**MANAGER OF COMMON-TOLL ROADS, ETC.**

THE Governor in Council, on the 24th of October, 1864, made the following appointment and arrangements with reference to a Common-toll Road, under the provisions of the Act 27 Victoria No. 176, § 253, 256, 257, viz. :—

JAMES BLAIR,

**THE SUBDIVISIONS OF THE SHIRE OF CRESWICK.**

At the Government House, Melbourne, the fifth day of December, 1864.

PRESENT :  
 His Excellency the Governor

WHEREAS by The Local Government Act, 1863, it is amongst other things enacted, that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board, for any original or proclaimed district thereafter sometimes called "single district," the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall within three months after the receipt of the same divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions, thereafter called subdivisions, by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district; and it is also enacted that every shire shall after the Proclamation thereof as such be and be deemed to be and have been such and the same district as such shire was at the time of such Proclamation, and save as aforesaid and save where herein otherwise expressly provided all the provisions of the said Act relating to districts shall continue and be of full force and effect with regard to such shire and be read accordingly: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the twenty-first day of December, 1863, the shire of Creswick was constituted: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by more than twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said shire, praying for the division of the said shire into three subdivisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order divide the shire of Creswick into three separate electoral subdivisions in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:—

THE EAST RIDING.—Commencing at a point on the Deep Creek where it is intersected by the Castlemaine road; thence southerly by the Castlemaine road to the most northern point of portion 35, parish of Bullarook; thence south-easterly to its most eastern point; thence by a road southerly to the intersection of said road with the Bullarook Creek; thence southerly and easterly by the Bullarook Creek to the north-west angle of portion 1, section III, parish of Dean; thence west to a one-chain road bounding the water reserve on the west side; thence south-westerly by the said road to the north-west angle of portion 3, section IV, of the said parish; thence south-easterly by the west boundary of said allotment 3, section IV, to a point opposite the north-east angle of portion IV, of section XXVI, in the parish of Creswick; thence west to the north-east angle of said portion IV; thence by a line due south to the southern boundary of the shire of Creswick; thence by the said southern boundary east to the north-east angle of the said shire; thence by the east and north-eastern boundary of said shire northerly and north-westerly to the commencing point.

THE SOUTH RIDING.—Commencing at the north-east angle of portion 63, parish of Ballarat, being a point on the western boundary of the shire of Creswick; thence northerly by the western boundary of said shire to its intersection with the Bullarook Creek; thence by the Bullarook Creek southerly and easterly to the north-west angle of portion 1, section III, parish of Dean; thence west to a one-chain road bounding the water reserve on the west side; thence south-westerly by the said road to the north-west angle of portion 3, section IV, of

the said parish; thence south-easterly by the west boundary of said allotment 3, section IV, to a point opposite the north-east angle of portion IV, of section XXVI, in the parish of Creswick; thence west to the north-east angle of said portion IV; thence by a line due south to the southern boundary of the shire of Creswick; thence by the said southern boundary west to the commencing point. Excepting that portion of the borough of Creswick included within the above boundaries.

THE NORTH RIDING.—Commencing on the west boundary of the shire of Creswick, at its intersection with the Bullarook Creek; thence north, east, and south-easterly by the west, north, and north-eastern boundary of said shire to a point where the Deep Creek is intersected by the Castlemaine road; thence southerly by the Castlemaine road to the most northern point of portion 35, parish of Bullarook; thence south-easterly to its most eastern point; thence by a road southerly to its intersection with the Bullarook Creek; thence by that Creek north-westerly to the commencing point.

WHEREAS by The Local Government Act, 1863, it is amongst other things enacted, that in every district divided into subdivisions the Governor in Council shall, within fifteen days after any subdivision of such district shall become such subdivision, appoint in and for such subdivision one place to be the place of polling at all elections hold in and for such subdivision, and may from time to time afterwards appoint in lieu thereof another such place within such subdivision: and it is further enacted that every shire shall after the proclamation thereof as such be and be deemed to be and have been such and the same district as such shire was at the time of such proclamation, and save as aforesaid, and save where herein otherwise expressly provided, all the provisions of the said Act relating to districts shall continue to be of full force and effect with regard to such shire, and be read accordingly: And whereas by three several Orders in Council made on the thirty-first day of October, the seventh day of November, and the fifth-day of December, in the present year, the shires of Corio, Dundas, and Creswick were respectively subdivided as therein mentioned; and it is expedient to appoint a polling place for each subdivision: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order appoint the places hereinafter mentioned to be the polling places for the subdivisions of the shires aforesaid, opposite to which respectively such polling places are mentioned, viz. :—

**UNION UNDER THE WEIGHTS AND MEASURES STATUTE, 1864.**

**PROCLAMATION.**

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, called, *The Weights and Measures Statute, 1864*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council, at the request of and pursuant to any agreement made by the councils or boards of any two or more of any adjoining boroughs, shires, and road districts, may proclaim such boroughs, shires, and districts to be a "union" for the purposes of the said Act, and by such proclamation fix the proportion in which the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act shall be borne by the several bodies corporate of such boroughs, shires,

or districts: And whereas the council of the borough of Maryborough, and the road board of the district of Tullaroop, have requested that the said borough and road district may be proclaimed a "union," and that the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act may be borne in the proportions of one-half by the borough of Maryborough, and one-half by the road district of Tullaroop: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do proclaim the borough of Maryborough and the road district of Tullaroop, to be a "union" for the purposes of the said Act, and do fix the proportion in which the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act shall be borne by the said council and road board, as follows:—  
 One-half by the council of the borough of Maryborough, and one-half by the road board of Tullaroop.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this ninth day of December, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in the twenty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign.

**REDBANK PUBLIC CEMETERY.**

**RULES AND REGULATIONS.**

ALL charges must be paid to the treasurer when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. Orders for interment must be given to the person in charge of the cemetery before Five o'clock p.m. on the day previous to the interment.

3. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of deceased, must be stated at the time of giving the order.

4. The procession to arrive at the cemetery punctually at the hour appointed for the funeral.

5. The usual hours of interment will be from Ten a.m. to Seven p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive; and from Ten to Four in the other four months, except on Sundays, when the only hours will be from Two to Five.

6. The charges will be remitted for the burial of any person on evidence being produced before two of the trustees that the relatives or friends of such persons are unable to pay the costs and charges.

7. Application for permission to make a vault or erect a monument in the cemetery, to be made to the trustees. A certificate of permission will be granted to the persons applying on payment of the charges set forth in the schedule marked A.

8. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug; but when a brick grave or vault is required it must be constructed under the direction of the trustees, or some person duly appointed by them; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault belonging to another person, the consent (in writing) of such person must be left with the order.

9. All monuments, vaults, graves, grave-stones, and fences, to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

10. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, or covered by a slab of freestone, granite, slate, or iron.

11. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and a plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, and a copy of every epitaph or inscription, to be submitted to the trustees for approval, who may withhold permission and prevent the erection of any monument which shall appear to them unappropriate or unbecoming, and shall determine and fix the position of any monument which may be preferred to be erected according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner. In the erection of tablets, copper cramps must be used.

12. Wooden fences allowed, but if not kept in proper repair may be removed by order of the trustees without notice to the owner.

13. A plan of the cemetery and a registry will be kept, and may be inspected at the charge set forth in Schedule A.

14. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees, will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

15. It is notified that any person wantonly or wilfully destroying, or doing or causing to be done, any damage to any monument, vault, or tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree, or plant in the cemetery, or guilty of a misdemeanor, and being convicted thereof, is liable to be punished as prescribed by the Act in that case made and provided.

16. No dogs will be allowed to enter the cemetery.

17. The cemetery will be open to the public from sunrise to sunset.

18. Three of the trustees to form a quorum.

19. No grave to be of a less depth than eight feet. The trustees reserve the right to make any alteration from time to time in these charges and regulations.

7. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles when required, within twenty-four hours, they will be otherwise procured, and the expense, over and above the contract price, will be deducted from his account.

8. The contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly in the prescribed form, and to forward the same in a complete state, signed by the officer by whom it was incurred, to the Government Storekeeper for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or Pay Office of the district, as the case may be.

9. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final; in respect to bread of first quality, a sample of the best bread ordinarily retailed to the public, will be considered as a test loaf.

10. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which, it will be procured by the person requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 7.

11. In the country districts, when a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, and in all cases when the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury

would be sustained either by the persons to whom the rations are due, or to the contractor, in waiting for a board of survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have the power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of an inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expenses will be charged as in clause 7.

12. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report of the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct not exceeding one-fourth the amount of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

13. It will be competent for the Government Storekeeper on behalf of the Government, or the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months; it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period of which the contract is made.
