NOTICE TO MERCHANTS, AGENTS, AND MASTERS OF VESSELS TRADING TO WELSHPOOL, CORNER INLET.

REFERRING to the intimation of this date respecting Welshpool Jetty, it is hereby directed:

1. Merchants, agents, and others will be required to give at the Custom House, Port Albert, twenty-four hours' clear notice prior to their landing at or shipping goods from the jetty in question.

2. An officer will then be despatched thither, free of expense to the applicant, to attend to such landing or shipping, as the case may be; and such officer will be empowered to receive the inward report of masters of vessels trading to Welshpool, and to clear vessels outwards, without the necessity of any master proceeding to Port Albert.

3. Any goods landed or shipped, except under the provisions of the laws relating to the Customs, and in presence of an officer of Customs, will be forfeited, and the parties concerned in the illegal landing or shipment thereof will be liable to the penalties imposed by the said laws.

THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF WANGARATTA.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant-Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that any district of the colony of Victoria, the area whereof should not exceed nine square miles; and which should contain a population of householders not less than three hundred, might, subject to the provisions of the said Act, be constituted a municipal district as thereafter mentioned; provided that no one point in any such area should be distant more than six miles from any other point; and it was further enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant-Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than one hundred and fifty householders resident within any such district, praying that such district might be declared a municipal district under the said Act, to cause the substance and prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition, signed by an equal or greater number of householders resident within such locality, should have been delivered at the office of the Colonial Secretary within one month from the date of such publication) the Lieutenant-Governor, with the advice aforesaid, might, if he should think fit, declare by Proclamation such locality a municipal district by a name to be mentioned in such Proclamation, and also by the same, or any other Proclamation might define the limits and boundaries of such municipal district, and such limits and boundaries at any time thereafter in the same manner, on receipt of a similar petition, might vary and alter, but so as in no case save as thereafter mentioned to include within the limits or boundaries of such municipal district an area of more than nine square miles, and upon the publication of any such Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, such locality so defined should be deemed and taken to be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act: And whereas a petition for the purposes aforesaid has been presented to the Governor by the householders and landholders resident at and near Wangaratta, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published as directed by the said Act, and no counter-petition, in accordance with the terms of the said Act, has been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation declare that the district hereinafter described and named shall be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF WANGARATTA.—Commencing at the south-west angle of allotment 1, section F, on Fifteen-mile Creek; thence north to the north-west angle of allotment 6, same section; thence east to the south-west angle of allotment 3, section 4, suburban allotments, Wangaratta; thence north to the north-west angle of allotment 1, section 8, suburban; thence east to the north-east angle of section 11, crossing the King River; thence northerly to the north-west angle of allotment 1, section B, on Reedy Creek; thence by the north-western boundary of last-named allotment north-easterly to

the north-eastern angle thereof; thence by a road and a line bearing S. 40° E. one hundred and fifty-five chains, more or less, to the Keedy Creek; thence by a straight line south-westerly to the south-east angle of allotment 4, section 16, suburbs, at Wangaratta; thence south to the south-east angle of allotment 7, section 17, suburbs; thence west to the King River, by that river southerly to the south-east angle of allotment 2, section E; thence west to the south-west angle thereof; thence by a road bearing S. 23° 20' E., and S. 32° 30' E., to the south-east angle of allotment 4, section 5, south of Wangaratta suburban allotments; thence west to the south-west angle of allotment 5, section 1, same survey; thence by a road bearing S. 23° 30' W. two chains; thence west two miles, more or less, to the point of commencement.

And I do hereby, with the advice aforesaid, direct that the council of the said municipal district shall be called by the name and style of "The Municipal Council of Wangaratta."

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this fifteenth day of June, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and in the twenty-sixth year of Her Majesty's reign.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

IMPORTATION OF CATTLE INTO OTAGO FROM PORT ALBERT, IN GIPPS LAND, PROHIBITED.

THE accompanying Proclamation by His Honor the Superintendent of Otago, under the New Zealand *Diseased Cattle Act, 1861*, is published for the information of shippers of cattle and others.

Proclamation prohibiting the Importation of Cattle from Port Albert, in Gipps Land, into the Province of Otago, by the Honorable JOHN HYDE HARRIS, Esquire, Superintendent of the said Province.

WHEREAS by section 9 of the *Diseased Cattle Act, 1861*, passed by the General Assembly of New Zealand, it is enacted that if at any time it shall be made to appear to the Governor that any infectious or contagious disease has broken out in any district out of the colony, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by Order in Council, to declare that such district is infected within the meaning of the Act, and from time to time to make such regulations as to him shall seem fit for prohibiting the importation of cattle into the colony from such district, and the landing or driving of such cattle, and for destroying cattle imported, landed or driven, contrary to such regulations: And whereas, by section 14 of the same Act, it is enacted that the Governor in Council may, by warrant under his hand, from time to time, delegate to the superintendent of any province within the colony, all or any of the powers vested in the Governor or Governor in Council by the said Act: And whereas the Governor in Council hath, by warrant under his hand, delegated to me, John Hyde Harris, so long as I shall hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Otago, the several powers vested in the Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act: And whereas a proclamation was issued by the Superintendent of the said Province of Otago, under the public seal of the said province, on the twentieth day of September last, admitting cattle from Port Albert, in Gipps Land, which it is expedient partially to rescind to the intent that this proclamation may have full force and effect: And whereas it has been made to appear to me that a certain infectious or contagious disease has broken out amongst cattle in the district of Gipps Land aforesaid: Now therefore I, the said John Hyde Harris, by virtue of the powers vested in me in this behalf, do hereby rescind the aforesaid proclamation of the twentieth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, so far as relates to the exception therein contained in favor of Port Albert, in Gipps Land, and do hereby proclaim and declare that, from and after the date hereof, Port Albert, in Gipps Land, shall be deemed an infected district, place, or port, within the meaning and for the purposes of the abovementioned Act, and that no cattle from and after the date hereof, until further notice, shall be permitted to be imported into the province of Otago from Port Albert, in Gipps Land.

MUNICIPALITY OF AVOCA.

BYE-LAW No. 23.—FOR IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND ON THE ANNUAL VALUATION OF PROPERTY IN HOUSES AND LANDS WITHIN THE AVOCA MUNICIPAL DISTRICT.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled *An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it was with other things enacted, that the municipal council of any municipal district should cause an annual valuation of all houses and lands within the boundaries of such district, and impose a rate on such valuation not exceeding Two shillings in the pound: And whereas the municipal council of Avoca has made such valuation, full particulars of which are only lodged in the offices of the said council: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Avoca, that a rate of One shilling in the pound be levied thereon for the current municipal year, the fifth, one moiety to be due and payable on the 19th day of June, 1863; and the second moiety thereof to be due and payable on the 10th December, 1863: Provided, nevertheless, that all rates which shall not exceed in amount Ten shillings, shall be due and payable, in one amount, on the 19th June, 1863, aforesaid.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 23, made by the municipal council of Avoca, has been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 15th day of June, 1863.

PUBLIC WORKS.

A contract has been completed for the formation of 12½ chains of Gipps street, and the pitching and metalling of the same with bluestone and insertion of two 12-inch barrel culverts.

Various repairs have been effected on the Rosebrook and Yambuk roads, and 2480 cubic yards of earth removed from water-channels and hips of street have been disposed of to the contractor for the jetty bridge at a price which relieves the council altogether of the expense.

FINANCE.

The debt of £300 to Bank of Victoria has been paid off, as also that of £107 17s. 3d. to the district road board for half share contract, repairs to Rosebrook Bridge, and the council is now free from debt except a small amount due for rent of chambers, but which will be met by rates, &c., still to be collected.
