THE DUBLIN EXHIBITION OF 1865.

THE accompanying Despatch of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and other documents relative to an International Exhibition proposed to be held in Dublin during the ensuing year, are published for general information.

SIR,—I transmit to you a copy of a letter (18th June, 1864) from the Secretary to the Dublin Exhibition Palace and Winter Garden Company, requesting that the Governors of the various British Colonies may be apprised of this undertaking, and requested to afford the company such assistance and encouragement as they may be able, in aid of their views.

I shall be very glad if you are able to do anything in furtherance of this enterprise, which appears to deserve the countenance of the Governments.

SIR,—I am directed by the Executive Committee of the International Exhibition to be held in Dublin in 1865, to transmit you a prospectus of the undertaking. You will observe that the list of directors includes the Duke of Leinster, Mr. William Dargan, Mr. B. L. Guinness, and others, whose names offer a guarantee that the project will be carried out in a manner to render it truly national and of great importance to Ireland.

The committee feels that colonial contributions are peculiarly necessary to success and completeness, and wishes to enlist the

co-operation of the colonial governments. They therefore hope that the Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies will not object to follow the precedent adopted in the exhibitions of 1851 and 1862, and will address a circular letter to the several colonial Governors, expressing the approval and sympathy of Her Majesty's Government with this international exhibition, and requesting them to offer such assistance and encouragement as may be in their power.

I need hardly add that the committee does not seek for any pecuniary aid or guarantee; it merely looks for recognition.

I am further to observe that a similar application made to the Foreign Office has been acceded to by Earl Russell.

THE directors of the Dublin Exhibition Palace and Winter Garden Company (limited) have resolved to inaugurate their building, now approaching completion, by holding an International Exhibition of Arts and Manufactures in the year 1865; and, in carrying out this design, solicit the co-operation of artists, manufacturers, and others, in the United Kingdom, the British Colonies, and Foreign Countries.

The buildings, which are of a very comprehensive character and are on a scale of great extent, are situate in ornamental pleasure grounds within the city of Dublin, and are designed to afford to the public, more especially to the inhabitants of Dublin, an inexpensive substitute for the injurious amusements of a crowded city. They comprise rooms suitable for concerts and public meetings, the largest being capable of containing upwards of 3000 persons, picture galleries, lecture rooms, polytechnic museum, &c.; while, surrounding these, is erected a structure of iron and glass 640 feet long, varying from 84 to 126 feet wide, and 65 feet high. The number of superficial feet at present available for exhibitors in the permanent building, exclusive of annexes, is 147,153 feet ground space, and 105,469 feet wall space.

In a building thus extensive and diversified in construction, opportunity will be afforded for displaying to advantage, and without risk of injury by exposure, the varied products of the world, in a manner not hitherto realised.

Many circumstances seem to favor the proposed project. The possession of an appropriate building, before it is devoted to the more exclusive objects of its design, removes one of the great difficulties attendant on periodical exhibitions on so vast a scale.

Twelve years will have elapsed since the exhibition held in Dublin, in 1853, created by the liberality and public spirit of Mr. Dargan, and honored by the presence of Her Majesty and the lamented Prince Consort. To His late Royal Highness is

due the suggestion and carrying out the first International Exhibition in 1851. Since that epoch, urged by the impetus thus imparted, and accelerated by the removal of nearly all financial restraints on commerce, the manufacturing industry of the world has progressed with unexampled rapidity, and manufacturers have eagerly appreciated the advantages afforded by periodical exhibitions in contrasting and stimulating the productions of different countries.

The death of His Royal Highness the Prince Consort cast a gloom around the opening of the Exhibition of 1862. The deep distress in the cotton districts of England called the attention of manufacturers to more urgent wants, and turned their wealth to more important channels. A succession of bad seasons in Ireland checked the development of the resources of the country in no ordinary degree. Happily, brighter prospects seem dawning on the United Kingdom; and there is every reason to hope that the proposed collecting at this date, of the products of the world in an International Exhibition, may be, as similar undertakings have proved, of lasting benefit to trade and manufactures.

The exhibition will be opened in May, 1865, and will remain open for a period of six months; at its close, arrangements will be entered into for keeping the buildings open as a permanent exhibition, on the plan of the Crystal Palace, Sydenham; and exhibitors who may desire to retain space will be allowed to do so on liberal terms.

A special committee has been appointed to carry out the various details; and, as every means will be taken within the power of the directors to render the undertaking attractive and successful, it is trusted that all those interested in the various departments of arts and manufactures will aid the efforts of the committee by a timely and cordial co-operation.

The Dublin International Exhibition of 1865.

DECISIONS OF THE INTERNATIONAL EXHIBITION COMMITTEE, ON POINTS RELATIVE TO EXHIBITORS.

1. The directors have fixed upon Tuesday, the 9th day of May, 1865, for opening the exhibition.
2. The exhibition will take place in the company's buildings, Earlsfort terrace, Dublin.
3. The fine arts department will be placed in the main building, erected in brick and stone. The machinery in a separate court, and the general exhibition will be held in the other portions of the buildings.
4. No rent will be charged to exhibitors.
5. The productions of all nations will be admitted.
6. The general plan for the division of the exhibition will be similar, as far as practicable, to that adopted at the suggestion of His Royal Highness Prince Albert, for the Exhibition of 1851, viz.:

Raw materials; machinery; textile fabrics; metallic, vitreous, and ceramic manufactures; miscellaneous manufactures; fine arts.

A.—RAW MATERIAL.

1. Mining, quarrying, metallurgical operations, and mineral products.
2. Chemical and pharmaceutical processes and products generally.
3. Substances used as food.
4. Vegetable and animal substances chiefly used in manufactures as implements or for ornament.

B.—MACHINERY.

5. Machines for direct use, including carriages and railway and naval mechanism.
6. Manufacturing machines and tools.
7. Civil engineering, architectural, and building contrivances.
8. Naval architecture and military engineering, ordnance, armour, and accoutrements.
9. Agricultural and horticultural machines and implements.
10. Philosophical instruments and processes depending upon their use; photographic apparatus; musical, horological, and surgical instruments; machinery employed in spinning and weaving, and in the manufacture of wood and metal; machinery in general.

C.—TEXTILE FABRICS.

11. Cotton.
12. Woollen and worsted.
13. Silk and velvet.
14. Manufactures from flax and hemp.
15. Mixed fabrics, including shawls, but exclusive of worsted goods (class 12).
16. Leather, including saddlery and harness, skins, furs, feathers, and hair.
17. Paper and stationery, printing, and bookbinding.
18. Woven, spun, felted, and laid fabrics, when shown as specimens of printing or dyeing.
19. Tapestry, including carpets and floor-cloths, lace and embroidery, fancy and industrial works.
20. Articles of clothing for immediate personal or domestic use.

D.—METALLIC, VITREOUS, AND CERAMIC MANUFACTURES.

21. Cutlery and edge tools.
22. Iron and general hardware.
23. Working in precious metals, and in their imitation; jewellery, and all articles of vertu and luxury, not included in the other classes.
24. Glass.
25. Ceramic manufacture, china, porcelain, earthenware, &c.

E.—MISCELLANEOUS MANUFACTURES.

26. Decoration, furniture, and upholstery, including paper hangings, papier maché, and japanned goods.
27. Manufactures in mineral substances used for building or decoration, as in marble, slate, porphyries, cements, artificial stones, &c.
28. Manufactures from animal and vegetable substances, not being woven or felted, or included in other sections.
29. Miscellaneous manufactures and small wares.

F.—FINE ARTS.

30. Paintings in oil and water colors, drawings and photographs, architecture, sculpture, models and plastic art, die-sinking and intaglios, engravings and etchings, enamels and frescoes.

7. Rough counters and wall space will be provided.
8. All goods and articles for exhibition must be delivered at the building free of any charge to the company, and at the risk of the exhibitor.
The reception of goods and articles will commence on the 1st of March, and none can be received after the 15th of April.
9. Articles and packages will be unloaded at the building. Should exhibitors or their agents not be present, the packages will be opened by the officers of the company, and the contents distributed with the utmost possible care, but at the risk of the exhibitor.
10. Tickets will be issued to every exhibitor, his agent or servant, to enable him to pass into the building until the 8th of May, between certain hours, to arrange the articles for exhibition. These tickets must be produced on entrance, and given up when required.

11. The most effectual means will be taken, through the agency of the police and otherwise, to guard against fire and protect the property in the exhibition, but the directors cannot be responsible for losses by fire, robbery, accident, or damage of any kind.

12. The directors reserve to themselves the right to exclude any article they may think unsuitable to the exhibition.

13. The following articles will not be admitted:—
Vegetable and animal substances liable to spoil by keeping.
Living animals.

Detonating or dangerous substances, copper caps or other articles of a similar nature, may be exhibited, provided the detonating powder be not inserted; also lucifer matches with imitation tops.

14. Spirits or alcohol, oils, acids, corrosive salts, and substances of a highly inflammable nature, will only be admitted by special written permission, and in well-secured glass vessels.

Phosphorus, detonating powder, and all substances liable to inflame or explode spontaneously, are excluded.

All acids or other substances of a corrosive nature, and also alcohol, ether, chloroform, and other inflammable liquids, are to be enclosed in strong glass bottles, three-quarters full, and carefully luted, containing not more than half an imperial pint each, and are to be placed in trays of lead or gutta percha large enough to contain the contents of the bottles, should a breakage occur.

Substances liable to give off an offensive smell must be properly enclosed in air-tight cases, also all substances likely to melt.

15. Any exhibitor whose goods can properly be placed together will be at liberty to arrange such goods in his own way, provided his arrangement is compatible with the general scheme of the exhibition and the convenience of other exhibitors.

16. Prices of articles exhibited may be affixed in all the sections with the exception of fine arts.

17. Exhibitors cannot remove their goods or substitute others for them, during the period the exhibition shall remain open, without the permission of the committee.

18. Exhibitors may employ (under the regulations of the committee) assistants, to preserve and keep in order the articles they exhibit, or to explain them to visitors.

19. Free admission, within certain limits, will be given to exhibitors or their agents.

20. Steam and water power required for the purposes of the exhibition will be supplied gratuitously.

21. Besides making arrangements for showing machinery in motion and illustrating it by processes, the committee will reserve space (if early application is made) for the exhibition of processes of manufactures in certain handicrafts which can be carried on without danger in the building.

22. The committee, considering that it will be interesting and instructive to the general public to have the opportunity of seeing the following and similar processes, will reserve sufficient space for showing illustrations of each of them.

23. Steel-pen making, pin making, needle making, button making, medal striking, gold chain making, engine-turning for watches, brick and drain-tile making, glove making, stocking weaving, the manufacture of linens, the manufacture of woollen fabrics, ribbon weaving, glass blowing on a small scale, type casting, type printing by hand, lithographic printing, copper-plate printing, earthenware printing, porcelain printing, a potter's wheel, turning in metal, wood, and ivory; lace making of all kinds, bookbinding, cabinet and poplin weaving, straw-plait making, pipe and cigar making.

24. All intending exhibitors must state whether they are the designer, inventor, manufacturer, importer, or producer of the articles they propose to exhibit.

25. Packing-cases must be removed and stored at the expense of exhibitors, or their agents, as soon as the goods are unpacked and examined. If not removed within three days after due notice has been given, the packing-cases will be removed by the company's servants, and the exhibitors will be charged for cartage and storage.

26. The foregoing rule will not apply to the fine art department.

27. Exhibitors must be at the charge of insuring their own goods, should they desire this security.

28. Exhibitors will be permitted, subject only to the necessary general regulations, to erect, according to their own taste, all the counters, stands, glass frames, brackets, awnings, hangings, or similar contrivances; which they may consider best calculated for the display of their goods.

29. The following is the form of address which should be adopted.

30. Intending exhibitors are requested to apply, without delay, to the secretary for a form of demand for space, stating in which of the classes they wish to exhibit.

31. Medals and certificates of merit will be awarded in all sections except in that of F.

32. It is not the intention of the committee to take any steps in reference to the protection of inventions or designs by patent or registration, the law on those points having been materially simplified since 1851.

33. Arrangements are now being made with the principal railway and steam packet companies having direct communication with Dublin, with a view of obtaining the same facilities for the conveyance of goods to and from the Exhibition as were afforded at the London Exhibition of 1862. Intending exhibitors will be furnished with further particulars on this point.

34. On application by exhibitors, empty packages will be warehoused up to end of 1865, at the following scale of charges, including cartage from and to the exhibition—

NOTE.—To prevent loss, mis-carriage, or mislaying, articles, or packing-cases containing them, which occupy less bulk than two cubic feet, should not be sent separately; but packages under such size, containing, as far as possible, the same classes of articles, should be transmitted in combination.

DECISIONS SPECIALLY APPLICABLE TO FINE ARTS.

CLASS F.

1. No copies, drawings, or photographs of any of the works of art will be allowed to be taken, without the previous written consent of their respective owners.

2. All packing-cases must be legibly marked, on the inside, with the owner's name and address.

3. Distinctive labels will be attached to such works of art as are intended for sale, the price of which shall be entered in a book, to be kept by an officer of the committee, through whom all sales must be made. A commission of 5 per cent. will be charged by the committee.

4. A purchaser must, in all cases, pay a deposit of 15 per cent. on the purchase of any work of art to the officer in charge, and shall pay the remainder of the purchase-money, and, at his own expense, remove the work purchased by him; within ten days from the final close of the exhibition. A work will not be considered sold, nor marked sold, until the deposit has been paid.

5. In case any purchaser shall not pay the remainder of the purchase-money within the period prescribed, the deposit shall be forfeited, and may, at the option of the committee, be given to the exhibitor of the work of art in question.

6. At the close of the exhibition, permanent galleries for pictures, &c., will be formed, and artists and others may leave their works on view, subject to the foregoing rules.

DECISIONS SPECIALLY APPLICABLE TO MACHINERY IN MOTION.

CLASS B.

1. The machinery will be grouped together as much as possible, to keep the noisy and dusty processes isolated.

2. The machinery must be kept at work, or in motion, during such hours as the exhibition shall be open; the officers of the committee will put such machinery to work as may be standing without good cause, at the exhibitor's risk. Engineers' tools, &c., may be driven at a slow rate off the naked shafts.

3. Motive power will be provided as follows:—

A.—Lines of polished lying shafts, revolving 150 times per minute, 2½ inches diameter (Whitworth's standard gauge). Diameter of largest pulley admissible, 36 inches; all pulleys and wheels of any kind to be put on in halves, either to clamp on shaft, or to key on with hollow keys. Counter or cross shafts must be provided by exhibitors; belt guards or hooks must be provided as required by the Factory Acts, wherever, in the judgment of the committee, the public safety requires it.

B.—Steam at 50 lb. pressure per square inch, in boiler, will be provided; and a range of steam and exhaust pipes laid through the building. Exhibitors must make their own connexions with these in a manner approved by the committee; no escape of steam into the building will be permitted.

C.—A limited supply of water, under a pressure of 70 feet, a larger supply under 22 feet, will be provided when the fountains are not in full play. An unlimited supply of water, about 10 feet below the floor, will be available, provided it is returned to the reservoir again.

Exhibitors must make their own connexions to the reservoir and water pipes in a manner approved by the committee.

4. Exhibitors must fence their machinery neatly and securely, in accordance with the regulations of the Factory Acts, as the committee cannot be responsible for accidents arising from neglect of these precautions.

5. Exhibitors must clean and lubricate their own machinery and counter shafts, and provide their own bands. Shaft-ladders and belt-crutches will be found by the committee.

6. Articles of great size or weight, the placing of which will require considerable labor, must be sent before the 1st of March, 1865; and manufacturers wishing to exhibit machinery, or other objects that will require foundations, must make a declaration to that effect on their demands for space.

THE SUBDIVISIONS OF THE SHIRE OF WARRNAMBOOL.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-fourth day of October, 1864.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board, for any original or proclaimed district thereafter sometimes called "single district," the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall within three months after the receipt of the same divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions, hereinafter called subdivisions, by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district; and it is also enacted that every shire shall after the Proclamation thereof as such be and be deemed to be and have been such and the same district as such shire was at the time of such Proclamation, and save as aforesaid and save where herein otherwise expressly provided all the provisions of the said Act relating to districts shall continue and be of full force and effect with regard to such shire and be read accordingly: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council, made on the twenty-first day of December, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the shire of Warrnambool was constituted: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by more than twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said shire, praying for the division of the said shire into three subdivisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order divide the shire of Warrnambool into three separate electoral subdivisions in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:—

THE NORTH RIDING.—Commencing at the intersection of the boundary of the Belfast and Warrnambool Shires by the Spring Creek, near Woolsthorpe; thence northerly by the western boundary of the Shire of Warrnambool to the Hopkins River at Chatsworth; thence by the course of the said river southerly to the south boundary of the parish of Ballangeich; thence westerly by the said boundary to the Drysdale Creek; thence by the course of the Drysdale Creek to its junction with the Spring Creek; and thence by the course of the Spring Creek westerly and northerly to the commencing point.

THE SOUTH RIDING.—Commencing at the sea-coast, at the southern point of the western boundary of the Shire of Warrnambool; thence by the said boundary northerly to its intersection by the Spring Creek; thence southerly and easterly by the line of the said creek to its intersection by the Drysdale Creek; thence by the course of the Drysdale Creek northerly and easterly to the southern boundary of the parish of Ballangeich; thence east by the said boundary to the Hopkins River and south by the course of the said river to the sea-coast; and by the sea-coast, excluding the Borough of Warrnambool, to the commencing point.

THE EAST RIDING.—Commencing at the Hopkins River, on the boundary between the Shires of Mortlake and Warrnambool; thence east by the said boundary to the western boundary of the Shire of Hampden; thence southerly and easterly and southerly by the said boundary to the sea-coast; thence by the sea-coast to the Hopkins River; and thence by the said river to the commencing point.

And the Honorable James Forrester Sullivan shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THE BOROUGH OF SEBASTOPOL.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-fourth day of October, 1864.

WHEREAS by *The Municipal Corporations Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted that any district not being a district wholly or in part comprised within the limits of the city of Melbourne, or, save as therein provided, the town of Geelong, or of any of the boroughs constituted by or under the said Act, which district shall not exceed in area nine square miles, and shall have no one point in such area distant more than six miles from any other point therein, and shall contain a population of inhabitant householders not less than three hundred, may be constituted a borough in manner next hereinafter mentioned; and it is also enacted that if not less than one hundred and fifty of the inhabitant householders resident within any such last-mentioned district shall sign and cause to be presented to the Governor a petition, praying him to constitute such district a borough under the said Act, and in such petition shall set forth accurately the boundaries of the district to which such petition shall refer, and if within one month of the publication as therein mentioned of such petition, an equal or greater number of inhabitant householders resident within such district so described shall not have signed and caused to be presented to the Governor a petition praying him not to grant the prayer of such first-mentioned petition, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by an Order in Council, if it shall seem fit, to constitute such district, or any portion thereof, a borough within the meaning of the said Act; and it is further enacted that in every such Order in Council as aforesaid the name and boundaries of the borough thereby constituted shall be set forth, and upon the making of every such order the district therein named shall be and is deemed to be a "borough" hereinafter sometimes called a "proclaimed borough" within the meaning of the said Act; provided that such district shall not comprise any locality not included within the boundaries set forth in the petition for the constitution thereof: And whereas a petition in accordance with the provisions of the said Act has been presented to the Governor, and notice of such petition has been duly given in the *Government Gazette* of the fifth day of August now last past: And whereas a petition presented to the Governor in the manner allowed and prescribed by the said Act, praying him not to grant the prayer of the petition above mentioned, has been found to be illegal and invalid: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth, in exercise of the power and authority conferred by the said Act, constitute the district hereinafter described a borough within the meaning of the said Act, and doth set forth the name and the boundaries of the said borough in manner following, that is to say:—

THE QUARANTINE STATION AT POINT NEPEAN, AND THE QUARANTINE ANCHORAGE FOR PORT PHILLIP.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of New South Wales, passed in the third year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intitled, *An Act for subjecting Vessels coming to New South Wales from certain places to the performance of Quarantine*, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall and may be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, from time to time, as he may think fit and expedient, by any Order or Orders notified by Proclamation, to appoint certain stations or places within the harbor of Port Jackson, or within or near any other harbor or place within the said colony, for the performance of quarantine under this Act or Ordinance, where all vessels liable to quarantine, and the crews, passengers, and persons on board thereof, shall perform the same, and also if necessary to appoint lazarets and other places where the crews, passengers, and other persons, and the goods, wares, and merchandise which shall or may be on board the said vessels, shall and may be detained and kept for the performance of quarantine: And whereas by another Act of the Governor and Legislative Council aforesaid, passed in the fifth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act to amend an Act intitled "An Act for subjecting Vessels coming to New South Wales from certain places to the performance of Quarantine,"* such and the like powers in respect to matters of quarantine as are by the said recited Act vested in the Governor of New South Wales, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, are vested in the Superintendent of Port Phillip, now called the colony of Victoria, or the chief officer resident in and administering the government thereof: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the twenty-third day of November, in the year 1852, the boundaries of the Quarantine Station at Point Nepean were declared and ordered: And whereas by another Proclamation, bearing date the sixth day of June, in the year 1853, the Quarantine Anchorage of the Port of Melbourne was also declared and ordered: And whereas it is expedient to amend the description of the limits of the Station and Anchorage aforesaid: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the two several Proclamations hereinbefore mentioned; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do, by this my Proclamation, in accordance with the provisions of the Acts hereinbefore recited, appoint the stations or places hereinafter described for the performance of quarantine under the Acts relating thereto, where all vessels liable to quarantine, and the crews, passengers, and persons on board thereof, shall perform the same; and within the limits of which stations or places I do hereby strictly prohibit all persons, not being themselves under quarantine, or duly authorised for the purpose of necessary communication with persons or vessels respectively under quarantine, from going, under any pretence whatever, when any ship or vessel is performing quarantine, or any person, goods, wares, or merchandise are undergoing quarantine, within such limits, under the pains and penalties prescribed by law; that is to say:—

THE QUARANTINE STATION.—The Quarantine Station at Point Nepean shall be that portion of the county of Mornington, in the colony of Victoria, commencing at the flagstaff on Observatory Point, about one and a half miles east of Point Nepean, which flagstaff bears from the high lighthouse at Shortland's Bluff south thirty degrees east, and bounded on the north by the shores of Port Phillip Bay eastward to a flagstaff bearing from the said lighthouse south forty-five degrees east, on the east by a line south to the sea-coast, on the south by Bass's Straits westerly, and on the west by a line bearing north to the commencing point.

THE QUARANTINE ANCHORAGE.—The Quarantine Anchorage of Port Phillip shall be that portion of the harbor commencing at a point three-quarters of a mile distant from Observatory Point, and bearing north from it; thence extending in an easterly direction at the same distance from, and parallel to, the line of coast leading to Point King, to a point bearing north three-quarters of a mile from a flagstaff erected midway between Point

King and Observatory Point. The magnetic bearings of the extreme points of the Quarantine Station at Point Nepean are as follows, namely:—The flagstaff on Observatory Point, marking the western end of the Quarantine Station, bears south 85° east from the flagstaff on Point Lonsdale, and south 30° east from the high lighthouse. The flagstaff on Ticonderoga Point, which marks the eastern end of the Quarantine Station, bears from the high lighthouse S. 45° E.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-fourth day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in the twenty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign.

A BILL FOR THE INCORPORATION OF THE RESPECTIVE INHABITANTS OF THE RESPECTIVE TOWNS OF SANDHURST, BALLARAT, BALLARAT EAST, AND CASTLEMAINE, FOR CERTAIN PURPOSES.

NOTICE is hereby given that application is intended to be made in the next session of the Parliament of Victoria, for leave to bring in a Bill, intituled, A Bill for Incorporating the respective inhabitants of the several towns of Sandhurst, Ballarat, Ballarat East, and Castlemaine, for all or some of the purposes following, namely:—

For the constitution of the above respective boroughs into towns, for determining the qualification of the burgesses thereof respectively, and to incorporate such burgesses.

For regulating the qualification, election of mayor and councillors, and their respective terms of office; the election and qualification of assessors and auditors, and for regulating the proceedings of the council and election of mayors, and defining their powers and determining their remuneration.

For regulation of disputed elections of mayors or councillors, and the business and proceedings of the councils.

For the appointment, removal, and salaries of officers generally herein, and regulating their several duties and hours of duty, and mode of keeping, balancing, and auditing accounts.

To erect toll-bars within the said towns, to collect tolls, and to fix and regulate the amounts thereof from time to time and exemptions, the appointment of collectors and other officers, and the appropriation of revenue derivable therefrom; and prevent the erection of any other tolls within three miles of the boundaries of the respective towns, without the consent of the council of such town.

To enable the respective councils of the respective towns to enter into contracts for lighting, and for any public authorised works within the said towns respectively, and to preserve to such towns respectively any contracts entered into.

To enable the respective councils of the respective towns to sue for and recover all arrears of rates, and to sue for and recover all rates to be levied under this proposed Act, without prejudice to the recovery of rates due and in arrear before the passing of such Act.

To enable the mayors and magistrates of the respective towns to hear and adjudicate as justices of the peace in all such matters as may be brought before them as such justices, notwithstanding that such mayors and magistrates are ratepayers or members of the respective corporations, and to enable such mayors and magistrates to hear appeals from any valuation or rating.

To confirm in the councils of the said respective towns all the privileges, liabilities, and property now existing or held by the respective borough councils or corporations.

To repeal, so far as may be necessary, the Municipal Institutions Act, 1864, in respect of the above-mentioned several towns.

1. For the regulation of their own proceedings.
