## TREATY OF COMMERCE AND NAVIGATION BETWEEN HER MAJESTY AND THE KING OF ITALY.

Signed at Turin, 6th August, 1863.

[Ratifications exchanged at London, 29th October, 1863.]

In the name of the Most Holy and Indivisible Trinity.

HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and His Majesty the King of Italy, being desirous of extending and facilitating the relations of commerce between their respective dominions and subjects, have resolved to conclude a Treaty for that purpose, and have named as their respective Plenipotentiaries, that is to say:

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, &c., Sir James Hudson, a Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Her Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to His Majesty the King of Italy;

And His Majesty the King of Italy, Giovanni Manna, Senator of the Kingdom, Grand Officer of the Order of Saints Maurice and Lazarus, Minister Secretary of State for Agriculture, Industry, and Commerce;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

### ARTICLE I.

There shall be between all the dominions and possessions of the two High Contracting Parties, reciprocal freedom of commerce and navigation. The subjects of each of the two Contracting Parties, respectively, shall have liberty freely and securely to come, with their ships and cargoes, to all places, ports, and rivers in the dominions and possessions of the other, to which other foreigners are or may be permitted to come; and shall, throughout the whole extent of the dominions and possessions of the other, enjoy the same rights, privileges, liberties, favors, immunities, and exemptions in matters of commerce and navigation, which are or may be enjoyed by native subjects generally.

### ARTICLE II.

No other or higher duties shall be imposed on the importation into the dominions and possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, of any article the produce or manufacture of the dominions and possessions of His Majesty the King of Italy, from whatever place arriving, and no other or higher duties shall be imposed on the importation into the dominions and possessions of His Majesty the King of Italy, of any article the produce or manufacture of Her Britannic Majesty's dominions and possessions, from whatever place arriving, than are or may be payable on the like article, the produce or manufacture of any other foreign country; nor shall any prohibition be maintained or imposed on the importation of any article the produce or manufacture of the dominions and possessions of either of the contracting parties into the dominions and possessions of the other, which shall not equally extend to the importation of the like articles being the produce or manufacture of any other country.

His Majesty the King of Italy further engages that he will not prohibit the importation into his dominions and possessions of any article the produce or manufacture of the dominions and possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, from whatever place arriving.

SUA Maestà il Re d'Italia e Sua Maestà la Regina del Regno Unito della Gran Bretagna e d'Irlanda, desiderosi di estendere e facilitare le relazioni di commercio tra i loro rispettivi domini e sudditi, hanno determinato di concludere un Trattato per questo scopo, ed hanno nominato a loro rispettivi Plenipotenziari, cioè:—

Sua Maestà il Re d'Italia, Giovanni Manna, Senatore del Regno, Grande Ufficiale dell' Ordine dei Santi Maurizio e Lazzaro, Ministro Segretario di Stato per l'Agricoltura, l'Industria, ed il Commercio;

E Sua Maestà la Regina del Regno Unito della Gran Bretagna e d'Irlanda, Sir James Hudson, Commendatore dell' Onorvolissimo Ordine del Bagno, Suo Inviato Staordinario e Ministro Plenipotenziario presso Sua Maestà il Re d'Italia;

I quali, dopo essersi reciprocamente comunicati i loro rispettivi pieni poteri, riconosciuti in buona e debita forma, convennero nella stipulazione dei seguenti Articoli:—

### ARTICOLO I.

Vi sarà tra tutti gli stati e possessi delle due Alte Parti Contraenti libertà reciproca di commercio e di navigazione. I sudditi di ognuna di esse Parti Contraenti avranno facoltà di entrare liberamente e sicuramente coi loro bastimenti e carichi in tutti i luoghi, porti, e riviere degli stati e possessi dell' altra, la cui entrata è fin d'ora permessa o la sarà nel seguito agli stranieri, e godranno rispettivamente negli stati e possessi dell' altra, degli stessi diritti, privilegi, libertà, favori, immunità, ed esenzioni in materia di commercio e navigazione di cui godono o godranno i nazionali.

### ARTICOLO II.

All' importazione negli stati e possedimenti di Sua Maestà Britannica di qualsiasi mercanzia, prodotta o fabbricata negli stati o possessi di Sua Maestà il Re d'Italia, qualunque siane la provenienza, e similmente all' importazione negli stati e possessi di Sua Maestà il Re d'Italia di qualsiasi mercanzia, prodotta o fabbricata negli stati di Sua Maestà la Regina d'Inghilterra, qualunque ne sia la provenienza, non saranno riscossi altri o maggiori dazzi d'entrata che quelli che si pagano o potranno pagarsi sui consimili articoli prodotti o fabbricati in qualunque alto paese straniero.

Non potrà conservarsi nè imporsi dall' una delle Alte Parti Contraenti alcun divieto all' importazione ne' proprii stati e possessi di qualsiasi mercanzia prodotta o fabbricata negli stati o possessi dell' altra, senza che tal divieto non sia nell' istessa guisa applicato all' importazione di consimili mercanzie prodotte o fabbricate in qualunque siasi altro paese.

Sua Maestà il Re d'Italia s'impegna ancora a non proibire l'importazione ne' suoi domini e possessioni di qualsiasi mercanzia prodotta o fabbricata nei domini e possessi di Sua Maestà Britannica, qualunque siane la provenienza.

## ARTICLE III.

No other or higher duties or charges shall be imposed in the dominions and possessions of either of the Contracting Parties, on the exportation of any article to the dominions and possessions of the other, than such as are, or may be payable on the exportation of the like article to any other foreign country nor shall any prohibition be imposed on the exportation of any article from the dominions and possessions of either of the two Contracting Parties to the dominions and possessions of the other, which shall not equally extend to the exportation of the like article to any other country.

## ARTICLE IV.

The subjects of one of the Contracting Parties shall enjoy, in the dominions and possessions of the other, equality of treatment with native subjects in all that relates to the transit trade; and also in regard to warehousing, bounties, facilities, and drawbacks.

## ARTICLE V.

All articles which are or may be legally importable into the ports of the dominions and possessions of Her Britannic Majesty in British vessels, may likewise be imported into those ports in Italian vessels, without being liable to any other or higher duties or charges, of whatever denomination, than if such articles were imported in British vessels; and reciprocally, all articles which are or may be legally importable into the ports of the dominions and possessions of His Majesty the King of Italy in Italian vessels, may likewise be imported into those ports in British vessels, without being liable to any other or higher duties or charges of whatever denomination, than if such articles were imported in Italian vessels. Such reciprocal equality of treatment shall take effect without distinction, whether such articles come directly from the place of origin, or from any other place.

In the same manner there shall be perfect equality of treatment in regard to exportation, so that the same export duties shall be paid, and the same bounties and drawbacks allowed, in the dominions and possessions of either of the Contracting Parties, on the exportation of any article which is or may be legally exportable therefrom, whether such exportation shall take place in Italian or in British vessels, and whatever may be the place of destination, whether a port of either of the Contracting Parties or of any third power.

## ARTICLE VI.

No duties of tonnage, harbor, pilotage, lighthouse, quarantine, or other similar or corresponding duties, of whatever nature, or under whatever denomination, levied in the name or for the profit of Government, public functionaries, private individuals, corporations, or establishments of any kind, shall be imposed in the ports of the dominions and possessions of either country upon the vessels of the other country, which shall not equally and under the same conditions be imposed in the like cases on national vessels in general. Such equality of treatment shall apply reciprocally to the respective vessels, from whatever port or place they may arrive, and whatever may be their place of destination.

## ARTICLE VII.

In all that regards the stationing, loading, and unloading of vessels in the ports, basins, docks, roadsteads, harbors, or rivers of the dominions and possessions of the two countries, no privilege shall be granted to national vessels which shall not be equally granted to vessels of the other country; the intentions of the Contracting Parties being that in this respect also the respective vessels shall be treated on the footing of perfect equality.

## ARTICLE VIII.

The Contracting Parties agree that, in regard to the coasting trade, the vessels and subjects of each Contracting Party shall enjoy, in the dominions and possessions of the other, the same privileges, and shall be treated in all respects in the same manner, as national vessels and native subjects.

The provisions of this Article shall, however, as respects the Colonial coasting trade, be deemed to extend only to the coasting trade of such of the Colonial Possessions of Her Britannic Majesty as may have petitioned or may hereafter petition Her Majesty, under the provisions of the Act relating thereto, to throw open their coasting trade to foreign vessels.

## ARTICLE IX.

All vessels which according to British law are to be deemed British vessels, and all vessels which according to Italian law are to be deemed Italian vessels, shall for the purposes of this Treaty be deemed British and Italian vessels respectively.

## ARTICLE X.

The Contracting Parties agree that in all matters relating to commerce and navigation, any privilege, favor, or immunity whatever, which either Contracting Party has actually granted, or may hereafter grant, to the subjects or citizens of any other State, shall be extended immediately and unconditionally to the subjects or citizens of the other Contracting Party; it being their intention that the trade and navigation of each country shall be placed, in all respects, by the other on the footing of the most favored nation.

## ARTICLE XI.

Any import duty levied *ad valorem* in the territories of His Majesty the King of Italy shall be calculated on the value at the place of production or fabrication of the object imported, with the addition of the cost of transport, insurance, and commission necessary for the importation into Italy, its dominions and possessions, as far as the port of discharge.

## ARTICOLO III.

Sull' esportazione di qualsiasi mercanzia dagli stati e possessi d'una delle Parti Contraenti, in destinazione degli stati e possessi dell'altra, non saranno riscossi altri diritti o maggiori di quelli che si riscuoteranno sui simili articoli esportati per qualsivoglia altro paese straniero. Non sarà imposto divieto all' esportazione di qualsiasi mercanzia dagli stati e possessi di una delle Parti Contraenti per gli stati e possessi dell'altra, senza che tal divieto sia applicato, nell' istessa guisa, all' esportazione di consimili articoli per qualsiasi altro paese straniero.

## ARTICOLO IV.

I sudditi di una delle due Parti Contraenti godranno, negli stati e possessi dell'altra, eguaglianza di trattamento co' nazionali in tutto quanto ha rapporto al commercio di transito, ed anche in quello che concerne magazzino, diritti di rimportazione, favori, e *drawbacks*.

## ARTICOLO V.

Qualunque prodotto che può o potrà legalmente importarsi ne' porti degli stati e possessi di Sua Maestà Britannica sopra bastimenti Inglesi, potrà egualmente importarsi negli stessi porti sopra bastimenti Italiani, senza essere sottoposti ad altri o maggiori diritti od oneri di quelli cui lo stesso prodotto andrebbe sottoposto se fosse importato con bastimenti Inglesi; e reciprocamente, tutti i prodotti che possono o potranno legalmente importarsi ne' porti degli stati e possessi di Sua Maestà il Re d'Italia sopra bastimenti Italiani, potranno parimente importarsi sopra bastimenti Inglesi, senza essere tenuti ad altri o maggiori diritti od oneri di quelli cui lo stesso prodotto andrebbe sottoposto, se fosse importato con bastimenti Italiani. Questa eguaglianza di reciproco trattamento sarà sempre dovuta, sia che le mercanzie provengano direttamente dal luogo d'origine, ovvero da qualsiasi altra località.

La stessa perfetta eguaglianza di trattamento sarà dovuta a riguardo della esportazione, in guisa che negli stati e possessi di una e dell'altra delle due Parti Contraenti si pagheranno sull' uscita dei prodotti che possono o potranno legalmente esportarsi, gli stessi diritti di esportazione e si accorderanno gli stessi favori e *drawbacks*, tanto se siano esportati sopra bastimenti Italiani quanto sopra bastimenti Inglesi, e qualunque siasi la loro destinazione, per un porto dell'una o dell'altra delle Parti Contraenti o di una terza Potenza.

## ARTICOLO VI.

Nessun diritto di tonnellaggio, di porto, di pilotaggio, di faro, di quarentena, o altro similante od equivalente, di qualunque natura o sotto qualsiasi denominazione, potrà essere riscosso a profitto dello Stato, di funzionari pubblici, d'individui privati, di corporazioni o di stabilimenti di qualsivoglia specie, se tali diritti non siano egualmente riscossi sui bastimenti nazionali. Quest' eguaglianza di trattamento si applicherà reciprocamente ai rispettivi bastimenti, da qualsiasi porto o località arrivino, e qualunque sia la loro destinazione.

## ARTICOLO VII.

Per tutto quanto concerne il collocamento, il carico e il scarico dei bastimenti ne' porti, bacini, docks, darsene, rado e riviere degli stati o possessi ne' due paesi, non potrà accordarsi alcun privilegio ai navigli nazionali, il quale non sia parimente concesso ai navigli dell'altro paese, essendo intenzione delle due Parti Contraenti che a tal riguardo i bastimenti dell'una o dell'altra siano trattati sul piede di perfetta eguaglianza.

## ARTICOLO VIII.

In ordine al commercio di costa o cabotaggio, le Parti Contraenti pattuiscono che i bastimenti e sudditi dell'una godranno, negli stati e possessi dell'altra, gli stessi privilegi, e saranno trattati nella stessa guisa dei bastimenti e sudditi nazionali.

Questa disposizione, in quanto concerne il cabotaggio Coloniale, s'intenderà ristretta al commercio sulle coste dei possedimenti di quelle Colonie di Sua Maestà la Regina della Gran Bretagna le quali abbiano fatto domanda a Sua Maestà o la faranno perchè, in virtù dell' Atto relativo alle Colonie, permetta il commercio di cabotaggio sulle loro coste ai bastimenti stranieri.

## ARTICOLO IX.

I bastimenti che a norma delle leggi Inglesi sono considerati come bastimenti Inglesi, e quelli che secondo le leggi Italiani sono considerati come bastimenti Italiani, saranno rispettivamente considerati Inglesi o Italiani per gli effetti del presente Trattato.

## ARTICOLO X.

Le Parti Contraenti pattuiscono che qualunque privilegio, favore, o esenzione in materia di commercio e di navigazione, sia dall'una di esse concessa, o possa concedersi in avvenire, a' sudditi o cittadini di qualsiasi altro Stato, si estenderà immediatamente e senza condizioni ai sudditi e cittadini dell'altra Parte Contraente, essendo intenzione delle due Parti che il commercio e la navigazione di ciascuno dei due paesi sia collocata, per ogni rispetto, sul piede della nazione più favorita.

## ARTICOLO XI.

I dazi *ad valorem* che si riscuotono all' importazione negli stati di Sua Maestà il Re d'Italia saranno calcolati sul valore al luogo della produzione o fabbricazione dell' oggetto importato, coll' aggiunta delle spese di trasporto, di assicurazione e di provvigione necessario per l'introduzione in Italia, e ne' suoi porti o possessi, sino al porto di scarico.

For the levying of these duties, the importer shall make a written declaration at the Custom-house, stating the value and description of the goods imported, with the addition aforesaid. If the Custom-house authorities shall be of opinion that the declared value is insufficient, they shall be at liberty to take the goods on paying to the importer the price declared, with an addition of five per cent.

This payment, together with the restitution of any duty which may have been levied upon such goods, shall be made within the fifteen days following the declaration.

#### ARTICLE XII.

The subjects of each of the Contracting Parties shall have, in the dominions and possessions of the other, the same rights as native subjects in regard to trade marks and designs of every description applicable to articles of manufacture.

#### ARTICLE XIII.

It shall be free for each of the Contracting Parties to appoint Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents, to reside in the towns and ports of the dominions and possessions of the other. Such Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents, however, shall not enter upon their functions until after they shall have been approved and admitted, in the usual form, by the Government to which they are sent. They shall exercise whatever functions and enjoy whatever privileges, exemptions, and immunities are or shall be granted there to Consuls of the most favored nation.

#### ARTICLE XIV.

The subjects of each of the Contracting Parties, conforming themselves to the laws of the country,—

1. Shall have full liberty, with their families, to enter, travel, or reside in any part of the dominions and possessions of the other Contracting Party.

2. They shall be permitted to hire or possess the houses, manufactories, warehouses, shops, and premises which may be necessary for them.

3. They may carry on their commerce either in person or by any agent they may think fit to employ.

4. They shall not be subject, in respect of their persons or property, or in respect of passports, licenses for residence or establishment, nor in respect of their commerce or industry, to any taxes, whether general or local, nor to imposts or obligations of any kind whatever, other or greater than those which are or may be imposed upon native subjects.

#### ARTICLE XV.

The subjects of each of the Contracting Parties in the dominions and possessions of the other shall be exempted from all compulsory military service whatever, whether in the army, navy, or national guard or militia. They shall be equally exempted from all judicial and municipal functions whatever, as well as from all contributions, whether pecuniary or in kind, imposed as a compensation for personal service; and, finally, from forced loans and military exactions or requisitions.

#### ARTICLE XVI.

The subjects of each of the Contracting Parties in the dominions and possessions of the other shall be at full liberty to acquire, possess, and dispose of every description of property which the laws of the country may permit any foreigners, of whatsoever nation, to acquire and possess. They may acquire and dispose of the same, whether by purchase, sale, donation, exchange, marriage, testament, succession *ab intestato*, or in any other manner, under the same conditions as are established by the laws of the country for all foreigners. Their heirs and representatives may succeed to and take possession of such property, either in person or by agents acting on their behalf, in the same manner and in the same legal forms as subjects of the country. In the absence of heirs and representatives, the property shall be treated in the same manner as the like property belonging to a subject of the country under similar circumstances.

In none of these respects shall they pay upon the value of such property any other or higher impost, duty, or charge, than is payable by subjects of the country. In every case the subjects of the Contracting Parties shall be permitted to export their property, or the proceeds thereof if sold, freely, and without being subjected on such exportation to pay any duty as foreigners, or any other or higher duties than those to which subjects of the country are liable under similar circumstances.

#### ARTICLE XVII.

The dwellings, manufactories, warehouses, and shops of the subjects of each of the Contracting Parties in the dominions and possessions of the other, and all premises appertaining thereto, destined for purposes of residence or commerce, shall be respected. If there should be occasion to make a search of, or a domiciliary visit to, such dwellings and premises, or to examine or inspect books, papers, or accounts, such measure shall be executed only in conformity with the legal warrant or order in writing of a tribunal, or of the competent authority.

The subjects of each of the two Contracting Parties in the dominions and possessions of the other shall have free access to the Courts of Justice for the prosecution and defence of their rights. They shall enjoy in this respect the same rights and privileges as subjects of the country, and shall, like them, be at liberty to employ, in all causes, their advocates, attorneys, or agents from among the persons admitted to the exercise of those professions according to the laws of the country.

#### ARTICLE XVIII.

Any ship of war or merchant-vessel of either of the Contracting Parties which may be compelled by stress of weather, or by accident, to take shelter in a port of the other, shall be at liberty to refit therein, to procure all necessary stores, and to put to sea

Tal pagamento, come pure la restituzione di qualsiasi diritto che fosse stato riscosso sulla mercanzia, sarà fatto ne' quindici giorni successivi alla dichiarazione.

#### ARTICOLO XII.

In ordine alle marche di fabbrica ed ai disegni d'ogni specie concernenti articoli di manifattura, i sudditi di ciascuna delle Parti Contraenti avranno, negli stati e possessi dell'altra, gli stessi diritti dei nazionali.

#### ARTICOLO XIII.

Sarà in facoltà di ciascuna delle Parti Contraenti di nominare Consoli-Generali, Consoli, Vice-Consoli, e Agenti Consolari, con residenza nelle città e porti degli stati e possessi dell'altra. I Consoli-Generali, Consoli, Vice-Consoli, e Agenti Consolari, non potranno però assumere l'esercizio delle loro funzioni sino a che non sono stati approvati e ammessi, secondo le formalità di uso, dal Governo presso cui sono destinati. Essi eserciteranno tutte le funzioni, e godranno di tutti i privilegi, esenzioni, e immunità, d'ogni specie, che siano accordate ai Consoli della nazione più favorita.

#### ARTICOLO XIV.

I sudditi di ciascuna delle Parti Contraenti, uniformandosi alle leggi del paese,—

1. Dovranno avere piena libertà, sia per sé che per le loro famiglie, di entrare, viaggiare, o risiedere in qualunque sia luogo degli stati e possessi dell'altra Parte Contraente.

2. Sarà loro facoltativo di affittare o possedere case, manifattura, magazzini, botteghe, e locali, che saranno ad essi necessari.

3. Potranno esercitare il loro commercio, sia personalmente, sia per mezzo di agenti che credano opportuno adoperarvi.

4. Non saranno, in alcun caso, sottoposti per le loro persone o proprietà, o per i passaporti, permessi di soggiorno, o di stabilimento, o per l'esercizio del loro commercio o industria, ad alcuna tassa generale o locale, nè imposta od obbligazione qualsiasi, che siano differenti o superiori a quelle che s'impongono, o possano, imporsi, ai sudditi nazionali.

#### ARTICOLO XV.

I sudditi di ciascuna delle Parti Contraenti saranno esenti, negli stati e possessi dell'altra, dal servizio militare obbligatorio, sia nell'esercito, nella marina, nella guardia nazionale, sia nella milizia. Saranno parimente esenti da ogni ufficio giudiziario e municipale, come pure da ogni specie di contribuzione, in danaro o in natura, imposta a compenso del servizio personale; e finalmente da qualsiasi prestito forzato, prestazione, o requisizione militare.

#### ARTICOLO XVI.

I sudditi di ciascuna delle Parti Contraenti avranno piena libertà, negli stati e possessi dell'altra, di acquistare, possedere, e disporre di ogni sorta di proprietà che le leggi del paese permettono agli stranieri, di qualsiasi nazione, di acquistare e di possederla. Essi potranno acquistare e disporre delle loro proprietà per compra, vendita, donazione, permuta, matrimonio, testamento, successione *ab intestato*, o in qualsiasi altra maniera, alle stesse condizioni che sono stabilite dalle leggi locali per tutti gli stranieri. I loro eredi o rappresentanti potranno succedere in queste proprietà e prenderne possesso, sia in persona, sia per mezzo di agenti per loro conto, nella stessa guisa e nelle stesse forme legali richieste per i nazionali. In mancanza di eredi o di rappresentanti, le loro proprietà saranno trattate nell'istessa maniera come se appartenessero ad un suddito del paese posto in eguali condizioni.

In tutti questi casi essi non pagheranno sul valore delle loro proprietà altre o maggiori tasse, diritti, e carichi, di quelli che sarebbero dovuti dai sudditi nazionali. I sudditi di ciascuna delle Parti Contraenti potranno, in ogni caso, esportare le loro proprietà, od il ricavo della loro vendita, con tutta libertà, e senza essere sottoposti per tale esportazione al pagamento di alcun diritto come straniero, o di alcun diritto che sia differente da quelli cui andrebbero soggetti in simili casi i sudditi del paese.

#### ARTICOLO XVII.

Le abitazioni, gli stabilimenti industriali, i magazzini, e le botteghe tenute dai sudditi di ciascuna delle Parti Contraenti negli stati e possessi dell'altra, come pure i locali che loro appartengono, destinati al commercio, saranno rispettati. Nel caso di perquisizione, o di visita domiciliare, in tali abitazioni o locali, e nel caso di ricognizione di libere, carte, e conti, non vi si potrà procedere che dietro autorizzazione legale od ordine scritto di un tribunale, o altra autorità competente.

I sudditi di ciascuna delle due Parti Contraenti potranno, negli stati e possessi dell'altra, far valere i loro diritti e difenderli avanti i tribunali. again without paying any dues other than such as would be payable in a similar case by a national vessel. In case, however, the master of a merchant-vessel should be under the necessity of disposing of a part of his merchandize in order to defray his expenses, he shall be bound to conform to the regulations and tariffs of the place to which he may have come.

If any ship of war or merchant-vessel of one of the Contracting Parties should run aground or be wrecked upon the coasts of the other, such ship or vessel, and all parts thereof, and all furniture and appurtenances belonging thereunto, and all goods and merchandize saved therefrom, including any which may have been cast into the sea, or the proceeds thereof if sold, as well as all papers found on board such stranded or wrecked ship or vessel, shall be given up to the owners or their agents when claimed by them. If there are no such owners or agents on the spot, then the same shall be delivered to the British or Italian Consul-General, Consul, or Vice-Consul, in whose district the wreck or stranding may have taken place, upon being claimed by him within the period fixed by the laws of the country; and such Consuls, owners, or agents, shall pay only the expenses incurred in the preservation of the property, together with the salvage or other expenses which would have been payable in the like case of a wreck of a national vessel.

The goods and merchandize saved from the wreck shall be exempt from all duties of Customs, unless cleared for consumption, in which case they shall pay the same rate of duty as if they had been imported in a national vessel.

In the case either of a vessel being driven in by stress of weather, run aground, or wrecked, the respective Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents shall, if the owner or master or other agent of the owner is not present, or is present and requires in, be authorized to interpose in order to afford the necessary assistance to their fellow-countrymen.

#### ARTICLE XIX.

The Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents of each of the Contracting Parties, residing in the dominions and possessions of the other, shall receive from the local authorities such assistance as can by law be given to them for the recovery of deserters from the vessels of their respective countries.

#### ARTICLE XX.

The present Treaty of Commerce and Navigation, when ratified, shall be substituted for the Treaties in force between the High Contracting Parties, namely, those concluded on the 5th April, 1847, and 30th December, 1854, between Great Britain and Tuscany; and on the 29th April, 1845, between Great Britain and the Two Sicilies; and on the 27th February, 1851, and 9th August, 1854, between Great Britain and Sardinia; and shall remain in force for ten years from the date of the exchange of the ratifications, and further until the expiration of twelve months after either of the Contracting Parties shall have given notice to the other of its intention to terminate the same; each of the Contracting Parties being at liberty to give such notice to the other at the expiration of the first nine years, or at any time afterwards.

#### ARTICLE XXI.

The present Treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London in six weeks, or sooner if possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

#### GENERAL SESSIONS DISTRICTS OF BEECHWORTH, KILMORE, AND SALE, ALTERED.

#### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better administration of Justice in Courts of General Sessions in the Colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that Courts of General Sessions of the peace shall be established and holden in certain places therein named, and such other places or districts within the said colony of Victoria as the Lieutenant Governor thereof shall

appoint; and that it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor of the said colony, from time to time, to define and appoint by proclamation the limits and boundaries of such places or districts within which all such courts shall have jurisdiction respectively, and the places and times at which such courts shall be holden, and such limits, districts, places, and times respectively to revoke, alter, and vary as the said Lieutenant Governor shall think fit: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the sixth day of December, 1853, the General Sessions District of Beechworth was defined: And whereas by another Proclamation bearing date the twenty-first day of January, 1851, the General Sessions District of Sale was defined: And whereas by another Proclamation bearing date the twelfth day of May, 1863, the General Sessions District of Kilmore was defined: And whereas it is expedient to alter the said districts: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke so much of the said several Proclamations as describes the boundaries of the said districts; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby alter the said districts, and do declare and appoint that the said Courts of General Sessions shall be holden in and for the respective districts hereinafter defined, that is to say:—

The Court of General Sessions of the peace holden at Beechworth shall have jurisdiction in and for the district of Beechworth, comprising all that portion of Victoria hereinafter described, viz.:—Commencing at the most eastern source of the Broken River; thence by a straight line south-westerly to the source of Collin's Creek; thence westerly by Mount Battery range to Mount Battery; thence by a straight line north-westerly to the source of Sandy Creek; by that creek north-easterly to its confluence with the Broken River; thence by the last-named river (and including the township of Benalla) to its confluence with Broken Creek; by that creek northerly to its junction with Back Creek; thence by a line north to the River Murray; by that river upwards to its source in the Australian Alps; thence by the Great Dividing Range to Mount Selwyn and the range dividing the waters of the King River from those of the Broken River to the most eastern source of the Broken River, being the point of commencement.

The Court of General Sessions of the peace holden at Kilmore shall have jurisdiction in and for the district of Kilmore, comprising all that portion of Victoria hereinafter described, viz.:—Commencing at the source of Sandy Creek in the Mount Barranhet Range; thence by that creek to its confluence with Broken River, by that river to its junction with Broken Creek (excepting the township of Benalla), by that the last-named creek to its confluence with Back Creek; thence by a line north to the River Murray; thence by the last-named river to its confluence with the Goulburn River; thence by the last-named river to its confluence with Hughes's Creek; thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the head of the McIvor Creek; thence by a line bearing southerly to the junction of Mollison's and Williams's Creek, by the last-named creek to its source in the Great Dividing Range, by that range easterly and northerly to the source of the Rubicon River, by that river to its confluence with the Goulburn River; thence by a straight line north-westerly to Mount Pleasant; thence by a straight line north-easterly to the source of Frenchman's Creek in Puzzle Range, by that range north-westerly to a point bearing south of the north-west angle of the town reserve of Merton; thence north to Mount Barranhet Range, by that range easterly to the source of Sandy Creek, being the point of commencement.

The Court of General Sessions of the Peace holden at Sale shall have jurisdiction in and for the district of Sale, comprising all that portion of Victoria hereinafter described, viz.:—Commencing at the confluence of Merriman's Creek with the sea; thence by Merriman's Creek to its most northern source; thence by a straight line westerly to Hobson's Bridge; thence by the road from said bridge to Bunceup Bunceup Creek; thence by that creek to its source in the Main Dividing Range; by that range easterly and northerly to a point about eight miles, more or less, south of Jericho; thence by a straight line north-easterly to Mount Buller; thence by a straight line northerly to Mount Howitt; thence by the Dividing Range to Mount Selwyn; thence by the Dividing Range to the sources of the Murray River; thence by the boundary line between New South Wales and Victoria to Cape Howe; thence by the sea coast to the point of commencement.

The mean temperature of the month of December was upwards of a degree below the average of the same month, extending over four successive years, and the cool weather has resulted in a mortality less by 95 than the average of the same period. The deaths, however, exceed by 87 those which occurred in the month of November.

The deaths of males and females which occurred during the month were in the respective proportions of 64 and 36 per cent. Deaths of persons over five exceed those of children under that age—a circumstance which has also been noted for some months past, but which at the same season finds no precedent in previous years. The proportions were 63 per cent. at the older period of life, and 47 per cent. at the younger.

The day of highest mortality was the 29th, on which 15th deaths occurred. Only 4 deaths were recorded as having taken place on the 14th.

Seventy-five years was the most advanced age at which any death was recorded during the month. It occurred to a female, and the cause was apoplexy.

The deaths from accidental or violent causes were more than usually numerous, and numbered no less than twenty-four. Of these as many as sixteen were from drowning. In fourteen of these cases the deaths were believed to have been accidental, and resulted principally from the heavy floods which took place during the month. In the remaining two instances, that of a clerk

aged 28 and of a grocer aged 22, who drowned themselves in the Yarra, the deaths were suicidal. A cab-driver, aged 22, also committed suicide by poisoning. A child of 3 years died of a burn, and one of 3½ years of a scald. A boy of 11 died in the Hospital of a fractured skull; a coach-guard, aged 39, was killed by the upsetting of his coach; a child 4 months old was suffocated in bed; a prisoner in the Penitentiary Stockade was killed from inhaling chloroform administered by a medical man; a man, aged 50, was hanged in the Central Gaol in pursuance of a sentence of the Supreme Court.

The deaths in public institutions numbered 62, or 22 per cent. of the total mortality: 36 occurred in the Melbourne Hospital, 7 in the Benevolent Asylum, 7 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Lying-in Hospital, 5 in the Immigrants' Home, 3 in the Immigration Hospital, and 3 in the Melbourne Gaol.

Of the 135 children dying under five years of age, 83, or rather less than 61 per cent., were males, and 52, or slightly over 39 per cent., were females; 99 were under one year old, 15 were between one and two years of age, 11 were between two and three, 7 were between three and four, and 3 were between four and five.

Of the 152 persons who died beyond five years of age, 100, or nearly 66 per cent., were males, and 52, or about 34 per cent., were females; 14 were between five and ten years of age, 12 were between ten and fifteen, 8 were between fifteen and twenty, 18 were between twenty and twenty-five, 16 were between twenty-five and thirty, 16 were between thirty and thirty-five, 13 were between thirty-five and forty, 16 were between forty and forty-five, 13 were between forty-five and fifty, 10 were between fifty and fifty-five, 4 were between fifty-five and sixty, 4 were between sixty and sixty-five, 6 were between sixty-five and seventy, 1 was between seventy and seventy-five, and 1 was seventy-five years of age.

The number of deaths which occurred throughout the district of Melbourne and suburbs during the quarter terminating on the 31st December, 1863, amounted to 688, against 830 in the corresponding quarter of 1862, against 738 in the corresponding quarter of 1861, and against 1,405 in the corresponding quarter of 1860.

#### BEECHWORTH MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAWS.—10th February, 1864.

**A**T a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Beechworth, begun and holden at Beechworth, in the said district, on the second day of February, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

##### BYE-LAW 47.

On the owner of any tunnelling claim, held under bye-law 27, ceasing to keep four men constantly employed, as required by the said bye-law, such extended area shall be forfeited; and the said owner shall be entitled to re-occupy a prospecting claim of three hundred and twenty yards in length on the course of all auriferous quartz lodes or veins intersected by said tunnel, such prospecting quartz claim shall be thereafter held as entitled to the privileges and subject to the conditions contained in bye-laws Nos. 10 and 12.

##### BYE-LAW 48.

All leads or tunnels used or required outside the boundary of any quartz claim to an extent not exceeding one thousand yards in length by a width of sixteen feet, as also an area of one hundred yards in length by a width of forty yards at the entrance of all such leads or tunnels, shall be allowed and held as part of the claim with which they are connected.

##### BYE-LAW 49.

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in these bye-laws, when any dispute arises regarding a claim held as worked and

abandoned ground, the party seeking to occupy a portion of such claim may bring the matter before the warden's court, when the said court shall decide whether the ground in dispute is to be deemed worked and abandoned ground.

The undersigned members of the said mining board concurred in making the foregoing bye-laws.

#### PROCLAMATION

PROHIBITING THE IMPORTATION OF CATTLE FROM TWOFOLD BAY, IN NEW SOUTH WALES, INTO THE PROVINCE OF OTAGO.

By the Honorable JOHN HYDE HARRIS, Superintendent of the said Province.

**WHEREAS** by section 9 of the *Diseased Cattle Act, 1861*, passed by the General Assembly of New Zealand, it is enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to the Governor that any infectious or contagious disease has broken out in any district out of the colony, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by Order in Council, to declare that such district is infected within the meaning of the Act, and from time to time to make such regulations as to him shall seem fit for prohibiting the importation of cattle into the colony from such district, and the landing or driving of such cattle and for destroying cattle imported, landed, or driven contrary to such regulations: And whereas by section 14 of the same Act it is enacted, that the Governor in Council may, by warrant under his hand from time to time, delegate to the superintendent of any province within the colony, all or any of the powers vested in the Governor or Governor in Council by the said Act:

And whereas the Governor in Council hath, by warrant under his hand, delegated to me, John Hyde Harris, so long as I shall hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Otago, the several powers vested in the Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act:

And whereas a Proclamation was issued by me, under the public seal of the said province, before the sixth day of June last, admitting cattle from the port and district of Twofold Bay in the colony of New South Wales, which it is expedient partially to rescind, to the intent that this Proclamation may have full force and effect: And whereas it has been made to appear to me that a certain infectious or contagious disease has broken out amongst cattle imported into the province of Otago, from the port and district of Twofold Bay, in the colony of New South Wales aforesaid:

Now therefore I, the said John Hyde Harris, by virtue of the powers delegated to me in this behalf, do hereby rescind the aforesaid Proclamation of the sixth day of June last, so far as it relates to the port and district of Twofold Bay, in the colony of New South Wales aforesaid.

And do hereby proclaim and declare that from and after the date hereof the port and district of Twofold Bay, in the colony of New South Wales aforesaid, shall be deemed an infected district, place, or port, within the meaning, and for the purposes, of the abovementioned Act; and that no cattle from and after the date hereof, until further notice, shall be permitted to be imported into the province of Otago from the port and district of Twofold Bay, in the colony of New South Wales aforesaid.
