16th, the range for the month thus being 25.9°. The daily range of temperature will be hereafter shown. The extremes of atmospheric pressure (30.586 in. and 29.412 in.) were respectively at 10 a.m. on the 15th and at midnight on the 1st, the range for the month being 1.174 in. The mean pressure for the month was 30.011 in. against 29.832 in. for June, 1861, and against 29.838 in. for June, 1860.

The mean temperature, number of deaths, and daily average of mortality for the first four weeks in June, were as follow:—

Of the 234 deaths as shown in the table above, those of males numbered 139, or rather over 59 per cent., whilst those of females numbered 95, or about 41 per cent. The deaths of children under five years of age were fewer than those of persons above that age, their respective numbers being 101 and 133, and their proportions 43 and 57 per cent. According to present experience, it is only during the cool months that the deaths of children under five are ever outnumbered by those of older children and adults, and even then the occurrence is a rare one. Since these reports were first issued, now upwards of two years and a half ago, it has only taken place four times; the most remarkable instance being in September, 1861, when only 40 per cent. of the deaths were of children under five. In the month corresponding with the one under review, in each of the last two years, the deaths occurring at the younger period of life have nearly, although not quite, reached the number of those at the older period.

Twelve deaths took place on the 23rd, 25th, 28th, and 30th, eleven on the 5th and 17th, and ten on the 3rd, 6th, and 13th; these were the highest numbers recorded during the month.

The most aged person returned as having died during the same period was a female of 76 years.

The fatal casualties which were recorded as having occurred during the month numbered eight, and resulted in the following manner:—On the 2nd instant, at Emerald Hill, a female child, aged 1 year, died from the effects of a burn; on the 3rd, at North Melbourne, a draper, aged 47, died by poison; on the 7th, at Smith's tannery, South Yarra, a woman was drowned; on the 18th, in Hobson's Bay, a mariner, aged 22, was also drowned; on the 21st, at the Melbourne Hospital, a woman, aged 40, died in consequence of fracture of the skull; on the 23rd, at Carlton, a male infant died of suffocation; on the same date, at the Melbourne Hospital, a woodcutter, aged 30, from the effects of a fractured skull; and on the 28th instant, in the River Yarra, the body of a man about 50 year of age was "found drowned."

The deaths which occurred in the public and charitable institutions were 54, or nearly 23 per cent. of the entire number recorded; they were thus returned:—Melbourne Hospital, 34; Lying-in Hospital, 4; Benevolent Asylum, 5; Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 6; Immigrants' Home, 2; Immigrants' Hospital, 1; Melbourne Gaol, 1; Western Gaol, 1.

Of the 101 deaths which took place among children under five years of age, 58, or rather more than 57 per cent., were of males, and 43, or rather less than 43 per cent., were of females; 60 were under one year old, 15 between one and two, 5 between two and three, 5 between three and four, and 7 between four and five.

The persons of five years of age and upwards who died during the month numbered 133, of whom 81, or rather less than 61 per cent., were males, and 52, or slightly over 39 per cent., females; 7 were between five and ten years of age, 4 between ten and fifteen, 7 between fifteen and twenty, 9 between twenty and twenty-five, 15 between twenty-five and thirty, 18 between thirty and thirty-five, 11 between thirty-five and forty, 22 between forty and forty-five, 13 between forty-five and fifty, 4 between fifty and fifty-five, 5 between fifty-five and sixty, 7 between sixty and sixty-five, 4 between sixty-five and seventy, 5 between seventy and seventy-five, 1 upwards of seventy-five, and 1 whose age was unspecified.

The deaths which occurred in the quarter under review numbered 739, against 971 in the corresponding quarter of 1861, and against 917 in the corresponding quarter of 1860.

At a meeting of the ratepayers, held at the Town Hall, on Thursday, 29th May, these gentlemen, with Mr. John Ahrens, were nominated for election; the show of hands being in favor of the three first named, a poll was demanded by Mr. Ahrens, which took place on the following day, resulting in the re-election of Councillor D. Turpie for three years, and Councillors A. F. Rowe and E. Steinfeld for two years respectively.

WORKS EXECUTED DURING THE HALF-YEAR.

- Construction of a bridge over the Canadian Creek, and making 13 chains of approaches thereto.
- Filling in the ground abutting on the Geelong road, near the Caledonian bridge, and making 11 superficial yards of pitched channelling.
- Repairing and making certain additions to Mount Pleasant bridge.
- Constructing a timber bridge at Peel street, and another at Barkly street, over the offlet drains of the Main road.
- Supplying and stacking 3363 cubic yards of metal on various streets of the municipality, for the purpose of maintenance.
- Lighting the streets of the municipality with gas and cleansing channels.

- Repairing and maintaining water mains and works in connection with water supply.
- Erecting posts on the newly surveyed lines of streets and reserves.
- Building the town hall, plastering and fitting up police court, fencing yard and erecting closets.

WORKS IN PROGRESS.

- Constructing a bridge over the storm-water channel at the junction of Wills and Mair streets.
- Making 32 chains of Peel and Rowe streets, and constructing a bridge over the Yarrooee River at the junction of those streets.
- Making 14 chains of Wills street and 4 chains of Davies street.
- Forming and draining the town hall yard and approach.

APPLICATIONS TO THE GOVERNMENT GRANTED.

That the portion of Mair street within this municipality may be gazetted as Wills street, in memory of the late Mr. W. J. Wills, of the Victorian Exploration Expedition.

APPLICATIONS TO THE GOVERNMENT UNDER CONSIDERATION.

Cemetery.—That, as by the 18 Victoria, clause 27, the care and management of cemeteries is vested in the municipal council, the sum of £115 7s. 9d. awarded by the Board of Land and Works for fencing and improving the Ballaarat East Cemetery may be paid over to the council to expend for that purpose; and, also, that an additional sum may be awarded, the first being altogether insufficient for the purpose, and that the members of the council for the time being be gazetted as trustees of the same.—Submitted for the decision of His Excellency the Governor.

- That the pitching with bluestone of the channels on both sides of the Main road may be completed, and raised to proper levels for drainage.
- That a railway station be erected at Warrenheip.

SURVEY OF THE STREETS AND RESERVES.

The council cannot but remark with regret the slowness with which this work has been carried on by the Survey Department; although the municipality has been established five years, the council has been unable to obtain a complete survey of even the inhabited portion of it, the chief thoroughfares only of the municipality having been placed on a map; but relying on the promises of the district surveyor, who has been employed on the work during the last fifteen months, the council hopes very shortly to be in possession of a complete map of the work, by which means the present residents, and those desirous of locating in the district, will be able to adapt their buildings to the lines of streets.

RAILWAY.

The Geelong and Ballaarat Railway was opened by His Excellency Sir Henry Barkly, on the 10th April, in person, accompanied by the members of the Executive Government and both Houses of Parliament. The stations for Ballaarat East are being completed; the bridge and approaches at Queen street have been constructed, and the foot crossing between Queen street and the Victoria bridges has been commenced; but the council regret that the Railway Department has deemed it advisable to refuse the request of the inhabitants and the council for the construction of a crossing over the railway between the Victoria bridge and Warrenheip, a distance of nearly three miles.

STORM-WATER AND SLUDGE CHANNEL.

During the past six months the Government has taken a contract for and carried out the works of forming and completing the inlet and offlet drains to the Main road, at a cost of over five thousand pounds; and it is most earnestly hoped by the council that no delay will be allowed to take place in completing the Main channel and the Yarrooee cutting, down to the proposed point beyond the White Flat bridge, by which means alone the benefits to be derived from the work already done will be realized, and a large amount of property secured from injury by floods. The necessity of the work having been fully recognized by the Government, and the Honorable J. B. Humfray, M.L.A., when minister of mines, and since that time having given the council every encouragement to anticipate its uninterrupted completion, by which means the council trusts that the district will be spared the annual losses it has hitherto sustained for many years by floods.

WATER SUPPLY.

During the past unusually dry summer this council, in conjunction with the Western Council, learned with much alarm and anxiety that the water supply from Yuillo's Swamp was nearly exhausted, and that a continuation of the same weather for another fortnight would have resulted in depriving this populous district of water, excepting such as could be obtained by pumping from the shafts of certain mining companies. Provision for so doing was made as a last resource, but the rainfall which took place prevented the necessity of adopting this means of supply. The fearful calamity which was escaped caused the councils, with the aid of the representatives of the districts, to press more urgently than heretofore on the Government the necessity of providing a permanent supply without further delay. After much negotiation it has been finally arranged that the Government will give to the councils, on account of the supply, the sum of £10,000, and the works already carried out in connection with Kirk's dam, also the necessary reserves of land, the municipalities to bear the balance of the cost of carrying out the works, the total expense of which is estimated at £25,000. The council would congratulate the inhabitants on the prospect this arrangement offers of speedily obtaining an ample supply of water, by which means their health, comfort, and prosperity will be in a great degree secured.

MUNICIPALITY OF HAMILTON.

FIFTH Half-yearly Report of the proceedings of the Municipal Council, ending 25th June, 1862.

At the annual election, held 26th December, 1861, Messrs. J. Nunn, A. Learmonth, and J. Wilson were elected; and on the 23rd April, Messrs. G. W. Harris and E. Wadley were elected in the room of Councillors McDougall and Laidlaw, resigned.

During the half-year the council held twenty-four meetings, and three meetings lapsed through a want of a quorum. Councillor Learmonth (the chairman), attended 18; Councillor Nunn, 16; Councillor Wilson, 22; Councillor Cameron, 11; Councillor Cox, 8; Councillor McDougall, 6 out of 13; Councillor Laidlaw, 9 out of 13; Councillor Harris, 5 out of 9; and Councillor Wadley, 6 out of 9.

The following public works, with others of minor importance, have been completed:—Forming and metalling 26 chains 75 links of streets, and 53 chains additional are nearly finished.

Bye-laws, No. 8, "For levying a rate of One shilling in the pound, &c.," and No. 9, "To prevent accidents from fire, through stacks of hay being left uncovered," have been gazetted.

The Government has granted a site for a town hall, but has twice refused to place a sum of money on the estimates to supply the town with water. The council has, however, again renewed the application.
