SANDHURST TOWN-POSTAL BOUNDARY EXTENDED.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the fourteenth day of December, 1863.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, *An Act to enable the Postmaster General to issue Money Orders in the Colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time order and direct what shall be deemed "separate post towns or places" within the meaning of the third section of the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, *An Act to amend an Act intituled "An Act to amend the Law relating to the Post Office."* Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that Kangaroo Flat, Long Gully, Eaglehawk, Epsom, Huntley, White Hills, and Golden Square shall be deemed as within the limits of the town of Sandhurst, for the purposes of the above-recited Act; and that all letters forwarded between the several post offices of Kangaroo Flat, Long Gully, Eaglehawk, Epsom, Huntley, White Hills, and Golden Square, and between those offices and the post office at Sandhurst aforesaid, shall be subject to the town rate of postage, viz., Twopence per single rate of half an ounce, and so on in proportion.

And the Honorable Thomas Howard Fellows, Her Majesty's Postmaster General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

MAIN ROAD UNDER "THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1863."

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, upon the application of any district, from time to time to appoint what roads or parts of roads shall be main roads, and every such appointment on the like application from time to time to revoke; and every such Order in Council shall be published in the *Government Gazette*: And whereas the Boards of certain Road Districts have severally applied for the appointment of the Main Road hereinafter mentioned: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order appoint the Road hereinafter mentioned to be a Main Road within the meaning and for the purposes of the said Act, that is to say:—

The Main Road extending from the western boundary of the borough of Castlemaine to the eastern boundary of the borough of Maldon; from the western boundary of the borough of

Maldon diverging in two branches, one to the eastern boundary of the borough of Dunolly, the other to the eastern boundary of the borough of Carisbrook; from the western boundary of the borough of Carisbrook to the eastern boundary of the borough of Maryborough.

And the Honorable James Macpherson Grant, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

COMMONS.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim, alter, increase, or abolish the commons hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

BUNG BONG FARMERS' COMMON, described under the designation of Bung Bong Farmers' Common in two several Proclamations bearing date the fourth of March and the twenty-first of October, 1861, is hereby abolished, and the land hereafter described shall be and constitute Bung Bong Farmers' Common, viz.:—Seven thousand eight hundred and thirty-four acres, more or less, being the unsold and unappropriated land comprised within the following described area: Commencing at the intersection of the Bet-bet or McNeil's Creek with the south boundary of the parish of Wareek; thence east about eighty chains; thence south about two hundred and seventy one chains to the main road from Maryborough to Avoca; thence by the main road aforesaid westerly about two miles twenty chains to its intersection with a one chain wide road leading to Dunolly; thence northerly by said road to a point where it crosses the Dunira Creek; by said creek north-westerly to its junction with the Bet-bet or McNeil's Creek; and by the last-named creek northerly to the point of commencement. Also, commencing at the north-west angle of allotment 9 section 1, parish of Bung Bong; thence west one hundred and eighteen chains seventy-two links; thence south three hundred and twenty-five chains twenty-three links; thence east one hundred and eighteen chains seventy-two links; and thence north three hundred and twenty-five chains twenty-three links to the point of commencement.—(G.S.11212.)

MACEDON TOWN COMMON—The unsold and unappropriated Crown lands embraced within the following described area shall constitute a Town Common for Macedon, viz.:—One thousand two hundred acres, more or less, county of Bourke, parish of Macedon; Commencing at the north-west angle of portion 8, parish of Macedon; thence west one hundred and twenty-three chains, more or less, to a point bearing north from the north-west angle of portion H, parish aforesaid; thence south to said north-west angle of portion H, parish aforesaid; thence east to the north side of the main road from Melbourne to Castlemaine, by that road south-easterly to the south angle of portion 63, parish aforesaid; thence north-easterly to the eastern angle of last-named portion; thence crossing the Mount Alexander and Murray River Railway to the south-west angle of portion 32; thence north-easterly and easterly by the south side of the last-named portion and the south side of portion 31 to the south-east angle of the last-named portion; thence north to the point of commencement, as shown on plan deposited in the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(G.S.4054.)

SANDHURST GOLD FIELD COMMON—The gold field common for Sandhurst, described in several Proclamations bearing date respectively the twenty-eighth day of January and the twenty-fifth day of November, 1861, and the thirty-first day of August, 1863, is hereby increased by adding thereto the portion of land hereafter described.—One hundred and twenty acres, more or less, being the unappropriated land within the following described area: Commencing at the south-east angle of allotment 3, section 19, parish of Yarraberr; thence westerly by the boundary of that parish to Myers' Creek; thence westerly to the boundary of that parish to the northern boundary of allotment 9, section 3, parish of Nerring; thence south-easterly to the boundary of the present gold field common; thence by that common northerly to the point of commencement, as shown on plan deposited in Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(G.S.11572.)

NEW ZEALAND, NORTH ISLAND, WEST COAST.

DIRECTIONS FOR CROSSING THE MANUKAU BAR.

BRING the Nine Pin Rock on with the Inner South Point on bearing E.N.E. (magnetic), and steer straight for it, crossing the bar on that line.

As soon as the bar is crossed, the water deepens to seven or eight fathoms, and the course should be gradually altered to E. by N. easterly till the Nine Pin is on with the Signal Station, when haul up so as to pass clear of Paratutu.

If Parera Island is visible, it will bear north when inside the bar.

Though the above direction is correct for the present time, the signals from the station must always be attended to, as the banks are said to shift continually. Until it is buoyed, the South Channel should never be taken by a stranger.

CONDITIONS.

1. The hay to be eaten, good, sound, and sweet; the straw to be wheaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats (colonial grown) and bran and maize to be sound and sweet and of the best description.

2. The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the officer in charge of the district or station, the quantities stated in schedule being, however, only approximative, and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than stated. The excess over the estimate will not, however, exceed during the whole year 50 per cent. of the estimated quarterly consumption.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the military commissariat.

4. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the District, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours from a reasonable time to be fixed on the order, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when from some other cause injury would accrue either to the public service or the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. It will be competent for the Government Storekeeper on behalf of the Government, or for the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to that effect, it being understood that such notice only can be given from the first day of a month, and provided that no such notice can be given before the 30th June, 1864.

BYE-LAWS OF THE RUTHERGLEN DISTRICT BOARD.

ORDINARY meetings shall be held monthly, at the office of the board in Wagunyah, at Two o'clock p.m., on the first Saturday of the month, commencing from December, 1863.

2. Special meetings may at any time be called by order of three or more members of the board, and addressed to the clerk, giving six clear days' notice, and specifying the business to be considered.

3. The quorum of the board shall consist of three members, and in the event of a quorum not being present within half an hour of the time appointed for holding any meeting, then such meeting may be adjourned by the members present to another day not further distant than three days from such adjournment, and the clerk shall enter in the minute book the names of the members present at every such meeting adjourned.

4. Conduct of business shall be, first, reading and confirming the minutes of former meeting, upon which no discussion, except as to accuracy, shall be allowed; then correspondence, reports, and petitions shall be dealt with; after which the special business of the day shall be disposed of, and finally notices of motion for future meetings shall be received.

5. Every notice of motion must be in writing, and signed by the mover.

6. Every communication to the board must be in proper form, and presented by a member of the board, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.

7. Members must stand when speaking, and address the chairman, and no member shall be interrupted except by a call to order.

8. No member shall speak twice on any motion or amendment, except in reply or personal explanation; and the ruling of the chairman shall be final on all points of order and practice.

9. No motion, the effect of which, if passed, would be to rescind a motion already passed, shall be entertained during the current year, unless in accordance with section 136 of the Local Government Bill.

10. No motion shall be considered unless notice has been given at a previous meeting, or when a special meeting has been called for the purpose.

11. No election to any office under the control of the board shall be made until fourteen clear days' notice shall have been given by advertisement in one or more of the local papers, calling for tenders from competent persons.

12. In the third week of August in every year the board shall elect a finance committee and a public works committee, each committee to consist of three members of the board.

13. The duties of the finance committee shall be generally to supervise the financial business of the board, and to submit annually, before the 31st of December, an estimate of the working expenses of the board during the next ensuing year.

14. The public works committee shall, before the 31st of December, bring up an annual report, with an estimate of costs of such public works as it may seem expedient to undertake during the year.

15. When the public works report shall have been brought up, it will be the duty of the board at the meeting next following to take such report into consideration, and finally determine upon the works, which shall at once be proceeded with; provided that the estimated cost of the works decided upon at such meeting shall not exceed four-fifths of the funds available for public works generally.

16. Plans and specifications of all public works which may be decided upon, on consideration of the public works report, shall at once be prepared by the engineer, and tenders called for the completion of such works before the 30th of April in every year.

17. Contracts shall be made by tender, and shall be advertised in one or more of the local papers.

18. Tenders must be accompanied by a deposit of five per cent. on the amount of tender, and shall be deposited in the tender box at the office of the board, and shall be opened by the chairman of the meeting held for that purpose.

19. Contracts shall be prepared at the expense of the contractor, and signed on behalf of the board by two members of the board.

20. Every contractor shall, on the acceptance of his tender, deposit with the board, as security for the due performance of his contract, ten per cent. on the value of the works contracted for, which shall be returned to him on the satisfactory completion of his contract.

21. Contractors may from time to time receive any sum not exceeding seventy-five per cent. on the value of the works actually completed under the contract.

22. All payments shall be made by cheque (only), signed by the chairman and two other members of the board, and no payment shall be made unless the account has been passed by the finance committee.

23. The bank account shall be kept at the Bank of Victoria, Waiungah.

24. The collector shall pay into the Bank of Victoria all moneys received by him within one week of the time of receiving such moneys, and shall furnish the board monthly with a detailed statement of the same in writing.

SEYMOUR ROAD DISTRICT.

STANDING ORDERS.

1. THAT the business of the Seymour Road Board be conducted with open doors; but if at any time interruption is caused by persons present, who are not members of the board, the chairman shall have power to have them expelled.

2. That the general meetings of the board shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month, at the hour of Eleven o'clock a.m., at the office of the board (Court House, Seymour), the business to commence as soon as a quorum of three is present; but should a quorum not be present at the expiration of one hour after the said time appointed for meeting, the same shall be entered; with a note of the members present, in the minute book, and the business of such meeting shall be adjourned for three days.

3. Special meetings may be called by the chairman, or by any three members, by giving not less than four days' notice to each member of the board, and the business intended to be introduced at such special meeting shall in all cases be stated in such notice; all notices to be given through the clerk.

4. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called; notice not so proceeded with shall be struck out.

5. All notices of motion must be handed to the clerk not less than four days previous to the meeting of the board at which the same shall be taken into consideration. A member giving notice of any motion may authorise any other member to bring forward the subject on his behalf in case of sickness or unavoidable absence.

6. All payments shall be made by cheques signed by the chairman and one other member of the board, and counter-signed by the clerk; and no such cheque shall be given unless passed at a regular or special meeting of the board.

7. No member shall digress from the subject matter of the question under discussion, or impute improper motives to

others; and all personal reflection upon any member shall be considered as disorderly, and the member making use of such offensive expression, and refusing to explain the same or to offer an apology for the use thereof to the satisfaction of the board, shall not be allowed to hold his seat or vote on any question before the board until the offensive words shall have been retracted by him and an apology rendered to the satisfaction of the board.

8. Any member may require the clerk to take down any particular words used by a member immediately upon the same being used.

9. The chairman, when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule of precedence applicable to the case without argument or comment, and his decision as to what is order or explanation shall be final in each case.

10. All tenders and applications for offices shall be opened by the chairman in the presence of the board.

11. If two or more members rise to speak at the same time, the chairman shall decide which is entitled to pre-audience.

12. That all officers entrusted by the board with the custody or control of moneys shall procure two sufficient sureties for the faithful fulfilment of his office, subject to the approval of the board.

13. That any member of the board addressing the chairman on any subject must stand whilst doing so.

14. That no member be allowed to interrupt another whilst addressing the chair, unless on a point of order.

15. That the clerk attend at the office of the board (Court House, Seymour) on Mondays and Thursdays from the hours of One to Three o'clock p.m., to receive notices and to transact the ordinary business of the board.

16. At every regular meeting of the board the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting for confirmation the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings. The minutes then confirmed shall be signed by the chairman for the time being.

17. After the confirmation of the minutes the order of business shall be as follows, viz.:

1. Reading copies of letters sent.
2. Reading letters received, considering and ordering thereon.
3. Reception and reading of petitions.
4. Receiving notices of motion.
5. Reading and ordering on reports of committees.
6. Motions of which previous notice has been given.

18. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the board, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration.

19. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind a resolution already passed, shall be entertained, unless a call of a special meeting of the whole board shall have been made for that purpose, and not less than seven days' notice, at least, be given to each member before holding the meeting.

20. No member shall speak more than once on any motion or amendment, except in reply or personal explanation.

21. Every motion and amendment shall be entered in the minutes, with the names of the mover and seconder; and on a division thereon the votes shall be recorded.

22. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost another may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote.

23. No election to any office at the disposal of the board shall be made until eight clear days' notice shall have been given by advertisement.

24. Contracts shall be made by tender, and shall be duly advertised as the board may direct.

25. The security in all cases of contracts shall be ten per cent. upon the amount of the contract, paid over by the contractor to the chairman of the board, which amount shall be lodged in the bank with the other moneys of the board, and only repaid to the contractor when he attains his final certificate that the works under such contract are satisfactorily completed.

26. In all cases it shall be sufficient for the collector to call once for payment of any amount due on the assessment roll. In no case shall the collector institute any legal proceedings without instructions from the board for the recovery thereof.

27. The collector shall pay to the treasurer weekly all moneys collected; he shall also furnish an account of all such moneys.

28. The collector and treasurer shall present their accounts at every regular meeting of the board.

29. The duty of the works committee shall be to examine all contracts during progress, and also all roads under repair; and no application for a progress or final payment shall be entertained unless recommended by the surveyor and one of the works committee.

30. That all members and officers of the Seymour Road Board pass through the tolls in the district free while on the duty of the board.

Adopted as the bye-laws of the Seymour Road Board, at a meeting of the board, held on Tuesday, the 15th day of December, 1883.

CITY OF MELBOURNE.

At a meeting of the council of the city of Melbourne, held in the Council Chamber in the Town Hall, Swanston street, in the said city, this 30th day of November, 1863, at which were present—The Right Worshipful the Mayor, Alderman John Thomas Smith, presiding; Aldermen Richard Eades, Richard Evans Hill, John Harbison, and Michael Keeley; Councillors William Bayles, Henry Donovan Brown, Joshua Cowell, Edward Cohen, John Edwards, John George Goldsmith, William Grant, Michael Gallagher, George Hughes, Charles Edwin Jones, Isaac Lyons, Joseph Story, Samuel Thorp, James Weedow, and George Wrasge, being more than one-third of the members of the said council, it was resolved and ordered: That whereas by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, 14 Victoria No. 20, intituled, *An Act for regulating the formation, drainage, and repair of streets, courts, and alleys on private property within the city of Melbourne*, it is amongst other things enacted that where any street, court, or alley on private property in the city of Melbourne, shall not be, or shall not have been, sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired to the satisfaction of the council of the said city, it shall be lawful for the said council at any time, and from time to time, by any order under the hand of the mayor or town clerk of the said city for the time being respectively, to order that any such street, court, or alley, or any part thereof, shall be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, in such manner and within such time as to the said council may appear expedient; and thereupon the owners of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon such street, court, or alley, on each side thereof, shall, in such manner and within such time as shall be expressed in such order, at their respective costs, charges, and expenses, remove all obstructions, and well and sufficiently pave, flag, macadamise, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete or repair, so much of the said street, court, or alley, to the centre thereof, as may be opposite to and co-extensive with their respective tenements adjoining or abutting on such streets, courts, or alleys respectively:

And whereas by the Act of the Parliament of Victoria No. 178, intituled, *An Act to further alter and amend the laws relating to the city of Melbourne and the town of Geelong respectively, and to extend and apply other existing Acts thereto*, it is amongst other things enacted that the words "tenements adjoining or abutting on such street, court, or alley," where used in the first hereinbefore recited Act, shall be held and taken to mean all tenements or premises actually abutting upon, and accessible from, and communicating with such street, court, or alley, whether the owners or occupiers thereof have or have not a right to use, or do commonly use the same: And that the word "owner" used in the said Act shall apply to, and be held to include agent of an owner, but only in so far as to enable such agent to apply to the defrayal of expenses incurred in the formation, drainage, and repair of any such street, court, or alley, under the authority hereof, monies of his principal, of which he shall be in the receipt or possession accruing from tenements lawfully chargeable for such expenses:

And that the said Act for regulating the formation, drainage, and repair of streets, courts, and alleys on private property within the city of Melbourne, shall extend and apply to the entire limits of the said city:

And that the apportionment of the expenses incurred by the council of the city of Melbourne, in the formation, drainage, and repair of every such street, court, or alley on private property, shall be made proportionate to the extent of the area of the land of each of the several owners which shall be so situated as to have or be capable of obtaining access to such street, court, or alley, at the time of or in consequence of the formation or repair of such street, court, or alley:

And whereas the streets, courts, or alleys enumerated in the schedule to the order annexed marked A have not been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired to the satisfaction of the council of the city of Melbourne:

Be it now ordered by the council of this the said city, that the streets, courts, or alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed marked A, shall, within ten days from the date of this order's coming into operation, be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered, in such manner as is expressed in the schedule to this order annexed, and marked B. And it is hereby notified to the owners respectively of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon the streets, courts, or alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed marked A, that if they or any of them shall neglect or omit to remove the obstructions, and pave, flag, macadamise, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete and repair the street, court, or alley on which their respective tenements adjoin or abut, in the manner and within the time expressed in this order, then the council of the said city will remove all obstructions in the said streets, courts, or alleys, and pave, flag, macadamise, level, drain, sewer, and otherwise complete or repair the same, or such parts thereof as shall not have been so done pursuant to this order; and will thereupon ascertain, determine, and charge such respective owners with their several proportionate part of the costs, charges, and expenses thereof, according to and co-extensive with their respective tenements adjoining or abutting on such street, court, or alley, proportionate to the extent of the area of the land of each of the several owners, so situated as to have or be capable of obtaining access to such street, court, or alley, at the time of, or in consequence of, the formation or repair of such street, court, or alley, having regard in such apportionment to the state and condition in which the pavement, flagging, macadamising,

levelling, draining, and sewerage of such streets, courts, or alleys respectively, or any part thereof, shall or may be at the time of making this order.

SCHEDULE B, REFERRED TO IN THIS ORDER.

Manner in which the Streets, Courts, and Alleys enumerated in Schedule A, referred to in this Order, are ordered to be freed from obstruction, paved, kerbed, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered.

The natural soil is to be reduced or made up as the case may require, so that the longitudinal section of the whole street, court, or alley shall in no part have an inclination of less than one (1) in eighty (80), and where practicable the entire length is to form one incline.

In laying on any stuff it is to be spread in layers of not more than one foot thick.

The transverse section of the street, court, or alley (where the water-channels are on the sides) is to show a roadway whose crown shall be one inch above the kerbs of the footways, and the fall from the crown to the water-channels shall not be less than one (1) in twenty-five (25).

Each street, court, or alley shall have a bluestone pitched water-channel, either at each of its sides or in its centre, of sufficient capacity to meet the required drainage for the same, the width of said channel or channels in no instance to be less than two (2) feet.

The pitchers to be nine (9) inches wide, and from six (6) to nine (9) inches deep, and from nine (9) to fourteen (14) inches long, with upright sides set in sand, and well rammed down to such section as the city surveyor may direct.

The bottom of the channel is to be seven (7) inches below the kerb-stones of footpaths.

On either side of the roadway there is to be, where practicable, a footpath not more than three (3) feet wide, and these are to be separated from the roadway by a neatly dressed bluestone kerb from two (2) to four (4) feet long, six (6) inches wide, and fifteen (15) inches deep.

The footways are to be covered with a coat of gravel three (3) inches thick, and the surface is to fall towards the channel at the rate of one (1) in ten (10).

The roadway is to be covered with a coat of clean bluestone metal, 2½ inch gauge, nine (9) inches deep in the centre, and six (6) inches deep on the sides, and this, when necessary, covered over with a coat of good loam, two (2) inches thick, and rolled with corporation iron roller.

Whenever private entrances lead from the streets, courts, or alleys, they are to be paved to the full width (of building line) with bluestone pitchers, similar to those used in the channels.

All entrances from adjoining street shall be pitched and kerbed either with four (4) inch bluestone cubes or nine (9) inch pitchers, as the city surveyor may direct, the sides being well supported with eight (8) inch stone kerbing.

The whole of the work must be done under the inspection and subject to the approval of the city surveyor, who is authorised to order any deviation from these general principles which the peculiarities of any case may require. No. 1973
