WARDS OF THE BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-first day of November, 1864.

WHEREAS by *The Municipal Corporations Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of councillors for any original or proclaimed borough, hereinafter sometimes called in common "single borough," the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by one-fourth of the number of persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in such borough, within three months after the receipt of the same divide the borough into three separate wards by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of such wards shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made upon or within thirty days before any day appointed for holding any annual election of councillors in or for such borough: And whereas the Governor has received a petition signed by more than one-fourth of the number of persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the borough of Richmond, praying that the said borough may be divided into three separate wards, to be designated and bounded as set forth in the petition: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by this present Order divide the said Borough of Richmond into Three separate Wards,

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by the names hereby assigned to the same respectively and with the several boundaries hereinafter set forth, that is to say:—

SOUTH WARD.—Bounded on the west by the east side of the Punt road; on the north by the centre of Swan street; and on the south and east by the banks of the River Yarra-yarra.

CENTRAL WARD.—Bounded on the south by the centre of Swan street; on the west by the east side of the Punt road; on the north by the centre of the Bridge road; and on the east by the banks of the River Yarra-yarra.

NORTH WARD.—Bounded on the south by the centre of the Bridge road; on the west by the east side of Huddle street; on the north by the centre of Victoria street; and on the east by the banks of the River Yarra-yarra.

EXTENSION OF THE 11TH CLAUSE OF THE FISHERIES ACT TO LAKE BOLOKE, AND THE CREEKS RUNNING THEREINTO AND THEREFROM, AND THE MORDIALLOE CREEK AND ITS EMBOUCHURE, ALTERED.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria passed in the twenty-fifth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to amend and consolidate the laws for the protection of the Fisheries of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that if any person shall set, lay down, use, or fish with any kind of net in the Yarra-yarra, Plenty, Werribee, or Saltwater Rivers, in the colony of Victoria, or in any or either of their respective tributaries, or in any other river, lake, creek, stream, or pond to which the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, shall by proclamation duly published in the *Government Gazette*, extend the provisions of the 11th clause of the said Act, he shall forfeit such net, and also such sum not exceeding Ten pounds, as the convicting justice shall think fit: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the thirty-first day of December, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the above-recited provisions of the said Act, being the eleventh clause thereof, were extended to Lake Boloke, and the creeks running therein and therefrom, and the Mordialloe creek and its embouchure: And whereas it is expedient to alter the said extension: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby limit the operation of the said clause, so far as the Mordialloe Creek is concerned, to the main stream of the creek from its mouth up to the Carrum Swamp.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-fifth day of November, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in the twenty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign.
