THE BRAYBROOK ROAD DISTRICT TOLLS.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, to declare the rates of tolls to be collected by any district road board, as thereinafter mentioned, and such rates and tolls from time to time to vary and alter, and any such Proclamation to revoke; and it is also enacted, that in case any district road board shall deem it advisable that money should be raised by tolls, it shall be lawful for such board, subject to the approval of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to cause from time to time such and so many toll-bars, toll-gates, and toll-houses to be erected and built in and upon the roads within their respective road districts, at such places as to each board shall seem fit, and in like manner to cause such toll-bars, toll-gates, and toll-houses to be removed, or built, or placed on other parts of the said roads, and to direct tolls to be paid for all animals and vehicles passing or re-passing through such toll-bars, toll-gates, or toll-houses, at a rate not exceeding the rates to be declared as aforesaid, and such rates from time to time to reduce or raise to any amount not exceeding the rates to be so declared: And whereas the Braybrook District Road Board deem it advisable that money should be raised by tolls within their district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare the rates of tolls hereinafter specified, to be the rates of tolls to be collected by the said Braybrook District Road Board, that is to say:—

MEREDITH POLICE LOCK-UP DISCONTINUED AS A GAOL.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the eleventh day of February, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, a certain building called and known as the Police Lock-up, situate at Meredith, was declared to be and constitute a gaol, prison, and house of correction, within the meaning of the Act passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders*: And whereas it is expedient to discontinue the use of the said premises for the confinement of prisoners under sentence: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the Proclamation hereinbefore mentioned, and do hereby notify that the said premises shall cease to be a gaol, prison, and house of correction.

MALICIOUSLY KILLING HORSES.

FORTY POUNDS REWARD.—FREE PARDON TO AN ACCOMPLICE.

WHEREAS during the night of Tuesday, the 21st of July last, Two Horses belonging to John Dunkley, left to graze on the Farmers' Common, North Wangaratta, were maliciously shot dead: And whereas Mr. Dunkley has offered a Reward of Twenty pounds for information leading to the conviction of the offender: Notice is hereby given that a Reward of Twenty pounds (supplementary to the above-mentioned reward) will be paid by the Government for such information as shall lead to the conviction of the person or persons guilty of the said outrage.

The Governor will also extend Her Majesty's Free Pardon to any person implicated in the above-mentioned outrage, and not being guilty of actually shooting the horses, who will give the required information.

The mean number of deaths in the month during four years was 264, the mean temperature 49.1°, and the mean atmospheric pressure 29.953 inches. The mortality of the month under review was therefore slightly below the average.

The deaths of males and females which occurred during the month numbered respectively 152 and 108, and were in the relative proportions of 58 and 42 per cent. The deaths of children under five years of age were exceeded by those of persons above that age, their numbers respectively being 102 and 153, and their proportions 39 and 61 per cent. Since last October this is the first month in which the deaths of persons at the older period of life have exceeded those at the younger.

The largest number of deaths recorded as taking place on any one day was 15 on the 6th. The smallest number was 3 on the 26th.

Seven persons died during the month at a more advanced longevity than seventy-five years. They were all males, and their deaths occurred as follows.:-A man at eighty-five years of pneumonia, 1 at eighty-four years of apoplexy, 1 at eighty-one years of phthisis, 2 at seventy-seven years of heart disease, 1 at seventy-six years of accidental suffocation, and another at seventy-six years of pneumonia.

Seventeen violent deaths occurred during the month in the following manner:—Two children were accidentally drowned, one of three years old in a tank at Williamstown, and another of a year old at Brighton in a manner not stated. A girl 4 years old died of burns, and a boy at the same age of a scald. A Chinese doctor aged 76 was suffocated with carbonic acid gas, and four infants were suffocated in bed. A male aged 27 died of accidental injury to the head, and another aged 30 of fracture of the vertebra. A laborer aged 41 was killed by falling into the hold of a lighter. A railway platelayer aged 41 was accidentally killed by a truck at Emerald Hill, and a clerk aged 39 in the same manner at Spencer street. A clerk aged 22 died from the effects of laudanum. A male aged 28 committed suicide by cutting his throat, and an infant 6 weeks old was wilfully murdered.

The deaths which occurred in public or charitable institutions were 57, or nearly 22 per cent. of the whole number. They were thus returned:—Melbourne Hospital, 38; Benevolent Asylum, 5; Immigrants' Home, 2; Immigration Depot, 1; Lunatic Asylum, 10; Military Barracks, 1.

MUNICIPALITY OF SANDRIDGE.

BYE-LAW NO. 19.—FOR REGULATING THE DEPOSIT OF BUILDING MATERIALS ON THE PUBLIC STREETS AND ROADS.

WHEREAS by Act of Council 13 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted, amongst other things, that every municipal council shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets, paths, and public thoroughfares, and shall and may make bye-laws for carrying out these objects as to such council shall seem fit: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Sandridge—

1. That no person, having obtained a license in the form set forth in the schedule to this bye-law, shall deposit any materials for building without first of all erecting a good and sufficient hoarding within which such material shall be placed, such

hoarding not to encroach more than one-third of the width of the carriage-road; and the footpaths and water-channels shall in all cases be kept free; and two (2) conspicuous lights shall be kept burning during the night from sunset to sunrise, such lights to be placed one at each end of said hoarding immediately above the top of same.

2. The license shall remain in force twenty-one days from the date thereof and no longer, but a new license may at any time be granted upon application to the council.

3. Any person or persons guilty of a neglect or breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds (£10).

REGULATIONS FOR COMMON LODGING-HOUSES WITHIN THE DISTRICT, MADE UNDER SEC. 10 OF 18 VICTORIA NO. 8.

IN all sleeping apartments a space of not less than three hundred and fifty (350) cubic feet shall be allowed for each person; there shall be proper and efficient means of admitting a plentiful supply of fresh air near the bottom of, and also for permitting the foul air to escape at the upper part of, every such apartment, and no room or building shall be occupied as a sleeping-place without being well ventilated.

2. Every common lodging-house shall be washed and scrubbed throughout once in each week at the least.

3. The inspector of lodging-houses shall have free access to all common lodging-houses for the purpose of examining into the cleanliness and ventilation of same, and to see that the provisions of the Act 18 Victoria No. 8, and of these regulations, are properly adhered to.

4. Males and females shall not be permitted to occupy the same sleeping apartment, except in the case of man and wife, or of children under ten (10) years of age, and no more than one married couple with their children shall (if any) be allowed to occupy the same sleeping apartment.

5. Any person or persons guilty of a breach or neglect of these regulations shall be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds (£5).

The foregoing regulations for common lodging-houses were passed by the municipal council of Sandridge on Thursday, the 16th day of July, A.D. 1863.

WATER SUPPLY.

No reference to the receipts and expenditure of the water supply is made in the above balance-sheet, as the business in connexion therewith has been transferred to separate offices, and special officers have been appointed to conduct it under the direction of the two municipal councils conjointly, under the title of "The Ballaarat and Ballaarat East Water Commission," a special report of which will be shortly published. It may not be out of place here, however, to state that the works are not at present leased, but are under the management of the commission; that the pipes contracted for from England, mentioned in a previous report, are arriving; that a testing machine has been imported and erected at the railway station; the pipes are being duly and severely tested, and but few proved faulty; they are being distributed along the line for laying; the upper reservoir at Harry Beale's Swamp is in course of construction, and other works being carried out, the whole involving a heavy outlay, to meet which the councils are taking measures to effect a loan on their revenues, and it is confidently anticipated that during the

next summer Ballaarat will have the great advantage of being supplied with purer water than heretofore, and in almost unlimited quantity from this source; the advantages that will be derived, and the rates from which, will doubtless amply justify the expenditure made.

RESIGNATION, RETIREMENT BY ROTATION, AND ELECTION.

Councillor C. Dyte resigned his seat in the council at the end of March, but as that gentleman's seat would become vacant by the usual rotation on the 1st June, it was not refilled until the end of the year, when Councillors J. Dodds and J. Fussell retired by rotation. At a public meeting of the ratepayers, held at the Town Hall, on Thursday, 28th May, five candidates were nominated, namely, the abovenamed gentlemen, with Mr. James O'Meara and Mr. Frederick C. Downes, the show of hands being in favor of Messrs. Dodds, Fussell, and Downes, a poll was demanded on behalf of the other candidates, which was taken on the following day, and resulted in the re-election of Councillors Dodds and Fussell, and the election of Mr. F. C. Downes, in the place of Councillor C. Dyte, Councillor Dodds for three years, and Councillors Fussell and Downes for two years.

WORKS EXECUTED DURING THE HALF-YEAR.

Making and fixing culvert across Geelong road and filling in old channel, &c.

Clearing Nos. 6 and 7 storm-water channels and culverts leading thereto.

Kerbing, channelling, and metalling 15 chains of Barkly street.

Filling excavations in Scott's parade and Ebdon street.

Repairing footpaths in Main and Bridge streets:—

330 lineal yards footpath planked.

1170 ditto ditto planks relaid.

182 ditto new kerb.

400 ditto old ditto relaid.

290 superficial yards pitched crossings in Main and Bridge streets.

233 superficial yards of pitched crossings taken up and relaid in Main and Bridge streets.

Forming and metalling 23 chains of King street and constructing timber bridge over creek in Specimen Gully.

Forming, levelling, and gravelling reserve for cattle market, and erecting cattle yards thereon.

Furnishing and stacking 4400 cubic yards of quartz metal on the various streets of the municipality.

Building shed and store-room in Town Hall yard.

Building office for inspector of weights and measures attached to the Town Hall.

Constructing a timber bridge over the Yarrowee Creek, near Little Bendigo, and making approaches thereto.

Erecting 16 rods of fencing in Barkly street.

Forming and gravelling 3 chains of Davies street, constructing a culvert over Blind Creek, and making 10 chains of footpath in Scott's parade.

Filling in holes in Town Hall reserve, improvements to the Town Hall, making access to the roof, tarring Wills street bridge, making and fixing flagstaffs, repairs, &c.

WORKS IN PROGRESS.

Repair and maintenance of footpaths in Main and Bridge streets.

Maintaining in repair 23 chains of King street.

Forming and metalling 19 chains of Rowe street and 23 chains of Peel street.

Repairing White Flat Bridge.

Forming and metalling 35 chains of Humfray street, 10 chains of Queen street, making and fixing five culverts, and maintaining the same until the 15th of December.

Cutting a channel along portion of the Yarrowee Reserve.

Repair and maintenance of the various streets of the municipality.

Conducting the expenditure of £1000 on improvements to the Melbourne road, granted by Government.

BYE-LAW PASSED.

No. 24. To empower the municipal council of Ballaarat East to regulate the duties of Town Crier, and to prevent the sounding of bells and other instruments by unauthorised persons in the public thoroughfares in an excessive manner.

BYE-LAWS UNDER CONSIDERATION.

To regulate and control the use of the wholesale produce, cattle, and general markets.

To enable the municipal council to borrow a certain sum of money for the carrying out of the water supply.

APPLICATIONS TO THE GOVERNMENT, GRANTED.

Reserve.—The reservation for drainage and sanitary purposes, of those two areas of land lying between Peel street Humfray street, and East street, near the railway.

Melbourne road.—In consequence of the application of the residents and owners of land along that portion of the Melbourne road between Ballarat and Lal-lal Creek, assisted by the co-operation of the two municipal councils, for the improvement of the road, the Honorable the Commissioner of Roads and Bridges appropriated the sum of £1000 toward the work, which this council has taken upon itself the responsibility of carrying out.

Main road channels.—Repeated applications have been made during the last three years, for having the Main road channels placed at such levels as would permit of proper drainage, the pitching to be completed throughout, but without success until May last, when the Honorable the Commissioner of Roads and Bridges apportioned the sum of £250 towards the object, and the council considering the necessity of the work, notwithstanding that the road is under the charge of the Central Road Board, has agreed to complete it and pay the additional cost, which is estimated will be at least an equal amount, and may be considerably more.

APPLICATIONS TO THE GOVERNMENT, UNDER CONSIDERATION.

Cemetery.—This matter still remains in abeyance, awaiting new legislation under the amended Municipal Corporations Bill.

Storm-water channel.—That the Government would complete the remaining portion of this channel, so as to give an outlet to the portions already made, and the drainage of the district.—(See further remarks under this head.)

Railway foot bridge.—The foot bridge over the railway at Ryce street, between Queen street and Victoria street bridges, although the Government agreed with the council to construct it at the same time that Queen street bridge was determined upon, has not yet been commenced; the Railway Department has, however, recently promised to commence it as soon as possible.

SURVEY OF STREETS AND SALE OF FRONTAGES.

This most important work is being carried out under contract with the Government and the supervision of the district surveyor, but judging from the progress made, it must be attended with many difficulties, probably owing to the irregular manner in which a large number of the dwellings are erected. In February last, the council having obtained a progress plan of the survey, and in compliance with the repeated requests of the inhabitants, made application for the sale of frontage allotments to certain streets; to this application no reply has yet been received, in consequence of its having been referred to the mining board for report as to any existing objections, which report has not yet been made; it is, however, to be regretted that so much delay should result in complying with the wishes of those whose interests may not interfere with mining operations.

STORM-WATER AND SLUDGE CHANNELS.

Notwithstanding the increasing action upon the Government to obtain the completion of these channels, during the past summer, the council deeply regrets to state that no measures were taken, seeing which, and in consequence of the injurious effects on the health of the district during the summer season and the danger to property in times of rain resulting from the non-completion of these channels. The inhabitants of the district called a public meeting in February last, soliciting the co-operation of the two municipal councils and the other local bodies, again to press upon the Government the necessity for completing this work. At the meeting, which was most numerously and influentially attended, a memorial was adopted to be presented to the Legislative Assembly, and it was also resolved that circulars, embodying the petition, be forwarded to each member of the House, and the co-operation of the representatives of the district invited, which was according done, and the Honorable J. B. Humfray duly presented the memorial, but refrained from giving notice of motion on the subject, from the favorable intimations made to him by several members of the Government, which led that gentleman to believe that the object could be attained without a special vote of the House. The Honorable the Commissioner of Public Works undertook to bring the subject under the notice of his colleagues, and recommend it to their favorable consideration, but since then, that gentleman has repeatedly informed this council that he had not had an opportunity of so doing. A short time previous to the resignation of the late ministry, Mr. Humfray gave notice of motion on the subject, but owing to the recent change of Government, further action is for a short time suspended; it is, however, the intention of the council to use its utmost influence to cause the work to be commenced as soon as the dry season arrives.

WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

The council has built an office for the deposit of the standard weights and measures, and for the use of the inspector, adjoining the Town Hall; during the time this was being done, a room in the Town Hall was temporarily used for that purpose.

LEGISLATIVE.

Mundic.—In consequence of representations from a large number of the inhabitants that mundic was being burnt in the municipality to the injury of health, the council felt called upon to take action in the matter, and having ascertained that it was being burnt at various mining works for the extraction of gold, lost no time in obtaining an analysis and report from the central board of health and an eminent chemist resident in the district, by which it was found that the practice of burning mundic, unless under proper regulations, could no longer be permitted with safety to the health of the inhabitants; the council has, therefore, taken the matter into consideration, with a view of ascertaining the most advisable means to be adopted, which without unnecessarily interfering with mining pursuits, will guarantee protection to health.

Municipal Conference.—The intended final meeting of the municipal conference mentioned in last report did not take place, whereby the business of previous meetings was left in a very unfinished state, and many of the most important matters connected with municipal government undetermined upon. The municipal and charitable institutions commission has furnished its report to the Government, and the new "Municipal Corporations Bill" has been laid before Parliament, and passed the second reading, but unless more extended powers than the Bill proposes are given to municipal corporations, and their permanent endowment more liberally provided for, a favorable opportunity will be lost, and the satisfactory settlement of this long-agitated question further delayed.
