SEYMOUR FARMERS' COMMON.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of April, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, a certain area therein described was proclaimed a farmers' common for agriculturists at Seymour and Tallarook: And whereas it is expedient to abolish the said common, and to proclaim another farmers' common in lieu thereof: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby abolish the said farmers' common at Seymour and Tallarook; and with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby proclaim the area hereinafter mentioned to be a Farmers' Common, that is to say:—

THE FARMERS' COMMON AT SEYMOUR.—Two thousand nine hundred acres, more or less, being the unappropriated land within the following described area, situated within the parishes of Mangalore and Tallarook, county of Anglesey: Commencing at the north-east angle of subdivision A of allotment 66; thence south seventy-eight chains fifty links; thence east fifty chains, more or less, to the east angle of portion 40, parish of Tallarook; thence by a road bearing S. 60° 45' W. fifty-seven chains sixty-one links, more or less, to the south boundary of portion 41; again by the same road bearing S. 86° 14' W. fifty-two chains twenty-three links, more or less; again by the same road bearing S. 71° 34' W. two hundred and thirteen chains, more or less, to Whitehead's Creek; by that creek north-westerly twenty-four chains, more or less, to the main road from Seymour to Avenel; by said main road bearing N. 37° 51' E. to the parish boundary between Tallarook and Seymour; again by the said main road bearing N. 21° 45' E. forty-three chains twenty-six links; again by the said main road bearing N. 35° 15' E. to the north-west angle of allotment 67; thence by a one-chain road bearing east to the point of commencement.—(73.H.744.)

UNITED COMMONS.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that where there are two or more neighboring commons the Governor in Council may proclaim that the same shall be a common under the name of "The United Town and Gold Field [or, as the case may be] Common of" for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of Executive Council, do hereby proclaim that each of the neighboring commons hereinafter mentioned shall respectively be a United Common, under the following names, that is to say:—

THE UNITED MUNICIPAL AND GOLD FIELD COMMON OF BEECHWORTH shall comprise the Beechworth Gold Field Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-eighth day of January, 1861, and the Beechworth Municipal Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the first day of December, 1862, and shall be for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either of the said commons.—(63.H.1737.)

THE UNITED TOWN AND FARMERS' COMMON OF WINCHELSEA shall comprise the Winchelsea Town Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the twentieth day of December, 1862, and the Winchelsea Farmers' Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the fourth day of March, 1861, and shall be for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either of the said commons.—(63.H.1310.)

BYE-LAW No. 16.—FOR EMPOWERING THE COUNCIL OF THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF DAYLESFORD TO MAKE AND EXECUTE CERTAIN WORKS AND PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS OUT OF AND BY A SUM OF TWO THOUSAND POUNDS RAISED BY MORTGAGING THE MUNICIPAL RATES OF THE SAID COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted that any municipal council shall have power to borrow, by way of mortgage or otherwise, on the credit of land, funds, or income to which it may be entitled, any sum or sums of money that may be required for the purpose of making, carrying on, or completing any permanent improvements that may directly benefit the municipal district for which such council has been elected, or for the purchase of any railway shares or other stock that may be necessary or desirable for any such improvements, or which may directly benefit such district, but in no case shall the sum or sums so borrowed exceed in the whole the estimated revenue of such municipal corporation for the period of three years; provided that no money shall be borrowed by any such municipal council until the express sanction of the Governor and Executive Council of the said colony has been obtained, not only for the amount to be borrowed, but also for the works, improvements, railway shares, or other stock upon which it is proposed to expend the sum or sums so to be raised: And whereas the council of the municipal district of Daylesford has obtained the express sanction of the Governor and Executive Council of the said colony to borrow a sum of Two thousand pounds, being a sum not exceeding in the whole the estimated revenue of the said municipal council of Daylesford for the period of three years, by mortgaging its municipal rates, and to expend that sum upon the works and permanent improvements set forth in schedule A hereunto attached: And whereas the said council proposes to execute the aforesaid works and permanent improvements in accordance with the conditions set forth in the specification given under schedule B hereunto attached:

Be it therefore enacted, that the council of the municipal district of Daylesford is hereby authorised to make, execute, and perform the several works and permanent improvements detailed in the said schedule A by the money raised by mortgaging its municipal rates as hereinbefore recited, and all such works shall be executed by contract, in writing, in conformity with and under such general regulations as may from time to time be made by any officer or person to be appointed by the Governor of the said colony for that purpose.

Specification.

In the accomplishment of the works proposed, the contractor will be required to perform in a workmanlike manner all necessary formation, cutting, and embanking.

The contractor must also execute all finishing necessary to impart to the street a creditable appearance, remove all useless material to such place or places not distant more than _____ or such distance as may be pointed out by the public works committee or surveyor, or any person acting for him.

The contractor must provide all labor, implements, and materials necessary for the due completion of the works proposed, except only such materials as earth and gravel, to raise which on the lands to be mentioned he shall have the necessary permission, but he must furnish all cartage and labor thereat.

Before the work shall be certified for as completed, the contractor shall be bound to clear away all surplus materials from the ground to such place or places as may be pointed out by the surveyor; provided that the lead be not greater in length than _____ from the nearest end of the works or of such section (if a special place of deposit be not named by the surveyor), and there to spread such earth as the surveyor may deem suitable for the purpose, so as to conform with the intended formation lines of such street or streets to which the contractor may cart the same, provided the lead be not greater in length than _____ from the nearest end of the works.

Further, the contractor shall perform everything necessary to impart to the work a creditable appearance.

The time allowed for the full completion of the work shall be _____ calendar month from the date of acceptance of tender by the municipal council of Daylesford.

No work shall be considered complete until a written certificate to that effect be obtained from the surveyor, who will give

this same when it is completed according to specification and his instructions.

Should the contractor fail in completing his work to the satisfaction of the surveyor within the aforesaid period, a sum not exceeding Five pounds (£5) sterling shall be deducted from the per-centage retained or deposit money for every lawful day after the time specified shall have expired until completion.

Should the contractor fail in carrying through the work proposed in manner specified, also in true accordance with the relative drawings, to the entire satisfaction of the surveyor, it shall be in the power of that officer to take the work out of the hands of the contractor altogether, and to complete the same at the latter's expense.

Should the surveyor deem it advisable to make any alterations upon the proposed works, as they are herein specified to be carried out, the contractor shall be bound to make such and every alteration upon receiving a written notice to that effect, the difference in cost to be paid or deducted from payments agreeably to schedule of prices furnished by the contractor along with his lump tender.

No claim for extra work shall be allowed unless the same shall be especially ordered in writing by the surveyor.

Damages made good.

All damages done to the works from whatever cause, until they shall be taken off the contractor's hands as finished, shall be at his risk, and shall be made good by him before the work is considered complete, unless such damage shall arise from anything done by order of the surveyor.

Measurement.

All measurement of works shall be made according to the actual dimensions, notwithstanding any custom to the contrary.

Forming.

The contractor shall be bound to furnish and securely put up sufficient fences, to maintain all necessary lights from sunset to sunrise, and otherwise to guard against the possibility of any accident occurring during execution, the consequence of which (if any such occur) shall rest with the contractor.

Maintenance.

The contractor shall be bound to maintain in good order and condition the whole of the proposed works hereinbefore specified for a period of _____ after certificate of completion has been granted by the surveyor, as a part guarantee for which the 25 per cent. retained as after mentioned shall not be paid over to the contractor or his order until the expiration of the said term of maintenance.

Payments.

Payments will be made in fortnightly instalments during the progress of the proposed work. It must be distinctly understood, however, that the sum of each or any instalment shall in no case exceed 75 per cent. of the full value of the actual work computed.

Any balance remaining owing shall be paid at the expiration of the specified period of maintenance.

Security.

BYE-LAW No. 8.—FOR THE BETTER PREVENTION OF FIRES AND THE DANGER ARISING THEREFROM.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is authorised and empowered to pass bye-laws for the prevention and extinguishing of fires, and for the general good rule of such municipal district: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Eaglehawk, that it shall not be lawful for any roof or other exterior covering of canvas, duck, drill, calico, or any such material, to be placed upon or on the outside of any building or buildings erected or to be erected within the said municipality, nor shall it be lawful for any such now in use to be repaired or renewed with a like material, unless such building or erection shall stand and be twenty clear feet apart from any dwelling-house, store, or other building whatsoever. That no person shall be permitted to keep any stack or stacks of hay, corn, or straw of any description on premises within the said municipality, unless the same be under cover of a shed or building of which no exterior part or covering shall be of canvas, calico, or any similar fabric, or shall not stand twenty clear feet from any dwelling-house or building whatsoever; and further, that no chimney or flue shall be constructed of inflammable materials, and that the top of such chimney or flue shall be sufficiently elevated or removed from any inflammable materials of which the roof or other part of the building, or any adjoining building is constructed. That every such chimney shall be so constructed as properly to carry up the smoke. That it be prohibited to light or have any fire burning in any street, lane, road, or public place, or within or upon any yard or premises, whether fenced or enclosed, or not, for any purpose, except such fire be made in a properly constructed fire-place or chimney; and any person guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall, on conviction, pay a sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 8, made by the municipal council of Eaglehawk, has been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 2nd of March, 1863.

BYE-LAW No. 27.—FOR THE REGULATION AND GOVERNMENT OF NIGHTMEN-CARTERS.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the licensing of public carters, &c.: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Maldon, from and after the date of the assent of His Excellency the Governor hereunto:—

1. That no person or persons shall carry on the business of nightman or fill the duties of nightman without having first obtained a license from the council for that purpose.
2. That the name and address of the nightman, with the number of his license, and the words "licensed nightman," shall be legibly painted in letters not less than one inch in height, in white on a black ground, on the off side of each cart or vehicle which shall be used as a nightcart, and each cart or vehicle shall have a properly fitted wood covering.
3. That no nightman shall be allowed to remove any night-soil, or to allow any night-soil to remain in his cart, anywhere within the town boundaries, except between the hours of Twelve o'clock at night and Five o'clock in the morning.
4. That whilst employed in removing night-soil, each cart shall have two lights affixed, one on the near side and one on the off side.
5. No person shall cart night-soil or act as a nightman without license as aforesaid, except the *bona fide* servant of a licensed nightman.

6. That no person shall alter his license or exceed the power granted therein, or shall refuse to show his license when required so to do, and any person or persons guilty of the neglect or breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.
