THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and sixty-one landholders and householders resident at Sale, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state their conviction that necessity exists for the erection of Sale into a municipal district as tending to its improvement and good government, and that a public meeting was held at Sale on the 6th of April last, at which meeting it was unanimously resolved as follows:—That the important and growing interests of Sale imperatively call for local self-government; that the meeting views with apprehension the probability of Sale being included in a district council, and desires respectfully to represent to your Excellency that its formation into a municipality is the course best adapted to its interests and circumstances.

The petitioners further state that Sale is the most populous town in Gipps Land, that its buildings are increasing, while its streets remain in their primitive state, and are during the winter months almost impassable, and that business is then conducted under circumstances adverse to the prosperity of the town and suburbs.

They add that the sites of the new Government Offices, Court House, and Gaol, are in streets not under the control of the district engineer; that the area comprised in the district prayed for does not exceed nine square miles, in which no point is distant six miles from any other; and that it contains a population of not less than 300 householders.

And the petitioners pray as follows, viz.:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that the area contained within the following boundaries may be proclaimed as the 'Sale Municipal District,' viz.:—Bounded on the north by a one-chain road commencing at the north-west corner of

suburban allotment No. 74, parish of Sale, and bearing east one hundred and eighty chains; on the east by a one-chain road, bearing south one hundred and eighty-seven chains to Flooding Creek; on the south by Flooding Creek; and on the west by Flooding Creek to the south-west corner of allotment 74; and by the western boundary of lot 74, bearing north eight chains to the point of commencement."

KEILOR ROAD DISTRICT.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE KEILOR DISTRICT ROAD BOARD.

THE regular meetings of the board shall be held at the Keilor Court House, on every alternate Wednesday, at Three o'clock p.m., for the time being.

2. Three members shall form a quorum.
3. Business shall commence as soon as a quorum is present; but should a quorum not be present at the expiration of half an hour after the time appointed for meeting, a memorandum shall be made of same in the minute book, recording the names of the members present, and the meeting shall lapse.
4. Special meetings may be called at any time, by order of the chairman or of three members of the board, addressed to the secretary in writing, giving three clear days' notice, and specifying the business to be considered.
5. At every regular meeting of the board the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting for confirmation the minutes of the preceding meeting; and no discussion shall be permitted thereon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings. The minutes then confirmed shall be signed by the chairman for the time being.
6. After the confirmation of the minutes the order of business shall be as follows, viz.:—

1. Reading copies of letters sent.
2. Reading letters received, considering and ordering thereon.
3. Reception and reading of petitions.
4. Receiving notices of motion.
5. Reading and ordering on reports of committees.
6. Motions of which previous notice has been given.
7. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the board and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration.
8. No motion entered on the business paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called.
9. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind a motion already passed, shall be entertained during the current year, unless a call of a special meeting of the whole board shall have been made for that purpose.
10. Members must stand while speaking, and address the chairman.
11. No member shall be interrupted except by a call to order.
12. No member shall speak more than twice on any motion or amendment, except in reply or personal explanation.
13. The ruling of the chairman shall be final on all points of order and practice.
14. Every motion and amendment shall be entered on the minutes, with the names of the mover and seconder, and on a division thereon the votes shall be recorded.
15. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote.
16. Notice of motion may be dispensed with in cases of emergency, provided that not more than three members be absent at such board meeting.
17. No election to any office at the disposal of the board shall be made until eight clear days' notice shall have been given by advertisement.
18. Contracts shall be made by tender, and shall be duly advertised as the board may direct.
19. Tenders shall be deposited at the office of the board, and shall be opened by the chairman of the meeting held for the consideration of the same.
20. Contracts shall be prepared at the expense of the contractor, and signed on behalf of the board by two members, one

of whom shall be the chairman of the meeting at which such tender shall have been accepted.

21. Every contractor shall deposit with the board satisfactory security for the fulfilment of his contract.

22. All payments must be made by cheque, signed by the chairman, treasurer, and secretary.

23. In all cases it shall be sufficient for the collector to call once for payment of any amount due on the assessment roll, and in the event of any such amount not being paid before the expiration of one month from the date thereof, proceedings will be taken for its recovery; but in no case shall the collector institute any legal proceedings without instructions from the board.

24. The collector shall pay to the treasurer, weekly, all moneys collected; he shall also, at the same time, furnish an account of all such moneys.

25. The collector and treasurer shall present their accounts at every regular meeting of the board.

26. The officers of the board shall be required to enter into security for the due fulfilment of their duties to such an amount as may be fixed by the board.

27. The finance committee shall consist of three members of the board, duly elected. Their duty shall be to examine all the accounts of the board.

28. The duty of the works committee shall be to examine all contracts during progress, and also all roads under repair; and no application for a progress or final payment shall be entertained unless recommended by the surveyor and one of the works committee.

ARARAT PUBLIC CEMETERY.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE ARARAT PUBLIC CEMETERY, MADE UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF 17TH VICTORIA No. 12.

ALL charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground is broken or a vault re-opened.

2. On application for permission to make a vault or erect a monument in the cemetery being made to the trustees, a certificate of permission will be granted on payment of the fees set forth in the schedule.

3. Charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery on the certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, and that the relatives of the deceased were unable to pay the usual fees.

4. Order for interment to be given either to the sexton or at the office of the trustees on the previous day, when a form of instruction according to schedule B must be filled up and given to the sexton.

5. The sexton shall dig all ordinary graves, unless otherwise specially ordered, on payment of the fee mentioned in schedule A; parties requiring brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of the trustees or any two of them.

6. The time fixed for the funeral must be the time the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

7. The usual hours for the performance of funerals shall be from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. from September to April inclusive, and from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the other four months.

8. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones must be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

9. Plan of every monument or headstone must be submitted to the trustees for their approval.

10. All persons destroying the fences, or in any manner injuring the cemetery, will be prosecuted as the law directs.

11. Every coffin in a vault must be bricked in or cemented, or covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron.

12. A plan of the ground and a register will be kept, which may be examined on payment of the charges set forth in schedule A.

13. The ground will be open daily from sunrise to sunset.

14. The trustees reserve to themselves the right of making any alteration from time to time in these regulations and charges, subject to the approval of His Excellency the Governor in Council.

The following works have been performed:—
Extending footpaths and kerbing same in various streets.
Fixing stone quadrants at corners of streets.
Forming and claying footpaths at Bridge street north, and other streets.
Making footpaths in Farrell street, Graham street, Stoke street, and Beach street.
Repairing Beach street and Heath street.
Repairing footpaths in Bay street, Beach street, Stokes street, and other streets.
Cleansing water-channels in various streets.
A contract has been entered into for the supply of 1000 yards cubic of 2-inch metal for repairs of Beach street, House street, and Graham street.
In consequence of the shifting nature of the soil, considerable expense is incurred in keeping footpaths and other works free of drift sand.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been assented to:—
No. 12. For the establishment of a toll at Ingles street.
No. 20. For levying a rate of One shilling and threepence in the pound.

ELECTIONS, APPOINTMENTS, ETC.

At the first meeting of the council, on 7th August, 1862, Councillor Pickles was elected chairman, but resigned that office on the following day, and on the 18th August, 1862, Councillor Plummer was elected to the vacant office. On 8th August, 1862, Councillors Morley and Poolman resigned their seats, and on 16th September, 1862, Messrs. William May and Alfred J. Johnson were elected to serve in their stead. On 11th September, 1862, Mr. Frederick Peterson was appointed valuator. On 3rd September, Messrs. Donaldson and Stewart were re-appointed auditors. On 2nd October, 1862, Mr. Fredk. Wm. Bull resigned his appointment as surveyor, and on 6th November, 1862, Mr. Robert Rowland Morgan was elected to fill the combined offices of surveyor and inspector of nuisances. On 20th November, 1862, John Gledhill was re-appointed rate collector. On 5th December, 1862, Councillor Byrne was appointed delegate to the municipal conference. On 15th December, 1862, Councillor Ingles resigned.

VALUATION.

The annual valuation of property in the district has made by Mr. F. Peterson. The amount of assessment after appeal amounted to £33,885 10s., at 1s. 3d. = £2117 16s. 10½d.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The danger arising from a low and irregular pressure and a want of extension of the Yan Yean water supply in the district, a subject which had frequently been urged on the attention of

the Government by the council, received a very forcible illustration on 13th November last, when several thousand pounds worth of valuable property was sacrificed solely from want of water, and low pressure. The questions of commonage for the district, of the extension of the municipal boundaries westward, the establishment of a custom house at Sandridge, increased barrack accommodation for the police, and the extension of Beach street eastward, have severally been brought under the notice of the Government by the council. On 6th November last, the council agreed to hold their meetings fortnightly instead of weekly. On 4th December, the Municipal and Charitable Institutions Commission attended at the Court House and took evidence relative to the position of the municipality. On 19th January a municipal fire brigade was established.

ELECTION.

On the 22nd December Dr. Ed. Davy was elected to a seat in the council, in the room of Councillor Hickey, disqualified, by non-attendance.

APPOINTMENTS.

18th December, managers of the municipal common, Messrs. D. Fernie, G. Gillam, and C. Quin; and on 1st April, Councillors Davy and Tyson, in the room of Messrs. Fernie and Gillam, resigned; 5th January, assessor, surveyor, and rate collector, Mr. J. G. Farquhar, at a salary of £50 per annum; auditors, Messrs. John French and George Gillam; 15th January, inspector of nuisances, senior constable Holmes, at a salary of £15 per annum; 19th February, keeper of lodge, Mrs. Isaac, at a weekly salary of 4s. The town clerk was re-appointed at his former salary of £60 per annum.

FINANCE.

The total value of the property within the municipality, after the hearing of appeals, amounted to £7063, on which a rate of One shilling in the pound has been struck.

PUBLIC WORKS.

A permanent improvement has been effected upon the spring in Ross street, which is now protected by a fence, and otherwise made more available to the public. Improvements have also been made upon a well on the reserve, for the convenience of parties residing there. The other public works carried out during the half-year have consisted in pitching, metalling, re-metalling, and draining various roads and streets.

DEPUTATION.

The Chairman, accompanied by the Chairman of the Daylesford municipality and the Chairman of the Glenlyon Road Board, waited upon the Honorable Commissioner of Railways and Roads, relative to building bridges over the Loddon and Wallaby Creeks. Want of funds prevented the Honorable Commissioner from complying with the objects of the deputation.

FORMATION OF A SHIRE.

This subject has been under the consideration of the council during the latter part of the half-year, and the Chairman and Councillors Tyson, McGrane, and Davy, appointed a Shire Committee. Nothing definite has at present been arrived at in the matter.

BYE-LAWS.

The following have been assented to:—No. 6. For the preservation of the public health and the suppression of nuisances caused by the overflow or soakage of waterclosets or cesspools. No. 7. For levying a rate of One shilling in the pound for the current year.


