THE SUBDIVISIONS OF THE SHIRE OF MARONG.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the nineteenth day of December, 1864.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board, for any original or proclaimed district thereafter sometimes called "single district," the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall within three months after the receipt of the same divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions, thereafter called subdivisions, by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district; and it is also enacted that every shire shall after the proclamation thereof as such be and be deemed to be and have been such and the same district as such shire was at the time of such proclamation, and save as aforesaid and save where herein otherwise expressly provided all the provisions of the said Act relating to districts shall continue and be of full force and effect with regard to such shire and be read accordingly: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the twelfth day of December instant the shire of Marong was constituted: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by more than twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said shire, praying for the division of the said shire into three subdivisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order divide the shire of Marong into three separate electoral subdivisions in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:—

THE SOUTH RIDING.—Commencing on the River Loddon at the south-west angle of the parish of Laanacoorie; thence northerly by the centre of the Loddon River to the centre of the road from Newbridge to Kangaroo Flat; thence easterly by that road to the centre of the road from Melbourne to Sandhurst; thence northerly by the centre of said road from Melbourne to Sandhurst to its intersection with the centre of the road to the Kangaroo Flat Railway Station; thence east by the centre of the last-named road to the western boundary of

the Melbourne to Sandhurst Railway; thence southerly by the said western boundary to the south-east angle of the parish of Ravenswood; thence west to the south-west angle of the same parish; thence north by the west boundary of the parish of Ravenswood to the south-east angle of the parish of Shelbourne; thence west by the south boundary of the parishes of Shelbourne and Laanacoorie to the commencing point.

THE NORTH-WEST RIDING.—Commencing at a point on the road from Newbridge to Kangaroo Flat, south of the south-east angle of the parish of Woodstock; thence northerly to and by the east boundary of said parish to the south boundary of the parish of Leichardt; thence east and north by the south and east boundary of said parish to the south boundary of the parish of Yarraberr; thence east and north by the south and east boundary of the last-named parish to the south boundary of the parish of Yallock; thence east and north by the south and east boundary of the last-named parish to a point on the east boundary due west of the north boundary of the Campaspe Road District; thence west to the centre of the Loddon River; thence southerly by the centre of the Loddon River to the centre of the road from Newbridge to Kangaroo Flat; thence by that road easterly to the commencing point.

THE NORTH-EAST RIDING.—Commencing at a point on the southern boundary of the municipality of Sandhurst where it is intersected by the western boundary of the railway from Melbourne to Sandhurst; thence westerly and northerly by the southern and western boundary of the said municipality to the western boundary of the Long Gully annexation to the said municipality; thence northerly and easterly by the western and northern boundary of the said annexation to the northern boundary of the municipality of Sandhurst; thence by the said northern boundary easterly to the Bendigo Creek; thence northerly by the Bendigo Creek and the western boundary of the Campaspe Road District to the north-west angle of the Campaspe Road District; thence by a line due west to the east boundary of the parish of Yallock; thence southerly to the south-east angle of said parish; thence westerly by the south boundary of said parish to the north-east angle of the parish of Yarraberr; thence southerly to the south-east angle of the last-named parish; thence westerly to the north-east angle of the parish of Leichardt; thence southerly and westerly by the east and south boundary of parish of Leichardt to the north-east angle of the parish of Woodstock; thence southerly by the east boundary of the parish of Woodstock and a direct line to the centre of the road from Newbridge to Kangaroo Flat; thence easterly by that road to the centre of the road from Melbourne to Sandhurst; thence northerly by the centre of said road from Melbourne to Sandhurst to its intersection with the centre of the road to the Kangaroo Flat Railway Station; thence east by the centre of the last-named road to the western boundary of the Melbourne to Sandhurst Railway; thence northerly by said western boundary to the commencing point. Excluding the municipality of Eaglehawk.

And the Honorable James Forrester Sullivan shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THE SUBDIVISIONS OF THE SHIRE OF ST. ARNAUD.

WHEREAS by The Local Government Act, 1863, it is amongst other things enacted, that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board, for any original or proclaimed district thereafter sometimes called "single district," the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall within three months after the receipt of the same divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions, thereafter called subdivisions, by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district; and it is also enacted that every shire shall after the Proclamation thereof as such be and be deemed to be and have been such and the same district as such shire was at the time of such Proclamation, and save as aforesaid and save where herein otherwise expressly provided all the provisions of the said Act relating to districts shall continue and be of full force and effect with regard to such shire and be read accordingly: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the fourteenth day of December, 1864, the shire of St. Arnaud was constituted: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by more than twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said shire, praying for the division of the said shire into three subdivisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order divide the shire of St. Arnaud into three separate electoral subdivisions in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:—

THE SOUTH RIDING.—Commencing at a point where the northern boundary of the Rich Avon East Run intersects the Avon River; thence easterly by the northern boundary of that run and the northern boundary of the Swan Water North Run to the northern boundary of the Connor Run; thence by the northern boundary of the Connor Run to its intersection with the Avoca River; thence southerly by the Avoca River to the northern boundary of the Naito Yaloak pre-emptive section; thence by a line westerly to the eastern boundary of the Stawell Road District at the township of Navarre; thence by part of the northern boundary of the said road district to its intersection by the west branch of the Richardson River; thence northerly by the centre of the said river and by the centre of the Avon to the point of commencement aforesaid; excluding the territory within St. Arnaud Borough boundaries.

THE EAST RIDING.—Commencing at a point where the northern boundary of the Rich Avon East Run intersects the Avon River; thence easterly by the northern boundary of the south subdivision to the Avon River; thence by the centre line of that river northerly and by the centre of the Albert Creek to the southern shore of Lake L'Albert; thence by a line bearing westerly to the 143° of longitude; thence southerly by that meridian to its intersection with the northern shore of Lake Buloke; thence southerly by the western shore of Lake Buloke and the centre line of the Avon River to the point of commencement aforesaid.

THE WEST RIDING.—Commencing at the south boundary of the Witchpool Run where it joins the Avon River; thence westerly by the said southern boundary of Witchpool, the southern boundary of Laan Run, the southern boundary of Leda Run, the southern boundary of the Sheep Hills Run, and the southern boundary of the Warracnabel Run to its intersection with the Yarrambiack Creek; thence northerly by the centre of the Yarrambiack Creek to the southern shore of Lake Corong; thence by a line bearing easterly to the 143° meridian; thence southerly to its intersection with the northern shore of Lake Buloke; thence by the westerly shore of Lake Buloke and southerly by the Avon River to its intersection by the southern boundary of the Witchpool Run.

And the Honorable James Forrester Sullivan shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

INCORPORATION OF THE MELBOURNE LYING-IN HOSPITAL, ETC.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act for Hospitals and Charitable Institutions*, it is amongst other things enacted that any institution established for the cure of disease,

or for the relief of diseased, aged, incurable, or destitute persons, and supported in whole or in part by the voluntary contributions of not less than fifty persons, each of whom shall have paid not less than One pound per annum or Twenty pounds in one donation, may be incorporated as thereafter mentioned, and all persons who shall have paid as aforesaid shall be deemed contributors within the meaning of the said Act; and it is also enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than twenty-five of the said persons praying that such institution may be incorporated, to cause the substance or prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition signed by an equal or greater number of such persons shall have been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication) the Governor in Council may declare the contributors for the time being to such institution to be and they shall thereupon become and continue a body politic and corporate by the style and title named in the Order in Council, and shall have perpetual succession and a common seal: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by not less than twenty-five contributors to the institution known as the Melbourne Lying-in Hospital, praying that the said institution may be incorporated: And whereas the substance or prayer of the said petition has been published in the *Government Gazette*, and no counter-petition has been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order declare the contributors to the said institution to be a body politic and corporate in accordance with the provisions of the said Act in manner following, that is to say:—

The contributors for the time being to the institution called and known as the Melbourne Lying-in Hospital, situate in the city of Melbourne, are hereby declared to be a body politic and corporate, by the style and title of "The Melbourne Lying-in Hospital" and Infirmary for Diseases peculiar to Women and Children."

And the Honorable James McCulloch, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act for Hospitals and Charitable Institutions*, it is amongst other things enacted that any institution established for the cure of disease, or for the relief of diseased, aged, incurable, or destitute persons, and supported in whole or in part by the voluntary contributions of not less than fifty persons, each of whom shall have paid not less than One pound per annum or Twenty pounds in one donation, may be incorporated as thereafter mentioned, and all persons who shall have paid as aforesaid shall be deemed contributors within the meaning of the said Act; and it is also enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than twenty-five of the said persons praying that such institution may be incorporated, to cause the substance or prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition signed by an equal or greater number of such persons shall have been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication) the Governor in Council may declare the contributors for the time being to such institution to be and they shall thereupon become and continue a body politic and corporate by the style and title named in the Order in Council, and shall have perpetual succession and a common seal: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by not less than twenty-five contributors to the Kilmore Hospital, praying that the said institution may be incorporated: And whereas the substance or prayer of the said petition has been published in the *Government Gazette*, and no counter-petition has been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order declare the contributors to the said institution to be a body politic and corporate in accordance with the provisions of the said Act in manner following, that is to say:—

The contributors for the time being to the institution called and known as the Kilmore Hospital, situate in the borough of Kilmore, are hereby declared to be a body politic and corporate by the style and title of "The Kilmore Hospital."

And the Honorable James McCulloch, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
