The deaths which occurred in December amounted to 393, or a daily average of 12.68. This shows a considerable increase in the rate of mortality as compared with that of the previous month, in which the daily average was only 8.10. In December, 1861, the number of deaths was 322, in the same month of 1860 it was 523, and in that of 1859 it was 479; or 430 deaths for the mean of the month in the last four years.

The mean temperature in the shade, during the month of December, was 63.8°, being lower by a fraction than that in November, but higher by one degree, than that in December, 1861. In the corresponding month of 1860 the mean temperature was 66.3°, and during the same period of 1859 it was 67.7°. The highest temperature (107.2°) was experienced at 1.34 p.m. on the 31st, and the lowest (44.8°) at 4 a.m. on the 2nd; the range for the month thus being 62.4°. The daily range of temperature will be given in a subsequent portion of this report. The mean height of the barometer for the month was 29.815 in., against 29.716 in. for December, 1861, against 29.804 in. for December, 1860, and against 29.827 in. for December, 1859. The greatest atmospheric pressure was experienced at 11 a.m. on the 16th, and the least at 8 p.m. on the 31st; the extremes for the month being 30.064 in. and 29.205 in.; making the monthly range .859 in.

Of the 393 persons who died during the month, 228, or 58 per cent., were males, and 165, or 42 per cent., were females; 250, or nearly 60 per cent., were children under five, and 134, or rather more than 34 per cent., were beyond that age; the deaths of young children being to those of older children and adults nearly as two to one.

As many as 21 deaths took place on the 10th, 20 on the 23rd, and 19 on the 5th and 27th. The least number returned as occurring on any one day was 5, the dates of such small mortality being the 4th, 8th, and 21st.

The oldest persons who died during the month were two males and two females: one of the former, aged 82, from pneumonia, the other, aged 77, from brain disease; and of the latter, one, aged 73, of disease of the heart, the other, aged 76, in consequence of old age.

The 13 deaths recorded as having taken place from violent causes were reported thus:—By drowning 3, viz., a ship steward, aged forty; a sailor aged twenty-six; and a boy aged ten; the two former in Hobson's Bay, and the latter in the Yarra. By a railway train accident at Keilor, a man aged fifty. By a fall from a horse, a bricklayer aged forty-six. Of an accident, the manner of which was not stated, a boy eleven years old, at Richmond. From the effects of a fractured thigh, a laborer aged seventy-four, in the Benevolent Asylum. From a fracture of the neck of the femur, a woman aged thirty-nine, in the Hospital. From severe burns, a housekeeper aged fifty. From suffocation (accidental), an infant seventeen weeks old. From strangulation (murder), an infant fifteen days old. Cut her throat, a woman aged thirty-one. Judicially hanged, a bricklayer forty-one years of age.

In the public institutions 51 deaths, or about 12 per cent. of the entire number, took place, and were thus distributed:—Melbourne Hospital, 23; Benevolent Asylum, 9; Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 7; Immigrants' Home, 5; Pentridge Stockade, 2; Melbourne Gaol, 2; Western Gaol, 2; Lying-in-Hospital, 1.

Of the 259 deaths of children under five years of age, 144, or 56 per cent., were of males, and 115, or 44 per cent., were of females; 199 were under one year old, 41 between one and two, 11 between two and three, 4 between three and four, and 4 between four and five years.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that where there are two or more neighboring commons the Governor in Council may proclaim that the same shall be a common under the name of "The United Town and Gold Field [or, as the case may be] Common of" for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of Executive Council, do hereby proclaim that the Castlemaine Town Common and the Castlemaine Gold Fields Common respectively described in two several Proclamations bearing date the twenty-eighth day of January, 1861, shall be a common under the name of "The United Town and Gold Field Common of Castlemaine," for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either of the said commons.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this second day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and in the twenty-sixth year of Her Majesty's reign.

 RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE RUTHERGLEN DISTRICT ROAD BOARD.

- ORDINARY meetings shall be held quarterly at the Office of Road Board, in Wahgunyah, at Two o'clock p.m. on the first Saturday of the month, reckoning from October, 1863.
- Special meetings may be called at any time by order of the chairman or of three members of the board, addressed to the secretary in writing, giving eight clear days' notice, and specifying the business to be considered.
 - Five members shall form a quorum.
 - Business shall commence as soon as a quorum shall be present.
 - Meeting shall lapse if a quorum be not present within half an hour of the time appointed for the holding of the meeting.
 - Secretary shall enter in the minute book the names of the members present at every such lapsed meeting.
 - Conduct of business at ordinary meetings shall be, first—the reading and confirming the minutes of the previous meeting, upon which no discussion, except as to accuracy, shall be allowed; then correspondence, reports, petitions, shall be dealt with; notices of motion for future meetings received; and finally the special business of the day shall be considered.
 - Every notice of motion shall be in writing and signed by the mover.
 - Every communication to the board shall be in proper form, and shall be presented by a member of the board, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.
 - Members shall stand when speaking, and address the chairman.
 - No member shall be interrupted, except by a call to order.
 - No member shall speak twice on any motion or amendment, except in reply or personal explanation.
 - No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind a motion already passed, shall be entertained during the current year, unless a call of the whole board shall have been made for that purpose.
 - No report shall be adopted at the meeting at which it has been presented; and no motion shall be discussed unless notice has been given at a previous meeting, or a special meeting has been called for the purpose.
 - The ruling of the chairman shall be final on all points of order and practice.
 - No election to any office at the disposal of the board shall be made until fourteen clear days' notice shall have been given by advertisement in one or more of the local papers, calling for applications from qualified persons.
 - Contracts shall be made by tender, and shall be duly advertised in one or more of the local papers.
 - Tenders shall be deposited in the tender box at the office of the Road Board, and shall be opened by the chairman of the meeting held for the consideration of the same.
 - Contracts shall be prepared at the expense of the contractor, and shall be signed, on behalf of the board, by the chairman, and two other members of the board.
 - Every contractor shall deposit with the board, as security for the fulfilment of his contract, Ten pounds per centum on the value of the work contracted for, which shall be returned to him on the satisfactory completion of his contract.
 - Contractors may receive, from time to time, any sum not exceeding Seventy-five pounds per centum on the value of the work actually completed under the contract.
 - All payments shall be made by cheques only, signed by the chairman and two other members of the board; and no payment shall be made unless the account has been passed at a meeting of the board.
 - The banking account of the board shall be kept at the Bank of Victoria, Wahgunyah.
 - The collector shall pay into that bank, to the credit of the board, all moneys, within one week of receiving them, and shall furnish the board, weekly, with a detailed statement of the same in writing.

The changes in the council have been the resignation of Councillor Martin, 13th October, and the election of Councillor Roberts in his room.

Detailed statements of receipts and expenditure are appended, by which it will be seen the council have been actively engaged in public works.

Immediately the Land Act became law, a bye-law in accordance therewith, for the election of managers to the Common, was adopted; and upon the same being sanctioned by Government, the council elected Messrs. Powell, Southey, and Batten, as managers. Since then, Mr. Southey has resigned, and Mr. Herd has been elected a manager in his room.

Notwithstanding the existing arrangement by which this council collect tolls at the Barwon Bridge, the Government have sanctioned the bye-law of the Newtown and Chilwell Council, to collect tolls at their new bridge unconditionally. The chairman has protested to the Government, as by this act of theirs, the income of this council has been reduced without a proportionate relief from its liabilities.

Councillor Mackenzie has attended in Melbourne as delegate to the Municipal Conference on several occasions.

An application has been made to Government for a grant of land near the toll-house, for the purpose of erecting a market-house and holding a market thereon.

Bye-law No. 21, for the election of managers to the common, and No. 22, for making an assessment and striking a rate of Ninepence in the pound for the year, 1862-3, has been assented to.

The Municipal and Charitable Institutions Commission have visited the district, and have been furnished with the information and returns that they requested.

The Health Reports have been duly prepared and forwarded.
