### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria (Number 136), intituled, "An Act to amend an Act intituled *An Act to prevent the further spread of the disease in Cattle called Pleuro-pneumonia*," it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may, by Proclamation which shall be published in the *Government Gazette*, declare any part of the colony in which the said disease is not known to exist, a "clean district," and shall by such Proclamation define the boundaries of every such district, and after such publication no cattle, unless certified to be free from disease by a commissioner appointed for that purpose, shall be taken into any such district until such Proclamation is revoked: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation declare so much of the county of Mornington as lies south of the Koo-We-Rup Swamp and east of Western Port Bay, and as is hereinafter described, including Phillip Island and French Island, to be a "clean district," within the meaning and subject to the provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

Commencing at the mouth of a creek in Western Port Bay, said creek forming part of the west side of portion 2, parish of Yallock; thence by that creek northerly to the south side of the Koo-We-Rup Swamp, by that side of the swamp and a line north-easterly to a point on the Buneep Creek seven miles south of the south boundary of the village of Buneep; thence southerly by part of the east boundary of the county of Mornington to Cape Paterson; thence westerly and northerly by the sea-coast and the shores of Western Port Bay to the point of commencement; including likewise Phillip and French Islands.

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty (Number 14), intituled, *An Act to provide for the Management of Towns and other places in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that so many of the provisions of the said Act as relate to the good order of towns and other populous places, being sections numbered V., VI., VII., VIII., IX., and X., in the said Act, shall extend to

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and be in force in such cities, towns, districts, and places as the Lieutenant Governor may by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare to come under the operation of the same respectively, or any of them; and it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor to define the limits of such places, and to vary and alter such limits and revoke any such Proclamation; and all the other provisions of the said Act except the last (being numbered XXXIX.) shall extend to and be in operation throughout Victoria and its dependencies from and after the passing thereof: Now I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare that the municipal district of Eaglehawk shall come under the operation of the sections of the said Act numbered respectively V., VI., VII., VIII., IX., and X.

**BEECHWORTH MINING DISTRICT.**

**BYE-LAWS.—[3rd February, 1863.]**

At a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Beechworth, begun and holden at Beechworth, in the said district, on the third day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

41. *Protection from forfeiture.*—Bye-law No. 33 of the Beechworth mining board, in the following words, "Any person considering a claim liable, &c." be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—

In the Buckland and Beechworth divisions, no claim or portion of a claim shall be liable to forfeiture, provided the proprietor thereof be a working miner who is not a shareholder in any other claim, except in accordance with the following conditions, viz: Any person desirous to obtain possession of such a claim or portion thereof, shall serve such proprietor or his representative with a written notice, stating his intention to apply for the claim; and if within one week from the date of such service, such proprietor, or his representative aforesaid, fails to fulfil his duties as prescribed by the bye-laws, the applicant may be placed in possession of the claim.

In the absence of the proprietor, or his representative before-mentioned, the notice shall be posted conspicuously on the claim, and a copy thereof at the office of the mining registrar of the division.

45. *Superiority of bank water-rights to motive-power rights in the Buckland division.*—Notwithstanding anything enacted to the contrary in section 3, bye-law 21, in the Buckland division, bank water-rights shall be superior to motive-power rights.

**PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.**  
QUEENSCLIFF.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and eighty-five householders resident at and near Queenscliff, in the county of Grant, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that they are householders resident within the area hereinafter described, and delineated on a plan which accompanied the petition, and that they desire that such area should be declared a municipal district, viz.:—"Commencing on the shore of Bass's Straits at a point where intersected by the west boundary line of the Battery Reserve, in the parish of Paywit, in the county of Grant; thence along the shore of Bass's Straits to Point Lonsdale; thence along the shore of Lonsdale Bay to Shortland's Bluff; thence along the shore of Port Phillip Bay to Swan Point; thence round Swan Island and along the southern shore of Swan Bay, including Rabbit Island, to the north-east angle of allotment 1, block 3, in the said parish; thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the commencing point, the last-mentioned line being the southern boundary of the Indented Heads road district."

And the petitioners pray as follows:—"Your petitioners therefore pray that your Excellency, with the advice of the Executive Council, will declare by proclamation the locality before mentioned a municipal district, by the name of 'The Municipal District of Queenscliff.'"

**MUNICIPALITY OF AMHERST.**

BYE-LAW No. 20.—FOR IMPOSING A RATE OF TWO SHILLINGS IN THE POUND ON THE RATEABLE PROPERTY IN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF AMHERST.

WHEREAS by 18th Victoria No. 15, municipal councils are empowered to impose a rate not exceeding Two shillings in the pound upon all houses and lands within their respective municipalities, according to their fair average annual value: Be it and it is hereby enacted by the municipal council of Amherst, that a rate for the current municipal year of Two shillings in the pound upon the annual value of all rateable property within the limits of the Amherst municipal district be imposed and levied, and be due in equal proportions upon the 31st December, 1862, and the 30th June, 1863.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 20, made by the municipal council of Amherst, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

**MUNICIPALITY OF ARARAT.**

BYE-LAW No. 29.—FOR MAKING AN ASSESSMENT AND IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND FOR THE YEAR ENDING 20TH SEPTEMBER, 1863.

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to assess all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district (except property belonging to or in the occupation of Her Majesty) according to its fair average annual value, and to impose a rate not exceeding Two shillings in the pound upon all such properties so assessed: Be it therefore enacted by the Ararat municipal council, that all the several properties within the limits of the said municipal district shall be assessed for the year 1862-63 according to the several amounts of annual value respectively affixed to the same on the assessment roll confirmed by the said municipal council on the 3rd day of December, 1862, and amounting, after all appeals have been heard, to the sum of £12,302 sterling: And also, that a rate of One shilling in the pound of said annual value is hereby imposed upon all the said properties for the current year, the first moiety of the said rate to be due and payable on the 1st day of March, 1863, and the second moiety to be due and payable on the 2nd day of June, 1863, except in those cases where the total rate does not exceed One pound, then the whole of such rate shall be due and payable on the 1st day of March, 1863.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 29, made by the municipal council of Ararat, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

**MUNICIPALITY OF CARISBROOK.**

BYE-LAW No. 38.—FOR THE PRESERVATION OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH, AND THE SUPPRESSION OF NUISANCES CAUSED BY THE OVERFLOW OR SOAKAGE OF WATER-CLOSES AND CESSPOOLS.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the preservation of the public health and the suppression of nuisances: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Carisbrook, that the

owner or occupier of any house or premises shall not allow the contents of any water-closet, privy, or cesspool to overflow or soak therefrom so as to be a nuisance or injurious to the health of the inhabitants, after written notice from the local inspector of nuisances to such owner or occupier to abate the same.

Any person guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall forfeit and pay a penalty or sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.

## MUNICIPALITY OF HOTHAM.

**BYE-LAW No. 17.—FOR MAKING AN ASSESSMENT AND IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING AND THREEPENCE IN THE POUND FOR THE CURRENT MUNICIPAL YEAR, ENDING 19TH OCTOBER, 1863.**

**WHEREAS** by the Act of Council 13 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is authorised and required to assess all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district (except property belonging to Her Majesty) according to its fair average annual value, and to impose a rate on all such properties for the current municipal year: And whereas the council of the municipal district of Hotham has lately caused a valuation of all rateable property within the said district to be made for the purpose of assessing the same, and which said valuation amounts to the sum of £34,274: And whereas all appeals against such valuation have been finally heard and determined, and such valuation has been amended as provided by the said Act: And whereas such amended valuation amounts to the sum of £33,970: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the said municipal council of Hotham, that the said valuation or assessment as amended be confirmed, and that a rate of One shilling and threepence in the pound for the current municipal year ending 19th October, 1863, on the said annual value of the said respective properties be and the same is hereby imposed and levied; and that three-fifths of the amount of such rate shall be due and payable on the first day of February, 1863, and the residue on the first day of May, 1863, unless where any of the said respective properties be valued at and under the sum of Ten pounds yearly value, then that the full amount of such rate shall be due and payable on the said first day of February, 1863.

## MUNICIPALITY OF SMYTHESDALE.

**BYE-LAW No. 10.—FOR THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS FOR THE SMYTHESDALE TOWN COMMON.**

**BEFORE** the election of managers for the town common shall take place, the chairman of the council shall cause to be given to each member thereof a written notice of the day and hour such election shall take place, such notice to be delivered fourteen days prior to the day of election.

2. Any member of such council desirous of nominating one or more candidates shall (eight days prior to the election) do so by giving to the town clerk, in writing, the name, place of abode, and occupation of such candidate or candidates; and the names of the candidates shall be publicly read in the council at the general meeting held previous to that at which the election shall take place.

3. The annual election shall be held in the month of February.

4. If the number of candidates shall not exceed the number to be elected, the chairman shall declare such candidates elected; but if the number of candidates shall exceed the number of managers to be appointed, the council shall proceed to the election by ballot, and the candidates who shall have the greatest number of votes shall be declared elected.

5. In case of death, resignation, removal by the council, or absence from the district for a period of one month of any manager, the office of such manager shall be declared vacant, and within one month of such declaration another person shall be elected in his stead, in the same manner as at the annual election, and the person so elected shall hold office for the unexpired term only of the manager in whose place he shall have been elected.

2. The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the officer in charge of the district or station, the quantities stated in schedule being, however, only approximate, and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than stated. The excess over the estimate will not, however, exceed during the whole year 50 per cent. of the estimated quarterly consumption.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the military commissariat.

4. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the District, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours from a reasonable time to be fixed on the order, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when from some other cause injury would accrue either to the public service or the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. Repairs to weighbridge, labor, material, &c.

Filling excavation in allotment 6, section O, Main street.

Constructing two water-carts for watering streets, and watering Main and Bridge streets.

#### APPLICATIONS TO THE GOVERNMENT, UNDER CONSIDERATION.

*Cemetery.*—This matter remains in the same position as at the time of the last report, the council have deferred further action awaiting the result of new legislation on the matter in connection with the proposed Municipal Corporations Bill.

*Main road channels.*—That the pitching with bluestone of the channels on both sides of the Main road may be completed and raised to proper levels for drainage. The only progress made towards obtaining the execution of this most necessary work, since the last report, is the promise of the Honorable the Commissioner of Roads, that when the estimates were passed the subject should have his favorable consideration.

*Warreneep station.*—That a railway station be erected at Warreneep.

*Storm-water channel.*—That the Government would complete the remaining portion of this channel, so as to give an outlet to the portion already made, and the drainage of the district.

*Vehicle bye-law.*—For its sanction to a bye-law for the regulation of public vehicles.

#### SURVEY OF THE STREETS AND RESERVES.

This most important work, which is being carried out by the district surveyor, has been progressing since the council's last report, yet not to such an extent as was anticipated, but doubtless the number of buildings and the irregular manner in which the ground is occupied, in consequence of the work being so long delayed, gives rise to especial difficulties. The council has, however, at no time lost sight of the urgent necessity for its uninterrupted completion.

#### RAILWAY.

In consequence of a rumour which obtained circulation, to the effect that an order had been issued to discontinue the delivery of goods from the Eastern Station after a certain date, a memorial was presented to the council by the inhabitants, praying that it would use its influence to prevent the same being carried into effect; the council thereupon sent a deputation to the Honorable the Commissioner of Railways, who stated that no such order had been made that he knew of, nor would he give effect to any such arrangement without consulting the council. The foot-crossing over the railway, promised to be constructed at Ryce street, has not yet been commenced, but it is hoped the Government will proceed with it shortly.

#### STORM-WATER AND SLUDGE CHANNEL.

The council deeply regrets having to state, that the hopes expressed in its last report, in reference to the completion of this most important and essential work, have not been realized. The present Government, regardless of the encouragement given by the former Government to the council, has uniformly refused its repeated and urgent applications. The council,

nevertheless, purposes to renew its efforts on the re-assembling of the Parliament, seeing that the health of the whole district greatly depends on the proper completion of this work, and being of opinion that the Government can have no reasonable excuse for leaving it in its present unfinished state.

#### WATER SUPPLY.

During the last half-year considerable progress has been made by the joint councils of Ballarat and Ballarat East in this important undertaking. A contract has been entered into for supplying 18-inch cast iron piping for the mains, to be imported from England, amounting to upwards of £15,000, the first delivery of which may be expected shortly to arrive. Plans of the necessary lands required for carrying out the scheme have been submitted to the Government for reservation to the councils. Negotiations have been entered into for obtaining a loan of the required amount of money for completing the entire work. The present supply from Yuille's Swamp has been temporarily augmented by connecting the water from Kirk's Dam with the mains, at the junction of Eureka and Main streets, which will prevent scarcity during the present summer. Kirk's Dam has been completed by the Government and handed over to the councils, and measures have been taken preparatory to the construction of a reservoir on a large scale at Beale's Swamp, and other works having for their object the conservation of of all the water derivable from the various sources. A competent engineer, secretary, and collector, has been appointed, and every means adopted for accomplishing this most necessary work without delay.

#### LEGISLATIVE.

The Government having appointed a commission on Municipal and Charitable Institutions, and framed a bill to consolidate and amend the law relating to municipal institutions. The council has furnished to the commission the most ample statistics and information in its power, also its opinion on all the important subjects affecting municipal government, advocating amongst others—permanent endowment with land and local revenues, temporary grants-in-aid, power to make bye-laws for regulating building operations, the storage of mineral and other oils, the establishment of markets and cemeteries, the construction of wharfs, piers, sewerage, water supply, &c., in addition to the powers given in the existing municipal laws; and to levy fees, tolls, and dues.

A conference of municipal delegates from the various councils throughout the colony having had two sittings in Melbourne to consider the new Bill, and having suggested amendments, appointed a committee to watch the interests of the municipalities, and adjourned with the view of again assembling when the report of the commission is presented to the Government, in order to take such measures as may be deemed advisable to secure the powers and privileges sought for. These measures the Council is led to hope will result in a much improved system of municipal legislation throughout the colony.

#### WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

The council congratulates the inhabitants on the fact, that at length the Government has effected provisions for the inspection of weights and measures (but only for avoidupois and measures of capacity); the council, to facilitate the carrying out this necessary supervision, has appropriated a room at the Town Hall for the use of the Inspector, who will forthwith commence his duties.
