LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

RICHMOND ELECTION—PETITION.

I HEREBY notify that there was presented to me, on Thursday, the first day of December instant, a Petition, of which the following is a true copy:—

To the Honorable Sir Francis Murphy, Knight, Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of the Colony of Victoria.

The Petition of Thomas Parsons, of Temple court, in the city of Melbourne, in the said colony, barrister-at-law,

Respectfully sheweth—

First.—That His Excellency Sir Charles Henry Darling, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the said colony, did, on or about the tenth day of October last, issue under his hand and the seal of the said colony a Writ directed to the Returning Officer of the Electoral District of Richmond, commanding him to proceed according to law to the election of two members to serve in the Legislative Assembly for the said district, and further commanding the said Returning Officer, that, in the event of the said election being contested, the poll should be taken at the time therein appointed for that purpose, at Saint Stephen's for the Saint Stephen's division, and at Jolimont for the Jolimont division, and at St. James's for the Saint James's division, and at Swan for the Swan division of the said district.

Second.—That the Governor in Council did not appoint within and for each or any division of the said district any place for taking the poll in such division at such election.

Third.—That except the said divisions of St. Stephen's, Jolimont, St. James's, and Swan, there are no such places as St. Stephen's, Jolimont, St. James's, and Swan, in the said Electoral District of Richmond, and there are no such places as St. Stephen's, Jolimont, St. James's, and Swan, in the said divisions, or any of them, and that each of such divisions consists of a large area of ground, and contains a great number of streets and places.

Fourth.—That James Goodall Francis, Philip Johnson, your Petitioner, and Archibald Baird Wardrop, duly became, and on the twenty-ninth day of October last, the day of nomination named in the said Writ, were duly nominated by the said Returning Officer to have been duly nominated, and to have become candidates at the said election.

Fifth.—That the said Returning Officer, on thirty-first day of October last, duly published in the Melbourne daily newspaper called the *Argus* of that day such announcement; and on the same day, and in the same newspaper, published announcement headed "Electoral District of Richmond" in the words and figures following, that is to say: "A Poll will be taken for the election of two members on Thursday, the 3rd day of November next, commencing at 9 o'clock a.m. and closing at 4 o'clock p.m., in the following divisions of the district—Saint Stephen's, at the Artillery Orderly Room, Bridge road; Swan, at the Rifle Orderly Room, Gipps street; Saint James's, at the Court House, Bridge road; Jolimont, at the National School, Grey street, East Melbourne."

Sixth.—That the poll was taken on the said third day of November, at the said Artillery Orderly Room, Rifle Orderly Room, Court House, and National School, accordingly.

Seventh.—That there were seven polling booths for the taking of the said poll, namely, three at the said Rifle Orderly Room for the said Swan division, two at the said Artillery Orderly Room for the said St. Stephen's division, one at the said Court House for the said St. James's division, and one at the said National School for the said Jolimont division.

Eighth.—That the said Returning Officer did not preside and take the poll at any booth of any such polling place, and took no part whatever in the taking of the poll, except visiting the different polling booths at intervals during the election.

Ninth.—That the poll was taken by the seven persons and in manner hereinafter mentioned, namely, at one of the said three booths at the said Rifle Orderly Room, by one Frank James Bartlett; at another of such three booths, by one George Burgoyne; and at the other of such three booths, by one Edgar Sprague; at one of the said two booths at the said Artillery Orderly Room, by one Henry Notley Hull; and at the other of such two booths, by one John Felix Matthews; at the single booth at the said Court House, by one Henry Saint John Clarke; and at the single booth at the said National School, by one John Clipperton.

Tenth.—That the said Returning Officer, on the fourth day of November in the year of our Lord One thousand eight-hundred and sixty-four, in the said newspaper called the *Argus* of that day, declared the said James Goodall Francis and Archibald Baird Wardrop to be duly elected as members for the said district, and the names of such two persons were endorsed on the said Writ by the said Returning Officer, and the said Writ was by him returned to the Governor within the time specified.

Eleventh.—That notwithstanding such declaration your Petitioner submits that the said James Goodall Francis and Archibald Baird Wardrop were not, nor was either of them, duly elected members or a member at such election for the said district, and that such election was and is absolutely void, for the following reasons:—

First.—That the Governor in Council did not appoint within and for each or any division of the said district any place for taking the poll in such division at such election.

Second.—That the said Writ did not name polling places lawfully appointed for taking the poll, and was therefore void.

Third.—That the several places at which the poll was taken were not, nor was any of them, named in the said Writ.

Fourth.—That the Returning Officer did not preside and take the poll at any booth of any polling place within the said district at the said election.

Fifth.—That the persons who took the poll or one of them had no authority whatever for taking the same.

Twelfth.—That your petitioner has paid into the Bank of New South Wales, being a bank carrying on business in Victoria, the sum of One hundred pounds to the credit of the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly in relation to this petition.

Your petitioner therefore respectfully prays—

First.—That you will as soon as conveniently may lay this petition before the Legislative Assembly.

Second.—That the Legislative Assembly will be pleased to forthwith refer such petition to the Committee of Elections and Qualifications.

Third.—That when such reference has been made, such committee will determine and report to the Legislative Assembly, that the said James Goodall Francis and Archibald Baird Wardrop were not nor was either of them duly elected.

Fourth.—That thereupon a new Writ may be issued for the election of two members to serve in the Legislative Assembly for the said district.

Lastly.—That your petitioner may have such further and other relief as the nature of the case requires.

And your petitioner will ever pray, &c.

STORES AND TRANSPORT REGULATIONS.

HIS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct that the following rules and regulations, relating to Stores and Transport, be observed by the several departments of Government (excepting the Railway Department and Military Store Department), in lieu of all former regulations on the same subject.

TENDER BOARD.

1. There shall be a Tender Board, composed of such officers as the Governor in Council shall see fit from time to time to appoint, and they shall elect from among their number a chairman and deputy chairman, who shall hold office for one year from the date of their election, which shall be subject to the approval of the Governor in Council. One or other of these officers shall preside at all meetings of the Tender Board; but in the event of their unavoidable absence, the board may at any meeting elect from among the number then present a chairman, who shall preside at such meeting.

APPOINTMENT OF SECRETARY AND INSPECTOR OF STORES.

2. There shall be an officer appointed as Secretary to the Tender Board and Inspector of Stores and Transport. He shall, in his capacity as secretary, be subordinate to the board, and shall receive his instructions through the chairman thereof.

3. There shall also be appointed an Assistant Inspector of Stores and Transport, who shall assist the secretary, and act for him during his absence.

DUTY OF TENDER BOARD (Clauses 4 to 10).

4. It shall be the duty of the Tender Board to ascertain from the annual estimates, to be furnished as hereinafter mentioned (Clause 20), the quantity and description of stores likely to be required for the service of the ensuing year, and to report to the Government through the Treasurer, as to the manner in which they would recommend that the said stores should be procured, whether by annual contract or otherwise, and generally advise the Government thereon. If in the course of the year demands should be submitted from any department and approved of by the minister, it will in like manner be the duty of the Tender Board to obtain them.

5. The board will be informed, through the same channel, of the decision of the Government; and action thereon shall be taken by the board without delay.

6. All advertisements calling for supplies shall contain the particulars of the supply, the period for and within which it is to be furnished, the amount of security required, with all other necessary information; and due notice shall be given of the day and hour on or before which the tenders, sealed and described as "Tenders for, &c." on the envelope, are to be sent in, after which time no tender for the same service, under the same notice, shall be received. The date when the tenders will be determined is also, if possible, to be given, and when the supplies are not to be furnished under annual contract, as much time as the nature of the case may seem to require is to be allowed between the date of the acceptance of the tenders and that on which the articles are to be delivered.

7. Tenders on being opened by the Tender Board shall be numbered consecutively, and be initialed by not less than three of the board then present. No tender shall be recognised in which the advertised conditions of contract shall have been in material points departed from so as to preclude an accurate comparison with other tenders for the same supply.

8. The days of meeting of the Tender Board, for ordinary business, shall be on Wednesday in each week, and on special occasions when called together by the secretary; but no business shall be transacted unless three members be present.

9. All tenders for supplies amounting to £50 or upwards shall be submitted by the board to the Government, through the Treasurer. The board will be guided in their recommendation by the quality of the sample, the price at which it is tendered, by the character and responsibility of the person tendering, and the sufficiency of his security. Should two tenders for a like amount be received, and one of them be recommended for acceptance, the reason for such recommendation is to be given. Whenever the lowest tender is not recommended, full reasons are to be stated. The particulars of all accepted tenders are to be transmitted to the Chief Secretary, for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

10. When the supply tendered for does not amount in value to the sum of £50, the acceptance or rejection of the tenders shall rest with the board, subject to these regulations so far as they shall in that case be applicable. Should the rate named be excessive, or should no tenders be received, the board shall advise the Government whether tenders should be again called for, the purchase be effected by the department concerned, or otherwise.

DUTY OF SECRETARY (Clauses 11 to 13).

11. It shall be the duty of the secretary to attend all meetings of the Tender Board, to summon the members thereof whenever a special meeting may be required by any responsible minister, to take notes of all proceedings of the board, and record the same in a book to be kept for that purpose, and, under the directions of the board, to prepare and cause to be inserted in one or more newspapers such advertisements as may be deemed necessary.

12. It shall also be the duty of the secretary, under the direction of the board, whenever a tender has been accepted, to enter on behalf of the Government into a contract with the tenderer for the supply tendered for, taking care that amongst the conditions of contract the following are included, viz. —

- (a) That the supplies shall be delivered either at the offices of the department concerned or at the Transport Office, Melbourne, as may be directed by the officer ordering the supply.
- (b) That with the view to the fixing of some day and hour at which delivery shall be taken of stores (or materials for works and buildings) ordered for the service of any department, the contractor, when ready to deliver such stores, is to give notice thereof to the inspector, naming the office at which delivery is to be made.
- (c) That the contractor shall, at the time of delivering the supplies, furnish his account for the same on the prescribed form to the Inspector of Stores, or, if for materials for works and buildings, to the Inspector General of Public Works.
- (d) That the acceptance of the supplies shall be subject to the approval of the Inspector of Stores, or such other officer as shall be named in the conditions.

13. The following documents are to be retained in the office of the Secretary to the Tender Board:—

- (1.) The advertisement.
- (2.) The contract, including tender and bond.
- (3.) A record of the accounts for supplies sent to country districts.

If the information embraced in these documents shall be at any time required for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness or otherwise of accounts, certified copies shall be furnished to the Commissioners of Audit; but, as a rule, a reference on the face of the account to the publication in the *Gazette* of the accepted tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

DUTY OF INSPECTOR OF STORES (Clauses 14 to 19).

14. The secretary, in his capacity of Inspector of Stores, on receiving the notice mentioned in clause No. 12*b*, shall (if the supply is not materials for works or buildings) inform the contractor on what day and hour he will be in attendance at the place named in such notice to receive delivery, and shall require the contractor to deliver accordingly. The delivery being completed, the inspector shall then and there compare the articles supplied with the approved requisition, and if correct he shall certify the contractor's account as to quantity and that the description and quality of the supply is in accordance with the contract and samples, leaving the account at the department to be forwarded for payment. When the supply is of materials for works and buildings, the inspector shall send the said notice to the Inspector General of Public Works, to be dealt with as hereinafter directed.

15. If the supplies be required for country districts, the Inspector of Stores, on receiving due notice as before mentioned, shall take delivery thereof at the Transport Office; and, if correct, he shall certify the contractor's account as described in the preceding clause, and forward it forthwith to the office of the minister of the department concerned, whence it will be sent on to the Treasury for payment.

16. Supplies for the country districts are to be packed under the supervision of the Inspector of Stores and Transport, who will obtain the requisite transport, and forward the supplies by the first convenient opportunity. Every consignment shall be accompanied by an invoice or way-bill, as per form No. 1, to be transmitted by the first post; and on receiving the way-bill received from the person to whom the supplies were forwarded, the inspector shall file the same for future reference. Every account for supplies for country districts shall be entered in a book to be kept by the Inspector of Stores for the purpose, in which the following particulars are to be shown, viz.:—Date of transmission, general description of the goods, by whom supplied and to whom forwarded, and the total amount of the account; and at the expiration of every month, or at such other interval of time as the commissioner may direct, the book shall be submitted for the inspection of the Commissioners of Audit, together with the way-bills received during that month.

17. All transport for bulky supplies, whether in Melbourne or the country, shall be performed under a written contract. When the season of the year, the demand for cartage, and the weight of the goods shall be such as to render it advisable, tenders shall be called for by public advertisement as in the case of supplies, and shall be submitted to the Tender Board for consideration. In all other cases contracts with individual carriers shall be made at the most advantageous rates.

18. The Inspector of Stores shall superintend the shipment and landing of all stores (except military and railway stores), on behalf of the Government of Victoria, and obtain such transport as may be required for conveying them to their destination. It will also be his duty, when condemned or other stores (but not building materials) are to be sold, to effect or superintend the sale thereof, if required to do so by the Honorable the Treasurer, and to collect the proceeds of the same. He shall

be a Collector of Imposts under the Audit Act, and shall find security for the due performance of his duties.

19. Clause 14 to 16 inclusive shall not apply to provisions, forage, fuel, light, and water; and clauses 15 and 16 shall not apply to materials for works and buildings.

ANNUAL ESTIMATES FOR STORES.

20. On the 1st of July in each year, or at such other date as may be named by the Governor in Council, every head of department shall furnish to the Tender Board, through the minister of his division, an estimate of probable requirements of his department for the year commencing on the 1st of January following, and shall specify whether in his opinion the various articles should be obtained by means of annual or special contract, and whether locally or in Melbourne.

QUARTERLY SUPPLIES, REQUISITIONS, ETC. (Clauses 21 to 27).

21. On the 15th December, 15th March, 15th June, and 15th September in each year, every head of department shall submit for the approval of the minister of his division, a requisition as per form No. 2, setting forth the particulars of all supplies (including fuel and light) required for the department under his charge during the ensuing quarter.

22. The requisitions are in all cases to be signed by the head of department; as follows:—

23. Requisitions, as per form No. 3, for articles for building and manufacturing purposes shall be submitted from time to time as required. The requisitionist must, however, give timely notice of his requirements to the minister. Delivery shall be taken from the contractor as regards building materials by the officer named in the condition of the contract, as mentioned in clause 12, section *a*, or as may be specially directed by the Minister for Public Works; and it shall be the duty of the Inspector General of Works, under the instruction of the minister, upon receiving from the Inspector of Stores the notice alluded to in clause 14 of these regulations, to make immediate arrangements for such delivery; and on the delivery being completed he shall certify the contractor's account and forward it on for payment.

24. Such articles only are to be placed in requisition as may be allowed by the regulations for the time being, or as shall be indispensable for the proper conduct of the public service, and shall, if possible, be of the description specified in the contract; and in all cases the weight, measurement, or quantity, shall be given, as well as a correct description of the articles. Heads of departments must keep clear and accurate accounts of their expenditure out of the votes for Stores, Fuel, Light, and Water. No requisition shall be submitted in excess of the provision made by the Appropriation Act.

25. Officers forwarding requisitions for the approval of the minister, must specify thereon the contract price, or if not in contract, the probable cost of the articles applied for.

26. The requisition having been approved by the minister, the heads of departments specified in clause 23 shall issue their orders upon the contractors for such stores as may be required, but no order is to be made in excess of the approved requisition; and each order must state at what place the articles are to be delivered. If delivery is to be made at the Transport Office the approved requisition must be forwarded to the Inspector of Stores for comparison with the contractor's account. (See Clause 15.)

27. The contractor's account for the articles delivered having been certified by the Inspector of Stores, as directed in clause 14, shall be completed and signed by the head of department (who will be held responsible that the rates and computations are correct), and shall be transmitted forthwith to the Treasury for payment.

SUPPLIES FOR COUNTRY DISTRICTS (Clauses 28 to 34).

28. If the supplies be required for country districts, the contractor shall be directed to deliver at the Transport Office, in Melbourne.

29. In case of the non-arrival within a reasonable time after the receipt of the way-bill mentioned in clause 16, of the supplies transmitted to country districts by the Inspector of Stores, the officer in charge at the station shall communicate at once to the Inspector of Stores the circumstances of the case, in order that such steps as may be necessary may be promptly taken.

30. If at any time the weight or quantity of the supplies received be deficient, or exceed that stated in the way-bill, the officer in charge shall point out the discrepancy to the carrier, and ascertain whether such discrepancy has arisen from carelessness, dishonesty, or other causes. Should the supplies be damaged, he shall also ascertain in what manner the damage occurred.

31. In every such case, the weight or quantity stated in the way-bill shall not be altered; but the officer shall attach his signature, and shall minute all essential particulars of the excess, loss, or damage on the face of the bill.

32. The quantities stated in the way-bill shall in all cases be entered in the books of the officer in charge as having been received, and he shall take credit on the opposite side of his account for the weight or quantity which may have been damaged or deficient.

33. The principal officer in charge at every station throughout the colony shall be considered as specially entrusted with the receipt of all supplies forwarded for the service under his charge, and he shall in all cases take care that the supplies are adequately housed and protected from the weather, from depredation, and from loss of any kind.

34. When an officer in charge, or his subordinate, shall be removed from any station, he shall balance his accounts, and shall take care that the stock handed over to his successor is correct. In like manner the person taking charge shall ascertain that the stock on hand is in all respects in accordance with the accounts, and should any discrepancies be afterwards discovered, he shall be held responsible. Wherever practicable, the person retiring and the person relieving him shall take stock, and certify conjointly to the correctness of the books.

35. In the event of any dispute between a contractor and the Inspector of Stores, as to the quality, &c., of stores supplied, the

latter officer shall, on the written request of such contractor, apply to the minister of the department concerned for the appointment of a Board of Survey, who, on being appointed, shall enquire into and determine the question in dispute, and such decision shall be final. Should any head of department have reason to object to the stores supplied to him, notwithstanding that they have been passed by the Inspector of Stores, he shall report upon the subject without loss of time to the minister of his department.

CUSTODY OF STORES (Clauses 36 to 39).

36. Every officer entrusted with the custody of stores shall keep a clear and exact account of every article which may in any manner be placed under his charge. He shall be particularly attentive to the preservation of the supplies, and shall give positive orders to this effect to the persons employed under him.

37. No articles whatever shall be lent, sold, or exchanged, without the authority of the minister.

38. All articles in store shall be constantly under observation, and shall be frequently inspected in detail. The contents of each package to be at all times correctly noted in conspicuous characters on a label attached to the package itself.

39. The officer immediately in charge should from time to time inspect his stores and take stock thereof at least once in each year, viz., on 31st December, or whenever called upon to do so by the Commissioners of Audit or other competent authority; and further, shall see that due order and regularity are maintained by his clerk or issuer.

UNSERVICABLE STORES (Clauses 40 to 42).

40. When stores, whether serviceable or unserviceable, in the possession of any particular department shall not be required for the service of that department, the officer in charge shall apply to the minister of his division for instructions as to their disposal.

41. No articles shall be considered as unserviceable until they shall have been inspected by a board of survey, appointed under the authority of the minister, and condemned.

42. Articles considered by any such board of survey to be unserviceable shall be divided by the board into three classes: 1st, articles which would probably realize more than the expenses of sale by public auction; 2nd, articles which could be made use of with advantage at the manufacturing branch of the penal establishments or by other departments of the service; 3rd, articles which are worthless; and the report of the board, which shall contain the board's recommendation as to the disposal of the said articles, shall be forwarded to the minister of the division concerned.

43. No person in the employment of the Government shall be permitted to act as agent for a contractor, in the supply of articles for the public service; and any person so employed, receiving from a contractor any fee, remuneration, or reward, shall be subject to dismissal.

FORAGE FOR POLICE.

44. The supply of forage is to be regulated as follows:—

(a) Requisitions for forage in the Melbourne District shall be submitted for the approval of the minister, on the 15th of each month for the ensuing month; for forage required at stations in the country districts, at such times as the season of the year, the rates of transport, and the amount of storage accommodation at the stations may render advisable.

(b) Forage for which contracts have been or may be entered into shall be procured from the contractor on the order of the head of the department, or the principal officer in charge of the station, as provided by the conditions of contract. Every effort shall be made to ensure the forage being stored in such a manner as to prevent any injury through the effects of weather or other causes, and should any damage or loss occur, the strictest investigation is to be made, and the person who, from negligence or culpability, allowed the same to take place, shall be held personally liable.

(c) No goats, pigs, poultry, &c., shall be kept in the neighborhood of a forage store by any person in the employment of Government. Proper precautions against loss by fire in all cases shall be taken. At every station where there is grass in the neighborhood, officers in charge of police must, at their discretion, turn out duty horses to graze, issuing to them only half rations, or such other allowance as may be deemed necessary, due regard being had to their being kept in serviceable condition. Where there is good grass, the horses should be kept altogether without the usual rations of oats, bran and hay. On the 1st July and 1st January in each year, and oftener if considered necessary, the stock of forage on hand, shall be ascertained by the officer in charge by actual tally and inspection, and shall be reconciled with the balances as shewn in the stock account.

(d) The transport of forage and other supplies from the head to the out-stations of the police shall be undertaken by the police carts. If, however, under extraordinary circumstances it should be absolutely necessary to engage transport, the officer in charge may hire it on the most economical terms. The transport of forage from Melbourne to country stations is to be undertaken, if practicable or ex-

pedient, by the police department, under the authority of the Chief Commissioner. Should the commissioner be of opinion in any case that this course would not be desirable, he must communicate with the Inspector of Stores and Transport, whose duty it will then be to obtain the necessary transport in accordance with these regulations.

(e) No requisition shall exceed the authorised scale of allowances; any quantity which shall be in excess of the scale laid down shall be disallowed, or, if supplied, shall be charged to the person making the requisition.

(f) The scale of forage is as follows:—

Hay	14 lbs.
Oats or maize	10 lbs.
Bran	1 lb.
Bedding	{ Straw	4 lbs.
	{ or hay	2 lbs.

The substitution of 2 lbs. hay for 4 lbs. straw shall be enforced wherever it may be more economical, or wherever straw may be difficult to procure.

RATIONS OF PROVISIONS, ETC.

45. For rations of provisions and light for immigrants, prisoners, lunatics, &c., approved requisitions will not be necessary; they will be supplied by contractors to the several departments, upon the order of the officer in charge of the station, and accounts shall be rendered for payment monthly.

46. The daily ration shall be as follows:—

FUEL, LIGHT, AND WATER (Clauses 47 to 50).

47. Fuel, light, and water, for office purposes shall be provided for upon quarterly requisition, in the same manner as stores.

48. Fires will be allowed in Government Offices in Melbourne, Suburban Municipalities, Geelong, and Williamstown, from the 1st of May to 30th September. The maximum quantity will be as follows:—

49. Water being supplied to the various departments by the Sewerage and Water Commission, the accounts will be passed on the certificate of the head of the department.

50. Gas accounts will be passed in a similar manner, it being, however, distinctly understood that the head of the department supplied will be held responsible that due care is taken to ensure accuracy in the meter, as well as economy in the consumption of the gas.

FUEL AND WATER FOR COUNTRY DISTRICTS (Clauses 51 to 55).

51. In every country town where three or more officers are stationed the usual supplies of fuel and water shall be obtained under a contract to be entered into on the part of the Government by a board, consisting of the senior or chief officer of each of the several departments in the town or district for which the supplies shall be required.

52. The senior officer of the board shall act as chairman, and, when necessary, convene meetings of the board for the consideration of tenders, and, in dealing with them, the course prescribed by the foregoing regulations shall, as far as practicable, be observed.

53. In towns or places where less than three officers are stationed, and in country places removed from any town, supplies shall be procured by each officer in the most economical manner, and the accounts, certified by the officer in charge, shall be forwarded to the head of the department in Melbourne.

54. Accounts for supplies of fuel and water made under contracts entered into by a board, as above laid down, shall be certified by the officer requiring the supplies, and by the head of the department.

55. Information as to the forms to be observed in calling for tenders, &c., and forms for the preparation of contracts, &c., shall be obtainable from the Secretary to the Tender Board, Melbourne.

56. Clauses 51 to 55 of these regulations shall apply to all towns, except Melbourne and its suburbs, Geelong and Williamstown.

57. The scale for wood, and the period of its allowance, shall be the same in the country as in town; but the substitution of coal will not be permitted except under special circumstances.

58. Water is allowed only for office use and for cleansing the offices. The consumption, however, is not to exceed, for all purposes, the rate of sixty gallons per month for each person.

FUEL, LIGHT, AND WATER FOR POLICE.

59. Fuel, light, and water will be allowed to the police according to the following scale, but where a less quantity will suffice the issue shall be limited thereto:—

Fuel.—Officers of police throughout the colony will draw fuel under clause 48.

Sergeants and constables will receive, in winter (from the 1st May to the 30th September), six (6) cubic feet of wood per man per week, or an equivalent in coal according to value.

Married men in Melbourne who receive no fuel will in lieu be allowed six (6) shillings per month in winter, and four (4) shillings per month in summer.

Water.—Police officers, sergeants, and constables, will be allowed two gallons each per day.

Light.—Gas will be allowed where most economical; elsewhere kerosene oil for one lamp in officers' quarters, offices, and outside lock-ups, and inside barrack-rooms; also one forty-eighth of a pound of sperm candles to each officer and man per night.

MISCELLANEOUS (Clauses 60 to 62).

60. Officers and clerks removed from station by order of Government will be allowed transport for their baggage to the extent of 2 cwt. each.

61. Articles of small value, which cannot conveniently be described or inserted in the quarterly requisition, or which can be purchased at a smaller cost than by the system of tender prescribed in these regulations, repairs to stores, the transport of parcels, and minor services generally, may be paid for by the several heads of department, mentioned in clause 22, who will be held responsible for the expenditure, and will not be required under these regulations to apply by requisition or otherwise for the minister's approval.

62. PRISONERS' MEALS.—When prisoners are in transit, and there is no lock-up or contract for the supply, the guard will be allowed One shilling per meal.

63. These regulations shall commence and take effect on and after the first day of January, 1865.

SIR,—

In compliance with your request, I have the honor to inform you, for information of the Honorable the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, that within the district of Riverina and the colony of Victoria no pine-trees exist allied to those from which the main supply of resin and wood-tar imported into Great Britain is obtained, our only coniferous trees consisting of the Murray pine and an allied species of callitris, none of sufficient abundance for obtaining from them export supplies of pine-tar.

Nevertheless, I would beg to direct attention to the circumstance, that our eucalypti are yielding more or less of a peculiar kind of tar, in some instances as much as 7 per cent. of the weight of the dry wood, irrespective of the quantity retained in the wood-vinegar; and although this tar is not precisely identical with the ordinary wood-tar of coniferous trees now generally in use, it may be anticipated that it could be advantageously substituted for many purposes for which now Stockholm tar is employed.

Likewise, most other woods than those of fir-trees are producing by dry distillation tar; but it appears that these are generally in the northern countries not available in sufficient abundance for the purpose.

Though the per-centage of eucalyptus tar may not always prove large, the process of obtaining it may nevertheless prove lucrative when we consider how inexhaustible a supply of wood is available in our ranges, whilst in Europe, North Asia, and North America, only the roots and branches of firs can generally be spared for the preparation of tar. Resin, similar to fir-resin, can however not be obtained from the eucalypti or any other Victorian trees.

Of the British territories in which firs attainable for supplies of tar and resin are abundant as forest-trees, Canada and the other parts of British North America, as well as the Indian highland, are standing prominently.

Finally, I may mention, that very many thousands of plants of the Scotch fir, the tree which mainly furnishes in Europe and Northern Asia the tar and resin of commerce, have been distributed from the nurseries of the Botanic Garden of Melbourne; and it may be deserving of the consideration of the Government, whether not finally the forest-culture of this and other important trees should be effected on the waste lands of the Crown.

BARRABOOL DISTRICT ROAD BOARD.

BYE-LAWS FOR REGULATING THE CONDUCT OF THE OFFICERS AND SERVANTS, AND FOR PROVIDING FOR THE DUE MANAGEMENT OF THE AFFAIRS OF THE BARRABOOL DISTRICT ROAD BOARD.

THE ordinary meetings of the board shall be held at the office of the board, on the last Monday of every month, at Twelve o'clock noon.

2. At any meeting of the board, should there be no quorum, the clerk shall enter that fact in the minute book, together with the names of the members present.
3. Any member may at any meeting, move for a call of the whole board for the consideration of any subject, and upon such motion being carried, notice in accordance with the Act shall be sent by post to each member, and should any member fail to attend on such notice without due cause shown to the satisfaction of the board, he shall be fined Ten shillings.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

4. At ordinary meetings of the board, the order of business shall be as follows:—
 - (1.) Confirmation of minutes.
 - (2.) Reading of correspondence.
 - (3.) Presentation of petitions.
 - (4.) Presentation of reports of committees and of officers.
 - (5.) Orders of the day.
 - (6.) Notices of motion.

5. No discussion shall take place on confirmation of minutes, except as to the accuracy of the record.
6. Every petition or memorial addressed to the board must be in proper form, and presented by a member of the board, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.
7. No report of a committee shall be considered or adopted at the meeting at which it is presented, unless by the consent of a majority, two-thirds of the members of the board being present.
8. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration. Any member may, however, bring forward any matter for consideration in the form of a notice of motion, such notice to be given in writing to the clerk at least eight clear days previous to the meeting at which the same is to be taken into consideration; but if the member who has given such notice, or some other member authorised by him in writing, is not present when the business is called on, it shall be struck out of the notice paper.
9. The mover of any motion which shall be referred to a committee, shall be, for that occasion, a member of such committee.
10. All motions shall be in writing, and signed by the mover and seconder.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

11. No member shall speak twice on the same motion or amendment, except by way of explanation or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as mover of the amendment last proposed; and any member moving or seconding any motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken on that motion or amendment.
12. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost another may be moved before the original question is put to the vote.
13. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the board; but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or if none, the next on the notice paper shall be discussed before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained.
14. Members wishing to speak shall rise and address the chairman, and if two or more members rise at the same time, the chairman shall decide which is entitled to precedence.

15. Any member digressing from the subject under discussion imputing improper motives, or making personal reflections, shall be considered out of order; and any member who shall use an expression capable of being applied offensively to any other member, shall, if required by the chairman, withdraw such expression and make an apology.

16. The chairman shall call to order any member when out of order, without waiting for the interposition of the board or any member thereof, and any member refusing or neglecting to obey the chairman in this respect shall forfeit any sum not exceeding One pound.

17. The chairman, when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case without comment, and his decision shall be final for that occasion in each case.

18. Any member may protest against any resolution of the board, and such protest shall be entered by the clerk in the minute book, and form part of the minutes.

19. Any member may at any meeting of the board, or during office hours, require the production of and inspect any documents belonging to the board.

20. No election to any vacant office at the disposal of the board shall take place until after eight clear days' notice shall have been given by advertisement in one or more of the local papers, inviting application from persons properly qualified; but this rule may be dispensed with in any particular instance by a motion to that effect carried by a majority of the members present at a call of the whole board.

21. There shall be a written agreement between the board and each officer in the employ of the board, which shall be executed by both parties before the term of office commences.

22. The clerk shall attend at the office of the board on Monday in each week, from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m., and at such other times as the board shall from time to time direct.

23. The surveyor shall keep a journal or diary, showing how his time has been employed. He shall report, at every ordinary meeting of the board, every contractor who shall be in arrear with his work, or shall not be performing the same satisfactorily.

24. The valuers appointed by the board shall visit and examine each rateable property within the road district, and shall, after having valued such property, thereupon deliver or cause to be delivered to the owner, occupier, or agent thereof, a notice setting forth the amount at which such property is valued, together with other particulars necessary to describe the property, and every such notice shall be signed by the valuers.

25. The collector shall report at every ordinary meeting of the board the names of all ratepayers the payment of whose rates shall be three months in arrear, with a view to immediate steps being taken for the recovery of such rates.

26. All officers of the board, with all books and documents, shall attend at the place of meeting, at least one hour prior to the hour of meeting, to afford members any information required.

27. At any meeting of the board any of the above rules may be suspended upon a motion to that effect being carried by a majority of the members present at such meeting.
