NOMINATION OF MANAGERS OF FARMERS' AND TOWNS COMMONS.

THE SHELFORD ROAD DISTRICT ALTERED.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the nineteenth day of August, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, the boundaries of "The Shelford Road District" were defined as therein mentioned: And whereas it is deemed necessary and advisable that the boundaries of such district should be altered: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke so much of the said Proclamation as defines the boundaries of the said district; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby proclaim and declare that the boundaries of the said Shelford Road District shall be the boundaries hereinafter specified, that is to say:—

Commencing at a point on the north boundary of the parish of Murghoboluc where it is intersected by the western boundary of the Geelong and Ballarat Railway; thence by a line north-westerly by the western boundary of the said railway to the northern boundary of the Upper Western road; thence westerly by the northern boundary of the said road to the eastern boundary of the parish of Burkwarrah; thence north to the north-east angle of the said parish; thence west by the north boundary of the said parish and a direct line to the centre of the Yarrowee River; thence north-westerly by the centre of the said river to the north-east angle of the parish of Lawaluk; thence due west to the centre of the Little Woody Yaloak Creek; thence southerly by the centre of the said creek to the centre of the Woody Yaloak River; thence by the centre of the Woody Yaloak River southerly to the centre of the Cressy and Foxhow road; thence easterly by the centre of the said road through Cressy to the centre of the Geelong and Cressy road; thence easterly by the centre of the Geelong and Cressy road to the western boundary of the parish of Wingeel; thence south by the western boundaries of the parishes of Wingeel and Hesse to the north boundary of the parish of Warracabarunah; thence east to the western boundary of the parish of Murdeduke; thence by the western boundary of the parish of Murdeduke northward to the centre of the Warramine Creek; thence easterly by the centre of the Warramine Creek to a point due south of the south-west angle of block 34, in the parish of Carrah; thence by a line north to the south-west angle of the said block 34, in the said parish; thence by the west boundary of the said block 34 to its north-western angle; thence by a direct line north-easterly to the south-west angle of Russell, Bell, and Gray's pre-emptive right; thence north to the north-west angle of the said pre-emptive right; thence east by the north boundary of the said pre-emptive right and a direct line to the north-west angle of the parish of Murghoboluc; thence east by the northern boundary of the parish of Murghoboluc to the commencing point.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-ninth day of July, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and in the twenty-sixth year of Her Majesty's reign.

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point north of the north-east angle of the parish of Lancefield; thence south to the north-east angle of the parish of Lancefield; thence southerly to the eastern boundary of the parishes of Lancefield and Monegeetta to the south-east angle of the parish of Monegeetta; thence west to the north-west angle of the parish of Havelock; thence to a point in the centre of the Lancefield road west of the said north-west angle; thence southerly by the centre of the Lancefield road to the northern boundary of the parish of Bolinda; thence east to the commencing point.

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Springfield Road District."

Commencing at a point in the northern boundary of the county of Bourke, north of the north-east angle of the parish of Lancefield; thence south to the north-east angle of the said parish; thence southerly by the eastern boundaries of the parishes of Lancefield and Monegeetta to the south-east angle of the parish of Monegeetta; thence west by the south boundary of the said parish to a point in the centre of the Lancefield road west of the south-west angle of the parish of Havelock; thence southerly by the centre of the said road to the northern boundary of the parish of Bolinda; thence west to the north-eastern boundary of the Mount Alexander Railway; thence north-westerly by the north-eastern boundary of the said railway to a point in the said boundary due south of a point in the centre of the Ballando Creek, which is due west of the southern boundary of section A, in the parish of Havelock; thence by a direct line north-westerly to the south-west angle of Brock's pre-emptive right; thence north to the south-west boundary of the parish of Monegeetta; thence by the south-west, the west, and part of the northern boundaries of the said parish to the south-west angle of the parish of Lancefield; thence north by the western boundary of the said parish and a direct line to the northern boundary of the county of Bourke; thence easterly by the said county boundary to the commencing point.

MUNICIPALITY OF KILMORE.

BYE-LAW No. 29.—TO ENABLE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF KILMORE TO ELECT MANAGERS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE KILMORE TOWN OR MUNICIPAL COMMON, TO FIX THE TIME AND MANNER OF THEIR ELECTION, AND TO REMOVE SUCH MANAGERS AND TO ELECT OTHERS IN THEIR STEAD.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the council of any municipal district may make bye-laws for the conducting of elections: And whereas by an Act of His Excellency the Governor and Parliament of Victoria, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the sale and occupation of Crown Lands*, 25 Victoria No. 145, section 69, power is given to the municipal council of any municipal district within or in the vicinity of which any town or municipal common is situated shall elect annually in such manner as they may be by-laws prescribe three persons to be managers of such town or municipal common, and may at any time remove any one or more of such managers, and elect others in their stead: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Kilmore, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the election of managers for the management of the Kilmore municipal common shall be held and conducted at the time and in the manner following:—

1. That the election for the appointment of managers for the management of the Kilmore municipal common shall be held annually in the Municipal Council Chamber, Kilmore, on the first Monday of September in each year, at Eight o'clock in the evening of said day.
2. That the election shall be conducted by ballot.
3. That should any manager be removed by order of the municipal council of Kilmore, a meeting for the election of a

successor to the manager so removed shall be held within one month from the date of such removal, the day for holding such meeting to be appointed at the regular meeting of the council which shall be held next after the date of the removal of a manager as aforesaid; such meeting to be held at the same hour and place, and conducted in the same manner as provided for at the annual meeting for the election of managers as hereinbefore provided.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 29, made by the municipal council of Kilmore, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF MALMSBURY.

BYE-LAW No. 4.—A BYE-LAW FOR CONDUCTING PUBLIC MEETINGS OF THE RATEPAYERS AND ELECTIONS OF MEMBERS OF COUNCIL, AND ALSO FOR REGULATING THE PROCEEDINGS AT THE ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN.

AT all public meetings of the ratepayers, in the absence of the chairman, the senior council then present shall preside.

2. In any polling place, no person other than the chairman, the town clerk or his deputy, the scrutineers, or electors who shall for the time being be tendering their votes, shall be entitled to be present; and it is hereby provided that it shall always be lawful for the chairman, the town clerk or his deputy, to summon to his assistance in such compartment or room any member or members of the police force, for the purpose of preserving the public peace, quelling any breach thereof that may have arisen, and for removing out of such room any person or persons who may, in his opinion, be obstructing the polling or wilfully violating any of the provisions of this section of this bye-law.

3. The chairman shall cause to be provided for the purpose of such election a locked-up box, of which he shall keep the key, with a cleft or opening therein capable of receiving the voting papers, and which box shall stand in front of the chairman; and each elector shall receive from the chairman a voting paper in the form in the schedule herunto annexed, and shall thereupon retire to a stall or compartment provided for that purpose, and there strike out the name or names of such candidates as he does not intend to vote for, and deposit the same in the ballot-box, in the presence of the chairman, town clerk or his deputy, and scrutineers; and in case such elector shall be unable to read, or be blind, he shall signify the same to the chairman, who shall thereupon mark or strike out the names of such candidates as such elector shall designate; and no elector shall take out of such polling place any such voting paper either before or after he has marked the same.

4. Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint, by writing under his hand, to be delivered to the chairman at any time before Eight o'clock in the morning of the day of polling, one scrutineer to be present on his behalf in the polling place.

5. The chairman may put to any person, before he shall have received his voting paper, the following questions:—

First. What is your name and surname?

Second. Are you twenty-one years of age?

Third. Are you a ratepayer on the ratepayers' roll of the municipal district of Malmsbury?

Fourth. Have you paid all rates levied upon you except such as shall have become payable by you within six months before this election?

6. At every election it shall be the duty of the town clerk or his deputy to provide himself with the ratepayers' roll, and as each elector comes forward to demand his voting paper to see whether the name of such elector appears upon the roll as a ratepayer within the meaning of the Municipal Act, and as each elector deposits his voting paper within the ballot-box to mark off such elector's name as having voted at such election.

7. In case the voting paper as of any person shall have been received, and any other person shall afterwards demand his voting paper as of the same person, the chairman, when such person shall propose to deposit his voting paper in the ballot-box, shall refuse to allow the same to be put therein, but shall receive and keep the same apart, and at the close of the election decide whether such person has already voted or not, and his decision shall be final and conclusive on all parties; and if it shall appear to the chairman that such person has not already voted at such election, such vote shall be added to the number already polled, but if otherwise such vote shall not be allowed.

8. At the close of the poll, or as soon after as conveniently may be, the chairman, in the presence of the town clerk or his deputy, and the scrutineers, shall count the number of votes polled for each candidate, and upon ascertaining the result shall make the same publicly known, and cause to be affixed a notice thereof in one or more places of public resort; and the chairman shall then, in the presence of the town clerk or his deputy, and the scrutineers, seal up all the voting papers given during the election, and safely preserve them among the records of the council.

9. The chairman of the council shall be annually elected in the following manner:—At the first meeting of the council after the annual election, which meeting shall be convened by the retiring chairman or the person presiding at the annual election, the senior councillor then present shall take the chair at the hour mentioned in the notice calling the meeting, provided the whole council be present, otherwise at the expiry of half an hour thereafter; and the council shall proceed, by open voting on motion as usual, to elect a chairman for the current year; and the councillor in whose favor the show of hands shall be, shall be declared by the acting chairman to be chairman of the council for the current year, and shall take the chair accordingly.

10. If the result of voting for chairman should be that the highest number of votes is held equally by more than two councillors, then another voting shall take place for those councillors only having such equality of votes, until a majority is recorded.

11. Upon the resignation or disqualification of the chairman of the council, at the next meeting of the council thereafter the senior councillor then present shall take the chair *pro tem.*, and immediately after the confirmation of the minutes of the preceding meeting, shall proceed to the election of a chairman of council for the residue of the municipal year, in a manner prescribed by this bye-law.

12. In determining the seniority of councillors for the purpose of this bye-law, it shall be understood to mean those councillors who shall have held office for the longest period without re-election, and having the greatest number of votes when elected.

13. Any person neglecting or refusing to comply with, or infringing any of the provisions of this bye-law, on conviction before two or more justices of the peace, shall forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

The voter is to strike out the name or names of the candidate or candidates for whom he does not intend to vote, by drawing a line through the same with a pen.

The ballot paper, being marked, is to be dropped by him into the ballot-box.

The voter is not permitted to take his ballot paper out of the polling place.

MUNICIPALITY OF SANDRIDGE.

BYE-LAW No. 18.—FOR PROHIBITING DAMAGE TO THE PUBLIC FOOTPATHS AND WATER-COURSES, AND FOR REGULATING THE FORMATION OF CROSSINGS OVER FOOTPATHS AND WATER-COURSES.

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted, that every municipal council shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets, paths, and public thoroughfares, and shall and may make bye-laws for carrying out these objects: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Sandridge, with the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of Victoria—

1. No person or persons shall ride, drive, or lead any horse or beast, nor shall drive or wheel any cart, barrow, carriage, or other vehicle, upon or across any of the public footpaths within the district, nor in any way damage, or cause to be damaged, the said footpaths, or any of them, nor in any way damage, or cause to be damaged, the public water-courses, or any of them.

2. Every owner or occupier of any gateway, yard, lane, or right-of-way to which access by horses, beasts, carriages, or other vehicles can be obtained only by riding, leading, or wheeling upon or across any of the said public footpaths or water-courses, who shall make and maintain such crossing or crossings over the said public footpaths and water-courses, or any of them, as may be necessary for approach and access to any such gateway, yard, lane, or right-of-way, in the manner hereinafter described, at the expense of such owner or occupier, and under the superintendence of the municipal surveyor, or such other officer as the municipal council may appoint in this behalf, shall be allowed to use such crossing without being liable to the penalty hereinafter provided.

3. In streets where a stone or wood korb is now or hereafter may be laid, every such crossing as aforesaid, when required, shall be paved with stone or wood pavement the whole width of the footpath from the building line to the pavement of the water-channel in cases where the said channel is or shall be paved, and in cases where the water-channel shall not be paved then as far as to the kerbing of the footpath, and shall be enclosed on both sides with a stone or wood kerb of the same size and description as the street kerbing, and the water-channel must not in any way be altered or obstructed. In cases where the water-channel is not paved, the street kerbing need not be removed, but a wooden bridge shall be placed across the channel in the manner hereinafter provided.

4. In streets where a footpath and water-channel are or may hereafter be formed, and where no kerbing is laid, suitable wooden bridges must be provided and fixed over the water-channel, so as to leave a free passage for the water underneath said bridges, which may project into the public roadway not less than four feet from the outer edge of the footpath.

5. The owners or occupiers of any buildings or premises shall not cause or suffer any water to be discharged on to or over any public footpaths, but such owners or occupiers, or any of them, may make and maintain such drains leading through and under the adjoining path as shall be necessary to discharge the water from such building or premises into the public water-channels at the expense of such owners or occupiers, under the superin-

tendance aforesaid, and with the consent of the municipal council first had and obtained, without being liable to the penalty hereinafter mentioned.

6. Any person or persons guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20).

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 18, made by the municipal council of Sandridge, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

HORSHAM ROAD DISTRICT.
RULES TO REGULATE THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE HORSHAM DISTRICT ROAD BOARD.

Order of Proceedings.

THE business of the board shall be conducted on all occasions with open doors.

2. The board shall sit and commence business on the first Thursday in each month, so soon after Two o'clock p.m. as there are a sufficient number of members in attendance to constitute a quorum; but if at the expiry of half an hour from the time specified in the circular there is not a quorum present, the meeting shall stand adjourned to the following Thursday. Five members shall form a quorum.

3. At all meetings of the board when there is not five members present, or when the board is counted out, such circumstance, together with the names of the members there present, shall be recorded in the minute book.

4. The minutes of any preceding meeting not previously confirmed shall be read, as the first business, at all meetings of the board, in order to their confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereupon, except as to their accuracy as a record of their proceedings.

5. At all meetings of the board the reading of correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day, and bringing up of reports of committees, shall have precedence of the regular business.

6. Every communication addressed to the board shall be in proper form, and presented by one of its members or the secretary, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.

7. On the presentation of a petition no debate shall take place thereon, and the only question that shall be entertained on the occasion of its presentation shall be that the petition be received and taken into consideration after the orders of the day, or at any future meeting, or, if necessary, that it be referred to a committee.

8. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the board, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration. Any member of the board may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable, in the form of notice of motion; no such motion, however, shall be decided on at any meeting of the board unless notice thereof shall have been given to the secretary in writing by the member bringing it forward, at the meeting previous to that in which the same shall be taken into consideration.

9. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorized by him, be present when the business is called in order. Notices of motion not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.

10. No bye-law shall be finally passed or adopted at the meeting at which it shall have been first proposed, nor until the next meeting.

11. No motion proposing any petition, address, bye-law, or standing order, shall be entertained unless the mover shall submit therewith a draft of such petition, bye-law, or standing order.

12. The mover of any motion which may be referred to a committee shall be a member of such committee.

13. Special meetings shall be summoned at any time by the secretary, upon receiving a requisition signed by two members, stating the matter to be discussed at such meeting.

14. No special meeting shall be held unless the secretary shall have given notice thereof, by post, five clear days before such meeting.

Order of Debate.

15. The presiding chairman's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument.

16. Every motion or amendment shall be entered in the minutes, with the name of the mover and seconder, and on a division thereon the votes shall be recorded.

17. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost another may be moved before the original is put to the vote.

18. Any member proposing a motion or amendment, or if speaking on any matter, must rise and address the chairman. No member, when speaking, shall be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down, in which case the member calling to order shall be heard thereon in preference to any other; and the question of order shall be disposed of by the chairman before the subject is resumed or any other matter entered upon.

19. All questions before the board shall be decided by open voting, unless a motion for any particular question is made and carried that it shall be by ballot.

20. No discussion will be allowed on any matter of adjournment of the board, but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be

allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the board.

21. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the board, shall be entertained during the same year, unless a call of the whole board has been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the board which shall have been negatived by the board shall be again entertained during the same year.

22. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same motion or amendment, except by way of explanation, or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment last proposed; and the chairman shall, without waiting for the interposition of the board, call to order any member proceeding to speak a third time on the same motion or amendment.

23. Any member moving or seconding any motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken on that motion or amendment.

Contracts.

24. All contracts shall be made by tender, advertised not less than twice in the Melbourne *Argus* and *Ararat Advertiser*, also by printed notices at court house and police offices; each tender shall be addressed to the chairman, and not opened until the appointed time. The respective amounts, together with the names of the parties tendering, to be entered in every case on the minutes of the board; and when tenders are accepted, a contract bond shall be entered into, signed by the contractor and by two members of the board, one of whom shall be the chairman of the board, or, in his absence, the chairman of the meeting at which such tender is accepted, and the expense of preparing such bond shall in all cases be borne by the person or persons giving the same.

25. No officer or member of the board shall have any pecuniary interest, either directly or indirectly, in any contract under the board.

Payments of Money.

26. All payments shall be made by cheque, signed by the chairman and one other member of the board, and countersigned by the secretary, and no such cheques shall be given unless they be passed at a regular meeting of the board.

Local Assessment.

27. In all cases it shall be considered sufficient for the collector to apply once for payment of any amount due on the assessment roll, and in the event of any such amount not being paid to him, a notice shall be left, stating that unless the amount be paid to the collector of the board before the expiration of one month, from the date thereof, legal proceedings will be taken for the recovery.

28. The collector shall pay into the treasurer's hands all moneys collected, immediately after such collection.

29. The treasurer shall place all money received from the collector to the credit of the board in the Oriental Bank, Pleasant Creek, until a local branch of bank is established in Horsham.

30. The collector and treasurer shall present their accounts at each meeting of the board.

at the hour of o'clock in the fore (or after) noon.

And the said board shall have the power of adjourning the hearing of the said application from time to time as occasion shall require.

2. *Notice of application.*—The parties making such application shall, fourteen days previous to the day fixed for the hearing thereof, affix on each of two conspicuous parts of the reef or ground on which it is proposed that the drainage should be effected, a copy of the said application, with subjoined thereto a notice in the form in the second schedule hereunto annexed, and shall also cause a copy of such application and notice to be inserted in each of two successive publications of the local newspaper published in this district nearest to the said reef or ground.

3. *Application to registrar for plan.*—Previous to the depositing as aforesaid of such application, the parties making the same shall apply to the mining registrar of the division wherein such reef or ground shall be situate, to make a plan thereof, which plan, together with the report hereinafter mentioned, shall, with the said application, be lodged with the said clerk, who shall file the same in his office, and shall permit the same to be inspected during office hours by all persons interested in the intended drainage.

4. *Mining registrar to make surveys, &c.*—The mining registrar shall, on being applied to as aforesaid, survey the reef or ground, the plan whereof he shall be so applied to make, and he shall make such plan or plans thereof, fixing and defining the limits or boundaries over which the applicants desire the intended drainage committee to have jurisdiction, showing the number of claims liable to be assessed, the area therein occupied, the natural water level, drawn to a scale of one chain to half an inch; and shall, on making such survey, connect the same with some point so as to secure its identity. The mining registrar shall also furnish a list of the names of the holders of claims likely to be assessed, and the quantity of ground held or occupied by each; also a specification of the manner by which the applicants propose to drain the said ground, whether by machinery or otherwise, with a report on the general features of the ground and drainage requirements. He shall also define the limits or boundaries of the said reef or ground by placing at each angle of the same good and substantial posts, to be supplied by the applicants, not less than six feet high by twelve inches in diameter, and cutting a V trench extending six feet therefrom, showing boundary lines.

5. *Objections.*—Any person or persons liable to be affected by the drainage proposed in any application, who shall object to the appointment of any drainage committee, shall give notice in writing, in the form in the third schedule hereunto annexed, to one or more of the persons whose signatures are attached to such application, a copy of which shall be lodged with the clerk of the mining board; and any such notice shall be given and lodged as aforesaid seven days previous to the day appointed for the hearing of such application.

6. *Hearing of application.*—Upon the day fixed for the hearing of such application, or upon any day to which such hearing shall be adjourned, the mining board, upon hearing the same, and the said applicants and objectors, if any, shall make such decision in the matter of such application as shall seem fit; and in case such application shall be granted, the holder of, or shareholder in, a claim likely to be charged with the expense of such drainage, or with any part thereof, may propose one or more than one such holder or shareholder (producing at the same time the consent, in writing, to act of each holder or shareholder so proposed) to act as a member or members of the intended drainage committee; and from the persons so proposed the said board shall select the persons who are to form the said committee, and shall proceed to fix and define the limits or boundaries of the jurisdiction of such committee; and the clerk of the said board shall make in the minute book of the said board a memorandum of the names of the persons so selected, and of such limits or boundaries, and stating that such persons were on that day established a drainage committee under the said Act, to act within the said limits or boundaries; and upon the making of such memorandum the persons so selected shall be a committee for drainage purposes within such limits or boundaries within the meaning of the said Act; provided that notwithstanding any vacancy in the said committee the members thereof from time to time existing shall be deemed to be the drainage committee established under the said Act.

7. *Vacancies amongst members of committees.*—In case of a vacancy amongst the persons so selected, by death, resignation, or otherwise, it shall be lawful for any person interested in such drainage to apply to the said board for the appointment of a person to fill such vacancy, such application to be in writing, in the form in the fifth schedule hereunto annexed, and to be deposited with the said clerk; and the said clerk shall, upon receiving the said application, act with respect thereto in the manner hereinbefore provided in respect of an application for a drainage committee; and the said board shall have the power of adjourning the hearing of such last-mentioned application from time to time as occasion shall require.

8. *Notice of application to fill vacancies.*—The person making such last-mentioned application shall, fourteen days previous to the day fixed for the hearing thereof, affix on each of two conspicuous parts of the reef or ground where such drainage is to be or is being effected, a copy of the said last-mentioned application, with subjoined thereto a notice in the form in the sixth schedule hereunto annexed; and shall also cause a copy of such application and notice to be inserted in each of two successive publications of the local newspaper published in this district nearest to the said reef or ground.

9. *Hearing of such application.*—Upon the day fixed for the hearing of such last-mentioned application, any holder of, or shareholder in, a claim chargeable or likely to be charged with the expense of such drainage, or with any part thereof, may propose one or more than one such holder or shareholder to fill up

any such vacancy; and from the persons so proposed the said board shall, after making such enquiries and hearing such persons as they shall think right, select such person as shall be deemed the most fit for such purpose, or in case one person only shall be so proposed, shall appoint such one person to fill such vacancy; and the said clerk shall make in the said minute book a memorandum of the name of the person so selected or appointed, and that he was selected or appointed to supply the said vacancy amongst the members of the drainage committee in respect of which he shall have been so selected or appointed. And upon the making of such memorandum, such person shall be a member of the said drainage committee as fully, and to all intents and purposes, as if he had been appointed *ab initio*.

10. *Duties of mining registrars.*—The mining registrar of the respective divisions of this district, on his or their attention being called thereto, or on it appearing to any mining registrar that any ground situate in any part of his division requires to be dealt with under any drainage bye-laws, shall make a report thereof to the mining board, calling their attention thereto, and setting forth the general features of the ground and drainage requirements. The mining registrar shall, on receiving instructions from the board in pursuance of such report, post one or more notices, in the form in the fourth schedule hereunto annexed, on some conspicuous parts of the ground proposed to be drained; and at the expiration of fourteen days from the date thereof the mining board may proceed to pass bye-laws for enforcing, regulating, and carrying out the drainage of any such ground, and for imposing on claims such fees or charges as may be considered necessary, unless before the expiration of the said fourteen days an application shall have been made to the mining board for the establishment of a drainage committee.

11. *Mining registrar's fees.*—The fees to be paid to the mining registrar by any such applicants, and which he may demand, shall be as follows:—

RETIREMENT BY ROTATION AND ELECTION.

Councillors A. F. Rowe, D. Turpie, and E. Steinfeld were the members of the council to retire by rotation at the end of the year. At a meeting of the ratepayers, held at the Town Hall,

on Thursday, 29th May, these gentlemen, with Mr. John Ahrens, were nominated for election; the show of hands being in favor of the three first named, a poll was demanded by Mr. Ahrens, which took place on the following day, resulting in the re-election of Councillor D. Turpie for three years, and Councillors A. F. Rowe and E. Steinfeld for two years respectively.

WORKS EXECUTED DURING THE HALF-YEAR.

Construction of a bridge over the Canadian Creek, and making 18 chains of approaches thereto.

Filling in the ground abutting on the Geelong road, near the Caledonian bridge, and making 11 superficial yards of pitched channelling.

Repairing and making certain additions to Mount Pleasant bridge.

Constructing a timber bridge at Peel street, and another at Barkly street, over the outlet drains of the Main road.

Supplying and stacking 3363 cubic yards of metal on various streets of the municipality, for the purpose of maintenance.

Lighting the streets of the municipality with gas and cleansing channels.

Repairing and maintaining water mains and works in connection with water supply.

Erecting posts on the newly surveyed lines of streets and reserves.

Building the town hall, plastering and fitting up police court, fencing yard and erecting closets.

WORKS IN PROGRESS.

Constructing a bridge over the storm-water channel at the junction of Wills and Mair streets.

Making 32 chains of Peel and Rowe streets, and constructing a bridge over the Yarroovee River at the junction of those streets.

Making 14 chains of Wills street and 4 chains of Davies street.

Forming and draining the town hall yard and approach.

APPLICATIONS TO THE GOVERNMENT GRANTED.

That the portion of Mair street within this municipality may be gazetted as Wills street, in memory of the late Mr. W. J. Wills, of the Victorian Exploration Expedition.

APPLICATIONS TO THE GOVERNMENT UNDER CONSIDERATION.

Cemetery.—That, as by the 18 Victoria, clause 27, the care and management of cemeteries is vested in the municipal council, the sum of £1157s. 9d. awarded by the Board of Land and Works for fencing and improving the Ballarat East Cemetery may be paid over to the council to expend for that purpose; and, also, that an additional sum may be awarded, the first being altogether insufficient for the purpose, and that the members of the council for the time being be gazetted as trustees of the same.—Submitted for the decision of His Excellency the Governor.

That the pitching with bluestone of the channels on both sides of the Main road may be completed, and raised to proper levels for drainage.

That a railway station be erected at Warrenheip.

SURVEY OF THE STREETS AND RESERVES.

The council cannot but remark with regret the slowness with which this work has been carried on by the Survey Department; although the municipality has been established five years, the council has been unable to obtain a complete survey of even the inhabited portion of it, the chief thoroughfares only of the municipality having been placed on a map; but relying on the promises of the district surveyor, who has been employed on the work during the last fifteen months, the council hopes very shortly to be in possession of a complete map of the work, by which means the present residents, and those desirous of locating in the district, will be able to adapt their buildings to the lines of streets.

RAILWAY.

The Geelong and Ballarat Railway was opened by His Excellency Sir Henry Barkly, on the 10th April, in person, accompanied by the members of the Executive Government and both Houses of Parliament. The stations for Ballarat East are being completed; the bridge and approaches at Queen street have been constructed, and the foot crossing between Queen street and the Victoria bridges has been commenced; but the council regret that the Railway Department has deemed it advisable to refuse the request of the inhabitants and the council for the construction of a crossing over the railway between the Victoria bridge and Warrenheip, a distance of nearly three miles.

STORM WATER AND SLUDGE CHANNEL.

During the past six months the Government has taken a contract for and carried out the works of forming and completing the inlet and outlet drains to the Main road, at a cost of over Five thousand pounds; and it is most earnestly hoped by the council that no delay will be allowed to take place in completing the Main channel and the Yarroovee cutting, down to the proposed point beyond the White Flat bridge, by which means alone the benefits to be derived from the work already done will be realized, and a large amount of property secured from injury by floods. The necessity of the work having been fully recognized by the Government, and the Honorable J. B. Humfray, M.L.A., when minister of mines, and since that time having given the council every encouragement to anticipate its uninterrupted completion, by which means the council trusts that the district will be spared the annual losses it has hitherto sustained for many years by floods.

WATER SUPPLY.

During the past unusually dry summer this council, in conjunction with the Western Council, learned with much alarm and anxiety that the water supply from Yuille's Swamp was nearly exhausted, and that a continuation of the same weather for another fortnight would have resulted in depriving this populous district of water, excepting such as could be obtained

by pumping from the shafts of certain mining companies. Provision for so doing was made as a last resource, but the rainfall which took place prevented the necessity of adopting this means of supply. The fearful calamity which was escaped caused the councils, with the aid of the representatives of the districts, to press more urgently than heretofore on the Government the necessity of providing a permanent supply without further delay. After much negotiation it has been finally arranged that the Government will give to the councils, on account of the supply, the sum of £10,000, and the works already carried out in connection with Kirk's dam, also the necessary reserves of land, the municipalities to bear the balance of the cost of carrying out the works, the total expense of which is estimated at £25,000. The council would congratulate the inhabitants on the prospect this arrangement offers of speedily obtaining an ample supply of water, by which means their health, comfort, and prosperity will be in a great degree secured.

Councillors Martin, Matthews, and Lowe, retiring in rotation this year, the election resulted in Councillor Martin being re-elected, and the return of Councillors Batten and Southey.

Since the election one meeting has been held, at which the whole council were present, and Councillor Powell was elected chairman.

As it will be seen by the balance sheet, the council have been actively carrying out works on the various roads in the district. A pump has been erected near the breakwater for the use of the ratepayers.

A further donation has been presented to the hospital, by means of which medical aid has been obtained for deserving objects.

A second donation has been made to the trustees of the Queen's Gardens.

The junction of the Germantown and Colac roads has received the attention of the council, and it is expected this necessary work will shortly be accomplished.

The Conewarre Road Board having applied that the traffic on the four main roads might be retaken, such has been done, and the returns show a marked increase on the Mount Colite road.

The council have to thank the Barrabool Road Board for granting permission for contractors to pass toll free with materials for making and repairing roads, as well as to that board, and also to the Conewarre Board, for granting permission to procure materials in their districts.

The tolls at the Barwon bridge and breakwater have been re-let to the lessee, Mr. Callaghan, for £41 10s. per week.

Several contracts are in progress on the four main roads specially depending on the toll funds, and further tenders are about being called for.

The Half-yearly Health Reports, which have been favorable, and other returns to Government, have been duly made.



