BYE-LAW NO. 29.—TO ENABLE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF KILMORE TO ELECT MANAGERS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE KILMORE TOWN OR MUNICIPAL COMMON, TO FIX THE TIME AND MANNES OF THEIR ELECTION, AND TO REMOVE SUCH MANAGERS AND TO ELECT OTHERS IN THEIR

REMOVE SUCH MANAGERS AND TO ELECT OTHERS IN THEIR STEAD.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, initialled, An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria, it is amongst other things enacted, that the council of any municipal district may make bye-laws for the conducting of elections: And whereas by an Act of His Excellency the Governor and Parliament of Victoria, intituled, An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the sale and occupation of Crown Lands, 25 Victoria No. 145, section 69, power is given to the municipal council of any municipal district within or in the vicinity of which any town or municipal common is situated shall elect annually in such manner as they may be bye-laws prescribe three persons to be managers of such town or municipal common, and may at any time remove any one or more of such managers, and elect others in their stead: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Kilmore, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the election of managers for the management of the Kilmore municipal common shall be held and conducted at the time and in the manner following:—

1. That the election for the appointment of managers for the management of the Kilmore municipal common shall be held annually in the Municipal Council Chamber, Kilmore, on the first Monday of September in each year, at Eight o'clock in the evening of said day.

2. That the election shall be conducted by ballot.

3. That should any manager be removed by order of the municipal council of Kilmore, a meeting for the election of a

successor to the manager so removed shall be held within one month from the date of such removal, the day for holding such meeting to be appointed at the regular meeting of the council which shall be held next after the date of the removal of a manager as aforesaid; such meeting to be held at the same hour and place, and conducted in the same manner as provided for at the annual meeting for the election of managers as hereinbefore provided.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 29, made by the municipal council of Kilmore, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

Bye-law No. 4.—A Bye-law for conducting Public Meetings of the Ratepayers and Elections of Members of Council, and also for regulating the Proceedings at the Election of Chairman.

AT all public meetings of the ratepayers, in the absence of the chairman, the senior council then present shall pre-

side.

2. In any polling place, no person other than the chairman, the town clerk or his deputy, the scrutineers, or electors who shall for the time being be tendering their votes, shall be entitled to be present; and it is hereby provided that it shall always be lawful for the chairman, the town clerk or his deputy, to summon to his assistance in such compartment or room any member or members of the police force, for the purpose of preserving the public peace, quelling any breach chereof that may have arisen, and for removing out of such room any person or persons who may, in his opinion, be obstructing the polling or wilfully violating any of the provisions of this section of this bye-law.

wilfully violating any of the provisions of this section of this bye-law.

3. The chairman shall cause to be provided for the purpose of such election a locked-up box, of which he shall keep the key, with a cleft or opening therein capable of receiving the voting papers, and which box shall stand in front of the chairman; and each elector shall receive from the chairman a voting paper in the form in the schedule hereunto annexed, and shall theroupon retire to a stall or compartment provided for that purpose, and there strike out the name or names of such candidates as he does not intend to vote for, and deposit the same in the ballot-box, in the presence of the chairman, two elector shall be unable to read, or be blind, he shall signify the same to the chairman, who shall thereupon mark or strike out the names of such candidates as such elector shall designate; and no elector shall take out of such polling place any such votting paper either before or after

as such elector shall designate; and no elector shall take out of such polling place any such voting paper either before or after he has marked the same.

4. Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint, by writing under his hand, to be delivered to the chairman at any time before Eight o'clock in the morning of the day of polling, one scrutineer to be present on his behalf in the polling place.

5. The chairman may put to any person, before he shall have received his voting paper, the following questions:—

First. What is your name and surname?
Second. Are you twenty-one years of age?
Third. Are you a ratepayer on the ratepayers' roll of the municipal district of Malmsbury?
Fourth. Have you paid all rates levied upon you except such as shall have become payable by you within six months before this election?

such as shall have become payable by you within six months before this election?

6. At every election it shall be the duty of the town clerk or his deputy to provide himself with the ratepayers' roll, and as each elector comes forward to demand his voting paper to see whether the name of such elector appears upon the roll as a ratepayer within the meaning of the Municipal Act, and as each elector deposits his voting paper within the ballot-box to mark off such elector's name as having voted at such election.

7. In case the voting paper as of any person shall have been received, and any other person shall afterwards demand his voting paper as of the same person, the chairman, when such person shall propose to deposit his voting paper in the ballot-box, shall refuse to allow the same to be put therein, but shall receive and keep the same apart, and at the close of the election decide whether such person has already voted or not, and his decision shall be final and conclusive on all parties; and if it shall appear to the chairman that such person has not already voted at such election, such vote shall be added to the number already polled, but if otherwise such vote shall not be allowed.

8. At the close of the poll, or as soon after as conveniently may be, the chairman, in the presence of the town clerk or his deputy, and the scrutineers, shall count the number of votes polled for each candidate, and upon ascertaining the result shall make the same publicly known, and cause to be affixed a notice thereof in one or more places of public resort; and the chairman shall then, in the presence of the town clerk or his deputy, and the scrutineers, set up all the voting-papers given during the election, and safely preserve them among the records of the council.

9. The chairman of the council shall be annually elected in

council.

9. The chairman of the council shall be annually elected in the following manner:—At the first meeting of the council after the annual election, which meeting shall be convened by the retring chairman or the person presiding at the annual election, the senior councillor then present shall take the chair at the hour mentioned in the notice calling the meeting, provided the whole council be present, otherwise at the expiry of half an hour thereafter; and the council shall proceed, by open voting on motion as usual, to elect a chairman for the current year; and the councillor in whose favor the show of hands shall be, shall be declared by the acting chairman to be chairman of the council for the current year, and shall take the chair accordingly.

10. If the result of voting for chairman should be that the highest number of votes is held equally by more than two councillors, then another voting shall take place for those councillors only having such equality of votes, until a majority is recorded.

11. Upon the resignation or disqualification of the chairman of the council, at the next meeting of the council thereafter the senior councillor then present shall take the chair pro ten, and immediately after the confirmation of the minutes of the preceding meeting, shall proceed to the election of a chairman of council for the residue of the municipal year, in a manner prescribed by this bye-law.

12. In determining the seniority of councillors for the purpose of this bye-law, it shall be understood to mean those councillors who shall have held office for the longest period without re-election, and having the greatest number of votes when elected.

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria, it is enacted, that every municipal council shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets, paths, and public thoroughfares, and shall and may make bye-laws for carrying out these objects: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Sandridge, with the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of Victoria—

1. No person or persons shall ride, drive, or lead any horse or beast, nor shall drive or wheel any cart, barrow, carriage, or other vehicle, upon or across any of the public footpaths within the district, nor in any way damage, or cause to be damaged, the public water-courses, or any of them.

2. Every owner or occupier of any gateway, yard, lane, or right-of-way to which access by horses, beasts, carriages, or other vehicles can be obtained only by riding, leading, or wheeling upon or across any of the said public footpaths or water-courses, who shall make and maintain such crossing or crossings over the said public footpaths and water-courses, or any of them, as may be necessary for approach and access to any such gateway, yard, lane, or right-of-way, in the manner hereinafter described, at the expense of such owner or occupier, and under the superintendence of the municipal surveyor, or such other officer as the municipal council may appoint in this behalf, shall be allowed to use such crossing without being liable to the penalty hereinafter provided.

3. In streets where a stone or wood kerb is now or hereafter may be laid, every such crossing as aforesaid, when required, shall be paved with stone or wood pavement the whole width of the footpath from the building line to the pavement of the water-channel in cases where the water-channel is or shall be paved, and in cases where the water-channel are or may hereafter be formed, and where no kerb

tendence aforesaid, and with the consent of the municipal council first had and obtained, without being hable to the penalty hereinafter mentioned.

6. Any person or persons guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty

pounds (£20).

Five members shall form a quorum.
- 3. At all meetings of the board when there is not five members present, or when the board is counted out, such circumstance, together with the names of the members there present, shall be recorded in the minute book.
- 4. The minutes of any preceding meeting not previously confirmed shall be read, as the first business, at all meetings of the board, in order to their confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereupon, except as to their accuracy as a record of their proceedings.
- no. 5. At all meetings of the board the reading of correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day, and bringing up of reports of committees, shall have precedence of the regular business.
- 6. Every communication addressed to the board shall be in proper form, and presented by one of its members or the secre-tary, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.
- 7. On the presentation of a petition no debate shall take place thereon, and the only question that shall be entertained on the occasion of its presentation shall be that the petition be received and taken into consideration after the orders of the day, or at any future meeting, or, if necessary, that it be referred to a committee.
- committee.

 8. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the board, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration. Any member of the board may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable, in the form of notice of motion; no such motion, however, shall be decided on at any meeting of the board unless notice thereof shall have been given to the secretary in writing by the member bringing it forward, at the meeting previous to that in which the same shall be taken into consideration.

 9. No writing outcome of the notice proposchall be preceded.
- 9. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorized by him, be present when the business is called in order. Notices of motion not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.
- 10. No bye-law shall be finally passed or adopted at the meeting t which it shall have been first proposed, nor until the next
- 11. No motion proposing any petition, address, bye-law, or standing order, shall be entertained unless the mover shall submit therewith a draft of such petition, bye-law, or standing
- 12. The mover of any motion which may be referred to a committee shall be a member of such committee.
- 13. Special meetings shall be summoned at any time by the secretary, upon receiving a requisition signed by two members, stating the matter to be discussed at such meeting.
- 14. No special meeting shall be held unless the secretary shall have given notice thereof, by post, five clear days before such

 15. The presiding chairman's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument.

 17. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost another may be moved before the original is put to the vote.

 18. Any member proposing a motion or amendment, or if speaking on any matter, must rise and address the chairman. No member, when speaking, shall be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down, in which case the member calling to order shall be heard thereon in preference to any other; and the question of order shall be disposed of by the chairman before the subject is resumed or any other matter

chairman before the subject is resumed or any other matter entered upon.

19. All questions before the board shall be decided by open voting unless a motion for any particular question is made and carried that it shall be by ballot.

20. No discussion will be allowed on any matter of adjournment of the board, but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be

allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the board.

21. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the board, shall be entertained during the same year, unless a call of the whole-board has been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the board which shall have been negatived by the board shall be again entertained during the same year.

SURVEY OF THE STREETS AND RESERVES.

SURVEY OF THE STREETS AND RESERVES.

The council cannot but remark with regret the slowness with which this work has been carried on by the Survey Department; although the municipality has been established five years, the council has been unable to obtain a complete survey of even the inhabited portion of it, the chief thoroughfares only of the inhabited portion been placed on a map; but relying on the promises of the district surveyor, who has been employed on the work during the last fifteen months, the council hopes very shortly to be in possession of a complete map of the work, by which means the present residents, and those desirous of locating in the district, will be able to adapt their buildings to the lines of streets.

The Geelong and Ballarrat Railway was opened by His Excellency Sir Henry Barkly, on the 10th April, in person, accompanied by the members of the Executive Government and both Houses of Parliament. The stations for Ballarrat East are being completed; the bridge and approaches at Queen street have been constructed, and the foot crossing between Queen street and the Victoria bridges has been commenced; but the council regret that the Railway Department has deemed it advisable to refuse the request of the inhabitants and the council for the construction of a crossing over the railway between the Victoria bridge and Warrenheip, a distance of nearly three miles. nearly three miles.

STORM WATER AND SLUDGE CHANNEL.

During the past six months the Government has taken a contract for and carried out the works of forming and completing the inlet and offlet drains to the Main road, at a cost of over Five thousand pounds; and it is most earnestly hoped by the council that no delay will be allowed to take place in completing the Main channel and the Yarrowee cutting, down to the proposed point beyond the White Flat bridge, by which means alone the benefits to be derived from the work already done will be realized, and a large amount of property secured from injury by floods. The necessity of the work having been fully recognized by the Government, and the Honorable J. B. Humfray, M.I.A., when minister of mines, and since that time having given the council every encouragement to anticipate its uninterrupted completion, by which means the council trusts that the district will be spared the annual losses it has hitherto sustained for many years by floods.

WATER SUPPLY.

During the past unusually dry summer this council, in conjunction with the Western Council, learned with much alarm and anxiety that the water supply from Yuille's Swamp was nearly exhausted, and that a continuation of the same weather for another fortnight would have resulted in depriving this populous district of water, excepting such as could be obtained

by pumping from the shafts of certain mining companies. Provision for so doing was made as a last resource, but the rainfall which took place prevented the necessity of adopting this means of supply. The fearful calamity which was escaped caused the councils, with the aid of the representatives of the districts, to press more urgently than heretofore on the Government the necessity of providing a permanent supply without further delay. After much negotiation it has been finally arranged that the Government will give to the councils, on account of the supply, the sum of £10,000, and the works already carried out in connection with Kirk's dam, also the necessary reserves of land, the municipalities to bear the balance of the cost of carrying out the works, the total expense of which is estimated at £25,000. The council would congratulate the inhabitants on the prospect this arrangement offers of speedily obtaining an ample supply of water, by which means their health, comfort, and prosperity will be in a great degree secured.
