Extracts from the Act No. 166, intituled *An Act to amend the law relating to Aliens.*

4. *Conditions of naturalization.*—When any alien friend now residing in or who shall hereafter reside within the colony of Victoria desires to be naturalized if he be of good repute and if he take the oath prescribed in the second schedule hereto the Governor may if he think fit grant to him under the seal of the colony letters of naturalization subject to such conditions (if any) as he may consider necessary or advisable.

5. *Naturalization to extend to wife.*—When any alien woman is married to any natural born or naturalized subject of Her Majesty such woman shall thereby become and be naturalized.

6. *Mode of obtaining naturalization.*—When any person desires to obtain naturalization under this Act he may present to the Governor in Council a memorial signed by himself and verified upon oath stating his name age birth-place residence and occupation the length of his residence in the colony and his desire to settle therein and praying that letters of naturalization may be granted to him and also a certificate signed by some warden police magistrate or justice of the peace to the effect that the applicant is known to the person so signing and is to the best of such person's belief and knowledge a person of good repute.

7. *Applicant to take oath of allegiance.*—If the Governor in Council think fit to grant such letters he shall direct the applicant to take the oath prescribed by this Act before some judge of the Supreme Court or of a county court or court of mines or some police magistrate and upon the certificate of such judge or magistrate that the applicant has taken before him the said oath he shall issue to the applicant letters of naturalization accordingly.

8. *Facilities given to persons naturalized elsewhere.*—When any person resident in Victoria has previously obtained any certificate of naturalization in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland or any part thereof or in any British colony or the continent of Australia Africa or America or in the colony of Tasmania or of New Zealand and desires to be naturalized in Victoria if he submit such certificate to the Governor in Council and if he further state in his memorial as aforesaid that he is the person named in such certificate and that the same has been obtained without any fraud or intentional false statement and that the signature and the seal if any thereto are to the best of his belief and knowledge genuine the Governor in Council may at his discretion grant the letters of naturalization without requiring from the applicant any further residence in Victoria or (if the applicant has previously taken a similar oath) the oath prescribed by this Act.

9. *Letters of naturalization to be enrolled.*—The Chief Secretary shall enrol for safe custody as of record all such letters of naturalization and a certified copy of every such certificate as aforesaid and shall demand and receive from every person to whom such letters are granted the fee of One pound in respect of such enrolment and shall cause to be made proper indexes to such letters and certificates And shall permit every person desirous

of so doing to inspect the same and make copies of such letters and certificates on payment of the fee of One shilling for every such inspection.

10. *Penalty for false statement.*—If any person to whom letters of naturalization have been granted be convicted of having wilfully made any false statement in his memorial he shall be deemed guilty of perjury and such letters of naturalization shall except against *bona fide* purchaser from such person for valuable consideration become thereby void.

WHEREAS a certain building has been erected at the public expense, at Palmerston (Port Albert), in the district of Gipps Land, as and for a lock-up for police purposes: And whereas it is deemed expedient to proclaim such building to be a gaol, within the meaning of an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the said colony, passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders*: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the said building, called and known as the Police Lock-up, situated at Palmerston aforesaid, as and to be a public gaol within the meaning of the said Act.

MUNICIPALITY OF BROWN'S AND SCARSDALE.

BYE-LAW No. 1.—FOR REGULATING BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF BROWN'S AND SCARSDALE.—[Adopted on the 25th August, 1862.]

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted that every municipal council shall have the power to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Brown's and Scarsdale, with the assent of the Governor-in-Chief of Victoria:—

CHAPTER I.

1. *Meetings of council.*—The ordinary or general meetings of the council shall be open to the public, but any councillor present at same may require the withdrawal of all strangers until it shall have been decided by the council whether or not the discussion of the particular question proposed to be considered take place with open doors or not. The chairman may, however, at any time, in the event of strangers present being in the least disorderly, order their withdrawal, and may take such further action as he may think fit for the repression of such conduct.

2. Members of the council shall at all meetings thereof designate each other by their official titles of chairman and councillor respectively; but any councillor (not being the chairman of the council) occupying the chair, shall be addressed by name as councillor.

3. The general meetings of the council shall be convened for such days as the council may from time to time appoint, by two clear days' notice sent or given to each councillor by the town clerk.

4. The chairman shall at any time upon receipt of a requisition signed by three members of the council, setting forth the objects for which they wish a special meeting to be held, cause such a meeting to be convened by two days' notice, stating the objects of the meeting, and at such meeting, only the matters referred to in the requisition shall be entertained.

5. *Adjournments.*—The council shall have power to adjourn their ordinary meetings from time to time, any such adjournment not being for more than fourteen days from the last day of meeting.

6. *Time of commencing business.*—At all meetings of council the business shall commence so soon as a legal quorum is present after the time for which the meetings are respectively convened, and should a quorum not be present at the expiration of twenty minutes after that time, such circumstance shall be noted (together with the names of the members present) in the council minute book, and the meeting shall lapse.

7. *Records of proceedings.*—Minutes shall be taken of the proceedings at all meetings of the council, and fairly entered into a book to be provided for that purpose, and shall be open to the inspection of all persons on the ratepayers' roll free of charge.

8. *Order of business.*—The order of business at all general meetings of council shall be as follows:—

1. The confirmation of minutes of previous meetings; and no discussion shall be allowed thereupon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings, and when confirmed such minutes shall be signed by the chairman of the meeting.

2. Consideration of received correspondence.

3. Reception (but only through members of council) of petitions and memorials. The councillor presenting any such petition or memorial being responsible for its being in proper form, authentic, and respectfully worded.

4. The consideration or adoption of reports from committees, &c., upon their presentation, duly numbered, and signed by the chairman of the committee for the time being.

5. Orders of the day, including the consideration of all matters arising out of instructions, &c., at former meetings of the council, and the consideration of any business the chairman may deem it desirable to bring forward.

6. The consideration of motions of which notice shall have been given by councillors, in writing under their hands, at the previous meeting of council, such motions to be taken in the order in which the said notices were given.

7. The reception of notices of motion, &c.

9. *As to petitions.*—The only way of approaching the council shall be by petition or memorial presented by some councillor; and every petition, memorial, or communication (other than the ordinary received correspondence), shall be in writing (not printed or lithographed); and upon its presentation no debate shall take place thereon until notice of motion has been given, and the only question which shall be entertained on the occasion of its presentation shall be (and this only upon the motion of some councillor) that it be received, or be referred to a committee to be dealt with, or for their consideration and report, or that it be taken into consideration with any order of the day to which such petition may refer; and the councillor presenting such petition, &c., must confine his remarks to a statement of the names of the persons from whom it comes, the number of signatures, and the reading the prayer of the petition.

10. *Proceeding with motions.*—No motion of which notice has been given shall be proceeded with, but shall lapse, unless the councillor in whose name it stands, or some other councillor authorised by him in writing, be present to proceed with the same when called upon.

11. *Business paper.*—This shall be prepared, and lie in the office of the town clerk two days previous to each ordinary meeting of council.

12. *Resolutions, how rescinded.*—No motion the effect of which if carried would be to rescind any previous resolution of the council shall be entertained during the same municipal year in which such previous resolution was passed, unless a call of the whole council has been duly made for that purpose; and no

motion for rescinding any resolution whatever of the council shall, if lost, be again entertained during the same municipal year.

13. *Bye-laws.*—No bye-law shall be finally passed nor adopted until at least the next general meeting of the council subsequent to that at which it is proposed; and every such bye-law shall, in the interim, be open to inspection in the town clerk's office, free of charge, by any person on the ratepayers' roll of the municipality.

14. *Addresses.*—No motion relative to any address or petition, &c., from the council, shall be entertained, unless accompanied by the draft of the proposed address or petition, &c.

15. The mover of any special committee, or of any motion which may be referred to a special committee, shall (*pro hac vice*) be a member of such committee.

CHAPTER II.—ORDER OF DEBATE.

16. *Chairman to decide points of order.*—The presiding chairman's ruling or decision shall be final on all questions or points of order and practice, and he shall state or give the same (when called upon to do so) without comment or argument.

17. *Motions and amendments.*—The mover of any motion or amendment shall rise and address the chair, and shall not be interrupted, unless called to order, when he shall resume his seat until the councillor raising the point of order shall have been heard and the question of order disposed of by the chairman, whose decision shall be final, when he (the said original speaker) shall proceed with the subject.

18. The mover of either an original motion or amendment must state the nature of same and have it seconded before addressing the council in support thereof, and must hand same in writing, duly signed, to the town clerk, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder, and afterwards the result thereof, i.e., "carried," "lost," or "lapsed," and shall carefully preserve such original manuscript in his office; and no motion, when seconded, shall be withdrawn without leave of the council.

19. *Seconding motions and enforcement of standing orders.*—No motion or amendment shall be entertained or discussed, unless seconded. Any one councillor may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the council by simply drawing the chairman's attention to its infringement.

20. *Speaking on moving or seconding a motion.*—The mover of any motion shall be the first to speak to it after its being seconded, but any councillor merely seconding a motion without remark shall not be held to have spoken to same.

21. *Priority of speaking.*—If two or more councillors rise at the same time to speak, the chairman shall decide who is entitled to priority.

22. *Speaking twice on the same subject.*—No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, except by the way of explanation, or in reply upon any original motion or amendment of which he was the mover; and immediately after the reply, the amendment or original motion, as the case may be, shall be at once put to the vote.

23. *Amendments, how allowed.*—One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but, if lost, one other can be moved before the original motion is put to the vote. In the event, however, of an amendment being carried, the original motion shall be deemed rejected, and the amendment so carried shall take the place of such original motion, and on it one amendment can then be moved, but no more.

24. *Disorderly conduct.*—No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion, nor impute motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly.

25. No councillor shall be allowed to continue a statement relative to any previous action or words of another councillor after the veracity of such statement shall have been decided by the councillor referred to.

26. Any councillor making use of an expression capable of being offensively applied to any other councillor, shall immediately upon being required by the chairman so to do, withdraw such expression, and make a satisfactory apology to the council.

27. In the event of any such conduct as last mentioned, or other disorderly behaviour on the part of a councillor, the chairman shall call upon such councillor by name to withdraw, and upon his withdrawal (after having been first heard in explanation, if he so desires), the council shall at once take the case into consideration.

28. Any councillor may require the town clerk to take down any particular words used by another councillor, immediately upon their being used.

29. *Production of documents.*—Any member may of right require the production of any documents of the council bearing upon the question or business then under discussion, but no question can be entertained or discussion allowed upon any previous action of the council.

30. *Questions, how superseded.*—Any question before the council may be superseded—

1st. By the adjournment of the council on the motion of a councillor "That the council do now adjourn."

2nd. By the previous question, viz., "That this question be now put," being proposed and negatived.

31. *Questions, how to be put.*—The chairman shall, in taking the sense of the council, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative, and the votes of the councillors, if a division be called for, shall be entered in the minutes.

32. *Manner of voting on a division.*—The council shall vote by a show of hands, excepting in cases of elections, when the voting shall be by each councillor writing the name of the person he wishes to vote for on a card and signing his own name to it and handing it in to the presiding chairman for the time being; but no unsigned card shall be received, and all such voting cards shall be preserved by the town clerk for at least twelve months.

33. *Adjournments.*—No discussion shall be allowed upon any motion for the adjournment of the council, but such motion shall, immediately upon being seconded, be put from the chair,

and in the event of its being negatived, the consideration of the subject then under discussion shall be resumed, or the next on the business paper be proceeded with, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before it shall be competent for a further motion for adjournment to be entertained; but should a motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of on the business paper of the day shall take precedence of all else under "orders of the day" at the next meeting of council.

34. *Committee of the whole.*—For the consideration of any matter requiring a discussion of details, it shall be competent for the council to resolve itself into a committee of the whole; and in such committee the standing orders shall be observed, except the rule limiting the number of times each councillor may speak.

35. *Committee of the whole may be interrupted for want of a quorum.*—The discussion of any question in such committee cannot proceed if a legal quorum cease to be present; but in the event of an interruption from such cause, the council may order the resumption of such committee on a future day, on motion upon notice, and the discussion of such question shall then be resumed at the point at which it was interrupted.

36. *Council may be counted out.*—No debate in council can be continued if a legal quorum cease to be present, but the order of the day or motion then under discussion and so interrupted may be restored to the business paper, and the debate thereon resumed at the following council meeting at the point at which it was so interrupted.

37. *Protests.*—Any councillor may record his protest against any resolution of the council on giving notice of his intention so to do immediately upon the adoption of such resolution, and by handing in such protest, specifying his reasons for recording it, in writing under his own hand, to the town clerk, at least twenty-four hours before the next meeting of council, when the same shall be duly entered upon the council's minutes of the day on which the resolution was passed: Provided always that such protest may be afterwards expunged, if declared by a majority of the council not to be in accordance with truth, or not to be in its terms respectful to the council.

CHAPTER III.—COMMITTEES.

38. *Standing committees.*—There shall at least be two permanent committees of the council, to be elected annually at the meeting of the council next after the annual election of chairman of council; the council, however, having power at any time to fill up occasional vacancies in either, viz.:

"The public works committee" consisting of five councillors, three to form a quorum; and "the finance committee" consisting of three councillors, two to form a quorum.

39. *Functions of committees.*—The public works committee shall take cognizance of such matters and in such manner as the council may direct, having power, however, to report to the council upon any matter that they deem it advisable otherwise to notice or enquire into.

The finance committee shall receive and examine all municipal accounts before they are presented to the council, to whom that committee shall then forward them, with a report embodying a recommendation for their payment or otherwise.

40. *Chairman of committees.*—Immediately after each annual election of chairman of council, some other councillor (not being such chairman nor the honorary municipal treasurer) shall be elected by the council as chairman of committees; and it shall be his duty when so elected to preside whenever the council goes into committee of the whole, and also at all meetings of the permanent committees of the council, and to bring up their reports and introduce same to the council; but the council shall have power to fill any vacancy in this post that may occur from death, resignation, or any other cause, any such interim election being, however, only for the time previous to the then next annual election of chairman of committees.

41. *Special committees.*—No special committee shall consist of less than five members, three to form a quorum; and the councillor upon whose motion any special committee is appointed shall be the chairman thereof.

42. *Convening committees.*—The town clerk shall (in manner as may seem desirable) convene such meetings of committees as the respective chairman may direct.

43. *Absence of quorum at committees.*—Unless a quorum shall be present within twenty minutes from the time for which a meeting of committee is called, such meeting shall lapse; such circumstance, and the names of the members who are present, being recorded on the minutes.

44. *Absentees disqualified.*—Any member of the committee absenting himself from three consecutive meetings of which he shall have been notified, shall cease to be a member of such committee, and such circumstance shall be reported by the chairman of the committee to the council at its next meeting.

45. *Vacancies.*—The council shall, if it thinks fit, discharge any member, at his own request, from serving upon a committee; and all vacancies from what cause soever, as they occur, shall be filled up by the council.

46. *Questions, how to be decided.*—All questions arising in committee shall be decided by a majority of the votes of the members of the council present, and whenever the votes are equal the chairman shall give a casting vote.

47. *Reports.*—The reports of committees shall be fairly written out on paper of a uniform size, so as to admit of being bound up at any time if so desired by the council.

CHAPTER IV.—MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS.

48. *Appointment of treasurer.*—Immediately after each annual election of chairman of council and chairman of committees, the council shall proceed to elect some other councillor (not being either of these officers) as honorary municipal treasurer, and shall be at liberty to fill up any vacancy occurring in that office from death, resignation, or otherwise; the councillor, however, so elected to fill any such vacancy, shall only hold office until the next annual election of treasurer.

49. *Financial statement.*—At the first meeting of council in every month, the honorary municipal treasurer shall report the state of the council's account in the bank, and within two months from his election as treasurer lay before the council a financial statement, showing the estimated probable receipts and expenditure of the council for the current municipal year; and upon the adoption by the council of his said statement, and of a resolution affirming the rate to be levied for each year, he shall bring up a bye-law for the enforcement of such rate.

50. *Payments, how to be made.*—All moneys received shall be lodged to the credit of the "Brown's and Scarsdale Corporation" in the bank, and all disbursements on behalf of the corporation shall be paid by cheques drawn on their account in the joint names of the honorary municipal treasurer for the time being, and the town clerk; but before any disbursement can be made of the corporation funds, the said honorary municipal treasurer must receive from under the hand of the chairman of council a warrant to the following effect, which shall be a sufficient voucher for the auditors:—

51. *Call of the council.*—It shall be competent for any councillor at any time to move (without previous notice) for a call of the council to take into consideration any particular subject or question at the next or any subsequent meeting, and in the event of such motion being carried, the object for which the call is made shall be notified to each councillor, when the meeting for which the call is made is being convened, and it shall also be entered in the business paper for such meeting; and no councillor shall be absent when the subject or question for which the call was made comes under consideration, nor shall be absent at the voting upon such subject or question, or any amendment thereof (whether of adjournment or otherwise) unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the council.

52. *Election of officers.*—No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until six clear days' notice has been given in a newspaper circulating in the district, inviting applications for the same, and the maximum salary or other remuneration of such office shall in all cases (except when the office is to be let by tender) be fixed before proceeding to the election; and at all such elections the voting shall be by each councillor signing his own voting-paper or card, after first inserting the name of the person he supports—no other can be received, and the town clerk shall preserve the same as a record.

53. *Contracts.*—No councillor shall have, directly or indirectly, by himself or his partner, any share or interest in any contract or employment with or by the council (except as a shareholder in some public company or corporation with which the council may contract for the supply of gas or water or for other public purposes); nor shall any councillor be received as surety for any officer; nor shall any councillor, auditor, or other officer become security for any contractor or other person employed with or by the council.

54. *Corporate seal.*—The town clerk shall have the custody of the common seal of the municipality, and be responsible for the same, and every impression thereof shall be verified by his signature. He shall not affix it to any corporate document without the express minute of the council; but in case of powers of attorney or other legal documents not relating to the corporation, but which require to be verified before the chairman by declaration or otherwise, the said seal shall and may be affixed by the town clerk to the chairman's certificate.

55. In all cases not hereinbefore provided for, resort shall be had to the rules, forms, and usages of parliament, so far as the same are applicable to the proceedings of this council.

56. *Suspension of standing orders.*—Any one or more of these standing orders may be suspended *pro tem.* in case of emergency, with the consent of a majority of the council, except standing orders Nos. 12 and 56.

57. *Penalty for breach of standing orders.*—The neglect or breach of the foregoing bye-law shall subject the person or persons guilty of the same to a penalty not exceeding Twenty shillings.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 1, made by the municipal council of Brown's and Scarsdale, has been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 20th of April, 1863.

MUNICIPALITY OF BROWN'S AND SCARSDALE.

BYE-LAW No. 2.—FOR REGULATING PROCEEDINGS AT THE ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN AND AT ELECTIONS OF MEMBERS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL AND PUBLIC MEETINGS OF THE RATEPAYERS.

WHEREAS it has been deemed expedient by the municipal council of Brown's and Scarsdale, in exercise and execution of the powers to them given by the Act of Council 18th Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, to make provisions for

regulating proceedings at election of chairman and of members of the said council, and for conducting public meetings of the ratepayers within the municipal district of Brown's and Scarsdale: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the said municipal council, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of Victoria, the following shall be the method of conducting the several matters herein referred to, that is to say:—

1. Written declaration of vacancies in the council, resulting from disqualification by absence or otherwise, may be made by the chairman and one or more councillors, and countersigned by the town clerk.

2. Voluntary resignation of membership shall be made in writing, addressed to the chairman of the council, and be presented by him to the council at the next meeting thereafter for their ordering on the same.

3. The chairman of the council shall be annually elected in the following manner:—Each councillor being supplied by the town clerk with a voting-paper, containing the names of the whole of the members of the council, shall mark that of the councillor for whom he votes, and deposit the paper in the urn or voting-box. On the delivery of the whole of the papers (it being obligatory upon every member of council to vote if the whole of the council be present), otherwise after one hour, the chairman shall announce the name of each councillor voted for, the number of such votes, and declare the name of the one who has a majority of votes to be duly elected the chairman of the council for the ensuing municipal year, who shall then and there take the chair accordingly.

4. If the result of the voting for chairman should be that the highest number of votes is held equally by two or more councillors, then another voting shall take place for those councillors only holding such equality of votes until a majority is recorded, the then chairman giving a casting vote in addition to his own in case of an equality of votes on the final division.

5. Upon the resignation or disqualification of the chairman of the council, at the next or any subsequent meeting of the council the senior councillor then present shall take the chair *pro tempore*, and immediately after the confirmation of the minutes of the preceding meeting shall proceed to the election of a chairman of council for the residue of the municipal year in manner prescribed by this bye-law, and in the event of an equality of votes being recorded, shall have a casting vote in addition to his own.

6. In determining the seniority of councillors for the purposes of this bye-law, it shall be understood to mean those councillors who shall have held office for the longest period without re-election, and having the greatest number of votes when re-elected.

7. At any election of members of council it shall be lawful for the chairman to appoint, under his hand, such and so many persons as may seem necessary to the council to act as poll clerks; and any candidate may appoint, by written authority, one scrutineer to act in his behalf, said written authority to be handed to the chairman before Eight o'clock a.m. on the day of polling.

8. If at any election for members of council a poll should be demanded, in the manner and form required by clause 19 of 18th Victoria No. 15, the chairman shall cause to be provided at the polling place a sufficient number of enclosed desks or compartments, each of which shall be provided with pens, ink, and blotting-paper, or with pencils, for the purpose of enabling the electors to secretly mark the ballot-papers as hereinafter provided; and the chairman shall also cause to be erected a barrier to divide the part of such room used for taking the poll from the other part thereof.

9. No person other than the chairman, town clerk, poll clerk or clerks, the scrutineers, and the electors who shall for the time being be tendering their votes, shall be entitled to be at the polling side of the barrier; and any person other than such persons aforesaid who shall intrude in such part of the room during the continuance of such poll shall withdraw upon being required by the chairman so to do: provided always that it shall be lawful for the chairman or the town clerk to summon to his assistance any member or members of the police force, for the purpose of preserving the public peace, quelling any breach thereof that may have arisen, and for removing from within such barrier or from the polling-room any person who may, in his or their opinion, be obstructing the polling, or wilfully violating any of the provisions of this bye-law or of the said Act.

10. The chairman shall cause to be printed, and stamped with the municipal seal, a sufficient number of voting-papers, in the form set forth in the schedule to this bye-law, which voting-papers he shall have in his own custody, and shall write his initials on the back of every voting-paper before it shall be delivered to any ratepayer about to vote; and upon the delivery of each ballot-paper the chairman shall check or cause to be checked off, upon a printed roll signed by the chairman, the voter's name.

11. It shall be lawful for the chairman, at the request of any candidate or scrutineer, to put to any person, before he shall receive his voting-paper, the following questions only:—

- 1st. What is your christian name and surname?
- 2nd. Are you the age of twenty-one years?
- 3rd. Are you the person whose name appears on the ratepayers' roll, numbered?
- 4th. Have you already voted at this election?

And no person shall wilfully give a false answer to any of the questions aforesaid.

12. In case any candidate or ratepayer shall object to any person tendering his vote, as provided by clause 20 of 18th Victoria No. 15, or in case the voting-paper as of any person shall have been received, and any other person shall afterwards demand his voting-paper as of the same person, the chairman, when such person shall propose to deposit his voting-paper in the ballot-box, shall refuse to allow the same to be put therein, but shall receive and keep the same apart, and at the

close of the election decide whether such person has already voted or not, and if it shall appear to the chairman that such elector has not already voted, such vote shall be added to the number already polled, but if otherwise, such vote shall not be allowed.

13. The chairman shall be provided with a locked box (of which he shall keep the key) with a cleft or opening in such box capable of receiving the voting-papers, and which box shall stand upon the table at which the chairman, poll clerk, and scrutineers shall preside; and each elector shall receive a voting-paper, in the form in the schedule hereunto annexed, and shall thereupon retire alone to a desk or compartment provided for that purpose, and there strike out the name or names of such candidates as he does not intend to vote for, and deposit the same in the ballot-box, in the presence of the chairman, poll clerks, and such scrutineers as may be then present. And in case any such elector shall be unable to read, or be blind, he shall signify the same to the chairman, who shall thereupon proceed with such elector to a desk or compartment as aforesaid, and there strike out the name or names of such candidate or candidates as such elector shall designate; and no elector shall take out of such polling-room any such voting-paper, either before or after he has marked the same.

14. Every elector may vote for any number of candidates, not exceeding the number of councillors to be chosen; and any ballot-paper recording a greater number of votes shall be absolutely rejected at the close of the poll.

15. At the close of the poll the chairman shall, as soon after as conveniently may be, in the presence of the poll clerks and scrutineers then present, count the number of votes polled for each candidate, and the chairman shall then, in the presence of the scrutineers, seal up all the voting-papers given out during the poll, together with the copy or copies of the ratepayers' roll used for marking off the voters' names, and the town clerk shall safely preserve them for at least six months among the records of the council.

16. No person shall personate an elector or deceased elector, or vote or attempt to vote a second time on the same day.

17. Neither the chairman, poll clerks, scrutineers, or any other person shall attempt to ascertain for whom any elector shall have voted, except and as provided by clause 15 of this bye-law, or shall divulge the name or names of the candidate or candidates for whom such person shall have voted, except when required to do so by any court having competent jurisdiction, or directly or indirectly aid in the discovery of the same.

18. All expenses incurred by the chairman of the council in carrying into effect this bye-law shall be paid and discharged by the municipal council out of the rates or other corporate funds.

19. Any person or persons committing a breach of this bye-law shall, on conviction before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds.

The voter is to strike out the name or names of the candidate or candidates for whom he does not intend to vote by drawing a line through the same with the pencil or pen.

The voter is not permitted to take his ballot-paper out of the polling place.

MUNICIPALITY OF DUNOLLY.

BYE-LAW No. 26.—FOR THE PRESERVATION OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH AND THE SUPPRESSION OF NUISANCES CAUSED BY THE OVERFLOW OR SOAKAGE OF WATER-CLOSETS AND CESSPOOLS.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the preservation of the public health and the suppression of nuisances: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Dunolly, that the owner or occupier of any house or premises shall not allow the contents of any water-closet, privy, or cesspool, to overflow or soak therefrom so as to be a nuisance or injurious to the health of the inhabitants, after written notice from the local inspector of nuisances, or other duly authorised officer of the said municipal council, to such owner or occupier to abate the same.

Any person guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall forfeit and pay a penalty or sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 26, made by the municipal council of Dunolly, has been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 20th day of April, 1863.

MUNICIPALITY OF HAMILTON.

BYE-LAW No. 11.—FOR PREVENTING DAMAGE TO THE PUBLIC FOOTPATHS AND WATER-COURSES, AND FOR REGULATING THE FORMATION OF CROSSINGS OVER FOOTPATHS AND WATER-COURSES.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted that every municipal council shall have the care and management of the roads, streets, paths, and public thoroughfares, and shall and may make bye-laws for carrying out these objects: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Hamilton, by and with the consent of His Excellency the Governor:—

1. No person or persons shall ride, drive, or lead any horse or beast, nor shall drive or wheel any cart, barrow, carriage, or other vehicle, upon or across any of the public footways within the district, nor in any way damage or cause to be damaged the public water-courses or any of them.

2. Every owner or occupier of any gateway, yard, lane, or right-of-way to which access by horses, beasts, carriages, or other vehicles can be obtained only by riding, leading, or wheeling upon or across the said public footpaths or water-courses, who shall make and maintain such crossing or crossings over the said public footpaths and water-courses, or any of them, as may be necessary for approach and access to such gateway, yard, lane, or right-of-way in the manner hereinafter described, at the expense of such owner or occupier, and under the superintendence of the municipal surveyor or such other officer as the municipal council may appoint in that behalf, shall be allowed to use such crossing without being liable to the penalty hereinafter provided.

3. In streets where a stone or wood kerb is now or may hereafter be laid, every such crossing as aforesaid when required shall be paved with stone or wood pavement the whole width of the footpath from the building line to the pavement of the water-channel in cases where the said channel is or shall be paved, and in cases where the water-channel shall not be paved, then as far as the kerbing of the footpath, and shall be enclosed on both sides with a stone or wood kerbing of the same size and description as the street kerbing, and the water-channel must not in any way be altered or obstructed. In cases where the water-channel is not paved the street kerbing need not be removed, but a wooden bridge shall be placed across the channel in the manner hereinafter provided.

4. In streets where a footpath and water-channel are or may hereafter be formed, and where no kerbing is laid, suitable wooden bridges must be provided and fixed over the water-channel so as to leave a free passage for the water underneath said bridges, which may project into the public roadway not less than four feet from the outer edge of the footpath.

5. The owners or occupiers of any building or premises shall not cause or suffer any water to be discharged over any public footpath, but such owners or occupiers, or any of them, may make and maintain such drains leading through and under the adjoining path as shall be necessary to discharge the water from such building or premises into the public water-channels, at the expense of such owners or occupiers under the superintendence aforesaid, and with the consent of the municipal council first had and obtained, without being liable to the penalty hereinafter mentioned.

6. Any person or persons intending to erect buildings in any of the streets of the town, and requiring to cart materials for that purpose across any footpath where no crossing exists, shall, before doing so, make application to the municipal surveyor or such other officer as the municipal council may appoint in that behalf, and on his or their entering into an agreement, and giving proper security for the same, to repair any damages which may be caused to the footpath through the carting aforesaid, shall, if he deem it necessary, give permission to convey materials across the footpath for the purposes required by the applicants.

7. Any person or persons guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20), to be recovered before any two or more of Her Majesty's justices of the peace.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 11, made by the municipal council of Hamilton, has been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 20th day of April, 1863.

BYE-LAW No. 37.—FOR IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND ON THE RATEABLE PROPERTY IN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF ST. KILDA, FOR THE CURRENT MUNICIPAL YEAR 1863-64.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to impose a rate on all houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district, according to the fair average annual value thereof, such rate not to exceed Two shillings in the pound of such value: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of St. Kilda, that a rate for the current municipal year of One shilling in the pound on the annual value of all property in houses and lands within the limits of the said municipal district, be imposed and levied, and be due and payable in equal portions on the first day of May and the first day of September respectively, in the present year 1863.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 37, made by the municipal council of St. Kilda, has been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 20th of April, 1863.

MUNICIPALITY OF SMYTHESDALE.

BYE-LAW No. 14 OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF SMYTHESDALE.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the suppression of nuisances and the preservation of the public health: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Smythesdale, that it shall not be lawful for any person to deposit, place, or put, so as to be a nuisance or injurious to the health of the inhabitants, any nightsoil, manure, offal, or other offensive refuse or matter whatsoever within the boundaries of the said municipal district; it shall be lawful to deposit any such nightsoil, offal, or other offensive refuse or matter within the boundaries of the public manure depot appointed to be the receptacle of such nightsoil, manure, offal, or other offensive refuse or matter; and any person or persons who shall be guilty of the neglect or breach of this bye-law shall, upon conviction before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 14, made by the municipal council of Smythesdale, has been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 20th day of April, 1863.

MUNICIPALITY OF WARRNAMBOOL.

BYE-LAW No. 36.—FOR THE PRESERVATION OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH AND THE SUPPRESSION OF NUISANCES CAUSED BY THE OVERFLOW OR SOAKAGE OF WATER-CLOSETS AND CESS-POOLS.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the preservation of the public health and the suppression of nuisances: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Warrnambool, that the owner or occupier of any house or premises shall not allow the contents of any water-closet, privy, or cesspool, to overflow or soak therefrom so as to be a nuisance or injurious to the health of the inhabitants, after written notice from the local inspector of nuisances to such owner or occupier to abate the same.

Any person guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall forfeit and pay a penalty or sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.

BYE-LAW No. 37.—TO AUTHORISE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF WARRNAMBOOL TO APPLY THE LEGISLATIVE GRANT-IN-AID FOR THE YEAR ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND SIXTY-TWO, AMOUNTING TO ONE THOUSAND ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-SIX POUNDS NINE SHILLINGS AND ONE PENNY (£1166 9s. 1d.).

THE Parliament of Victoria having granted the sum or One thousand one hundred and sixty-six pounds nine shillings and one penny sterling for the execution of public works in the municipality of Warrnambool, the municipal council thereof enact that the amount of the said grant shall be applied in and towards the execution of such public works as are enumerated and set forth in the schedule hereunto appended.

The foregoing Bye-laws, No. 36, 37, and 38, made by the municipal council of Warrnambool, have been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 20th of April, 1863.

STORE AND TRANSPORT REGULATIONS.

FUEL AND WATER IN COUNTRY DISTRICTS.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has made the subjoined regulations relative to the supply of Fuel and Water in country districts (in lieu of sub-regulations No. 5 to regulation No. 52 of the 15th of February, 1853), viz.:

1. In every country town where three or more officers are stationed the usual supplies of fuel and water shall be obtained by a contract to be entered into on the part of the Government by a board, such board to consist of the senior or chief officer of each of the several departments in the town or district for which the supplies are required.

2. The senior officer of the board shall act as chairman, and, when necessary, convene meetings of the board for the consideration of tenders, and, in dealing with them, the course prescribed by the general store and transport regulations shall, as far as practicable, be observed.

3. In towns or places where less than three officers are stationed, and in country places removed from any town, supplies must be procured by each officer in the manner most economical, and the accounts, certified by the head of the department, are to be rendered to the Government Storekeeper.

4. Accounts for supplies of fuel and water made under contracts entered into by a board, as above laid down, must be certified by the chairman of the Board, the officer requiring the supplies, and the head of the department.

5. All accounts for fuel and water must be forwarded to the Government Storekeeper for liquidation.

6. Information as to the forms to be observed in calling for tenders, &c., and forms for the preparation of contracts, &c., can be obtained from the Government Storekeeper.

7. This regulation applies to all towns, except Melbourne and its suburbs, Geelong, and Williamstown.
